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#### **Dunkin Denton Moving to New Digs**

#### It's the end of an era for the former McConnell's Fun Food building

DENTON – A new mini shopping center is coming soon to the corner of State Route 404 and Legion Road, while a landmark building will be coming down.

Those who have been challenged navigating the serpentine entrance to the current Dunkin will enter and leave via a "greatly improved" access, said Denton Town Administrator Scott Getchell.

Some lane closures on Legion Road since mid-May have accompanied the project. Choptank Excavating has been grading the building site and parking lots during May.

One notable absence is the round outdoor pavilion that has been a landmark for decades. Choptank Excavating's owner David Blough disassembled the building and will set it up elsewhere, according to reliable sources. Mr. Blough could not be reached for comment.

The pavilion has stood on the property since the Dunkin building was McConnell's Fun Food. The late James McConnell owned the business until he retired in 1987. The restaurant served up old-fashioned "fun food" until Dunkin Donuts came along.

Caroline County Commission Vice President Larry Porter said he "certainly ate a lot of meals there."

A Federalsburg native, McConnell worked there "seven days a week," Porter said. "I don't think the man ever left. He cooked every cheeseburger there was."

The popular hang-out was the first fast-food restaurant in Denton and attracted beach-goers, teens and Little Leaguers before McDonald's and Burger King set up shop on the bypass. Kids nagged their parents to stop so they could picnic and play outside under the pine trees.

County Administrator Katheleen Freeman, who moved to the county in 1999, remembers the playground with its rocking horse and "the scalding metal swing set," she said, laughing.

Porter remembers McConnell selling the business to Carl Thornton, but the original building burned down. The present building was then bought by Zeb Brodie, and Dunkin Donuts and Subway moved in.

The property was purchased in 2023 and slated for a shopping center, which will be situated on just over six acres. It is owned by Nick Nistazos, whose Strato Holdings LLC, is based in Ocean City, Maryland. Nistazos received final site approval by the Denton Planning Commission Oct. 31, 2023.

The new three-unit commercial building will feature a new Dunkin with drive-thru, improved parking, a T-Mobile store and as-yet unassigned space. It will be situated closer to Taco Bell and face Legion Road.

No changes will be made to the existing lane divider on Legion Road, and the entrance and exit will remain the same. Town of Denton Building Code Official Bill Clemens said the traffic pattern around the new building will be "fairly sizeable."

While the corner landscape is changing, the memories will remain, and a popular contemporary hang-out will still serve up fun food topped with sprinkles.

## Choptank Fiber Increases Support for Customers in Need

DENTON, MD – Choptank Fiber, a subsidiary of Choptank Electric Cooperative, has announced it will double the size of its financial support program for broadband fiber customers that qualify.

"Everyone deserves access to the world made available through high quality internet," explains Mike Malandro, Choptank's President & CEO. "Choptank Fiber was created to bring that access to residents on the Eastern Shore. We have increased our support to \$30 per month for those who are income-challenged to make sure they can get service when it becomes available."

The Low-Income Access Program (LIAP) was created when Choptank Fiber launched its service in 2021 to

help many of the same members who need assistance paying their electric bills. In fact, anyone who qualifies for energy assistance automatically receives Choptank's LIAP benefit on their broadband internet bill. Fiber customers not on Choptank's electric lines can also get the discount if they have energy assistance with their electric provider.

The energy assistance programs provide a monthly support payment made directly to the member's bill for individuals and families in financial need. Referrals to the program are often made by Choptank staff when talking to members who need assistance, but the qualification process is administered by the state Department of Housing and Community Development.

Choptank's decision to double the size of the support payment was driven by the loss of federal and state benefits for broadband customers. The federal Affordable Connectively Program (ACP) and the Maryland Emergency Broadband Benefit (MEBB) ended in February due to lack of funding.

"We here at Choptank want to be sure members don't fall through the cracks and lose their vital broadband service," adds Malandro. "It's just what we do as a cooperative."

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### New Rules for Real Estate Agent Commissions

Since the beginning of time, or at least since real estate transactions came to fruition, buyers and sellers have been assisted in the transaction by real estate agents. Sellers in the transaction paid the commissions or fees of both the agent who represented them AND the agent who represented the buyer. This fee usually is 5%-6% of the purchase price and is split equally between each agent, unless otherwise negotiated. In July 2024, this arrangement is going to change.

