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Danny Paisley & Southern Grass on the Second Sunday at **American Legion February 11**



Danny Paisley and the Southern Grass play powerful, unadorned, and intense traditional bluegrass. They reflect a love of the bluegrass genre like no other - a perfect pick for an early Valentine's Day for this second Sunday concert at the American Legion

Hall. Doors open at 12:30. Music begins at 1 p.m. with the house band - the beloved "Kitchen Pickers". The featured performer starts at 2 p.m. Admission is \$15 and is open to the public. Special thanks to concert sponsor, Towers Concrete Products and Bill and Gail Towers.

There is no hybrid or genre-bending Bluegrass music here. Danny Paisley's combination of instrumentation and vocals convey the energy and emotion of classic bluegrass and country music. Danny's lead vocals will captivate your senses, so much so that many prominent musicians, including Alison Krauss, have considered Danny as one of their favorite singers. His voice combines powerful range and soulful blues with a sound like no one else in bluegrass today.

Since Danny's father, Bob Paisley (founder of Southern Grass), passed away in 2004, Danny Paisley and The Southern Grass have made their niche in the bluegrass world, producing consecutive chart-topping albums. The group has been given over 20 Bluegrass Music Award Nominations and won the 2009 IBMA Song of the Year for Don't Throw Mama's Flowers Away. In 2021, Danny Paisley joined an elite group of vocalists to be awarded the IBMA Male Vocalist of the Year for the third time - an achievement bestowed only to five others in Bluegrass music history.

With Danny Paisley on guitar, Southern Grass continues the family tradition by adding Danny's son Ryan on mandolin, the next generation of up-and-coming pickers. Southern Grass continues the rich musical heritage started by Bob Paisley and Ted Lundy with Lundy's sons T.J. (Fiddle) and Bobby (Bass and Vocals). T.J. Lundy is a highly respected fiddler bridging the gap between old-time fiddling and bluegrass music. Bobby Lundy is also a renowned multi-instrumentalist who has gained attention for his unique bass style. Southern Grass includes Dean Phillips on banjo.

The concert is produced by the Eastern Shore Bluegrass Association (ESBA), a not-for-profit association of volunteers committed to promoting and supporting this American music. ESBA is more than 50 years old and the Sunday, February 11 concert is one of nine monthly performances - typically the

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Feds and the Interest Rate

he Federal Reserve is again front and center in determining what direction interest rates will go in 2024. The Fed has made it clear that inflation of 2% is optimal. Some economists have argued that 2% is too low for today's economy and a more realistic number is 2.25-2.50%. Regardless of what anyone thinks it should be, the current Federal Reserve under Jerome Powell is directing monetary policy to reach a 2%, year over year inflation level.

When the inflation number came in for November 2023 showing an anemic .1% increase in year over year inflation, the stock and bond markets responded favorably, and economists quickly concluded that the Fed would reduce rates in 2024 as much as five times.

This set off a small decline in mortgage rates of approximately 1% from 7.25 to 8% range in October to 6.5% to 7% now, depending on loan program, loan term, loan to value and credit scores. Hard to believe that I am getting excited talking about interest rates under 7%. But this has not unlocked an increase in listings or homes available for sale since 82% of homeowners in this country with a mortgage are paying less than 5%, and

the median rate being paid is under 4%. Who wants to sell their home that they are financing at 4% to get a new mortgage and pay 7%?

This lack of inventory of homes for sale has been frustrating for first time buyers not only because there is not much to look at but also because prices just seem to continue to go up. We may be at a point where prices are at least starting to stabilize.

When the real estate market has become constipated due to high rates and low inventory some event has to occur to break it loose. Lower interest rates will be the laxative that will loosen up the market. The \$64,000 question is "when will that happen?"

Many homes on the market are investor owned. Either they are currently a rental, and the owner/investor wants to take their profit, or they are flip houses that are purchased fixed up and resold. Or they are homes where owners have to sell due to relocation or retirement.

