Solar farm ordinance gets green light

The opportunity to build solar farms in Dakota County was given the green light by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners.

The board voted unanimously to approve a resolution that will allow solar farms to be built within the county after receiving no opposition during a public hearing at Monday's county board meeting.

Only one person spoke in favor of the resolution during the public hearing, as Ethan Frazier with Mission Clean Energy suggested two small changes to the ordinance that did not change the intent of the

Frazier suggested that battery energy storage systems are co-loaced as one system, and to also allow for setbacks to apply to the equipment and not to the zoning district.

Planning and Zoning administrator Joe O'Neill told the board that he had spoke with members of the nine-person board and did not hear any concerns with

The solar overlay district helps promote the use of solar energy in the county as an alternative to fossil fuels. An overlay district must be at least 50 acres and not affect neighboring landowners. The overlay

district would be taxed as a business, and if the property closed out of the solar energy setup, it would return to an agricultural designation without having to rezone.

Incorporating the district overlay would tax that property as a business without affecting the taxing of surrounding landowners, according to minutes from the Fe. 18 meeting of the Dakota County Planning

Also at Monday's meeting, the board heard from Dakota County Treasurer Stephanie Gatzemeyer, who reported on the recent tax sale of more than 300 parcels in the county. She said that 127 properties had their taxes paid up before the sale, and 129 properties were purchased with 48 not getting an offer before the close of the sale.

"We did excellent having only 48 left out of 304 (properties)," she told the board.

Total receipts from the sale were \$236,399.37.

She did add that the 48 properties not sold had a total tax due of \$2,146,004.80. The biggest chunk of that number belongs to the Big Ox Energy property which has sat vacant for several years since the plant closed in 2019.

Support for sexual assault survivors is available here

Sexual assault has long been a problem in the Siouxland area and here in Dakota County.

Staff at Haven House Family Services Center in South Sioux City have seen a notable increase in the number of sexual assault survivors who come through the doors of their new building at 921 B Street, which opened a little more than a year ago.

"They're at an all-time high," said Debbie Goettsch, executive director of the non-profit that has served a five-county region in Northeast Nebraska, including Dakota County, for more than 40 years. "This last

year, I would say 30 percent of our clients are sexual assault victims."

It's long been an issue, but rather than suffer in silence, more survivors are seeking help.

"I think it's always been happening, but we have done a lot more outreach and people know they can go here for help," Goettsch said. Reporting a sexual assault is

never easy for the survivor, and about 3 in 10 assaults go unreported, according to various studies. Of those that are reported, a 2015 National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence survey found that 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men are sexually assaulted between the ages of 11 and 17.

Goettsch said that Haven House helps those who have experienced sexual assault in a variety of ways, from helping file police reports to supporting them through difficult situations like going through the process of a rape kit, which collects DNA evidence from an individual's body that can aid in the identification

Some survivors are willing to share their experiences, but how

much they share varies.

"They don't have to tell in detail and it's up to them how much they want to share. We don't force them to do so," Goettsch said. "If they are willing to talk to law enforcement, we can have the police come to the office and take a statement. After that, we can help them with whatever they need, whether it's going to court to press charges or providing shelter.'

More often than not, survivors of sexual assault know their attacker. Among women, the 2015 survey found that 51.1 percent were attacked by an intimate partner and another 40.8 percent

were by an acquaintance. (For men, 52.4 percent were attacked by an acquaintance and 15.2 percent were by a stranger.) "We're seeing a lot of fam-

ily members or trusted people. The stranger that comes through town doesn't happen as often,' Goettsch added.

Local and county law enforcement in Dakota County have been very supportive in helping Haven House and the court system has prosecuted more sexual assault crimes over the years.

"We have had quite a few people get prosecuted, especially for child sexual assault," Goettsch

Ag producers can still enroll in USDA safety net program

Agricultural producers who have not yet enrolled in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for the 2025 crop year have until April 15 to revise elections and sign contracts.

Both safety net programs, delivered by USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provide vital income support to eligible farmers who experience substantial declines in crop prices or revenues for the 2025 crop year. In Nebraska, producers have completed 74,763 contracts to date, representing 84 percent of the more than 89,474 expected con-

"Agriculture Risk Coverage or Price Loss Coverage programs provide excellent risk protection, for market declines, at no cost to the producer,' said Tim Divis, deputy state executive director for FSA in Nebraska. "If you haven't made your program election or signed a contract, please contact your local FSA county office as soon as possible to set an appointment so you don't miss the April

Producers can elect coverage and enroll in ARC-County or PLC, which provides crop-by-crop protection, or ARC-Individual, which protects the entire farm. Although election changes for 2025 are optional, producers must enroll, with a signed contract, each year. If a producer has a multi-year contract on the farm, the contract will continue for 2025 unless an election change is made.

