Mrs. Chester County: Grounded in faith, Hutcherson looks to future

"I don't feel worthy at all," said Sherry Hutcherson upon hearing she has been named "Mrs. Chester County" in the Chester County Independent Reader's Choice awards. While Hutcherson challenges her inclusion among those who would qualify for the title, she says she is humbled by the nominations and feels honored. "Thank you to those that thought enough of me to vote," she said. "It's something I never expected."

Hutcherson is a true native of Chester County. Born in their Montezuma home, the daughter of Buel and Betty Ruth Maness, sister to Dennis. Growing up in Chester County, Hutcherson attended school at Jacks Creek Christian School and was Salutatorian for her small graduating class of four.

As one chapter concluded, the next had already begun. A cute boy she had seen in Chow Wagon one afternoon became her husband the December before she graduated. Forty years later, she and Barry are still together. She stated that it was the second most important decision she has made for her life. "I feel like I made a really good choice when I chose my life partner," she said. "Other than your salvation - choosing to follow Christ the next thing would be who you choose to share your life with...and fortunately, I made a good choice." While opposites in many ways, Hutcherson says she and her husband share the same moral compass and align on the big things.

The two have carried different roles over the years. Barry has been a plumber, electri-

cian and cook and has been Chester County Mayor since 2018; she has held a variety of roles, and rolls - quite literally. In addition to her greatest accomplishments of being a wife and mother, Hutcherson began her working career babysitting her Aunt Joan's children, Michael and Angie. She worked briefly at Chester County Sportswear and then began waiting tables at Catfish Galley. She enjoyed working in the food service industry, commenting on the change of pace, the variety of tasks and people in any given shift. She credits her table philosophy to advice from a Western Sizzlin' manager, to go above and beyond, providing more to customers than what they expect. The advice served her well at Western Sizzlin' (south) and then when her family opened Snookum's steakhouse in 1994. In 1997, Hutcherson also began working in the cafeteria at the new Chester County High School. She said the role of "lunch lady" brought new avenues of service as she got to know the students. Students opened up to Hutcherson, and she met them with encouragement and support.

Through all of the different hats they have each worn, Hutcherson said she and Barry are each still the same people they have always been. A title does not change the inward compass or the outer goals, she explained, recalling the love and compassion she has observed Barry exhibit in whatever capacity he stood. "He's good all the way thorough." She was grateful to be able to work and also be with their two girls, Jennifer and Hayley, while they were young. She worked two jobs for the majority of her adult life until she had

emergency heart surgery in 2010. She lost her mother to heart disease in 2008. Today, she continues to spend evenings at Snookum's overseeing customer satisfaction and occasionally waiting tables while Barry mans the grill, and both set aside time to be present for their family, including their grandchildren, Khloe and Karson (Jennifer and Karl) and Palmer and Piper (Hayley and Clint).

Hutcherson's faith has carried her through, seeing God's work in her life and in the community. She said her family has always relied heavily on prayer, trusting that things will work out for the best, whether or not it works out the way you want.

"People are good, especially here in Chester County," she said. "We're blessed. We have good people that come together – when something happens people jump to help...it doesn't matter what side of the aisle you're on or what; they help each other."

"My momma always taught me to treat others how I want to be treated, and I've tried to live by that; I taught my kids to live by that."

More of the same is what Hutcherson hopes for the future of Chester County, for the community to continue working together, as a community.

To support each other in local business.

"Our own people that are trying to make something in Chester County - we need to want each other to succeed."

To continue seeing the need, and meeting that need where each is able.

"There's people in Chester County that don't have food...people that don't have a place to sleep at night," she said. "We don't know what somebody's fighting. We may be the only smiling face they see all day."

"We don't realize how blessed we are until we go someplace else."



Carl Perkins Center recognized for protecting community's children

One in every 10 children living in Chester County will be sexually abused before their 18th birthday, says Carl Perkins Director Kirby Fahs. It is a startling statistic, one that is true not just for Chester County, but nationally. A child is abused or neglected every 47 seconds in the United States, according to the Exchange Club-Carl Perkins Center for Child Abuse Prevention. Of the children who are sexually abused.

90% are abused by someone they know and trust. Seventy percent of children who are sexually abused are abused by a peer. Fewer than 5% of child abuse/neglect reports are false. When considering that these statistics are based on abuse which is actually reported, the need to protect the nation's children becomes clear.

