Bison art contest is now under way

An art contest will be held this year in conjunction with the annual Buffalo Art Walk and Craft Fair. The art walk, a Buffalo Downtown Association event, is scheduled for 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, May 6, on the Buffalo square.

People of all ages are invited to participate in creating art for the art contest. Public voting of the overall winners will take place during the art walk itself.

The rules of the art contest include the following:

- 1. Must be a representation of a bison.
- 2. Must be made by the artist (not by a parent).
- 3. Must fit in a 1-foot-by-1-foot space.

Big trash day is around the corner

Buffalo city residents should start gearing up to pick up, clean out and participate in the Residential Citywide Spring Cleanup Week from April 17 to 20.

The city of Buffalo will pick up yard waste. Residents must bundle, bag or stack neatly near the street but not mix with the regular trash. Yard waste must be out on Monday, April 17.

To avoid a nuisance complaint on the property, put cleanup items to the curb by one week before the cleanup week. OMS will only pick up excessive trash with an additional fee.

OMS will pick up trash on regularly scheduled days. Garbage dumped on the ground will not be taken. OMS asks that residents neatly bag or bundle items for pickup by the trash cart.

The landfill will not accept the following items: tires, cement, bricks, rocks, asbestos, flammable or volatile substances, hazardous waste, infectious waste, large dead animals, lead acid batteries, liquids, PCBs, pesticide or unexpended pesticide containers, radioactive materials, septic tank pumping, semi-solids, sludge containing free moisture, liquid paints and waste oils. OMS will not pick up this list of prohibited items.

Buffalo man charged with stealing, property damage

State of Missouri vs. Gregory Allen Lenox

Gregory Allen Lenox, Buffalo, born in 1971, was charged by Dallas County Prosecuting Attorney Jonathan D. Barker in Dallas County Circuit Court with two counts of the Class D felony of stealing, a Class E felony of property damage and two counts of the Class B misdemeanor of trespassing in the first degree on or between Feb. 1 and Feb. 18, 2023. His bond was set at \$5,000.

According to his probable cause statement, Deputy S. Caston of the Dallas County Sheriff's Office said that at about 2:45 p.m. Feb. 18, 2023, he was dispatched to Hackberry Road in Dallas County in reference to walnut trees being cut and taken without consent. Upon arrival, Caston spoke with the victim, who told him that he noticed eight black walnut trees had been cut off his property and it would have happened during the past two weeks.

Tim Carver retired about five years ago and wanted to come to live in rural Missouri because he loves the area. He spoke at a recent meeting of the Buffalo Rotary about the CarePortal the community uses to find help for local needs for children through caseworkers, social services and Dallas County R-1

School counselors. Carver and his family have always been involved in short-term missions, primarily internationally based in India. However, at this time, they couldn't go to India anymore and were looking for a new mission to join and support.

He spoke to an old friend, who introduced him to CarePortal and explained the reason for setting up this system was for orphaned children or children in crisis throughout the USA. The

group is headquartered in Kansas City and is led by Christians.

The main goal of Missouri Children's Division is to keep the family circle together whenever possible and keep children safe. But unfortunately, Missouri systems that involve care for children seem to be broken. The Care-Portal is one way local residents can help the children in their communities. According to the careportal.org website, the portal connects people who can help with people who need help in real time.

CarePortal launched in Dallas County on March 1. Carver volunteered last summer to help make this launch a reality.

The Christian-based CarePortal believes churches are the best circle to surround the family. Then, surrounding the church is the community, making a

grassroots program implemented through the app for churches to serve the children in Dallas County. Seven churches have committed to serving the mission. Individuals sign up for the Care-Portal on an app. Anyone can help with the mission of helping the children.

CarePortal introduced to Buffalo Rotary members

The child caseworkers ensure a legitimate need for the family, such as formula, beds, shoes and diapers. These missing items from a home can cause a child to go into foster care. If the need is legitimate, the request goes out on the app in the CarePortal.

Anyone can respond through the app that they have the items or can get the request. Churches deliver the items the family needs. The church can minister to them as they deliver the recommendations and establish a connection to help in the future. The church volunteers can see additional needs and provide further assistance if warranted.

Another example of the need, at 18, a foster child is kicked out of care and onto the street. Carver says it is heartbreaking and questions what we do as a community for that child. The 18-year-old has no place to stay, needs a shower and has no clothes.