Under the current system of compensation, sellers are required to consent to pay the buyers agent commission as a condition of having their property listed in a Multiple Listing Service (MLS). The MLS is the central location where real estate agents access information about homes that are on the market, status of pending sales, and a plethora of other information about real estate sales in the local market. In 2023, 88% of all sellers had their home listed in the MLS.

It is widely recognized that the United States has some of the highest real estate transaction costs compared to most other developed countries in the world. This kind of attention has drawn the ire of many consumer groups, courts, and the US Department of Justice. This attention has stimulated these entities to initiate legal action against real estate companies and the National Association of Realtors (NAR).

In response to these legal challenges of the last several years, most real estate brokers have required buyers to sign a disclosure before showing property to them whereby the buyer client was required to acknowledge that they would be "responsible" for payment of a commission, usually 2.5%-3% of the purchase price of a home, to the buyers' agent.

But, because the buyer agent would only be showing properties to potential buyers that were listed in the MLS, (where sellers had agreed to pay the buyers' broker commission) buyers would not have to worry about paying their real estate agent's commission. The real estate agent could truthfully disclose at the time that the buyers signed the agency agreement that although they are technically responsible for payment of their agent's commission, any contract they enter into will "require" the seller to pay the buyer commission. The

sellers agreed to this as a condition of listing the home in the MLS.

A class action lawsuit in Missouri in October 2023 against NAR brought the entire real estate industry to a point of radical change. The judge found that the current practice requiring sellers to pay the buyers' agent as a condition of including the property in a MLS violated anti-trust laws, discourages competition, and locks in higher commissions and costs to consumers.

To settle this lawsuit, NAR agreed to pay \$418 million in damages and eliminate the rule that requires sellers to agree to pay buyers' commissions to be included in an MLS. Sellers will be prohibited from paying buyer agent commissions unless otherwise negotiated in a contract of sale.

Buyers of real estate will be required to enter into an agreement with their agent whereby they agree to pay a fee to their agent/broker. This fee can be a percentage of the purchase price of a home, as it is now, or it can be a flat fee or an hourly rate. Regardless of how a buyer agent/broker elects to be compensated, they will be required to list what services they will provide for the fee that they will receive.

The real estate industry, and many others, have expressed concern that putting buyers in a position where they must pay for their agents services will put many buyers, especially first-time buyers, at a distinct disadvantage. It is hard enough for first time home buyers to accumulate the financial resources necessary to purchase a home without having the burden of paying their agent too.

Many first-time buyers will be forced to ask the seller to provide them a seller credit to offset the cost. This

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could put them at a competitive disadvantage in that their offer may not look as good as the offer of a potential buyer who is not asking for a seller for credit.

I must clarify that although sellers are prohibited from paying the buyer agent commission or fee, whatever it may be, they are not prohibited from providing a seller "credit" to the buyer for a specific dollar amount at closing. This seller credit is not applied against any single item or expense but is a credit against the total costs of the buyer.

As I write this in mid May, real estate brokers and agents are trying to figure out next steps. Most are concentrating on is establishing, reviewing, and updating their "value proposition" for their customers. Real estate agents will have to itemize and enumerate all the services they are providing. Some agents may allow consumers to pick and choose what services they are willing to pay for.

Competition for listings will get more intense as brokers and agents will do everything possible to differentiate themselves from other brokerages in how they market properties. Although the cost of selling a home will be less than the 5%-6% currently being charged, real estate agents will have to justify the fee they are charging for the level of service they are providing. The MLS may not be the only outlet for marketing your property.

All this is occurring at a time where websites like Zillow, Redfin and Realtor.com have made it much easier for buyers to get information about homes for sale. The role of the buyer agent has changed over the last 10 years, and it will be critical for agents who work with buyers to define their value proposition and enumerate all the services they will provide for buyers. If they don't, buyers will reach out to listing agents directly, which in turn will put listing agents in position of having to refer them to another agent because in Maryland real estate

agents cannot work for buyers and sellers in the same transaction.

It has been estimated that 30% of real estate agents will leave the business. The slow market due to limited inventory and high interest rates has been the root cause of a decline in the number of real estate agents. Changes in how realtors are paid will accelerate the decline.

