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### **New Perdue Henson JA Center to Benefit Many Students**

In last month's article I promised to follow up with a press release and some photos of the ribbon cutting at Perdue Henson Junior Achievement Center in Salisbury. The ribbon cutting was the culmination of over four years of planning, fundraising, and constructing of a facility that will connect students from Kent County, Maryland to Accomack County, Virginia, and every Maryland county in between.

It will also provide a gathering space for potential future use by businesses and non-profits with state-of-the-art technology.

The following is the official press release.

"Junior Achievement of the Eastern Shore (JAES) officially opened its new facility to over 10,000 students annually on Oct. 26 with the ribbon-cutting ceremony of the Perdue Henson Junior Achievement Center. The

25,000 sq. ft. facility is located in the Oak Ridge Commons in Salisbury at the site of the former Kmart. The \$7.5 million center will house students from nine counties, including Kent, Queen Anne's, Talbot, Caroline, Dorchester, Wicomico, Worcester, Somerset, and Accomack (VA). "The Perdue Henson Junior Achievement Center will change

education throughout the eastern shore," said Jayme Hayes, President of JAES. "We are so thankful to our donors, community partners, board members, educators, students and more for helping us make this dream a reality. The Perdue Henson Junior Achievement Center will be the first of its kind on Maryland's eastern shore, offering JA capstone programs such as JA BizTown and JA Finance Park. Both will allow



students to interact with local businesses to discover how these organizations benefit them as consumers but also show the opportunities that await in their own backyard. Partnering businesses include TidalHealth, Pohanka of Salisbury, Green Street Housing, Chick-fil-A, Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development, Delmarva Power, Choptank Electric, Delaware

Elevator, Coastal Association of Realtors and several more. The Center will house students from the public, private and home-school sector, primarily hosting Grades 5-7, while providing several opportunities for students in other grade levels to attend. Junior Achievement will continue with its in-classroom programming and annual events like JA Inspire and the JA Stock Market Challenge to ensure every student in

JA's impact area continues to receive programming. Primary objectives of the Perdue Henson Junior Achievement Center include increasing graduation rates, providing a better understanding of money management, providing economic growth, showcasing local career opportunities, and increasing students' soft skills.

"Every student in the region will come through this facility," said Hayes. "We're revolutionizing

how our students learn the skills needed to succeed outside the classroom. The Perdue Henson JA Center will create an impact our local economy will feel for years to come." To learn more about the Perdue Henson JA Center, please visit inspiredbyexperiencejaes.org.

Missing from the press release is how significant the commitment is from the

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business community to promote and support the mission of Junior Achievement. The total cost to renovate and build this facility totaled \$ 7.5 million, of which all but \$400,000 has been donated or funded by grants.



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
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## CRCC is Grateful for Generous Community Support







## **Protecting the Tuckahoe**

Tucked into the center of the Eastern Shore between Queen Anne's, Caroline, and Talbot counties, the Tuckahoe Creek watershed is a rural world of winter rye, potato fields, cardinal flowers, massive beech trees, yellow-blooming water lilies, and wild rice nodding above fresh quiet water. Canopies of deciduous trees are across winding back roads. Wild blueberry bushes sprawl between tidal marshes and stands of pine. This is the point on the peninsula where the wide and flat farm fields of the lower shore give way to small hills so gradually, so gently, you may not even notice the slope.

The watershed stretches across 97,900 acres, covering an area about the size of two Washington D.C.'s. More than half of that area is devoted to agriculture, the rest consumed by small towns, forests, wetlands, and the creek itself, which runs over 20 miles from north of Queen Anne to its confluence with the Choptank River at Gilpin Point in Caroline County. If there's one important takeaway for this region, it's that the Tuckahoe is abundant. For fishermen, the Tuckahoe offers one of Maryland's few flyfishing spots with wide openings, steadfast water, and a stony creek bed. For farmers, the watershed offers freshwater irrigation and prime soils that have produced in abundance for centuries upon centuries—from the gardening

