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## "Legacy Programs" Provide Relief to Local Businesses

Since the start of the pandemic, more businesses have looked into – and taken advantage of – incentives and grants than before. It was our pleasure to move out over \$2.4 million in grants to Caroline County businesses over the last 18 months. The programs are not as

prevalent now at the federal, state, or local level, but there are what I like to call "legacy programs" that can provide some relief to local businesses.

One program, the Enterprise Zone program, provides growing businesses with an opportunity to save on property taxes when significant property improvements are made and income tax credit when new positions are created. The Enterprise Zone program is a geographic based incentive program; commercial and industrial parcels in two zones have been designated as eligible for consideration of incentives. The Federalsburg Enterprise Zone was established in 2015 and includes parcels in the industrial parks and commercially zoned parcels in town. The North County Enterprise Zone was established in 2018 and covers eligible parcels in Ridgely, Greensboro, and Goldsboro. The Enterprise Zone program is a Maryland Department of Commerce tool to grow existing businesses, create jobs, and revitalize communities. The Enterprise Zone benefits can spur business growth through property improvements and expansion and job creation. The beautiful thing about this program is current and new businesses can take advantage of it.

Companies that invest in their buildings or land could realize significant savings on the property tax on the new value of those improvements. The property tax credit portion of the program is a tiered reduction in property taxes on newly assessed value after an improvement. Companies that create at least five new jobs could get up to \$1,000 per job state income tax credit.

The program is a partnership between the State of Maryland, which provides reimbursement of the benefits, and the County and Towns. The program is administered by the Caroline County Economic Development. A business must become certified by the County and meet certain eligibility requirements to take advantage of the benefits. 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## Where Are All the Old Railroad Depots Today?

The end of an era was observed quietly in Caroline County just a few weeks ago when a chugging diesel engine slowly bumped its way out of Greensboro with a couple of freight cars tagging along behind.

It was the final run on the MD-DEL RR Spur line that used to serve communities in Caroline and Talbot counties with as many as five passenger trains and a couple freight trains a day at the turn of the century.

The 55-mile-long branch from Clayton, DE to Oxford, MD, was known as the Delaware & Chesapeake and was a part of the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore RR that bound Eastern Shore communities together with rails of steel along with hundreds of other rail companies across the nation.

And 81-year-old Roland Cartwright, of Goldsboro, recalls the days he served as station agent in both Goldsboro and Greensboro when "the iron horse" was the principal mode of travel.

"I remember as many as five passenger trains a day; particularly on Saturdays in the summer. We had four on a regular daily basis, but on Saturdays a lot of New York people who had homes in Talbot County and along the Bayshore came down forcing an extra train to be run," he said.

He laughed as he recalled it "was about \$3.25 for an excursion trip from Greensboro to Atlantic City for a day's outing."

"The trains ran direct to the boardwalk in those days," he said.

Mr. Cartwright, who still does income tax work at his one on MD 313 just south of Goldsboro, also wonders what has happened to many of the small depots that served passengers along the line.

"I know the folks in Ridgely have transformed their depot into a town hall," he said.

His old station in Goldsboro and Greensboro were made into other uses. At Greensboro, the building is used as





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apartments and the small station at Goldsboro was moved to Caroline Acres for use as a community hall.

In Queen Anne, the station was bought and the owner had it moved to Centreville for a private dwelling. The same was done for the depot in Henderson as it was moved out on a farm for a home.

Retired Denton band executive Ted Orme believed the little station at Downs Station was moved and used as a home and he thinks the one at Hobbs and Hickman were finally torn down along with the depot in Denton.

A yellowing, but remarkably-wellpreserved railroad timetable of 1901, shows a map of all the lines on the Delmarva Peninsula complete with timetables for each of the branch lines.

The Delaware & Chesapeake, from Clayton, DE to Oxford, MD had 15 stops, with two passenger trains a day south and two northbound.

