

EDA has major projects in the works



Members of the local Economic Development Authority board have been meeting behind closed doors a lot lately, and that's actually a good thing.

The board has a legal right to hold closed meetings under specific guidelines if the meetings pertain to the recruitment of business and industry. The multiple meetings means that the board has at least one project that has made it through multiple steps, something the community has not witnessed in recent years.

"We are looking at two prospects and things are looking pretty good," board chairman Bobby Morrison said earlier this week. Morrison and Heather Spoon made a visit to Frankfort last week to visit with state officials involved in economic development. While Morrison said they are still at a place where they cannot talk about specifics, they are very optimistic about the future.

"We're still somewhat in negotiations and there's some timelines out there, but they're looking good, and (state officials) refer more prospects to us all the time," Morrison said.

The EDA board approved two letters of intent in March to provide 160 acres of land in the Green River Commerce Park to the two prospective tenants. They also hired a law firm to represent EDA with any transactions.

Morrison said he was surprised at the number of steps required and the number of boards that must give their approval for a project that includes the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development, but the board sees light at the end of the tunnel.

Getting the projects to completion takes a lot of time, and EDA board members serve as volunteer members. Morrison and board

Willis has been an educator for more than two decades, with the majority of those years spent in the Adair County school system.

When asked her goals as a new principal, Willis said, "First and foremost, the students are the most important, and I want us to work together as a team –

City will assess structural needs of Trabue-Russell House

The Columbia City Council voted Monday night to allocate \$11,500 to assess the condition of the Trabue-Russell House and prioritize any need for repairs.

Members of the Adair Heritage Association made the request to the council during the regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Mary Ann Loy, who

volunteers her time toward the care of the historic home, addressed the council concerning the request. The building is owned by the city.

The assessment will be completed by Spangler Williamson Architecture and Engineering.

Loy explained how they determined there was a need for the assessment. She said she had

made a list of visible repairs for city employees to work on, but when they began working on the repairs they realized there were issues with floor joists beyond what they could do.

With a recommendation from Mayor Pam Hoots, the group contacted the Kentucky Heritage Council for suggestions.

They recommended

several people who could do this type of work, and the group selected Spangler Williamson and architect Jen Spangler Williamson, who was at one time the architect for the Kentucky Heritage Council. She has already visited the building and provided a proposal.

During discussion about the historic home, council members

thanked the committee for their work on the house and Dr. Ronald Rogers added a particular compliment for Loy.

"I've seen her work over there eight to 10 hours in a row, Rogers said, noting that he can see the Trabue-Russell House from his home.

Other than the conversation concerning the Trabue-Russell House,

the meeting was brief with only a few updates on current projects.

Council members Hannah Peck, Sharon Payne, Robert Flowers and Rogers were present. Mark Harris and Rhonda Loy were absent.

Mike Harris attended his first regularly scheduled meeting as the newly appointed city attorney.

member Mark Dykes have taken a lead on different aspects of the project, and while Spoon is supposed to be hired on a contract basis by the board, Morrison said she has not billed the board for the work she has provided them.

"She hasn't billed us in a year," Morrison said. "We've been on her case about it. She's put in tremendous work and been a tremendous help to us."

Among other things, Spoon helped the board compile the data and information needed during a recruitment process. Prior to that work, the board did not have a professional portfolio to present. Morrison said they would have never been able to have worked with the two prospective clients without the early work Spoon provided.

"We couldn't touch it," he said.

Morrison also complimented Rob Wilkerson, who owns Assisted

Transportation Systems, which is located in the Green River Commerce Park.

"He really helped us a lot in trying to identify and locate all the utilities in the park," Morrison said. "Him being willing to trade land for us really opened up the opportunities here."

They traded land after EDA was told they could not build a road over natural gas pipelines that go through the park. The trade allowed EDA to have a better access around the pipeline.

Build Ready project moves forward

In addition to meeting with state officials and potential new businesses for the Green River Commerce Park, the board is busy moving forward with a 150,000 sq. ft. certified build ready pad.