The Carl Perkins Center is the boots-on-the-ground support for West Tennessee's children. With 20 locations in West Tennessee, the center provides services for children who have experienced sexual abuse or severe physical abuse while spreading awareness of the battle all Tennesseans face on behalf of our kids. The Chester County center provided services for 96 local children in the 2023-24 fiscal year, as well as 68 adults, for a total of 164. Services are extensive and multi-faceted, providing each child their best chance at overcoming their experience.

Services offered by the center include forensic interviews; trauma focused cognitive behavioral therapy (once per week,

lasting 12 weeks to one year, depending on each child's progression); victim advocacy (advocate begins the journey with the child at the forensic interview through prosecution, ensures needs are

on progress, make sure the child/family/care giver knows what to expect); nurturing parenting classes - weekly for six to eight weeks (includes topics such as communicating with respect, dealing with stress, dealing with feelings, expectation and brain development)t; Stewards of children community education classes Darkness to Light program on child sexual abuse prevention, 2.5 hour free training, meets criteria for schools/agencies/etc., learning facts/ statistics, minimizing opportunity (Child sexual abuse occurs 80% of the time in isolated situations) how to minimize, how to create a safer space, how to talk to kids about boundaries, policies within agencies and how to recognize signs. Additionally, the center offers resources

met in home and checks in monthly to update


such as a food pantry and diapers/ wipes/personal hygiene products and a 24-hour hotline with on-call staff answering after hours. All services offered at no charge to families and guardians.

A Child Protective Investigative Team (CPIT) composed of 14 members evaluates all aspects of the child's case to determine every need and service. "We have an amazing team," Fahs said. "They come in, and we spend a lot of time on every kid to make sure that every single discipline that is involved has the opportunity to talk about where they are, what they see, what they think, what they need; so at the end of the day we're not missing anything, the kiddo's not falling through the cracks."

With all of the inside help, the center receives a large amount of assistance from the community as well. The center operates strictly from donations, every dollar raised stays in the county where it is raised, and every dollar makes a difference. Fahs said that people often call to ask what the center's needs are. While she sometimes suggests staples such as tuna or peanut butter, or therapy supplies such as canvases, paint and journals, she says she is always open to ideas. Often, someone will call wanting to donate the exact thing that has just been or will soon be identified as a need for the center's families. "It is amazing how, if we've got a need in one of our families, it's met - and quickly," Fahs smiled.

The center hosts several fundraising events throughout the year. The larger ones include the Daddy Daughter Dance,

Freed-Hardeman's 5K for the

children, the wrestling event sponsored by NEO and Dinner and Auction. Wrestling will be March 14 this year with Dinner and Auction following the next day, March 15. Dinner and Auction will be held at First Methodist Church and will feature a "Dancing with the Stars" theme. Items are now being accepted for the auction portion of the event, and may include any services, products or experiences anyone would like to donate. See the story in this week's edition of the **Independent** for more information on these upcoming events.

The Carl Perkins Center has been voted "Best Charity" in the Reader's Choice awards time and time again. "Thank you to our amazing community for showing your support to us each and every day," Fahs said. "We counld not do what we do without you!"

The Carl Perkins Center has been providing services in Chester County since the mid-late 1980s, as one of the first counties provided services by Madison County. The first Chester County Center operated from a spare room in Southwest Human Resource Agency on Church Ave. before moving into

most recent move was to Record Drive, a location which offers a substantial increase in space, storage and some unexpected perks due to the privacy of location.

One of the hardest things about sharing the center's needs and successes is related to privacy, according to Fahs. She said it is difficult to tell the community what good is being done, when only the briefest of details can be shared. "Being able to see so many people do something they don't have to do, for people they don't know that they might know, is amazing," she said.

Fahs began working at the local center in 2007, spending some time in Hardeman County as well and serving the last nine years as director in Chester County. "It's been a really amazing 18 years. This is just a good county."

While the work is challenging and can be heartbreaking, Fahs said that she is glad to be able to offer the services to the children and families who need

them. Each report increases awareness, which decreases the number of children who will experience abuse in the future. Prevention is key. The center offers a safe place for the children to heal and succeed.

"It's been cool to see our families' needs met; its been amazing to see how people have supported us to make sure that we have what we need to be able to meet these families at the front door and say 'I'm so glad you're here.""






