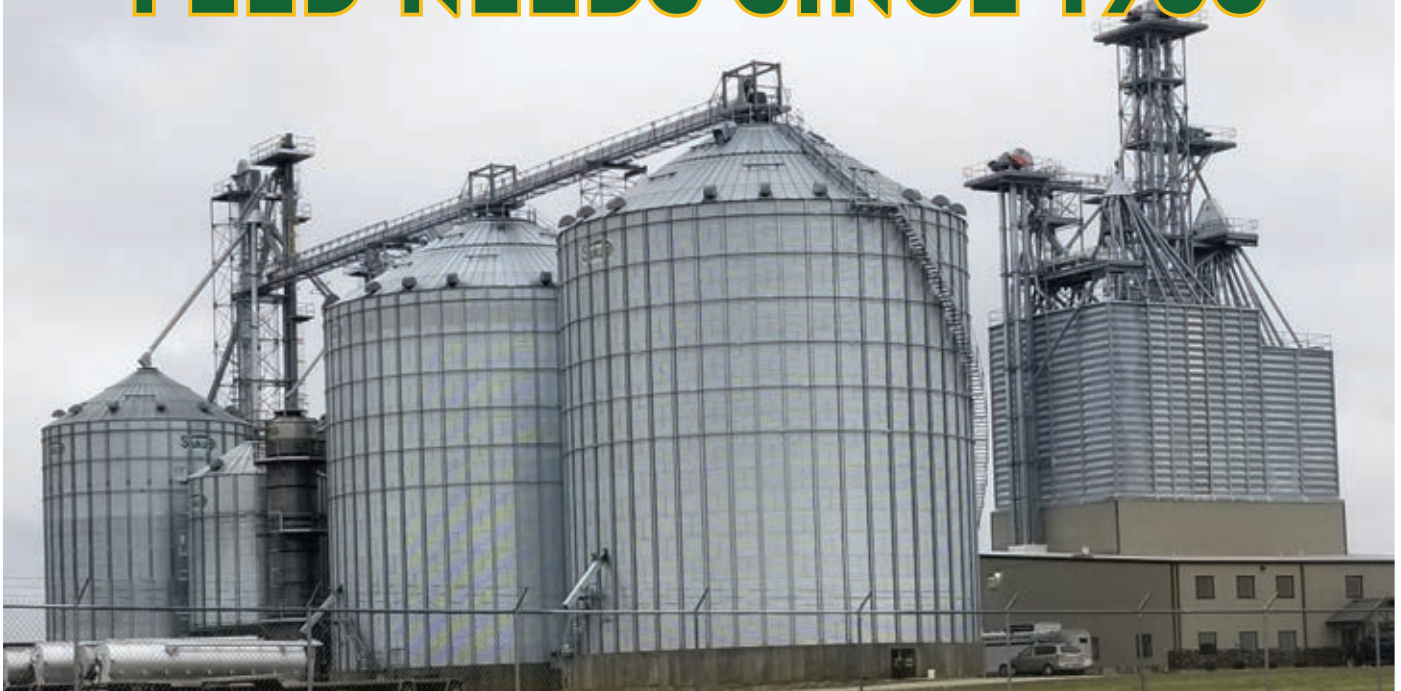

Welcome to Dallas County Schools

Believe in Buffalo

Dallas County School District services most of the children who live in Dallas County. The school district services approximately 1680 students over 379 square miles of Dallas, Laclede and Polk counties. The school district is the largest employer in the county with 288 staff members, including 160 teaching staff and 128 classified staff.

Home of the Bison, Dallas County School District is fully accredited by the State of Missouri and is an A+ school with an early childhood center, elementary school, middle school, high school and technical center in Buffalo. Dallas County Schools have a rich heritage of strong academics, competitive sports and a wide variety of extracurricular activities, as well as after-school programming. The average years of experience among the teaching staff is 10.7 years.

D. A. Mallory Elementary in Buffalo serves students grades K-4, with a student-to-teacher ratio of 12:1. The elementary school offers special services to students with disabilities, as well as gifted programs and Title I services. Mallory Elementary is proud to serve the early childhood community with its Early Childhood Center. The preschool program serves students ages 4-5 preparing them for kindergarten with a half-day preschool program. The center also offers the Parent As Teachers program which serves children from birth to 3 years of age.

Buffalo Prairie Middle School, grades 5-8, has a student-to-teacher ratio of 15:1 and offers a comprehensive academic and extracurricular programs. It also provides a variety of fun educational after-school programming.

Buffalo High School, grades 9-12, has a student-to-teacher ratio of 14:1 and offers a comprehensive program for college and career readiness including courses in career education, dual credit, and advanced placement, as well as a variety of extracurricular activities. Buffalo Prairie Middle School and Buffalo High School offer special services and gifted services.

