### Mainline Health launches new health center at Warren Schools

Mainline Health Systems Inc. (MHSI) is excited to launch their newest School-Based Health Center (SBHC) at Warren School District. The acting medical provider will be Karen Richardson, APRN. Richardson is currently a family practice nurse practitioner at the MHSI Warren Medical Clinic and will transition in her new role at the beginning of the 2023-2024 school year.

The MHSI Warren School-Based Health Center will have two primary locations, in the Seabec Building and in the new elementary building but will serve the entire Warren School District with a full range of primary medical care, dental care, and behavioral health services. The school clinic will have a family practice nurse practitioner, a dentist, a dental hygienist, and a behavioral health therapist. The MHSI Warren SBHC will offer medical and behavioral health services at the beginning of the 2023-2024 school year, and dental services will be available Fall/Winter 2023-2024.

Some of the basic primary medical care services include routine screenings and check-ups, wellness exams, phys-

icals, sick visits, and treatments for injuries. For dental care, services offered include dental exams, cleanings, fillings, and treatment for tooth decay and gum disease. Some of the behavioral health care services include treatment for mental health disorders, stress management, coping skills, and talk therapy. MHSI Warren School-Based Health Center will serve adults and children for medical, dental, and behavioral health care.

Richardson is a lifelong resident of Bradley County, where she attended Warren Public School. She has been working in health care, serving Bradley County, since 1979. She began her nursing career in 1981 and began her career as a Nurse Practitioner in 1997. When asked what she was looking forward to most about working as the primary care provider for MHSI Warren School-Based Health Center, Richardson replied, "I am looking forward to caring for all age groups, and watching my grandchildren as they enter preschool and grow up in the Warren School District. I am looking forward to implementing preventative health care, such as screenings and vaccines, and offering gen-

### BCMC hosts successful MASH Camp

The 2023 version of MASH Camp at Bradley County Medical Center was recently completed as the hospital hosted seven students from Warren High School and one from Rison High School for two weeks full of medical related activities that started on Monday, June 19 and ended on Friday, June 30.

MASH, which stands for Medical Applications of Science for Health, Camps are put on throughout a number of hospitals across Arkansas thanks to UAMS and Arkansas Farm Bureau. BCMC's Labor and Delivery Nurse Manager Krissy Morrison and Emergency Department Nurse Manager Cheryl Wells took the lead for this year's program as they have the last few years.

This year's students from Warren included Alex Ayala, Ashlyn Crawford, Anna Mitchell, Adyson Rauls, MaCalia Thomas, Jolie Trussell, and Murphie Wilkinson. Rison High School's Jared Saeler rounded out this year's group.

The beginning of the camp started out with Alexee Chambers from Healing Chambers and included a visit from Kayla Gates of Gentiva Hospice. The last visitor of the day was Rick Beckner, RN, for a message about emergency preparedness, while the students had several educational activities led by Morrison and Wells along with a presentation from Tim Vandiver of the UAMS Stroke Program. The next day saw SouthArk faculty and students help with vital signs before a program from UAMS MASH Program Director Stephen Attebery. The day ended with a trip to Frazer's Funeral Home in Warren and the UAM School of Nurs-

ing Simulation Lab with Dr. Brandy Haley.

Wednesday, June 21 started with a visit to Kids First in Warren with Jessica Griffin followed by hand hygiene and an introduction to medical records by BCMC's Barbara Barnes-Saffel, RN, and Caleb Longoria, respectively. After lunch the students were in two different groups for presentations from BCMC Senior Care. One was a dementia simulation with Charlotte Clausen of the UAMS Center on Aging, while Brandy Files taught Nonviolent Crisis De-escalation Tips. Thursday's morning was spent in BCMC Surgery with the staff and Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist Jan Gorman before hearing from Mainline's Dietitian. The day concluded with suturing from Anthony Rodriguez, APRN, of Mainline and a trip to the BCMC Rural Health Clinic.

The conclusion of week one started with a tour of the Arkansas Rural Health Partnership van that has information about workforce and training opportunities in healthcare. Next on the agenda was a hands-on experience with the BCMC Respiratory Department's Stephanie Slaughter and Sharee Williams on intubation and an ultrasound demonstration from BCMC's Leeanna Williams. After lunch the group had an extensive visit with Jimmy Plyler and Justin Starnes of the Arkansas State Police, followed by diabetic education from Karen Rawls, RN.