The timetable indicates that Goldsboro was 19.58 miles from Clayton and the southbound train stopped there at 6:01 p.m. and 10:19 a.m. each day, while the northbound train stopped at 8:11 a.m. and 3:07 p.m.

Mr. Cartwright, who may be retired from railroading, but has no thoughts of taking life easy, answers quickly when asked when he started "working on the railroad."

"It was January 4, 1917 when I went into the Goldsboro station as a telegrapher," he said. "During World War I, I was sent to Farmington, DE as a relief clerk and later up to New Castle. I believe that I worked nearly all the stations on the Delmarva Division north of Delmar during my career."

He became the agent in Goldsboro in 1936 and it was finally closed in 1950.

He went over to neighboring Queen Anne's County to be an agent in Sudlersville for a year, served as an "extra agent" for the railroad until 1958 when he came into Greensboro where he retired in 1967.

"Sure, I remember the last passenger train on the line," he admits. "It was in 1949. There was no celebration or anything like that. It came through one day and the next day there were no more passenger trains, just freight from then on."

He says the railroad has its own clubhouse in Rehoboth Beach that is used by retired and active employees, who own the property.

"We have it fixed up somewhat as a museum with pictures and railroad memorabilia," he said.

After a half-century of working on the railroad, Roland Cartwright has many memories of the days when the iron horse was king.

Beth Spurry, a Women & Girls Fund board member who co-chairs the Grants Committee along with board member Allie Prell, shared the committee's purpose: "We are interested in receiving applications from organizations in Caroline, Dorchester, Kent, Queen Anne's, and Talbot counties. No organization should be reluctant to apply. We give strong attention to specialized needs and innovative programs for which other funding sources might not exist.

We are pleased to have helped a number of small projects get started and become successful ongoing programs."



## Housing Shortage Leads Soaring Prices

If you are homeless or otherwise in search of a place to live, Caroline County is not the greatest place to be looking. Heck, the entire Mid-Shore area has a shortage of decent affordable housing, either to rent or purchase, especially for younger people just trying to start out in life.

Mom and Dad, or other family members, have become the source of shelter for many people, young and old. The challenges of the Covid pandemic and limited inventory of homes for sale has served as a catalyst for developers to build homes on the few building lots that had been sitting dormant for a period of time. Currently, the high cost of lumber and other building materials and compliance with ever tightening building requirements has stopped any serious investor from moving forward on any new housing projects.

With a shortage of housing units available for sale or rent, prices for purchasing as well as monthly rents have soared to levels that seem unsustainable. There is a feeling that at some point prices will come down, or at the very least stabilize. But the \$64,000 question is "when will that happen?"

Rental units, if you can find one, have monthly rental payments that could be higher than what a mortgage payment would be, especially with current sub 3% interest rates. No need for landlords to put ads in the local paper or advertise online. The network of rental companies and landlords receive calls every day regarding units available.

The pandemic has made many tenants squatters in that landlords have been prohibited from moving for eviction. Rental assistance moneys for those tenants who have fallen behind has saved many landlords from their own economic disaster.

So, with all this gloom and doom about housing and the prospects for the situation to improve in the near future looking fairly grim, why would anyone consider purchasing a home? For the simple reason that you need to live somewhere, and you might as well be an owner instead of a tenant. This market, with exorbitantly higher rents reaching levels close to what it costs to be an owner, is a prime reason to buy instead of rent. Even with today's higher prices.

There are things you can do now to be considered a serious buyer, and doing these things will also make you look better to a potential landlord if renting will be your first step getting out on your own.



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The first thing you must do is establish good credit. Whether renting or buying, your credit report, more specifically your credit scores, will be critical. You cannot purchase, nor can you rent, without a satisfactory credit report that shows you are prudent in managing your use of credit.

If you are just starting out and need to establish credit you need to get a secured credit card. These are major credit cards, usually VISA or Mastercard where your credit limit is determined by the amount you put on deposit with the issuer. You send the issuer \$300, and they will issue you a credit card with a \$300 limit. If you default on the card they keep your money, hence the term "secured."