The Dallas County Technical, now on the same campus as Buffalo High School, serves six school districts including the Dallas County R-1. Career and technical education is offered in ten program areas for 9-12 graders and students can earn industry certifications in each program and can even earn college credit in their tech center classes. Students can choose to take classes in automotive technology, collision repair technology, agriculture education, construction technology, welding technology, information technology, criminal justice, graphic design, health science, and teacher education preparation. Most classes have a student to teacher ratio of 18:1.

The school district strives to maintain strong communications with parents and the community. Parent and community involvement is essential to providing strong academic programming for its students. The district regularly seeks community involvement and support for school improvement in all areas.

We have wide open spaces but are close to a city

Dallas County offers the best of both worlds — a rural and small-town flavor, yet near Springfield, one of Missouri's major cities. The county offers a friendly atmosphere, wide open spaces, outdoor living, a relatively low cost of living and low taxes.

County residents are proud of their deep-rooted values, which are reflected in the abundance of churches and outstanding schools in the area.

Because of the relatively new four-lane highway, Dallas County is more convenient to Springfield than ever — less than 30 minutes from Buffalo and of course much closer for those in the southern part of the county. This is felt that this will lead to more growth and economic development in the

county, and helps those Dallas Countians who work in Springfield get to their destinations faster.

Additionally, in recent years a third lane was completed on U.S. 65 from Mo. 32 north to the new Mo. 73 bypass, a total of one mile. The 73 bypass was completed in 2009, and all of these road construction projects are opening new economic opportunities for Dallas County.

The county's population is nearly 17,000 people, which is up from 12,000 in 1990. Buffalo is the county seat and the county's largest city, with more than 3,000 residents. Urbana is the second-largest city with a population of about 420.

In 2017 an organization called the Economic Development Group in January added an executive

director to lead efforts to bring more businesses and people into the county.



About 75 to 80 percent of Dallas County residents live in the country, where they fully can enjoy the area's outdoor living and activities. Agriculture is the county's largest industry, with beef and dairy cattle dominating the ag scene. There is also a growing number of horse owners in the county.

Dallas County is a mecca for hunters and anglers. Deer and turkey are the most prominent game, and there are many rivers and streams in which to fish. Bennett Spring State Park features fishing and camping activities, and the Niangua River is a popular destination for those interested in canoeing and other boating activities.

Buffalo, the seat of Dallas County, was founded in 1841 on Buffalo Head Prairie. Subsequently, the town was named for a buffalo skull landmark erected in 1833 by Samuel Grigsby, who apparently was just passing through the area. The landmark was about where Shewmaker Auto Parts is today, near the junction of U.S. 65 and Mo. 32. One of the first settlers was Mark Reynolds.

Today, Buffalo is a thriving community of more than 3,000 residents and is the hub of Dallas County commerce. It is the largest city on U.S. 65 between Springfield and Sedalia, a distance of 115 miles, and is just 30 miles from Springfield and 75 miles from Branson.

The Dallas County Courthouse and Annex are on the town square in the area of Maple and Main streets. Buffalo High School, Buffalo Prairie Middle School, D.A. Mallory Elementary School and a preschool are located in the city limits.

In July 2010 the Missouri Department of Transportation completed a four-lane highway (U.S. 65) from

I-44 in Springfield to Buffalo. Many believe this will lead to more population growth and increased commerce in the future.

To prepare for this growth, the city in 2006 completed construction of a 400,000-gallon water tower and well near South Locust Street. A new water tower to replace the old downtown tower was finished in 2020.

In April 2006, residents overwhelmingly passed a \$3.7 million bond issue to expand the wastewater plant in order to handle future population growth. That project was completed in 2009. In 2010, Buffalo's wastewater plant was named Wastewater Plant of the Year by the Missouri Rural Water Association.

In September 2009, a one-half mile connecting road was completed from U.S. 65 to Mo. 73 in north Buffalo. The connecting road now routes large semi trucks around the edge of Buffalo instead of bringing them through the town square on Mo. 73. Aside from the safety issue, community leaders expect the new corridor to spur economic growth in the area.

Buffalo is a community *recognized* by the Missouri Community Betterment Association

Buffalo was given the prestigious Community of the Year award two consecutive years. The Missouri Community Betterment Association (MCB) is a statewide organization whose goal is to promote and support all Missouri communities through advocacy, partnership, marketing and resources. About 70 Missouri communities around the state are currently members of MCB. Buffalo is the only community in the organization's 60 year history to win the award two years in a row — 2018 and 2019.

Buffalo was chosen for Community of the Year based on their outstanding demonstration of community planning and collaboration. Strategic planning brought city, county, economic development, legislative, academic and civic leaders together to identify central community goals, and leveraged their joint efforts to move forward in the same direction.

"This recognition is a tre-

mendous honor for Buffalo and the many community leaders and volunteers who have worked hard to keep moving this community forward. To receive this recognition two years in a row is really a testament to the vision and continued work that is being done here in this community," said Hollie Elliott, execu-

tive director of the Dallas County Economic Development Group who accepted the award on the community's behalf.