According to Carver, the CarePortal is in 28 states and 27 counties in Missouri, serving 5,000, and \$1.3 million went directly to help Missouri families with children. Carver's family believes in what they are doing to aid the orphaned, foster families and children. Partnering for a common cause excites Carver because Dallas County is helping its community.

CarePortal has a few non-negotiable practices, including it only hires Christians; deliveries can only be completed by partnering churches and any legislation created that would affect the system would have to be bipartisan; otherwise, it's a no-go.

Carver said, "This project is an opportunity to unify people. Division is growing in the country, but now an opportunity regardless of faith, liberal or conservative, role in society or economic position in society. CarePortal focuses on protecting the children."

To become involved and volunteer for Care-Portal, go to careportal. org and sign up to start getting alerts. Beyond donating items, financial support can be monetary with donations from individuals, organizations or businesses.

Individuals choose how much or what to volunteer for the churches to deliver. There is no minimum or maximum. Each person will volunteer and supply based on their value with contribution self-decided.

YMCA the Kids Zone is for children ages 6 weeks to 9 years old or

with an adult within arm's reach. If children younger than the age of 9 accompany a parent, a guardian or an adult older than the age of 16 must be within eyesight. This group of children must act appropriately and according to the rules and safety guidelines, or

At the Dallas County Area they might be asked to stay in the Kids Zone.

> If children 10 to 12 come to the YMCA, they may use appropriate areas of the Y unsupervised as long as they follow the rules and safety guidelines. To use cardio equipment, the child must complete the youth cardio certification, wear the badge indicating they have passed the course, and be under the direct

supervision of a parent or guardian older than 16. No other wellness equipment may be used.

For students ages 13 to 15, rules are the same as the 10- to 12-yearolds, except that they may use other wellness equipment.

3. Approved the lease for four handicapped buses (three short and one long bus) beginning in June 2024.


4. Approved the addition of two special education teachers at the high school, one aide at the alternative

Caston said he followed the logging trail leading onto the neighboring property, belonging to Linda Buckley, who is having her property logged by Gregory Lenox. Lenox was contacted by Caston and asked if he was logging, and Lenox said that he was.


Lenox showed Caston and the victim where he cut the trees, which was on the other side of the fence on the victim's land. The victim valued the cost and the damage caused by the logging. The following is the estimated list of loss:

- Eight black walnut trees, \$1,800 each.
- Two new gates (install and repair), \$2,800.
- Repair roads (culvert cost), \$800.
- Repair roads (gravel and limestone), \$750.
- Repair roads (dozer work), \$750. Backhoe to clean ruts
- for culverts, \$250. Fencing repair,
- \$4,000. Clearing blocked
- roads (removing tops and limbs), \$800.

On Feb. 19, 2023, Caston reported he spoke with another victim, who told him that her property on Dallion Ford Lane had four black walnut trees taken from her property, which borders the first victim's and Linda Buckley's properties. Buckley's four trees cut were valued at \$7,200.

Anyone accused of a crime is presumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.





A TALE OR TWO

Easter memories

looking through some old photo albums, I ran across one of Tim and Tina, taken on Easter morning, in 1981, making Tim 10 years old and Tina 8. I'm so glad I captured a bit of their mischief. I don't know if you can tell, but Tina is in the first stages of creating a crazy expression; trying her best to match her brother's antics.

Easter was the most fun when I was a little girl. We were fortunate enough to have egg hunts at school, at Sunday school, at home and at my Grandma Belva's house. We were supposed to bring two colored hen's eggs, with our names written on each, to school on Easter party day. Most everyone used food coloring in water with some vinegar added, so our eggs would be a pretty pastel pink, yellow, blue or green. Some real inventive kids mixed their colors and ended up with a putrid purple or a gaudy green.

We wrote our names on the hot eggs with a Crayola, and after it was colored, the names were still visible, plain as day, and it even had an outline around it. We used the Crayolas to draw flowers and animals and whatever else our imaginations could come up with, on our eggs, too.

The day we had our party at school, we gave our two colored eggs to the teacher, and she had two or three high school girls, or some of the mothers, go hide them, and we were to go find them. Sometimes it was pretty hard to find our own eggs. We could find everybody else's, but finding our own two eggs took quite a while. We weren't supposed to help anyone, so if we ran across our best friend's egg, we had to keep quiet about it. Some of the eggs were stepped on or dropped, but that didn't bother too many of us; most of the kids didn't like hard-boiled eggs anyway.