Buyers who want to sell their existing home and move up to something bigger have to be sellers first.

It is my totally unscientific opinion that we will not see a significant increase

in homes on the market until we see long-term interest rates get below 6%. Rates in the 5s will be more acceptable to homeowners with 3%-4% mortgages than rates at 6.5% to 7%.

Unfortunately, those who are looking to buy now will need to continue to be patient and diligent. And buyers who are sitting on the sidelines will need to be content that inventory may not get better until later this year.

When the December inflation number came out at 3.4%, suddenly the Fed easing of interest rates was pushed back from January 2024 to March, and that may be a "big fat maybe."

But as disappointing as this revelation is for borrowers on the other side of the ledger it is good news for savers. At least for those who are able to have savings.

The personal savings rate, which is the amount of disposable income American's have each month after they have paid their expenses and taxes, was 6%-6.5% prior to the pandemic. In April of 2020 it skyrocketed to 30% when the pandemic lead to a nationwide shutdown. It remained over 10% until July of 2021 as Americans' bank accounts swelled with "Covid money" and everybody got a check.

It is worth noting that the personal savings rate remained elevated during a period of over 10% while at the same time American families were adjusting to year over year inflation that averaged 7% in 2021 and 6.5% in 2022 from a previous low of 1.4% in 2020.

In August of 2023 it dropped to 3.9% and has dropped lower than this recently. The August number was the most current I could find.

It was during these years of government stimulus that mortgage rates fell to their lowest levels ever. As distressing as the

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pandemic was for the health of all Americans it provided a wonderful opportunity for Americans to improve their financial health. If you owned a home, you refinanced. If you were creditworthy enough with sufficient income you bought a house.

The challenge going forward for Americans in this economy is to adjust their spending to align more with their income, which is obviously a challenge since credit card balances and delinquencies are going up. Consumers are continuing to spend but they are using borrowed money (credit cards) to pay for it. And as credit card balances grow it becomes more of a struggle to make their payments.

Remember my advice, regardless of how hard it may be to keep your head above water at the very least make the monthly minimum payment due. Past due payments on credit cards should be the easiest ding on your credit to avoid. Creditors require such a small monthly payment in relation to the outstanding balance it is foolish to not make at least the minimum payment.

If purchasing a home is in your future, whether in the market now, observing on the sidelines or planning on getting in later this year, the real estate market in 2024 will be challenging at best and nerve wracking at worst.

The uncertainty of which way inflation numbers will go has increased with the December numbers. With the three prior months' numbers coming in line with the Fed's 2% target, the table is being set for a Fed decrease in March. Depending on which prognosticator you listen to, the March cut could be the first of two to four more reductions in 2024.

"Happy Days are here again," or are they?

My philosophy about interest rate trends has been the same for decades, and I have always been 100% correct in my predictions. You can bet on it!

Interest rates will "always" not just "sometimes" do one of three things. They will either go up, stay the same or they may go down. Count on it.

I do seriously feel that the Fed will not increase interest rates this year. They have finished increasing rates to slow the economy and rein in inflation. They will very diligently focus on inflation numbers going forward and focus on not just one month's number but consider the trend. If the trend goes down, they will be more inclined to reduce rates. If the trend is mixed, up one month, down the next I think they will take a wait and see attitude and leave rates as they are.

They will be laser focused on what is happening with the presidential election and not want any of their actions to be considered to advantage one candidate over the other. And as it appears right now, neither of the two most likely

candidates enjoy a greater than 50% popularity rating among all Americans.

We are at the beginning of a presidential election like we have never seen before. An incumbent seeking re-election at the waning years of his life versus a prior incumbent candidate fighting lawsuits from multiple different directions that regardless of their outcome could hinder his ability to effectively govern if he were elected.

Either candidate getting elected President of the United States in 2024 would be a first in US history. One would be the oldest person to ever be elected President. The other would be the first president or former president to be indicted, not once but 91 times in four separate cases.

