

Lumberjacks retain Union Bank Saline River Shootout Trophy 30-21

For the second consecutive year, the Warren Lumberjacks was the host team for the Union Bank Saline River Shootout.

Both Warren and Monticello entered the contest with a 1-0 8-4A Conference record.

The Lumberjacks won the coin toss to begin the game and elected to receive the opening kickoff. Monticello's Joseph Rojas kicked the ball to the 10-yard line where it would be returned 21-yards by Neondre Thomas to Warren's 31-yard line.

Cameron Burks completed the first pass of the drive to Aaron Davis. However Davis was tackled in the backfield by Laytn Nichols for a four-yard loss. After a two-yard loss on a run by Davis, Burks connected with

Tramond Miller for a 21-yard gain to the Warren 46-yard line which was followed by a fiveyard offside penalty that placed the ball into Monticello territory at the 49-yard line.

Warren drove deep into Monticello territory to the four yard line, but the drive stalled when the Lumberjacks turned the ball over on downs with 7:17 remaining in the first quarter. Beginning the drive at the Monticello four-vard line, Jackson Hines gained a yard to the fiveyard line. The Billies gained a little room on the next play on a four-yard reception by Rojas from Tye Guthrie. Zaedin Jones advanced the ball to the Monticello 21-yard line on a 12-yard run.

Monticello advanced the ball down to Warren's 38-yard line on the drive. Joseph Accelus

broke free and ran 38 yards for return by Antonio Jordan. Daa Billie touchdown. Rojas added the extra point to give Monticello a 7-0 lead with 1:30 on the clock. Warren's next drive began at Warren's 47-yard line after a 36-yard return by Thomas. The Lumberjacks drove to the Monticello 44-yard line as the quarter ended.

After reaching Monticello's 30-yard line on a pass from Burks to Miller, the Lumberjacks further advanced to the Monticello one-yard line. But a false start penalty pushed the ball back to the six-yard line. Burks got the touchdown from the six-yard line. Hayden White added the extra point to tie the score, 7-7. After forcing Monticello to punt on the next drive, Warren began their drive in Monticello territory at the 43yard line following a 20-yard

vis got an eight-yard run on the first play of the drive. That was followed by a 10-yard run by Burks to the Monticello 35-yard line.

Burks connected with Miller for a 10-yard pickup to the 15-yard line. A holding penalty backed the ball up to the Monticello 25-yard line, but the Lumberjacks would get the yardage back on a 15-yard pass from Burks to Tayshawn Edwards to the Monticello 10-yard line.

On the next play, Burks connected with Jo Jo Steen for the 10-yard touchdown pass. White added the extra point to give the Lumberjacks a 14-7 lead with 6:44 remaining in the half.

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

The Lumberjacks drove to the Monticello 39-yard line into Billie territory. After an incomplete pass, Burks next pass was intercepted by Monticello's Blaine Hayden for a 58-yard return for the touchdown. After Rojas kicked the extra point, Monticello had tied the contest at 14 with 4:57 remaining in the third quarter.

The Billies got their second turnover of the contest on the Lumberjacks next drive after Burks threw his second interception of the contest after Laytn Nichols came down with the pass at the Monticello 40. But the Lumberjack defense forced the Billies to punt the ball with

Thomas returning the punt 13 yards from the Warren 37 to the 50. Monticello's defense also forced the Lumberjacks to punt on their drive with the Billies' next drive extending into the fourth quarter. The Billies turned the ball over on downs at the Warren 26 with 9:34 remaining in the contest. After forcing Warren to punt on the next drive, the Billies began their drive at their own 34 yard line. However, they were forced to punt the ball with Warren taking over on the Monticello 48 after a 27-yard return by Jordan.

Davis gained three yards to the Monticello 45 but fumbled the ball on his next carry. Jagger Hines recovered the ball at the Monticello 48 with 7:07 remaining in the contest. On the first play after the turnover, Tye Guthrie connected with Curtis Barrow for a 52-yard touchdown pass. Rojas got the extra point giving Monticello a 21-14

lead with 6:57 remaining in the game. Warren began the next drive from their own 35 vardline. Monticello's Jon Luke Brotherton sacked Burks for a five-yard loss on the first play of the drive.

