### A full agreement not yet reached on car show and burnout

Buffalo City aldermen met Monday evening, April 22, with Hot Rods & Hillbillies promotors Greg and Shane McKinney to discuss and try to reach an agreement for continuation of the biannual car shows that have taken place on the Buffalo square. At the last city council meeting on April 8, the aldermen approved the car show and cruise for the square location, but did not approve the burnout that traditionally takes place at the 100 block of North Cedar Street. Safety issues and liability of the city were given as the reasons to withhold the burnout. This decision led to the cancellation of the entire event. The McKinneys, long-time sponsors and organizers of the well-attended shows and burnouts for the past ten years, maintain the draw of the event is the combination of both; that without the burnout, there would be no draw of crowds. "The reason we do this is to help the community. I really care about my community. People come from all over to attend, even from out of state. It helps bring revenue to the city and county, whether they eat at our restaurants, shop in our stores or stay in our hotels. I invest in the community and get nothing back out of it. It has helped our local charities with their raffles and the money we get goes to the Shriner's Children's Hospital," McKinney told the board of aldermen. Alderman Scott Decker pointed out that the city hosts other events that draw crowds where people spend money in Buffalo.

### **Community Leaders meet to discuss FEMA Community Shelter**

Buck Shockley, assistant superintendent at Dallas County R-1 School, gathered a group of county and city law enforcement, Dallas County 911, school officers and staff, and the Office of Emergency Management (OEM). The group tweaked protocols for opening the FEMA Community Shelter at Buffalo High School to ensure everyone was on the same page. It also reviewed current rules and expectations among these officials. Residents should remember that it's probably too late to drive to the FEMA shelter if the sirens are going off. According to OEM director April Garrett, traveling to a public storm shelter can sometimes be riskier than staying home during a storm. She said, "When a storm hits, roads can become very dangerous. There could be high winds, causing debris in the air, heavy rain or even flooding. These conditions make driving risky and could lead to accidents, such as getting stranded or someone getting injured." Experts say to shelter in place when the sirens go off in the safest location in your home or at the public building where you have taken shelter.

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"Is it any different than our Friday night ballgames? The Artwalk? We just had the Easter Egg Hunt that brought over a thousand people," Decker said. "None of these events pose an inherent risk to the safety of spectators like the burnout."

McKinney had spoken with Mayor Brandon Kenall before the meeting and the two discussed alternatives and possibilities for a different venue or a way to secure a safer environment at the downtown location.


The FEMA building at the grade school was built with grant monies and intended for personnel and students. The facility is only big enough for the elementary population. Each school building has a designated place for students to go during a warning.

Individuals should make a preliminary plan days before storms hit the area. Everyone needs to know the difference between a watch and a warning.

### **The National Weather** Service provides the following definitions:

Warning: A warning is issued when a hazardous weather or hydrologic event is occurring, imminent, or likely. It means weather conditions pose a threat to life or property, and people in the path of the storm need to take protective action.

Advisory: An advisory is issued when a hazardous weather or hydrologic event is occurring, imminent or likely. Advisories are for less serious conditions than warnings that cause significant inconvenience, and if caution is not exercised, they could lead to situations that may threaten life or property. Watch: A watch is used when the risk of hazardous weather or hydrologic events has increased significantly, but its occurrence, location, or timing is still uncertain. It is intended to provide enough lead time so those who need to set their plans in motion can do so. A watch means that hazardous weather is possible. People should have a plan



#### of action in case a storm threatens and listen for later information and possible warnings, especially when planning travel or outdoor activities.

Garrett prepared the following instructions for each household:

When to Prepare: At least 72 hours before the anticipated impact, begin storm preparations. Planning allows time to secure your home, gather supplies, and formulate a safety plan.

### Make a Safety Plan:

• Identify the safest room in your house.

• Create a communication plan: Every family contact card with meaningful names and phone numbers; if possible, identify an out-of-state contact and discuss after a disaster. It might be challenging to make a call, but texting could get through faster.

• Pick a Family Meeting Spot both in and outside your neighborhood.

#### **Secure Your Home:**

• Clear gutters and drains to prevent water accumulation.

• Secure or store outdoor furniture and other objects that could become airborne.

• Charge cell phones

and any battery-powered devices.

