Hilham Woman Wanted

A local woman is wanted for her involvement in a double homicide that took place last Sunday in Tompkinsville, Ky.

Kayla Spivey, 28 of the Hilham community, has an active arrest warrant for two counts of complicity to commit murder.

Edward Whiteledge, 29 of Bakersfield, Calif., has an active arrest warrant for two counts of murder.

According to Kentucky State Police reports, officers responded to a residence on White Oak Ridge Road in the Fountain Run Community in reference to two deceased males being located

inside the residence with apparent gunshot wounds to the head.

The victims are Trevor Cleary, 20 of Tompkinsville, Ky., and Austin Copas, 19 of Fountain Run, Ky.

This has become a multi-state investigation involving authorities in Kentucky and Tennessee.

The motive is still unclear at this time, however Kentucky authorities report that the killing was “execution-style.”

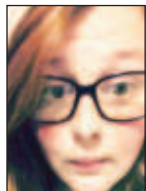
Law enforcement agencies in Overton County and the surrounding areas are on high-alert.

Livingston Police Chief Greg Etheredge and Overton County Sheriff John Garrett informed that searches have been taking place in the local communities and at this time, they do not appear to be in the area; however, citizens are asked to be on alert.

The suspects were last seen driving a black 2009 Nissan Altima with Tennessee license plate DP68781.

Garrett said it was concerning that local officials were not informed about the matter until Thursday, Sept. 24. Since then, they have been trying to play catch-up in search efforts.

The Kentucky State Police and local authorities are asking for the public’s assistance in locating the individuals; however, they are considered armed and dangerous. The public is urged to inform local law enforcement agencies if the suspects are seen but to do so with discretion. Do not attempt to approach or apprehend the individuals.

Woman Pleads Guilty In Multi-County Pursuit

A woman who was arrested in Overton County on June 26 after a high-speed pursuit that started in Clay County has pleaded guilty and received probation.

Jamilia King, 43 of Michigan, was arrested after a multi-county pursuit that resulted in the charges of reckless endangerment, aggravated assault, resisting arrest and evading arrest.

According to the Clay County Sheriff’s Department, a deputy on Highway 52 clocked King at 94 mph. As King entered Overton County, Clay County asked for assistance. Overton County Sheriff’s Department (OCS) deputies, followed by members of the Livingston Police Department (LPD,) met King near the Celina Highway

and Andrew Cove Road intersection, with LPD taking the lead of the pursuit through the city limits.

According to the OCSD narrative, King had exceeded 100 mph through Livingston. As the pursuit left the city, OCSD took over the pursuit and attempted to box in King’s vehicle, but she swerved and hit a deputy’s vehicle. Then a second attempt to box off the vehicle was made, and King drove across the median into oncoming traffic—nearly colliding head on into several oncoming vehicles before losing control and crossing back into the median and rolling over.

The narrative states that the arresting officer tried to plead with her to exit the vehicle because of the risk of fire and King began searching for something in her vehicle

and did not abide by the request to show her hands. The officer then deployed his taser, until he observed what she had been reaching for was her phone.

According to the narrative, it took two officers to place her into handcuffs. After being detained, she refused to provide information to EMS personnel and was taken to Livingston Regional Hospital for medical evaluation prior to being booked at the Overton County Justice Center.

King pleaded guilty to one count of felony reckless endangerment, one count of aggravated assault and one count of felony evading arrest. With the guilty plea, five years to serve were all suspended to supervised probation.

Information concerning a case resolution in Clay County has not been made available at this time.

TDOE Releases Newly Designed State Report Card

The Tennessee Department of Education released the newly designed 2019-20 State Report Card, an annual online report that provides access to important data and information about each school and district in Tennessee.

The purpose of the State Report Card is to provide stakeholders with information about how schools and districts are performing and meeting the needs of students. To view the state report card, visit the State Report Card website.

Due to COVID-19 school closures and the United States Department of Education and the Tennessee General Assembly waiving the federal and

state assessment and accountability requirements for the 2019-20 school year, school letter grades and rankings, assessment data, and additional partially collected data are not included in the 2019-20 Report Card.

“While we know the coronavirus has limited the data available to highlight on this year’s report, we hope this data will be useful for Tennessee families, educators, community members, and public officials with information about schools and districts as they work to provide a high-quality education for all our students,” said Commissioner Penny Schwinn. “The department is excited to unveil exciting new im-

provements and features included in this year’s State Report Card, which will enhance the user experience and make this tool more accessible for years to come.”

As a result of limited data availability due to COVID-19, there are no comparison features on the State Report Card this year. Later this fall, the State Report card will be updated with previous years’ academic data. Currently, users can access this data on the Data Downloads webpage under the heading “Report Card Data.”