of Choptank people who tended squash, beans, and corn, to colonial tobacco production, grain growing, and fruit and vegetable farming for local canneries. Mills, steamboat landings, poultry farms, schooner manufacturing, scenic recreation, and kayak paddling trails, are all signature features of the Tuckahoe, which also supports five unique habitats of rare plants. The watershed is home to deer, waterfowl, songbirds, turtles, 39 species of freshwater fish, 25 species of amphibians, and a host of native plants including "tuckahoe," the Algonquin word for a marsh-loving arrowhead plant whose roots were harvested by the Choptank people for food and for medicine. Tuckahoe Creek is also unique for its ties to local African American history. The famous statesman and abolitionist, Frederick Douglass, was born within the watershed, and Harriet Tubman often used the nearby upper Choptank watershed as a northward route while leading escapees on the Underground Railroad.

As more people move to the Eastern Shore and more industries seek out the Shore's open space, it's easy to see how important it is to conserve places like the Tuckahoe in order to preserve natural and cultural resources and in order to protect water quality by improving natural buffers surrounding the tributary. Luckily, Maryland DNR's Rural Legacy Program, begun in 1997, exists to protect large, contiguous tracts of the state's most precious cultural and natural resource lands through grants made to local applicants. ESLC has been a sponsor for Rural Legacy Areas (RLA) on the Eastern Shore since 2001, and has protected 66 properties covering over 11,000 acres of land utilizing this funding program. The Tuckahoe is one of ESLC's sponsored Rural Legacy areas. In 2019, ESLC worked with DNR and local governments to further expand these RLAs, by almost four times their original footprint, drastically increasing the number of eligible properties in the region.

Thanks to the work of Eastern Shore Land Conservancy, MALPF, and funding from Rural Legacy grants, over 13,000 acres of the Tuckahoe watershed have been permanently conserved each farm, forest, and wetland protected from development forever. While 13,000 acres is a success worth celebrating, there are still over 31,000 acres within DNR's Tuckahoe Rural Legacy area just waiting to be conserved, with ample funding at the ready. This rural legacy area was expanded just a few years ago to encompass 44,543 acres, almost half of the entire watershed. To conserve the full area would be a gigantic win for conservation, for agriculture, for water quality protection, for rare and threatened species, historical preservation, public access to recreation, and so much more.

If you, or someone you know, owns a property of over 30 acres located in the Tuckahoe area, we'd love to speak with you about a conservation easement!

## O Little Town of Bethlehem

(this story originally appeared in the December 1983 Caroline Review)

For a few days of each December the little town of Bethlehem in southern Caroline County becomes a stamp collector's haven.

The postmaster with the Biblical name of Aaron Carroll says he will hand-stamp several thousand Christmas cards prior to the holiday for people who send in cards just to have the special hand-stamp shown on the envelope.

But he admitted early this month that the flood that reached as many as 40,000 in years past has slowed somewhat, "probably because of the cost of the postage," he said.

His biggest customer remains the Tidewater Inn at Easton that will bring over 500 or 600 cards to be mailed out from the tiny post office, a cubicle in the Bethlehem General Store at the crossroads of MD 331 and 578.

Carroll is not the first in his family to keep up the time-honored tradition for the Yule season.

His late mother, with the Christmassy name of Mary Carroll, handled the postal chores from 1946 to 1961. She died in 1969.

In between the two Carrolls, the community's postmaster was Leonard Legates, who did the stamping from 1961 to 1971. He died in 1972.

Carroll started work in the post office as a helper for Legates in 1963, and was named postmaster in 1971.

The practice of hand-stamping an original Christmas scene cachet on the envelope began in 1939 when Marjorie Ann Chambers Lake, daughter of long-time weekly newspaper publisher Max Chambers, in nearby Preston, designed the scene on a rubber stamp about two inches square.

Chambers said his daughter helped spread the name of the little village when she did a short story about the cachet as a teenager, and the Associated Press picked it up and reprinted it on the wire service.