There is no doubt that 2024 will be a very "interesting" year!





The Birthing Center at UM Shore Regional Health's Shore Medical Center at Easton will provide several classes related to childbirth, parenting, breastfeeding and being a safe sibling throughout 2024. The Birthing Center team also offers ongoing breastfeeding support, as well as certified Safe Sitter courses for adolescent babysitters, led by experienced maternal care nurses and lactation consultants. With the exception of the Safe Sitter course, all classes are offered free of charge.

All classes will be held in-person at UM Shore Medical Center at Easton's Nick Rajacich Health Education Center, as follows:

Understanding Labor - 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. the first Saturday of each month. This course provides information on the signs of labor, stages of labor and labor contractions. Skilled Birthing Center team members discuss options for comfort techniques and pain management, laboring positions, medical procedures, and recovery following delivery.

New Mom, New Baby - 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. on February 10, April 13, June 8, August 10, October 12 and December 14. This course provides an overview of care for mother and child, from the time of delivery to two weeks following delivery (postpartum). Birthing Center team members provide information

about postpartum care, emotions and stress, intimacy and sexuality, returning to work and birth control options. Course participants also learn about newborn care, including feeding, diapering, bathing, circumcision care and infant safety.

Breastfeeding - 9 a.m. to noon on March 9, May 11, July 13, September 14 and November 9. Birthing Center team members discuss tips and techniques for successful breastfeeding, including latch and positioning, and maintaining milk supply. (Please note: UM SRH certified lactation consultants also offer expectant and new mothers with information about the benefits of breastfeeding for mother and baby, along with tips and techniques for successful breastfeeding. 



February is Heart Health Awareness Month

Heart disease remains the leading cause of death for men and women in the USA.

Key Risk Factors for Heart Disease include (account for half of the risk factors):

- High blood pressure
- High cholesterol
- Smoking

Other Risk Factors include:

 Diabetes, obesity, unhealthy diet, physical inactivity, excessive alcohol use.

The CDC has several recommendations to follow in order to help us all achieve good heart health:

Know your numbers! Talk with your doctor about your heart health. Have your blood pressure and cholesterol checked routinely. Have your BMI

(body mass index) measured and your A1C blood test to check for pre-diabetes/diabetes. Take any medications as directed.

The Eastern Shore Area Health Education Center (ESAHEC) is offering The National Diabetes Prevention Program (NDPP). This is a virtual program. Later this winter they will also be able to refer you to an inperson program in your community. Stay tuned! To learn more or to register contact them at 410-221-2600 or esahec.org.

Add exercise to your life. Physical activity can help you maintain a healthy weight and lower your blood pressure, blood cholesterol, and blood sugar levels. For adults, the Surgeon General recommends 2 hours and 30 minutes of moderate-intensity exercise, like brisk walking or bicycling, every week. Children and adolescents should get one hour of physical activity every day. Before starting an exercise program talk with your doctor about exercising. Visit our two state parks (Martinak and Tuckahoe) and join in their Healthy Parks/Healthy People Program.

Develop Healthy Eating Habits-Choose healthy meals and snacks to help prevent heart disease and its complications. Be sure to eat plenty of

fresh fruits and vegetables and fewer processed foods.

- Eating lots of foods high in saturated fat and trans fat may contribute to heart disease.
- Eating foods high in fiber and low in saturated fats, trans fat, and cholesterol can help prevent high cholesterol.
- Limiting salt (sodium) in your diet can also lower your blood pressure.
- Limiting sugar in your diet can lower your blood sugar level to prevent or help control diabetes.
- Do not drink too much alcohol, which can raise your blood pressure. Men should have no more than two drinks per day, and women no more than one drink per day.