After the egg hunt was over, we went back to our room for treats and games. The mothers made homemade

cookies and cupcakes, and we usually had something cold to drink. We were allowed to eat our hard-cooked eggs then, too, but most of us declined.

The egg hunt at Sunday school often meant store-bought candy eggs and treats. Boy, how I looked forward to those Easter Sunday egg hunts. One such egg hunt sticks out in my mind like a sore thumb. I had been a little sick the Saturday before Easter, so Mom decided it would be best if I stayed home with Daddy, while she and the rest of the family went on to church. Mom left me in bed that morning, and when I came downstairs, the house was quiet. I realized Mom had left me at home.

I knew it was Easter and I was missing out on candy and treats, so I was really mad at Mom for going off without me. I rushed around and found my new dress and new shoes and got dressed as fast as I could. Since I was only about 4 or 5 years old, I was still unable to tie my shoes and button the

buttons on the back of my dress, but I was an independent little cuss, and if I made up my mind to do something, then Heaven help anyone who stood in my way.

I walked up the hill to Harvey Boegel's house and asked him if he could tie my shoes and button my dress. He was very helpful in getting me dressed. I walked just as fast as I could around the corner and down the road, until I turned the last corner by the Fair Grove Methodist Church. The kids were finishing their egg hunt and going in. I had missed it all!

As I began to cry, my teacher saw me and told me how much they missed me, and she was sure she had enough eggs left for me. I was so happy with my pretty little basket of storebought eggs because it was only once a year I received some of those delicious candy eggs.

My Grandma Belva Thomas lived a short while next door to Elbert and Hazel Wommack. The Wommack house, located north


of the Fair Grove Post Office, was torn down recently. While living in the little house next door to the Wommacks, each Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas, Belva hosted a family gathering. An egg hunt was held each of those Easters we met at Belva's.

The one I will tell about here, a bit of mischief took place. You see, one of Elbert's and Hazel's grandsons was visiting his grandparents. He had a basket full of store-bought eggs. Our eggs were hard-boiled, colored hen's eggs. When we noticed this boy peering over the fence at all the Thomas cousins, we asked him if he would like to join us.

He did. The bad part about this story, his store-bought eggs were hidden right along with our hen's eggs. And of course, we snatched up his candy. I'm hoping we gave it all back to him, but I don't remember that part.

I miss getting to watch Tim and Tina, then Owen (my grandson) hurrying around, picking up all the eggs their baskets would hold. With their egg hunts, it was always candy. No hard-boiled eggs to have to turn their noses at. Although we did let the children color eggs.

Yes, Easter is fun. But we need to remember that "Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus from the tomb on the third day after his crucifixion. Easter is the fulfilled prophecy of the Messiah who would be persecuted, die for our sins, and rise on the third day. Remembering the resurrection of Jesus is a way to renew daily hope that we have victory over sin." — taken from the Internet.

Two Out of Three Ain't Bad — A journal of a trip west, Part 7

October 2022 Tuesday Noon, Oct. 11 (cont.)

ndian Garden is a very popular resting site on the Bright Angel Trail. It's a fairly large wooded grove that has a campground and is popular with first-time day-hikers. Many people hike the 4.5 miles down from the Bright Angel Trailhead to the site in the morning, have lunch and then hike back up that afternoon. That is what Judy, Leigh Ann and I did the first time that we came to the Grand Canyon about 40 years

The place is also very popular with animals. One can often see deer, squirrels that try to steal your food, and sometimes a rattlesnake can be seen. The only rattlesnake that I've ever seen in the wild was at the bottom of the canyon on the North Kaibab Trail. It was a small, yellow-colored one that did not seem too aggressive.

When I was at the river, I used the spray bottle

several times to cool down, but now the temperature was dropping so much that I put the fleece jacket back

Even though I still had plenty of Gatorade, I refilled one of the empty water bottles at the water station. I decided to start hiking on up, even though the couple who offered me the use of their campsite seemed skeptical that I could make it to the top. They, again, asked if there was anything that I needed and wished me good luck.

From Indian Garden the trail going up is a gently sloping tree-lined path for about one-half mile, and then the steep switchbacks begin.

