Warren dominates Hamburg 47-21 in Homecoming victory

The Warren Lumberjacks delivered a commanding 47-21 win over the Hamburg Lions on homecoming night, improving to 4-3 on the season and remaining unbeaten in conference

play at 4-0.

Warren's defense set the tone early, with Antonio Jordan leading the charge. The Lumberjacks forced a turnover on downs on Hamburg's first possession, and despite early

offensive struggles, a booming 68-yard punt by Jordan pinned the Lions deep in their own territory. Hamburg's strong special teams play briefly shifted momentum with a huge return to the Warren 27-yard line, but firm, forcing a punt.

Warren's offense clicked on its second possession, as Aaron Davis and Tremon Miller made key runs and catches to drive the ball into the red zone. Quar-

the Lumberjack defense stood terback Cam Burks connected with Josiah Steen for an 8-yard touchdown, giving Warren a 7-0 lead with 6:12 left in the first quarter.

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

The publishers of The Eagle Democrat have chosen to publish articles from the past Oldtimer's Notebook in memory of Robert L. Newton. This article was first published May 5,2004.

Dr. Ron Moseley of Little Rock called the other day asking where he might get a picture of the lamented Camp Mansfield, torn down 40 years ago.

A bunch of us old-timers including Sykes Harris, Bob Tate, and myself tried to figure that one out, sans success.

We realize most folk under 50 don't know anything about the YMCA's camp at Bank Springs on the Saline, south of the "new bridge," the 4-laner between here and Wilmar.

Larry Derby was another one of those seeking a picture with no luck.

Camp Mansfield grew out of the perfervid enthusiasm for the outdoors that permeated the American life right at World War I.

The late Laurence Hurley, an early leader in the YMCA

movement, suggested the Bank Springs site on Bradley Lumber Company of Arkansas land.

Genesis, walked down through

The Fullerton brothers, Robert W. and S. Baker, were approached with the idea and they responded in a positive way, telling "Y" leadership they could have the tract near the river and spring in perpetuity as long as a YMCA camp was conducted there.

Clifford J. Mansfield, vice-president and general manager of the Arkansas Lumber Company, then told the YMCA folks he would have a camp house built at his (or the company's) expense. Hence the name "Camp Mansfield."

Arkansas Lumber Company's carpenter crew came out and set to work. Don't you imagine they were directed by C. E. Englehart? I met his great-granddaughter, Nancy Trcy, one of two daughters of Charles Clyde Tracy, MD, at the races the other day. She reminds me of her grandmother, Hazel Tracy.

For some reason, we swam nude in the Saline River. I once had in my possession a snapshot of Jack "Seven Finger" King on the makeshift divin' board, sans a thread: everybody else was in the water. That didn't seem to damage our psy-

This week, the House and Senate Education Committees approved a proposed recommendation for educational adequacy. The plan to increase state funding to \$8,162 per-pupil for the 2026 school year and \$8,371 per-pupil for the 2027 school year reflects a commitment to investing in the future of Arkansas students. The current funding amount is \$7,771 per-pupil.

The Arkansas General Assembly has a long history of prioritizing education funding. The foundation funding model established in 2003 has been instrumental in determining the essential resources needed for an adequate education, and the recent approval of the educational adequacy report builds upon this foundation.

The funding matrix used by Arkansas calculates per-student funding based on a variety of factors, ensuring that students have access to equal opportunities in areas ranging from teacher salaries to technological resources. The approved recommendation also addresses important evolving needs for students, such as school safety and mental health support.

One key aspect of the proposal approved by the committee this week is the increase in funding for schools to hire more special education teachers and provide higher wages for classified staff. While school districts have discretion in how they use these funds, these recommendations are designed to support the overall improvement of educational outcomes for Arkansas students.

This report will now be delivered to the Governor, the House Speaker, and the Senate Pro-Tem for review. It will assist the General Assembly in not only determining educational funding but also in shaping the state budget as a whole.

Dr. Margaret Pittman was one of the great scientific minds of the past century. While she helped create vaccines for three diseases that once left millions dead in their wakes, the Arkansan accomplished much more.

She had risen steadily from her roots in Washington County to becoming a school teacher, principal, and eventually acclaimed research biologist. She started working at the National Institutes of Health in Washington, DC, in 1936, in what she later called "a golden opportunity." At the time, she was one of only a handful of women working as research scientists for the federal government.