Quit tobacco use and Vaping: Smoking and second hand smoke have long been known to be bad for our health. A lot of people who smoke have tried many, many times to quit with little success. The Maryland Quit Line is here to help. They provide free Nicotine Replacement Patches and Counseling at no cost! Call 1-800-QUIT-NOW. The Caroline County Health Department can provide a referral to the Maryland Quit Line to help get you started. For more information about our program, call 410-479-8080.

February is Black History Month

How to reduce cancer incidence and mortality rates for Black women and men?

- For most types of cancer Black men and women have the highest death rate and shortest survival of any racial/ethnic group in the United States.
- Overall, Black men have a higher cancer incidence rate and an even higher cancer death rate than White men. Even more striking, Black women have a lower breast cancer incidence rate than White women, but a higher cancer death rate. Black women are 41% more likely to die from breast cancer than

White women. This is thought to be partially because about one in five Black women with breast cancer have triple-negative breast cancer, more than any other racial/ethnic group.

Cancer screening rates for Black men and women are low across the state of Maryland, regardless of insurance status! How can we work to improve this?

- Get your routine cancer screenings done. Most insurance covers screenings with no copay.
- Check with your Primary Care Provider to find out when you are due.

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- Check with family members to find out about your medical history.

A Chesapeake Bay Resort – Ferry Idea That Failed

Denton and Choptank were to have been two Eastern Shore stops for a steamship line from Chesapeake Beach in Anne Arundel County in the late 1920s, but the ships never sailed.

They were to have been part of a grandiose project to transform the Chesapeake Bay resort into another Newport or Atlantic City around the turn of the century, but it was not to be.

While the bayfront resort south of Annapolis did flourish for a number of years, thanks to a 32-mile-long rail line from Washington, D.C., the automobile ultimately spelled its doom and the proposed excursion steamers from the resort, across the bay and up the Choptank never materialized.

In the late 1800s, Otto Mears, a pioneer Colorado narrow-guage railroad builder, was sold on the idea of erecting a modern-day Monte Carlo and summer resort close to the nation's capital to be served by a rail line.

He raised the money, named it the Chesapeake Beach Railway, and by early 1900 hand constructed the 32- mile line to the resort where a sandy beach and amusement park, complete with overthe-water roller coaster, carousel and other forms of entertainment attracted thousand of vacationers.

But the grand hotels were never built and even though excursion ships from Baltimore brought visitors the same as they did to Tolchester on the Eastern Shore, the resort declined in popularity.

In 1928, the board of directors of the railway named G.F. Detrick, formerly with the Sacramento Northern Railway, as president, and Eugene Fox, of the Western Pacific, as vice-president of the line.

Soon after taking office, the two embarked on an ambitious effort to





put the line in the ferry business.

They talked with many Eastern Shore bankers, industrialists and farmers and concluded that Chesapeake Beach's falling passenger receipts would be offset by promoting car, truck and freight traffic between Washington and the Delmarva Peninsula.

A map printed in a book entitled "The Chesapeake Beach Railway," shows the proposed ferries would sail from Oxford in Talbot County, and up the Choptank River to Cambridge, Secretary, Choptank and as far as Denton.

The development plan called for the purchase of two steel ferryboats that could carry 95 cars on the main deck and 1,800 passengers on the upper, or saloon level. With slips at Chesapeake Beach and Trippe's Bay, some 16 miles apart, it was calculated that the trip across the bay would take an hour and 30 minutes less than the ferry operating between Annapolis and Claiborne.

Since the Claiborne-Annapolis Ferry Company enjoyed a virtual monopoly of trans-Bay traffic, its officials protested the new venture vigorously.

In 1930, the Interstate Commerce Commission approved the application of the Chesapeake Beach Railway for the new ferry service, but the officials of the older ferry company took it to court and the legal ranglings dragged on for two years.

It wasn't until February 18, 1933, the lowest point of the Great Depression, that the ICC finally approved a loan of \$425,000 to the Chesapeake Beach Railway to begin its ferry system.

