# Gregg Reep wins Warren election, Hermitage election leads to runoff

(Editor's Note: The numbers are from the unofficial results that were released)

Former Warren mayor, and soon to be mayor, Gregg Reep received the majority votes in the mayoral election for Warren. Reep received 788 total votes, Wayne "Poke Chop" White received 153 votes, and Carlos Yepes received 140 total votes. There was a total of 1,081 votes cast for Warren mayor.

In the Hermitage mayoral race, Mayor Tonya Kendrix received 34 votes, Matthew Cathey received 28 votes, and Karla Ramos had 28 votes. There were 85 votes for the Hermitage mayoral race. However, due to lack of total votes, there will be a runoff election on December 6 against Mayor Kendrix and Cathey.

For Warren City Council, Joel Tolefree received the majority votes in Ward 1, Position 2 against Jimmy Domineck. Tolefree received 206 votes and Domineck received 126 votes.

Tolefree also received the majority vote for Warren School Board Zone 2 with 134 votes against Angela Marshall with 127 votes.

The majority of residents voted "against" the 41.50 Mills Warren School Tax with 1,099 votes and 812 votes "for" the tax.

Representative Jeff Wardlaw received the majority vote in the

county with 1,198 total votes. His opponent, Curley Jackson, received 654 total votes in Bradley County. Rep. Wardlaw won re-election with 63 percent, or 5,163 votes, and Jackson received 37 percent, or 3,017 votes.

"I am so humbled by the support I received from our voters in Tuesday's election," said Rep. Wardlaw. "I feel very blessed. I also want to thank my family and friends for all of their help. I certainly could not have been successful without them. I promise to work hard every day to make Southeast Arkansas a good place to call home and represent you to the best of my abilities at the State Capitol."

Rep. Bruce Westerman received the majority votes in Bradley County with 1,806 and he also won re-election in the district with 71 percent, or 153,677 votes. His opponents were John White and Gregory Maxwell. White received 707 votes in Bradley County and 26 percent, or 56,647 votes in the district. Maxwell received 58 votes in Bradley County and only three percent, or 6,086 votes in the district.

In Bradley County, Rep. John Boozman received 1,823 votes, his opponents Kenneth Cates received 63 votes and Natalie James received 729 votes. Rep. Boozman received 66 percent of the votes in the state,

or 590,068 votes. James received 31 percent of the votes, or 277,726 votes. Cates had three percent of the votes, or 28,590 total votes. Rep. Boozman also won re-election.

For governor, Republican candidate Sarah Huckabee Sanders won the gubernatorial race with 63 percent of the votes in the state, or 568,849 votes. In Bradley County, Sanders received 1,763 votes. Her Democrat opponent, Chris Jones, received 35 percent of the votes in the state, or 316,607 total votes. Jones received 845 votes in Bradley County.

Tim Griffin received 68 percent of the state votes for Attorney General, or 603,398 total votes. In Bradley County, He received 1,793 votes. His opponent, Jesse Gibson, received 32 percent of the state votes, or 278,705 total votes. In the county, he had 775 votes. Griffin won the majority vote.

Dennis Milligan won the Auditor of State election with 67 percent, or 592,849 votes in the state. In Bradley County, he received 1,799 votes. His opponent, Diamond Arnold-Johnson, received 29 percent of the votes in the state, or 255,842 votes and 729 votes in Bradley County.

Tommy Land won his re-election as Commissioner of State Lands with 69 percent of the state vote, or 609,314 total votes. He had 1,802

votes in Bradley County. Darlene Goldi Gaines, his opponent, received 31 percent of the state votes, or 275,372 votes. In Bradley County, she had 729 votes.

Leslie Rutledge won the Lieutenant Governor election with 64 percent of the total votes in Arkansas, or 575,088 votes. In Bradley County, she had 1,795 votes for her. Kelly Ross Krout, her opponent, received 32 percent of the state votes, or 286,212. She had 740 votes in Bradley County. Her other opponent, Frank Gilbert, had four percent of the state votes, or 33,021 and 74 votes in Bradley County.

John Thurston won the Secretary of State election against Anna Beth Gorman. Thurston had 67 percent of the state votes, or 597,806. In Bradley County, Thurston had 1,824 votes. Gorman had 33 percent, or 292,488, of the state votes and 764 votes in Bradley County.

Mark Lowery won the State Treasurer election against Pam Whitaker with 66 percent of the state votes, or 590,322 votes. He had 1,806 votes in Bradley County. Whitaker received 34 percent of the state votes, or 299,089 votes, and 784 votes in Bradley County.