1In addition to her work on vaccines, one of her most important breakthroughs emerged during World War II. Wounded soldiers often showed signs of infections after blood plasma infusions, infections tied to the infusions. Pittman inspected the storage and processing procedures used and quickly devised a new strategy with other NIH scientists. Soon, they established new tests and new lab standards to ensure the safety of the plasma given to the wounded. Post-operative recovery rates improved dramatically as a result. Pittman noted in a later interview that this led directly to test samples being taken at the time of blood donation and modern tests for HIV or hepatitis contamination from donated blood. By 1957, the NIH appointed Pittman to head the Laboratory of Bacterial Products, a position she would hold for the next 14 years. With this promotion, she became the first woman to head a national lab in the United States. Pittman was in high demand at scientific conferences, and she traveled the world speaking about her research. In the 1960s, she was participating in studies of cholera outbreaks in Bangladesh and participating in World Health Organization projects to stem the tide of infectious diseases in the poorest parts of the world. She also researched a salmonella vaccine. Throughout her career, Pittman made public health her primary interest. This devotion to science and public safety led to her colleagues electing her as president of the Washington Academy of Science and the Society of American Bacteriologists. In 1970, she was given the Federal Women's Award by the US Department of the Interior. She retired in 1971 at the age of 70, respected around the world. However, still possessing an unquenchable thirst for knowledge, she went back to the lab as a guest researcher for the NIH, conducting studies and experiments without pay. She also continued to publish important articles in prestigious medical journals on different vaccines and research into different bacteria and diseases into the 1990s. In her later years, she remembered the difficult times her family faced after the death of her father and how her mother had worked so hard to take care of them. To honor her, in 1981, Pittman established the Virginia McCormick Pittman Distinguished Professorship at Hendrix College in Conway. Today, the Pittman Professorship is considered one of the highest honors for Hendrix professors and has been held by an eclectic group of scholars including Dr. Bruce Haggard, a biologist, and Dr. Stephen Kerr, an economist. In 1986, Pittman was given an honorary fellowship from the American Academy of Pediatrics for her work on vaccines. Though she was never a medical doctor, her breakthroughs in the lab made the practice of medicine so much easier for modern physicians. By 1993, at the age of 92, she stepped away from the lab from the last time. The next year, the NIH established the Margaret Pittman Lectureship in her honor. She died in Cheverley, Maryland, not far from Washington, DC, in 1995, on her ninety-fourth birthday.



Legislative budget hearings have begun at the state Capitol, in preparation for the 2025 regular session that begins in January.

Members of the Legislative Council and the Joint Budget Committee will review in detail every state agency spending request. In November the governor will submit a balanced budget proposal, which will be a starting point in writing budgets for state government. According to the Arkansas Constitution, the legislature has the final say in all fiscal decisions.

The Senate and House Education Committees completed a vital first step in the budget process. They recommended a 2.48 percent increase in all the

various categories that make up foundation school funding.

Public school funding is the starting point in the legislative budgeting process because the Constitution mandates that the state provide all children with an adequate and equitable education.

The state Supreme Court has ruled that the legislature's constitutional duty is to fund an adequate education system. Legislators must first determine how much money is needed for education, rather than simply funding schools based on how much the state can afford after it has funded other programs.

Arkansas operates under a balanced budget law known as the Revenue Stabilization Act, which requires state agencies to reduce spending if tax revenue declines due to an economic downturn. The importance of school funding was reaffirmed in 2003 when the legislature passed the so-called "doomsday law" that protects school funding from budget cuts.

State government in Ar-

kansas spends more than \$39 billion a year. More than \$6.3 billion comes from state revenue sources such as sales taxes, individual income taxes and corporate income taxes. The largest single expenditure of state tax dollars will go to public schools from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Last year that was \$2.57 billion.

State agencies will spend more than \$12 billion in federal funds. Last year most of that amount, about \$7.4 billion in federal funding, went to the state Human Services Department for Medicaid and other health services. State government paid for about \$1.8 billion of the DHS budget.

The state collects about \$894 million in special revenues, which come from taxes levied for special purposes. The Transportation Department maintains highways and bridges and collects about \$673 million in special revenue from motor fuels taxes and fees.

Colleges and universities receive about \$783 million in state aid. They generate an additional \$5.4 billion in cash funds, derived from tuition and fees. The University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences has the largest source of cash funds, raising about \$2.5 billion a year.


The University of Arkansas at Favetteville generates about \$1.3 billion in cash funds, compared to \$212 million it receives in state funding. Arkansas State University at Jonesboro generates about \$224 million in cash funds and receives about \$63 million in state aid.

Last year the state spent \$568 million on corrections, including \$25.8 million paid to counties for holding state inmates in county jails. State prisons also generated about \$40 million in special revenue and cash funds from their farm and industry operations. In all, the total operating budget for corrections was \$662 million. That included the costs of supervising parolees who had been released early from prison.

Most notable will be the length of time waiting to receive a passport, thanks to the tremendous work by the U.S. State Department to bring processing times back to pre-pandemic levels. The Bureau of Consular Affairs says applicants should now expect four to six weeks for routine service and two to three weeks for expedited processing.

You may have heard about or even personally experienced the extensive backlog in passport applications that wreaked time or are beyond your renewal date, visit Travel.State.Gov/ passport for the latest forms and fees.

Another recent improvement will be evident for Americans who need to renew a passport. The new Online Passport Renewal (OPR) system is a secure, online process that saves time and effort. This innovation helps applicants avoid having to send a paper application, photos or a check by mail. Instead, all this information and payment can be submitted online at Travel.State.Gov/ renewonline. In today's world where convenience and accessibility are key elements that inform our decision-making, this option should satisfy many of those planning a visit abroad

in the years ahead.