Before I got to the switchbacks, I turned the headband light on. It wasn't completely dark yet, but I didn't want to step on a rock and twist an ankle or fall, now that I had made it this far. The headband light worked much better than the small handheld flashlights that Rosie and I used several years ago when we hiked out in the dark.

When I started up the switchbacks, it became

Even though I had hiked in the canyon five times before, this was the most physically and mentally demanding stretch of hiking that I had ever done. If I could just keep putting one foot in front of the other, I thought that I could make it to the top.

Also, I mentally broke

this last climb down into segments. Instead of thinking that I had four and a half miles to go to get to the top, I began to think that I only had one and a half miles to hike to get from Indian Garden to the Three-Mile Resthouse. Slowly, I made the climb to that rest house. The rest houses were simple rock shelters with a water station and toilet nearby. My legs were very tired but were still not cramping up very tightly.

From the Three-Mile Resthouse, I then had to hike just 1.5 miles to get to the 1.5-Mile Resthouse. Every 100-200 feet, I would stop to rest, and usually drink some Gatorade, eat a small snack and then move on. Again, I would not have made it up over the logs and rocks that were across the trail without the trekking poles.

Eventually, I made it to the 1.5-Mile Resthouse. I rested there for about five to 10 minutes and checked to see that I still had plenty of water. I no longer had any Gatorade but still had plenty of water, salty food and snacks.

Now, only 1.5 miles to the

top! I became fairly certain that I was going to make it to the top at that point. The cramping in my legs was not any worse than when it first started, so I was fairly confident that I could keep it under control for another 1.5 miles.

A few minutes after I left the 1.5-Mile Resthouse, I met a young woman, who appeared to be about 30, coming down the trail. She had a headband light on and even flashing lights on her hiking shoes. The first thing that she said was, "Are you Richard?" Someone, it was probably the physical therapist whom I had met earlier, had told her that she might meet me down the trail. She asked if I had seen three young women back down the trail. I hadn't seen them. She had done a Rim to Rim hike from the North Rim to the South Rim, and her friends who were hiking somewhere in the canyon hadn't arrived back at the top yet. She was worried about them. She had come down the trail looking for them and to help them if they were in trouble.

About 140,000 people enjoy trout fishing at Bennett Spring each year. Trout fishing at Bennett Spring has a history dating back to the early 1900s. Currently, MDC manages trout fishing and the hatchery at Bennett Spring State Park. The state park facilities are managed by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources.

f you're not planning to plant a tree in the days ahead (or be involved in the planting of one), at least take a moment to think about how important trees are.

April 7 is Missouri's state Arbor Day — a day when trees are in the spotlight. This is actually the first of two Arbor Days in Missouri. Missouri's state Arbor Day is always the first Friday of April. National Arbor Day is always celebrated on the last Friday in April, which this year will be April 28.

If you're up on your Arbor Day history, you know Arbor Day dates back to its initial celebration in Nebraska in 1872. (If you're really knowledgeable of your Arbor Day facts, you'll remember the 1976 cartoon "It's Arbor Day Charlie Brown" — a show that included one of the few occasions that Charlie Brown's baseball team actually won a game.)

Trees are usually appreciated for their aes-

thetic value and for the important roles they play as wildlife habitat. Although these are, indeed, valuable aspects of a tree, here are some other tree facts you might not have known.

Many of us know that trees take in carbon dioxide and produce oxygen, but did you know that, in one growing season, a single tree produces the amount of oxygen that 10 people breathe in a year? Or that 1 acre of trees can remove 13 tons of dust and gases from the air each year?

We know that mature trees with full canopies provide comfortable shade, but did you know that, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the net cooling effect of a young healthy tree is equivalent to 10 room-size air conditioners operating 20 hours per day?

Trees also provide a valuable boost to Missouri's economy. Timber harvests contribute about \$3 billion to the state's economy annually. Each year, the average Missourian uses the equivalent of one tree that's 100 feet tall and 18 inches in

Member FDIC diameter for his or her paper needs.

Trees also play a role in the high-quality streams we have here in southern Missouri. Evidence of the roles they play in slowing erosion, stabilizing stream banks and riparian corridors, and in filtering groundwater that percolates through their root systems can be found in the clear water and quality sport fish populations that exist in many of our waterways. In addition to their root systems, a tree's canopy also helps to slow erosion by breaking up and, in some cases, diverting precipitation before it hits the ground. Research has shown that the canopies of 100 mature healthy trees will intercept about 100,000 gallons of water per year.

