Bell tower funding falls short

Bradley County Judge Klay McKinney updated the quorum court on the progress of the courthouse bell tower project. The judge told the quorum court he signed a contract to finalize the repairs to the bell tower along with other repairs that are needed. The county is still \$56,000 short to fully fund the project. Efforts were still being made to get the funding needed.

The county also applied for a grant to work on the courthouse clock.

The county applied for two grants for New Beginnings, a non-profit that provides treatment for drug and substance abuse. New Beginnings is part of the 10th judicial district of

southeast Arkansas. The two grants would help them upgrade.

Judge McKinney reported construction to replace a wooden bridge on Bradley 60 was close to completion. There were three wooden bridges left in the county that the judge hoped to replace.

The judge said the trash issue was getting better. The solid waste department lost a driver who went to another job. Judge McKinney said they were struggling with having enough labor.

It was reported there were no findings in the 2020 county audit.

After the meeting, there was a public hearing allowing residents to give ideas on what to use the American Rescue Plan

funds for. One of the justices brought up purchasing a generator for the county courthouse.

Dana Harvey recommended using funds to use the old Martin's lot for public use.

Gregg Reep brought up the old Bryant building could be torn down and used for a variety of things like parking, concerts, and festival activities.

JP Gwen Bullard said the funds should be used to create a place for teenagers to hang out. JP Randy York mentioned the need for sidewalk repairs. JP Bobby Hargrae recommended improving the water supply for the Rural Fire Department.

The next meeting will be at 6 p.m. Monday, September 19 at the courthouse.

Mother of local organ donor shares story for Donor Awareness Month

Just days before his unexpected death, Dwight James Tate spoke his last testimony surrounded by family and friends. "I'm not perfect and I make mistakes, but I always put God first," he said. On February 12, 2018, DJ, a loving father and son, died of a sudden heart attack at age 37.

DJ's mother, Stephanie Farmer Tate Martin, didn't know he was registered as an organ donor when she arrived at the hospital that day. However, after speaking with team members from ARO-RA, Arkansas's largest organ and tissue recovery agency, she learned of DJ's generous decision. "They were able to recover bone tissue, eye tissue and heart valves from DJ after he passed," Martin said. "It brought me comfort that he was able to donate tissues and bless other people."

Martin knows that DJ's corneas were able to restore the sight of two people and his heart valves were recovered and donated to a nine-year-old boy in California.

DJ had one daughter, LaDonna, who was just 13 at the time of his passing. Besides spending quality time with LaDonna and working at Riceland Foods in Stuttgart, he managed several other interests, from rapping and producing music with friends to selling scented oils.

"DJ was very charismatic, passionate, and a stick of dynamite," Martin said. "He was

real loving, caring, and kind. He was very affectionate. He was really creative."

DJ was fearless, his mother said, and he trusted and believed in God. DJ was known to share biblical scripture with his friends from an early age, and even went out of his way to help spread the message among unhouseed people and others facing challenges and difficulties; fitting for a man who never met a stranger.

DJ's story of an unexpected heart attack is tragic, yet not unheard of for many African Americans. People who are members of communities of color often face disproportionately higher rates of diabetes, high blood pressure and heart disease that contribute to organ failure, especially kidney failure, pronouncing the need for organ donation and transplants.

August is National Minority Donor Awareness Month (NMDAM). It was founded in 1996 by the National Minority Organ Tissue Transplant Education Program (MOTTEP), bringing heightened awareness to donation and transplantation in multicultural communities. NMDAM focuses primarily on African American, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander and Native American communities.

Of the more than 100,000 people awaiting a life-saving organ transplant, nearly 60% are from multicultural communities. Transplants can be

successful regardless of the ethnicity of the donor and recipient. However, the chance of longer-term survival may be greater if the donor and recipient are closely matched in terms of their shared genetic background.

Martin says she now realizes how registering as an organ and tissue donor can help save and restore lives.

"Registering as a donor means giving life to someone in need," Martin said. "If you're not already registered as a donor, be a light and save a life."

At his memorial service, DJ's friends serenaded him with the gospel hymn "This Little Light of Mine," as an ode to DJ and all the lives he touched. Everyone can follow DJ's example and let their light shine during National Minority Donor Awareness Month by registering as an organ and tissue donor.

