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Kenall sat down with the Buffalo Reflex to discuss progress in Buffalo. He pointed out several new builds across the city, including duplexes on the lots at the northeast corner of Locust and Madison streets. A new home is going up on Ramsey and Locust. The RV park is almost completely located behind Walmart and entering the US. Hwy. 65 where the log cabins have been going up this year.

Across the city, home remodels, from minor fixes to kitchen remodels, are being planned and executed. A new building inspector at city hall, Russ Wisdom, is described as an employee who takes a common-sense approach and is easy to work with. He will also take over all the nuisance complaints, like debris in yards, tall grass and abandoned cars.

lic safety building. The building will be a regional training facility for firefighters and law enforcement. It will also include offices, a firetruck and storage for some fire essentials.

Local fire and police will collaborate with other regional agencies to coordinate events in the facility. Currently, the city is obtaining a 3-4 acre plot for construction.

The three-million-dollar facility is in the design stage. According to the mayor, the architects have a strict schedule, meeting every Monday to set milestones through the end of the year. They are organized and very committed to the project. The state money has to be allocated in 2024 and spent by 2026.

Airport Improvements

Engineers are reviewing MODOT and DNR plans to refurbish the airport's infrastructure and decide on a fuel spot. MoDOT should have specifications completed by June 1. Then, the city will post requirements and accept bids for the fuel. The money granted to the airport came from state appropriations. State Senator Sandy Crawto rehab the FBO and hangar.

Other Business

The city has hired a new meter reader, who will now serve as a city utility that shuts off and turns on water. In addition, they will perform park maintenance, take care of ball fields and help with the street crew as needed.

Kenall encourages residents to watch for paving to start in the next two weeks. He also invites everyone to attend city council meetings to speak during citizen comments or to learn how the city government operates.

Citizens can call in nuisance complaints during business hours or stop by the office on the square. Businesses and individuals have improved the appearance of their parking lots and outward appearance, making Buffalo more appealing to visitors and travelers.

Kenall said, "Overall, people are taking more pride in their property. We still have some challenges with some of the same property owners neglecting it."

Russ Wisdom is the new city of Buffalo building inspector. One of his tasks will be ensuring safety and that landlords' rental properties follow all city ordinances.

When a renter moves out, the landlord must apply for a certificate of occupancy for their property. The alderpersons adopted the new policy in August 2023.

The rental property owners and Widsom are a good team. The properties are getting the attention they need to align with all ordinances, improve the safety of local renters and make all rentals habitable.

Wisdom also inspects new buildings and remodel work. He makes sure everything is up to code. Contractors and landlords may get a list of specific things to bring up to code, and he will come back, and the structure will pass inspection.

Landlords will fill out an inspection request form and schedule a time for inspection. There is a \$25 fee for the initial inspection by phone or in person at City Hall. If the property owner doesn't show up for the inspection, an unavailability penalty of \$50 will be assessed to the owner. The re-inspection fee will be an additional \$25 if, at that time, the rental property does not pass the initial inspection and meets the required repairs.

It is unlawful for anyone to occupy or for the owner or agent to permit the occupancy of any building for any purpose before getting an occupancy permit. If there is more than one violation of occupancy before the certificate of occupancy is issued, a summons will be issued to appear in the City of Buffalo Municipal Court.

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State Releases April 2024 General Revenue Report

State Budget Director Dan Haug announced today that net general revenue collections for April 2024 increased 20.3 percent compared to those for April 2023, from \$1.15 billion last year to \$1.38 billion this year.

Net general revenue collections for 2024 fiscal year-to-date increased 2.7 percent compared to April 2023, from \$10.42 billion last year to \$10.70 billion this year.

Pass-Through Entity tax collections were previously reported within Individual Income, which makes growth in Individual Income tax collections appear artificially low.

The figures included in the monthly general revenue report represent a snapshot in time and can vary widely based on a multitude of factors.

If the property has code violations, the owner has thirty days to correct them and reschedule an appointment with the inspector.

After the requirements are approved, two certificates will be left at the inspection site. The tenant will bring one copy to the city to sign up for utilities. Utilities will not be transferred until a certificate of occupancy is provided to the utility company.

Owners can review the inspection checklist list to ensure they are up to code. These include the following areas: • All dwelling units must be movein ready and clean, and the previous tenant's belongings must be removed. • Accessory structures like sheds, garages or fences should be structurally sound.