Now more than ever, buyers of real estate will have to do everything they can to make their offer look the best. Not asking sellers for closing cost help, or if you do, asking for the least amount possible will be a plus. Being a cash buyer who can go to settlement in 30 days will be the best.

This does not mean that if you are not able to pay cash (only approximately 30% of real estate transactions are cash) you are stuck. There is something I can do to make your offer operate like a cash offer.

If you need financing to purchase a home your offer will be more solid if you are already approved for your loan before you contract is written. By providing information for a mortgage application and required supporting documentation, we can underwrite your loan and get loan approval for a specific dollar amount. We provide an actual loan approval, not a loan pre-approval, with the only conditions being a satisfactory appraisal and title work. A loan approval is much more acceptable to a listing agent and a seller. Especially when it comes from a local lender opposed to a preapproval from an internet or out of the area lender.

The next three to six months will be the most challenging for anyone involved in the sale of real estate, especially residential real estate. Buyers will be confused and frustrated with what is happening. Sellers will be pleased to find the 5%-6% they were expecting pay will be lower and they will receive more net proceeds. Real estate agents and brokers will have to adjust to a new normal in their business. A new normal at this point looks more like chaos.

### Avoid These Estate Planning Mistakes

& Tobacco Use

The behavioral health population includes individuals at risk for or living with mental, behavioral, and/or substance use disorders. This particular population has higher smoking rates than the general public and disproportionate tobacco-related health disparities. Individuals in this population tend to have less access to tobacco treatment and are underrepresented in treatment trials.

People with behavioral health conditions have been exploited

by the tobacco industry for years. Tobacco companies used to donate free cigarettes to psychiatric facilities. They lobbied for psychiatric facilities to be excluded in the Joint Commission 1993 ban on smoking in hospitals. They funded misleading research. They marketed the idea that nicotine is helpful for emotional issues.

These predatory marketing strategies contribute to the high rate of smoking among the behavioral health population today. Adults with mental illness or substance use disorders account for 40% of all cigarettes smoked. People with behavioral health disorders are dying from smoking related causes.

## Tips, Classes and Programs to help you live healthier!

Individuals with chronic mental illness die on average 5-25 years earlier than the general population. Smoking related illnesses such as cardiovascular disease, lung disease, and diabetes are the top causes of death. Tobacco use contributes to more than three times as many deaths as alcohol and illicit drugs.

There are a lot of myths surrounding smoking and the behavioral health population. Let's dispute them:

Myth: People with mental illnesses and/or substance abuse disorders are not interested in stopping smoking.

Truth: The truth is most people, including those with mental illnesses and addictions know the

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dangers and many want to stop smoking. Over 80% have made at least one attempt to stop in their lifetime.

Myth: People with mental illnesses and substance abuse
disorders cannot stop smoking.
Truth: Clinical trials show
otherwise. People with mental
illnesses and substance abuse
disorders can stop smoking
when provided the means and
support to do so. Helpful strategies are similar to the general
population including - having
social support from friends or
family, direction and support
from a doctor, use of nicotine
replacement medications, and

getting advice from a friend that has already stopped smoking. Myth: People with mental illness need to smoke to manage their illness or self-medicate.

Truth: When someone is addicted to nicotine and they smoke,

the withdrawal process stops for a short time. This "quiets the cravings" for a few moments, providing a false sense of stress relief. Smoking relieves withdrawal symptoms. Smoking maintains a nicotine addiction.



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

Myth: Stopping smoking will threaten recovery for people in treatment for substance abuse. Truth: Studies show when individuals stop smoking there are actually improvements in mental illness symptoms and positive progress towards addiction recovery. Smoking is a trigger for substance use. For example, when someone stops drinking and smoking at the same time they have a 25% greater chance of long-term abstinence from alcohol and illicit drugs!

Stopping smoking is possible for everyone. It's important to be aware of resources that can help people stop smoking. Having support can really go a long way. Go with your friend or family member to their next doctors and talk about options to help them stop smoking. Promote the Maryland Quitline, 1-800-QUIT-NOW. It is a no cost, phone-based program available designed to help anyone 13 and older to stop smoking. The person is paired up with a "quit coach", often someone who previously smoked, to build an individualized plan. Nicotine replacement medications, like patches and gum may also be sent in the mail to qualifying individuals for free.