• Prepare your emergency bag; OEM recommends using a backpack so you can grab it and go if need be in the haste of whatever the weather brings.

### Suggestions for your emergency bag:

• Pack non-perishable food, water, and critical medications.

• Ensure you have a first aid kit, flashlights, extra batteries, a portable radio for updates, and spare cell phone chargers.

• Change of clothes or, at the very least, dry socks (store them in a ziplock baggie to ensure they stay dry).

• If you have young children, pack a coloring book and crayons.

#### **Stay Informed:**

• Sign up for Dallas County Alerts (Text "Sign-MeUp" to 77295).

• Monitor weather updates through the NWS Springfield website and local media.

• Understand the terms used in weather forecasts, such as "watch," "advisory," and "warning." [see above]

The Buffalo City Park and Fairgrounds was mentioned as a possibility. Kenall said he had discussed having a 75-100 ft. asphalt strip laid north-



west of the fairground barns with Dallas County Fair board president John Crawford, police chief Chad Garner and Street Superintendent John Hardin. All agreed it could be done.

At Monday's meeting, time was offered for each alderman to explain their safety and liability concerns. Most of them had done online research concerning burnouts and one, it seems, who cannot act professional and obey all rules. He said they are disqualified and asked to leave.

"We even post signs that tell our participants and spectators to respect our city and obey our rules. No burnouts on our square or past certain points. We expect them to comply or not to be present," Greg said.

Shane McKinney asked the council if they addressed the safety issues, that had been brought up just this year after a decade of shows, would the council consent to continuing the burnout on the square. The idea of moving it to the park and fairgrounds would still have the event on city property. A suggestion of the airport property for use was made. Kenall said he had spoken with the city's insurance agent and Buffalo's attorney and both had agreed, that at any event, there is never a zero percent liability for the city, no matter of the coverage of the event holder's insurance.

The McKinneys had already paid an event insurance of \$3,000 for three events. This insurance premium is non-refundable according to them. The McKinneys said the whole purpose of the car show and burnout was to bring back the nostalgia of the days when the square was the hangout place on weekends for teens and young adults with cars, as well as gen-

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drags. Some incidents that resulted in injuries and fatalities were pointed out — one such was the 2015 Selmer, Tennessee incident that killed six people and injured two dozen when a dragster lost control and careened into the crowd.

The main Buffalo burnout safety concerns of the aldermen were that cars were continuing to burn out past the designated burnout area and that there were people along the sides of the road. Greg McKinney said there were rules in place and a specific distance for the shut-off point for the burnout, but he also said that there is always someerate additional revenue for the community.

Alderman Bret Viets asked the council if they had any objection to allowing another downtown car show and burnout while the park and fairgrounds were being prepared for future burnout events. Greg and Shane agreed they would consider the possibility of the park idea,

"The last thing we want is for anyone to get hurt. Safety is always a priority. There is always a possibility that something could happen, but that's with anything, anywhere," said Greg.

At this time a decision has not been settled on.

### **April Is Autism Awareness: Light It Up Blue**

Autism disorder is a condition related to brain development that impacts how a person socializes and perceives others, causing personal issues in social interaction and communication. The term "spectrum" refers to the wide range of symptoms and severity. Autism generally begins in early childhood. Most children show early sings in the first year. All children can progress at different stages sometimes signs and symptoms can slowly come on prior to their second year of life. Boys are four times more likely to develop autism than girls. Family history of autism, generational can also increase risk of it being passed on. Other risk factors include older birthing parents and preterm babies.


A child with onset of autism may have any of the following signs: poor eye contact, delayed speech or loses ability to say words or sentences. Difficulty understanding simple questions or directions, resists cuddling and prefers playing alone. There is no biological marker for autism. This means no blood or genetic test can diagnose the disorder. Medical history, questionnaires and observation usually determine the diagnosis. The American Academy of Pediatrics "encourages autism screenings for all children at their 18and 24-month well-child checkups".

One of the greatest controversies in autism disorders centers on whether a link exists between the disorder and childhood vaccines. Despite research, no reliable study has shown

a link between autism and any vaccine. Avoiding childhood vaccines can place your child and others in danger of catching and spreading serious diseases such as whooping cough. If you are concerned

about your child's development or you suspect that your child may have autism, discuss your concerns with your pediatrician or primary care physician. The symptoms of autism can also be linked with other developmental disorders.