When just starting out, it is imperative that you set yourself up properly to get a good credit score. First, make your payments well before the due date. Do not be late in making your payment! If you are late, that reflects negatively on your account and lowers your credit score.

Keep in mind the goal is to establish good credit so when a credit score is reported it is a good score, and not a bad one. Late on your payment-BAD. Charge amounts over your credit limit-BAD. Getting a credit card and not using it-BAD. It does no good to have a credit card for the purposes of establishing credit and leaving it in the desk drawer collecting dust.

Think of your credit score like a water pump. Using the card is like priming the pump and getting water flowing. Every time you make a payment is one more handle stroke on the pump bringing up more water.

Get the card, use it every month and make payments before the due date, another pumping stroke. more water. Keep the balance on the card at, or below 40% of what your available credit is (credit limit) and the flow of water is steadier and more dependable. And use the card every month, because for every month there is not activity, water flow slows down and credit score stagnates, or worse, the score drops.

And for gosh sakes never, ever let the balance go over your credit limit. I have seen potential borrowers with a shallow credit history (very few accounts) lose 50 points in credit score because they went over the limit on a secured credit card. This will force you to start pumping all over again because you have lost your prime and the water level in the pump has dropped. Just like your credit score.

Once you have a card for a few months sign up for a credit monitoring service like Credit Karma or most credit card companies offer that to their card holders. Keeping an eye on your credit on a regular basis will show the impact of certain things on your score, so you can see what makes the score go up and also down.

Starting the home search journey will require cash for a security deposit and first month's rent if renting and cash for closing costs/down payment if purchasing. Although, it is possible to buy a house with no money through the Rural Housing Program, so a large amount of cash may not be necessary,

In either case, the more cash you have at time of signing a lease or a contract the more resources you will have if repairs or painting are needed. Or new or more furniture is necessary or appliances that the home or apartment may not come with. Also, having funds available after a purchase closing can help mitigate what is called "payment shock."

This is the shock new homeowners suffer when going from a certain payment for rent to a higher payment for a mortgage.

The most extreme example is a person, or persons who are living with family and not paying any rent, and they are purchasing a home where their monthly mortgage payment will be \$1,200 per month, plus utilities that could add another \$150-\$200 per month in expenses. This is significant payment shock.

Someone with very little, if any, savings after closing will potentially start their homeownership experience under financial strain, depending on how much income they have. Yet someone with \$5,000 in the bank after closing will have those funds available to help cushion the blow, or help adjust their monthly budget to these added expenses. Having a job is an absolute minimum requirement when considering taking on a monthly obligation like rent or a mortgage payment. If you are currently unemployed or have had a sporadic work history over the last several years buying a home will have to be put on pause. Having made job changes over the last several years may not be an issue if those changes resulted in improving your career path, higher salary, better benefits, opportunity for advancement.

To be qualified for most mortgages, selfemployed borrowers must have been in business for at least two taxable years. And for most programs if the business had a decline in revenue in excess of 20% year to year, then the income from that

The pandemic year of 2020 was ruthless in decreasing income for many small businesses. Those borrowers will need to wait until their 2021 taxes are prepared and hopefully show an increase in revenue.

Some people who lost jobs due to the pandemic took the entrepreneurial leap to self-employment and started their own business. For them, the homeownership clock got set back two years until two full taxable years for the business can be provided.


W-2 employees' income is much easier to document because it is an established hourly rate or salary. Overtime and bonus earnings can be used for qualifying if it has been earned for at least the last two years with the same employer.

It is not always necessary to have been employed for the past two years if you were a full-time student immediately prior to your current job. Being a full-time student and working in a career field in line with your degree or certificate can be substituted for two years of employment. A recently hired school teacher just out of college is a prime example of this.

