

Tomme "Fufa" Fullerton passed away at her home on March 1 at the age of 88. She was the wife of the late Sam Fullerton. They were married for 69 years.Both of them were very involved in the community.

Fullerton also served on the police committee. She was active in the Arkansas Muncipal League and served on multiple committees. She was presented with a lifetime award for recognition of her service in the Municipal League.

She was a member and president of Warren Junior Auxilary. She was on the boards for the Warren YMCA, Warren Libary, and many other committees locally and throughout the state.

Senate Week in Review Ben Gilmore

State government and a host of private organizations announced a new effort to recruit more foster families, streamline the process of placing foster children with relatives and accelerating the process for the permanent adoption of children.

The governor issued an executive order directing the Division of Children and Family Services to work with a list of more than two dozen organizations that recruit and train foster families.

In January the state had about 4,100 children in foster care but only 1,600 homes available for placement.

He retired from the field in 1957 with a career batting average of .306, with 2,054 hits, 870 runs Throughout his playing days, he still managed to return to Arkansas often. An avid hunter, he never missed a season for quail or ducks. One of his hunting buddies was Sam Walton

His younger brother, Skeeter, was also a gifted player. Between 1948 and 1951, he played for the University of Arkansas where he came to the attention of Major League scouts. He played second base for the Philadelphia Athletics for the 1952 season. He ultimately returned to Arkansas. George Kell became a broadcaster after his retirement from

the Orioles, he worked for CBS as a play-by-play announcer. In 1959, he began announcing games for the Detroit Tigers on radio and television. He would periodically work for NBC in the early 1960s. By 1965, he was calling Tigers games on television exclusively, becoming a beloved and familiar voice for Detroit-area viewers. He continued to work in the broadcasters' booth until his retirement in 1996.

Though Kell remained an extremely popular figure in Detroit, Arkansas was still home. In 1970, he served as campaign chairman for the gubernatorial campaign of Dale Bumpers. In 1973, Bumpers appointed Kell to serve on the Arkansas Highway commission. He served on the commission until 1983. He also owned a popular car dealership in Newport, George Kell Motors. It is still in operation today. In 1983, Kell was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York. He died at his home in Swifton in 2009 at age 86.