Continued education and treatment for children or adults with autism helps to provide a productive and fulfilled life.





### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

We have simply the worst phone service I have ever seen since 1958, when my family's phone service was a party line with eight other people on the same line.

I don't know about the average household here in Dallas County, but four miles north of Buffalo, cellular phone service is as bad as it can get! We have lived here five years or so, and I have tried every phone company that is available, and my experience is still the same ... BAD!

There is a tower about two miles south of our house, and another four miles northwest. So there is no excuse for bad service. But here is what I have found out about this problem — all the phone companies use the same towers in this area, and not one of them will invest in strengthening the signal to prevent poor service.

I have called the FCC to complain, and they told me that Dallas County can contact the state and get some of that federal grant money they gave Missouri for upgrades to communication issues, but they must first apply for it. The woman told me, contact your 'Planning and Zoning Commission'. I laughed at that. I said , "Ma'am, you really don't know nothing about this area, do you?"

I said, "We don't have a planning and zoning commission, and ain't likely to ever get one."

She said, "Well, you can contact your county government." I answered, "Who would that be?" You see, I don't rightly know. So I called the state attorney general's office to find out how to go about this. I got to talk to a machine that said, "leave a message and someone will call you back when they can." ### To Follow or Not to Follow — The Law

Should someone be prosecuted if they ignore or fail to follow the law? This question is a significant question as part of the US Supreme Court's review of presidential immunity case. One aspect of this case revolves around decisions made that can be related to one's official position or duties. If the presidential immunity is removed, thus taking away possible differences of opinion, other high-ranking officials like the Vice President, Cabinet members, and senior advisors may also face vulnerability to lawsuits, potentially hindering their ability to perform their duties. Without immunity, government officials may become overly cautious and hesitant to make decisions or take actions that could lead to legal liability, potentially paralyzing the functioning of government.

Additionally, opposition parties or special interest groups may use lawsuits as a political weapon, targeting officials, with whom they disagree, leading to political gridlock and further polarizing the political landscape. Courts may also become increasingly politicized, with judges facing pressure to rule against officials from opposing political parties, further eroding trust in the judiciary.

Moreover, allowing lawsuits against the President and other officials could blur the lines between the executive, legislative, and judicial branches, potentially leading to an erosion of the separation of powers, a fundamental principle of the American democratic system.

A current example that could lead to prosecution is Secretary Mayrokas's lack of enforcement of immigration laws. If elected or appointed officials are not immune from prosecution for failing to follow laws due to their opinion that the laws can be interpreted differently, they could face legal action for not adhering to what others believe the laws requires. This prosecution could occur while in or after leaving office as with President Trump.

Taking this to an extreme, removal of immunity could open the door to "lawfare" where those drafting and approving regulations to implement bills passed by Congress and signed by the president are prosecuted on grounds of ignoring or failing to follow the actual intent behind the legislation.

Ultimately, if immunity is stripped from officials responsible for decisions made while in office, one could potentially be prosecuted for any perceived deviation from strictly following the letter of the law in every instance. This could have a chilling effect, with officials afraid to exercise any discretion or judgment in their official duties out of fear of legal repercussions. The risk of personal liability may deter qualified individuals from seeking public office or accepting appointments, leading to a "brain drain" in government.

The Supreme Court must carefully weigh whether upholding prosecutorial immunity for official acts, despite potential perceived conflicts with laws, better serves the ability of government to function effectively. Or whether personal liability exposure, no matter how strict, is a necessary check to ensure individuals are prosecuted for perceived ignoring or failing to follow the law.

Dear Friends and Neighbors of the City of Buffalo/Dallas County R-1 Schools:

We are pleased to partner with the City of Buffalo and the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) to offer the FEMA shelter to our constituents when needed. The tornado shelter is on the west side of the Buffalo High School building near the intersection of Spruce and Main Street.

The Dallas County School District owns and constructed the tornado shelter, which provides protection for students and staff during tornadoes and extreme high wind events. The shelter is also available for community residents who do not have a safe place to shelter during these extreme weather events.

