Thomson Prison

The Thomson prison is not a new subject and to imply it has been a long journey is an understatement. State and federal governments have made large investments in this prison and I realize the local communities have matched these efforts.

The Administrative United States Penitentiary (AUSP) at Thomson currently employs nearly 400 staff, with a future full staffing complement of over 600. While a majority of our staff and their families are from the local area, a large number have transferred from other institutions and now reside in vour communities.

They are a diverse group with diverse needs and their presence has a compounding effect as salaries are redistributed throughout the local area, in housing, food, goods, services, and taxes.

As our staffing levels continue to grow, the demand for homes and other amenities also increase. Affordable and desirable housing along with good quality schools and day care centers determine where Bureau of Prisons' staff reside. They need

apartments, rental houses, starter homes and larger homes for their expanding families.

Unfortunately, for some, commuting a long distance is necessary, with some staff traveling as far north as Dubuque and south beyond the Quad Cities.

AUSP Thomson is now offering new correctional officers a sign-on bonus of 10 percent of their salary and after successfully completing one year of service; new staff will receive a one-time bonus of over \$4,000. However, this may not be enough to entice staff to reside in the local community.

Therefore, I humbly request your assistance in advocating for more housing development. Please do what you can to create conversations among community leadership and residential developers. I fear that without noticeable development, the lack of housing may become a determining factor against relocating to this area.

As always, thank you for your interest in AUSP Thomson and the hospitality provided to Bureau staff and their families. The local communities have always made us feel at home and AUSP Thomson intends to be a good neighbor.

hat is 'wondrously mad

nat in the world could my discovery of liverworts in a close-up photo of mosses along my stream have to do with brothels in Jo Daviess County in the mid-19th century?

A week ago while I was hiking along my stream

to discover what the storms had churned up, I was surrounded by the rich vibrancy and variety of greens. I focused my camera on a bit of moss which caught my eye because of its intense color.

When I got back up my hill to check it out, I enlarged the photo allowing myself to zoom in on what seemed like tiny leaves. To my astonishment, they

were like nothing I had ever seen! They had no veins like ordinary leaves and instead had what seemed to be a scaled surface.

I posted my picture on Facebook with a question. "Does anyone know what this is?" Fortunately, Randy Nyboer, naturalist, responded.

"A fine specimen of liverwort," he wrote.

I immediately looked up liverwort and discovered that the plant is ancient! It was here on our planet before plants had roots and vascular systems. I suspect what had drawn me to it was some message from 470 million years ago, for that is when liverworts appeared. Our sweet, tender planet! How

wondrously made! How much I have missed seeing

Recently, I have been paying particular attention to groups of people whose history often renders them invisible. Surely, they also are also wondrously made and deserving of reverence.

This week, I have been listening to a series of fine BBC podcasts on the struggles of worldwide

refugees. Though I know of such struggles from my own fieldwork, I am particularly agonized by the plights of young women caught by human trafficking in the sex trades.

Because the Friends of Wapello (Galena Gazette, May 22) were clearing what had reputedly been a location where a 1940s brothel once stood, I began to wonder if prostitution existed in our region in the 19th century. I could not help but think about the women themselves.

There are a few references to houses of prostitution in the Galena Daily Gazette. On April 14, 1883, the Gazette wrote of the grim discovery of the remains of a woman. The article continues, "A house of prostitution is said to have located many years ago near where the gas works now stand, and it is thought by some that the remains were those of some unfortunate inmate."

On May 8, 1874, the Galena Daily Gazette reports that the "keep of the bawdy house on the East Side expires tomorrow. If moral and legal suasion will not have the effect to abate this nuisance, the neighbors propose to resort to other means."

Even earlier on July 18, 1859, a woman's name is published while the man remains protected. "Yesterday a Teutonic gentleman and Mary St. Peter were caught in flagrante delicto, for which both were fined \$5. Mary, not possessing the 'ready-go-down,' was sent to the calaboose. The Dutch Lothario gave security for the payment of the cost of violating the city ordinance."

Was the unfortunate Mary a prostitute who the

reporter assumes was not yet paid? Or was she attacked? The man is described as a Lothario at the same time he is described as a gentleman. In 1859, he was a protected seducer while Mary was named and humiliated.