After that, the post office began getting mail from all over the country at Christmas time to be stamped and mailed out with the Bethlehem postmark and cachet.

The first cachet stamp showed three wise men on camels with a star overhead. Today, Carroll still uses that stamp, along with one scene of the stable manger and another of the Madonna's head cradling the Christ child.

Chambers, the unofficial historian of Caroline County, said the town was believed named by one of the first Methodist circuit riders on the Delmarva Peninsula, Francis Asbury. The first Methodist bishop of Maryland, Asbury came through the area about 1800 and visited homes.

He does not have documented evidence, but believes Asbury probably stayed with a family here over Christmas in the late 1700's and decided Bethlehem would be a nice name for a quiet little country village.

There are only 55 general delivery boxes in the little wooden cubbyhole at one side of the general store, recently purchased by Wayne Chance from Judy and James Whitby. It is now known as Bethlehem General Store.

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# Shining a Spotlight on the Bridgetown Area

I have heard some whoppers in my day, but in my five-plus years of setting the local historical record straight via a oneman research mission, this takes the cake: I was informed that the reason the main street of Ridgely is so wide is because it was built to accommodate the shipbuilding industry of the town. I fell off my dinosaur when I heard this, got up, re-saddled my trusty stegosaurus steed, and fell off again when others then shared they "learned" this "fact" while attending the local public schools. I guess someone with an overactive imagination concocted this tale daydreaming while gazing out the classroom window at the banks of the mighty Ridgely River.

Come on, people. There were no sailing ships in Ridgely. There is no river. Heck, most local farmers surrounded by wilted corn and soybeans will readily confirm that most of the time it doesn't even rain in that zip code. Anyone who can eat their weight in strawberries around here should know that Ridgely was a planned community but investors ran out of money well before their dreams of an epicurean Eastern Shore utopia could be realized; Central Avenue through the middle of town is a broad and lasting tribute to the long-faded optimism of the 1860s.

Why am I bringing up Ridgely? This is supposed to be a column about the far northwestern hinterlands of Caroline County. There is an eventual connection I guarantee, and it is not just that some students in the Bridgetown-Baltimore Corner megalopolis attend elementary school in the ironically-nicknamed Dream City. The segue I need to get this article finished revolves around railroads, actually. There are train tracks in Ridgely and have been since its incorporation; there used to be a village on the way to Greensboro where an intersection with Maryland Route 480 is today. It was called Boonsboro, but it lacked railroad access. So dwellers literally picked up structures they had built there and plopped them a few miles west at what was evolving into Victorian-era Ridgely. Score one for the maroon team.

The history of Bridgetown actually wellpredates Ridgely but is not so, ahem, glamorous. If we ignore county lines for a moment, or acknowledge that the top third of Caroline used to be part of Queen Anne's County (a fact that seems to be left out of every formal or public commemoration of Colonel William Richardson as our legislative founder), then we can gloss over the fact that the oldest building in Bridgetown is actually on the Ruthsburg side of the ditch. On that portion of Maryland Route 304 sits the Bridgetown Church. It dates back to at least 1773, with a congregation possibly meeting in the vicinity as early as 1640. Even though it is in QAC, it is still part of the Ridgely Charge, along with Thawley's Chapel near Tuckahoe Neck.

So why the name Bridgetown? Verily verily, I say unto thee, there were bridges. Nine over the creeks and streams that flow into the Tuckahoe River to be exact. Up until 1841, the settlement was known as Nine Bridges as a result -- which is when the one sturdy one you are likely familiar with was placed on the border as you cross into Queen Anne's County, perhaps to attend a Christian service in an historical setting. The aforementioned church was at one point accompanied in the area by a tobacco warehouse, a cannery, a post office, and other commercial enterprises plus a neighborhood school building. So why didn't Nine Bridges aka Bridgetown take off? For precisely the same reason why Ridgely made it as a town: witchcraft. Check that. Actually, in this case, it was not a Faustian pact with the devil in the style of Damn Yankees but an anticipated railroad never came through -- so no boost in population or commerce as was seen by Ridgely in its glory days well over a century ago. They did have a community baseball team, though.... and a rhyme. It is said that the people of Bridgetown:

Chew tobacco thin Spit it on their chin And lick it up again.