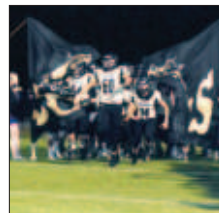

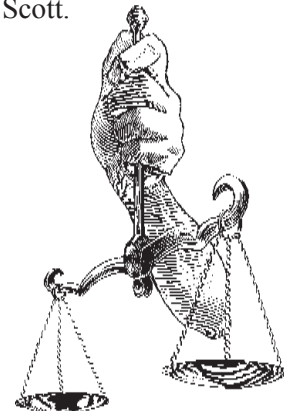

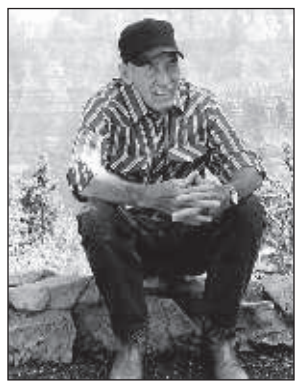

TDMHSAS Expands Mental Health Services

The Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services is expanding its School-Based Behavioral Health Liaison program to all 95 counties in the state. Governor Bill Lee budgeted and the Tennessee General Assembly appropriated an increase of \$3 million for the current fiscal year to expand the program.

School Based Behavioral Health Liaisons provide face-to-face consultation with classroom teachers who enhance learning environments for children who have or are at-risk for Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED), behavior problems or substance use disorders. Liaisons also provide training and education for classroom teachers and serve as a link between schools and families.

Liaisons currently serve elementary, middle and high schools in 36 Tennessee counties. In state fiscal year 2020 which ended June 30, liaisons served about 7,500 children and youth and 2,500 teachers. Liaisons held more than 11,000 individual counseling sessions and 7,300 individual consultations.

“With the COVID-19 pandemic affecting so many facets of life, there has never been a time of greater focus on the mental health of our children, youth and young adults. It is both fortunate and fortuitous that Governor Lee and the General Assembly budgeted the funding to expand this much-needed service,” said TDMHSAS Commissioner Marie Williams, LCSW.

The school-based nature of the service meant the current liaisons had to adapt quickly to changes

brought on by COVID-19. Liaisons pulled together community resources to support their students’ immediate needs in addition to their mental health needs.

With the new school year underway, liaisons have adapted to continue to provide their core services in the new environment using various forms of technology, and they have been holding small group trainings and meetings where possible and safe.

The expansion of the School Based Behavioral Health Liaison program comes as the department and its community mental health providers are expanding the Behavioral Health Safety Net (BHSN) to children and youth ages 3-17. The BHSN provides essential mental health services to uninsured or under-insured Tennesseans.

Dig Into A Sweet Dish

Casserole
3 large eggs
1 1/2 cups heavy cream
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon ground

cinnamon
9 honey buns (preferably Little Debbie brand)

1/2 butterscotch chips
1 cup Peanut Butter-Whiskey Sauce (see below)

Peanut Butter-Whiskey Sauce
1/2 cup heavy cream
1/3 cup creamy peanut butter

3 tablespoons high-alcohol bourbon, such as Noah’s Mill or Old Rip Van Winkle 10-year

1. Preheat the oven to 325 F. Generously butter a 2-quart baking dish.

2. In a very large bowl, whisk the eggs until frothy. Whisk in the cream, salt, and cinnamon to combine. Break the honey buns into 1-inch pieces and add to the egg mixture. Add the butterscotch chips and stir gently to combine.

Pour the honey bun mixture into the baking dish and bake until puffed, golden and bubbly, 40 to 45 minutes. The custard will be set around the edges and the center will be a little jiggly. Remove and let rest on a rack for 15 minutes before serving.

3. To make the sauce: Heat the cream in a small heavy pot over medium heat until it starts to simmer. Whisk in the peanut butter until well blended and smooth. The peanut butter is too fatty to melt on its own; the cream stabilizes it so it won’t separate or seize. Slowly whisk in the bourbon.

4. Serve the bread pudding with the peanut butter-whiskey sauce. You could serve it without the sauce, but if you’re going to splurge, splurge.

The Risk Factors For Breast Cancer

No two women are the same. But when it comes to breast cancer, women from all walks of life share various risk factors for a disease that the World Health Organization indicates is the most frequent cancer among women.

Risk factors are anything that affects the likelihood that individuals will get a certain disease. In regard to breast cancer, the American Breast Cancer Foundation notes that various factors, some that result from lifestyle choices and others that are not changeable, can increase a woman's risk of developing breast cancer. Recognizing these risk factors can help women make any necessary changes and even highlight the importance of routine cancer screenings that can detect the presence of the disease in its earliest, most treatable stages.