One of the "oldest landmarks in Galena," which had been built in 1828, was torn down in 1887. It was located on "lower Main street, near Casserly's corner." The Galena Gazette of June 6, 1887, states that it "was at one time a notorious house of ill repute."

Though I will need to do more thorough research to add to this still rudimentary information on brothels, I do wish to include what is the tragic tale of Lizzie O'Rourke who, when charged with prostitution according to the Galena Daily Gazette, Jan. 28, 1879, had her son taken from her by the county superintendent. What great human suffering in that tale about which we know so little!

Because we are living in a time when life itself is threatened on our planet, I am finding all life exquisitely remarkable. Thus, I am left with the apparently odd similarity between liverwort and prostitution.

One does not have to be religious to appreciate the 139th Psalm. When I lived for a time as a hermit after experiencing such violence in my own life, that Psalm gave me comfort. Especially, that I was "wondrously made."

I remained awed by a bit of liverwort sending me its 470 million-vear-old message. All life, liverwort and prostitutes are "wondrously made." With reverence, we must honor them both with equally gentle tenacity.





Council considers liquor licenses

GALENA—Galena will soon have a new category of liquor license, this one for salon/day spa businesses. At the Tuesday, May 28 Galena City Council meeting, the council approved, by a 4-2 vote, the first reading of an ordinance amending city code to create a liquor license for salon/day spa businesses.

Council member Jerry Kieffer, who spoke out at the last meeting in opposition to another classification of licenses, remained against the move, as did council member Pam Bernstein, who was not at the May 13 meeting.

Council members Chris Allendorf, Robert Hahn, Marc McCoy and Jerry Westemeier voted in favor.

At the May 13 council meeting, Tina Knautz, who is planning to open the Studio One Green Spa and Salon in the Gateway Park Subdivision, made the request

In approving the first reading, council members discussed better defining the time period for the new license before eventually settling on 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

McCoy said that by establishing the new classification, there is some type of monitoring taking

place. He also likes that Galena is doing something different

When it came to a creating a liquor license for beer and wine only, without an associated restaurant, what would be called a "Class J-1" license, the city council opted not to move forward. Instead, the council plans to expand the number of available Class A licenses and issue one to the business. The Class A is a full-service license intended for bars. The Class A permits the sale of all alcoholic beverages.

Currently, all eight Class A licenses authorized by the city code are issued to operating businesses, so an ordinance is needed to expand the number.

The issue arose at the May 13 meeting when Lisa Kempner, who plans to open a high-end champagne bar on Main Street with her sister, requested the new type of license.

In examining the Class J-1 concept, Allendorf was opposed. He noted that pretty much every business in Galena would qualify for a liquor license with that model and he didn't like the idea of this type of business competing against already established restaurants with bars.

McCoy and Bernstein both said they thought

an additional Class A license made sense in this situation

Both requests will eventually go before the liquor commission for approval.

Other business

In other business, the council:

• approved a request by the Galena Center for the Arts to use two parking spaces on Main Street for Chalkfest on June 14 and 15. The area will be in front of the Coatsworth building.

Allendorf, who was concerned with taking away parking spaces on a busy weekend, voted no. All others were in favor.

• approved installation of curb and gutter adjacent to the Greenwood and St. Mary's Cemetery on Gear Street. Estimated cost for curb/gutter and sidewalk including design and construction engineering will be \$104,926, funds will come from street resurfacing budget item which contains \$373,400.

• approved a contract to install parking for persons with disabilities at Grant Park. Wienen Excavating and Landscaping will install two parking spaces at a cost of \$17,065.

• approved a license for St. Matthew Lutheran Church to install lighting on Cemetery Park property.

• approved an internet services agreement with Northern Illinois University for the internet service at the fire department.

• approved a change order for \$2,815 for All Star Power Wash for the swimming pool sandblasting and painting project.

• approved a request by Midwest Medical Health and Fitness for the 15th annual fun walk/run on the Galena River Trail for Oct. 5.

• approved a request by Northern Illinois Wine Growers for the Corkless Wine Festival at Depot Park on June 22.

• approved a license for 1628 Field St., for garage improvements on the Hamilton Street right-of-way.

• approved a request by the Galena ARC to host the Fourth of July Community Day at Rec Park, including the Buckhill Run, on Thursday, July 4, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

• approved a budget amendment for year-end budget adjustments.

