President Trump's FY2026 Budget Proposal

On May 2, 2025, the Trump administration submitted its discretionary budget proposal for fiscal year (FY) 2026, calling for a \$163 billion cut (approximately 23%) in non-defense discretionary spending compared to FY2025, while increasing defense funding by 13% to \$1.01 trillion and allocating \$175 billion to border security. A portion of this increase—\$325 billion—is expected to be enacted via reconciliation.

The Commerce budget includes \$134 million in targeted investments to "strengthen trade enforcement and aggressively protect American innovation." This includes an additional \$122 million for the Bureau of Industry and Security, a more than 50-percent increase, while cutting \$145 million from the category "International Trade Administration – Global Markets." Stacked Tariff Walk-Back

President Donald Trump signed an Executive Order on April 29 designed to mitigate the cumulative tariff burden imposed on imports under various U.S. trade remedy authorities. A separate Presidential Proclamation issued the same day modifies the 25% Section 232 tariff on imported auto parts, allowing U.S. manufacturers to claim offsets: READ MORE

India is actively pursuing a bilateral trade agreement with the United States that includes provisions for relaxed export controls, aiming to facilitate greater access to advanced technologies. U.S - Ukraine Post War Reconstruction Fund

The United States and Ukraine have signed a landmark agreement establishing the United States— Ukraine Reconstruction Investment Fund, a joint initiative aimed at mobilizing capital for Ukraine's postwar reconstruction, economic recovery, and strategic transformation following Russia's full-scale invasion in 2022.

Signed by U.S. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent and Ukraine's First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Economy Yulia Svyrydenko, the agreement lays the legal and operational foundation for a limited partnership between the U.S. International Development Finance Corporation (DFC) and Ukraine's State Agency for Support of Public-Private Partnership. Pacific Freight Market Collapse

NASA Contractor Declination for Self-Disclosure

The Justice Department announced that it has declined the prosecution of Universities Space Research Association (USRA) after it self-disclosed five years ago criminal violations of U.S. export control laws committed by its former employee. Jonathan Soong pleaded guilty in January 2023 to willfully violating the Export Administration Regulations (EAR) by exporting U.S. Army-developed aviation software to a university in the People's Republic of China (PRC) that had been placed on the Commerce Department's Entity List and was sentenced to 20 months in prison. Rocket Fuel to Iran Sanctions

Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) has designated six entities and six individuals in Iran and the People's Republic of China (PRC) for operating a procurement network that facilitates the supply of ballistic missile propellant ingredients to Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC).

The network has been involved in the procurement and shipment of sodium perchlorate and dioctyl sebacate from the PRC to Iran. Sodium perchlorate is a precursor to ammonium perchlorate, a material controlled under the Missile Technology Control Regime (MTCR) and integral to the manufacture of solid propellant rocket motors. Dioctyl sebacate similarly supports the production of ballistic missile technology. READ MORE

Treasury Alert on Mexican Oil Smugglers

The Treasury Department announced sanctions targeting individuals and entities tied to oil smuggling and narcotics trafficking networks linked to the Jalisco New Generation Cartel (CJNG). The action aligns with the Administration's focus on southwest border enforcement and the financial disruption of designated Foreign Terrorist Organizations.

The Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) designated three Mexican nationals and two Mexico-based companies for their roles in smuggling crude oil stolen from Petróleos Mexicanos (Pemex) into the United States. READ MORE