After an incompletion, Burks hit Miller for a 34-yard completion to the Monticello 36 followed by another completion to Miller to the Monticello 23. After advancing the ball to the 17, Burks hit Miller once more for the 17-yard touchdown.

The Lumberjacks were setup for the extra point, but Monticello was flagged for a false start that placed the ball at the two yard line. Warren elected to go for the two-point conversion with Antonio Jordan running the ball in giving the Lumberjacks the 22-21 lead with 5:19 on the clock.

Monticello began by getting the ball back to their 19. After an incompletion, Guthrie's next pass was intercepted at the Monticello 31 by Jo Jo Steen with 4:46 on the clock. A delay of game penalty moved the ball back to the Monticello 36 and the Billie defense tacked Davis in the backfield for a four yard loss on the next play. Warren got the ball back to the original line of scrimmage but another delay of game penalty moved the ball back to the Monticello 36 once more. Burks next pass was incomplete but Warren was flagged for a holding penalty

Oldtimer's notebook

The publishers of The Eagle Democrat have chosen to publish articles from the past Oldtimer's Notebook in memory of Robert L. Newton. This article was first published November 3, 1999.

Robert B. Taylor, longtime official of the International Woodworkers of American (AFL-CIO) well remembers when Derby Insurance was on South Main, almost directly across from the men's department of Martin's Department Store.

Mr. Taylor went to work for the union after a long career with Bradley Lumber Company and its successor, Potlatch Corporation, and went to Derby's for insurance on his "company car."

Derby was located, then, in the previous home of Warren Bank. Following that, it was the office of John R. Gannaway Insurance, and the Warren Building and Loan Association.

Mr. Gannaway and his wife, Fannie, were among Arkansas' leading producers for Prudential Life Insurance Company.

Friends will remember that Mr. Gannaway started losing his sight when he was a student at Fayetteville. It was almost all gone now in his 90s, says we forgot to

when he was in Bailey's Drugstore, current site of The Sandwich Shop, which was once the home of Wayne's.

He heard a woman laugh and inquired as to whom it might be? "Miss Frances Bills, new school-

teacher from Bolivar, Tenn." was the response.

"That is the woman I want to marry," responded John Ramsey Gannaway, a State Representative, business leader, and several years Miss Bills' senior.

That's the end of report. They married and built the house long occupied by the late Don Smith on Hankins Street.

Warren Bank was established by the Ederington's and the Meeks about 100 years ago as "the other bank." Dr. Martin, Henry Turner, and others set up Merchants and Planters Trust and Savings Bank almost 110 years ago.

Robert and Mrs. Taylor showed us all something in Warren: the successful raisin' of kids.

There was not a better group of kids to come out of our town than the Taylor progeny.

mention the late Finis G. Watson's business venture, Rex Clothing House. It was located in the block between the old Warren Bank and the M&P Bank in the 20s and early 30s.

Rex Clothing House was a victim of the Great Depression. Mr. Watson then repairing to Hot Springs where he ran the Arlington Toggery in the basement of the Arlington Hotel for many years.

The Watson daughters married Wallace Hurley and Leffel Gentry. The son became an official of a giant lumbering concern on the eastern seaboard.

Wasn't Mrs. Watson, formerly a Belin, a sister to Mrs. Hankins, the mother of one of our marvelous teachers at Miss Allie Mae's School, Kathryn Hankins Engelhart? The father of Miss Kathryn was Edin Hankins. He built the house that is now occupied by Samuel McFadden Leslie and his wife, Irma, at Bradley and Church.

Back to Kim Hedrick. He married Miss Joel Dean Cunningham, a niece of Mrs. Maude Hargis. Mrs. Maude was married to W.C. Hargis, the car, truck, and cattle dealer.

Mrs. Hedrick was valedictorian of her class at WHS in the early 30s. The salutatorian was the beloved Katie Lou Williams

McKinney. She was the sister to Clyde and Burgess Williams. She was also the sister of the mother of James Ed Moseley of Warren. Mrs. Hedrick is a fine lady, married to a fine man.