If producers do not submit their election revision by the April 15 deadline, the election remains

the same as their 2024 election for eligible commodities on the farm. Also, producers who do not complete enrollment and sign their contract by the deadline will not be enrolled in ARC or PLC for the 2025 year and will not receive a payment if one is triggered. Farm owners can only enroll in these programs if they have a share interest in the

Producers are eligible to enroll farms with base acres for the following commodities: barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Center for Agricultural Profitability and Nebraska FSA cooperated on a webinar designed to educate producers on the 2025 ARC/PLC options. Producers are encouraged to use the tool of their choice to support their ARC and PLC elections

Producers are reminded that enrolling in ARC or PLC programs can impact eligibility for some crop insurance products offered by USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA). Producers who elect and enroll in PLC also have the option of purchasing Supplemental Coverage Option (SCO) through their Approved Insurance Provider, but producers of covered commodities who elect ARC are ineligible for SCO on their planted acres.

Unlike SCO, RMA's Enhanced Coverage Op- can contact their local USDA Service Center.

tion (ECO) is unaffected by participating in ARC for the same crop, on the same acres. Producers may elect ECO regardless of their farm program

Agricultural producers visiting FSA to complete ARC/PLC elections and enrollment are encouraged to also conduct other FSA program business during their scheduled appointment, including completing farm loan applications and applying for the recently announced Emergency COmmodity Assistance Program (ECAP).

Sign up for ECAP began on March 19. ECAP, authorized by the American Relief Act, 2025, provides up to \$10 billion to agricultural producers for the 2024 crop year. Administered by FSA, ECAP will help agricultural producers mitigate the impacts of increased input costs and falling commodity prices. Congress gave USDA 90 days to implement the program, and that deadline was met. Producers of eligible commodities must submit ECAP applications to their local FSA county office. by Aug. 15. Only one application is required for all ECAP eligible commodities nationwide. ECAP applications can be submitted to FSA in-person, electronically using Box and One-Span, by fax or by applying online at fsa.usda.gov/ecap utilizing a secure login.gov account. 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

Targeting lab-grown protein in Legislature

In 2008, People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) offered an award of \$1 million to the first scientist who could grow chicken in a laboratory. UPSIDE Foods won that contest and received a patent for their work.

Since that day beef, lamb, pork, shrimp and turkey have all been grown in laboratories. In 2022, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved UPSIDE Foods's lab-grown chicken for human consumption. Additional kinds of meats are getting FDA approval and today it is legal to sell FDA-approved labgrown protein.

The development of lab-grown protein has caused quite a stir. Animal rights activists, such as those at PETA, support it because it saves the lives of animals and reduces the amount of their suffering. Opponents of lab-grown meat complain about the high production costs, microbial contamination, allergens, the lack of adequate testing, the flavor, and unfair competition with farmers and ranchers. Some, including me, would go so far as to say that lab-grown meat is not real meat, and that is why I prefer to call it lab-grown protein.

So, how is lab-grown protein made? First, stem cells are extracted from a live animal. The stem cells are then cultivated in a nutrient-rich mimics the conditions of an animal's body. Finally, the cells are separated and shaped to look like normal meat

and consumption.

The repugnant nature of lab-grown protein is now causing politicians to react with legislation prohibiting its manufacture, sale and import. Italy, for example, has banned the manufacture, sale, and import of all cultivated or lab-grown protein. Alabama, Florida, and Mississippi have all passed legislation banning the sale of lab-grown protein in their states, while Iowa has passed legislation forbidding the labeling of labgrown protein as meat; instead, manufacturers have to use labels such as 'artificial meat,' 'imitation meat,' or 'lab-grown protein.'

Here in Nebraska, Gov. Pillen has targeted lab-grown protein as one of his top legislative priorities for 2025. Gov. Pillen would like to ban the manufacture, sale, and import of labgrown protein in Nebraska. LB 246 amends the Nebraska Pure Foods Act trade practice.

Nevertheless, I will support the effort to ban lab-grown protein in Nebraska with LB 246 for three reasons. First, lab-grown protein undermines Nebraska's agricultural economy. Ag is the engine that drives Nebraska's economy, and Nebraska produces the finest beef, pork and poultry in the country. Second, lab-grown protein has not been sufficiently tested, in my opinion. The fact of the matter is that there are no long-term studies showing the effects of consuming lab-grown protein over long periods of time. Third, lab grown protein is treated with antibiotics and other chemicals to prevent bacteria and disease. Helping President Trump cut your taxes Recently, President Trump re-com-

mitted to eliminating federal income taxes on Social Security benefits. He's also promised to increase support for our veterans. I agree with President Trump. Social Security and veterans' benefits should be completely tax-free. This week, I introduced two bills to help the President deliver on that agenda. My bills will help Americans keep more of their hard-earned money in retirement.

I introduced the Social Security Check Tax Cut Act and the Tax Cuts for Veterans Act. These bills are built on the same common-sense approach we took in Nebraska. This double tax needs to end.

My Social Security Check Tax Cut Act will start phasing out the federal tax on Social Security benefits. It begins with a 10 percent cut in year one and grows to 20 percent in year two. Congress can continue phasing out the tax by 10 percent per year and make Social Security income tax free

Schools should pay for sex crimes

When your child is at school, you would like to think that they would be safe from the evils of the world.