The next Monday the campers were able to visit Dr. Doug Mullins with the Monticello Animal Clinic due to the power outage in Warren and then took off to El Dorado for SouthArk's Simulation Lab and Escape Room. The day

ended with CPR and First Aid by Kasey Reep and Emily Harton. Tuesday began with the BCMC Outpatient Therapy Department at the Brunson Medical Complex with an injection lab from SouthArk faculty and students after. The students then heard from Alleyssa Horn of New Outlook Counseling and underwent Narcan Training put on at BCMC by the ARHP. Next up was a visit with BCMC's Peer Recovery Specialist Samantha Johnson followed by an obstetrics experience with Dr. Kristen Dent, Jessica Dawson, and Jasmin Cruz Queriapa.

Tuesday evening was a very special experience for the campers as they were able to witness a vehicle extrication training exercise with the help of the Warren Fire Department, Warren Police Department, EASI, and BCMC emergency room team. Wednesday morning saw the campers perform animal heart dissections with Dr. Michelle Weaver followed by some time with BCMC Radiology and Dr. Shannon Turner of RAPA. Wednesday afternoon was full with a presentation from Buddy Boldon on biomedical engineering, a trip to the Brunson Medical Complex to meet with DaVita Dialysis, casting with Dr. Dichelle George, and a visit from the Warren Lions Club.

Thursday's morning featured meetings with the BCMC Laboratory and Pharmacy Departments before a trip to the Donald W. Reynolds YMCA of Warren and Bradley County with a presentation by Stacie Stone. Tyler Turner of LifeTouch Hospice then spoke to the campers after lunch with more time with the lab and pharmacy to end the day.

Warren Fire Chief Chuck Moore reported the Warren Fire Department responded to 22 calls in June. All the fire trucks passed the pump test.

Building official Johnson reported he had issued several building permits. The old Union Bank building, located on Pine Street, was being remodeled and will be a USDA building.

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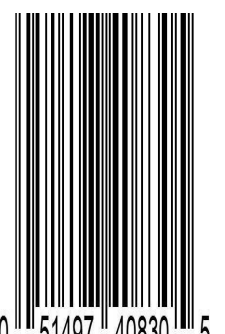
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# Rotary Club elects new officers

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## Oldtimer's Notebook

The publishers of *The Eagle Democrat* have chosen to publish articles from the past *Oldtimer's Notebook* in memory of Robert L. Newton. This article was first published June 13, 2001.

Back to Robert W. (Bill) Glasgow, perhaps the most distinguished journalist who ever came out of Southeast Arkansas: Bill Glasgow died several days ago in his retirement home in Italy.

He was a contemporary of the late Dr. Hugh Moseley, Jr., of Warren and was the elder son of Wilbur Glasgow and his wife, Florence Kyle Glasgow.

Bill Smith was also a contemporary.

There was newspapering in his background: didn't his aunt, Edwardine, replace her brother, John Crawford Jolly, as publisher of THE EAGLE DEMOCRAT when Mr. Jolly died at the shady age of 35, of cancer in Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D.C.?

At any rate, Bill's parents "slept late" because Mr. Glasgow didn't close the confectionary until midnight or so.

Consequently, Bill Glasgow'd come across the street to the Moseleys for breakfast; then the two boys would repair to the Warren schools.

Bill Glasgow was with The Eagle Democrat and also one of the two big newspapers in Little Rock ere going on to spots like TIME Magazine, where he did a cover story on the greatest American who ever ran for president but who didn't get elected, Illinois Governor Adlai E. Stevenson. Bill later worked for

PSYCHOLOGY TODAY in California.

Along the way, he was said to have developed a Terrific Thirst.

The late Kenneth Crosswell, friend in California, used to report in amazement the number of those pre-luncheon cocktails Bill Glasgow would absorb. No effect, said Ken.

But the soda waters didn't get him: advancing age did. That's what he would have wanted...

Wilburn Thornton, Jr., retired Air Force officer in a third career at Warren Bank and Trust, says Charles Ramon Greenwood's book advising kids about how to get good jobs is looked upon as a textbook both by himself and by Glenda Cross, working now with SEACBEC in teaching kids how to become gainfully-employed: making a good impression, in other words on prospective employers.