• Steps, stairs, handrails, and guards

• Chimney must be maintained and safe.

• The exterior walls and foundation walls are sound and in working order.

• Free of any infestation.

• A sound roof and flashing with clean gutters and downspouts are required.

• Plumbing must be properly installed and maintained. Every dwelling will contain a bathtub or shower, lavatory, water closet and kitchen sink in a sanitary and safe condition.

• A 5 lb. ABC class fire extinguisher is required and tagged yearly.

Homeowners can review this list for their residences to evaluate whether improvements are needed at their homes, too.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary nonprofits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive Federal funds, 3) have 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

State of Missouri vs. Taylor Nicole Tweten

Taylor Nicole Tweten, Fair Grove, born in 2002, was charged by Dallas County Prosecuting Attorney Jonathan D. Barker in Dallas County Circuit Court with the class E felony of driving without a valid license on or about February 1, 2024.

According to his probable cause statement, Deputy Talon Farrar of the Dallas County Sheriff's Office, reported that while

he was on patrol on Feb. 1, he observed a silver Toyota Avalon bearing Missouri plates VG4C3N traveling southbound on St. Rd. F. The vehicle did not have a functioning tail light as it approached the intersection of F and St. Hwy. 38. Farrar activated his emergency lights and the vehicle pulled over into the right hand turn lane at 65 and 38.

Farrar said he made

contact with the driver, Taylor Tweten, and her passenger. Both subjects provided their information, and he ran a check through central dispatch. Dispatch advised that neither subject was a valid driver. Farrar asked Tweten if she had a valid license, and she told him she did not. He placed her under arrest and transported her to the Dallas County Detention Center.

Farrar stated he booked Tweten in. She was issued a citation for driving while license revoked second time. A check of her criminal history showed that on Sept. 14, 2021, Tweten was convicted for driving without a valid drivers license in Dallas County.

Anyone accused of a crime is presumed to be innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.



That's the sound of love

elcome to the year of the bug. We're just in time to witness two giant broods of cicadas rising from the ground like a horde of zombie bugs. How many zombie bugs? Definitely billions. But most likely trillions. There's no official tree-to-tree cicada census, so it's hard to be sure.

But we're sure they're here because they're loud - so loud that some people have called the police to make noise complaints about the roaring, whining sound that scientists say registers at about the same decibel level as a lawnmower or a jet flying overhead.

No matter how noisy it gets, police can't do anything about it. There's not enough departmental funding to buy teeny tiny cicada handcuffs that only get used every 13 years. That expense would never get approved by management. And even if police could lock up these bugs for having a raucous party, the cicadas would literally crawl out of their own skin and fly away - leaving nothing but a crunchy exoskeleton behind. The collective roar we hear this year is much like the cicada equivalent of online dating. These cicadas have been

alone underground for as long as 17 years, and now they're desperate for a date. I read an article from the University of Wisconsin that said sometimes male cicadas form boy bands to attract the ladies. Then they start belting out a special "courtship song" when a pretty girl flies by. If she likes the song, she'll flick her wings at the singer - the bug equivalent of swiping right.

It might sound like fun and games, but cicadas must dodge plenty of predators while they look for love. Birds anticipate the emergence of cicadas rising from the ground the same way some people look forward to the grand opening of a Golden Corral. It's an all-youcan-catch-and-eat mega buffet minus the chocolate fountain. And it's not just birds who chow down. Wasps, spiders, fish, reptiles, and even some mammals enjoy a crunchy cicada snack every chance they get.

But cicadas are lovers, not fighters. They can't sting. They're not poisonous. And their mouth parts can't even bite. All a guy can do is try to stay alive long enough to find a love connection with a good-looking cicada who likes his music and flicks a wing in his direction.

Not your typical country mom

y mother never made cinnamon rolls for breakfast or an apple pie for supper, leastways none that I can recall

My friends today often speak fondly of such mothers, but I can't relate. Breakfast for me and my brothers was more often a bowl of 40 percent bran flakes and supper dessert store-bought cookies, though seldom a name brand.

In fact, we didn't often have breakfast with Mom on weekdays, and supper almost always came later than I'm used to today.

Mom was generally on the road to Springfield before we came up from morning milking and seldom home before we finished evening chores. Likely as not she had stopped at Consumers' supermarket to pick up a chicken or pork steak to fry, as well as a can of cream corn, a head of lettuce and a loaf of bread.

