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Coryell County radio tower needs new lights

The old tower warning lights, which used lightbulbs, are no longer fixable

On the east end of town, just across Highway 36, several tall equipment towers dot the rural skyline. Nestled in the hills these towers bring cellular, television and radio service to Gatesville and Coryell

Standing at 460 feet, the Coryell County radio tower is the tallest. It transmits radio signals for the Coryell County Sheriff's Office, Coryell County and Gatesville Fire Departments, the Gatesville Police Department, and Emergency Medical Ser-

"There is no backup system," Gatesville Fire Chief Billy Vaden told the Messenger in an interview on Tuesday.

When the tower was erected 10 years ago the county was required to purchase red and white lights to adorn the top and sides of the tower. The strobing lights would flash white during the day and red at night to warn aircraft of the obstacle.

The county purchased the best lighting system available at the time

thinking it would last forever. But a decade later the lights are failing

"We've kind of nursed it the for the last two years," Vaden told the Coryell County Commissioner's Court at Tuesday's budget workshop. "But it needs to be replaced."

Vaden told the commissioners a new LED lighting system and replacing the 30 to 40 capacitors would cost the county an estimated \$28,000. The lights, which have to endure the hot Texas summers and rainy spring storms, are expected to last 20 years.

The County Commissioners have the option to leave it out of the budget, but not having the lights operational violates Federal Aviation Administration guidelines and leaves the tower vulnerable to aircraft at

Vaden said he checks the lights on his way to and from his office at the Gatesville Fire Department. If he

Extreme heat expected in the region next week

Rain and cloud cover have kept the daily high temperatures out of the triple digits for much of the summer. But a high pressure system will enter the region next week bringing forecasted highs close to 100 and expected heat indexes of 105 degrees or greater.

Creator of bronze eagle has another piece at Coryell Museum

eems fitting a vigilant bronze eagle watches over Gatesville.

Its sculptor and hometown boy, Don Hunt, dubbed it "King of the Sky."

"The eagle represents freedom. I put this eagle perched on a ball representing the freedom of the world," Hunt was reported telling bystanders as a 210-foot crane lovingly lofted his work to its perch atop the bell tower of the Coryell County Courthouse. "There is nothing more free than an eagle."

The eagle is just one of Hunt's many creations. The Coryell Museum and Historical Center were the recent recipients of a large,

bronze sculpture that was donated to the museum by the Chuck Helton family of Bedford. Helton was a friend of Hunt.

The sculpture, entitled "Thunder on the Plains," was described by Helton as "being to my knowledge, the only one in existence."

Coryell Museum Board of Directors president, Ervin Adams, said "By making this donation, Chuck Helton has enabled this museum to honor one of Coryell County's most famous sons. We are extremely grateful for the opportunity to continue to add to our collection and tell the story of Coryell County and its citizens. Once it is formally unveiled, I ask the community to come by and see it."

COWBOYS AND EAGLES

The original sculpture of the eagle was found missing a few years after construction of the courthouse in 1897 was completed. For decades the building's crown sat empty.

Here's a 'devilishly' good pasta dish

ow that it has quit raining, and summertime, you may be planning on hosting or attending a backyard party or a family reunion.

I think I have the dish you are probably looking for! It is a simple yet tasty dish to contribute to such an occasion.

You all know that side dishes and desserts are the thing you pile high on the plate, wanting to taste and savor all the items that have been contributed to such a feast.

Two of the most popular ones that show up are deviled eggs and pasta salad, so why not combine the two for a pleasant surprise! This recipe is easy and can be doubled and even quadrupled if you are so inclined.

Deviled Egg Pasta Salad

ingreaients:

6 hardboiled eggs

8 oz of ditalini pasta (or small shell pasta)

34 cup of mayonnaise 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

2 tablespoons sweet pickle relish (you can substitute dill relish if you don't like it sweet)

½ teaspoon garlic powder

¼ teaspoon smoked paprika

¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper 2 tablespoons red onion, finely chopped

2 ribs of celery, finely chopped Salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

1. In a large pot of salted boiling water, cook the pasta according to pack-

age directions. Drain and rinse with cold water, set aside. 2. Peel eggs and separate the yolks from the whites. Chop the whites and

set aside. Add yolks to a large mixing bowl and crush into a paste.

3. To the crushed yolks, add mayonnaise, Dijon mustard, relish, garlic powder, paprika, cayenne, salt and pepper and mix to combine.

4. Add the pasta, onion, celery, and egg whites. Stir gently to combine. Adjust the seasonings as needed and chill until ready to serve. Enjoy!

doesn't see them working he files a report with the FAA. The county is required by law to make the lights operational within 30 days.

Vaden said he's filed roughly a

dozen reports so far and he's either been able to fix the problem or has hired someone who can. But the tower's red lights no longer work, the white lights are much dimmer than they should be, and the failures are occurring more frequently.

"It's a good time to fix it," Vaden

The Coryell County Commissioners Court is expected to release a preliminary budget next week. The court will vote on the final budget in mid-August. If the expenditure is approved by the commissioners Vaden estimated it would be 4-6 months before the installation is completed.

ell County Commissioners to restore the 1897 courthouse. Hunt was selected to create a replacement for the lost eagle.

"I'm proud they selected me to put something up there like that," Hunt said at the time. "My offspring can drive by and see it. It humbles me. I'm proud of the courthouse and what they've done to it."

LOCAL BOY

Don Hunt was born in Gatesville in 1940 and attended Gatesville schools before continuing his education at Southwest Texas State University. His family was very involved in the cattle and ranching business in Coryell County.

