Area girls have success during first day at state

OMAHA — The South Sioux City Lady Cardinals put two wrestlers after the first day of the Nebraska State Wrestling Championships Tuesday at the CHI Center.

Top-ranked Madelynn Bohnet improved to 42-0 on the season with a pair of pins at 105 pounds to move into Wednesday afternoon's semifinals. She pinned Savannah Kelliher of Kearney in 3:20 and finished Rylee Luce of Gering in 2:24 to advance to the semifinals.

Defending heavyweight champion Caitlyn Sohm continued her road to the medal stand with two wins at 235 pounds. She also had a pair of pins, finishing Jennifer Lopez of Adams Central in 3:22 and pinning Kayleigh Steinbeck of McCook in 3:00.

Araidne Rocha (115) and Zulema Godinez (190) both won one

match before being defeated in the quarterfinals. Stephanie Salgado (145) and Lysandra Torres (155) both lost in the first round.

Tri County Northeast's Kiya Tornez went 1-1 on the day at 157 pounds in Class B action. She earned a fast 27-second pin over Gabi Young of Falls City before being pinned late in the first period by Hayley Rusher of Chase County to drop into the second round of consolations.

The first two rounds of consolations start at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, followed by the semifinals and third-round consolations at 12:30 p.m. Consolation semifinals and third- and fifth-place matches will follow, with the finals set for 6:30 p.m.

County Board address drainage, road needs

Water in the elevator shaft could present future building issues at the Dakota County Courthouse.

During Tuesday's County Board of Commissioners meeting, Commissioner Doug Bousquet expressed concerns about water getting into the elevator shaft at the courthouse.

"The elevator shaft has water in it again," Bousquet said, who then explained that if it continues, it could cause extensive damage to the Courthouse in the long run.

The elevator shaft is located on the north side of the Courthouse, next to the jail. The drainage seems to be the cause of two cement slabs that need to be bolstered. Bousquet suggested he look into possible bids from companies the county has previously worked with on highway issues. The commission has used Gill Construction and Steve Harris Construction for similar problems. They could place bids on the cost of mudd-jacking two cement slabs on the east and north sides of the jail next to the elevator shaft, thus elevating the drainage issue.

Bousquet said he will bring separate bids from the companies to the next County Commissioners meeting and have the Board vote on the matter.

Proposal would fund housing for domestic abuse survivors

The Nebraska Legislature is considering a bill that would provide nearly \$1 million to help survivors of domestic abuse and sex trafficking pay for emergency housing.

Recent research shows that 1.4 million Nebraskans have report some form of domestic or sexual violence in their lifetimes.

Jo Bair, executive director of the

Encourage Advocacy Center in Hastings, said lack of access to safe and affordable housing is a primary barrier for survivors of sex trafficking and intimate partner violence, who are trying to escape abusive relationships.

“So,” said Bair, “these survivors are having to weigh out, ‘Do I stay in an unsafe situation, or do I leave and potentially become homeless, potentially have my children become

homeless?’”

Bair added that people who’ve experienced domestic violence or sex trafficking have almost always suffered financial abuse. They’re either prevented from working, or have had their work sabotaged.

They’re often cut off from people who could help them, and have poor or no credit history.

The measure is currently pending in the Nebraska Legislative Revenue Committee.

Nebraska has passed legislation in the past designed to help victims of domestic violence, but Bair said LB

78 goes further, by bridging the cost and social service gap that has been left in the past.

“These are also funds that are going to be provided to people who are working with victim service agencies, who are doing extensive case management support to help ensure that there is sustainability,” said Bair, “and that people are going to be able to support themselves after they have this initial help.”

Critics of plans like the one proposed in LB 78 worry about people’s ongoing dependence on the state for financial help.

superintendent Jolene Gubbels, regarding whether to change orders for the M Avenue ARPA project.

Gubbels stated, “The stabilization on the road, M Avenue, did not work. The road turned slick due to too much clay in the soil.”

Engineer Josh Cooney of Bancroft got the bid to reinforce the roads with the crushed concrete the county had

already purchased. Gubbels stated that Cooney felt he could complete the project within 4-6 weeks with the weather cooperating.

The stretch of Ave. M is a heavily used farm road. If the first four to six inches of road on top are softer material, it tends to make drivers nervous. The crushed concrete is denser and has more stable traction, so the larger aggregate creates a better base. The stretch of road is from 210th to 240th Street on M Ave.

It's time: put violent offenders away for life

Don't Get Me Started

Back in 1976, I was sexually assaulted by a sick, twisted teenager in the small town of Newman Grove, located about 35 miles southwest of Norfolk.