Greenwood was the only son of the Carl Greenwoods.

He had a great career in journalism and even served in a cabinet level position in Washington for a season.

Greenwood and his wife, the former Miss Martha Holmes of Rison, have been residing in Pine Bluff since he took early retirement as a vice-president of American Express: we hear, however, they are going back to the Chicago area to be near their kids.

As for Wilburn Thornton, he was in the Air Force, then worked for the State in its employment security division ere joining Warren Bank and

Trust.

Wilburn was in the WHS class of 1950, one that included such luminaries as Dale Reaves, Sam Derby, Jack Lain, the late Ted Hurley.

Rachel Mitchell Nicholson, a minister's daughter, probably holds the record as a church accompanist in the American Central South.

Mrs. Nicholson has been providing musical accompaniment for church groups for the better part of 70 years.

"Well, I started as a child", she smiles.

Mrs. Nicholson was in the WHS Class of 1938.

She married before she left high school, however, and a couple of years later gave birth to her only child, a son the Nicholsons named Dale.

That only son has been the longtime president and general manager of Channel 7 TV in Little Rock.

As a tribute to his mother, and to her church, First Assembly, Nicholson has had a number of compact discs and tapes made of his mother's artistry: these are being sold to help defray the cost of the church building at its new location, Smith Road and the Pine Bluff Road, where the project is well-afoot with the dynamic leadership of Pastor Jim Bales, our neighbor.

Rachel Nicholson's brother, A. H. Mitchell (known to all friends as "Frisky") is a neighbor; old timers will remember their wonderful mother, Miss Leona, who married Rev. W. W. Wagon after the death of her first husband.

Mrs. Wagon worked at Imogene's Fashion Center on South Main for many a year.

**COSL announces tax auction for surrounding counties**

Commissioner of State Lands Tommy Land announced that his office will auction tax-delinquent parcels located in Ashley, Bradley, Chicot, Cleveland, Desha, Drew and Lincoln Counties on July 25.

The regional auction begins at 10 a.m. and will be held at the University of Arkansas Monticello - Fine Arts Center, 371 University Drive in Monticello. Registration begins at 9:00 a.m.

"These new regional auctions will allow bidders to attend the sales for multiple counties without traveling to multiple locations or taking several days off work," Commissioner of State Lands Tommy Land said. "This will also allow us to be more fiscally responsible by conducting fewer events."

Auctions will be conducted alphabetically by county. Prospective bidders can find the Public Auction Catalog on the Commissioner's website at [www.cosl.org](http://www.cosl.org). This resource includes a buyer's guide; statutes governing sales; auction

date, time and location; and a complete listing of parcels offered.

The website also includes an instructional video demonstrating how to research information about each parcel available for sale.

"Owners of delinquent parcels going for auction should be aware that the redemption period has changed," Land said. "Parcels must be redeemed by 4 p.m. on the last business day before the sale date. That means we must have their money and petition to redeem in our hands by that time."

Auction sales are final, he emphasized. "Parcels sold at auction cannot be redeemed." Bidders must register for the auction before placing a bid. Purchases may be paid for with a business or personal check, or a credit or debit card. Cash is not accepted for purchase of tax-delinquent parcels.

"Property taxes help fund schools, roads, libraries and public services including ambulances," Land said. "Everyone benefits from paying

those taxes — and the property owner benefits from paying on time, by avoiding interest and penalties on delinquent taxes."

Properties that do not sell at auction will appear on the COSL's post-auction sales list 30 days after the auction date. From there, they can be purchased through an online auction system. Another instructional video on the COSL website demonstrates that process to bidders.

Owners of delinquent parcels may redeem those delinquent taxes online at [www.cosl.org](http://www.cosl.org) using a credit or debit card. Those who prefer to pay by check or money order can print a Petition to Redeem from the website or call the office at 501-324-9422 to request the petition, which must accompany their payment.

Owners seeking to redeem within 30 days before an auction must use certified funds or may redeem with cash in our office at 1020 W. 4th Street in Little Rock. Cash is only accepted for redemption, and only for in-person payments at 1020 W. 4th Street.

## Arkansas History Minute

John Pope was the third territorial governor of Arkansas and a man who helped steer Arkansas out of its wilderness era. However, his outspokenness would spark many political fights within the new territory.

