On a 6-0 vote Monday night, the City Council of South Sioux City approved its 2024-25 fiscal year budget, one that sees a decrease in the cent special election that gave the operating budget with a slight inwe're going to be talking to our crease in property taxes. legislators about as well since we

The good news is that the city's operating budget of \$112.3 million is 15 percent lower than last year's operating budget of al-

most \$132.5 million. The bad news — a 5 percent increase in the city's property tax asking, from \$4.14 million to \$4.36 mil-

Mayor Rod Koch told the Dakota County Star that inflation made putting together

this year's budget a real challenge, and the tax increase was needed to keep the city eligible for state fund-

'We cut as many places as we could, but with inflation it caused the budget to go up and we had to raise taxes a bit to keep the basic services that we have," he said. "We weren't happy to have to do it, but we really didn't have a choice.

The 5 percent increase in property taxes is due in part to a 9 percent increase in the city's total valuation, which rose from \$1.01 billion to \$1.105 billion. While that dropped the levy from 40.94 cents to 39.4573 cents per \$100 of valuation, the net result sees an increase in property taxes for the coming fiscal year.

Koch said that increasing salaries to stay competitive was part of the increase, and the city wanted to take care of some of that now, rather than

waiting until later. "We're incrementally doing things and not kicking the can down the road," Koch said. "It's still a very conservative budget, and with raising salaries and keeping people on board, it's something we need to do or we're going to lose people to places like Sioux City.'

Three new firefighters are being added to the city's fire department roster, and much of the funding for that will come as the result of a recity the option to move sales tax funding from its roads department to the fire department.

The Council also approved a tric of redevelopment proposals, one of which received a significant amount of discussion.

The state of Nebraska has been named defendant in two lawsuits filed in Dakota County District Court in connection with the May 7, 1982 death of former Dakota County Deputy Sheriff Michael T. AARP grant funds housing design contest

Drawing attention to a housing option that could make it easier for older Nebraskans to "age in place" is one of the goals of an AARP Community Challenge grant-funded con-

Omaha by Design was awarded a nearly \$24,000 AARP "Demonstration Grant" for its "Duplex by Design" contest. The contest is for duplex designs which "promote health and greater autonomy" with their accessibility and affordability.

Abe Lueders, director of urban design and affordable design fellow at Omaha by Design, explained duplexes are one type of badly needed 'missing middle housing.'

"When we say 'missing middle," we're talking about basically small multifamily buildings," Lueders noted. "That includes duplexes but also up to quadplexes, townhomes; things that are bigger than a house but smaller than an apartment." AARP maintains one reason

small, affordable housing is missing in many communities is too little of it has been built since the 1940s. This causes some seniors to remain in larger homes than they need.

Empty-nest Baby Boomers in the United States currently own twice the number of large single-family homes as Millennials raising chil-

Todd Stubbendieck, state director for AARP Nebraska, said not only is there a need for more "accessible" senior housing but also for more housing options that allow seniors to live independently for as long as

Duplexes provide that opportunity for a little smaller space, downsized, maybe less stairs and just more of an age-friendly design option for folks," Stubbendieck outlined. "This project is going to highlight and raise awareness of duplexes and create some buildable designs that folks in Omaha can work with.

Lueders stressed in addition to being more affordable and accessible, "missing middle housing" creates more housing on a single lot. He pointed out duplexes are "the next rung up" on the housing ladder, since they are built on the same scale, use the same construction methods and are subject to the same residential building codes as singlefamily homes.



Truth in Taxation law sends out pink cards

Labor Day has come and gone and the weather has cooled off some, which means fall is on its way. I hope you were able to spend time with family over the Labor Day weekend enjoying some final activities of the

In the past several weeks, preliminary budgets for political subdivisions have been in the newspapers. In 2021, the Nebraska Legislature passed the Truth in Taxation law that went into effect in 2022. This is now Nebraska statute §77-1633 and requires a pink postcard to be sent out to the taxpayers if the public subdivisions are asking for a property tax amount that exceeds the allowable growth percentage.

(2) If any political subdivision seeks to increase its property tax request by more than the allowable growth percentage, such political subdivision may do so, subject to the limitations provided in the School District Property Tax Limitation Act and the Property Tax Growth Limitation Act, if the following require-

— (a) A public hearing is held and notice of such hearing is provided in compliance with subsection (3) of this section; and

– (b) The governing body of such political subdivision passes a resolution or an ordinance that complies with subsection (4) of this section.