Buffalo highlighted the cultural "shift" which has been occurring in the community over the last three years. This movement of the needle was primarily evidenced by the passing of a bond issue to build a new Career and Technical Center for the Dallas County R-1 School System, as well as a county tax levy to support services, both in the same early 2019 election. Dr. Tim Ryan, superintendent of schools — Dallas County R-1 stated, "This was the first bond issue to be passed in Dallas County in 20 years."

One of the outstanding programs highlighted

was the Leadership Buffalo program, which was created on the belief that the community, just as any business or organization, requires strong leadership to improve and grow. Leadership Buffalo aims to identify current and emerging leaders throughout the community, enhance their leadership skills and deepen their knowledge of the community's opportunities and challenges. Upon reviewing the projects, judges were impressed by the level of collaboration between stakeholders, and the effectiveness with which they are moving forward together. They cited "impressive" community focus, impact and support as the reasons for choosing Buffalo to receive this award above all others.

in the area.

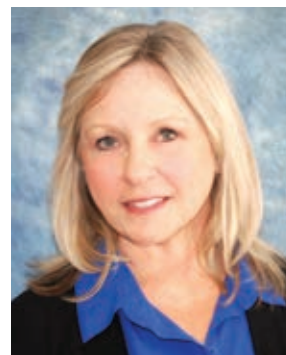
- Demographics — The chamber offers area demographics useful to businesses and those interested in expanding or starting a business.

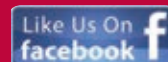

Agriculture is Dallas County's **biggest industry**

Dallas County is home to about 50,000 head of beef and dairy cattle, making animal agriculture the county's primary industry.

With 217,912 acres devoted to farming, county farmers annually contribute \$47.7 million approximately in agricultural receipts to the economy, according to the Missouri Department of Agriculture.

The county's 1,188 farming operations include 25,500 beef cows and 2,500 dairy cows. The remainder of the cattle numbers is comprised of calves, bulls and steers.

Most of the county's beef operations are small — running 50 or fewer head. Although few compared to beef numbers, Dallas County's sheep and lamb inventory of 607 represents a growing enterprise, while hogs stand

at 209 head. Goat numbers are larger at 944.

With increasing meat goat numbers in Dallas and surrounding counties, Buffalo Livestock Market has become a leading Missouri goat market, as well as a strong regional cattle outlet. Urbana Livestock Market offers buyers and sellers an optional market in the north end of the county.

In addition to cattle and other animals, Dallas County is home to a large turkey production industry, as well as an expanding organic and nonorganic layer industry, shipping eggs nationwide.

Bred for pleasure-riding, competition, cattle-working and as purebred breeding stock, horses number about 2,602. That figure also includes donkeys and mules.

As average beef herd numbers suggest, most Dallas County farms are relatively small, family operations.

For farmers to grow livestock, they must first become forage producers. Sustaining Dallas County's vital animal agriculture are about 50,000 acres of grass and legume hay.

Although much of the county's geography is better suited for permanent grass, many arable acres also have been sown in corn, soybeans and sunflowers in recent years, as well as no-till crops of winter wheat.

Providing expertise and technical assistance to Dallas County farmers as needed are specialists with the University of Missouri Extension Service, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service and the Dallas County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Since 2002, Dallas County 911 has been at the center of providing emergency communications throughout the county. Including handling all 911 emergencies, telecommunicators help disseminate and control the radio and phone communications for all emergency services agencies within the county as well.

Over the years, the telecommunicators have provided these professional services to the community using various radio and computer technology specific to mission-control style emergency communications. As with many products and services constantly changing and improving, so has Dallas County 911.

Dallas County 911 is also responsible for establishing and maintaining addressing information throughout the county. Consistency is important as all emergency personnel rely heavily on signs and clearly posted address markings. Dallas County



911 strongly encourages residents to clearly display, in large characters, their 911 address for responders to quickly identify their home.

The telecommunicators of Dallas County 911 enjoy directing all emergency personnel to individuals in crucial need of medical attention, law enforcement intervention or fire suppression. The tasks of each telecommunicator

can be overwhelming at times, and being a telecommunicator requires strong-willed, motivated and talented characteristics.

Telecommunicators must be prepared to handle any type of major incident at any moment. This field of professionalism is not mundane and requires constant training, self-motivation and a desire to help others.

Dallas County 911 is staffed by two telecommunicators 24/7, but depending on call types and loads, even two veteran telecommunicators can become inundated with call processing. The use of 911 is strictly for emergencies only involving threat of life or property. Non-emergencies can be processed by calling the designated non-emergency phone number, (417) 345-1999.

Dallas County School District opens new *Technical Center*

Graduates may choose to attend a four-year college or university; others may seek additional training at a post-secondary technical school or community college; and some will go directly into the workforce or military.

