## Downtown demolition project begins

Demolition began downtown on Tuesday, May 2 a day earlier than planned due to the unstable condition of the buildings. Crews worked throughout the week and continue to work at the time of the publication.

Bradley County Judge Klay McKinney said progress was

going well and progress was going faster than expected. Safety was their main priority. He commented he hoped by next Saturday, the demolition would be close to being done.

He said one of their concerns was the light pole on the corner. Workers are doing the best they can to save the light pole.

Judge McKinney said they have saved all the bricks from the buildings and have them piled up. About 100 loads of debris

is hauled to the landfill for each building. On Saturday, they hauled 75 loads.

Judge McKinney told The Eagle Democrat that termites had gone up the interior wall and had eaten the roof causing it to fall in.

The demolition project took three to four weeks to plan before they started.



## Housefire claims house, family accepting donations

A housefire broke out in the middle of the night at 9:14 p.m. on Monday, May 1, on 116 Bradley 191 in Banks. Banks Volunteer Fire Department, Bradley County Sheriff's Office, Hermitage City Fire Department, Hermitage Rural Fire Department, and Jersey Rural Fire Department quickly responded at 9:24 p.m.

According to the Banks Fire Department report, it is unknown where the fire started but it was believed

to have started on the back porch. The outside door was on fire when it was noticed by the owners. The report stated there was possibly an outside electrical box there.

There was a downed power line and the back yard was partially burnt. However, the entire house was burned down.

## BCMC celebrates National Hospital Week May 7-13

Bradley County Medical Center has served Bradley County for 72 years this year and it will honor National Hospital Week from May 7 to May 13.

Dennen Cuthbertson, public relations specialist for the medical center, told The Eagle Democrat they were having lunch served to staff during the week due to a big project that is underway at the hospital.

"Our community has shown up and shown out for Hospital Week. BCMC is blessed to be a part of such a generous and caring community," BCMC CEO Leslie Huitt told The Eagle Democrat. "I would like to thank everyone who provided meals, goodies, and gift cards for drawings."

National Hospital Week always falls on the week of Florence Nightingale's birthday on May 12. Nightingale lived from 1820 until her

death in 1910. She was known as "The Lady with the Lamp." She was a British nurse and best known as the founder of modern nursing.

The Bradley County Medical Center was founded in 1951 and has evolved into one of the top medical facilities in southeast Arkansas. The medical center employs more than 230 people making it one of Bradley County's largest employers.

The Bradley County Medical Center was originally named Bradley County Memorial Hospital when it was founded in 1951 until the name changed to Bradley County Medical Center in 1997. The name was changed because their status changed to a private, not-for-profit. The hospital cost about \$450,000 to construct. The first superintendent was Sen. Lee Reaves of Hermitage. A \$300,000 bond issue was approved by Bradley County voters in November 1948.

The Warren Lions Club sponsored a campaign to build the hospital under the club's first president, W.D. Roddey, Jr. He served as the master of ceremonies at the dedication ceremony on June 10, 1951. About 1,500 people toured the newly built hospital after the dedication ceremony.

The hospital was originally a 24,000 square foot building with a 60-bed capacity. In 1999, an addition to the facility was added with four acute care patient rooms, along with six LDRP (labor, delivery, recovery, postpartum) rooms. It provides new mothers with the best in accommodations while they are hospitalized.

In 2005, the Bradley County Medical Center became a Critical Access Hospital that allowed for different benefits from Medicare than other facilities. The Bradley County Medical Center provides a variety of services to its patients.

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ed Arkansas Gazette from 1841 to 1930 (two volumes), Bradley County physicians from 1850 to the present, and select obits of Bradley Countians from the Arkansas Baptist “Advance”.