Information on the Shelter:

a. The OEM makes the recommendation to open the shelter when there is a: • A severe thunderstorm warning (if wind speed is greater than 75 mph) • A tornado warning b. Sirens are sounded within the city of Buffalo when the storm is within three miles of Buffalo. c. The City of Buffalo and Dallas County emergency managers make the decisions to activate the sirens, and 911 activates the sirens.d. The maximum capacity of the shelter is 1,895 people.e. The tornado shelter is equipped with an emergency backup diesel-powered generator that will supply the shelter with power for 48 hours Individuals with physical impairments, special medical alerts, and/or service animals will need to complete a Special Needs form, which can be obtained at the district office. These forms will be kept on file with the Assistant Superintendent. As a reminder, pets are not allowed in the shelter. Parking for the shelter is located in the North parking lot of BHS and anyone needing handicapped parking should use the parking lot at Dallas County Technical Center. Signs are posted to direct individuals to the shelter. If you have any questions, please contact the administration office at 417-345-2222.

The value of making mistakes

hocolate chip cookies, the Slinky, Play-Doh, Post-It notes, and potato chips. The one thing they all have in common is this: They're losers.

Big fat mistakes. Accidents. Epic fails. None of them turned out to be the thing they were intentionally meant to be, and yet they've become household names. How did the thing we all fear so much - failure - turn into a lucky break for the people behind the inventions?

For the cookie, it was a simple matter of "failure to melt." In 1930, a woman named Ruth Wakefield, who was co-owner of the Toll House Inn, was trying to make a chocolate dessert when she ran out of the chocolate she normally used. As a substitute, she used Nestle semi-sweet chocolate chips, but they didn't melt as she'd hoped they would. The result? Cookies with chocolate chips inside. The failed recipe gave birth to the best cookie the world has ever known. The popsicle was also a project that took a wrong turn at Albuquerque. In 1905, an 11-year-old boy named Frank Epperson tried to make homemade soda pop. As boys that age often do, he got distracted from his project and left a bowl of his homemade soda pop sitting outside with the stir stick still in the bowl.

night, and when Frank came back to the bowl the next morning, he had a sweet frozen treat on a stick. More than 100 years later, our hot summer days wouldn't be the same without Frank's mistake.

But perhaps my favorite example of failure-turned-phenomenon might just be the story about two scientists working for the 3M company in 1968. One of them, Spencer Silver, was having a rough day at the office when his mission to invent a strong adhesive failed miserably. Instead, he ended up with an extremely weak adhesive that would allow paper to be peeled off of anything. The wimpy adhesive sat on the shelf for almost six years until a fellow scientist named Arthur Fry needed a bookmark for his church hymnal, preferably something that wouldn't hurt the book's pages. He remembered the failed adhesive and its lightly sticky quality that allowed it to be easily moved, and an idea came

to mind.

Most people at the company didn't think it would work as a real product - these sticky yellow squares. But in 1980 they gave it a shot, and now desks and cubicles in more than 100 countries around the world are covered in Post-it notes.

What I like most about these true stories is how they reinforce the value of making mistakes. They show me that we're meant to make them because we're humans and not robots. Mistakes are the things that teach us the most and propel us forward - either on the path we were originally on or in a whole new direction. Either way, we're moving, growing and gaining wisdom, which is so much better than staying safely stuck right where we are.

Whether it's making a sale, writing a book, creating art or baking a chocolate dessert, we must be willing to mess up, to look stupid, to waste our time. It's hard, and most of us naturally resist it because mistakes can be heartbreaking, humiliating, frustrating and even scary. But they can also be the springboard to something amazing. So perhaps we should all grab a pen and one of those wildly successful Post-It notes and write down this reminder: Be willing to make a mistake. You never know when it might turn into a chocolate chip cookie.





### **Changes that could arise** from the "silver tsunami"



A report from the International Monetary Fund in the summer of 2023 indicated that a new challenge awaits the world in the coming years. The global population increased by one billion people between 2010 and 2022. That remarkable increase saw the world surpass the eight billion people mark in November of 2022.

Despite a sharp increase in the global population in such a short period of time, the IMF asserts that the population boom is not the most formidable demographic challenge facing the world. The IMF defines population aging as the most formidable challenge. Widely referred to as the "silver tsunami," a term credited to the AARP, the increase in the number of individuals age 65 and older could lead to some unique changes in countries across the globe.