It's an experience that, 49 years later, still haunts me in ways that I should never have to experience. The trauma, nightmares and damage to self-esteem that is experienced by those of us who survive sexual assaults are events nobody should have to live with.

And yet, five decades later, I still do.

I've sought therapy, taken medications, say prayers and let God deal with what I can't, but why should I have to live in this mental prison for the rest of my life, while my perpetrator continues life free of the responsibilities he has for shattering my youth?

The criminal justice system in this country — and especially here in Nebraska — has for too long allowed these scumbags to do things to innocent people for far too long without the proper punishment being handed down. There would not be much of a need for all the drugs and therapy that is needed to offset the damage done by these losers if they were not allowed to continue their carnage — and yet, the criminal justice system allows them to do just that.

Most recently, a young lady in Seward had filed a protection order against a low-life that had most recently beaten her within an inch of her life and threatened to kill her if she reported it. The woman reported that her attacker had banged her head on a nightstand three times, and when her 12-year-old daughter came into the room, he beat her as well.

She requested a protection order a month ago, and her attacker threatened to kill her if she didn't drop the charges. A few days later, he was arrested and charged with tampering, and the judge C. Jo Peterson, posted a measly \$2,500 bond. He posted the 10 percent required — 250 bucks — and one day later, shot and killed the woman. (The judge is now subject to a possible recall within her district — one that we wholeheartedly agree with.)

HOW did this happen? HOW was this scumbag allowed to be free on such a pathetically minimal bond, knowing that he had threatened to kill this woman, and then see him follow through on his threat within 24 hours of him being release from custody?

HOW?

Those of us who have experienced

these types of violence live a lifetime sentence when our attackers are allowed to walk free. Even if they have served their pathetically-short stints in a prison cell, they remain a constant threat to repeat their sick acts of violence, whether it be on their original victims or on somebody else.

My attacker was a juvenile, and back in 1976 when this happened, the court system's view on sexual assault was even more dismissive than it is today. His probation was handled by the local chief of police — who happened to be his grandfather. So it should be no surprise to you, then, to know that he continued to have multiple run-ins for a variety of criminal activities until 20 years later, when he finally got put in prison for first-degree sexual assault of a vulnerable adult. He served half of a five-year sentence in the Nebraska state pen and is now a lifetime member of the Sex Offender Registry — but remains a free man otherwise.

Many other survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault also have this hanging over their heads — they may no longer be with their attacker, but the attacker is still free and has the capability of returning to the scene of the crime — maybe even to "finish the job" or whatever threats they may have made.

The young lady in Seward can't live to see the day her attacker is put in prison. And what are the chances her attacker ever gets another day to walk free and potentially repeat his actions?

The penalties for domestic violence and sexual assault in this state are outrageously mild. Even with sexual assault being increased from 5 to 25 years in the past couple of decades, it is still not enough, especially when the perpetrator is of adult age and the victim is a minor.

The criminal justice system needs to be held accountable for allowing these hopeless slugs to continue raping, hurting and killing innocent people. There is simply no room for allowing such behavior to continue in this day and age. Knowing what we now know about the trauma and impact these crimes have on those of us fortunate enough to have survived

these encounters, and knowing that the vast majority of those who commit these crimes can not be rehabilitated, it is long past time that we put some real teeth into bail and sentencing laws for these specific crimes.

The Seward killer needed just \$2500 to be released from custody and wait his court date. Ten percent of your bond is all he needed to get out of jail and follow through on his death threat. For these kinds of crimes, bail should be set high enough that it will be difficult, if not impossible, for these scumbags to get out of custody.

Ten percent of \$2,500? Easy. How about 10 percent of \$10 million? That's right — a cool million gets your sorry self out of the hole. How many of these evil creatures have that much in the bank?

As for sentencing — since Nebraska has a "good time" rule where you get one day taken off for every good day you serve in prison, let's make sure there is enough to work off that the loser likely spends the rest of their life in a cell. Short of a life sentence (which is what those of us who have survived these encounters now enjoy), how about a mandatory minimum of five times their age when the crime is committed? A 40-year-old perpetrator would get a 200-year sentence and be eligible for parole in 100 years.

I'm willing to bet there are a number of survivors here in Dakota County who would be more than happy to never have any chance of coming in contact with their perpetrator for the rest of their lives. The idea of running into my attacker is certainly not on my bucket list of things to do, and it would be more comforting for me to know that likelihood would be down to zero.

Sadly, the gross negligence (or sheer incompetence) of a judge has taken the life of a young woman from this world who never should have had to worry about it in the first place. HOW this could have happened is not near as distressing as the idea that it WILL happen again, and will continue to occur until we finally put some teeth behind our laws and put these wastes of humanity where they belong — in a prison cell.