Now she’s writin’ another book, to wit, and she explains:

I am writing my book in segments. I completed a Law and Order chapter, and were my eyes every opened! Several hangings, murders, duels, and occasional suicides that need publishing! I have also completed an early medical practice segment, one on the county fairs where thousands of people came to socialize. Believe they were first organized in the mid 1880’s. a segment on fraternal organizations that was very interesting. One article is very descriptive of the Masonic ceremonies conducted during the laying of the cornerstone for the courthouse. It gives a list of objects that were buried in remembrance. I have wondered if this was ever exhumed. Another segment I am presently working on are the schools. One of the first schools in Warren was Mrs. Josephine Horne’s Female Academy, and it was established in 1851. Another segment is about the weather...even in the old, old days, tornadoes or typhoons called then...plagued the area. Many accounts are given in the old newspapers. And then a segment on the railroad, and of course my favorite subject...the happenings on the Saline River. I have researched all the old ferries, crossings, and have them documented on a map. Another historian friend of mine loaned me old ledger books belonging to E.B. Cryer, a noted captain who along with Bob Withers steamboated on the Saline.

I suppose my purpose in writing all this history is to present what was lost when the fire destroyed all the old newspapers at Warren. I don’t look for much of anything after 1930 as The Eagle is on microfilm after that date.

Another thing worth mentioning, I have been in contact with a black man, 70 years old, who now lives in California, but was raised

in Bradley County. He has almost written me a history itself about the relationship of blacks and whites in Warren. He is very humble and forthright in his stories.

Suffice it to say he told me that there were many mean white men and then there were some white men who would always come to the rescue of a black...and he gave me the names.

I truly believe that my collection of Bradley County history should be made available, and I would love to share it with all.



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# Former Eagle Democrat guest editor earns Ph.D.

Kerri Bennett, formerly of Warren, graduated with a PhD in Heritage Studies from Arkansas State University on Saturday.  
Dr. Bennett is the daughter of Bobby and Felecia Bennett, and the granddaughter of Bonnie Outlaw and the late W.T. Outlaw of Warren and the late Lee and Betty Bennett of Green Hill. Bennett is a 2003 honor graduate from Warren High School.  
After high school, Bennett attended Arkansas State University where she graduated

magna cum laude, earning a BA in English with a concentration in Creative Writing and a minor in Journalism in 2007. Upon receiving her degree, she returned to Bradley County where she taught high school English and Journalism at Hermitage and high school English at Warren. While teaching, she earned an MA in Teaching from the University of Arkansas at Monticello in 2008.  
In the summer of 2009, Bennett decided to further her graduate studies and moved back to Jonesboro to begin a second master's degree at A-State. She also began working for the university as a graduate assistant teaching Basic Writing, Composition I and Composition II. She completed an MA in English in 2011, and was named the Outstanding MA Student in English that year.  
For the past twelve years, Bennett has continued to teach for A-State's Department of English, Philosophy, and World Languages. Aside

from teaching Composition I and II and World Literature since 1660, she is the Concurrent Enrollment Program Faculty Liaison for all of the First-Year Composition courses that are taught in Northeast Arkansas high schools which are offered for college credit at A-State. She also serves as the faculty sponsor for *The Tributary*, which is the Department of English, Philosophy, and World Languages' student literary magazine.  
Bennett entered the A-State Heritage Studies Program in the Fall of 2019, where she studied women writers under the direction of Dr. Lauri Umansky. Notably, to fulfill the degree requirement of conducting practical work within the field of heritage studies, Bennett served as a guest editor for The Eagle Democrat during the summer of 2021.  
Bennett completed her coursework in the Fall of 2021 and subsequently earned an MA in Heritage Studies en route to the PhD. After pass-

ing her Qualifying Exam and Candidacy Exam, she began writing her dissertation, which is a book-length work of scholarly research concerning the many book and film adaptations of Jane Austen's novels, last March. She successfully defended her dissertation, on March 21 of this year in front of her doctoral committee and presented the work entitled *Austentatious Aspirations: How Janeite Women Writers Create and Expand Their Own Cultural Communities Through Re-counting and Adapting Jane Austen's Original Works in Literature and Film* on March 28. She plans to continue teaching English at A-State.  
As previously reported in The Eagle Democrat, Bennett is the author of *Three Seventeen*, a paranormal novel written for young adults, published in 2011. She has since written a sequel called *To Catch a Wolf: A Three Seventeen Novel*. She also hopes to publish her dissertation in the near future.