As a child, Hunt began drawing and sketching to fulfill a creative spirit he felt. He would later study as an apprentice with Randy Steffen and cast his first bronze sculpture.

"This was a turning point in my life," Hunt said in a publication. "I have to participate in three-dimensional structure, I live the story. I experience the meaning. I strive to capture motion and the movement in bronze."

After attending Southwest Texas State University, he later served in the U.S. National Guard during the Vietnam War. He came home to tend to the family ranch.

Hunt left the cattle business in Coryell County and followed his passion to begin a career as a full-time bronze artist. He was selected from hundreds of applicants in the United States to memorialize such legendary figures as Barbara Jordan, Tom Landry, Whizzer White, Baylor University's Grant Teaff and the Baylor Bear.

"My sculpture is an extension of my life, my interests and beliefs," he reportedly said. "I know the agony and the ectasy."

He was commissioned in 2008 to sculpt the life-size statue of an 1870's Texas Ranger riding a horse, which today is displayed in front the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame in Waco and is reported to be one of the most photographed sculptures in Waco.

As a part of the Gatesville community, Hunt was a leader at First Baptist Church of Gatesville as a deacon and Sunday school teacher. He also served as a member of the Gatesville Independent School District School Board, was a FFA sponsor and served as a mentor for future artists and students of sculpture.

COLORADO FOUNDRIES Don Hunt and his wife, Mary Margaret Nesbitt Hunt, relocated from San Antonio to Colorado in 1999 so that he could be closer to the

Loveland, Colorado bronze foundries and where he also opened a gallery where his sculptures were exhibited.

Hunt died on Feb. 14, 2011 at the age of 70. His remains were returned to his hometown of Gatesville where he was buried at Restland Cem-

The Coryell Museum and Historical Center will be unveiling Hunt's bronze sculpture, "Thunder on the Plains," on Friday, July 30 at 2 p.m. by special invitation only.

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Gatesville schools eye a return to normalcy

Gatesville schools are trying for a normal year.

Remote learning was nixed by the Gatesville ISD School Board, opting instead to bring students back to the classrooms. The board did bake in seven "COVID-19 Makeup Days" in case of surges.

It was a strain on educators trying to keep students on track, according to Superintendent Dr. Barrett Pollard, with the educators required to upload their assignments and lessons remotely while also having in-person classes.

"It won't be like it was previously where every-

thing was just right there in Google Classrooms," Pollard said. "It was pretty stressful on almost all of the teachers to keep up with hybrid and in-person classroom instruction."

The makeup days are similar to how snow days work, with students scheduled to have the day off until the event arises that time needs to be made up due to school-wide closures caused by COVID outbreaks.

Despite having a recent local and national increase in the amount of confirmed covid cases, Pollard said GISD is still on track of not having students learning from home, and has an emergency plan in place for when the county sees a spike in infections.

"I would hope that last year was probably the hardest year of covid because there were no vaccinations, and we did pretty well," said Dr. Pollard.

Local and national health authorities recommend everyone over the age of 12 get vaccinated to prevent the spreading of the coronavirus variants. They also recommend continuing to wear a mask if you have not been vaccinated or are showing symptoms consistent with COVID-19. 
He was preceded in death by his parents and his brother, Curtis A. Davis, Jr.





summer and winter beds.
Summer bedding is used to help keep deer cool during the dog days of summer.
These areas include more rangeland, as deer will bed underneath trees that offer a cool summer breeze.

Winter bedding areas are typically characterized by thick and often thorny vegetation like greenbrier, blackberry, and even mesquite thickets. To put it simply, if it's too thick for you to walk into an area, it's more than likely a bedding area for white-tailed deer.

Finding bedding areas can help hunters focus on their strategy, spending more time near summer beds during the early season and more time near winter beds during the late season.

Feeding areas are just that, a place for deer to consume food. During the season, white-tailed deer expend an incredible amount of energy. Bucks chasing does, and does growing next year's fawns, increases the amount of forage that a deer needs to consume to survive.

Feeding areas can vary between planted food plots, corn or protein feeders, and natural vegetation such as oak or pecan stands. When it comes to summer scouting for feeding areas, focus on finding some of the most nutritious and available browse and forage on a property. Finding large oak or pecan trees is a surefire way to figure out where deer will be feeding, as loads of acorns or pecans are consumed by deer yearly.

sumed by deer yearly.

Browse vegetation is another tell-tale sign of feeding

areas. To find good browse sights, you must look for spots that offer ample sunlight to hit the forest floor. Many browse species are shade intolerant, so they are not present when the forest canopy is closed. Look toward habitat edges, where there is a transition in habitat (forest - rangeland - grassland). Species like partridge pea or honey locust are often overlooked but provide excellent nutritional value for deer.

Travel corridors are some of the most exhilarating, yet boring places to hunt. You can have hours of no activity, and within a matter of seconds you can be drawn back on a 150" buck cruising down a rub line.

These corridors are like a

These corridors are like a highway system in the DFW Metroplex, elaborate, mind boggling, and always changing. Travel corridors show the movement from bedding to feeding areas, making them excellent spots to look at activity and can often include rub lines.

Many travel corridors can be found by changes in topography and/or vegetation. Creek channels, topographical fingers on ridges, and fingers of trees can all be used by deer as travel corridors.

So, while the summer is filled with mosquitoes and ticks, you can help to ensure your hunting success come fall. Looking for these specific types of areas on your property or a piece of public land can help you strategically tackle the next hunting season, helping to ensure more success, more stories to tell, and more taxidermy bills.