Pope was born in 1770 on his parents' farm in northern Virginia, near the Maryland border. When the American Revolution erupted, his father, William Pope, served as a colonel for the colonial forces. As the war intensified, Col. Pope decided the area was no longer safe enough for his young family. In 1779, together with several other settlers, the Popes struck out westward into Kentucky. Kentucky at that time was sparsely populated, and the war would not spare the region as local Native American tribes allied with the British and periodically attacked American settlers.

As a youth, John Pope was critically injured in a farm accident that cost him an arm. Nevertheless, Pope continued to work hard with his studies, attending a private school and eventually attending William and Mary College in eastern Virginia. He eventually settled down in Shelbyville, not far from the new Kentucky state capital, and set up a law practice.

In 1798, Pope was elected to the Kentucky state legislature, where he quickly developed a reputation as a man of ideas and total integrity. In 1806, the Kentucky legislature (as was the practice at the time) elected Pope to the US Senate. He was respected in the Senate, named by his fellow senators to be president pro tem of the Senate in 1809.

By 1812, a new generation of western politicians was clamoring for a new war against Great Britain, citing British seizure of American ships and sailors on the high seas and accusing the British of inciting the Native American tribes to attack the settlers in the region. In June 1812, President James Madison reluctantly called for the US to declare war on Great Britain. Pope voted against the war declaration, believing that America's military was not ready for a war with Britain. Pope was defeated for re-election as a result later that year. And the War of 1812 proved to be a near-disaster for the nation because of its lack of preparedness.

After supporting Andrew Jackson in the 1828 election, Pope was rewarded for his loyalty by being named the territorial governor of Arkansas. Pope was excited about the possibilities he foresaw for the Arkansas Territory. He called for the development of roads, canals, and harbors for riverboats. Legislators in 1829 quickly named the newly formed Pope County after him.

However, he ran into fierce opposition from fellow Kentuckian Robert Crittenden, who himself coveted the job of governor and served as the territorial secretary. Crittenden worked to maneuver the legislature and public opinion against Pope, but to no avail. In 1831, the climactic confrontation came when Crittenden, now having resigned, offered to trade his brick mansion in Little Rock for the 64 acres of federal land given to Arkansas to build a state capitol. Pope vetoed the bill, stating that Crittenden's home was overvalued by at least four times the actual value of the land in the land swap and that the deal was little more than corruption and graft.

Pope had to step down in 1835 when President Jackson refused to reappoint him as governor as a result of a dispute over federal banking policy. Pope returned to Kentucky, where he would serve three more terms in Congress before losing re-election in 1842 and his death in 1845.



Senate Week in Review from Ben Gilmore Senator

The governor announced that the state would provide about \$11 million to local school districts to help them pay the steeply rising costs of property insurance premiums.

In her announcement, the governor said premiums are going up for schools by an average of 130 percent, and the state aid would help them pay for about 30 percent of the increase.

The Legislative Council will consider the governor's proposal, which was developed with input from lawmakers over the past several weeks.

An insurance plan purchased by the Arkansas School Boards Association covers 179 districts and a plan purchased by the state Insurance Department covers 78 districts,

according to news reports.

Part of the dramatic increase in premiums is attributed to the cost of repairing damage caused by severe weather events such as tornadoes, flooding and sudden freezes. The increased insurance costs are not limited to Arkansas, but are being experienced nationwide. Not only schools but also homeowners are seeing increases in the cost of insuring property.

Education Week, a national news magazine that focuses on issues affecting schools, reported that in Davis, Oklahoma, the cost of liability insurance has increased more than threefold percent since the 2019-2020 school year, when the cost of insurance to the district was about \$68 per student. It is now \$167 per student and is going up to \$290 per student.

According to the superintendent, the district pays \$261,000 for property insurance. That amount would cover the pay of two teachers, or an entire grade level of math and science text books, he

said.

The article in Education Week said that other factors, in addition to severe weather events, are causing rates to go up. New laws allowing more lawsuits over sexual abuse have contributed to rate increases.

Cybercrimes were cited also. The Little Rock School District was victimized last year by computer hackers who demanded and received \$242,000 in extortion payments. They had stolen sensitive information such as Social Security numbers and other types of identification.