In the State Supreme Court Associate Justice Position 2 election, Robin Wynne won with 58 percent of the votes, or 447,664 total

votes. In Bradley County she had 1,697 votes. Her opponent, Chris Carnahan, had 42 percent of the votes, or 319,310 total votes and 708 votes in Bradley County.

Arkansans voted on four issues in this election. None of the issues were passed.

Issue 1, an issue about special sessions, did not pass in the state with 61 percent voting "no" and 39 percent voting "yes". In Bradley County, 879 voters were "for" and 1,623 were "against".

For Issue 2, an issue on reforming certain measures to voters, 59 percent voted "no" and 41 percent voted "yes". Bradley County citizens had 1,033 votes "for" and 1,505 votes "against".

For Issue 3, known as the "Arkansas Religious Freedom Amendment", it was a 50/50 split, but 439,003 voted "no" and 431,525 voted "yes". Bradley County had 1,334 votes "for" and 1,228 votes "against".

For Issue 4, that would legalize recreational use of marijuana, 56 percent of the state voted "no" and 44 percent voted "yes". In Bradley County, there were 939 votes "for" and 1,676 votes "against".

There are 5,292 registered voters in Bradley County, with 2,654 casting their vote. The voter turnout in Bradley County was 50.15 percent.

Reminiscing from the past . . .  
Oldtimer's Notebook

The publishers of The Eagle Democrat have chosen to publish articles from the past Oldtimer's Notebook in memory of Robert L. Newton. This article was first published September 27, 2000.

THE EAGLE DEMOCRAT is publishing the news that a onetime schoolboy employee of the late Curtis Hurley had given \$1.2 million dollars to the University of Missouri to establish a teaching chair in Curtis Hurley's honor.

Curtis published the Morrilton DEMOCRAT from 1929 to 1952 and his death.

Curtis Hurley was the second son of a Monticello native Joe Hurley who came to Warren to reside with his sister, Mrs. Charles W. Hankins.

The Hurley men, his sons, were short-lived: Laurence Hurley died at 62; Curtis Hurley at 56; Joe Boyd Hurley (he brought in the Shuler Oil Field near El Dorado and became an automatic multi-millionaire) at age 41; Jim Hurley, Sr. at 54; and Wallace at 77.

Curtis Hurley was said to be a man of amazing rectitude and Godliness.

All this seems to have rubbed off on the teenage Ed McLaughlin, who provided that dramatic gift to the University of Missouri.

Of the Hurley children, one survives. This is Mary Hurley Gray Lee of far-away Estherville, Iowa, who taught the Oldtimer in grade two.

In 1936-37, "Miss Mary" took her second graders to what they was called the new city hall here: all the kids had

a chance to slide down the pole from the second-story quarters of the firechief.

"Who all slid down the pole", the Oldtimer's parents asked.

Innocently, the little boy, now age 71, said: "Everybody but me and Miss Mary". The parents liked that...

Great-grandson of Eula and Joe Hurley is the Rev. Dr. Edwin Gray Hurley, pastor of a huge Presbyterian Church in Bowling Green, Kentucky, where our eldest and her family now reside.

Ed Hurley is the son of Joe Hurley, now of Fayetteville, and his wife, Mary Jane Gray, a cousin to the late Alice Appleton.

He pastored First Church of Monroe, La. prior to going to Bowling Green.

At the Kentucky city, his church was founded in 1819. Dr. Hurley bears a strong resemblance to his cousin, Attorney Robert Laurence Roddey, Little Rock.

The Kentucky pastor has twin sons who are high school gridders: that and a daughter, too.

Dr. Hurley owns an elegant education: Vanderbilt, Princeton (where he followed Arthur Fogartie) and Fuller of California for a doctorate.

The Kentucky pastor took part in Mrs. Appleton's funeral here a number of months ago.

Noted that Margaret Potter O'Hara has succumbed. She was the daughter of the Warren School Superintendent Finis Potter,

## Arkansas History Minute

Hattie Caraway was not going to stay quiet. Her husband dead only a few months and already having had to fight an election to keep his seat in the United States Senate, the nation's only woman Senator was determined not to be ignored and pushed aside.

Her husband of 29 years, Thaddeus Caraway, was popular congressman and US Senator from northeastern Arkansas. Hattie Caraway had proudly stood by his side as his career advanced and was heartbroken by his sudden death by a heart attack on Nov. 6, 1931. One week later, Gov. Harvey Parnell appointed her as interim US Senator, not expecting she would seek a full term.

She assumed office on December 8, overwhelmed by the events that had transformed her life in just a few short weeks. The appointment of widows to political offices was not without precedent. It had happened at the local level fairly often in the late 1800s, even for such offices as sheriff. It was considered a show of respect for the deceased but also an opportunity to help a widow make a living for her surviving family in a time before pensions.