The Dallas County R-1 School District consists of Buffalo High School, Buffalo Prairie Middle School and D.A. Mallory Elementary School, all in Buffalo.

Based on the 2021 Annual Performance Report issued by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, Dallas County R-1 celebrates many achievements. DC R-1 student performance is compared to the average of other Missouri students. The APR is the measure by which school districts are fully accredited, provisionally accredited or unaccredited. The percentage of students earning technical skills certifications was 88.89 percent in career and technical courses, which exceeds the state average. The percentage of students who were employed, in the military or seeking further education six months after graduation was 92.73 percent. Finally, the district graduation rate also exceeds the state average at 99.08 percent. This is an outstanding percentage. School building administrators utilize the APR data to set building goals, develop building improvement plans and action plans. Data from state assessments is also used to assist teachers in making instructional/curriculum decisions moving forward.

Post-secondary preparation is key for student success and is a priority of the Dallas County R-1 School District. Buffalo High School participates in the Missouri Department of Higher Education A+ Scholarship Program. The A+ Scholarship Program provides scholarship funds to eligible graduates of A+ designated high schools who attend a participating public community college or vocational/technical school, or certain private two-year vocational/technical schools. The A+ Program is designed to ensure that no matter which option is chosen, all high school students will be provided a selection of courses, career counseling, technology and/or workplace skill development opportunities that are appropriate to their career goals. The A+ Program encourages all students to focus on careers early and set goals, which includes training beyond high school. The program provides the opportunity for all students to select a career path, plan course work for all four years of high school, and progress toward a goal of additional training at the post-secondary level or a high-wage job.

Dallas County R-1 is proud to serve the early childhood community in two different ways. Housed within the red walls of the Early Childhood Center, there is a

Parents as Teachers Program, or PAT, and the preschool program that services up to 80 preschoolers each day. The mission of the PAT program is to provide the information, support and encouragement that parents need to help their children, ages birth through kindergarten, achieve optimal development. The PAT achieves this through annual developmental screenings and home visits where age and developmentally appropriate activities are conducted. The preschool program has two classrooms and two three-hour sessions to ensure that the learners are given the tools they need to be successful kindergartners. With the littlest Bison, the school focuses on developing phonological awareness, numerical awareness, fine and gross motor skills, health and safety skills and social-emotional skills. This is achieved through structured learning and play, and the newly implemented Early Language and Literacy Curriculum.

Exceptions to the rule are the Southern Dallas County Fire Protection District, Elkland Fire District, Fair Grove Fire District, Urbana City Fire District and the Bennett Spring Fire Protection District, which are funded by tax revenue.

County *library* offers large variety of books

Library Card

Patrons need two forms of identification to obtain a library card, photo identification or a non-driver's license with photo and proof of current mailing address. Youth 17 years of age and younger must have a parent or guardian's signature. Out-of-county resident yearly fee is \$10. Replacement cards are \$4 each. Library cards are required to use computers or to check out material. Non-card holders or visitors must provide ID and sign Policy to use public computers, charge is \$1.

Materials

The library has print material, E-Books, audio (CD's) e-audio books, magazines, e-magazines, and video. Loan period time for print material, audio books and magazines is two weeks with one renewal allowed. Videos, one week with no renewals.

Public Internet services

Youth 17 years old or younger must have a parent or guardian sign an acceptance use form. Children 13 or under must have a parent or guardian on premises to use the Internet.

All Internet customers must sign an acceptable use form, and provide photo identification and current address information. Use of the Internet is free unless photocopies are made.

Internet computers are on a first-come, first-served basis.

Internet for up to one hour a day. Some computers are available for longer periods for customers to use for online classes. Reservations for these computers may be arranged in advance.

E-books and digital audio books

E-books and digital audio books are now available for download to computers, smartphones, iPods, MP3s or e-book readers. A valid Dallas County Library card is required.

Interlibrary loans

Material can be borrowed from or loaned to other libraries within the United States free of charge if delivered by courier system.

Print material or microfilm is available for genealogy research.

Society is great source of **county history**



They say you can't understand the present or future unless you are knowledgeable about the past, and much knowledge can be gained at the Dallas County Historical Society and Museum.

The museum is at the Buffalo Head Prairie Historical Park, 1107 S. Ash in Buffalo, one block south of the junction of U.S. 65 and Mo. 32.

At the park, people will find the Stearns Cabin, Eberhart Cabin, Crescent School, a caboose, old equipment display and the museum. The museum has many displays pertaining to Dallas County, and admission is free.

The Jacobsen Library, a genealogical and historical research library, is housed inside the museum. It is free to the public.

The main purpose of the library is to help people research Dallas County history, but there are research aids for other Missouri counties and other states in which many of the settlers in this area previously lived. The historical society regularly adds research materials to the collection.

These records can be found in books and on microfilm. They include probate files, marriage records, census schedules, early court records, cemetery data, old pictures, and church and school records.