Make no mistake, we always ate well, and Mom could cook when she had time, but cooking and housekeeping were not the center of her life. A medical technologist, she spent her days with other mothers in

white uniforms caring for the sick.

Only her five boys back on the farm (I and my dad and three brothers) trumped her medical responsibilities. She had made it clear to Dad from the onset she would gladly live on a farm, but she would not be a stereotypical farm wife, and she wasn't.

As far as I can recall, Mom never milked a cow, only rarely canned green beans or dressed a chicken and never drove a truck or tractor in the havfield.

She did, however, "bring home the bacon," as they say.

There was never any doubt among us boys that it was Mom's career in town that allowed Dad to stay home and raise us like Pa Cartwright and his brood on the Ponderosa.

I'm not sure Dad ever conceded it was Mom's paychecks, rather than his meager milk checks, that kept us all fed and clothed, but it was.

And it was a win-win situation for all of us. Mom loved her career and living in the country. Dad loved raising his boys on the farm, and we learned a lot more than if the roles had been reversed. Moreover, I learned things many young men have no chance to experience — like how to make, biscuits, cornbread, blackberry cobbler and hosts of other country fare.

No, my mom was not a typical farm mother for her time, nor Dad a typical father. They were both way ahead of the curve — 21st Century parents in a 20th Century environment - and the result was an extraordinary childhood for four boys on 39 brushy acres of Dallas County farmland.

As hard as the work was and as scarce as extra dollars were, I would return in a heartbeat to the riches of those bygone days.




In the top of the fourth Olyvia Williams crunched a long home run over the centerfield wall to make it 3-1.

Pomme De Terre Fishing Report

By BRAD SHOCKLEY I Åm Outdoors

Lake Conditions

Lake Level: 845.32, 65-67 degrees.

Water condition: The lake is currently 6.32 feet high. They have been letting out a lot of water and the lake level has been coming down quickly. The water clarity is stained to dirty.

Crappie

Action: Good.

The crappie are aggressive and biting very well. Some have finished spawning but the majority of the crappie are still trying to go shallow and have about half their eggs. Some crappie are shallow, at the edge of the flooded bushes. However, the most aggressive crappie are in spawning areas around structure in 20-30 feet of water

Pattern: On standing timber in 20-30 feet of water in the mouths of creeks or coves of spawning areas. Most of the crappie are 10-15 feet deep; they will hit a jig that is swimming past them. They are moving in and around the trees. Cast your jig past the tree, let it fall and slowly reel it back.

Brush piles in 20-30 feet of water have been good. The crappie are hanging in the top of and around the brush, cast your jig, let it fall near the top of the pile

and slowly reel back. Some piles will produce a few fish while other piles will produce several.

Lures: Crappie Slammers split tail shad and straight tail shad have been producing well. While the crappie are aggressive, the grub shad has been a good performer. In the main lake area natural colors are the best toothpaste pearl, sunset pearl, blue crystal and the natural. In the upper ends a dark color with chartreuse has been best on cloudy and dark days - white pearl chartreuse, red chartreuse, pink lemonade, midnight chartreuse.

Bass

Action: Fair to Good. Pattern: The bass have been somewhat inconsistent; however they are turning on a little more. They are starting to move shallow (see the same report on conditions for crappie) and will continue as the water warms and the lake level stabilizes. The bass are beginning to move to the flooded bushes.

The best bite has been on a jig, just remember to match the color to the conditions. Crankbaits and jerk baits are still producing.

Lures: Jigs with a good trailer, crankbaits, jerk baits and soft plastics.

Box Turtles

box turtle never forgets. Missourians will see many signs of a box turtle's reliance on memory in the weeks ahead when people will observe turtle crossing roads throughout the region. These turtle treks don't mesh well with our reliance on automobiles, as evidenced by the large number of turtles killed by vehicles each year. Before we get to the connection between turtle travels and turtle memory, here's more about these interesting reptiles.

Eighteen species of turtles are found in Missouri. Although you'll find various species crossing highways, the most common turtles you'll see on area roads are the three-toed box turtle and ornate box turtle. Three-toed box turtles have plain, olive-brown colored shells and ornate box turtles dark shells with yellow streaks and spots. (Young three-toed box turtles often have vellow markings on their shell, but their shell color becomes duller as they mature.) Three-toed box turtles prefer brushy edges of fields and oak-hickory forests interspersed with clearings while ornate box turtles tend to be more of a prairie/grassland species. Here in the southwest part of the state, both can be found with equal frequency.