• heard the monthly water and sewer operations report from Matt Trotter, project manager for Veolia.

Miller-Steinke Galena license suspended, fined

GALENA–A long-time Galena funeral home does not have a licensed operator.

Ommar "Michael" Badran, Miller-Steinke Funeral Home's owner/operator in Galena, who also operates in Chicago and DuPage County, had his license indefinitely suspended and was fined \$15,000 by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation.

According to a Freedom of Information Act request fulfilled by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation (IDFPR), Badran had his license suspended in February for billing for services he did not provide, making false statements and dishonorable, unethical or unprofessional conduct of character likely to deceive, defraud or harm the public.

According to the documents, Badran promised certain services, and accepted payment for those services, but did not deliver. After the IDFPR filed a complaint against Badran, he neither filed a written reply nor did he appear at subsequent hearings.

Badran's failure to reply or appear was constituted to be an admission of the allegations, accord-

ing to the IDFPR.

According to the documents, the family of Frances Skaggs made arrangements with Badran for a funeral service in 2017, and paid Badran \$3,000. Badran charged for, but did not provide, a singer, tent and chairs and an obituary.

The documents state Badran provided a debit agreement to the family in October 2017, but incorrectly dated the agreement Sept. 19, 2017, which was declared a falsification of documents.

The IDFPR listed a second complaint against Badran, on behalf of the Janet Nelson Schlitt family. The complaint states arrangements included a religious service involving a pastor and a musician, burial at Greenwood Cemetery in Galena and an inscription on the headstone. The documents show Badran was paid \$12,000 through Schlitt's insurance.

Schlitt passed away in 2017 in Minnesota. Prior arrangements were made in 2014 with Miller Funeral Homes, before the location was bought out by Badran.

The Gazette reported Badran purchased the Galena location in 2017. After Schlitt's death, Badran was supposed to pay the Minnesota funeral home and pay for a headstone inscription.

The IDFPR states Badran failed to account for the funds he received as well as failing to return excess funds to Schlitt's beneficiary.

The IDFPR concluded that Badran made false statements to the Skaggs family and collected fees for services not rendered.

"(Badran's) conduct regarding the falsely dated debit agreement constitutes knowingly making any false statements of a character likely to influence, persuade or induce others in the course of performing professional services or activities," states the IDFPR complaint.

In both the Skaggs and Schlitt cases, the IDFPR concluded that Badran acted in a "dishonorable, unethical or unprofessional conduct of a character likely to deceive, defraud or harm the public."

Also, in both complaints, Badran did not provide either family with an agreement signed by both parties. The IDFPR indefinitely suspended Badran's funeral director and embalmer license and imposed a fine of \$15,000.

Documents show Badran initially failed to appear or respond, either in person or through counsel, to the IDFPR complaint in October 2018.

Badran also failed to appear or answer to the complaint in November 2018. Attempts to contact Badran for this story were unsuccessful.

Forest Therapy Walk at Sinsinawa June 29

SINSINAWA, Wis.-Nature will provide the setting for a new program at Sinsinawa Mound. Forest Therapy Walk will be held 9-11:30 a.m. Saturday, June 29.

Forest therapy is inspired by the Japanese practice of Forest Bathing. Forest therapy is not a naturalist walk. School board committee decides against policy for hiring faculty as coaches

GALENA-The Galena School Board's policy and legal update committee decided Tuesday, May 28 that establishing a board policy to address coaching opportunities for faculty members might not be the best course of action.

Superintendent Greg Herbst showed the committee-Brian McIntvre, Chuck Korte and John Rosenthal-a chart that showed which coaches are faculty members, which are employees of the district in another capacity and which are not otherwise employed by the district. For IHSA-sanctioned activities, there are more non-employees than faculty members.

Herbst said that up to this point there haven't been teaching candidates who have declined a position because a coaching opportunity wasn't available, but that is a possibility.

Herbst said he wanted to be proactive before something like that might occur and the district lose an excellent teacher. Coaches are at-will and hired every year.

Rosenthal was the first to point out that establishing a policy might not be best.

"Once you put it into a policy, I think it kind of

ties your hands," he said.