Sanders took the action in response to an all points bulletin from Sioux City police, who wanted the woman in connection with a shooting in Sioux City. The woman offered no resistance. Allen was charged with murder in connection with the shotgun slaying of her husband in her home Sunday night.

Road work in area on the schedule

One of the concerns that folks living in Legislative District 17 have brought to my attention concerns the poor conditions of the State Highways which pass through Dakota County, Thurston County, and Wayne County.

Indeed, many of these state-owned roads and highways stand in great need of service and repair. Therefore, today I would like to update my readers on plans that have been developed by the Nebraska Department of Transportation (NDOT) to fix some of these problems.

I recently received correspondence from Kevin G. Domogalla, who is the District Engineer for our area in northeast Nebraska. Mr. Domogalla kindly reported to me which projects that NDOT intends to take on this year in the three counties named above. After reading Mr. Domogalla's letter, I was pleased to see that NDOT will be taking on several projects in our area this year.

The first project NDOT is planning concerns State Highway 35. NDOT plans to patch and overlay the highway southwest of the town of Hubbard. Overlaying a roadway means to add a new layer of asphalt to the already-existing road surface. The cost for this project has not yet been determined and NDOT is still working on securing an independent contractor to complete the work. Never-

theless, NDOT plans to get the work done on this road sometime later this year.

The next project concerns State Highway 75. NDOT is planning to rehabilitate the roadway from Macy to Winnebago. Rehabilitating a roadway means restoring the roadway to its near-original condition by repairing cracks, potholes, and uneven surfaces. This project is projected to cost \$7,674,554. An independent contractor has already been secured and work on the highway should begin this year.

NDOT has another project planned for another section of State Highway 75. NDOT plans to resurface the shoulder of State Highway 75 north of the town of Homer. Resurfacing means removing the old surface and replacing it with a new one. This project is projected to cost \$3,326,011. An independent contractor has already been secured and the work should begin sometime this year.

The last project concerns State Highway 77. NDOT is planning to resurface the highway from Lyons to Walthill. Again, resurfacing means that this section of State Highway 77 will receive a new surface. This one is the most expensive of the four projects and is projected to cost \$12,379,940. An independent contractor has already been secured and the work should commence sometime later this year.

Because these four projects all involve state highways and are overseen by NDOT, none of the costs will affect any of our county budgets. Funding for these road projects comes from the State of Nebraska's General Fund. NDOT receives money appropriated for these projects every year through the State of Nebraska's biennial budget. However, we are very fortunate to get this work done in our area this year because the State of Nebraska is currently facing a budgetary shortfall of \$432 million.

Restoring maximum pressure against Iran

The Islamic Republic of Iran is the leading state sponsor of terrorism. They've spent decades funding terror attacks all over the world. Iranian proxies have launched thousands of missiles at Israel. In fact, Iran itself launched the largest ballistic missile attack in history against Israel last year.

Iran doesn't just chant 'death to Israel,' though. They chant 'death to America,' as well. Iranian proxies murdered American servicemembers. They've tried to assassinate President Trump. Their proxies have launched missile attacks against U.S. Navy warships and commercial cargo vessels. Most concerning, they are closer than ever to possessing a nuclear weapon. That would greatly threaten the security of the United States and our allies.

Yet for four years, President Biden chose a policy of appeasing Iran. The Biden administration relaxed sanctions on Iran and enabled them to generate \$100 billion in oil revenue. They unfroze \$6 billion in Iranian assets on the anniversary of 9/11. And they continued to push for a renewed Iran nuclear deal — even though Iran constantly cheated and continued processing nuclear materials under the first deal! Biden's weakness emboldened Iran and made Americans less safe. It led to its increased attacks on Americans and our allies.

President Trump understands that Iran must be deterred. That means using all available tools to impose severe costs on the Iranian regime. President Trump is restoring American strength by reimposing a policy of maximum pressure. I've introduced legislation to help him push

our allies to do the same.

During his first administration, Trump's sanctions drained Iran's foreign reserves from \$122.5 billion to less than \$14 billion. He killed Soleimani, Iran's terrorist Quds Force Commander. And he negotiated the historic Abraham Accords, the Middle East's first peace agreement in 26 years. He should have won the Nobel Peace Prize for the Abraham Accords.

His policies worked. And now, President Trump is doing it again.

Recently, President Trump took executive action to restore maximum pressure against Iran. He directed the Treasury and State Departments to try and drive Iran's oil exports to zero. This will stop their ability to fund terrorism. He also directed our UN Ambassador to pressure our allies to 'complete the snapback of sanctions and restrictions on Iran.'