Arkansans can register to become an organ and tissue donor when renewing their driver's license at their local DMV office. However, a trip to the DMV doesn't happen every day so ARO-RA offers two other convenient registration options. Arkansans can log onto www.donatefearkansas.org to register online. Or, they can log onto the ARO-RA website at www.arora.org/kiosk to locate a donor registration kiosk where they can register in a matter of seconds.

The missing individual was last known to be at 343 Bradley 28 in Hermitage.

In a statement on Facebook, the sheriff's office, on behalf of the family, thanked everyone for the assistance in the search for McDougald. They stated he was en route to his home.

Oldtimer's Notebook

The publishers of The Eagle Democrat have chosen to publish articles from the past Oldtimer's Notebook in memory of Robert L. Newton. This article was first published July 5, 2000.

Several Bradley County oldtimers have left us, plus the prominent Texas businessman, Wilton Fair, of Tyler, whose late son, Bart, married the Rev. Dr. Fairfax Fullerton Fair of Warren.

Dr. Fair now pastors a nice-sized Presbyterian Church in Houston: her son, only grandson of the Fairs and also of Dr. Fair's parents, too, will be entering Tulane this fall as an engineering student.

Elmer Clarence Lane, residing in Hattiesburg, Miss., in retirement to be near his younger daughter, has succumbed at 90.

Elmer was a lumberman, a son of the Wade Lains, Warren, who attended Park College, was an educator, and later was in lumbering both here and at Fordyce.

Elmer had a room at the old YMCA and he kept the "Y" open on Friday nights while my late parents could take their corpulent little son to the picture show.

Rufus Lain was his brother. And we hear Eddie Lovett,

He named his sons Sophocles, for the Greek philosopher, and Yuri Gararin, for the first man in space (a Russian cosmonaut).

Eddie Lovett gained national attention when his library burned.

Charles Kuralt of CBS TV visited him and did a national TV story.

One of the hundred of book donors to him after the fire was the Rev. Dr. Theodore Hesburgh, president of Notre Dame University.

Eddie was not popular with some folks: he apparently was perfectly happy to live on a government check and to put the pressure on the schools three decades ago to give his kids what he considered a quality education.

Eddie's life was not glorious, unvarnished success: one of his sons got in a scrape with the law and was sent to Cummins State Prison Farm near Grady.

Eddie wrote touchingly about his son and his feelings for him.

Reminded one of King David's lament over Absalom, who had made bad choices.

Eddie was a perfervid writer of "letters to the editor".

Laughingly, the late Dr. Hugh Moseley used to refer to

Dick Bullard came to Arkansas from the concern's facilities in Idaho.

He is a strong family man and a leader in the Monticello stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. Dick and Sarah Bullard have seen three of their six youngsters graduate from Warren High: one of their daughters graduates from UA Monticello in December.

Several of their youngsters have attended Brigham Young University in Utah.

Dick Bullard himself is an engineering graduate of Washington State University of Pullman, Washington.

He was no stranger to the South when the family came here a number of years ago: he had operated a major lumbering concern at Bruce, Miss., near the site of Ole Miss, for several years.

He still drives a modest little car bought a decade ago and more at Calhoun City, Miss., next town over from Bruce.

At 58, Mr. Bullard says he "can retire" but doesn't want to yet.

The Bullard home on Bradley Road has a "for sale" sign in front.

A strong advocate of fitness, Dick Bullard arises before dawn and runs through town and down South Main to the bypass, then eastward to Church Street and back home. Daily.

Pretty good for a man of 58, with all his responsibilities.

His picture was published on page one of this newspaper when he came almost a decade ago. The man in the picture was essential Dick Bullard: modest, fit, no necktie, no sport coat.

"Looks like the kind of feller you all need", observed a Potlatch oldtimer, retired, to his sons, who would later take early retirement themselves.

All business: Richard Bullard.

All business, with an up-front touch: what you saw is what you got in this modest son of the Pacific Northwest.

Dick Bullard replaced E.R. Akerman as head of the concern's lumbering operations in the area: Mr. Akerman, retired now in Florida, had the same sort of fate as did the Warren man.