John Gray Lucas was born in the chaos of the Civil War and became a voice for civil rights in Arkansas. He was born in East Texas in 1864. His mother had been a slave who became a refugee as she sought to escape the increasing shortages and lawlessness of the dying Confederacy. In his lifetime, Lucas rose from slavery to becoming an outspoken legislator and federal prosecutor.

He grew up in Pine Bluff. Despite the many hardships Arkansas faced during Reconstruction, African-Americans now had new opportunities. Lucas attended local schools where he was a gifted pupil. He would later attend Branch Normal College (University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff) before gaining admission to Boston University law school in 1884. He would graduate with honors in 1887 and return to Arkansas to set up his law practice. He passed the state bar exam with a perfect score.

He would become the assistant prosecutor for Jefferson County and was later named a special magistrate for the US Circuit Court for the Eastern District of Arkansas. In 1890, he was elected to the state House of Representatives, representing Jefferson County.

In spite of the increasing obstacles that freedmen faced in the years after Reconstruction, Lucas remained determined to secure a future for African-Americans in the South they had helped build. In one speech, Lucas stated, “We will not leave the graves of our fathers, but here we will rear our children; here we will educate them to a higher destiny.”

His optimism and determination met their match in the legislative session. In 1891, the state legislature, dominated by reactionaries, passed a slew of bills designed to push African-Americans back down to a subservient existence. Bypassing the Fifteenth Amendment, which forbade any restrictions on the vote based on race, legislators instead relied on the deep poverty and poor education that most African-Americans still faced. A poll tax was imposed for voter registration as well as a secret ballot. The secret ballot prohibited the illiterate from voting. In the deep poverty of Arkansas, the \$1 poll tax was too high of a price for democracy, and they were unable to afford to register to vote. The Separate Coach Law mandated that all modes of transportation be segregated by race. Lucas had argued passionately against these laws, but failed.

Gov. James Eagle did nothing to oppose the rising tsunami erasing the gains of the freedmen and actively encouraged it. African-Americans would lose the right to vote for decades. Segregation would be the law. Lucas and the eleven other African-American members of the state legislature were swept out of office as a result.

Lucas, frustrated by the loss of so many basic freedoms for African-Americans in Arkansas, decided he could do no more. He moved his family to Chicago where he would become a prominent defense attorney and would serve in several city and county positions. He argued a number of cases before the US Supreme Court.

By 1934, he was seventy years old. While many men would consider retirement at such an age, Lucas was ready to start a new career as President Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed him Assistant U. S. Attorney. Lucas would serve ably through the Great Depression and World War II until his death in 1944. He devoted his life to the fight for justice, laying the groundwork for future breakthroughs in civil rights in Arkansas and across the nation.

During the 2023 regular session, which adjourned on May 1, the legislature enacted a list of new laws to protect the integrity of elections.

Act 352 prohibits election officials at the local or state level from accepting any funds, grants or gifts from any entity other than the governing body. Its intent is to prevent Facebook, Twitter and other private entities from paying for election-related expenses.

Act 305 eliminates write-in candidacies.

Act 353 prohibits counties from accepting absentee ballots in a drop box.

Act 236 increases the number of signatures needed to place a citizens’ initiative on

the ballot. It would increase the number of counties where sponsors would have to gather signatures from at least 15 to at least 50. Canvassers would have to collect at least half the number of designated electors in the county.

Act 620 requires the state Board of Election Commissioners to conduct more frequent reviews of election-related documents and results.

It creates an Election Integrity Unit within the Attorney General’s office.

Counties would get reviewed when chosen by random or when chosen by two-thirds of the Board. Also, the legislature’s Joint Performance Review Committee could designate which counties are to be reviewed.

Act 544 also creates an Election Integrity Unit with the Attorney General’s Office.

Act 194 authorizes the state Attorney General to review ballot titles and popular names of proposed amend-

ments and initiatives. For years the AG reviewed ballot titles, but in 2019 the legislature transferred that authority to the Board of Election Commissioners.

Act 766 makes it a crime to destroy signatures gathered on petitions to place an issue on the ballot.