The award came as an anticlimax.

So much time and money had been spent in the long legal battle with the Claiborne-Annapolis Ferry Company that the final victory was a hollow one. The directors had decided some months earlier that the project could not be financed at any price, however favorable the terms might be.



So the dreams of a second ferry line crossing the Chesapeake Bay and picking up passengers and freight as far up the Choptank as Denton died a-borning.

And on April 15, 1935, the final passenger train out of Chesapeake Beach to Washington slowly made its

way westward as the crew padlocked each of the empty depots along the line.

The story of the relatively short life (35 years) of the Chesapeake Beach Railway is a sadly familiar one in modern railroading.

Adkins Arboretum, Shore Rivers Receive Grant to Educate Homeowner Associations

Adkins Arboretum received a 2023 Chesapeake Bay Trust Outreach grant to partner with ShoreRivers on a "Naturally Better Landscaping" project that strives to educate and empower local homeowner associations to adopt environmentally-friendly landscaping practices. The project was prompted by the passage of Maryland House Bill 322, which prohibits HOA governing bodies from restricting homeowners who employ landscaping techniques that benefit the environment.

By using native plants in conjunction with other environmentally friendly

techniques such as leaving the leaves, reducing turf, and finding alternatives to toxic fertilizers and pesticides, homeowners can help support wildlife and keep our waterways clean. Land, water, and wildlife are inextricably linked, and the choices homeowners make play an important role in safeguarding our environment.

During the initial "Naturally Better Landscaping" project year, Adkins and ShoreRivers have provided field experiences, site visits, and community presentations to Bay Bridge Cove and Chester Harbor HOAs in Queen Anne's County, as well as Back Creek HOA in Talbot County. They have also developed garden concept designs and online and print resources. The project was featured in the Chesapeake Conservation Landscaping Council's "Turning a New Leaf" conference in December.

Queen Anne's County officials have welcomed the "Naturally Better Landscaping" project as a way to raise awareness about best landscaping practices and stormwater management. With their encouragement, Adkins has applied for a second year of funding in hopes of working with three new HOAs in addition to the HOAs currently engaged. Mallard Run HOA in Stevensville has already expressed interest.



How Will Higher Rates Affect You?

As you know, interest rates have risen considerably over the past couple of years. But what does this mean to you, as a consumer and as an investor?

From a consumer's standpoint, it's not hard to see the effects of higher interest rates. If you want to take out a mortgage or refinance an existing one, you'll find that it's considerably more costly, in terms of the interest you'll pay, than it was a few years ago. And the same is true of car loans and credit cards. Paying these debts at higher rates can affect your cash flow, so while rates are high, you may need to make some important decisions about your overall budget and spending plans.

As an investor, though, you may find the effects of higher interest rates to be somewhat more complex. That's because higher rates can have a different impact on different types of investments, such as stocks and bonds.

When considering stocks, be aware that not all market sectors will respond the same way to higher interest rates. For example, the financial sector, which includes banks, insurance compa-

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nies and brokerage firms, may benefit from higher rates. On the other hand, smaller technology companies, which still must invest heavily in their businesses, may not do as well due to rising interest rates making it more expensive for them to borrow. And other sectors will respond differently to higher rates. Keep in mind, though, that there's great variance within sectors and among companies, so when you consider purchasing stocks, evaluate each choice on its merits and make sure it fits within your risk tolerance, time horizon and need for portfolio diversification. When you diversify your investment dollars, you can reduce the risk of market volatility affecting just one type of asset, although diversification by itself can't protect against all losses.

With fixed-income investments, such as bonds, interest rate movements can have significant and direct impacts. When interest rates rise, the value of your current bonds will likely fall because new bonds can pay higher rates. However, you can also buy bonds at the new, higher rates and benefit from bigger interest payments.