· Increased recreation spending: Sixty-five has traditionally been viewed as retirement age, and that

for individuals living in countries like the United States that have increased their official retirement age. Though an uptick in the aging population is often framed in terms of the challenges countries will face, that increase also could present some opportunities. For example, a recent AARP Longevity Economy Outlook report noted that people 50 and older account for the most spending on recreation and culture of any demographic. That could prove beneficial to businesses and regions that cater to consumers interested in recreation.

Employment opportunities: The AARP also noted the role the 50 and older population plays in supporting jobs. In 2020, the demographic of people 50 and older supported roughly one-third of the world's jobs and generated \$23 trillion in labor income with its spending on goods and services. Estimates from the AARP indicate that individuals age 50 and older will support 1.5 billion jobs across the globe by 2050. The labor income impact by then will more than double to \$53 billion.

Employment challenges: Though the silver tsunami could help to maintain existing jobs and create plenty of new ones, employers might find it difficult to fill those positions. As more of the global population reaches retirement age, it bears noting that more workers will retire. Deloitte and the Manufacturing Institute note that the manufacturing sector will need to fill 2.5 million job openings related to retirements between 2020 and 2030. That could prove a sizable challenge, as the aging population is increasing at a time when the young population is decreasing.

The aging population is increasing, which could lead to a number of opportunities and challenges in the decades to come.

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

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### Pomme De Terre **Fishing Report**

I Am Outdoors

#### Lake Conditions

Lake Level: 840.49, 61-63 degrees.

Water condition: The lake is currently 1.49 feet high. The water is slightly stained in the upper ends with some clarity; it gets clearer the closer you get to the lower end. The lower end of the lake is developing moss. The water temperature has slowly been on the rise.

#### Crappie

Action: Good.

The spawn is in full swing. The crappie are aggressive and hitting a number of lures and presentations. However, there can be a misunderstanding about the spawn, that doesn't mean all crappie are on the banks shallow. Most crappie are going to the banks late in the evening or during low light conditions. Generally, with the water slightly stained, you need to focus your attention on structure in 10-20 feet of water.

Pattern: On standing timber in 10-20 feet of water in the mouths of creeks or coves of spawning areas. Most of the crappie are 10-15 feet deep. They are aggressive and will hit a jig that is swimming past them. They are moving in and around the trees. Cast your jig past the tree, let it fall and slowly reel it back.

Brush piles in 10-20 feet of water have been good. The crappie are hanging in the top of and around the brush, cast your jig, let it fall near the top of the pile and slowly reel back. Some piles will produce a few fish while other piles will produce several.

Lures: Crappie Slammers split tail shad and straight tail shad have been producing well; while the crappie are aggressive, the grub shad has been a good performer. In the main lake area natural colors are the best - toothpaste pearl, sunset pearl, blue crystal and the natural. In the upper ends a dark color with chartreuse has been best on cloudy and dark days - white pearl chartreuse, red chartreuse, pink lemonade, midnight chartreuse.

#### Bass

Action: Fair to Good.

Pattern: The bass have been somewhat inconsistent; however they are turning on a little more. They are starting to move shallow and will continue as the water warms. The warmer weather is starting to get the bass excited.

The best bite has been on a jig, just remember to match the color to the conditions. Crankbaits and jerkbaits are still producing. As the bass move to the beds don't overlook soft plastics.

Lures: Jigs with a good trailer, crankbaits, jerkbaits and soft plastics.

### Mussels

reshwater mussels are a seldom-seen, but very important part of Missouri's streams.

Freshwater mussels spend most of their time buried in sediments of stream bottoms so, of all the things you see and hear when you fish a stream, float on one, or camp near one, freshwater mussels aren't among them. However, freshwater mussels should be high on the list of aquatic organisms that we humans here in the Show-Me State need to care about.

Missouri is home to 69 species of freshwater mussels. The large mussels found in the sediment of a number of Missouri's rivers and streams are frequently called pearly mussels and are in the Unionoida order of mollusks. (The small mussels found in marshes, ponds and streams across the Ozarks, known as "fingernail clams" or "pea clams" because of their tiny size, are in the Sphaeriidae family and are not the focus of this article.) Some of the state's pearly mussel species have interesting names like monkeyface, pistolgrip and threehorn wartyback.