EDA just received a signed agreement for a grant from the Kentucky Product Development Initiative for \$456,000. Matching funds have

already been approved by EDA, the city and county, with each group contributing \$150,000. The funding will be used to build the pad and provide \$500,000 in utility additions and improvements at the commerce park.

Morrison spent some time this week marking of the location for the build ready pad. Engineers have already been hired for the project.

The next step is to apply for the next round of KPDI grant funding, and EDA can apply for up to \$2 million. A company EDA works with for recruiting has shown interest in helping match the grant, but those negotiations are in early stages. If they reach an agreement, the company will match the \$2 million grant to build a \$3.4 million spec building on the build ready pad. Additional improvements in utilities and waterlines would also be included in the project.

students as well as the community. I want to create a positive school climate for the students so they are excited about coming to school, that they enjoy school, and that would help them be successful."

Willis is taking on the role of principal at the same time the district is welcoming a new superintendent, Jason Faulkner. Willis said they have not held their first administrative meeting yet with Faulkner.

Willis comes from a family of educators, including her parents, Don and Francine Neat. She and her husband, Matthew, have three children, Samuel, Mattie, and Warren.

Mayor responds to criticism by county judge

The Columbia City Council held a brief special called meeting last week to go into a closed session. While the reason for the meeting was a generic description required to hold an executive session dealing with potential new business or expansion, the reason for the meeting was no secret.

The notice of the meeting went out to news media on Tuesday afternoon, June 27, but later that night County Judge Executive Larry Russell Bryant spoke critically during a fiscal court meeting about Mayor Pam Hoots, saying she was asked to write a letter of recommendation for an economic development project but she delayed it, saying she needed to take it before the city council.

Mayor Hoots spoke to the Community Voice following the council meeting the following day and said she was fol-

lowing her normal protocol by notifying council members. She said she contacted state officials to make sure her timing on the letter did not jeopardize the project.

Newly appointed city attorney Mike Harris also took part in the interview, and noted that Hoots has the authority to send letters on her own for various matters.

"She normally gets the blessing of the council whenever these things come up," Harris said. "This matter came up on short notice. Usually they get it a month in advance and she always goes to the council to ask them their thoughts about what they want to do."

Hoots said she sent a "temporary" letter until she could speak with the council then would follow up with an official letter.

Bryant's comments the night before were highly critical of Hoots, even

commenting that, "We don't need people like that holding back our county."

Hoots responded to the comments on social media:

"You know, the definition of 'bullying' is an effort by someone (can be in workplace, an elected official, or someone as a supervisor) that is providing/attempting to intimidate or create a hostile environment.

"Without going into details, two days this week, I received numerous calls, friends of mine received correspondence, and others (including state officials) were contacted to get me to do something that is not a process I follow. I was told they were going to call out 'the big dogs,' to make me agree with their position."

Hoots went on to explain her desire to inform the council and thanked people for the support she had received.

I wondered how the nation began shooting off fireworks for this particular event so I thought I would do a little research. It turns out that fireworks were part of the 4th of July celebration from the beginning.


According to a report

from AccuWeather, in 1776 John Adams sent a letter to his wife, Abigail, writing that Independence Day should be celebrated "from one end of this continent to the other" from that day forward. It should be celebrated with "pomp and parade, with (shows), games, sports, bonfires, bells and illuminations."

The very next year, the first fireworks were displayed on the 4th of July in Philadelphia, beginning a tradition we continue to hold dear.

I've always loved Independence Day and what it represents. I think about the founders of this nation who were willing to put everything on the line to take a stand in a battle that appeared very unlikely to end in victory. They knew the odds were against them, but they believed in the need for independence so strongly that they were willing to sacrifice their belongings and their lives for the freedom they sought.

While some people may get weary when their neighbors shoot off fireworks in the dead of night, I usually just smile and go about my business. They may not even know much about why fireworks are in abundance the first week of July, but for me, it's the sound of freedom, a freedom that was hard fought and should be treasured, protected, and celebrated.