And, of course, there's the wildlife benefits mentioned above. A multitude of animal species depend on our trees for nesting habitat, shelter or food.

Simply put, Missouri wouldn't be the wonderful state we enjoy today if it weren't for trees. It's evident Missourians understand this because,

throughout the history of the Missouri Department of Conservation, the residents of this state have made it clear they care as much about conserving forests as they do about conserving the fish and wildlife resources of this state. Department of Conservation staff deeply appreciates and values the cooperation and input it receives from Missouri residents. Let's face it: Because more than 90 percent of Missouri land is privately owned, the aesthetic, economic and habitat benefits produced by Missouri's trees would not be possible if not for the efforts and support of residents.

First Ladies of America

Claudia Taylor Johnson, known as Lady Bird, became first lady following a national tragedy. The stunning public assassination of President John F. Kennedy, along with the nation's outpouring of sympathy and support for his popular wife, meant that Mrs. Johnson's transition would not be any easy one. However, Lady Bird Johnson had great strength of character and eventually left her own unique mark on American

Mrs. Johnson received her famous nickname during infancy from a nurse who had commented that she was "pretty as a ladybird." After the death of her mother in 1917, she was raised by her father and an aunt.

She was a successful student, graduating early from high school and receiving degrees in liberal arts and journalism from the University of Texas at Austin. Her introduction to Lyndon Johnson in 1934 while he was a congressional secretary marked the start of a whirlwind romance culminating with his marriage proposal a few months

Long before Lyndon Johnson became president in 1963, Mrs. Johnson was a homemaker, managing family homes in Washington, Houston and the LBJ ranch in Texas. She raised the couple's two daughters and used her considerable business acumen to turn a radio station investment into a substantial fortune.

As a political wife, Mrs. Johnson actively campaigned for her husband, who served in the House and the Senate before becoming vice president in 1961.

When her husband was abruptly thrust into the role of president in 1963, Mrs. Johnson found herself with some important choices to make as first lady. Mrs. Johnson delayed assuming a fully public first lady role until some of the grief and shock of the Kennedy assassination had subsided.

She did, however, establish her own White House preservation committee to continue Mrs. Kennedy's work in that area, and she sought advice from the former first lady on other matters involving life in the executive mansion.

Gradually, she became more politically active and traveled the country extensively in support of President Johnson's Great Society programs.

Mrs. Johnson's own special interest, however, was the environment, and she worked tirelessly to promote the beautification and preservation of America's landscape, especially in areas that were disintegrating due to

> misuse or neglect. Legislation restricting the placement of billboards along public roadways, known as the Beautification Act, was the crowning achievement of her efforts to bring attention to environmental issues.

1963-1969 After leaving the White House, Mrs. Johnson retired with her husband to the LBJ Ranch, but she continued her environmental work, founding the National Wildflower Research Center in the early 1980s. For this achievement, she was awarded a Congressional Gold Medal.

> Long before her death in 2007 at the age of 94, she had won many admirers and much respect for the courage, determination and strength she displayed during a long life devoted to service.





Potter went the full five innings on the mound, allowing five runs on nine hits while striking out five.







introduced you to Gerald Ulmer, the musician and artist, a few years ago with a Reflex DC Artist story about a talented singer/songwriter and painter. Now I would like you to meet Gerald Ulmer the author.

Ulmer, who resides north of Buffalo, recently finished his first novel called "Jenny and the Ghost of Foggy Bottom Landing," and now

is marketing it through big names such as Amazon and Barnes & Noble. He is proud to see it is available in different printed languages in nine different countries. The book is available as an ebook or print on demand. It is a historical paranormal experience based on actual locations and events, that even young readers, such as teenagers, can enjoy.

How it all started

Gerald Ulmer's favorite subjects in school were anything involving industrial arts subjects. He took auto collision classes in the afternoons at Graff Vo-tech in Springfield while attending Central High School. He graduated from Central in 1968. It wasn't long after that, Uncle Sam called the 18-yearold Ulmer to duty in the armed services during the tumultuous time of the Vietnam War era. He returned to civilian life in 1970 with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and a harsher attitude. A temporary period of unpleasant personality that cost him his first marriage after one

and a half years. Depressed and seeking solitude after the separation from the love of his life, Ulmer moved up to central Missouri to work construction with his brother. While living in the Pettis County/Sedalia area, he enjoyed playing

guitar and singing at nightclubs and lounges such as Chez When in Sedalia on weekends. He was writing a lot of his own material — music and lyrics. He was present at Sedalia's Ozark Music Festival in July 1974 but said he didn't fit in with the hippie and drug crowd. That same vear, he married his second wife, the mother of his two children. That marriage would eventually end also due to Judy's drug addiction.