Seems like heading major industry here can be uncomfortable: the highly respected

Calvin Heird, head of what once was Sykes Flooring, had the same sort of fate a number of weeks ago.

Well, life goes on: we hear some of those displaced at Potlatch are absolutely delighted with the generous severance pay given them.

Coming home from Europe, the airline (Delta) favored us with TV images of the exact location of our plane at any

given time.

Once, flying into Atlanta, we passed over Lynchburg, Va., where two former Presbyterian pastors in Warren, Arthur Fogartie and John T. Mabray, now pastor churches.

And we went over Gainesville, Ga., site of Riverside Academy, where the late J.T. Ederington III and the late John Clay Burch were once students.

Coach Hembree speaks at rotary club

The Rotary Club of Warren met Tuesday, August 16 for its weekly meeting inside the Fellowship Hall at First United Methodist Church. Rotarian Bob Milton presented the program and continued his annual tradition of having Warren High School Head Football Coach Bo Hembree speak about the upcoming season.

Coach Hembree began by mentioning the Junior Jacks scrimmaged at Little Rock Central Monday night and came away with a 12-0 win after a 30-minute light-

ning delay. He spoke briefly about last season's team and some of the players they will miss before he transitioned into talking about the 2022 squad, which begins play with a scrimmage at home against Little Rock Central Thursday night at 7 p.m. The regular season begins Aug. 26 with a home game against Stuttgart.

Coach Hembree stated the Lumberjacks have 11 seniors, most of which will have big roles on this year's team and said they have 42 players on the roster, which is the most

around 15 years. He believes the defense will be the strength of the team and is ahead of the offense at this juncture.

However, he's excited about what the offense will become as the season goes along and is excited about some younger players on that side of the ball. The team also has three-year letterwinners returning at kicker and punter.

Coach Hembree briefly spoke about the conference and how unique it is to have a nine-team conference instead

of eight as former conference foe McGehee was added but no teams left the league.

The Lumberjacks will play eight games in the 8-4A and only two non-conference contests and Coach Hembree also explained that they had to redraw the league schedule which is why the Lumberjacks are making some of the same trips two years in a row and hosting some of the same teams for two years in a row. He concluded the presentation by answering a few questions from the group.

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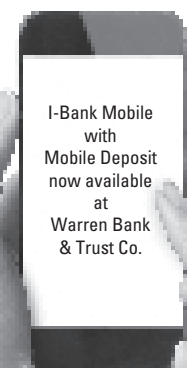

Bradley County receives safety award from AAC

The Association of Arkansas Counties (AAC) awarded its annual safety awards during its 54th annual conference, held Aug. 10-12, 2022, in Hot Springs/Garland County. The Safety Award Program was established by the AAC to recognize those counties that have made outstanding efforts to provide a safe working environment for employees. Each county is evaluated annually based upon a 100-point grading system, with the possibility of 15 bonus points for qualifying counties. Those counties receiving a grade of 75 to 115 points are presented a safety award. Counties that are under the Worker's Compensation Rule 32 Hazard Program do not qualify for a safety award, nor will

they qualify if the Loss Ratio is 50 percent or above. The loss ratio calculation is based on 2021. The 30 counties receiving 2022 AAC safety awards were: Baxter, Benton, Boone, Calhoun, Clay, Conway, Craighead, Drew, Garland, Greene, Hempstead, Hot Spring, Howard, Izard, Johnson, Lincoln, Miller, Ouachita, Pope, Prairie, Pulaski, Randolph, Saline, St. Francis, Stone, Van Buren, Washington, White, Woodruff, and Yell counties. In addition, three counties received a certificate for no reportable injuries in 2021. They were Bradley, Drew, Lee, Lincoln, and Prairie counties. Arkansas History Minute

The early years of the United States includes tales of many daring explorers. One of these figures was Benjamin Louis Eulalie de Bonneville, a Frenchman by birth who immigrated to the United States and eventually made Arkansas his home. Bonneville gave Americans a much clearer view of the Rocky Mountain West thanks to his travels in the 1830s.

Benjamin Bonneville was the son of a publisher and born in Paris, France, in 1796. In 1803, the family immigrated to New York. The family was close friends with Thomas Paine, the outspoken essayist who inspired countless Americans during the Revolutionary War. Paine had encouraged the family to come to the United States and paid for their voyage to their new home. Upon his death in 1809, Paine established a trust fund for Bonneville and his sister for their education.