I have no clue how that originated, or if it was borrowed from something else, but I remember hearing that all the time growing up and especially at the village store that was still operational well into the 1980s.

I do, however, know how Baltimore Corner got its name. Don't know where that is? It's right down Maryland Route 312 from Bridgetown, as a matter of fact, and it too requires some fallacious Ridgely folklore to transition into a more fact-laden paragraph. About five years ago, several people in a county history group emphatically argued, despite having no skin in the game whatsoever, that the original name for Ridgely was intended to be some derivation of Baltimore. Not so; more 1950s schoolhouse marm fiction I presume. Ridgely was from the start named for local landowner Reverend Greenbury Ridgely, a former law partner of antebellum Congressional icon Henry Clay -- the town was never meant to be known as Baltimore or named after Lord Baltimore in any way, shape, or form. At


best, perhaps those who thought it to be true were recalling that it was the Maryland and Baltimore Land Association that parceled out town lots before the company went quickly bankrupt.

With that said, Baltimore Corner, or the name at least, does have, to an extent, a connection to Baltimore City. Until the Bay Bridge was built, there were two standard ways to get to the Western Shore from Caroline. One was by ferry, such as the service at Matapeake on Kent Island. The other was to go up to Cecil County and around the long way. Interestingly enough, many locals preferred the overland route because of hours-long lines to board the ferry. So eventually, travelers referenced the turn at Maryland Route 312 onto Route 313 as Baltimore Corner to note their progress or reason for taking that road.

There's actually a bit more historical nomenclature to share, which is interesting considering no tangible town, village, or organized settlement has ever existed at that exact crossroads. While there was for a time a country store that Pizza Empire currently occupies and a mottling of generational farms nearby, the population is arguably zero if one applies the bureaucratically statistical definition of Census Designated Place. Yet that spot, despite its humble presence, has been popping up on Caroline County maps since colonial times. The general vicinity was called Forest of Choptank as settlers moved into it to clear property for agriculture. As that work progressed, locals well into the 1800s would have known the corner and adjacent lands as Hogpen Bridge.

I hope that more people will take an interest in this swath of oft-forgotten Caroline County frontier that graces our Queen Anne's County border. Visitors may be surprised at the traces of what used to be there, what is there, and what hidden treasures exist waiting to be uncovered while toddling through. Bridgetown indeed warrants a closer look by the usual local authorities on such matters and recreational day trippers alike.

World AIDS Day was founded in 1988 and was the first-ever International Day for Global Health. It has been observed every year since that time on December 1st.

The day remains as relative today as it has always been, reminding people and governments globally that HIV has not gone away. It is a day to remember those lost to HIV/AIDS, those that continue to fight against HIV, and acknowledge those people who are living with HIV today. While great medical and social advances have been made over the four decades since the first known reported cases of HIV/AIDS, this disease remains a public health challenge. There still remains a critical need for continued funding for the HIV/AIDS response, to increase awareness of HIV and how it affects people's lives, to end stigma and discrimination around HIV, and to improve the quality of life globally for people living with HIV.

In 2023, we know that prompt and consistent HIV treatment and care

improves life expectancy. The Caroline County Health Department offers free, confidential, walk-in Rapid HIV Testing every day that the Health Department is open. The test results are obtained in one minute. It is fast and easy, and only takes a drop of blood to test.

It is important to know your HIV status. Think of it this way:

If you don't know you are HIV positive, you don't receive care and treatment. You don't receive support and services, you can't protect those you love, and you cannot have the best outcome and quality of life.

#### The Connection Between Smoking/Vaping & Stress

It is easy to think that smoking a cigarette or taking a hit on your vape is a good way to calm your nerves

from all of the stress in today's world but did you know smoking and vaping can actually increase the stress inside your body? It is true! Nicotine, found in cigarettes and in many vapes, is an addictive stimulant.