Gerald Ulmer decided what he wanted the cover for his first novel to look like.

"Judy had a drug monkey on her back, and I didn't know how to deal with it. The kids were grown up enough, and I just couldn't live with it any longer. I didn't know how to help her," Ulmer.

Ulmer spent most of his younger adult life working construction or auto collision repair. He also traded in real estate by purchasing property, fixing it up and selling it. But then, he would always move into another house he would purchase and do the same thing.

In 2001, Ulmer became interested in an old cabin not far from his grandparents' hometown of Nelson. He did the research and discovered an interesting true story about the people who lived there when the Oregon Trail passed by. He wrote a book from the viewpoint of the cabin's patriarch named William Asa Finley. He had it printed with the

title "Cabin in the Woods." He was surprised to find out that many residents in the Nelson and Arrow Rock area didn't even know about the cabin or its details. The book was well-received and was placed in Saline and Cooper counties' historical societies and the Marshall Library.

In 2015, Ulmer ran into the love of his life again, and time had softened a lot of memories. He remarried his first wife, Linda, and after a few years of marriage, they moved to Dallas County. They love calling Dallas County home and enjoy reading the local paper, the Buffalo Reflex.

Ulmer had not put pen to paper very often in the way of fictional storytelling, but he did like to write about facts, history, his own experiences and opinions. In 2020, he wrote a letter to the Reflex editor, sharing his views on a certain topic. The editor (myself) was impressed at the eloquent way he disputed and raised awareness of his topic. It brought the two together for a conversation. They formed a friendship based on their mutual enjoyment of writing, and a writing club was formed with several other talented local writers and authors.

Through discussion and

encouragement, Ulmer decided to move forward on a fictional story that

he had been brewing in

his mind for a while. His

fellow club members were impressed with his story idea and the way he told it. It was "Jenny and the **Ghost of Foggy Bottom** Landing."

From Gerald's own description of his book:

"The story is centered around a young girl who is sent from Chicago, Illinois, to live with her

grandfather, Earl Spencer, on his farm in Saline County, Missouri, while her father is fighting in WWII.

"Earl's farm is a small part of what was once a large plantation built over two centuries before, by Jenny's long-dead relatives who brought the enslaved people to the area in chains. 

Up and down and round and round

couple of weeks ago, my wife, Carol Ann, and I made a trip to northeast Missouri for her to check up on one of her public administrator's wards and visit with the MAC (Missouri Association of Counties) immediate past president, who is the county clerk for Scotland County. We experienced something along the way that got me to thinking and comparing a portion of the drive to the facets of life.

After leaving Kirksville, we saw the directional/distance sign for Thousand Hills State Park pointing westward. We weren't going that way, but we thought it was an interesting name. When we turned east off Highway 63 onto a state road, to cut toward Memphis, county seat of Scotland, it nearly turned into an "amusement park ride." I thought they must have gotten the arrow wrong on the sign be-



cause the road we were on was like the old Wild Mouse roller coaster ride at Lake of the Ozarks.

Anyway, it was tight hills, up and down, that caused our stomachs to climb into our throats. To add to the dizziness, there were spinning windmills on each side of us as we drove through the windmill farm that stretched through Adair and Schuyler counties. We didn't need tickets to Silver Dollar City or Worlds of Fun

for a thrill ride during this vacation. Carol Ann was looking at the GPS to keep us on track toward our destination when she exclaimed, "Oh!" I said, "You might want to keep your eves on the road for a while." I slowed even more, and honestly that didn't help a lot. With the crest of every hill, we were looking at an expanse of hills to come and just as many windmills.

I have always embraced ways of alternative energy resources, and when we saw Missouri had several windmills scattered across the countryside there, I thought great idea. I still do. I already had seen the windmill farms in Kansas and other western states, and I found out that Texas had the most, producing 37,422 megawatts, but wasn't aware Missouri was following suit. It seems I'm always just a little bit behind. I can hear my wife saying, "... and you're a newspaper guy? You're supposed to know these things." "Sorry."

