Corporate Whistleblower Site Launches

Friday the Justice Department rolled out its corporate whistleblower awards program, launching justice.gov/CorporateWhistleblower for the reporting of information about certain types of corporate crime. If the Justice Department brings a prosecution that results in the forfeiture of criminal proceeds, the whistleblower may be eligible to receive a portion of that forfeiture as a monetary award.

The Pilot Program covers four areas of corporate crime not covered by existing whistleblower regimes: foreign corruption, foreign corrupt conduct, financial institutions and fraud against private insurers.

Customs reform inches forward

U.S. Senators Bill Cassidy, M.D. (R-LA) and Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV) released a discussion draft of their Customs Facilitation Act of 2024, following on last year's efforts to prod reform in the trade facilitation bureaucracy. Vietnam Non-Market Economy Status Unchanged

The Commerce Department announced Friday that it has made the decision to continue classifying Vietnam as a non-market economy country for purposes of calculating US antidumping duties on imports from Vietnam. Despite Vietnam's substantive reforms made over the past 20 years, the extensive government involvement in Vietnam's economy distorts Vietnamese prices and costs and ultimately render them unusable for the purpose of calculating US antidumping duties, Commerce said. Senate's Commerce Funding Clears Committee

The Senate Appropriations Committee completed the markup of the "Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act S.4795 providing \$11.54 billion for the Department of Commerce.

This includes \$206 million for the Bureau of Industry and Security [BIS]. The recommendation is \$15 million above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level and \$17.4 million below the budget request. READ MORE

Chips R&D Promotion Bill Proposed

House Select Committee on China Chairman John Moolenaar (R-Mich) and ranking Democrat Raja Krishnamoorthi (III) unveiled bipartisan legislation yesterday to boost US semiconductor research and development in order to compete against China's attempt to dominate the industry.

The Semiconductor Technology Advancement and Research Act would create an investment tax credit for semiconductor design expenditures. READ MORE

Canada - US Technology Safeguards Agreement

Canada and the United States have concluded substantive negotiations for a Technology Safeguards Agreement (TSA). Global Affairs Canada announced Friday.

The Canada-United States TSA, upon its entry into force, will establish the legal and technical safeguards needed to allow the use of U.S. space launch technology, expertise and data for space launches in Canada while ensuring the proper handling of sensitive U.S. technology.

The bilateral treaty-level agreement would allow American organizations to conduct space launch activities in Canada with local service providers. READ MORE

More Houthi Sanctions: Yemen & PRC

Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) is sanctioning two individuals and four companies that have facilitated weapons procurement for Ansarallah, commonly referred to as the Houthis. This action targets key actors located in the People's Republic of China (PRC), including Hong Kong, and Yemen who have directly supported Houthis' efforts to procure military-grade materials abroad and ship these items to Houthi-controlled areas of Yemen, enabling the group's ongoing attacks.

Iranian Missile and UAV Procurement - China Nexus

Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) is targeting five individuals and seven entities based in Iran, the People's Republic of China (PRC), and Hong Kong that have facilitated procurements on behalf of subordinates of Iran's Ministry of Defense and Armed Forces Logistics (MODAFL).

Those designated procure various components, including accelerometers and gyroscopes, which serve as key inputs to Iran's ballistic missile and unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) program. Iran's acquisition of critical missile and UAV components continues to enable its proliferation of weapons systems to its proxies in the Middle East and to Russia." READ MORE

"Bay of Piglets" mastermind arrested on firearms charges

A former Green Beret and his Venezuelan sidekick were arrested Tuesday and charged with conspiracy to violate export laws, smuggling goods from the United States, violating the Arms Export Control Act, and violating the Export Control Reform Act, as well as violating the National Firearms Act and unlawful possession of machine guns. The charges relate to the failed 2020 attempt to invade Venezuela by a ragtag group of irregulars seeking the overthrow of Maduro Government. READ MORE

IPEF Partners Establish Supply Chain Bodies

Commerce announced the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework for Prosperity (IPEF) Agreement Relating to Supply Chain Resilience concluded inaugural virtual meetings of the three supply chain bodies established under the Agreement – the Supply Chain Council, the Crisis Response Network, and the Labor Rights Advisory Board.

Pursuant to the Supply Chain Agreement, the IPEF partners established three supply chain bodies – a Supply Chain Council to pursue targeted, action-oriented work to strengthen the supply chains for those sectors and goods most critical to national security, public health, and economic well-being; a Crisis Response Network to provide a forum for collective emergency response to exigent or imminent disruptions; and a Labor Rights Advisory Board that brings together workers, employers, and governments at the same table to strengthen labor rights and workforce development across regional supply chains. EXIM set to approve Malaysian Refinery Funding

Export-Import Bank of the United States (EXIM) has received an application for final commitment for a long-term loan or financial guarantee to support the work of Honeywell UOC's engineering of the Pengareng Energy Complex at the tip of the Malaysian Peninsula.

In February the Board received a request to increase the financed amount to a \$743 million direct loan to support the export of approximately \$439 million worth of U.S. engineering services, design services, licenses, catalysts, and refining equipment. READ MORE