Freshwater mussels are filter-feeders that feed on plankton, bacteria and other small food particles in the water. Water enters and leaves the animal through a pair of openings at the back end. The water is filtered by passing through tiny

openings in two pairs of hollow gills. Food particles as small as bacteria are captured, transferred to the mouth along the edges of the gills and swallowed. Full-grown adult mussels of some species can filter more than 50 gallons of water per day.

Unionoid mussels have a number of unique features and characteristics, but arguably the most fascinating part of their life cycle is reproduction, which takes place in the latter part of summer. A mussel's reproductive process is definitely one of the more fascinating reproductive events that occur in our Ozarks waterways. Though this annual nature event is off the radar screen of even the most ardent water enthusiast, making sure it continues to happen is something we should all care about. But more on that in a minute: first here's more about the process.

Sperm is released by the male directly into the water and enters the female during filtering. After fertilization the eggs develop into a larval stage called glochidia. In a variety of species-specific methods, these tiny worm-like glochidia get transferred to the bodies of larger fish which are foraging for a meal. The glochidia become attached to the fish's gills and remain there for a few weeks and continue to develop before dropping to the bottom of stream to continue development into adult mussels.

As if this weren't interesting enough, there's another fascinating twist to

cial harvest of Missouri's freshwater mussels for the button industry was a multi-million dollar industry. By the time plastics reduced shell buttons to little more than novelty items in the mid-1900s, this heavy harvest had reduced the populations of several Missouri mussel species. However, river channelization, pollution and other man-made changes to the waterways probably had the biggest impact on Missouri's mussel populations.

Today, nearly two-thirds of Missouri's mussel species are classified as species of conservation concern. This fact should raise human concern because, as stated above, mussels benefit humans through their feeding process. Their filter feeding helps keep water clean. They also serve as environmental indicators - a stream with a low mussel population likely has other problems as well.

### MDC sets 2024 bear and elk seasons with permit applications in May

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) will offer 400 permits for the taking of a maximum of 40 black bears during the 2024 Missouri black-bear hunting season this fall, Oct 21-30.

MDC will also offer five permits to hunt bull elk in Missouri this fall with at least one permit designated for qualifying landowners that own property in Carter, Reynolds, or Shannon counties and the remaining permits for qualifying Missouri residents. MDC has designated the elk archery portion to run Oct. 19-27 and the elk firearms portion to run Dec. 14-22. The five permits will be for bull elk with at least one antler being six inches or greater in length and will be valid for both archery and firearms portions.

Only Missouri residents who will be at least 11 years of age by the first day of the hunt for which they are applying are eligible to apply for bear and elk permits during the application period of May 1-31. All permits will be assigned through a random drawing.

The Missouri Conservation Commission gave final approval to the bear and elk season recommendations from MDC during its April 5 open meeting in Rolla.

### **BLACK BEAR HUNTING**

MDC has established three Bear Management Zones (BMZ) in southern Missouri and will issue annual permit numbers and harvest quotas for each of the three BMZs. Each permit will be for a specific BMZ and may be used on public or private property within the BMZ. Once the specific harvest quotas are filled for each BMZ, the season for that BMZ will be closed.

There is a fee of \$10 per applicant. Applicants must select one of three BMZs. Those selected will then be eligible to buy a BMZ-specific permit at a cost of \$25. Permit and harvest quotas for the Oct. 21-30 bear season will be:

• BMZ 1: Permit quota of 200 issued with a harvest quota of 20 bears.

• BMZ 2: Permit quota of 150 issued with a harvest quota of 15 bears.

• BMZ 3: Permit quota of 50 issued with a harvest quota of 5 bears.

Hunting hours will be a half-hour before sunrise to a half-hour after sunset. Hunters must call MDC prior to hunting each day to determine the closure status of the BMZ for which they are permitted. Hunters will be allowed to use both archery and firearms methods with allowable methods being the same as those for deer and elk, except the use of an atlatl. Baiting and the use of dogs will not be allowed.

The harvest limit will be one bear per permit. Only lone black bears may be taken. Hunters may not take bears that are known to be in the presence of others bears, including female black bears with cubs. Bears may not be disturbed, pushed, harassed, or taken from a den.

### **ELK HUNTING**

MDC will require a \$10 application fee for elk-permit applicants. Those selected will then be eligible to buy a permit at a cost of \$50. All elk-hunting permits, including those allocated to qualifying area landowners, can be used in Carter, Revnolds, and Shannon counties, except the refuge portion of Peck Ranch Conservation Area.

