Kenya State Visit Revives Calls for FTA

Congressional leaders rallied around the idea of a Free Trade Agreement for Kenya, while the Biden Administration continues to pursue its U.S.-Kenya Strategic Trade and Investment Partnership (STIP) with its associated "high-standard commitments."

STIP is inteneded for the United States and Kenya to resolve various nontariff trade issues— including on agriculture, anti-corruption efforts, digital trade, environmental issues, workers' rights, and trade facilitation. <u>READ MORE</u>

Sec 301 Tariffs: Details Published in FR; Exclusions Extended

WTO / Looking for a "Way Forward"

World Trade Organization General Council Chair Petter Olberg informed members yesterday that a retreat will be convened on July 8-9 to discuss how the WTO can remain a "forward-looking organization" amidst continued stalemates on several issues, said people familiar with the development.

The hidden goal of the retreat seems to be aimed at changing the consensus-based decision-making as enshrined in the Marrakesh Agreement that established the WTO in 1995, said a trade envoy who asked not to be quoted. <u>READ</u> <u>MORE</u>

WTO / Debate over Responsible Consensus

REPO Now, say Lawmakers

Boeing Snared in Chinese Sanctions

After deftly avoiding the sanctions levied in the past on US Defense contractors by Beijing for their transactions with Taipei, Boeing's Defense, Space & Security unit has been placed on the Ministry of Commerce's "unreliable entities list" (UEL).

In April MofCom sanctioned dronemaker General Atomics and General Dynamics Land Systems, while the announcement omitted Boeing, the maker of Taipei's Harpoon anti-ship missile system. The May 20 announcement reiterates the April actions, adding Boeing. <u>READ MORE</u>

Chinese Sanction Ex-Rep. Gallagher

China's Foreign Ministry on Tuesday announced countermeasures against former U.S. lawmaker Mike Gallagher. He will be banned from entry into China, and all types of property and assets of his in China will be frozen starting on May 21.

Organizations and individuals within the territory of China are prohibited from engaging in relevant transactions, cooperation and other activities with Gallagher. If the sanctions are strictly enforced, those who transact with him, including individuals and institutions, could be affected. <u>READ MORE</u>

Early Self-Disclosure Spares Biochem Supplier

Two Florida men have pleaded guilty to one count of wire fraud conspiracy for their roles in a scheme to fraudulently procure deeply discounted products from Massachusetts biochemical company Sigma-Aldrich Inc., doing business as MilliporeSigma, and export them to China using falsified export documents.

As a result of MilliporeSigma's timely self-disclosure and extraordinary cooperation, MilliporeSigma will not be charged, despite the criminal wrongdoing committed by a MilliporeSigma employee. <u>READ MORE</u>

Tax Credits Proposed for Puerto Rico Pharma

BMW, Jaguar Land Rover, and Volkswagen all rely on suppliers banned for using Uyghur forced labor, according to a report issued by the Senate Finance Committee.

Interviews and documents obtained by committee staff show that Bourns, Inc., a California-based auto supplier, had sourced components from Sichuan Jingweida Technology Group, a company added to the UFLPA Entity List in December 2023, and whose goods are presumed to be made with forced labor. <u>READ MORE</u>

Farm Export Promotion Funds Flow

Section 321, 19 USC 1321 is the statute that describes de minimis, which provides admission of articles free of duty, but the aggregate fair retail value of articles imported by one person on one day and exempted from the payment of duty shall not exceed \$800. READ MORE