Paying heed to these suggestions and using them as a guide should provide a good foundation for anyone preparing to purchase a home. A consequence of following these suggestions will also serve to make you a more desirable risk for a landlord to consider.

Remember to get a preapproval from a lender like me who offers financing utilizing all the various programs for first time buyers, and most importantly can explain the reasons why a particular loan program works best for your particular situation.



## STOP BULLYING!

Have you ever been bullied? Perhaps somebody made fun of your haircut, your clothes or the way you speak. Perhaps your bully took it further than teasing and started spreading rumours about you or even physically harassed you. Or maybe you've been on the other side and have actually BEEN the bully. Either way, bullying is not fun and is extremely hurtful to both the bully and those who are on the receiving end.

It's obvious why bullying is hurtful to those who are being bullied. It hurts your self-esteem. It creates a feeling of "less than". It makes you fearful to go to school, work or anyplace you might encounter your bully. Being bullied can lead to depression, anxiety, and many other psychiatric issues. But the long-term effects can actually be worse for the one who's doing the bullying. People who bully stand a greater chance of abusing alcohol and drugs, getting into fights, vandalizing property, having a criminal record, and being abusive to their spouse and/or children. Bullying hurts everyone.

So why do people do it? There's no one real reason why people bully others but some of the most common reasons are their own feelings of insecurity and powerlessness, their need to control others, or they just simply enjoy making other people feel badly about themselves. Whatever the reason, their bullying behaviors hurt the victim, the community, and themselves.

What can we do to put an end to this and "Stomp Out Bullying"? Like most things, it begins at home. Parents who are bullies are more likely to raise kids who also bully. By doing so, they're reducing their children's chances to succeed and thrive in school and life in general. Watch you own behavior and treat others with the kindness and respect you'd like to receive - kids learn by watching their parents, teachers, and other adults in their lives. We all have love and hate in our hearts - teach them it's ok to choose love over hate! Show them how much better it is to be considerate of others than it is to incessantly tease, taunt or harass. Visit websites like www.stompoutbullying.org for resources on how create a more respectful environment. Talk to your kids, neighbors, colleagues about what is acceptable behavior - use the prompts in the picture to start those discussions. We're all responsible for creating safe and welcoming environments in our schools, homes and communities. We're all #CarolineStrong!

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

## Rabies Prevention and Vaccination

Rabies is an acute, progressive viral infection that nearly always results in fatal encephalitis. An exposure to the rabies virus may occur when a person is bitten by or exposed to saliva of a rabid animal. The disease is prevented with a four dose rabies vaccine series administered over a period of 14 days and a dose of rabies immunoglobulin given at the beginning of the series. Each year, approximately 900 Marylanders receive preventive vaccinations after exposure to a rabid or potentially rabid animal.

Animals with rabies often show changes in behavior. Wild animals may act friendly, domestic animals may become aggressive, and animals that are active only at night may appear during the day. Rabid animals may stagger, drool, or become paralyzed. The diagnosis of rabies is made by examining brain tissue from the suspected rabid animal.

To avoid being exposed to rabies:

- Have your dogs, cats, ferrets, and livestock vaccinated against rabies
- Keep your pet under your control at all times, especially when traveling
- Enjoy wildlife from a distance and do not feed wildlife
- Avoid sick animals and any that are acting in an unusual manner
- Cover garbage cans securely and do not leave pet food outside
- Do not relocate wildlife
- Prevent bats from entering your home.

If you find a bat in your home, do not touch it. Bats found in the home should be safely collected, if possible, and tested for rabies. Only let a bat go if you are sure no people or household pets have had any contact with it. If it is alive, protect yourself from exposure and catch it by placing a small box, bowl, or can over the bat once it has landed to roost, and then slide a piece of cardboard under the container to trap the bat inside. Tape the cardboard to the container and contact the Caroline County Health Department for guidance.

Any suspected exposure to a rabid animal should be reported immediately to the Caroline County Health Department at 410-479-8045.


