Mission Week provides thousands of hours of service

A back-to-school bash, a block party and sidewalk chalking – it all sounds like too much fun to be part of a weeklong project to serve the needs of others, but that's exactly what Mission Week is all about.

J.O.Y. Ministries just wrapped up the annual Mission Week, with close to 3,000 hours spent serving the community while having a great time.

More than 50 students participated in Mission Week, and 80 people were involved overall when factoring in leaders and volunteers.

"It is for high school age and above students, and they do missions throughout our community, instilling that servant leadership mentality in students," said Hannah Peck, vice president of the non-profit organization.

During Mission Week, students spend their nights at a local church, and each day brings new ways to serve others. Each evening ends with a praise and worship session

The back-to-school bash served 96 children from the community, providing them with everything from clothing and shoes to backpacks, along with a hot meal for the entire family. On different days, participants cut trees, spent time with people in an adult dare care facility, and sent out hundreds of meals to people in the community.

Gabe Coleman was part of a group that helped at a Feeding America volunteer center in Elizabethtown and took on some pretty hefty projects during the week.

"My group was one of the two boys' groups that went around and did more physical labor," he said. "We painted the basement at the United Methodist Church... We cut down some trees and trimmed bushes and low hanging limbs."

At Feeding America, Coleman said they were able to pack Rx boxes. The boxes are provided to doctors who ask patients a question about food security, and if they

Garden overflow shared at free produce stand

A successful garden is a garden of overflow. There's plenty of fresh produce for the day's meals and hours of busy canning or freezing so the bounty will continue providing nourishment throughout the winter.

But sometimes, enough is enough. The pantry is filled with enough canning jars to last for years, and the freezer can hold no more. So, what's a successful gardener to do?

The answer came easy for Laura Brummett. She set up a produce stand on the side of the road near her home and started giving away the overflow.

A "Fresh Produce" sign catches the eye of travelers along Ky 55 in the GlensFork community, or Hardscratch as the locals like to call it. On some days, there's enough of this or that for a good canning session, and it's all free for the taking, first come, first served, of course.

"This is just my second year of raising a garden and we canned all that we can can," Brummett said. "There was still food left, so I guess you could say that the Lord graciously provided for us,

and I felt like if it was still there, then it was more than enough to give away to other people in need or just people who wanted to can and didn't have a garden."

Brummett said the greatest part of the experience has been the opportunity to get to talk with people who are enjoying her generosity.

"We are out there farming all day, and we don't have a lot of interaction with people like you do when you have a public job, so that's been a fun part of it," she said. She has even met new people, some through messaging, because of the project.

People have reached out to thank her for the fresh produce and she has particularly enjoyed hearing from elderly people who once grew their own garden but are no longer able to. Others are growing their own produce, too, and bringing their overflow of items while taking a few other items they are short in.

Jeremy McQueary was recently named director of the law enforcement division at the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife.


McQueary, an Adair County native, is a 16year veteran of the department, all within the law enforcement division. He began his career with Kentucky Fish and Wildlife in 2007 and graduated from the agency's Academy Class 14 in 2008 as class valedictorian. He is the first graduate of the academy to move up the ranks to eventually be named a colonel in the Cabinet.

McQueary started his enforcement career in District 4, which includes Adair, Barren, Cumberland, Edmonson, Grayson, Green, Hardin, Hart, Larue, Marion, Metcalfe, Monroe, Nelson, Taylor and Washington counties. He assisted within the training section of the law enforcement division throughout his ca-

Prior to joining the department, McQueary began his law enforcement career as a Kentucky State Park Ranger stationed at Lake Cumberland in 2005. He graduated in Class 371 from the Department of Criminal Justice Training in 2006 as class valedictorian.

McQueary is an Adair County High School graduate and attended Lindsey Wilson College where he played baseball for four years and holds a bachelor's degree under a contract major emphasized in biology, business and journalism.

He and his wife Carly have four children, Luxy, Lemmy, Ava and Creek, and a lab in training, Jude. He's an avid hunter, angler, a traditional archer and enjoys endurance sports.

Gold enters Class of 2027 plebe summer at U.S. Naval Academy

Jonathan Gold, a graduate of Adair County High School, was inducted into the Naval Academy Class of 2027 on June 29, marking the beginning of six challenging weeks of basic midshipman training during Plebe Summer.

Approximately 1,200 candidates are selected each year for the Academy's "plebe" or freshman class, and each student is required to participate in Plebe Summer. During this time, plebes have no access to television. movies, the internet, or music and restricted access to cell phones. They are only permitted to make three calls during the six weeks of Plebe Summer.

The pressure and rigor of Plebe Summer is care-



fully designed to help plebes prepare for their first academic year at the Naval Academy and the four years or challenge that awaits them.

As the summer progresses, the new midshipmen rapidly assimilate basic skills in seamanship, navigation, damage control, sailing, and handling yard patrol

craft. Plebes also learn infantry drill and how lo shoot 9 mm pistols and M-16 rifles.

Other daily training sessions involve moral, mental, physical, and professional development and team-building skills. Activities include swimming, martial arts, basic rock climbing, and obstacle, endurance, and confidence courses designed to develop physical, mental, and team-building skills. Forty hours are devoted to the instruction of infantry drill and five formal parades.

Founded in 1845, the U.S. Naval Academy is a four-year service academy that prepares midshipmen morally, mentally, and physically to be professional officers in the naval service.





Meeting will feature textiles in Adair

Early settlers in the Adair County area had no access to store-bought clothing. What they used was made by hand at home.

Some grew flax from which linen was made, some grew cotton, some raised sheep for wool. It was a rare thing for cloth to be imported across the mountains or down the Ohio into this area before the early 1820s.


Even then most fam-

ilies relied upon homemade cloth. The textile industry here was slow to grow but did exist.

Weaving and quilting were cottage industries that flourished here. Quilting continued into the recent past as a necessity and today is more an art form than a need for comfort.

Most families have or have had treasured textile heirlooms and keepsakes such as quilts, embroidery work, clothing and more. The Adair Genealogy and History Research Center has collected some items in this category and enjoy the comments by those who view them here.


