


Greetings!

oin Special Olympics dedicated Polar Plungers, volunteers, families and friends on Feb. 15 for the 2019 SUPER Plunge. Over a 24-hour period, the truly elite Plungers will take 24 icy dips (once an hour, every hour) into Lake Michigan as part of the SUPER Plunge to benefit Special Olympics Illinois.

All SUPER Plungers and their support person will spend the 24 hours in a heated tent on the beach during this fun, round-the-clock event. This year's event will take place on the campus of Northwestern Illinois University, 2311 Campus Dr. in Evanston.

Anyone who is ready to "be bold and get cold" can be a SUPER Plunger!

Each SUPER Plunger is asked to raise a minimum of \$2,500 to participate in this extreme event.

Aside from the SUPER plunge, there are 23 other opportunities to join in on the freezing endeavor.

Each year, the Polar Plunge challenges thousands of individuals at numerous locations across heart wanting to support Special Olympics athletes is welcome to participate.

Over the past 20 years, 72,000-plus plunges have raised more than \$20 million for the organization. The funds benefit the more than 23,000 Special Olympics athletes and nearly 20,000 young



Overcoming limits on the slopes

Skiing as a sport is so much more than an athletic endeavor. It is a connection between families and friends. It is a challenge. It is above all else, a sport for all ability levels.

he ski hill is home to many, including, Special Olympics Illinois athletes Louis Pisani and Cole Paravola. Louis and Cole compete with DuPage Valley Special Athletes (DVSA). Both boys have had a passion for skiing for as long as they can remember.

Louis's parents, Paul and Kish Pisani, spend any free time they have on the slopes. On any given Sunday, you could find the Pisani family skiing. Paul and Kish saw their son's love for the sport and wanted to bring that love to other Special Olympics Illinois athletes.

With the hope of others finding the same love in skiing, DVSA was founded in 2014. The Pisanis felt skiing was a great way to spend time together as a family. They felt it brought people together no matter their experience level. Whether an individual has never been skiing before or is a level three skier, there is a spot for everyone with this sport.

Skiing has given athletes like Louis and Cole the confidence to make great strides in their athletics. This past December, Louis, Cole, and their families took a trip to Colorado. There they spent some time working with the Breckenridge Outdoor Education Center (BOEC).

BOEC provides people with disabilities and/ or special needs the opportunity to experience a variety of snow sports, one of those being skiing. The boys took a ski racing lesson from the adaptive ski instructors at BOEC. On the slopes, the boys felt confident and fearless. After the trip, they felt ready to take on regional and state competitions back in Illinois.

"Skiing has allowed athletes like Louis and Cole to be recognized by their ability and not their disability," said Kish Pisani. "Skiing is one place where many athletes feel fearless."

No matter what the starting point, anyone can learn to ski. The sport is universal for all individuals. Louis and Cole's passion for the sport of skiing resembles that of the Special Olympics athlete oath: "Let me win. But if I cannot win, let me be brave in the attempt."

Deere 'Dollars for Doers' supports Special Olympics

GALENA—Several John Deere employees help with the Special Olympics Illinois Winter Games and donate to the cause at the same time through the company's Dollars for Doers program.

Through the Dollars for Doers program, the John Deere Foundation may provide funds to any eligible organization for which an eligible employee volunteers at a rate of \$25 per hour, with a maximum of \$1,000 per employee per fiscal year while the budget remains.

A portion of the John Deere employees' donations go toward the publication of this special section, while the remainder goes directly to Special Olympics Illinois.

An employee must track their time in the Power for Good tool, within the same fiscal year that the employee volunteered. An employee can track their hours each time they volunteer or in lump sums, remembering there is a chance the program will be fully utilized as the fiscal year progresses.




volunteer activities should support the John Deere Foundation's philanthropic focus areas of solutions for world hunger, community development and education.

Employees are also encouraged to participate in initiatives for which they have a personal passion or interest. Both types of volunteerism are eligible to receive Dollars for Doers.

Employees can assist non-profit causes to be reviewed for eligibility by Nominating a Cause in the Quick Links section of the Power for Good tool.

"Whenever I recruit a volunteer from Deere to help at Winter Games, I always encourage them to submit their hours through the Power for Good tool, so that there is a corresponding donation made to SOILL," said Scott Price, a John Deere employee who has volunteered with Special Olympics for years. "Kelly Fehr, who has been helping for two days of Winter Games each year for the last several years always submits his hours, and some of the others do also."