# PROTECT YOUR KIDS. SAVE A LIFE WITH SAFE STORAGE & DISPOSAL.



As we extend warm wishes for a happy retirement to the Warfields, Senior Moments would like to welcome our new publisher and owner, Debbie Bowden, to the *Caroline Review*. Our county has come to rely on the wealth of information found in this magazine, and we look forward to many more years of excellence under her guidance.

Since SHIP has been getting some calls from readers, I am sharing an update about State retiree prescription drug coverage ending at the end of this year. According to a letter issued by the Department of Budget and Management on January 15, 2024, state retirees will no longer have prescription drug coverage as part of their retirement benefits as of January 1, 2025. Much of the following state information is quoted from the letter State Retirees are receiving and from the website https://: dbm.maryland.gov.

Active workers' and retirees' health

care coverage, as well as their current Medicare A & B coverage, will NOT be affected by this change. Only prescription drug coverage is affected. If you were hired by the State before July 1, 2011, and retired from the State on or before January 1, 2020, you will receive funding from the State to pay for the cost of prescriptions. They will set up a Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) in your name and will contribute tax-free money to help pay for your medications. You will be notified if you qualify for the HRA.

All retirees are now eligible for prescription drug coverage through Medicare Part D. Retirees must enroll during Open Enrollment which is October 15- December 7th. The state is working on contracting with a company to provide one-on-one counseling to assist with the process of enrolling in a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan. They indicate more information should be available in July. Of course, your Caroline County SHIP will be available to assist you with enrollment as well! Stay tuned for more information from Mary Moran as the summer progresses.

There are three plans, referred to as the Maryland State Retiree Prescription Drug Coverage Programs. To be eligible, your last day of work before retiring must have been on December 31, 2019, or earlier. Note that one must also be enrolled in a Medicare Prescription Part D Drug Plan Before enrolling in any of these three programs.

- 1. The Maryland State Retiree Prescription Drug Program will provide reimbursement for out-ofpocket costs of more than \$1500 annually for an individual and \$2000. out-of-pocket costs for a family.
- 2. The Maryland State Retiree Catastrophic Prescription Drug Assistance Program is designed to reimburse for out-of-pocket costs after one reaches the catastrophic coverage phase of Medicare D.
- 3. The Maryland State Retiree
  Life Sustaining Prescription Drug
  Assistance Program reimburses
  out-of-pocket costs for a lifesustaining drug that IS covered
  under the current State Prescription
  Drug Benefit plan but is Not covered
  by Medicare. "A list of those lifesustaining drugs will be made available
  at a later time." And "there may be a
  maximum reimbursement amount
  if a retiree qualifies for a partial
  State health insurance subsidy."

The information provided here is not all-inclusive, and there are other details regarding eligibility for each program. 

Somewhere Mr. Nostalgia has a cassette tape that includes a request he called in at about 3:00 am one morning. Yes, the middle of the night, and I called and talked live to famous DJ Troy Hill who was sitting in downtown Federalsburg and quick to get Mac Davis on for me. Back then you could walk into the *News & Farmer* office in Preston or the *Times-Record* in Denton. Local folks reporting local stories, and we took it all for granted.

It's now 2024 and the Preston paper is long dead; the radio stations and *Times-Record* still exist, more or less, but are owned and produced from far away.

Another child of the 80's? The *Caroline Review*. A few weeks ago, I stumbled upon some issues from around 1984; much had changed, but just as much was the same. As I leafed through the pages something that stood out was the advertisements: there were many more than compared to now. The reason: most of those locally owned businesses are known only to history. A controversial message to my readers: it only works if you support local businesses. Walmart, Starbucks, Aldi's, Royal Farms, AutoZone, McDonald's, and many more...they don't support your *Caroline Review*. That doesn't make them bad, of course. But, how about supporting those who DO bring you the last of the local media here in our county? If you look around you'll be amazed at what you can find without

walking into a "big box." You can start by browsing the pages of this month's *Caroline Review*.

My challenge to each of you is to buy something from at least one of these advertisers this month. If you do that, well, I'll stay off your back...and write about something else next month! Oh, and don't forget, when making that purchase, to tell them who sent you!