After checking out the High Prairie Renewable Energy Center (windmill farm) online, I found out it is the largest windmill farm in Missouri with 175 turbines that can produce up to 400 megawatts of energy. The turbines towered over us, and the wind kept them spinning, converting the kinetic energy of the wind into electrical energy. I discovered there are over 120,000 people working in the U.S. wind industry across all 50 states, and the possibility of hundreds of thousands of more jobs by 2050. In 2021, wind turbines in all 50 states generated 9 percent of the net total of the country's energy. Wind power is a clean and renewable energy source, just like solar

Then I began to think, isn't this crazy up and down drive with spinning distractions a symbolic reminder of the

journey of life. Lots of ups and downs from day to day, not able to see over the hill in front of us to the next one, wondering what's ahead. The windmills symbolic of the dizzying distractions we must face every day.

Sometimes we get over-anxious to see what's just over the hill that we miss the interesting sights on the journey. If you have ever seen the Disney movie "Pocahontas," one of my favorites, you might recall the song the lead character sings about how she is excited to go forward to see "Just Around the Riverbend." There is an excitement, but also there is sometimes an apprehension as to what we might be facing. For me, that's when faith comes into play.

None of us know what the future holds. So buckle up and enjoy the ride.





The 'four o's' of culling cattle



Load 'em up and ship 'em

That's the advice University of Missouri Extension livestock specialist Andy McCorkill gives on "crazy cows."

Post-drought hay shortages have forced cattle producers to cull cows that aren't a good fit for their operations. Short hay supplies press producers to tighten cow herds, but routine culling can improve herd management overall.

Even though the cull cow market has remained relatively stable, don't carry unproductive cows through the winter, McCorkill says. Poor cows eat up more than hay. They eat up profit margins.

McCorkill calculated the daily feed costs for cows eating lower-quality hay and a feed supplement of more than \$3 per head per day many times this winter.

"Sticker shock really sinks to maintain current, smallin when you look at the costs er inventories and evaluate over the whole winter," he management before adding says. "When you feed that way for 120-150 days year, it's easy to have \$400-\$500 per head tied up in winter feed costs alone."

That's another reason to give freeloaders a ride on the first trailer headed to the sale barn.

McCorkill, like many other livestock producers who have been on the receiving end of an ornery cow, says he abides by the four "o's" of culling cattle: open, old, ornery and other.

Select the right replacement heifers as you prepare to rebuild the breeding herd, he

It's halftime, Farm Bureau, and the second half is about to begin

s the legendary college football coach Lou Holtz once said, "How you respond to the challenge in the second half will determine what you become after the game, whether you are a winner or a loser." Last week was the annual legislative spring break, marking the symbolic halfway point in the 2023 spring legislative session. Looking at the first half, we saw progress on a number of Missouri Farm Bureau priority issues.

Both the House and Senate versions of the Farm Bureau Health Plan bills were heard in committees, with the Senate voting the bill out of committee and one step closer to providing Missouri Farm Bureau members another, more affordable, option for health coverage. The House passed legislation that would reform the initiative petition process, raising the threshold for constitutional amendments from a simple majority of votes cast to 60 percent. The House and Senate are also considering several other initiative petition reform bills. Legislation passed in the House to further restrict foreign ownership of agricultural lands and is headed to the Senate, and the House Agriculture Committee passed legislation to assist with passing the family farm onto the next generation by tackling the impact of crippling capital gains taxes. Protecting private property rights and improving our road systems, including expanding Interstate 70 to six lanes, are also high priorities.

Last week, we spent halftime assessing what we need to do to continue the momentum. At Missouri Farm Bureau, we know this isn't a game. Improving access to affordable health coverage, enhancing the safety and reliability of our roads, and protecting private property rights are real needs of our members and our fellow Missourians — and there are real solutions pending in the General Assembly.


Sports fans know all too well that games are often won or lost in the second half. Working with bill sponsors and other legislative leaders, the needs identified by our members are positioned to be addressed, but nothing is ever certain. Opponents of our legislative proposals are out in full force and will be through the end of session.

The legislature needs to hear from Missouri Farm Bureau members. They need to hear about the issues we face every day in rural Missouri, and they need to hear how these real-world solutions can make a difference.