The big, wooden house in which they raised five successful kids on North Myrtle was built by W.J. Savage, founder of the Valley Telephone Company. The Valley Telephone Company which served Dermott, Monticello, and Warren in the World War I era.

His daughter was Miss Willie Savage, valedictorian in the Class of 1911 at the Presbyterian Training School on West Pine, site of Warren Junior High School.

The salutatorian was a young woman from New Edinburg who came to Warren and boarded at the home of Charles and Kate Hurley Hankins, founder of C.W. Hankins & Son, on Church.

Her name was Lois Bell Hunter.

She later graduated from Erskine College in South Carolina and became, with Miss Gussie Carmical, a longtime teacher in Pine Bluff. She was the first Cleveland County woman to graduate from college.

Miss Hunter, at 28, married R.L. Newton who was the former principal of the junior high. He

had once taught at the hometown much to her, but she kept braggin' of Lena and Carl Barger.

But then, that's another story. We were at a gathering in Pine Bluff the other day and met a nice-lookin' lady named Pam Mahonchak, a Captain with United Airlines, which is based in Denver.

We told her we knew a young man who flew as a co-pilot for United named Danny Brazeel.

"Nicest Young man in Denver!" she explained, observing that Co-Pilot Brazeel had been with her "in the right seat" on a number of flights.

Captain Pam is also a great admirer of Brazeel's wife, Elizabeth, who is the youngest daughter of Martha and Attorney Clint Huey.

Dan Brazeel is the younger son of Mildred Neely Brazeel and Major James A. Brazeel (USAF-Ret.) of this hectare.

The older son, Steve, practices medicine in Monroe.

Steve's wife is also a physician and is highly praised by the patients she sees in Crossett when she goes there on days for clinic visits.

I told her that Danny Brazeel was a fine WHS quarterback, in between Dan Nicholson and Jim Hurley, III, and then the Rev. Barry Carter.

That didn't seem to mean

on Dan Brazeel.

Did the Captain tell us she flies 737-300 planes?

Whatever that means. I bet Major Brazeel knows.

Our little trip down the Main Street of Warren in the 30s has been interrupted.

We left you at Cypress and Main here, in the building once occupied by Moseley Brothers, Ed and Jim. The Martin's Department Store, established by Noel and Bryan Martin, is now operated by Bryan's grandson, also named Bryan.

The brother of Noel and Bryan was Dr. Rufus Martin, who practiced medicine upstairs.

His telephone had an extension in the pharmacy department of Appleton's Drugstore, next door. If Dr. Martin didn't answer the phone, either Mr. Will Appleton or his son, Monroe Brown, would answer it.

Rufus Martin married a young widow from Monticello. She was previously married to a man named Ives. Edwin Ives became Dr. Martin's stepson.

"He treated me like I was an adult from age six on," insisted the longtime Bradley official, Edwin Ives.

The state budget profoundly influences our daily lives, affecting everything from education to healthcare. As the legislative session approaches, the General Assembly takes the time to assess the state's current fiscal situation and evaluate budget requests for the upcoming fiscal year.

This year's budget hearings are scheduled to commence on October 8 and will run through November 21. Held in the MAC building behind the Capitol, these hearings are open to the public and will be live-streamed on our website, ensuring transparency and accessibility for all.

During these hearings, budget requests will be presented by various licensing boards, commissions, and state agencies. Additionallv. the executive branch will unveil its balanced budget proposal for Fiscal Year 2026. Historically, education and human services have received the bulk of funding, alongside priorities such as higher education, public safety, and health.

The most recent general revenue report indicated a 2.3 percent decrease in net available general revenue compared to last year. However, after three months into the fiscal year, net available revenue has surpassed forecasts by \$17.7 million, or 1.0 percent.

The insights gained during this process are instrumental in shaping appropriation bills that will directly affect our communities. Engaging in these hearings fosters a sense of accountability and ensures that the budget reflects the priorities and necessities of our citizens.