## What Does Retirement Security Mean to You?

your monthly payments will be much larger if you can wait until your "full" retirement age, typically between 66 and 67. (Payments will "max out" at age 70.) So, if you have sufficient income from a pension or your 401(k) and other retirement accounts, and you and your spouse are in good health with a family history of longevity, you may consider delaying taking Social Security. You also might want to explore other income-producing vehicles, such as certain annuities that are designed to provide a lifetime income stream.

- Prepare for unexpected costs. During your retirement, you can anticipate some costs, such as housing and transportation, but other expenses are more irregular and can't always be predicted, such as those connected with health care. Even with Medicare, you could easily spend a few thousand dollars a year on medical expenses, so you may want to budget for these costs as part of your emergency savings, and possibly purchase supplemental insurance. You may also want to consider the possibility of needing some type of long-term care, which is not typically covered by Medicare and can be quite expensive. The average annual cost of a private room in a nursing home is more than \$100,000, and it's about \$55,000 per year for a home health aide, according to Genworth, an insurance company. To address these costs, you may want to consider some form of protection, such as long-term care insurance or life insurance with a long-term care component.
- Do your estate planning. It's hard to feel totally secure in retirement if you're unsure of what might happen if you have an unexpected health event, become incapacitated or die earlier than expected. That's why you'll want to create a comprehensive estate plan – one that might include documents such as a durable power of attorney, a will and a living trust. A review of your insurance coverages and beneficiaries can also help protect your assets and ensure they are distributed the way you want. In creating your plan, you will need to work with your financial advisor and a legal professional, and possibly your tax advisor as well.



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

### Breast Cancer Screening During the time of COVID-19

During this very challenging time of the coronavirus pandemic, we all have second thoughts about doing common everyday things like going to the grocery store or restaurant, but what about going to a doctor's office for a routine exam? Many of us have stopped doing tasks that can affect our health and well-being. It has been 18 months since the coronavirus knowingly appeared in the USA. It is going to be with us for a while.

The percentage of mammograms, Pap tests, and Colonoscopies performed last year dropped by > 90% across the country. This has improved in 2021 as more people are being vaccinated. The National Cancer Institute has warned that delaying screening due to the pandemic could lead to a sharp increase in deaths from breast and colorectal cancers in the next 10 years.

Delayed screening may = delayed diagnosis = poorer prognosis = treatment options that are more invasive due to advanced stage of cancer.

What to do? Coronavirus isn't stopping for anyone! Neither are we!

 If you are due for a Clinical Breast Exam, Pap test, Mammogram or Colonoscopy, call your Primary Care Provider. Ask them if they are seeing patients and what the process is. They are prepared to see you with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and will certainly ask you COVID-19 related questions. They are following CDC guidelines and want to protect their staff and you as well.

### Choptank Health expands schoolbased dental health

Choptank Community Health recently added school-based dental services to





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Kent, and Queen Anne's County public school student enrollees. Choptank Health's dental services are already provided in Dorchester County Public Schools, with dental and medical services available to students enrolled in the school-based health programs of Caroline and Talbot County Public Schools.

Choptank Community Health's Chief Dental Officer Sandra Garbely-Kerkovich, DMD and Community Based Program Director Chrissy Bartz, PAC, MMS oversee the school-based dental program, with Pre-K through 12th-grade students enrolled in each school are eligible to receive care at any location.

Registered dental hygienists provide on-site dental screenings, fluoride treatments, sealant applications, and dental hygiene education. The free dental screenings include examinations of the teeth and all soft tissues of the mouth—along with instruction on brushing and flossing, and education on the importance of eating healthy foods in good oral hygiene.

"Strong partnerships with the area's local school systems are critical to the impact our School-Based Health Centers have on the wellness of all students," said Choptank Community Health CEO Sara Rich. "We are thankful for the commitment of each school and county for recognizing the importance of this program in helping to provide access to health care for all."