There is also a notebook for each city, town or settlement in the county. A copy machine is available. The society has several books for sale on Dallas County history and genealogy.

The library is open for research from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. the first Satur-

day of the month June through September and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the first and third Thursdays of March through May and October through November.

Meetings, which include historical speakers and programs, are at 1 p.m. during the open houses in June through September. They are at 1 p.m. the third Thursday of March through May and October through November. The November meeting includes a carry-in lunch for Thanksgiving as well as the program.

The area that is now known as Dallas County was originally Niangua County formed in 1841 from the eastern half of Polk County.

In the late 1830s residents of the area began asking for their own county. Bolivar was the county seat of Polk County, and it was a great distance to go there to take care of official business.

A number of settlers had already purchased land from the land office in Springfield in the eastern half of Polk County.

The 1837 Tax List of Polk County shows names of a number of men who after 1840 were residents of the new county. Old tax receipts show that Martin Randleman paid taxes as early as 1829.

The area would have been Crawford County at that time, and early records from that county show many of the same names as in Polk and Dallas counties a few years later.

William G. Marlin served as Polk County's first state representative. He resided in the far southeast corner of the county. He was followed in that position by Robert E. Acoc of Brighton. Acoc promised the settlers that if he were elected in 1840 he would see that they would get their own county.

Acoc won the election, and true to his word he began proceedings to start the new county. In 1841 Niangua County was formed with Buffalo as the new county seat.

The name Niangua was confusing to pronounce and spell, so in 1844 the name was changed to Dallas after the

vice president of the United States.

In 1855 a small amount of land was taken off the southeastern corner of the county to go to Webster County.

The county contains 339,200 acres of land and is very diverse in its geography, ranging from prairie to hills and heavily wooded areas. It abounds with springs and streams. Big Niangua, Little Niangua and Pomme de Terre are the three largest streams.

Most early county records were destroyed by a number of courthouse fires during the Civil War, but the original plat book did survive.

By the time settlers arrived, most of the Indians had been moved on to the south and west. They did return for a number of years to their burial grounds for ceremonial rites and were accused in several cases of marauding and horse thievery.

More families came from Tennessee than any other state. The 1850 census shows that 20 states and Ireland were represented among the early settlers.

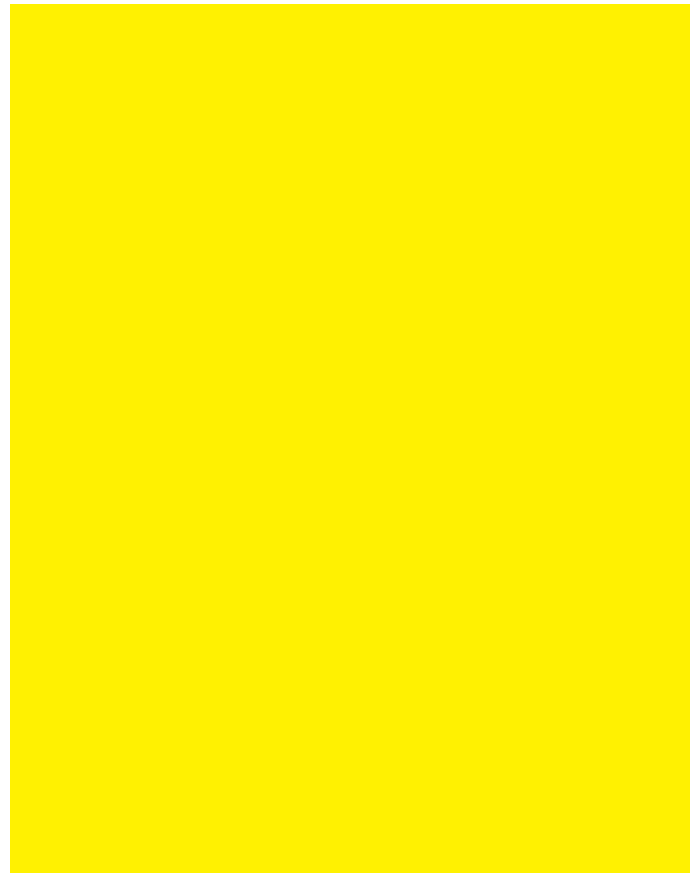

Many **services** available in **Buffalo**

*Water, sewer, trash
and recycling*

The city of Buffalo Utility Department bills for water, sewer and trash services. Contact City Hall to set up an account. Their address is 115 S. Maple St., and telephone is (417) 345-2701.

Deposit and service charge for residential owners is \$25. Non-owners pay \$100.

Utility bills are mailed out at the end of the month and are due in full by the 10th. If residents do not receive their bills, they need to contact City Hall.

Penalties of 10 percent of delinquent balance are assessed after the 10th of the month.

If the bill is not paid by the 24th of the month, the services will be disconnected on the next business day. There is a \$25 service charge assessed any time service is disconnected.