(3)(a) Each political subdivision within a county that seeks to increase its property tax request by more than the allowable growth percentage shall participate in a joint public hearing. Each such political subdivision shall designate one representative to attend the joint public hearing on behalf of the political subdivision. If a political subdivision includes area in more than one county, the political subdivision shall be deemed to be within the county in which the political subdivision's principal head-quarters are located. At such hearing, there shall be no items on the agenda other than discussion on each political subdivision's intent to increase its property tax request by more than the

(b) At least one elected official from each participating political subdivision shall attend the joint public hearing. An elected official may be the designated representative from a participating political subdivision. The presence of a quorum or the participation of elected officials at the joint public hearing does not constitute a meeting as defined by section 84-1409 of the Open Meetings Act.

Due to the recent special session on the property tax crisis in Nebraska, I wanted to remind you of this Truth in Taxation legislation as well as encourage you to be involved in any type of budget hearings in your area. Many of these political subdivisions add to their budgets, but forget to adjust the levy request. As you look at your property tax statement, look for all of the things your property taxes go for such as school bonds, bonds used for city or village improvements, etc. Due to what was passed in LB34 this past special year, this fiscal year will remain unchanged for political subdivisions. On July 1, 2025 the changes made in LB34 for political subdivisions will go into effect for property tax relief.

Suicide and what might never have been

The stretch of 17th Street that runs past the Arbors Apartments here in town was a gravel road almost 20 years ago where I thought I was taking my final steps on this earth.

You may not remember (and it's certainly not worth the effort at this point), but this is my second tour of duty with your newspaper. I was hired as managing editor by thenpublisher Mark Rhoades back in 2006, and it was an experience that I will never forget because of how it (almost) ended.

I was a much different person back then than the one you know today — I was full of anger, having been forced to shut down my freelancing business and go back on a promise I had made to my then-teenage daughter about staying close to her until she graduated from high school. I felt like I was failing in EVERYTHING in my life, and I brought that energy with me here to South Sioux City.

One evening, as I laid on my couch and wallowed in my depression, I decided that I'd had enough. I wanted out. I wanted to stop feeling the pain I was experiencing. I wanted to stop everything.

There had recently been a drowning along the Missouri River that I'd written a story about, and I figured that would be the perfect antidote for what ailed me. I put on my shoes, walked out my apartment door and took that walk along the then-dirt road to a space just east of the Dible Soccer Complex that allowed access to the raging, muddy water that flowed south toward Omaha.

As I stood at the water's edge and contemplated my final thoughts, a voice spoke: "What will they tell

your daughters?"

My teenage daughter, Kylie, was a part of my life. My second daughter, Abby, had been given up for adoption and had yet to reach the age where she could understand her situation and had not been in contact with me (she would make that first contact three years later and we still speak to this day). Neither knew of, or could comprehend, my desperation at that moment. In fact, NOBODY knew about it. It would be the question about Mikey C that would forever be asked — WHY would he take his own life?

Something about that voice made me step back from my final destination. I walked back to the apartment, broke down in tears and lamented what I thought to be the fact that I was so pathetic I couldn't even do suicide right.

The sun came up the following morning, and I realized something needed to change. I took that day off from work and drove down to talk with my dad, who lived down the river in Plattsmouth. He was heading down to Endicott (a small village famous for its brick operation) to pick up bricks for a project he was doing

at his church, so we drove and talked. I told him about what I'd been through the night before, and the look of surprise, sadness and disappointment on his face was one I still recall. We spent the rest of the drive talking about what was going on in my life, and he made me realize that all of my fears and self-loathing about my place at that point were not anywhere near reality. He saved my life on that drive, and instead of thinking about all of that, we ended up trading funny stories from our college days. I went to college in Beatrice, and we stopped at McDonald's there on the way home where I shared some of the funny things I did with friends back then — I thought he was going to have a stroke with as hard as he was laughing.

By the end of the drive, he made me promise that if I ever felt the need to harm myself over something, to first call him and talk to him. I took that advice a number of times and

One year, he surprised me by coming to watch some of the action and we got this photo together. helped me move to a new place and about committing suicide, including get a new start and was there for so many amazing moments that I never would have been able to experience had I followed through on that fateful evening along the river.

Among those experiences that I would have missed — yes, buying the Dakota County Star. He passed away this past January, just as former publisher Jason Sturek and I were starting negotiations on the deal. I know that he would have been proud to see what's happened in these past few months, and I'm sure the irony of that experience and how it has come full circle to today would not have been lost on him.

What else would I have missed if I'd committed suicide that day? Here's a "short" list:

And the steps I take today point not toward the end, but to new beginnings and opportunities to grow and succeed. Dad had a simple, two-word phrase to remind me:




