Golf carts may soon roam city streets

With ATV's and UTV's already allowed on city streets, you may soon see golf carts rolling down the street soon in South Sioux City.

At Monday's Public Works meeting, the committee decided to seek more information before making a final decision to allow golf carts to be driven on city streets.

The city already has an ordinance regarding licensed ATV and UTV vehicles, but that ordinance does not include golf carts.

Jeremy Liu came before the committee to request the committee look at his vehicle. which looks like a golf cart but is not labeled as one. The vehicle has front and rear lights and is listed as a neighborhood electric vehicle, which can legally be on city streets.

"It can go up to 25 miles per hour and has all the features of a UTV," he told the com-

Sioux City Police officer who said the vehicle was not legal, and he came seeking clarification from the city on the issue.

"A number of cities already allow it, so it would be no problem," he said.

City Councilman and committee member Ben Schultz said he had been contacted a number of times recently about the issue.

Court clears way for felons to vote

The state Supreme Court has upheld a

law giving Nebraskans with prior felony convictions the right to vote once they have completed their sentence. Proponents of the measure are calling it

a hard-fought victory to restore full rights to citizens who have paid their debt to so-State lawmakers challenged a clause in

the state's 1875 constitution disenfranchising people with felony convictions for life. Steve Smith, director of communica-tions with the group Civic Nebraska, said

the ruling ends a decades-long legal battle "Had the court ruled the underlying stat-

ute is unconstitutional, those folks would have been out of luck," said Smith. "And so the stakes were pretty high. In a state the size of Nebraska, that's close to 10% of the electorate. It's about 100,000 voters." Smith said eligible people must register

in person by 6 p.m. on October 25 at their county's local elections office. Smith said the ruling negates an order

by the secretary of state blocking county officials from registering former felons despite a bipartisan bill that eliminated a two year waiting period for people with He said the requirements to register

have been simplified.

'It is fully completing your sentence. And so the term is off-papers," said Smith. "And most folks who have been justiceimpacted understand what off-papers mean. They've served any term of incarceration. They have completed any terms of parole, probation or supervised release. and they have not reoffended."

Smith said his organization and others are urging people who are now eligible to register and to vote, calling it both a civil right and a civic duty. 'For those of you going, 'I don't know it

I want to do this,' know that the Supreme Court, the highest court in our state, has said, 'You are good to go, and you should vote with confidence,'" said Smith. "It you're on the fence about not voting, think about how hard some people tried to keep your vote away from you, and then wonder why that is.

More than 20 years ago, Mike and Claudia Ratkowitz decided to start a new family.

With their daughter graduated and out of the house, the couple were approached about starting a "billet family" to help out the Sioux City Musketeers hockey program.

'We had raised a daughter and had two foster sons and several exchange students over the years, and after 9/11 we took a couple of about it." years off," said Ratkowitz, vice president for K&B Transportation in South Sioux City.
Prior to the start of the Musketeers' 2003-

2004 season, he and his wife — a retired elementary school teacher who taught here for 45 years — were approached about hosting a couple of the new Musketeer players who

were coming to Sioux City to play for the in their homes. The players arrive prior to the United States Hockey League team.

wanting to fill up their "empty nest," they decided to take on this new responsibility.

"One of my employees, who was a hockey player, suggested that we get into it," Ratkowitz said. "I didn't know much about hockey, but he introduced us to the coach and his wife and we spent a Sunday afternoon talking

Before long, the Ratkowitz's hosted two kids and over the years have hosted as many as five in a season. In the two decades they have served as a billet family, they have hosted 65 players, about a third of whom have gone on to play in the National Hockey League.

start of a season and stay until the season's With their daughter out of the house and end, a stay that can last up to nine months from training camp to the league playoffs.

The families receive a stipend from the team for each player to help out with household expenses, groceries and other related items. In exchange, the families provide each player with a bedroom, three meals a day and serve as de facto parents, making sure they adhere to the rules of the house. Players serve as a role model for the family's children and are asked to be active in off-ice activities, including the home, where they are assigned chores and make sure their rooms are picked up.



They have responsibilities at their house and he runs a tight ship. But you get to live in a great house with all the love they give and they spare no expense on the players.'

Ratkowitz said the players have responsibilities at his house, and rare are the times that a problem comes

"With the exception of Christmas and spring break, they live here 24/7," he said. "They're expected to pitch in, make their bed, help out with laundry. It's highly organized and they help out."

That's been especially important in their house as Mr. Ratkowitz has been battling Stage 4 colon and liver cancer the last several years. While he recently got a clean bill of health in August, it's been great to have these young men in the house.

Temporary campfire ban in effect

The Nebraska Game and Parks is implementing a temporary ban on vegetation. campfires at all Nebraska state park areas and wildlife management areas until further notice.

Camp stoves using liquid or gas fuel are permitted as they reduce the likelihood of ash or hot charcoal being discarded before they are extinguished. These types of stoves also do not produce blowing embers, further reducing wildfire potential. Propane fire pits are not permitted.

USDA giving out \$3.55 million in grants

Harvest is in full swing and things have become busy for us. We just finished harvesting soybeans and are now on to harvesting corn. The USDA Rural Development office from the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced last week that \$3.55 million in investments are being awarded to nine Nebraska projects to improve educational and business opportunities for rural businesses and Native American tribes. "Rural Development is excited to partner with these community institutions of education and entrepreneurship," said Cindy Axne Rural Development Senior Advisor for Rural Engagement, Delivery and Prosperity. "When we invest in our rural community partners, we strengthen Nebraska and expand opportunities for all the people in the state.

— A \$199,368 grant will help expand and enhance the Makerspace Project in Thurston and Knox counties for the Center for Rural Affairs. rent small business owners and expand Makerspace opportunities and over the next three years. offerings through online training courses and a video library of howto videos. This project is expected to assist a minimum of seven small and emerging businesses over the next three years.

- A \$900,000 grant will help construct a 6,195 square foot business incubator wing on the Nebraska Indian Community College in Macy. 



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

Getting around the 5,000-meter monster course at the Kearney Country Club will be a challenge, and I'm optimistic the seven SSC runners can finish somewhere in the middle of a very talented Class A lineup.

Homer's boys have shown to be a consistent top-shelf team this fall. Their pack-style running that keeps them within a few spots of one another could be a big help. If they finish close enough together and up near the front third of the pack, they could be in the hunt for a Class D

Likewise, the Homer girls can post a strong finish if they can match the boys' packrat attack. Based on district times, the Lady Knights might not be in the Class D title hunt, but if there's one thing I've learned over the years while covering high school sports, it's that you should always expect the unexpected.

Ponca's boys have made quite a statement the past few weeks, particularly with the improvement shown by their three-man band. All three have moved up significantly from where they began the year, and they could surprise some people in the Class D boys race Friday afternoon.

Ponca's Ava Brennan ought to be in the mix of the best runners in the Class D race. Her district-winning time of 20:07.42 was the third fastest among the Class D girls qualifiers. If she can run as well as she did in Pender last week, she might be in the hunt for an individual state championship.

Tri County Northeast will have a runner in both Class D races. Jade Ridenour's move from football to cross country has paid off nicely as he was able to get in on his first try. Alejandra Hermosillo earned her first trip last year and was the last girl in this year. Medal or not, both will gain a lot from the experience and will bring that back to the Wolfpack lineup in 2025.

Each pitch came from a different pitcher — Burt Hooton in the fourth, Elias Sosa in the fifth, and knuckleballer Charlie Hough in the eighth, a bomb that was hit so high and so far that it nearly brought the stadium down.

This will be the 12th time that the Bronx Bombers and Dodger Blue will decide baseball's world championship, and it should be a fun one to

watch once again. Give me the Dodgers in six.

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



Section 1. (1) The Legislature finds that: (a) Funds appropriated for the education of students in kindergarten through twelfth grade are for a

fundamental public purpose of state government and constitute an ordinary expense of state government; (b) Enabling the greatest number of parents and legal guardians to choose among quality educational opportunities for children will improve the quality of education available to all children; (c) Privately operated elementary and secondary schools in Nebraska satisfy the state's requirements for legal operation and provide quality educational opportunities for children; (d) Parents and legal guardians of limited means are less able to choose among quality educational opportunities for their children; and (e) Making it possible for more parents and legal guardians to be able to choose privately operated schools benefits Nebraska parents and taxpayers. (2) For purposes of this section: (a) Education scholarship means a financial grant-in-aid to be used to pay all or part of the cost to educate an eligible student attending a qualified school; (b) Eligible student means a resident of Nebraska who: (i) Is receiving an education scholarship for the first time and is (A) entering kindergarten or ninth grade in a qualified school or the first grade level offered by the qualified school, (B) transferring from a public school at which the student was enrolled for at least one semester immediately preceding the first semester for which the student receives an education scholarship to a qualified school and is entering any of grades kindergarten through twelve, or (C) a member of an active duty or reserve military family transferring into Nebraska from another state or another country and is entering any of grades kindergarten through twelve in a qualified school; (ii) Has previously received an education scholarship under this section and is continuing education at a qualified school until such student graduates from high school or reaches twenty-one years of age, whichever comes first; (iii) Has previously received an education scholarship under the Opportunity Scholarships Act, as such act existed prior to its repeal by this legislative bill, and is continuing education at a qualified school until such student graduates from high school or reaches twenty-one years of age, whichever comes first; (iv) Is the sibling of a student who is receiving an education scholarship and resides in the same household as such student; or (v) Is currently enrolled in a qualified school and is a member of a family whose household income is no more than two hundred thirteen percent of the federal poverty level; and (c) Qualified school means any nongovernmental, privately operated elementary or secondary school located in this state that (i) is operated not for profit, (ii) complies with the antidiscrimination provisions of 42 U.S.C. 1981, as such section existed on January 1, 2024, (iii) complies with all health and life safety laws or codes that apply to privately operated schools, and (iv) fulfills the applicable accreditation or approval requirements established by the State Board of Education pursuant to section 79-318. (3) The State Treasurer shall establish a program to provide education scholarships to eligible students to pay the costs associated with attending a qualified school. Under such program, the State Treasurer shall: (a) Establish a priority system for awarding education scholarships under the program. Such priority system shall: (i) Give first priority to: (A) Eligible students who received an education scholarship under this section or under the Opportunity Scholarships Act, as such act existed prior to its repeal by this legislative bill, during the previous school year: and (B) The sibling of a student who is receiving an education scholarship, so long as the sibling resides in the same household as such student; (ii) Give second priority to: (A) Eligible students whose household income levels do not exceed one hundred eighty-five percent of the federal poverty level; (B) Eligible students whose application for the enrollment option program established in section 79-234 has been denied; (C) Eligible students who have an individualized education program; (D) Eligible students who are experiencing bullying, harassment, hazing, assault, battery, kidnapping, robbery, sexual offenses, threat or intimidation, or fighting at school; (E) Eligible students who are in foster care; and (F) Eligible students who are in a family with a parent or guardian in an active duty role in a branch of the armed forces of the United States or in the National Guard, or whose parent or guardian was killed serving in the line of duty; (iii) Give third priority to eligible students whose household income levels exceed one hundred eighty-five percent of the federal poverty level but do not exceed two hundred thirteen percent of the federal poverty level; and (iv) Give fourth priority to eligible students whose household income levels exceed two hundred thirteen percent of the federal poverty level but do not exceed three hundred percent of the income indicated in the income eligibility guidelines for reduced price meals under the National School Lunch Program in 7 C.F.R. part 210; (b) Limit the maximum scholarship amount awarded to any eligible student to the cost necessary to educate the eligible student at the qualified school such student attends;

(b) Employer does not include the United States or the State of Nebraska or its agencies, departments, or political subdivisions; (5) Family member means: (a) Any of the following, regardless of age: A biological, adopted, or foster child, a stepchild, a legal ward, or a child to whom the employee stands in loco parentis; (b) A biological, foster, step, or adoptive parent or a legal guardian of an employee or an employee's spouse; (c) A person who stood in loco parentis to the employee or the employee's spouse when the employee or employee's spouse was a minor child; (d) A person to whom the employee is legally married under the laws of any state; (e) A grandparent, grandchild, or sibling, whether of a biological, foster, adoptive, or step relationship, of the employee or the employee's spouse; or (f) Any other individual related by blood to the employee or whose close association with the employee is the equivalent of a family relationship; (6) Health care professional means any person licensed under any federal or state law to provide medical or emergency services; (7) Paid sick time means time that is compensated at the same hourly rate and with the same benefits, including health care benefits, as the employee typically earns during hours worked and that is provided by an employer to an employee for the purposes described in section 4 of this act, and in no case shall the amount of this hourly rate be less than that provided under

(8) Public health emergency means a declaration or proclamation related to a public health threat, risk, disaster, or emergency that is made or issued by a federal, state, or local official with the authority to make or issue such a declaration or proclamation;

(9) Retaliatory personnel action means a denial of any right guaranteed under the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act and any threat, discharge, suspension, demotion, reduction of hours or pay, or other adverse action against an employee for exercising or attempting to exercise any right guaranteed in the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act; (10)(a) Small business means an employer with fewer than twenty employees during a given week, including full-time. <u>part-time</u>, <u>or temporary employees.</u> (b) Small business does not include an employer that maintained twenty or more employees on its payroll in each of twenty or more calendar weeks in the <u>current or preceding calendar year; and</u> (11) Year means a regular and consecutive twelve-month period as determined by the employer.

Sec. 3. Accrual and carryover of paid sick time; paid sick time following transfer or return after separation from employment. (1) All employees <u>shall accrue a minimum of one hour</u> of paid sick time for every thirty hours worked. Unless the employer selects a <u>higher limit, this section does not entitle</u> <u>an employee to earn or use more than:</u> (a) Forty hours of paid sick time in a year <u>for an employee of a small business; or</u> (b) Fifty-six hours of paid sick time in a year for an employee of an employer that is not a small business. (2) Employees who are exempt from overtime reguirements under 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(1) of the federal Fair Labor Standards Act, 29 U.S.C. 201 et seq., shall be assumed to work forty hours in each workweek for purposes of paid sick time accrual un-<u>less their typical workweek is less than</u> forty hours, in which case paid sick time accrues based upon that typical workweek. (3) Paid sick time as provided in this section shall begin to accrue at the commencement of employment or October 1, 2025, whichever is later. An employee shall be entitled to use paid sick time as it is accrued. An employer may provide all paid sick time that an employee is expected to accrue in a year at the beginning of the year. (4) Accrued paid sick time shall be carried over to the following year. A small business is not required to permit an employee to use more than forty hours <u>of paid sick time per year, and other</u> employers are not required to permit an employee to use more than fifty-six hours of paid sick time per year. Alternatively, in lieu of carryover of unused paid sick time provided pursuant to this <u>section from one year to the next, an</u> employer may pay an employee for unused paid sick time provided pursuant to this section at the end of a year and provide the employee with an amount of paid sick time that meets or exceeds the requirements of subsections (1) and (3) of this section that is available for the employee's immediate use at the beginning of the subsequent year. (5) Any employer with a paid leave policy, such as a paid time off policy, who <u>makes available an amount of paid</u> <u>leave sufficient to meet the require-</u> ments of the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act that may be used for the same purposes and under the same conditions as paid sick time under the act is not required to provide additional paid sick time under the act.

(6) At its discretion, an employer may

loan paid sick time to an employee in

advance of accrual by such employee. (7) If an employee is transferred to a separate division, entity, or location, but remains employed by the same employer, the employee is entitled to all paid sick time accrued at the prior division, entity, or location and is entitled to use all paid sick time as provided in the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act. When there is a separation <u>from employment and the employee is</u> rehired within twelve months of separation by the same employer, previously accrued paid sick time that had not been used shall be reinstated. An</u> employer that has not provided to the employee a copy of such written policy shall not deny paid sick time to the employee based on noncompliance with such a policy. (4) An employer shall not require, as a condition of an employee's taking paid sick time under this section, that the employee search for or find a replacement worker to cover the hours during which the employee is using paid sick time. (5) Paid sick time under <u>this section may be used in the smaller</u> of hourly increments or the smallest increment that the employer's payroll system uses to account for absences or use of other time. (6) For use of paid sick time for more than three consecutive work days, an employer may require reasonable documentation that the paid sick time has been used for a purpose covered by subsection (1) of this section. Reasonable documentation shall include (a) documentation signed by a health care professional indicating that paid sick time is or was necessarv or (b) if the employee or a family member did not receive services from a health care professional, or if documentation cannot be obtained from a health care professional in reasonable time or without added expense, a written statement from the employee indicating that the employee is taking or took paid sick time for a qualifying purpose covered by subsection (1) of this section. In any action brought to enforce the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act, the court shal have jurisdiction to grant such legal or equitable relief as the court deems appropriate to effectuate the purposes of the act. If an employee establishes

a claim and secures judgment on the claim, such employee shall also be entitled to recover the full amount of the judgment and all costs of such suit, including reasonable attorney's fees. (7) If an employee institutes suit against an employer under subsection (6) of this section, any citation that is issued against an employer under subsection (1) of this section and that relates directly to the facts in dispute shall be admitted into evidence unless specifically excluded by the court. If a citation has been contested as described in subsection (3) of this section, it shall not be admitted into evidence under this subsection until such contest has been resolved. (8) A civil action brought under this section shall be commenced no later than four calendar years after the cause of action accrues.

Sec. 9. Confidentiality and nondisclosure. (1) Unless otherwise required by law, an employer shall not require disclosure of the details of an employee's or an employee's family member's health information as a condition of providing paid sick time under the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act. The cost of the water tower in 2000 was \$326,500 and was built by McGuire Iron Co. Cost of the painting was \$264,400 and was done by Viking Painting LCC. The Emerson water tower holds 150,000 gallons of water. It is a single-pedestal elevated single-storage tank and this is the first time it has been painted.