Failure to receive a bill or other notice will not relieve residents of the service charge.

Trash is collected once a week. Put all bagged trash in the provided trash bin and have the trash bin at the curb the night before to ensure collection. If trash is not picked up, please notify City Hall so that they can notify the trash company. Weeds and grass clippings cannot be put in the trash bin along with any other item that is banned from the landfill.

Only four dogs and/or cats are allowed per household. A city license is required for animals age 3 months or older. Residents must have proof of current rabies vaccination. It

is against city code to allow an animal to run loose off of owner's property. Dog/cat licenses must be renewed annually by June 1.

City Hall hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, except holidays.

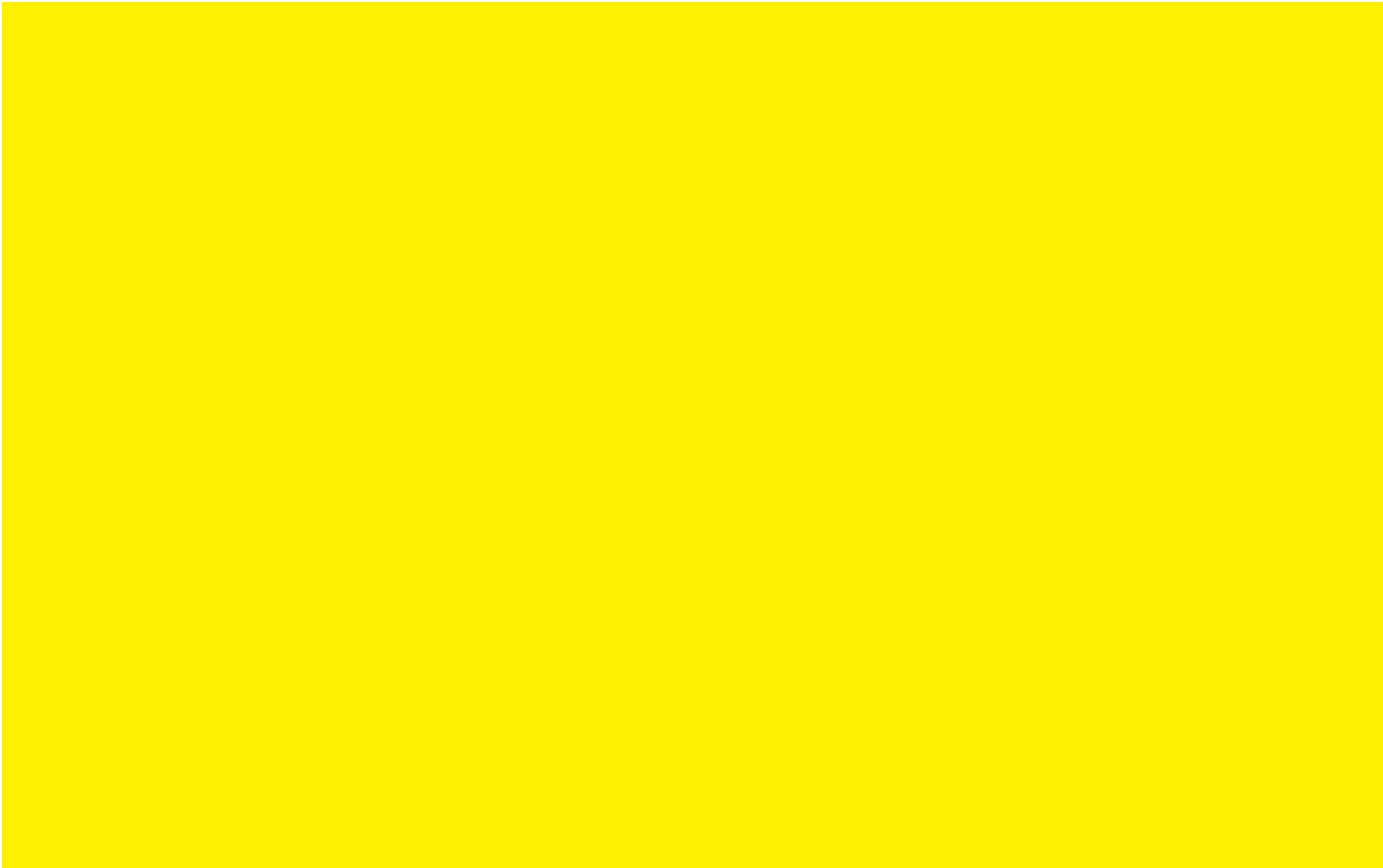

Montgomery Senior Center



The Montgomery Senior Center, at 303 N. Maple St. in Buffalo, is a project of the SeniorAge Area Agency on Aging. It is federally and state-funded, but clients also make contributions for services they receive. Those dollars go back into the programs.