Rebecca Felton of Georgia had been the first woman to serve in the U. S. Senate, serving only for a day in 1922. When Hattie Caraway arrived, she was the only woman in the chamber.

Caraway and her husband had made a formidable political couple in Jonesboro for many years. They were both former teachers and like-minded reformers. Where Thaddeus Caraway was outspoken, Hattie Caraway chose her words carefully. She understood that most of the Senate's decisions were made in powerful committee meetings and quiet discussions with individual senators. She was careful not to try to upstage anyone. This perplexed many members of the media who had dismissed her as "Silent Hattie" for her lack of speeches in the Senate.

She won the election to serve the remainder of her husband's Senate term in January with little trouble. In May, the all-important Democratic Primary would be held for the next term. It was the presidential election year of 1932 in the midst of the Great Depression. Several men were anxious to move into the Senate, and many expected Caraway to simply step aside. Caraway, while she presided over the Senate one day, instead announced she would seek a full term.

Arkansas had been slightly ahead of the rest of the nation with women's rights. In 1917, Arkansas allowed women to vote in the Democratic primaries, which essentially decided almost every state and local election in those days. Now the state had appointed the second woman ever to the United States Senate, but no woman had ever been elected to that body. This was an age in which many Americans were still opposed to women even voting and many colleges still blocked the enrollment of women.

Women came forward across the state to support Caraway. She established nurseries at rallies so women could hear her speeches and not have to worry about child care. The popular Louisiana Sen. Huey Long campaigned energetically with her in the week before the election, adding to her credibility. She would win 68 counties and win the general election easily.

As a senator, she backed many reforms. She also supported Prohibition, determined to end the problems of overdoses, deadly accidents by drunken husbands, and though it was still only discussed in hushed whispers, domestic violence. She would also be the first woman to chair a Senate committee. She was re-elected in 1938, narrowly winning the primary against future Senator John L. McClellan. In 1943, she would be the first woman member of Congress to co-sponsor the Equal Rights Amendment, determined that the rights of women should be forever protected. The amendment, however, would not pass Congress until 1972 before it went on to an uncertain ratification process with the states.

She lost re-election in 1944, losing to U. S. Rep. J. William Fulbright. Though three other women had briefly joined her as Senators during her tenure, she was the only woman in the Senate when she left. However, by choosing to run for election on her own – and winning twice – she opened the door for other women in the future.

In 1945, President Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed her to serve on the Employees' Compensation Commission, a position she would serve in until 1950. She died at her home in Virginia in December 1950 at age 72. In 2022, twenty-four women now serve in the US Senate, thanks in part to the quiet Arkansas woman who stayed silent no more.



Senate Week in Review from Ben Gilmore Senator

Funds are now available from the settlement of a massive lawsuit against opioid distributors, and will be awarded to projects that have demonstrated effectiveness in combating the abuse of painkillers.

The Arkansas Opioid Recovery Partnership has set up a website with information about how to apply. It has an advisory board that will review applications. The Partnership's director previously served as state Drug Director for five years.

The Partnership is a combined effort of the Arkansas Association of Counties and the Arkansas Municipal League, which joined in the litigation against opioid dis-

tributors.

Arkansas was awarded \$216 million in the settlement. That money will be divided evenly between cities, counties and the state and will be gradually paid out over the next 18 years. The settlement was announced a year ago, after four years of litigation that resulted in a \$26 billion settlement that will be distributed nationally.

So far, Arkansas has received about \$10 million from the first stage of the settlement. At a recent news conference the Partnership director said that more settlements with other pharmaceutical companies may increase the total amount Arkansas gets from lawsuits over opioid sales.

The dispensing rate for opioids is very high in Arkansas. In Arkansas in 2022, for every 100 people in the state more than 80 prescriptions were filled. That is an improvement over 2018, when more than 93 prescriptions for painkill-

ers were prescribed for every 100 Arkansas residents.

The dispensing rate was even higher in some counties. In 2018, in Garland County 126 prescriptions were dispensed for every 100 residents.

The number of people who have died from an overdose increased from 180 in 2019 to 261 in 2020 and 371 in 2021.

The fatal overdoses are not caused just by abuse of illegal drugs, but are commonly from abuse of legal prescriptions. Arkansas is second in the nation, behind Alabama, in the overprescribing of prescription opioids.

After states and local governments joined in lawsuits against major drug companies, the prescribing of opioids tapered off between 2012 and 2020, when dispensing rates fell to the lowest level in 15 years.

However, even after the decline, 3.6 percent of all counties in the United States had a dispensing rate of more than

one prescription of painkiller for each resident in the county.

Nationwide, the dispensing rate has gone down from a peak in 2012 of 81.3 prescriptions for every 100 people. In 2020 the national rate was 43.3 prescriptions for every 100 people.