Herbst gave the example of new-hire Michael Decker, who will teach physical education next year. There is currently an opening for a middle school football coach, but Decker coached at the varsity level and could potentially be a candidate for head football coach at some point, Herbst said, so perhaps an assistant varsity position would be a better fit.

McIntyre and Korte agreed with Rosenthal that the administration having flexibility is a good thing.

Herbst said he appreciated all the comments in support of administration making the decisions they believe are in the best interest of the students. In a small town, Herbst noted, emotions can run high, and the board's trust in administration is very important. He agreed that continuing without a formal policy would be better.

The committee also discussed making sure coaching decisions are made earlier than they are currently so that coaches know what the future

Switching gears, the committee also addressed the district's attendance and truancy policy, which Herbst will discuss with the district's attorney to possibly clear up some language issues to make the policy more clear.

Students incorporated the facts into pieces of historical fiction which culminated into an anthology, Weston Writings. Weekly writing workshops were conducted by P.J. HartNaus allowing students to see the writing process from an author's

Her visit also allowed students to use their writing talents in a real world situation.

Copies were given to local libraries, historical societies as well as the Galena library's historical collection's room. Parents had the opportunity to purchase copies as well.

The familiarity and comfort of knowing students over multiple years is something he wishes all teachers could experience.

"I wish teachers from larger areas could see what we have here," said Hendren.

Building relationships with his students was what has kept Hendren coming back each school year. Throughout the county, Hendren still runs into former students who compliment him and his class.

Hendren said both Warren and River Ridge are supported by great communities.

"Warren, Elizabeth and Hanover have just been amazing," said Hendren.

Giving up being around the students was the hardest part to give up, said Hendren.

"The hardest part in making my decision to retire is this," said Hendren, motioning to his classroom

But Hendren also said he is now "at peace" with retiring and came to the realization it was time for him to start the next chapter in his life. Hendren said he knows his replacement and that the kids are in good hands, which made his decision to retire easier. Looking back on his career, Hendren said he has been very lucky.

"I consider myself so lucky," said Hendren. "What I wanted, I got. It's been fun."

Hendren said he looks forward to traveling with his wife and being able to spend more time outdoors. He said he's an avid hunter, fisherman and loves to go snowmobiling.

As his former students know, Hendren is a big Chicago sports fan and has his classroom decorated with memorabilia. His parents were originally from the south side of Chicago before moving to California.





The Wildcats advanced to the Lisle Super Sectional Final on Monday, May 27, where Mother Nature intervened as rain shortened the game to

Elgin Harvest Academy led 3-1 after five innings and a storm rolled in just as the Wildcats were about to bat in the top of the sixth with the heart of their order coming up.

"As soon as I heard it thunder, I knew our season was over," said Wildcats Coach Jeremy Knauer.

The game was called due to weather, giving the Lions the super sectional victory and a trip to the state tournament in Peoria.

"Maybe one of the most difficult things I have ever had to do was walk back on that bus and tell our players our season was over, despite only being down 3-1 with six outs left." Knauer said.

Both teams were strong on the mound on Monday, but Elgin harvest academy was just a little bit stronger at the plate.

Tayden Patterson started the game for River Ridge/Scales Mound Wildcats and recorded 15 outs.

The Wildcats got on the board first, scoring one run when Micah Knauer doubled. Elgin Harvest Academy tied the game, scoring on a stolen base


Elgin Harvest Academy scored one run on a stolen base to tie the game in the bottom of the second inning.

Knauer added that many of the players have gone "above and beyond, giving up a majority of their last seven summers traveling around on weekends across the Midwest."


He said the team had high hopes going into the season. A 4-6 record to start the season didn't seem to affect his players. They "didn't panic or lose faith." Knauer said.

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

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

Warren man receives 300 years

DEER LODGE, Mont.-A Warren man received 300 years in Montana prison for the rape of a child.

According to the Montana Standard, Charles M. Byrne, 47, Warren, was found guilty of three counts of sexual intercourse with a person under the age of 12. Byrne was sentenced to the maximum allowed by law, 300 years, where he has to serve 50 years before being considered for parole.

The case mirrors a 2010 case in Jo Daviess County where Byrne pleaded guilty to two counts aggravated criminal sexual abuse, both class 2 felonies. Byrne received eight years in prison for his abuse of two sisters, who at the time, were under the age of 13.