Nicotine narrows blood vessels, making them smaller, which causes your blood pressure and heart rate to go up. In turn, your heart has to work harder to pump blood throughout your body, thus putting more stress on your cardiac system.

Craving nicotine causes stress too. When you smoke or vape, your brain receives a hit of nicotine and that nicotine craving is satisfied for a short amount of time. This can trick you into feeling more relaxed. Those feelings are short lived and as your nicotine levels drop, you start to feel on edge and will likely experience another craving for a cigarette or vape. This process continues to repeat for as long as you keep smoking or vaping. Talk about stress in the brain!

The cost of buying cigarettes and vape products can really add up. Feeding a nicotine addiction is financially expensive. In a world where everything costs more than it used to, figuring out how to pay for it all can be very stressful. Breaking free from a nicotine addiction will allow your hard earned dollars to go to things that really matter to you instead of the deceitful tobacco companies.

It is important to remember there will always be times of stress in our lives whether we choose to smoke, vape, or breathe clean air. Learning to deal with our stressors is very important. Quitting smoking and vaping will decrease the stress nicotine cravings cause, reduce the physical stress



nicotine puts on the body, and free up some extra cash.

However, the process of actually quitting can still be daunting. Having support is key. The Maryland Quitline offers support from trained quit coaches. Often these folks previously used tobacco themselves so they understand and can help you build a quit plan. They work with you right over the phone and can send nicotine replacement products like patches and gum to you in the mail, all at no cost. To learn more or enroll you can contact the Quitline directly at 1-800-QUIT-NOW (1-800-784-8669) or you can contact me at 410-829-0848 (call or text) and I can submit a referral to have a quit coach reach out and contact you.

Last but not least, I wanted to leave you with a few stress reduction tips. Practice deep breathing and gratitude reflections. Take your breaks! Step away from work and stressful situations and take a walk, grab your phone and reach out to a friend or play a game. This still gives you a chance to decompress and, guess what? You can do it all without smoking or vaping!

#### RSV: Risk, Signs & Prevention

RSV is a common respiratory virus that usually causes mild, cold-like

symptoms. Most people recover in a week or two, but RSV can be serious. Infants and older adults are more likely to develop severe RSV and need hospitalization. The virus can also worsen certain medical conditions, including asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), and congestive heart failure.

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The following are the latest recommendations regarding RSV vaccine and prevention:

#### **ADULTS**

Two RSV vaccines have been approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Each vaccine requires a single dose injection.

All adults aged 60 and over should discuss the RSV vaccine with their healthcare provider. This is especially true if you are at increased risk for severe complications from RSV, based on any of the following health conditions; asthma, COPD, congestive heart failure, coronary artery disease, neurologic conditions, diabetes. kidney disorders, liver disorders, bleeding disorders, or a compromised immune system. Other things that may increase your risk are frailty, advanced age, or residency in a nursing home or long-term care setting.

One of the available vaccines has also been approved for pregnant individuals between 32- and 36-weeks gestational age in pregnancy. If you are pregnant, discuss the RSV vaccine with your OB/GYN.

RSV vaccines are available through primary care offices and some pharmacies.

#### **CHILDREN**

RSV is especially dangerous to infants. The CDC recommends certain infants receive the FDA-approved monoclonal antibody product Beyfortus (also called nirsevimab). Beyfortus has been shown to reduce the risk of both RSV-related hospitalizations and RSV-

related healthcare visits in infants by about 80%.

One dose of Beyfortus is recommended for all infants younger than 8 months, born during, or entering, their first RSV season (typically fall through spring). For a small group of children between the ages of 8 and 19 months who are at increased risk of severe RSV disease, such as severely immunocompromised children, a dose is recommended in their second RSV season.

Parents of infants who meet the above criteria should discuss the RSV monoclonal antibody product with their child's pediatrician.