One announced goal of the Partnership is to make Naloxone more available among first responders and groups that work to abate opioid abuse. It is a drug that reverses the effects of an overdose.

The 12-member advisory board includes a school board president, a county judge, a mayor, a physician whose specialty is pain medicine, a retired police chief, sheriff, a grant writer, staff and former staff of opioid abatement projects and an attorney knowledgeable about the settlement of the opioid lawsuit.

The board also has representatives from the Municipal League and the Association of Arkansas Counties.

No one day of observation is equal to the sacrifice of those who put their lives on the line to defend the freedoms that we sometimes take for granted. While we celebrate this Veterans Day, we can look back to just earlier this week

when we were able to practice one of our special freedoms.

Election Day is a critical time in our democracy that decides the coming future of our country. We are free today to have a say in our democracy because of the hundreds of thousands of men and women who have stood against dark times.

As Governor, it is important to say thank you, and God bless our men and women who have served and those who continue to serve. We are forever in your debt.

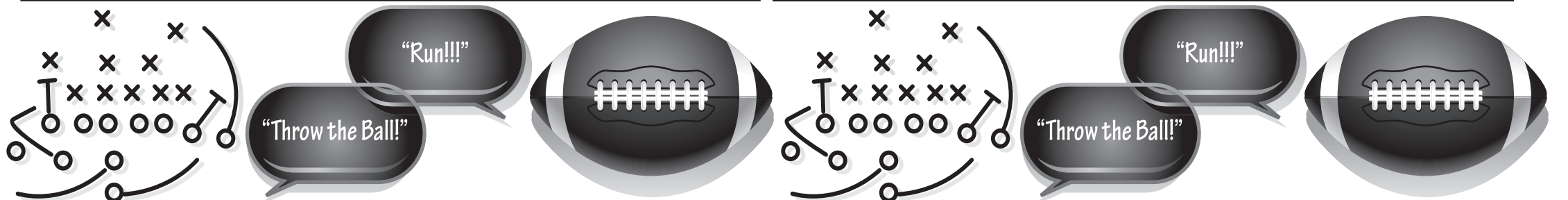

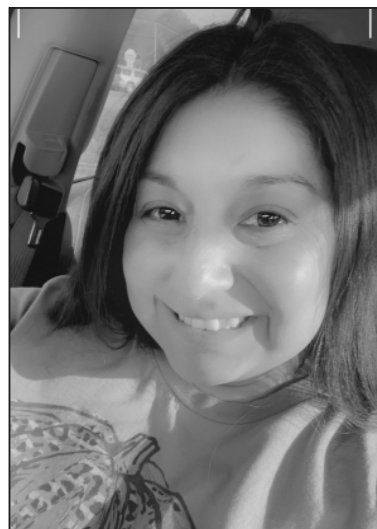

With three minutes left in the second quarter, Lassiter made a 13-yard pass to Ervin

Rivera, who made it to the end zone for another touchdown.

The kick by Jacinto was good, giving the Lumberjacks 21-8.

Later, with only a few seconds left in the first half, the Chickasaws intercepted the ball close to their end zone and ran a few yards for the touchdown. The receiver was tackled by one of the Lumberjacks at the end zone, but the touchdown was good.

However, the Chickasaws attempt at a two-point conversion was no good.

The Lumberjacks ended the first half in the lead with 21-14.

In the third quarter, the Chickasaws' offense made a big play from their two-yard line and running the ball to the Lumberjacks' 14-yard line.

The Chickasaws' quarterback threw a pass from the four-yard line for a touchdown.

They attempted another two-point conversion that failed. Tension was mounting as the Lumberjacks were ahead by only one point, 21-20.

Each year, rainbow trout raised at the Jim Hinkle Spring River State Fish Hatchery in Mammoth Springs are delivered to community ponds in Arkansas once the water temperature has cooled enough to accommodate these cold-water fish. This normally occurs during the third week in November. According to Maurice Jackson, AGFC Family and Community Fishing Program coordinator, the timing is right on track to begin running trout Wednesday, Nov. 16.

"The cold weather gives us the opportunity to bring these fish to some of our anglers who can't venture up to

Arkansas's famous trout tailwaters," Jackson said. "We've added these stockings to our program for more than a decade, and many of our anglers get excited to see the switch."

Jackson says specially tagged trout also will be released in program ponds later in December to offer even more incentives for anglers to get out and enjoy a day by the pond during winter.

Anglers 16 and older must have a fishing license to fish in FCFP locations, and if trout are kept, a trout stamp also is required. The limit for trout in these ponds is three fish per

angler per day. Licenses are available at sporting goods stores or online at [www.agfc.com/license](http://www.agfc.com/license).