Bonneville graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York, in 1815. He served at various army posts, including Fort Smith. In 1824, he was transferred to Fort Gibson, which was at that time in the Arkansas Territory but now located in northeastern Oklahoma.

Curious about the largely unexplored lands of Oregon and the Far West, he took a leave of absence from the army and led an exploratory expedition in 1832. The force of 110 men was financed by private investors. The explorers left Missouri in May, eventually trekking along the Platte River in present-day Nebraska and into Wyoming and Idaho. He took careful note of the different geologic formations along the way as well as the wildlife and fauna of the region.

He sent one part of scouts under Joe Walker to the southwest to search for an overland route to California. This party went into northern Utah and Nevada and discovered what came to be known as the California Trail, later a major route for pioneers heading west during the California Gold Rush. Walker's team encountered Great Salt Lake and the dry, ancient lakebed that Great Salt Lake once encompassed on a larger scale which was later named Lake Bonneville. The field of salts covering the desert floor mark what was once the lake itself and is now called the Bonneville Salt Flats.

Along the way, Bonneville encountered several different Native American tribes, often trading with them for supplies and employing several as guides. He made it as far as eastern Washington. In the winter of 1834, he and his party stayed with a band of Nez Perce near the Salmon River who helped them survive the difficult season. The next spring, the party returned to Missouri.

In 1837, he worked with famed writer Washington Irving and published his journals as *The Adventures of Captain Bonneville*. During the Mexican War, he served with Gen. Winfield Scott in his campaign to take Mexico City and was part of the occupation force of the Mexican capital. By 1855, he was promoted to colonel and took command of different posts in the New Mexico Territory.

He initially retired in 1861, but the eruption of the Civil War led him to return to the army. He was promoted to the rank of general and put in charge of recruiting Union troops in Missouri. He retired for the final time in 1866.

Bonneville spent the last years of his life in Fort Smith. He died in 1878. His name appears often across Arkansas and the nation, including a number of schools in the West. The community of Booneville in Logan County was named in his honor. Bonneville County, Idaho, was also named after the general. In 1962, the Fort Smith School District named Bonneville Elementary School after him.



Senate Week in Review from Ben Gilmore, Senator

Arkansas has begun the process of expanding Medicaid services so that more pregnant women can qualify for the government health care program.

The expanded services should be available to thousands of women by the beginning of next year, if the federal government approves the proposals submitted by the state Human Services Department.

About 5,000 women with high-risk pregnancies would become eligible for home visits by a nurse. The visits would be available after the baby is born, for up to 60 days.

About 450 visiting nurses now help expectant mothers enrolled in Medicaid. Last year they helped 1,913 Arkan-

sas families.

Home visits reduce the risks of long-term health problems for the newborn baby and they improve the health of the mother. In high-risk pregnancies they lower the need for intensive care for newborns, which saves the state Medicaid program enormous sums of money.

Home visits can help new mothers cope with anxiety and mood disorders. They also offer advice about breast feeding and answer questions about lactation.

The state will also seek federal approval to expand the range of services that pregnant mothers can receive. That will help some mothers who now only qualify for Medicaid services directly related to their pregnancy.

The department is seeking federal approval to offer full Medicaid coverage to all pregnant women in the program. This would make about 2,000 women eligible for a full range of medical care, including care for behavioral health

problems.

DHS officials also announced that they would request an increase in the department budget next year so it can increase payments to foster parents. Many foster families now receive \$455 a month for food and shelter for children in foster care.

Many children are in provisional foster care with relatives, or a close friend of the family. Those placements are considered provisional for the time it takes to place them with a foster family. That period of time can be a month to six months.

Beginning in September, the department will pay \$240 a month during the period in which the child is in provisional care. The governor expressed his hope that in the 2023 regular session the legislature would increase the amount of provisional payments.

There were 4,520 Arkansas children in foster care in June.

State officials are working to provide more resources

for pregnant women because they expect an increase in the number of unplanned pregnancies in Arkansas. Earlier this year, the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that overturned *Roe vs. Wade* triggered a state law that immediately prohibited almost all abortions in Arkansas.

