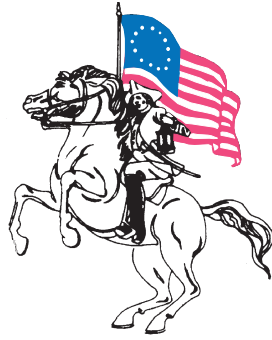

Dastardly Deeds Deterred By Deputies

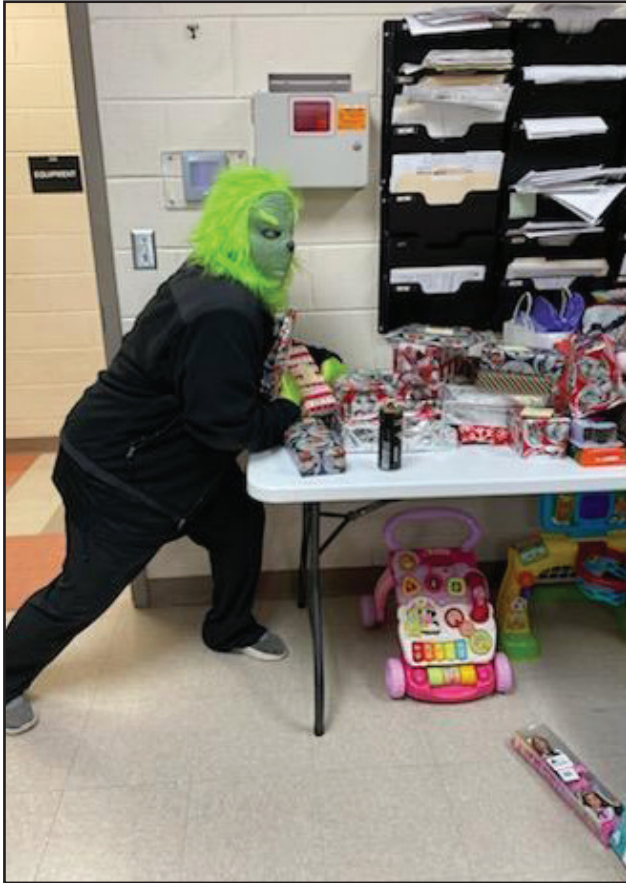

Rose Announces Office Hours

"We are ready to assist constituents with federal casework and welcome anyone with questions to sit down with staff," said Representative Rose. "My goal is to make the expertise of my staff and the resources of this office easily accessible to every person I represent."

District Director Rebecca Foster will be representing Rose in Jamestown at the Fentress County Courthouse on Wednesday, December 20, from 10:30am until 11:30am.

Fentress Saw 99% Graduation Rate

The Tennessee Department of Education announced the 2022-23 statewide graduation rate is 90.6 percent, exceeding ninety percent for the first time and achieving the highest graduation rate on record since 2012.

"Tennessee's continuous commitment to ensuring students are successful in graduating from high school on time is demonstrated in this year's statewide graduation rate and is a direct result of the hard work of Tennessee directors of schools, administrators, and educators have done with our families and students," said Lizzette Reynolds, Commissioner of Education. "Earning a diploma and graduating high school is a milestone that unlocks so many opportunities for students as they begin their lives after K-12 education, and I am thrilled to see Tennessee's graduation rate at a record high."

For the 2022-23 school year, the most notable takeaways from graduation data include:

Alcoa City Schools, Clay County Schools, Fentress County Schools, Haywood County Schools, and South Carroll Special School District each had over 99% graduation rates.

61 districts graduated 95% or more of their eligible students on time.

78 districts improved their graduation rates from 2022 to 2023, with nine districts improving by five percentage points

or more. 896 more students graduated in the 2023 cohort compared to last year, for a total of 65,476 students graduating across the state.

29 districts improved graduation rates for the

economically disadvantaged student group by five percentage points or more.

37 districts improved graduation rates for the students with disabilities student group by five percentage points

or more. The department continues to offer several initiatives to accelerate academic achievement and prepare students for postsecondary success, including summer programming, TN

ALL Corps, Innovative School Models, and AP Access for All.

Holding the score down, the Dragons made the score remain the same. And with that, the 2023 Dragon Football season comes to an end. They made history, hosting playoffs, scoring 30 plus points in the third round of playoffs, and having a 13-0 record. Thank you for the dedication of every single football player for having an amazing season. It was hard to see you lose, but in every way possible, every fan in the stands that night knew you all had worked hard to get where you are.

We will also be closed Monday, January 1st in celebration of New Year's Day. Our deadline for the January 3rd edition will be Thursday, December 28 at 10:00am.

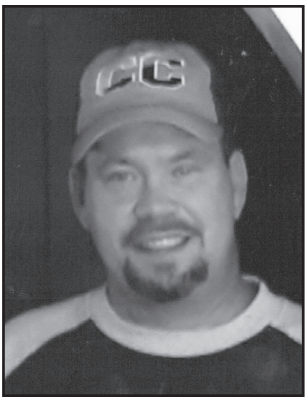

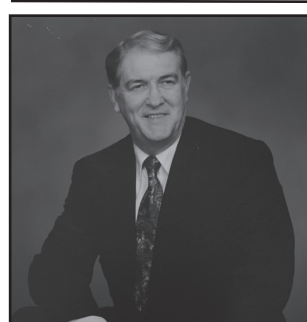

From Twin Lakes Telephone Cooperative Corp.