Shakeout within the insurance industry is also a factor. In markets where some companies have stopped writing policies, there is less competition and therefore less pressure to hold down rates.

Major companies have stopped issuing new homeowner policies in California because of the prevalence of wildfires. Spokesmen for the insurance companies attributed their decisions in part to inflation and the high-

er costs of re-building homes and structures.

### New Drug Laws

Earlier this year the legislature approved Act 584, which creates a new felony of "death by delivery" for dealers who lace their illegal drugs with fentanyl, resulting in the death of users. The penalties range from 20 years to life.

Prosecutors in Searcy relied on Act 584 when they filed felony charges recently against a couple who allegedly sold drugs laced with fentanyl to two people who died from overdoses.

Last year 487 people in Arkansas died from a drug overdose, and so far this year 133 Arkansans have died from fatal doses of drugs. In the past few years fentanyl has become the leading cause of fatal overdoses.

So far this year, emergency medical personnel and first responders have administered almost 2,000 doses of Naloxone to Arkansans at risk of death from an overdose.



According to a 2022 Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) report, 17 veterans take their own life each day, on average. While the number has decreased for the past two years, even one suicide is too many. There is a lot of work to do to ensure our veterans get connected with resources to treat their mental health struggles and save lives.

Organizations across the country are creating programs to support men and women who struggle to get the mental health care they need. In recent days, Sheep Dog Impact Assistance, a Rogers, Arkansas-based organization that encourages veterans to live their best life through continued service-driven initiatives, celebrated the grand opening of its Heroes Ranch at Rush Springs, strengthening its mission to help our heroes in need.

This site north of Bentonville will provide an environment for veterans to connect with nature, build relationships with others experiencing the same health challenges and foster camaraderie to ultimately demonstrate their life is worth living.

Congress has taken action to support successful veteran-serving programs by allowing the VA to harness the efforts of non-profits and community organizations that have built effective suicide prevention programs and, just as important, measuring their effectiveness. I authored this law because we need a new strategy to help those living with the invisible wounds of war.

This was a good first step and we're continuing the momentum with a new legislative initiative to support a comprehensive approach to

saving lives.

In March, I joined Senate Veterans Committee Chairman Jon Tester (D-MT) to introduce the Not Just a Number Act, which would require the VA to develop a more complete picture of the factors contributing to veteran suicide.

This bipartisan bill would modernize how we reach and serve veterans who struggle to get the mental health care and support they need. It's clear the VA needs to update and expand its data collection to examine the relationship between VA benefits and suicide outcomes as well as analyze which benefits have the greatest impact on preventing suicide.

Our goal is to help use the data to improve policies and programs which will ultimately translate into real-world success in preventing suicide.

Right now, the VA's suicide statistics only incorporate veterans who had appointments at the department's health facilities. Acknowledging suicide prevention goes beyond just mental health practices is

key to solving this crisis.

There are other root causes of suicide we need to be looking at such as food insecurity, lack of housing and financial strain.

I shared that message with my colleagues and VA officials at a recent Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee hearing. It was important to hear the VA agrees on the importance of understanding correlations between Veterans Benefit Association programs and clinical care that prevent veterans from taking their lives.

Preventing veteran suicide is a top priority for me and the committee. I will continue working to pass the Not Just a Number Act to give hope to at-risk veterans and fulfill the promise we made to all those who have worn our nation's uniform.

### Q: What is better — walking or running?

**A:** Research shows that when it comes to lowering your risk for heart disease, brisk walking is as good as running. Walking is associated with fewer injuries and is accessible to more people.

The catch? Walking takes more time than running to see the same benefits — simply because it takes longer to cover the same distance. For example, a 15-minute jog is equivalent to a half-hour brisk walk in terms of calorie burn.

Also, recent research reported by the American Heart Association found that brisk walkers saw the same benefits as runners in terms of risk for diabetes,

high cholesterol and high blood pressure.

Walking is a good option for those with joint issues, arthritis and other health conditions, like heart disease, because it doesn't put as much stress on the body as running. If you have these conditions or other concerns, discuss it with your doctor before experimenting with running.

The even better news? You can do both. Part of maintaining your health is giving your body variety. If you're healthy enough to run, you can mix things up by incorporating both running and walking in your routine.