President Trump's actions will make our country safer. But he can't do it alone. Our allies, including the United Kingdom, France, and Germany, also known as the E3, need to do the same. This week, I introduced legislation pushing our European allies to initiate a snapback of U.N. sanctions on Iran.

These snapback sanctions would include export controls, travel bans,

asset freezes, and other restrictions on those involved in Iranian nuclear and missile activities. My legislation would deliver a strong message to our European allies. They need to step up. They need to do more.

Iran's possession of a nuclear weapon would threaten our security and the security of our allies. Nebraska's Offutt Air Force Base houses U.S. Strategic Command (STRATCOM). STRATCOM plays a critical role in deterring nuclear threats, including those from Iran. A nuclear-armed Iran would directly challenge STRATCOM's mission and the safety of the women and men serving there.

We can't allow that to happen. Snapback sanctions are key to ensuring that President Trump's maximum pressure policy is successful. On the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, I'll continue highlighting the threats posed by our adversaries. I'll continue pushing our allies to honor their commitments. And I'll continue working with President Trump to keep Americans safe.

Homer's girls athletes have had quite a year in high school sports, and are looking to book a trip to Lincoln for next month's Girls State Basketball Championships.

-- Boys basketball subdistricts get started next week, and the records that the four area teams have put together would indicate that their chances of making it to the state tournament are not very good.

But before you attach the cart to that particular horse, allow me to relate a story from my early days in this business.

I covered a small D-2 school in southeast Nebraska many years ago whose reputation as a basketball school was, well, non-existent. The school had not been to a state tournament in 68 years, and after going through an 0-18 regular season, there were no expectations for them to be playing in Lincoln that March.

But a funny thing happened on the way to turning in the uniforms . . . they went on a three-game winning streak, upsetting the top seed in their district in the finals to claim the district title and a trip to the state tournament.

That's right -- 3-18 and playing in Lincoln.

The team had to play the top seed in the eight-team bracket and didn't let the bright lights of Lincoln get in their way. They came out hot and played a solid first half and were in the game until their top scorer fouled out. With their leader sitting on the bench, the Cinderella story came to an end and they lost by 25 points.

They may have ended the season 3-19, HOWEVER -- they got to experience the excitement of playing in the state tournament.

And so, with that being said, here's to all four of the area boys basketball teams in wishing them the best of luck next week. What's happened between opening night in early December and now is no longer important. Everybody starts with a 0-0 record now, and every game is a one-game season -- win and you stay in with a chance to advance to the next round. Run the table in subdistricts, win your district, and it doesn't matter what your regular-season record was -- you're heading to Lincoln for some state tournament basketball.

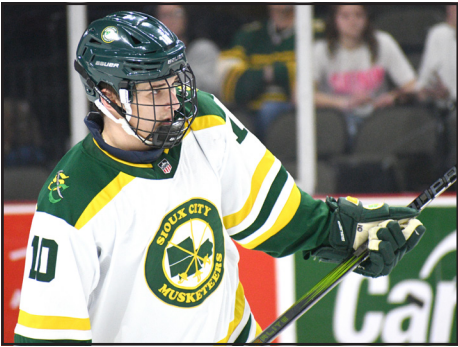
But the Storm tied the contest only a couple

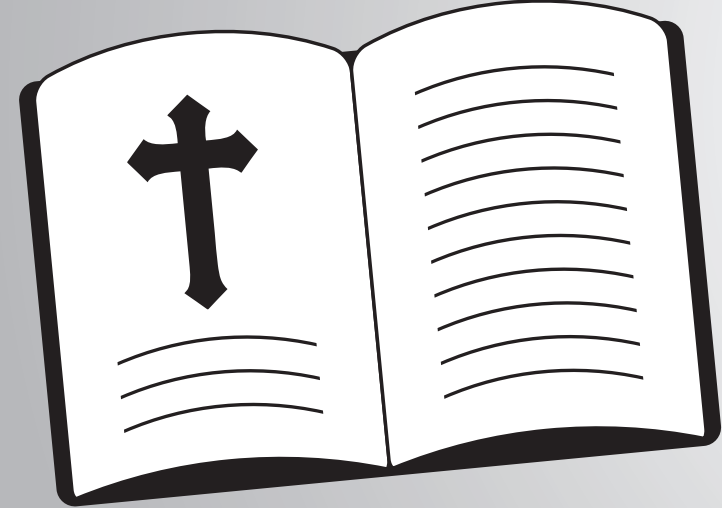