The Tennessee Public Utilities Commission designated Twin Lakes Telephone Cooperative Corp. ("Twin Lakes") the "Eligible Telecommunications Carrier" for its service area for universal service purposes. The goal of universal service is to provide all citizens access to essential telecommunications services.

Twin Lakes provides the supported services—voice telephony service and broadband Internet access service—throughout its designated service area. **This includes access to:**

- Voice grade access to the public switched network
- Minutes of use for local service provided at no additional charge
- Access to emergency services provided by local government or other public safety organizations, such as 911 and enhanced 911
- Toll limitation service for qualifying low-income customers
- Broadband Internet access service which includes the capability to send data to and receive data from the Internet, but excludes dial-up service.

Twin Lakes Telephone Cooperative Corp. provides basic single party residence (with unlimited local usage) and basic business service for rates which range from \$22.34-\$39.99 for residential customers and \$27.50-\$36.99 for business customers. Broadband Internet access service is provided at rates which start at \$49.99 per month for residential customers and \$69.99 per month for business customers. Twin Lakes would be pleased to provide you with specific rates for your area upon request.

Twin Lakes offers qualified customers a Lifeline Service Discount. Lifeline is a non-transferable, federal benefit that makes monthly phone or broadband service more affordable. Eligible households may apply the monthly Lifeline discount on either voice (home or wireless) or broadband (home or wireless), but not both. The current discount provided under Twin Lakes Lifeline service is \$9.25 per month for broadband with a minimum speed of 25/3 Mbps subject to certain exceptions or \$5.25 per month for voice-only service for each month the customer qualifies.

A household is eligible for the Lifeline discount if the customer's annual household income is at or below 135% of the federal poverty guidelines. You may also qualify for the Lifeline program if a customer, a dependent, or the customer's household participates in one or more of the following programs:

- Medicaid
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- Supplemental Security Income;
- Federal Public Housing Assistance (FPHA)
- Veterans and Survivors Pension Benefit.

Twin Lakes is an active participant in the Affordable Connectivity Program. The Affordable Connectivity Program is a federal government benefit program operated by the FCC that helps ensure households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more. The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households. The Affordable Connectivity Program is non-transferable and limited to one monthly service discount per household. If the program ends, or when a household is no longer eligible, subscribers will be subject to Twin Lakes' standard internet rates and terms. Add A Rosemary Topiary This Holiday Season

Add a fresh look and fragrance to your holidays with a potted Rosemary plant. This favorite herb of cooks, crafters, and gardeners can be sheared into the shape of a wreath, small tree or orb and found at garden centers and florists.

The pine scent and attractive foliage make it a wonderful addition to the holidays. It adds nice color, texture, and fragrance to any room or holiday decor. Add a bow and decorative pot for the perfect hostess or holiday gift.

Rosemary was as popular a Christmas plant as mistletoe and holly until the 20th Century. It's not clear why this plant fell out of favor. Whatever the reason it has not stopped Rosemary from making a big comeback for the holidays.

Rosemary represents love and remembrance, a great sentiment to share during the holidays. Give the plant a pet and the aroma that follows is sure to lift your spirits. Or pluck a sprig to add welcome flavor to your winter meals and beverages. Then move it outdoors in the garden when the danger of frost has passed.

Regular trimming will help maintain its topiary form and keep the plant producing more stems and leaves for a fuller, more robust plant. Prune back or remove overgrown or wayward branches to maintain the desired shape. Remove and use the leaves on these long stems, then turn them into skewers for cooking kabobs. Use trimmings from the tender stem tips and leaves to flavor your holiday meals or mix a few of these into your holiday centerpieces and wreaths.

Keeping Rosemary plants alive and looking their best throughout the winter can be challenging. Grow it in a cool location with bright light to boost your success. Use artificial lights if natural light is limited.

Avoid drafts of hot and cold air. Water your plant thoroughly but only when the soil is just start-

ing to dry. Allowing the soil to go too dry or keeping it too wet will result in the death of your plant. Pour off any excess water that collects in the saucer. Or place pebbles or marbles in the saucer to elevate the pot above any excess water.

Skip the fertilizer since most plants are experiencing limited growth during winter. Begin fertilizing as needed once the days lengthen and the plants are actively growing in spring.

And if your plant dies, stick it in a corner out of sight, but within reach. A gentle petting of even a dead Rosemary plant will still release a wonderful fragrance for you to enjoy.

Rosemary (*Rosmarinus officinalis*) is a Mediterranean native and hardy to zone 8. This evergreen perennial herb grows 4 to 6 feet tall outdoors in zones 8 and warmer. There are a few cultivars like Alcalde Cold Hardy, Arp, Athens Blue Spire, and Madeline

Hill that are supposed to be hardy to zone 6.

You may have discovered, or others have told you that growing Rosemary indoors can be challenging. Don't let past failures stop you from trying. Just keep trying until you find the location and maintenance routine that keeps your Rosemary thriving under your care. Then consider drying and preserving some of the Rosemary for cooking or gifting to friends and family.