According to Jo Daviess County court transcripts, during a victim impact statement, one of the victims said, "You deserve life in prison for doing these things. I only wish I could make that happen."

That sentiment came partially true as, according to the Standard, the two Illinois victims testified at Byrne's trial. Byrne was sentenced to three consecutive 100-year sentences with no chance of parole for 50 years.

EMS committee mulls paid service

ELIZABETH-Small and large scale solutions to the county's EMS crisis were discussed during the Jo Daviess County Board's ad hoc committee on EMS sustainability meeting on Friday, May 24.

The committee has been tasked by the county board to explore long-term solutions to declining EMS rosters and missed pages and calls. Committee members have generally agreed that the county's EMS situation will only get worse if left unchecked, and that sometime in the future there will have to be a paid EMS service.

Committee member Scott Greene said every EMS agency will fail at some point.

"Looking at (missed calls and pages), it's going to fail," said Greene referencing data showing how many missed calls each agency has had since 2017.

Greene said the Hanover EMS collapse is only the beginning and that other county agencies are on track to fail as well. He suggested the committee start seriously considering laying groundwork for a paid service.

In 2017, there were 64 county EMS calls that went unanswered, with 24 due to no crew. In 2018, there were 60 unanswered calls, with 20 attributed to lack of personnel. In the first three months of 2019, there have been 15 unanswered calls with 9 due to no crew.

Committee member Mary Jo Losey said EMS is a public health and safety crisis and that a paid service Looking at (missed calls), it's going to fail.'

will ultimately be the only answer left.

"Public health and safety is the primary reason governments work for us," said Losey. "It's inevitable to go to a paid service."

Committee member Dan Schleicher also said a paid service is inevitable.

"In my mind, at some point, we are going to have to hire someone to do it," said Schleicher. "We just have to find a way to pay for it."

Committee member Richard Robinson said a paid service will be needed at some point.

"I think we have to move toward a paid position," said Robinson.

In exploring smaller scale solutions, committee member and county board chair Scott Toot said the committee's purpose is to look at as many options

"Every option needs to be explored for this report," said Toot.

Toot suggested a smaller-scale solution of having law enforcement personnel certified as emergency medical responders (EMR) or technicians (EMT).

Toot said many times law enforcement is dispatched to the scene of medical calls and are

often the first to arrive. Toot recognized the change would be a "band-aid," but one that could have a

"It would be a band-aid," said Toot, "but one that would help for several years."

Toot said law enforcement would have their EMT or EMR training paid for and receive a stipend for their efforts.

The committee's ultimate mission is to explore sustainability options and present its findings, recommendations and suggestions to the county board. All decisions regarding future actions will be made by the county board.

Mike Dittmar, committee member, said the committee isn't receiving input from all county EMS agencies. Losey said it is "vital" to have input from Warren and Stockton, whose representatives haven't attended meetings for the last few months.

work out a solution between themselves.'

East Dubuque Fire Chief Joe Heim is on the committee but has previously expressed East Dubuque is in good shape and does not have the same issues

"It's vital we have their input," said Losey. "Their input can be very valuable.'

Dittmar said at some point, the committee must proceed without agencies who are not participating. "If they are not showing up," said Dittmar, "we

can't keep hoping they show up.'

Dittmar suggested looking at a smaller EMS cooperative, such as Galena, Elizabeth and Hanover. He said after Hanover shut down, the three districts have cooperated to provide coverage and could serve as a framework for a countywide service.

"All three are working well together," said

Dittmar said he believes a fear among agencies is they will lose their ambulance service and the county will step in and take over. Dittmar said he sees a place for private EMS agencies and there can be cooperation between agencies without county

Losey said the committee was formed to help all county EMS agencies. The purpose of the committee, said Losey, is to make sure each community has EMS coverage, not take away agencies.

Dittmar said moving to a hybrid agency, with some paid and some volunteer members, could work on a smaller scale and the price tag would be smaller.

The committee continues to research different areas of EMS operations and one focus will be contacting other Illinois counties that have made the transition from volunteer to paid service.

The tight-knit community came out to support their new graduates and the gym was filled with family, friends and well-wishers.





Galena Bible Church sets Bible school dates: June 24-28