The state Health Department is implementing a service called the Pregnancy and Parenting Resource Call Line. People can call 1-855-ARK-MOMS to get information about the availability of resources in their area that benefit pregnant women.

That's also 1-855-275-6667.

The call line will provide information about health care services, prenatal and postnatal care, adoption and foster care, child care assistance, mental health care, how to apply for a job, how to get treatment for addictions, how to sign up for welfare and food stamps and how to get tested for sexually transmitted diseases.

Wardlaw Weekly Column

As Arkansas students head back to school, we want to take this week to remind drivers to be mindful of student safety when approaching school buses.

It is estimated that close to 350,000 students in our state ride a bus to school. Those buses make stops in every community.

It is illegal to pass a stopped school bus whenever its red

lights are flashing, as students are present. The fines, penalties and punishment for anyone found guilty of illegally passing a stopped school bus were increased dramatically by Act 2128 of 2005, also known as Isaac's Law.

The legislation was named in honor of Isaac Brian, an elementary school student in the Bryant School District who was struck and killed when a driver illegally passed his school bus while students were exiting the vehicle.

The law requires drivers to stop on 2 lane and 4 lane highways in both directions, even those with a middle

lane. Drivers cannot attempt to pass in any direction until the school bus vehicle has finished receiving or discharging its passengers and is in motion again.

In the 2021 Regular Session, the General Assembly passed Act 264 to clarify the distance and areas where drivers must stop.

It states drivers must come to a complete stop no less than 30 feet from the bus when it stops to load or unload passengers. This 30 feet perimeter would apply to public roads, private or public property open to the general public, and any driveway

or parking lot belonging to a public school.

Arkansans should also remember that the use of handheld wireless phones are prohibited in a school zone. In 2019, the General Assembly passed legislation making the use of a handheld phone in school zones a primary offense.

Every one of us has a responsibility to ensure students arrive to and from school safely.