Choptank Community Health operates 12 medical school-based health centers, located in each Caroline County Public School and in Talbot County Public School's Easton Elementary, Easton Middle, and Easton High Schools.

"School-Based Health Centers improve attendance by limiting the amount of time students and staff miss from school and work by providing the care they need, and then allowing them to return to school as appropriate," says Bartz. "It's a great service to our students, their parents, our schools, and ultimately our entire communities."

Each medical health center is staffed by licensed advanced practice clinicians, including Certified Nurse Practitioners and Physician Assistants, and function like a typical doctor's office. Choptank Health is offering telehealth and curbside visits at the schools for COVID testing, with quarantining protocols and separate well-child spaces on premise.

 According to the School-Based Health Alliance, school-based health care is a powerful tool for achieving health equity among children and adolescents who unjustly experience disparities in outcomes simply because of their race, ethnicity, or family income.





## **Ridgely Rails Legacy**

This month, I want to highlight the first book in the RIDGELY RAILS LEGACY series. Last month I included a short synopsis of the story, but in this article, I'd like to provide the back cover summary as well as some inside information on the novel and its cover.

"Suffering has been stronger than all other teaching... I have been bent and broken, but--I hope--into a better shape." – Charles Dickens, Great Expectations

Ella Mae Hutchins knows exactly what she wants from life. Getting it turns out to be much harder than she expects. She has only two dreams: to marry Daniel Evans and to become a successful novelist. When neither dream seems achievable, she sets out to build a life without either.

After all her efforts fail, Ella Mae returns to her hometown broken. Determined to start again, the last thing she expects is to encounter the man she blames for ruining her life.

Although age and suffering have changed them both, can she forgive Daniel for breaking her heart and is she brave enough to hope for a writing career in a time when female novelists are rare?

It doesn't take much imagination to know where the inspiration came from for Ella Mae's character. At an early age, I developed a love for reading and writing and began cultivating a dream that one day I could find my name on the New York Time's Best Seller List. Although my favorite fictional characters growing up were Anne of Green Gables and Josephine March from Little Women, in college I discovered literary fiction and fell in love with Mark Helprin's A Soldier of the Great War. At that time, I concluded that in order to be successful, I must write in a similar male voice if I wanted to receive credit and acclaim from male critics.

It wasn't until I was an adult that I, like Anne Shirley and Jo March, circled back to the simplicity of my early love for imagination and literature, and it was this mindset which inspired me to write WHERE THIS ROAD ENDS. When I was young, like Ella Mae, I was always in a corner with my nose in a book or lost in my own imagination, creating stories. I wrote my first full length novel when I was fifteen (in the olden days of paper and pen and hardback encyclopedias!) and by the time I graduated high school, it had evolved into a three-book series. I was full of hope, and then... Life happened. As it does to everyone. And I lost faith in myself and in my dream.

When I moved to Ridgely, I had already self-published two different series, six books total, and I was in a much more hopeful place. I was inspired by the old town charm and the 1895 house which I was living in (it now has a new caretaker). How often do you get to include your own home in an historical fiction novel? I was pretty excited about it! It is known by locals as the John Jarrell House and was constructed




as a boarding house during a time of growth in Ridgely, thanks to the fertile farmlands and the railroad.

The doors on the house still bore the brass numbers and one of the wooden double doors to the room I used as my office was still stenciled in old time type: "Office." In the backyard, the barn still stood which had served as a carriage house for the horses and buggies of the family and guests. It was easy to place myself in a different time period and imagine my characters living in the house and walking the streets of Ridgely.

Like so many other small Eastern Shore towns, the survival of Ridgely was directly linked to its ability to ship goods through the railroad, so the title of the series seemed like a logical tribute. In typical eccentric writer fashion, I holed myself up from the world throughout the winter months and did little else but research and write in my spare time. I also began planning the cover for the novel, and it only seemed natural for it to include a picture of the old railroad station. It wasn't until I emerged from my hermitage in the spring that I learned the local historical society had been working to preserve the station and it would be ready for its grand debut at the same time I was ready to call in my graphic designer. Talk about perfect timing!