The bill was prompted by incidents that occurred when casino interests paid canvassers to gather signatures. Competing interests reportedly offered money, or harassed, to get them to stop collecting signatures or to erase the signatures they had already collected.

Act 300 schedules all special elections on the same day as ordinary elections, i.e., the May primary or the November general election date, except in years of a presidential election when the primary is in March.

Act 350 requires counties that choose to use paper ballots to use ballots that are

compatible with machines used by the Secretary of State to count them. If counties do not use those ballots, they must pay for the expenses of the election themselves.

According to the emergency clause, the intent of Act 350 is to protect the integrity of elections that rely on paper ballots.

Act 462 sets petition requirements for new political parties. They must submit at least 10,000 signatures of registered voters. Previously, the threshold was three percent of the number of votes cast in the most recent election for governor.

Drag Racing  
The legislature passed Act 714 to further crack down on drag racing. It grants police officers the discretion to impound motor vehicles that have been operated in a drag race, if the violation is a second offense. Recovering the vehicle would come at the owner’s expense.

As parts of Arkansas reach record-high May temperatures, there is excitement about the summer and the opportunities we have to connect with the unique environment in our state. We are blessed to have amazing treasures in our backyard that provide endless enjoyment for outdoor enthusiasts. We must work to ensure our recreation sites continue to be a source of pride for generations to come.

In recent years, Congress has made investments to protect and improve public access to federal recreation areas including through passage of The Great American Outdoors Act, which represented a serious commitment to conserving and preserving public lands. We must continue that commitment at U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE)-managed areas.

The USACE is one of the nation’s largest federal outdoor recreation providers oversee-

ing more than 400 lake and river projects in 43 states. In Arkansas, these include popular destinations such as Bull Shoals, Beaver, Ouachita, Greers Ferry and Norfork Lakes.

With 90 percent of USACE-managed locations situated within 50 miles of a major metropolitan area, they attract untold visitors, and like other federal land management areas, encompass well-used facilities in need of repairs.

Much of the USACE recreation infrastructure was constructed decades ago and since then interest to explore these locations has increased. The USACE indicates visits to its public lands and waters grew by more than 12 million in 2021 from the previous year, but maintenance and upkeep of facilities has not matched this growth.

We’ve crafted a new way to deliver improvements to

these locations with the introduction of the Lake Access Keeping Economies Strong (LAKES) Act. This bipartisan legislation opens the door for public-private investments and gives local districts more flexibility to reinvest the resources they collect.

Unlike the U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and National Parks Service, existing law prevents local USACE managers from keeping recreation fee revenues from its users onsite. The LAKES Act would allow the money collected at these locations to be reinvested into the very places they are generated.

Outdoor recreation is an economic driver for Arkansas communities. The industry accounts for more than 39,000 jobs and contributes \$3.5 billion to our state’s GDP. Allowing local USACE leaders to manage how funds are reinvested in their sites will better support the communities near these popular destinations.

As a member of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee, I work closely with USACE officials to support our nation’s water

infrastructure, drinking water and recreation needs. In a recent hearing, the agency’s leadership expressed appreciation for the effort to deliver additional support to its facilities so visitors are sure to get the most out of their experience.

While we look forward to spending more time outdoors over the next few months, my colleagues and I are working to secure a new method to support the needs of some of the most fun summer spots so we can maintain and improve beloved facilities in The Natural State and continue attracting visitors for years to come.

**Caring for roses**

In drier climates, the gardener must regularly provide water for rose bushes. Though generally one should water only the soil around the bushes, sprinkling water directly onto the plants keeps the foliage and blooms clean, retards powdery mildew and repels some pests. Insects that like to feed on rose bushes include aphids, Japanese beetles, spider mites and sawflies. Most of these can be controlled with neem oil or insecticidal soap; if you plant alliums near your roses, they can help repel aphids. - Brenda Weaver

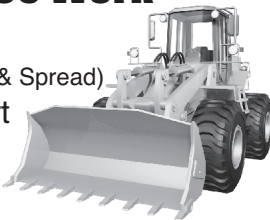