Some box turtles crossing the road are looking for food or shelter. Others are males seeking mates. Whatever they're looking for, one obvious characteristic of traveling box turtles is their dogged determination to cross traffic-filled highways in a specific direction, despite the fact that equally good habitat or mates may be in another and much safer direction.

And this brings us back to a box turtle's powers of remembrance.



The primary navigational tool that guides a box turtle's travels is memory. The seasonal ranges of box turtles are often quite small – sometimes as small as several acres. Box turtles instinctually familiarize themselves with various components of their range (where food is, where water is, where a good place to lay eggs is, etc.). Then, over the course of a year, and succeeding years, as well; they use their strong homing abilities to return to these locations as they need to. It doesn't matter if their routes cross automobile-filled roads or newly developed subdivisions; all turtles know is they have to get back to the spots they're accustomed to using at this time of year.

For the most part, box turtles have little negative impact on humans and are merely creatures trying to live long enough to produce the next generation. If this has given you the urge to give a box turtle some road-crossing assistance the next time you see one on a highway, remember this:

• If you stop, do so at a location and in a manner that won't endanger you, your vehicle or other traffic on the road.• When you

move a turtle, make sure you move it across the road in the direction it's traveling. Because of its strong homing characteristics, if you set the turtle back in the direction from which it came, it will merely try to cross the road again.

Over the decades, a number of people have captured box turtles and tried to raise them as pets. Wild box turtles do much better in their natural surroundings than in captive settings (regardless of what you've read on the Internet). So, if you want to help a turtle cross a road, simply move it to the other side of the road and let it be what it was meant to be - a wild animal.

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows turkey hunters checked 43,380 birds during Missouri's 2024 regular spring turkey season, April 15 through May 5. Top harvest counties for the regular season were Franklin with 940 birds harvested, Callaway with 822, and Texas with 780.

Young turkey hunters also harvested 3,739 turkeys over the youth weekend, April 6 and 7, bringing the overall 2024 spring turkey harvest to 47,119. According to MDC, that is a 6-percent increase in total harvest from 2023 and a 20-percent increase in total harvest compared to the previous five-year average

"2024 was the third year in a row in which harvest increased," said MDC Wild Turkey Biologist Nick Oakley. "The ability to hunt all day on private land may have had a role in this increase. Successively better hatches starting in 2021 meant there were also likely more turkeys on the landscape as well.

We are still looking at the data to see how much of the increase in harvest can be attributed to the new regulation, as well as how many new hunters the regulation change helped to get into the field. A 6-percent increase in harvest is in line with what we would have expected knowing that many factors play into harvest totals."

Last year, young turkey hunters harvested 2,566 turkeys over the spring youth season and hunters harvested 41,977 during the regular spring season for a 2023 spring season total harvest of 44.543.

Troublesome Pasture Plant of the Week - Buttercup

Bulbous Buttercup is a low-growing, late spring flowering, perennial plant. The leaves are alternate and sessile with hairs located on the surface. They are divided in three triangular to oval/rounded lobes. Its distinctive five to seven-pedal, bright yellow flowers are around 1 inch wide and are easily seen in your field in late March through May. After the flower is fully opened, a triangle shaped sepal can be seen just below the flower in a downturned position. Buttercup gets its name from the bulbous base, really a corm, located at the bottom of an erect, thick vertical stem around 8 to 24 inches tall. The corm is located just below the soil surface with

thick roots branching off of it. This plant easily overwinters and produces a new plant in the spring. Like most weeds, it will grow based on the soil and growing conditions surrounding it. Just like fescue, it does better when you fertilize it. When mowed often, which will not kill it, the plant is usually lower growing, almost prostrate, and is usually hairy near the base. This plant can be found in almost any type of landscape.

All parts of this plant are poisonous to grazing livestock. However, most livestock tend to avoid this plant as it does not smell or taste very good to them. Hungry animals, which consume buttercup, may suffer from blistering in the mouth, stomach, and/or rumen. Animals may show outward symptoms of diarrhea and colic. Buttercup toxins become inac-

tive when this plant is mowed, raked, and baled for hay. One of the easiest ways to spread this plant, by seed on your farm, is feeding late cut contaminated hay.

Since most grazing animals do not graze buttercup and mowing often only thickens the plants your choice of control is chemical. The best time to spray this plant is early spring before it goes to flower. The most effective chemicals are those that contain 2-4-D, such as Cimarron Max, Grazon P & D, and Weedmaster. Chemicals that contain metsulfuron work as well too.