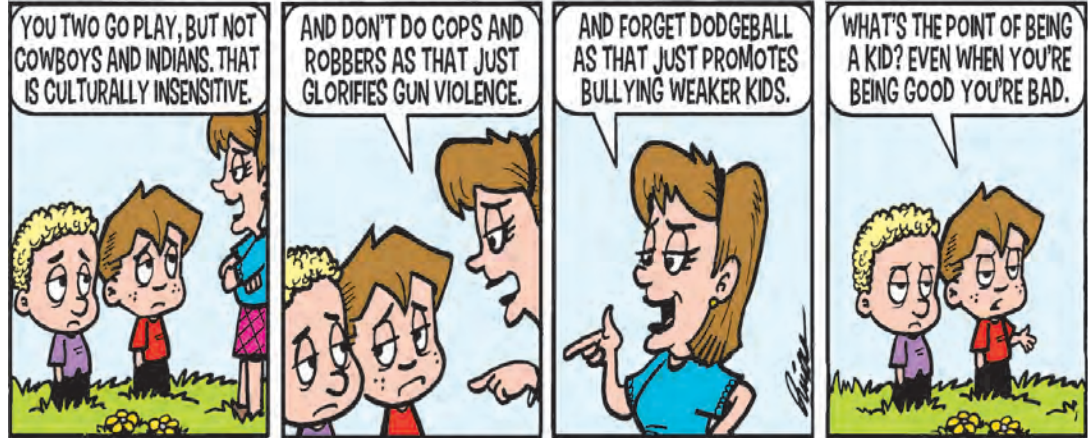

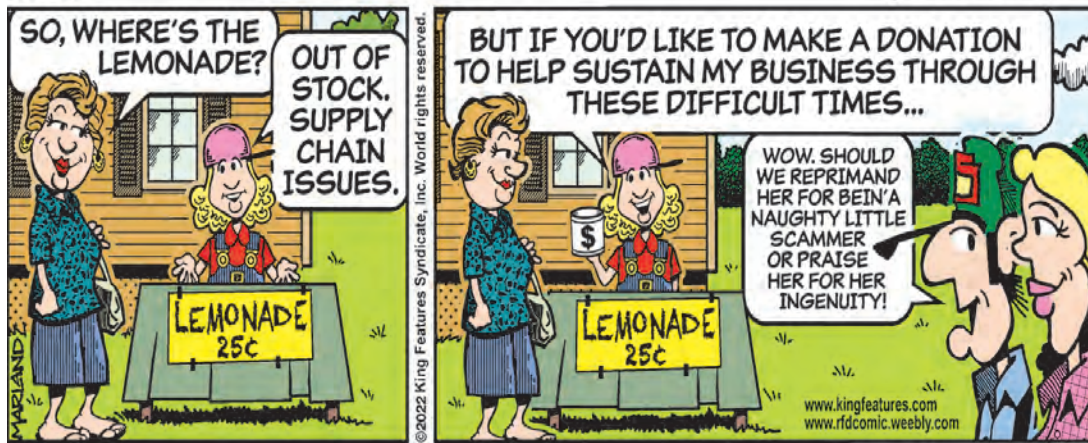

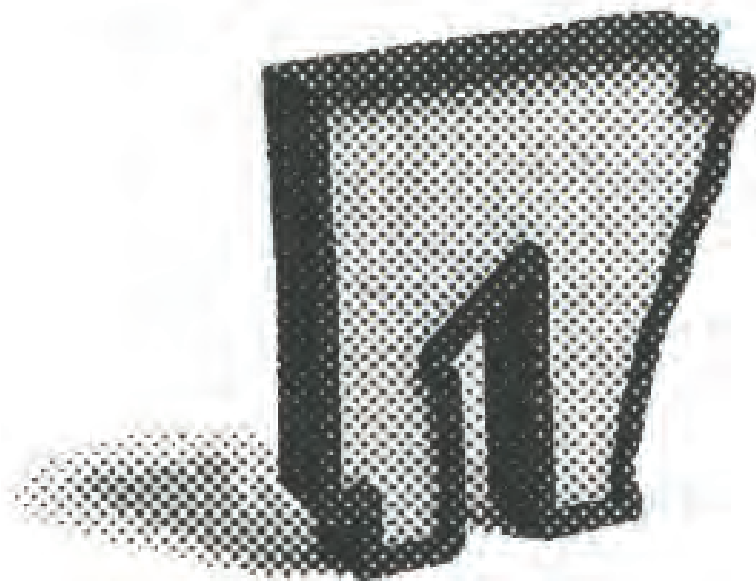

Coach Hembree said he's excited about the sophomore players coming in.

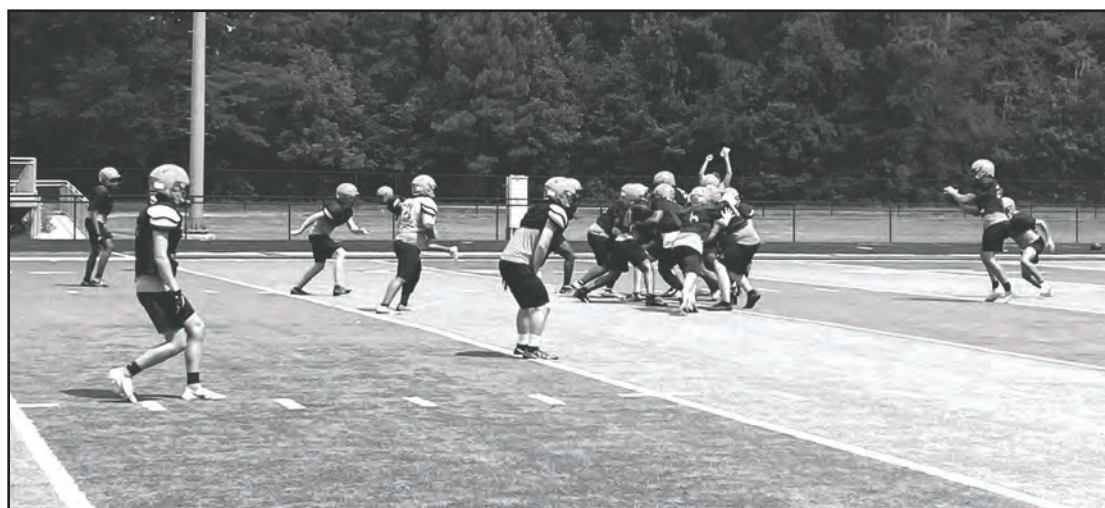