The archery portion will run Oct. 19-27 and the firearms portion will run Dec. 14-22. The allowed hunting methods for each elk season portion will be the same as for deer hunting. The permits will allow for the harvest of one bull elk with at least one antler being six inches or greater in length.



### Troublesome Pasture Plant of the Week – Coralberry Buckbrush

Coralberry Buckbrush is a common concern to many livestock producers as it often crowds out desirable grazing forages. It is found around the edges of our pastures, as well as in our pastures and hay fields. It is also found in poorly managed





fields, roadside ditches, and timberlands. This invasive low-growing perennial woody shrub is extremely prolific if left unchecked. Deer and goats will consume this plant while cattle and horses have little to no desire to eat it. The coral berries produced on this plant persist well into the winter and are wintertime favorites of deer and other wildlife. In late summer and

early fall, this plant is easily seen as it draws a

summer heat burning down most cool season grass leaving it to stand out. This is not the time of the year to control it! The leaves are opposite and about the size of a quarter in most cases. They are oval in shape with a short petiole, smooth margins, and short soft hairs found on a whitish-green leaf surface. The early springtime younger leaves often have a reddish coloration to them as they develop from new growth. The plant will usually grow to heights of 3 to 4 feet in a bushlike structural pattern. This plant is known to

lot of attention due to the

permanent control and is not likely to eliminate future infestations. However, goats through proper grazing practices, can reduce infestation rates of buckbrush over time. The best control method when using chemicals is 2-4-D (1-2 qts/acre) applied to early spring growth (before April 15th). The best time to spray is when the plants are young and around 10-12 inches in height with large fully developed leaves. Chemical applications after these two common practices, due to the leaves developing resistance to chemicals via a waxy coating, seem to lose for any grazing and/or their effectiveness and may be a total waste of time and money. Make sure you get the plant completely wet by applying plenty of water (15 Gallons per acre minimum) when going over the plants. You will also find it very difficult to

get in and around problem areas like standing timber and/or next to large ditches, so a long-reaching spray wand may be of great help. Some other effective herbicides

used for control are those containing 2-4-D, aminopyralid and/ or metsulfuron, such as Chaparral, Cimarron, or Grazon Next HL.

For a 100-gallon spray mix, depending on the chemical of your choice, you may want to mix up to 2 quarts of a quality surfactant. As with all chemicals, locate and read the label completely and carefully watch having restrictions as these things may have an adverse effect on your livestock operation. 



### **Classroom Activity** (Missouri Show-Me-Standards: S.3, S.4)

Objectives: After completing this activity, students will be able to:

- Explain why woodpeckers are able to find grubs and insects in trees
- Explain how woodpeckers help keep our forests healthy
   Explain how woodpeckers are affected when forest habitat disappears

#### Materials:

- Several large pieces of cardboard. If available, use boxes from washers, dryers, refrigerators, long fluorescent light bulbs or other types of large appliances. If these aren't available, use whatever types of long pieces of cardboard can be found Pieces of clay
- Duct tape
- Colored markers or cravons · Plastic toy hammers or other type of tapping devices

#### Background:

Woodpeckers find hidden insects and insect larvae by pecking on tree trunks until they hear a different sound, indicating something is hidden under the bark. This activity will test how good your students' "woodpecker" skills are

#### Procedure:

Prior to the activity, explain to the students what woodpeckers are and how they find their food.

1) Divide students into groups of three or four. Have enough pieces of cardboard so that each group has one. Have each group draw and color the middle portion of a tree trunk on their cardboard. Make sure the trunk is wide — several feet across if possible

2) After class or when students aren't around, attach pieces of clay that are marble-sized or slightly larger in a scattered arrangement on the un-colored side of the cardboard. Secure the clay to the cardboard with pieces of duct tape

3) The next class period, explain to each group that they are woodpeckers that will have to find food. Demonstrate with a toy hammer or some other type of tapping device, such as an ink pen or kitchen utensil, how the tapping sounds are different at different locations on the cardboard. (The tapping sound is less hollow when they tap where the clay is.)

4) One by one, hold each teams' piece of cardboard and have the team members take turns coming to the cardboard to look for "food." Without peeking on the other side, the team members should try to find the pieces of clay by lightly tapping. When students think they've found a piece, they should circle the spot where they think it is with a colored marker and put their initials by the circle. Each team member should try to find two pieces of clay on their teams' piece of cardboard.