#### **PREVENTION**

You can help prevent the spread of RSV by taking the same precautions used to prevent other respiratory illnesses, like COVID-19:

- Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or your elbow – not your hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick, such as kissing, shaking hands, and sharing cups and eating utensils.
- Stay home if you are sick, but if you have to go out in public, wear a face mask.
- Avoid touching your face, particularly your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- · Clean frequently touched

- surfaces, such as doorknobs and mobile devices.
- Get vaccinated if recommended by your healthcare provider.

If you have an infant, avoid crowds, ask people to wash their hands before touching the baby, and keep the baby away from anyone with cold symptoms.



#### **Know the Key Benefits of Roth IRA**

As you save for retirement, you'll want to take full advantage of the investment vehicles available to you — and one of the best is a Roth IRA. But what sets it apart from other accounts?

Three key factors distinguish the Roth IRA:

- Tax-free earnings When you invest in a Roth IRA, your earnings can grow tax free, provided you don't begin taking withdrawals until you're 59½ and you've had your account at least five years. If you don't meet these criteria, withdrawals of earnings will be subject to taxes and a possible 10% penalty.
- No penalties on withdrawals of contributions You fund a Roth IRA with after-tax dollars, which means you can withdraw your contributions — not the earnings — at any time for any reason, without facing taxes or penalties. So, you could use some of your Roth IRA money for non-retirement purposes, such as helping pay for a child's college education.

However, unlike a traditional IRA, a Roth IRA does have income limits.

A Roth IRA does share one similarity to a traditional IRA: It

For the 2023 tax year, if your modified adjusted gross income was less than \$138,000 (for a single filer) or \$218,000 (married filing jointly), you can put in the full amount of \$6,500 and an additional \$1,000 catch-up contribution if you're 50 or older. The amounts you can contribute will gradually decline at higher income levels and are phased out entirely at \$153,000 for single filers and \$228,000 if you're married and file jointly. These income ranges will likely change for the 2024 tax year, so you'll want to consult with your tax advisor for details.

Still, even if you've contributed to a traditional IRA or a 401(k) for many years, you may have a chance to eventually "convert" some, or all, of these funds to a Roth IRA and gain its benefits. It's not hard to do this conversion — it involves minimal paperwork from your traditional IRA or 401(k) provider — but it does come with tax issues. Any money that's converted from a traditional IRA or 401(k) to a Roth IRA will be treated as ordinary taxable income. This can trigger a large tax bill, so, unless you have the money available from other accounts to pay the taxes, the conversion may or may not make sense for you. But you don't have to convert all the funds at once. By spreading the conversion over several years, you could reduce the effect of a large tax hit in any single year. You may want to consult with your tax advisor before converting any funds to a Roth IRA.

If you can find a way to contribute to a Roth IRA, either directly or through a conversion, consider it carefully — you'll find a lot of upsides to this investment account.

Establishing a donor-advised fund and making qualified charitable distributions are significant moves, so you'll need to consult with your tax advisor first. But if they're appropriate for your situation, they may help you expand your ability to support the charitable groups whose work you admire.

You know you live on the Eastern Shore when Choptank Electric puts out a request to "Please don't shoot the lines "!

I got a chuckle out of this headline but then read the reminder that "shooting at wires, poles, and insulators is dangerous to you and jeopardizes everyone's power." So, here's a friendly reminder to young and old who are bored enough to take pot shots at this equipment to "Please don't shoot the lines"! Instead, let's shout out a big "Thank You" to those hardworking linesmen and lineswomen who brave nasty weather to keep our lights and heat on! Bless you all!

December is the one month that I simply cannot bring myself to address those important dates and numbers associated with next year's Medicare and Social Security programs. For yours truly, it is time to step back in gratitude for friends and family, and

to appreciate the beauty and wonders of living in our special Shore county! Americas patchwork of cultures is well represented in Caroline, so here is a light reprieve from the cold hard facts of life and a glimpse of what the Holiday Season is for us all!