Lifestyle-related risk factors

The ABCF notes that certain habits or behaviors can increase a woman's risk for breast cancer. But the good news is that women who understand the link between certain habits or behaviors and breast cancer can avoid those behaviors to decrease their risk of developing the disease. According to Breastcan-

cer.org, the following are some habits, behaviors or lifestyle choices that can increase a woman's risk for breast cancer.

Alcohol consumption: Breastcancer.org notes that researchers have uncovered links between the consumption of alcoholic beverages and hormone-receptor-positive breast cancer. One study found that women who consume three alcoholic beverages per week have a 15 percent higher risk of developing breast cancer than women who don't drink at all. And while research into the connection is limited, a 2009 study found a link between alcohol consumption and breast cancer recurrence.

Sedentary lifestyle: Exercise consumes and controls blood sugar and limits blood levels of insulin growth factor. That's an important connection, as insulin growth factor can affect

how breast cells grow and behave. A sedentary lifestyle also can increase a woman's risk of being obese, which the ABCF notes is a risk factor for breast cancer among postmenopausal women.

Smoking: Smoking has long been linked to cancer, and Breastcancer.org notes that smoking has been linked to a higher risk of breast cancer in younger, premenopausal women.

Unchangeable risk factors

Unfortunately, many risk factors for breast cancer are beyond women's control. For example, the ABCF notes that roughly two out of three invasive breast cancers occur in women age 55 and older.

Women cannot change their ages, but recognizing the link between age and breast cancer risk is important, as such a recognition may compel more women 55 and older to prioritize cancer

screening.

Gender and family history are two additional unchangeable risk factors for breast cancer. Women are much more likely to get breast cancer than men. In addition,

Breastcancer.org notes that between 5% and 10% of breast cancers are believed to be caused by abnormal genes that are passed from parent to child.

Women are not help-

less in the fight against breast cancer. Knowledge of breast cancer, including its various risk factors, is a great weapon against it as women look to reduce their risk of developing the disease.

The Clay County Bulldogs picked up a big win over rival Westmoreland on Friday when they defeated the Eagles 27-22 after an exciting fourth quarter.

The Bulldogs earned the win on their homecoming night and advanced their season record to 4-2.

The game would be an exciting back and forth battle that would leave the teams trading leads all the way until the final seconds of the contest.

The Bulldogs would begin the game with the ball and were beginning to move it down field

when quarterback Keaton Arms was intercepted by the Eagle defense.

The Clay County defense would stand their ground on their opening drive, forcing the Eagles to turn the ball over on downs.

The Bulldogs would once again show flashes of success on the offensive end of the ball before once again turning the ball over to the Westmoreland defense.

Clay County fumbled the ball and Westmoreland recovered it, leaving the Bulldog offense with back-to-back turnovers on their opening drives.

Westmoreland would find themselves inside the Bulldogs five-yard line

only to be shut down by the Clay County defense.

The Eagles lined up in field goal formation from four yards out, but instead attempted a fake field goal, which was shut down by the Bulldog defense.

The Bulldogs, plagued by bad field position, were forced to punt the ball once again.

Westmoreland picks up a series of nice gains on the ground lead by their quarterback that would put them back in their red zone on the Bulldog 11-yard line.

Soon after, Bulldog playmaker Brison Burchett intercepted the Westmoreland quarterback, saving Clay County from a potential Eagle touchdown.

The teams would trade punts a few more times as time began to fade away in the first half.

The Bulldogs would find themselves with the ball with about a minute remaining in the half. Two nice runs by Arms, a big pass from Arms to Wide Receiver Jacob Burnette and a powerful run by Running Back Carson Sharp led the Bulldogs to the Eagle one-yard line.

Arms would punch it in for a touchdown with

less than 30 seconds remaining before halftime and the Bulldogs would find themselves up 7-0 at the half after a successful PAT from kicker Levi Garrett.

Westmoreland would answer with a touchdown of their own about midway through the third quarter.

They too would hit the PAT and the score would even back out at 7-7.

The teams would trade punts back and forth until the beginning of the fourth quarter when Clay began to march down the

field.

A combination of powerful runs by Arms and Running Back Joseph Marcom lead the Bulldogs into their own red zone where Marcom would make his way into the end zone after an 11-yard run.

Garrett's kick was not good, leaving the Bulldogs up 13-7 with 9:15 remaining in the game.

Westmoreland would take some time off the clock moving the ball down field before punching it in for a touchdown of their own with 5:35 remaining in the contest.