5) When the activity is completed, have all the teams turn over their cardboard to see how accurate they were.

If possible, have a tree or insect expert speak to the class about what these under-bark insects are and how some of them can harm trees. Explain that woodpeckers help trees by eating these insects. Explain that woodpeckers also use old dead trees for nesting purposes. Teachers, or if possible, a local bird expert, can discuss with students what happens to woodpeckers when forests begin to disappear.







axine Hume of Buffalo recently turned 100 years old. Her family had a birthday celebration for her this past Saturday.Maxine's two sisters, Nancy, 90, and Leona, 89, made the trip from Dent County, Missouri to wish her "Happy Birthday."

"One of my neighbors stopped by to give me a card and tell me he wanted to see what a hundred year old person looked like . . . and now he knew," Maxine said with a laugh. She added it was a wonderful birthday party with family and friends.

### Not just a little **German blood**

The descendant of German immigrants, Maxine Hume was born in 1924 and grew up in a large family near Salem, (Dent County) Missouri. The oldest of seven children born to Ferdinand "Ferdie" and Flossie Mae (Watkins) Haas, Maxine recalls stories she had been told of how her great-grandmother Strauss taught the six German-speaking Strauss children English using two Bibles — one written in German and the other in English. The Strauss family and the Haas family immigrated to Dent County, Missouri at about the same time. The families settled on farmland between Salem and Rolla. They established the Elk Prairie Church in that area. Max-

ine's father was a full-time farmer, owning and working two farms.

As a small child, Maxine can still remember her Uncle Louie reading the newspaper to her as she sat on his lap. The regular ritual started when her father's hands were occupied with her younger brother, Buddy, and little sister, Hazel, and three-

"My dad told Charles that I would make a good wife, because I already did all the housework, cooking and laundry. That I already knew how to take care of a family," recalled Maxine.

She married Charles and shortly afterward, the tuberculosis finished her mother's life. Her father remarried, presenting Maxine and her siblings with a step-mother and four spoiled step-sisters.

Charles took a teaching job at a school north of Hobson. He taught all grades at the one-room schoolhouse. Then Maxine learned in January 1942 that she was pregnant. Maxine and Charles would be blessed with a son,

and wanted me working up front. But he told the customers with big deposits to go to Charles and those with just cash and small checks to use me. I could count money, but Charles showed me the proper way to count back money."

### **One-fifth of a hundred** years in Buffalo

The Hume family lived in a two-room apartment, but would move back to the farm in Salem and go into partnership in a mobile home business. Their partner had a branch of the business in Waynesville, and the Humes bought the partnership and went into business alone. Charles retired some years later and the couple bought 20 acres in Dallas County to move close to their daughter, Carol Sue who had married Jimmy Maddux and lived in Buffalo.

Charles couldn't sit for long so he got his real estate license and they moved to Springfield. It was during this time that Maxine began painting pictures. At 75 years old, she was certified to teach painting lessons. She is also a talented needlework artist. After Charles passed away, 80-year-old Maxine moved to Buffalo, across the street from Carol Sue. In 2010, Carol Sue died and Maxine's granddaughter, Clara Maddux married Randell Boggs. Funny, but the Boggs couple has made careers in the banking field. Maxine's other Dallas County grandchildren are twins, Keith, Buffalo and Kevin, Nixa. She is so very proud of all her family, especially her great grandchildren. She says she is one blessed woman to have lived such a long life, and I believe Buffalo is blessed to be able to call this 100 year old lady one of our own.

Her six siblings could only visit their mother through the window that led onto the porch.

### **Remembrance of love** and war

In October 1941, two life-changing events took place for Maxine. Her beau. Charles Lee Hume, asked her father for her hand in marriage.

David Lee and a daughter later that they named Carol Sue.

During the decade of the 40s, World War II interrupted life for all Americans and Charles was drafted to serve in military service. Returning home from the war. Charles took a position at a bank.

Eventually, Maxine would leave her job at the shoe factory and join her husband to work at the bank in Rolla. She started as a fill-in bookkeeper, and she was very fascinated with the bookkeep machine. She said she was promoted to teller because, "my boss liked the way I handled customers