Although located in Buffalo, the Montgomery Senior Center is for all people in Dallas County who are 60 years of age and older. A home-cooked meal is provided five days a week from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The meal comes with a drink, dessert and roll. A soup and salad bar is also available. The center also provides home-delivered meals for those who are not able to attend the center.

The center care coordinator conducts an in-home assessment for homebound clients who need senior age in home meals every day. Services from Homemaker Plus and respite services are also available.

The kitchen staff provides well-rounded nutritional meals five days a week including diabetic friendly dessert options.

CSPF (Senior Box) is distributed on the second Monday of every month for seniors who qualify.

Nutrition classes and falls prevention classes are offered as well as stress-busting classes for those caring for dementia patients.

Senior Age staff pride themselves on maintaining a balance between professional support to seniors and a fun and enjoyable social environment.

February through April the center has people trained in all tax services, including Missouri property tax credit and rental tax credit, on-site to help provide a

free service for the seniors of Dallas County.

The center has open enrollment for Medicare services from October to December.

During the open enrollment of the Healthcare Act, November through January, the center can enroll anyone in need of this service, including disabled people under age 60 as well as seniors.

SeniorAge Area Agency on Aging is an advocate on all senior services and can answer any questions or concerns.

The center has classes throughout the week on painting, woodcarving, knitting, crocheting and quilting. Exercise classes are held from 1 to 2 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday, and bingo is at 9 a.m. on Monday and Friday. There is a lot of fun and fellowship at the center.

Fundraising events are held throughout the year to raise funds for a new building.

Dallas County lends itself to a diverse combination of hunting and fishing opportunities.

The county has approximately 82 miles of the Nian-gua River, as well as smaller creeks and streams such as Greasy Creek, Lindley Creek and Dousinbury Creek.

They offer fishing opportunities that include great smallmouth bass fishing, trout and goggle-eye, as well as great sunfish fishing in the smaller creeks and streams.

Alfred Newton Gossett Conservation Area

A 671-acre area located near Windyville. Offers deer, turkey, squirrel and rabbit hunting opportunities. Access to the Niangua River along K Highway for fishing.

Barclay Spring Conservation Area

Good hunting for deer, turkey, rabbit and squirrel is available. Fishing is good for trout, smallmouth and goggle-eye. A boat and canoe launch is available.

Bennett Spring Access

The access has good fishing for trout, smallmouth, and goggle-eye. It also offers bow hunting opportunities. A boat ramp and canoe launch area are available.

Big John Conservation Area

Big John is three miles east of Buffalo. Fishing is good for smallmouth and goggle-eye.

Charity Conservation Area

The access is located east of Charity. Hunting and fishing access is available with good rabbit, squirrel, deer and turkey hunting. Fishing for smallmouth is good. A boat ramp is available.

Goose Creek Conservation Area

Goose Creek is on the Dallas

and Laclede County line. Hunting only is allowed. Deer, turkey and squirrel hunting are good.

Lead Mine Conservation Area

The largest and most diverse area the Conservation Department has in Dallas County. Lead Mine has almost 8,000 acres of land with good deer, turkey, rabbit and squirrel hunting, as well as hiking and horseback riding trails. The area offers several accesses to the Niangua River with two boat ramps. There is also an unstaffed shooting range. This is the only Conservation Department area in Dallas County that allows camping (in designated areas only).

Moon Valley Conservation Area

Moon Valley offers good fishing for smallmouth and a boat launch area is provided for gigging and floating opportunities.

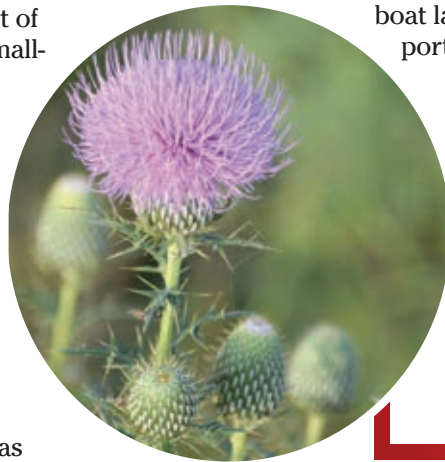

Dallas County home to vibrant *arts community*

Dallas County boasts a thriving arts community.

The Buffalo Downtown Association organizes the Buffalo Art Walk each year in the spring. Dozens of artists display their creations, including paintings, pottery, wood carvings, jewelry, crafts and other handmade items.

Hundreds of people turned out for the 2019 Buffalo Art Walk in May. The event also features food vendors, music and children's activities. The 2020 Art Walk was postponed to the following year because of the coronavirus pandemic.

Several murals around Buffalo showcase a variety of subjects and talents.

At the Shewmaker Performing Arts Center at Buffalo High School, seven murals highlight six classes — visual art, vocal music, instrumental music, performing arts, language arts and foreign language — as well as the name-sake of the performing arts center, Jack Shewmaker. Retired high school art teacher Lori Paro painted the murals on a small scale, and then they were enlarged by computer generation. The original small-scale paintings hang inside the performing arts center.