Recently this novel was reviewed as "A sweet, but sad, story." I promise it has a happy ending! Not every love story does. My



daughter refuses to watch Little Women with me since Jo and Teddy don't end up together. But in the spirit of Anne Shirley finally finding her soulmate in Gilbert, Ella Mae will marry Daniel to satisfy that longing in all our hearts!

It's finally Fall! What a relief to turn off the AC and open the windows to that good, cool country air? As the harvest begins and we see our farmers out on the roads getting to their crops with their tractors, combines, and balers, let's remember how important these hard-working folks are to our local and national economy. Practicing patience as they maneuver their behemoth equipment around Caroline County is an important part of being a good neighbor! They know we are behind them and try to make way whenever possible for general traffic, so let's give them a break and keep all gestures friendly!

As we ready ourselves for fall, we must also get ready for an avalanche of snail mail plus plenty of radio, internet, and television advertising this fall, folks! Open enrollment for Prescription Drug Coverage part "D" starts October 15 and ends December 7, so anyone selling anything Medicare related (including Supplemental policies and Advantage plans) is flooding the market with "buy from us" attention grabbers! Agents that are marketing Medicare products have guidelines set out by CMS that they must follow. Under these guidelines, plans and agents cannot:

- Use language that suggests their plan is preferred by Medicare
- Represent itself as coming from or sent by Medicare, Social Security, or Medicaid
- Call or text you if you did not ask them to do so
- Leave information (such as leaflets, flyers, door hangers, etc.) on your car or at your home if they come from a company that did not have an appointment with you
- Provide information that is inaccurate or misleading
- Require attendees to provide contact information as a prerequisite for attending a marketing event
- Call marketing event attendees later without permission
- Call prospective enrollees to confirm receipt of mailed information
- Approach beneficiaries in public common areas, such

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### as parking lots, hallways, lobbies, or sidewalks

Remember that Open Enrollment is the time to evaluate ones' current prescription drug plan (part "D") and enroll in a different plan for 2022 if need be. The evaluation includes examining changes to the plan's formulary, whereby a given medicine can be dropped and will no longer be covered, or changes in the tiering of a drug which affects the cost and availability of medications. Call Mary Moran at the above number for information and assistance with your evaluations for next year's coverage or to report violations of the guidelines stated above!

The Medicare Modernization Act requires insurers whose policies include drug coverage to notify policyholders in writing if their prescription drug coverage is creditable. Credible coverage means that the coverage is expected to pay, on average, as much as the standard Medicare part "D" prescription drug coverage. This disclosure must be provided to Medicare eligible working individuals and their dependents, as well as COBRA individuals and their dependents, by their employer, union, or Integrated plan. (An integrated plan is any plan of benefits offered to Medicare eligible individuals that offers prescription drug benefits, along with medical coverage, vision, dental, etc.) This notification also applies to those who are disabled and Medicare eligible, as well as retirees and their dependents. If one does not have creditable coverage from an entity other than Medicare, you are facing penalties once you do sign up for "D", Medicare Prescription Drug coverage!

Remember that after one's initial enrollment period, those who are Medicare eligible and do not have creditable drug coverage after 63 days of losing drug coverage will be assessed a Late Enrollment Penalty when they enroll in a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan. (PDP) The Late Enrollment Penalty amount is added to the enrollees' monthly part "D" premium. The PDP collects the penalty in addition to the premium payment and passes it along to Social Security. The base amount of the Late Enrollment Penalty can change annually. The penalty for 2021 was 33.6 cents X number of months without coverage. Therefore, if one has gone 14 months without creditable coverage, 14 months X 33.6= \$4.70 per month. Therefore, \$4.70 per month would be added to one's prescription drug premium for 2021. Since the penalty amount can change annually, the penalty amount tacked onto one's "D" premium can change over time as well. So, if you do not have creditable coverage from another entity, Don't Delay! Call Mary Moran and Enroll during the 2021 Open Enrollment!