Hanukkah is an eight-day Jewish festival celebrated by lighting a candle on the menorah (a candelabrum with eight lights) each night. This year Hanukkah is celebrated from December 7-15. The word "Hanukkah" means "dedication" in Hebrew. This festival commemorates the rededication of the Second Temple of Jerusalem and the first recorded successful fight for religious freedom. It is also spelled Chanukah. (Wiki.org)

Kwanzaa, a holiday honoring African American culture, is celebrated from December 26-January 1, mainly in the United States. There are seven principles representing seven values of African culture that help build and reinforce community among African Americans. Each day a different principle is discussed, and each day a candle is lit on the kinara (7 light candleholder). On the sixth day of Kwanzaa, people hold a Karamu feast, a celebration that may include music, drumming, discussion of one of the African principles or a chapter in African history, a candlelighting ritual and finally, a feast. (Wiki. org)

Dongzhi celebrates the winter solstice and is observed on the longest night of the year. Winter Solstice is celebrated on December 21, the longest day of the year. The Asian word "Dong" means "winter" while "Zhi" means "arrival" giving the literal meaning of the festival "the coming of winter". (Wiki.0rg)

Winter Solstice coincides with the pagan holiday, Yule, which begins on the winter solstice and continues for 11 days. Many ancient Yule traditions have been incorporated into modern Christmas celebrations, including the familiar yule log. (Wiki.org)

The feast of St. Nicholas is on December 6. It recognizes the Christian bishop who sold off his inheritance to give to those in need, the sick, and the suffering. In remembrance of St. Nicholas's generosity, St. Nicholas Day is marked by giving gifts. It is observed primarily in the Netherlands and Scandinavia, where the tradition of leaving one's boot or sock outside of the bedroom door for treats or coins began. St. Nicholas is known in the Netherlands as Sinterklaas, the word from which Santa Claus derives. (Wiki. org) Gotta Love good Ole Saint Nick!

Christmas is our Christian celebration of the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. Christians around the world celebrate the birth of our savior with religious services, decorations, lights, Christmas trees and gifts.

Latin countries and Hispanic communities in the United States celebrate Las Posadas from December 16-24, Christmas Eve. The word posada translates to "dwelling" or "lodging". The traditions associated with this nineday novena represent the hardships faced by Mary and Joseph while seeking shelter on their journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, as well as their search for a safe place to stay for Mary to give birth to Jesus.

The tradition features a procession of carolers led by a small child dressed as an angel. The head of the procession carries a candle inside a

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paper shade. Two people dress up as Mary and Joseph, and certain houses are designated to be "inns". The actors travel to one house each night for nine nights. (Pilgrims may carry images of the Holy personages instead.) At each house, the residents respond by singing a song and the pair are recognized and allowed to enter.

The group of guests come into the home and kneel around the Nativity scene to pray. (Typically they pray the Rosary, which is a biblically based set of repetitive prayers promoting meditations on the gospel episodes in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus from the Annunciation to the Ascension.) The final location may be a church instead of a home.

Attendants such as angels and shepherds join along the way, while children may carry food, warm drinks, and piñatas and poinsettias. The procession is followed by musicians, with the entire procession singing. At the end of each night, Christmas carols are sung, children break open star-shaped pinatas and everyone sits for a feast. (https://nationaltoday.com/las-posadas)

"And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, 'Fear not:" "for behold, I bring unto you

good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the City of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God, and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." Luke 2: 8-14



Carroll says about 250 people live in the area around the intersection about halfway between Easton nd Federalsburg and four miles south of Harmony.

A search through the History of Caroline County, a book in the library, failed to turn up when the town was actually formed and when it got its Biblical name.

One elderly resident said the area used to be called "Fluharty's Desire," around the time of the Revolutionary War, then it became know as Willis Crossroads, after Col. Arthur John Willis, who owned much of the land. It was still known by that name in 1850.

The county history book noted that in 1865 the town's only schoolhouse, long since closed, was to be turned over to the county and made a part of the state school system.
