Adam's grandfather, JD Biggs, worked at Taylor County RECC for five decades. Adam is following in his footsteps and already building a reputation as a hard worker, the first to volunteer and learn anything new. He graduated high school in 2019 and graduated lineman school in Somerset the following September.

After high school he got a job at A and C Communications, where he worked for around eight months before getting hired at Taylor County RECC as a meter reader. He later became a staking engineer before landing what he calls his dream job, becoming a lineman in January 2022.

A t the age of 28, Cody Giles is believed to be the youngest person operating a bourbon distillery in the U.S. As a Master Distiller, Cody operates the James E. Pepper Distillery in Lexington.

Cody graduated from Adair County High School in 2013 then the University of Kentucky in 2017, where he majored in chemical engineering.

Cody worked at vineyards and wineries during college and started working for James E. Pepper Distillery in the fall of 2017.

The Pepper family brand of whiskey dates back to the American Revolution, but in the late 1960s the bourbon industry hit hard times and both the brand and the Lexington distillery were abandoned for over half a century.

In 2008 the brand was relaunched and a multi-year construction plan was put into place. Cody started at James E. Pepper Distillery during the completion of the renovation of the property. In 2022, he was promoted to plant manager/head distiller and now leads a team of six full-time operators involved in all

aspects of the whiskey production process, from fermentation to the finished product.

Cody says two Adair County High School teachers played a significant role in leading him to pursue a chemical engineering degree.

"Susan Peck is an amazing chemistry teacher who brought so much enthusiasm to the subject she was teaching. John Shelley did much the same for mathematics. Thanks to both of them," he says.

As he headed into his junior year of college, Cody was still not sure where he wanted his career path to take him, but then he heard about a distilling certificate program starting up at UK.

He took the classes and developed relationships with his professors and was led to James E. Pepper, a new startup distillery. He thanks Amir Peay, the owner, for taking a chance on him, and his mentor, Aaron Schorsch, "who taught me everything I know and is a great distiller."

Cody is the son of Mary Ellen Rogers and Jeff Giles and is brother to Jared Giles.

rey Spinks worked in the and earned a welding certificate from Tulsa Welding School. He was already hard working and successful, but Trey wanted more.

He was driving home one day and a cornfield caught his eye. That moment led him on a trail and after some research, he found his calling.

Trey started looking at crop spraying drones, drones that use precision technology to map, plan and execute crop treatments. After his research, he took the idea to his father, Ronnie Spinks II, who agreed a drone would make a great business venture. Along with the support of his family, Trey started Spinks Aerial Spraying Solutions and Southern Kentucky Soil Sampling.


Trey was the first person in the state to obtain an agricultural aircraft operator certificate for spray drones. In 2019, he worked with farmers in three counties on a project led by Nick Roy, Adair County Extension Agent, to look at the cost effectiveness and feasibility of drone-applied fungicides to corn. Drones can get into fields where helicopters can't, and they spray just where the product is needed.

"Some local farmers really encouraged him to invest in that business. They were very appreciative of him," Roy said.

Producers were eager to work with Trey, and Roy and the team at the University of Kentucky were able to collect several years of data, Roy said. Their cutting-edge research first proved that using a drone is a feasible way to spray fields. Once that was proven, they were able to use the drone to test different fungicide treatments. The research led to several university publications about their findings.

"I love what I do," Trey said. "Spraying corn has taught me a lot about corn in general and how to properly care for your crops. In addition, I learned about the importance of soil health and the impact it has on the crop. This inspired me to start another business for sampling soil. This endeavor has also allowed me to work in agriculture but also learn a lot about new technologies and how these technologies can help advance the way we farm in the future."

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
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