Still, there's no guarantee that interest rates will stay elevated – in fact, the Federal Reserve has indicated that it might actually start cutting rates in 2024 – which is why it may be a good idea to build what's known as a "ladder" consisting of short-, intermediate- and long-term bonds. Once you have your ladder in place, you'll have some protection from interest-rate movements. So, if rates were to keep rising, you could reinvest the proceeds of your short-term bonds in the new, higher-paying ones. But if rates level off, or even fall, you'll still benefit from your longer-term bonds, which typically (but not always) pay higher rates than short-term ones.

Of course, if you hold your bonds until maturity, you will continue to get the same interest payments, regardless of where market rates go.

In any case, it's useful to be aware of what's happening with interest rates — the more you know about the factors affecting your investments, the better off you'll be.

It surely seems like we are in thick of sick these days! The trifecta of Covid, RSV, and pneumonia are rampaging through Caroline County along with those lovely stomach bugs that haunted Christmas this year. These lung infections are serious and very contagious, with the coughing lasting 4-6 weeks. For those burning wood stoves or fossil fuels to keep warm, humidifiers help to get some moisture into the air to reduce that cough. And for those tough guys and gals who put off seeing a doctor because they must work, do us all a favor and call the doctor, or get thyself to urgent care, and get some meds to stop the spread! The doctors are slammed and doing the best they can, so don't be surprised if it takes a few days to be seen, but please, make the call! We respect your work ethic but need our coworkers to be considerate of everyone's health!

As we go about our daily lives with this mess it's important to protect ourselves

and the community! We are all familiar with the routine to mask up, be diligent about hand washing, use hand sanitizer in the car and at home, and wipe down those shopping carts! For those that are healthy, getting vaccinated for all three lung infections will reduce and shorten your suffering and keep you out of the hospital...or the morgue!

Reminder to those with February Birthdays! Maryland's Birthday Rule opportunity to reduce the premiums on your Medicare Supplemental Plans starts the day of your birthday and ends exactly 30 days later. It is your annual opportunity to change insurance carriers and plans and agents are not permitted to ask any medical underwriting questions! However, your age will determine your new rate. Call Mary Moran at the above numbers for more information.

SHIP is still waiting for 2024 income limits for eligibility for Extra Help. These income limits are based on the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) which drops every year in February or March. This federally based program is facilitated by Social Security and puts a cap on your Medicare Prescription drug costs. Members will pay a co-pay of \$4.50 for generic drugs and \$11.20 for brand name drugs. With the exception of insulins, it is recommended that these are picked up in 90-day supplies to pay the flat fees of \$4.50 and \$11.20

rather than buying them monthly for the same price!

Know that in 2024 they are prorating your monthly contributions to your monthly premiums with the more expensive plans. Our annual Social Security benefit statement will reflect whatever is being deducted from your check for your share of the drug premiums. If you are enrolled in Extra Help but did not evaluate your options during Open Enrollment, SHIP may be able to help. One of the perks of being in Extra Help is the option to change plans quarterly outside of Open Enrollment! Based on your medication needs there may be a better option for you.

Annual Deductibles are reduced from \$535 to \$109 for those enrolled in Extra Help.

We do know the feds have streamlined this program and eliminated the two tiers of eligibility. Until the FPL is released, eligibility is based on 2023 income limits.

The individual monthly income limit is \$1,843. The individual asset limit is \$17,220 and does not include one's home or vehicle.

A couples monthly income limit is \$2,485. The couples asset limit is \$34,360, not including home or car.

For moderate income Maryland residents, the Senior Prescription Drug Assistance Program (SPDAP) pays up to \$75 per month toward Medicare part "D" monthly premiums. There are no other subsidies tied to this program and it does not reduce one's drug costs. However, the assistance is great for those who find themselves paying high premiums!

The one extra perk is that it allows a change of Medicare prescription "D" drug plan one time per year outside of Open Enrollment. It may come in handy if one's health and medication needs change.

There is no asset test, but couples must apply as individuals, even though your household gross is the base line.