Members can begin pre-filing bills on November 15, with the Arkansas General Assembly set to convene for the 2025 Regular Session at noon on January 13, 2025.

The North Carolina University study also showed that American manufacturers produce billions of rolls of consumer-grade (Charmin, Scott, Angle Soft...) toilet paper each year. We should have an abundance, right? But stores only carry a few weeks' worth of toilet paper in their warehouses at a time. When demand goes up, their supply quickly decreases. In other words, STOP PANIC **BUYING!** Now, back to the possibility of a shortage. Lately, I've been see-See EDITORIAL Page 6

Senate Week in Review from Ben Gilmore Senator

A subcommittee of legislators is close to finishing its year-long study of Arkansas gun laws.

The study includes a package of bills to clarify the rights and restrictions of owning and carrying firearms.

Arkansas lawmakers overwhelmingly support the Second Amendment. The intent of the subcommittee's work has been to make it easier to understand the requirements of responsible ownership of firearms. To achieve this goal, the package of legislation would repeal repetitive, confusing or conflicting provisions in current law.

The Legislative Council last

year approved the study by its Game and Fish/State Police Subcommittee.

Legislation under study by the subcommittee would eliminate the current dual system of granting licenses to carry concealed firearms, and simplify the law by having only one system. Now, you can apply to the State Police for either a "regular" concealed carry license or an "enhanced" concealed carry license. The attorney general recommended going to one system.

A spokesman for the attorney general told the subcommittee that having a "regular" license means little because Arkansas allows permitless carry. Act 777 of 2023 makes clear that a permit is not required to carry a concealed handgun.

Another bill in the study would prohibit cities and counties from enacting gun laws that are more restrictive than state laws.

Lawmakers also want to em-

phasize the rights of gun owners to carry while on a journey. To avoid confusion, a draft bill under consideration would define a journey as leaving home.

The subcommittee heard from several law enforcement agencies, as well as people who are firearms instructors, hunters and owners of firing ranges. Also providing input were people seeking stronger gun laws near schools.

Broadband Funds

Arkansas has become eligible for an additional \$1 billion in federal funding for grants to expand access to high speed Internet access. This good news is especially important for schools, medical providers and businesses in isolated, rural parts of the state.

The National Telecommunications and Information Administration approved the grant funding, which is a part of what is known as the BEAD program.

In our state, outdoor recreation impacts 43,000 jobs and generates more than \$4 billion in consumer spending. Elevating this industry enhances opportunities and preserves our environment.

I recently met with Arkansans representing a number of outdoor recreation activities in The Natural State including hiking, rock climbing and mountain biking. These members of the Outdoor Alliance, a national coalition of organizations representing the outdoor recreation community, advocated for policies to strengthen access to public lands across the country.

We've been blessed to see the results of public and private investment in growing an interest in biking. Across the state, trails have gained popularity among locals as well as in the eyes of national biking enthusiasts.

The Adventure Cycling Association designated its first U.S. Bicycle Route System trail in Arkansas earlier this year. USBR 51 starts at the Missouri state line and travels 88 miles with many of my colleagues to and increases participation in to Alma, Arkansas. More than make that even easier.

That stands for the Broadband, Equity, Access and Deployment Program, which is providing more than \$42 billion to all 50 states to expand high speed Internet access.

The BEAD program follows up on the Arkansas Rural Connects program, which in three rounds of funding provided about \$520 million to Arkansas communities for broadband expansion.

Arkansas was one of 19 states to receive more than \$1 billion through the BEAD program. **SNAP** Benefits

The state Human Services Department announced that people who receive food stamps can be reimbursed for benefits stolen through an electronic scam known as skimming, or cloning.

The temporary relief program applies to benefits stolen between October 1, 2022 and September 30, 2024. During that period 296 people reported digital theft of their benefits.

Rugged rock formations in our state also attract rock climbers of all skill levels. Arkansas has more than 400 rock climbing sites. I'm proud to support this sport at home and nationwide by championing policies that provide the climbing community access to public lands. That's why I recently joined a bipartisan letter urging the U.S. Forest Service and the National Park Service to reconsider policy changes that limit the use of fixed anchors for climbing in federally-designated wilderness areas.