Social Security and the Center for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) also spend the fall sending out important Color-coded notices to LIS (Low Income Subsidy) Beneficiaries. Be sure to keep any and all notices you receive from these government agencies in the event you need more information or wish to appeal denials or decisions regarding Medicare Savings Programs.

By late September, all people who qualify for Extra Help will receive a notice (called a rider) from their current drug plan stating how much help they will get toward the 2021 Part "D" premium, deductible, and copayments. The folks who participate in Extra Help and have been selected for review should have received an "Income and Resources Summary" sheet from Social Security. This must be returned in the postage paid envelope within 30 days to recertify eligibility, or the Extra Help coverage will end as of January 1, so do not dawdle! Return it today! Social Security will begin mailing out notices in November letting people know if they will still qualify for this program in the coming year.

If a beneficiary receives a grey notice in October, stating that they no longer automatically qualify for Extra Help as of the first of the new year, they must re-apply using the application enclosed with the notice. If one receives an orange notice from CMS in October, it will state that an individual still automatically qualifies for extra help, but their copayment levels will change starting January 1, 2021. Blue notices are re-assignment notices. A CMS Blue notice may inform beneficiaries that their current Medicare drug plan is leaving Medicare for the upcoming year so they must choose a new one before December 31. A CMS blue notice may also inform non-choosers (plans are assigned by CMS) that their current plan's premium is above the regionally assigned maximum for LIS assistance, so they must join a new plan, or they will be assigned a new plan. A blue notice will be sent out in December, is entitled "Reassign Formulary Notice", and informs those who were reassigned new plans which of the part "D" drugs they took in 2021 will be covered by the new plan.

Finally, in November CMS will send out a tan notice to Extra Help Beneficiaries who choose their own drug plan. They will be advised that their current plan's premium is changing, and they will have to pay the difference if they do not choose a new \$0 premium plan themselves. This notice should include a list of local plans with \$0 premiums for Full Extra Help recipients. It is best to choose next year's prescription drug plan yourself. For SHIP assistance, Call Mary Moran at the above phone numbers to receive help comparing available plans to best suit your needs for 2022!

The message screams a warning from Microsoft stating that your computer has alerted Microsoft that it has been infected with a virus and spyware. As the noise spikes your blood pressure, the message warns that if you close the page without resolving the issue, access to your computer will be disabled to prevent further damage to the network or your computer. Do not call the number on the screen. Microsoft will never display a phone number on your screen. The phone number is the tipoff that crooks are prowling and



have zeroed in on you! If you call it, these highly professional hackers have learned to continue the con by giving their victim a fake Microsoft employee name, and Microsoft badge number to ease your doubts.

Stealing people's financial information and identity is their profession and they are very good at it. The "Microsoft representative" will ask if you have used your phone in public, like a grocery store, and state that the bad guys have probably hacked into your phone while you used a public wifi system. These swindlers know the habits of cell phone users! To keep you on the phone so you can't check on who they are, they reassure their Pigeon that they are on a "secure line" phone number to protect your phone from the hackers who broke into your computer and are listening in. They will repeat how important it is not to disconnect the call. Then they reassure you that Microsoft can check your system to see if it has been hacked and install another layer of protection

free of charge. That is the hook to get into your computer information.

When this pop-up attacks, turn off your computer immediately and wait a few minutes.

Despite your being concerned about losing information, do not rush to turn it back on again! You must give it at least a few minutes in the shutdown mode, otherwise the message may pop up again if you turn it back on immediately! And seeing it twice could mean it's real, right?! Wait a few minutes, then go to your browsing history to pull up where you left off before the attack. Don't be duped, turn your computer off and shut the bottom feeders down!