It's bad enough that we've had to worry about school shootings, drugs being brought into school or bullies who seem to torment our children without fear of repercussion. If you've experienced any of those things in your life (especially the bullying), you know what a dreadful experience that is to have to live with on a day-to-day basis every time you walk into a school building.

One would think that, when it comes to keeping our kids safe, we should be able to not have to worry about them being sexually assaulted, whether it's in a classroom, a locker room or on the school bus.

And yet, it seems there are those in our schools who have a problem with being held accountable when one of our kids has been sexually violated by someone at school, whether it's a teacher, or a classmate, or even someone in a position of power within the district.

Nebraska State Sen. Danielle Conrad's priority bill, LB156, holds school districts accountable when someone is sexually assaulted on school property, whether it is in a building, at an event, in a school vehicle or in a vehicle that a school employee is driving.

A Centers for Disease Control study several years ago discovered that 1 in 4 children in the United States experiences sexual assault before their 18th birthday. If you plugged that ratio into the current K-12 enrollment numbers here in the Nebraska, that total would be larger than the 90,000-seat capacity at Memorial Stadium, home of the University of Nebraska football team.

"We're trusting the schools with our vulnerable kids . . . and we expect them to protect (our kids)," the Omaha World-Herald quoted Contrad during a Judiciary Committee hearing last week.

Gov. Jim Pillen vetoed a broader version of the bill in the last term of the Legislature. According to the World-Herald, Pillen claimed it would put a financial burden on taxpayers who might be footing the cost of the misdeeds of those who may not even work for the government.

So what?

If the school district is that lax in properly checking out those who might be working with our children

ing in a vehicle with them, how can we, as parents, possibly feel good about what is happening to our children when they are on a school bus or in a locker room with someone who is looking to prey upon our youth?

> And what about the financial AND emotional impact a family would face if their child was sexually assaulted by the PE coach, or para professional, or the school bus driver? I can say from experience that the impact my sexual assault had on me and my family is something that, even 49 years later, is still felt.

> Conrad is pursuing this bill because the daughter of one of her constituents was sexually assaulted during an event on Lincoln Public Schools property. The family filed a suit against the school, but a judge dismissed the case.

> Many public (and private) schools in this state have long tried to sweep situations like these under the rug and it has come at the expense of the young, innocent lives of our children. It is long past time that the education community in the state of Nebraska take the physical and emotional concerns of our children much more seriously than they claim they are doing. Proposed tobacco tax hike will hurt small businesses, state economy

Here we go again, Nebraska. More taxes to try to influence adults' behavior. I'm talking about new proposed tax increases on many of the things that we all like. Just last week, lawmakers at the state capital introduced a new bill that will increase the price we Nebraskans pay for pop, candy, and cigarettes. Like many convenience store owners, I run a small business. At my store in South Sioux City, I employ nine hard-working people who rely on my business to put food on their family's table. Every day, we all look forward to greeting our customers as they come in to grab snacks, drinks, and possibly tobacco products. It's where people in our community come together. Now, I'm worried again about the state's latest attack on businesses like mine with the new proposed tax hike of 72 cents per pack of cigarettes and new taxes on candy and pop. These changes could really hurt small businesses like mine.

We've been down this road be-

just not how it works. Taxes like these mostly hurt hardworking folks in our community, especially those who earn less. Instead of quitting, they'll drive over to another state, where tobacco and other products are already cheaper.

Not only are lawmakers talking about hiking taxes on cigarettes, candy, and sugary beverages, they're targeting more of the goods I rely on to keep my doors open. In two other bills that lawmakers just introduced, they're going after nicotine pouches and e-cigarettes - two product lines that smokers are using to quit smoking. Legislators want to tax nic pouches by 20 percent and vapes by 40 percent. At the beginning of 2024, they raised the taxes on vapor products very minimally. Most of my customers haven't minded paying a little more. But if the state significantly taxes nic pouches and e-cigs, I can guarantee my customers will bypass my store and head right over the bridge to Sioux City, Iowa where fore; politicians saying higher taxes they don't tax vapor products or nic will help people quit smoking or lead pouches. It won't just be tobacco

healthier lives. But honestly, that's sales that I'll lose. Customers will go to other states to fill up their gas tanks, grab snacks, and do their shopping there instead. That's a lot of lost business, income, and, eventually, jobs for our community.

Plus, Nebraska won't actually gain from these taxes. We'll end up losing money overall. Customers buying across state lines mean less tax revenue for Nebraska, which means fewer dollars going to services we all

There's also the issue of whether these taxes even work. Usually, tobacco users will find cheaper options or buy illegal products instead of quitting. Real solutions should focus on education and support programs. not heavy taxes that punish Nebraskans who can't easily afford them.

I hope Governor Pillen and our state legislators reconsider these proposed tax hikes. Let's invest in solutions that really work, like education and prevention programs, instead of taxes that just end up hurting small businesses and our local economy.