As always, when using any type of agricultural chemical, read and follow the manufactures label, and use the correct application methods.

MDA Helping Prevent the Spread of Harmful Pests

MDA is working to keep plant pests out of Missouri throughout the summer

The Missouri Department of Agriculture Plant Industries team is setting spongy moth pest traps in May and will continue monitoring for other plant pests in the upcoming months. Summer is a popular time for pests to make their presence known in a negative way.

"Plant pests can hitchhike to new

lure that attracts male spongy moths. The pheromone travels a short distance, only attracting moths already in close proximity to the trap. Traps are tied around the trunks of oak trees across the state, from the southwest corner to the northwest corner of Missouri. Nearly 3,200 traps are set out each summer, both in urban and rural settings.

MDA also watches closely for the spotted lanternfly, a leafhopper native to Asia. The spotted lanternfly feeds on the sap of over 70 plant species, including grape, apple, hops, oak, walnut, maple and ornamental plants. Tree of Heaven, an invasive plant in Missouri, is a favored host for the spotted lanternfly. Spotted lanternflies, like spongy moths, are hitchhikers in their egg mass life stage. Look for spotted lanternfly and spongy moth egg masses on vehicles, trees, and other outdoor surfaces.

Farmers Market Nutrition Programs Underway

Programs provide fresh products to low-income seniors and WIC participants

The Missouri Department of Agriculture has launched the Missouri Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) and WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program (WICFMNP) for the 2024 season. Both programs are funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service and assist low-income recipients in obtaining fresh Missouri Grown produce. Low-income seniors in the Kansas City, St. Louis, Springfield and Mid-Missouri regions can apply to receive benefits, which will allow them to purchase eligible foods from an authorized farmer at a Missouri farmers market or roadside stand. A total of \$50 in benefits may be issued to each qualifying Missouri household. To identify the regions containing the highest number of eligible citizens, the Missouri Department of Agriculture worked with the Missouri Department of Social Services. Seniors are encouraged to use a proxy to apply

for benefits and purchase eligible foods at a farmers market. Each senior may designate one proxy on their behalf. The senior and the proxy must both sign the program application in order to receive the benefits.

Seniors may apply for benefits at the following locations:

• Springfield – Senior-Age Area Agency on Ag-

same agency where they receive their WIC benefits.

The Department's Missouri Grown team has trained and authorized nearly 257 farmers to participate in the program. Authorized farmers will be identified by a sign that states the booth is proudly participating in the Farmers Market Nutrition Program. Benefits may be used to purchase fresh, raw, unprepared foods grown in Missouri and sold at a farmers market or roadside stand. Eligible foods include fruits, vegetables, fresh cut cooking herbs and honey (SFMNP only). Benefits are available through Sept. 30 (or until funds are exhausted) and must be redeemed by Oct. 31. Farmers interested in learning more about eligibility and participation should email MDA at FarmersMarket@mda. mo.gov. locations through a number of avenues," said State Entomologist Rosalee Knipp. "They can burrow in untreated firewood and attach themselves to outdoor surfaces. Our team works hard to ensure Missouri's plant industry remains protected throughout the year, and no invasive species make their way into our state."

For more than 45 years, MDA's Plant Pest team has been surveying for the spongy moth by setting delta traps. The spongy moth arrived in the U.S. in 1869 and has primarily affected the east coast. Surveying helps MDA monitor for spongy moths and would allow our team to pinpoint location if spongy moths were to enter our state. Spongy moths feed on more than 300 species of trees and shrubs but are particularly fond of the oak tree. Missouri has approximately 12.5 million acres of oak that could be severely damaged or killed if infested with spongy moths, which would greatly impact the state's forestry economy.

Temporary traps are set in May each year. The traps are checked by MDA staff throughout the summer and are removed in August. Spongy moth traps are orange and triangular, and each trap includes a pheromone

Missourians can help stop the spread of these pests in a number of ways.

• If you happen to see a spongy moth or spotted lanternfly egg mass when it is dormant during late fall, winter or early spring, scrape or smash the mass and report the sighting to MDA.

• Don't move untreated firewood to new places. Source firewood where it will be burned or buy certified, heat-treated firewood before traveling.

· Source plants and seeds responsibly.

My advice to underclassmen would be to not take high school too seriously. While it's important to always try your best, it's not worth completely stressing out or losing sleep over.