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
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

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Adair woman arrested on rape charges

An investigation that began around 1:12 a.m. on Saturday led to the arrest of a Columbia woman on rape, 1st degree charges.

The investigation began with a complaint on Jamestown Street that led officers to the back of Haven Hill Cemetery off Liberty Road. Police say Felicia Frausto was found with another female who appeared to be trying to get away from her. After interviews, the victim was transported to TJ Health for treatment. Frausto was charged and lodged in the Adair County Regional Jail on charges of rape, 1st degree; unlawful imprisonment; possession of marijuana and public intoxication.

Sheriff Deputy Chandler Staten is leading the investigation. He was assisted on scene by Deputy Josh Durbin and officers with the Columbia Police Department.

Adair woman injured in collision

On Friday the Adair County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to an accident with injuries in the Sano community nine miles east of Columbia.

Preliminary investigation indicated Brandy Shepherd, of Columbia, was traveling south on Ky. 1729 in a 2018 Lincoln SUV when she dropped off the right

shoulder of the highway, struck a tree and overturned.

Shepherd was treated on scene by Adair EMS and transported to TJ Health for additional treatment.

The collision is being investigated by Sheriff Josh Brockman.

Russell County man arrested on trafficking charges after traffic stop

A Thursday traffic stop led to an arrest on drug charges.

Sheriff Deputy Josh Durbin and K-9 deputy Chandler Staten initiated a traffic stop on a 2005 Chevy Silverado on Campbellsville Rd.

Investigation led to a vehicle search where methamphetamine was located. Based on the quantity, law enforcement believes the drugs were intended for resale.

Jake Mcendree, 42, of Russell Springs, was arrested and charged with trafficking in a controlled substance, 1st degree, methamphetamine; possession of drug paraphernalia; possession of marijuana and possession of a controlled substance, 3rd degree, unspecified.

Deputy Josh Durbin is continuing the investigation.

Columbia man arrested on drug charges

A suspicious person call at Five Star on Jamestown Street Thursday led to the arrest of a Columbia man.

When officers arrived they made contact with a male subject in a vehicle. After speaking with the subject he denied consent to search the vehicle.

K-9 unit Nitro with the Adair County Sheriff's Office was deployed and alerted on the male's truck. A search of the vehicle led to the discovery of marijuana and suspected methamphetamine.

Michael Compton, 52, was arrested and charged with possession of drug paraphernalia; possession of marijuana; and possession of methamphetamine.

Sheriff Brockman warns of scam calls

Adair County Sheriff Josh Brockman said he has been made aware of scam calls happening that are using various



sheriff's office and police department names.

The scammers are using an app to make it appear as if the call is coming from a law enforcement phone number.

The caller has extensive information about the individual they are calling, including their family names, addresses, maiden name, license number, birthday dates and other identifying information.

The caller will give a case number that they claim is pending against the victim and will ask them to go ahead and prepay their bond.

While it is possible for a law enforcement officer to call you in reference to an incident, it is highly unlikely they will call you on the phone about an incident you aren't already aware of,

states Brockman.

If you receive one of these calls, Brockman says to ask the caller for their name, the department they work for and their badge number. Then hang up the phone, look up the contact information for the agency they claim to work for on a legitimate source and call the agency to verify. Ask to speak to that officer, give the badge number and tell them the nature of the call you received to verify the call was made from them.

A law enforcement agency will never call and ask you to make a direct payment for a ticket, a bond or a warrant. A bond can only be posted in person at a correctional facility or at the circuit clerk's office.



Law enforcement officers are not allowed, nor

do they have the training or ability to post bonds at their agencies, according to Brockman, and they especially don't use apps such as PayPal, Venmo or Apple prepaid cards.

Most of the time, once the money is paid, it is gone and not recoverable. The addresses with the accounts normally leads to an abandoned house or business, if they even exist at all.

"If it doesn't sound right, it probably isn't right," Brockman said, "Please do not fall prey to these scam artists."




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