The Eagles were successful on their PAT giving them a 14-13 lead over the Bulldogs late in the game.

Arms and Marcom would once again lead the Bulldogs down field with a series of hard-nosed carries. Marcom brought it down to the one yard line where it was once again punched in by Arms for a Bulldog touchdown.

Clay would attempt a two-point conversion but would be unsuccessful, putting the up 19-14 with 1:11 remaining in the contest.

Westmoreland would return the following

kickoff all the way down to the Bulldog four-yard line where they would quickly score on a short handoff up the middle.

The Eagles would also find their way into the end zone on their two-point conversion attempt leaving the Bulldogs trailing 22-19 with 54 seconds remaining in the game.

The bulldog kickoff return team made their way onto the field trailing with less than a minute to play. Bulldog return man Jimmy Burchett would field the ball and return it all the way back for a Bulldog touchdown to take the lead once again.

Arms would cross the plain for the two-point conversion attempt and the Bulldogs would go up 27-22 with 41 seconds remaining.

The Eagles got the ball back without any timeouts and were unable to score before the clock expired, leaving the Bulldogs with the 27-22 homecoming victory.

The Bulldogs will take the field again on Friday when they travel to region-rival Pickett County. Clay County will be hoping to bring this momentum into next week, when the game kicks off at 7 p.m.

Unemployment Down In Nearly Every County

Newly released data from the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development highlighted an improving economy with lower unemployment in nearly every county across the state in August.

Unemployment rates decreased in 94 of Tennessee's 95 counties during the month. Benton was the only county with a slight increase of 0.1 of a percentage point in its month-to-month comparison.

Moore County had the state's lowest unemployment rate in August. At 5.1%, unemployment in the county dropped by 1.3 percentage points when compared to the previous month's revised rate of 6.4%.

Pickett and Williamson counties had the next lowest rates in the state. Pickett County's rate went down 1.1 percentage points to 5.2%. Williamson County's revised July rate of 6.5% dropped to 5.3% in August.

Following closely behind, Overton County had an unemployment rate of 5.5%, a 1.2% decrease from the previous month.

Clay County's unemployment rate dropped 2.1%, bringing the rate to 7%.

Jackson County's rate is at 7.8%, a 1.9% decrease from the previous month.

Shelby County experienced the state's highest unemployment in August. The county's new rate of 13.4% is down 1.4 per-

centage points from its revised July rate.

At 11.4%, Haywood County had the second-highest unemployment rate for the month. That represents a 1.6 percentage point decrease from the previous month. Davidson County recorded the third-highest unemployment rate in August. Its new rate is 10.4%, down 1.9 percentage points from the county's July statistic.

Each of the state's largest cities experienced lower unemployment in August. Memphis dropped 1.4 percentage points from its revised July rate of 17.4%. Nashville's rate is now 10.4%, down 1.9 percentage points. Knoxville's August rate of 8.1% is 1.5

percentage points lower than its July rate.

A complete analysis of Tennessee's August 2020 county unemployment data is available online.

The statewide seasonally adjusted jobless rate in August dropped to 8.5%, down 1.2 percentage points from July's revised rate of 9.7%.

Nationally, seasonally adjusted unemployment also decreased in August. At 8.4%, the United States unemployment rate fell 1.8 percentage points from the revised July rate of 10.2%.

Businesses across Tennessee are ready to help the state's economy rebound by reemploying out of work individuals. Jobs4TN.gov, Tennessee's workforce develop-

ment website, currently has 219,000 open positions for all job skill levels.

Jobs4TN.gov also offers online assistance with writing a resume that will catch the attention of employers, advice on how to engage and impress during job interviews, and details about potential job training opportunities.

There are more than 80 American Job Centers across Tennessee that are open for business

and offering job seekers one-on-one personalized assistance. Career specialists are ready to work with individuals to devise a reemployment plan that will help them rejoin the state's workforce.

All the assistance is free to anyone who needs help finding a new job or career path.

The state of Tennessee will release the unemployment rate for September Thursday, Oct. 15 at 1:30 p.m.

Graduation Rate, which includes whether students are graduating from high school on time. The data for the 2019 cohort is available on the 2020 Report Card.

Ready Graduate, which includes whether students are prepared for postsecondary education or career paths after they leave high school. This information is lagged, so data from the 2019 cohort is available on the 2020 Report Card.

According to the data provided, Clay County has a graduation rate of 97.8% and a Ready Graduate rate of 59.1%.

2019-20 enrollment information and basic school information are also included in the 2019-20 State Report Card. For additional information on what data and information is available in this year's State Report Card, visit the TDOE website.