A mural inside the former Engles Memorial Senior Center building, which is now a thrift



store that helps support the Montgomery Senior Center, depicts what Dallas County might have looked like in the 1930s and 1940s. The mural was completed by Susan Owensby in January 2014.

Large murals also can be seen on the south side of the former Missouri Farm Bureau building on Maple Street, the AMVETS building on Ash Street and the Bison Acres Marketplace building on Ash Street.



Mennonites make **major contribution** to county

There are three distinct Mennonite communities in Dallas County, the largest and oldest located near Buffalo.

The county's first Amish-Mennonite community was established southwest of Buffalo beginning in 1964 with the arrival of 30 families from Illinois. Since then the community has grown to include 152 families and more than 800 individuals involved primarily in agricultural and construction enterprises.

Most of the Amish-Mennonite families of the Buffalo-Halfway area are involved in cattle and turkey production, as well as hay crops and some commercial wildlife. These families are taxpaying members of the greater Dallas County community but school their own children through the eighth grade at Prairie Grove Mennonite School.



At Lead Mine, in the northeast part of the county, is an Old Order "horse and buggy" Mennonite community with a variety of businesses serving the public. Those include bulk foods, dry goods and general mercantiles, as



well as skilled furniture makers and other craftspeople. They also are engaged in farming and building trades.

The most recent addition to the Mennonite community is a group of six families that has settled and established a church in Plad. Both the Lead Mine and Plad Mennonite communities also operate private schools.

The county with a *big heart*

Dallas Countians have a long tradition of being generous when it comes to medical causes and helping those in need.

The Dallas County Food Pantry, located at Prairie Chapel United Methodist Church near Urbana, is across from Skyline High School. To contact this facility, call (417) 993-4403.

Temporary help including the Home Energy Assistance Program for financially distressed county residents can be obtained at the Buffalo Neighborhood Center, a branch of Ozarks Area Community Action Corp. (OACAC). Telephone (417) 345-7964 for more information.

Another major effort to help others is the annual Dallas County Toys for Tots promotion, in which Christmas toys are purchased for children in need. This includes a “toy run,” featuring several hundred bikers and riders bringing about \$3,000 worth of toys to the DAV building on a Sunday afternoon in November. Also a program called Shop with a Cop is sponsored by local law enforcement and fire and rescue members.

Another group, the Dallas County Emergency Recovery Unit, chainsaws in hand, are available to remove debris and branches from houses and driveways following tornadoes, ice storms or other disasters. The DCERU, along with the Mennonite Emergency Relief organization, has traveled to other states to help in emergencies, including Mississippi, Louisiana and Oklahoma.

Bennett Spring is big outdoors draw

Nestled in a narrow valley in the Missouri Ozarks, Bennett Spring State Park offers fishing, camping, hiking, canoeing and other outdoors activities for the whole family.

A short drive from Buffalo, the 3,200-acre park is on the Niangua River, a premier Ozarks fishing and recreational floating stream, and is bisected by a spring branch, which is one of the state's foremost trout fisheries.

The fourth-largest spring in the state, Bennett Spring boils out of an underwater cave at the rate of 100 million gallons a day. On the Dallas and Laclede counties line, the Bennett Spring area was first settled in the mid-19th century.

Arriving from Illinois with his wife and two children in 1837, James Brice subsequently homesteaded 480 acres and built the first grist mill on the spring branch in 1842.

The community around the mill was originally known as Brice. Several other mills followed, but none stand today.

The state first introduced trout into the spring in 1900, and in 1923 a private fish hatchery was built.

In 1925 the state bought the spring and 984 acres from the Bennett family, creating Bennett Spring State Park. Today the Missouri Department of Conservation operates the hatchery and stocks the stream daily.

One of four trout parks managed by the Missouri Department of Conservation, Bennett Spring is visited by thousands of anglers annually, starting with the traditional opening-day throng on March 1 and continuing through Oct. 1.

Catch-and-release fishing also is allowed during the winter

months. A daily fishing permit is required, as well as a valid Missouri fishing permit.

Operated today by the Missouri

Department of Natural Resources, Bennett Spring State Park is more than a destination for trout fishing enthusiasts. In addition to fishing in the spring branch and Niangua River, the park offers swimming in the park pool, canoeing on the Niangua (arranged through the park office or any one of several private river outfitters), hiking trails and shaded picnic areas with restrooms and shelter buildings convenient to the parking areas.

Though the park has seen numerous improvements in its nine decades, it also retains a rustic charm with its vintage hatchery building, dining lodge and arched stone bridge built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s.

Visitors are welcome to tour the trout hatchery and rearing pools, enjoy a meal in the 1930s dining lodge, visit the nature center and extend their stays with accommodations in the park or nearby campgrounds.