The Natural State provides numerous opportunities for locals and visitors to enjoy the great outdoors. Arkansans appreciate the beauty of our environment and want to explore these treasures in our backyard. I will continue working



to be outside. I especially enjoyed fishing and riding my bike around Fort Smith with my friends. These experiences of my youth have always been a fond memory. They ingrained in me an appreciation of the outdoors, something I hope to inspire young Americans to develop a lifelong interest in sup-

porting. In 2015, the U.S. Department of Interior launched a program connecting kids with national parks and other public lands by offering fourth graders and their families free entrance to these locations. The success of the program led Congress to ensure upcoming fourth graders have the same opportunities by making it law. It has encouraged young people to explore our landscapes and created future outdoor enthusiasts.

I've partnered with my colleague Senator Martin Henrich (D-NM) to continue this initia-

Introducing young Americans to our national parks encourages an appreciation for the lands and resources that help define our country. I'm proud to support this legislation that allows the next generation to discover our national treasures and explore the outdoors.

The Every Kid Outdoors program has successfully encouraged tens of thousands of children and their families to explore America's public lands, waters, historic sites and national parks – more than 2,000 sites in all.

The twentieth century opened a door for innovation in science and technology. Great minds steadily unlocked the mysteries of the world and made life better for countless people. One of those great minds was Arkansas research scientist Dr. Margaret Pittman, a woman whose research has helped save millions of lives.

Pittman was born in Washington Grove in Northwest Arkansas in 1901. Her father, Dr. James Pittman, was a respected physician in Washington County and introduced her to the world of science and the study of health. As a child, she and her brother and sister would often assist their father in his medical practice though that would not be permitted in any medical practice today.

In 1919, her father died after an attack of appendicitis. However, he had arranged for all of his children to attend Hendrix College in Conway. The family, however, still struggled as they completed their studies. Nevertheless, Pittman excelled and earned degrees in math and biology when she graduated in 1923. After graduation, she wanted to pursue a career in science, but her immediate options were limited. In the meantime, she went into education. She taught briefly at Galloway College in Searcy, which was a local girl's school, and quickly rose to the position of principal. When the opportunity to study science at the graduate level came along, she jumped at the chance.

She earned a masters degree in bacteriology, the scientific study of bacteria, from the University of Chicago in 1926. Showing great promise as a scientist, she won a fellowship to the prestigious Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research, earning credit for her doctorate while working with some of the nation's top researchers on questions surrounding bacteria and disease.

One question that captivated her research was the bacteria Hemophilus influenzae. The world suffered a terrifying outbreak of the flu in 1918 and 1919 that left 500,000 dead in the United States alone and tens of millions more worldwide. 

ganism responsible for the flu, publishing an important paper on the subject in 1928. She also discovered that there were several strains of the bacteria, some of which caused meningitis, discoveries that paved the way for a life-saving vaccine years later. Pittman also studied bacterial pneumonia and earned her doctorate by 1929.

In 1936, she began work for the National Institutes of Health, continuing her studies of microorganisms and disease. In 1943, she began work on a whooping cough vaccine. The disease, also known as pertussis, infected thousands of children at the time and the most severe cases could cause pneumonia, seizures, brain damage, and even death. Hundreds of children died from the disease each year. With her NIH colleagues, Pittman developed a new technique to test the safety, viability, and potency of the vaccine. By the 1950s, deaths from whooping cough all but disappeared. While at the NIH, she

worked with colleagues on vaccines for cholera and typhus. two diseases which had caused millions of deaths around the world. By the 1960s, her work led to the perfection of the cholera vaccine.

Her work added important pieces to the scientific puzzles that had frustrated medicine for generations. While doctors and scientists had suspected that there were cures to these diseases, Pittman put the fin-

ishing touches on the vaccines for many ailments, to the point that where many of these diseases once left thousands dead in their wake are hardly given a second thought by the general public in the twenty-first century. That peace of mind for so many families is thanks in part to the genius and determination of one Arkansas scientist.
