Helping to encourage, rebuild lives

Hidden Gem focuses on restoration

Helping to rebuild lives of people who have been shattered or disrupted because they are the victims of crime - or the loved ones of victims - while offering encouragement, support and financial assistance is the aim of Hidden Gem Family Center, a nonprofit organization located at 115 S. Seventh St.

Since it first began operations in July under the direction of Executive Director Jenny Featherston and Program Director Julia Smith, the organization has sought to help those who are often enduring dark and difficult times because of the way crime has impacted their lives.

"We're all about family restoration," said Featherston, who is also the crime victim assistance coordinator for the Coryell County District Attorney's Office. In that role, she said she works with victims and their loved ones to refer them the resources and services that can help them.

"We were having to outsource a lot of that to other counties. Coryell County just didn't offer a whole lot when it came to those types of services, so I decided it would be good to start our own.'

Victims, survivors honored

Survivors of crime and relatives of victims who died because of crime gathered at Hidden Gem Family Center on the Coryell County Courthouse square recently to remember their loved ones and to thank those who stood by them through the darkest of times.

Fourteen Christmas trees were set up in honor of crime victims who died, and a 15th tree represented survivors. Family members or friends of those who died were able to place an angel or angel's wings on a tree in their memory, and survivors or their loved ones were able to place a dove on a tree to celebrate their triumph over adversity.

"We want the families to know we haven't forgotten," said Jenny Featherston, crime victims assistance coordinator for Coryell County. "We want to celebrate their loved ones with them, and it's a reunion for us to be with them and let them know we still support them."

Coryell County District Attorney Dusty Board, assistant DAs and other staff also attended the event, and voiced their support for victims and those who care about them.

"It's always really reward-

zation came about as a way of reflecting every person's value, which is sometimes hidden beneath the surface. Featherston said.

"As far as the name, I felt like God gave it to me," she said. "When you are going through really difficult times it's important to get past the rough and to find the gem that's hidden within, to bring out the best and shine the way that God wants it to."

ing to see people whose cases have been finished (in the legal system) and also to visit with those whose cases continue. It's great to be able to spend time with them, especially during this time of year (before Christmas)."

Boyd praised Featherston, who has the dual role of working for the DA's office and coordinating efforts for the nonprofit Hidden Gem, and other volunteers for their efforts.

Book focuses on experiences of WW II veterans

The Gatesville Public Library recently hosted a book signing with award-winning author Kaye D. Schmitz, who was signing her most recent novel, "The Road Remembered." Her novel chronicles the lives of real World War II veterans - all of whom allowed her to use their names and actual experiences as characters and plot points in her story

Local interest in the novel was spurred by two WW II veterans featured in her story, Erwin Davis and his twin brother, Ervin, who were natives of nearby Pearl, Texas.

"Three years ago, I flew to Texas

to meet Erwin Davis - and that really kick-started the journey of writing my latest novel. The Davis twins are featured prominently throughout the book," Schmitz said. "One of my biggest regrets is that Erwin is no longer with us. Oh, how I would have loved to have had him sitting beside me signing the book with me," she said. Ervin Davis passed away on March 9, 2018, in Waco at the age of 92. His brother, Erwin, died at age 95 at his home in Austin on July 16, 2021.

The twins were born in Pearl in 1925 to William Alvis Davis and Hattie Ruth DeLoach Davis. Upon graduating from Pearl High School,

nonprofit offers is to help community members obtain their general equivalency degrees if they haven't received their high school diplomas, to connect people with programs to help them break the cycle of addiction, to provide help for people who are hurting because of abuse and to help find financial resources for those who need them. It also provides opportunities for people who need to talk about their struggles, and also plans to offer Bible studies for those who are interested.

The organization is faith-based, so there is a strong emphasis on finding healing through the love and strength available through prayer and a relationship with God.

Two of the volunteers with Hidden Gem are Delisa Sandell and Bethany Tennison, who have overcome adversity in their own lives and want to encourage and support others.

"Being a victim, I came in to see Jenny and get help, and she started talking to me about Hidden Gem," Sandell said. "She and others with the group have been the army of God sent to help bring me out of my despair.

"I have come to realize that

devote their time and efforts," he said. "We (the staff of the DA's office) work together with them as true advocates for those who have suffered because of crime."

Addressing those attending the event, Boyd said he was glad to see those with whom he and other staff have built strong bonds.

"I missed y'all," he said. "It's been two years (since the last such gathering, because of COVID-19 disruptions), and I want to thank there's only so much people can understand if they haven't been through the trauma (of being a victim) themselves. That's something I can help with. I understand personally what it is like to have gone through that. I still have trouble with trauma, but it helps to work through that with others who understand and who care and support you."

Tennison said she wants to encourage those who are struggling, and to help them know that help is available.

"My drive is being a life coach," she said. "I love to help people overcome addiction so they can be who they're meant to be through Christ. I go to the jail and talk to people so I can give them information about resources available if they want to change. I have gotten a lot of positive feedback.

"This is a good place to come and get help so that people can become who they are meant to be."

One goal Hidden Gem is working toward is transforming a former substance abuse treatment facility in the Evant area into transitional housing for those who need it.

"It surprised us how many homeless people there are, and they have no support," Featherston said. "Our goal is to give them that help and support."

Those who have been victimized

"It's always so rewarding to be able to spend time with our families that we have worked with over the past and in the present. For many of you who have been through the criminal justice process before, the criminal justice process can seem cold and long. It's our hope that you will know we care."

Boyd talked about how the staff of the DA's office has grown substantially as the county's population has also grown.

"Our mission is to make sure we are always on the curve or ahead of the curve. It's important that people feel connected no matter how big we grow. We want you to know that we care and we give all we have for you."

Boyd recalled how in the past, Coryell County's holiday gathering for victims and survivors was held at the Bell County Expo Center.

challenge. Just as we've made an impact on your lives, you have also made an impact on ours.

"I assure you, just because the doors close and the (defendant) is sent to prison or gets probation, we never forget. I drive by areas where I see a cross on the side of the road, and I relive it (the circumstances that led to court cases)."

One woman attending the event told Boyd she appreciated all the efforts by staff and volunteers to help them through times of distress and pain.

"Thank you for all you've done,"

"What's amazing is so many people don't even realize they've been victims of abuse, or they don't accept that," she said.

"I know God has been with me every step of the way (through her own struggle)," Sandell said. "When you're in that trauma there are so many thoughts and so many questions of why and how."

Featherston said that understanding of the difficulties people are facing and the desire to help them is a key to helping them heal.

"That is so important," she said. "Those who have gone through the trauma can help those who are still going through it. That also helps your relationship with the Lord grow stronger.

"We want to be able to help anyone who has been through trauma no matter what the trauma is."

Donations are welcome, Featherston said, and people can also call if they are struggling and need help.

The nonprofit's goal is to offer counseling, child care and temporary and transitional housing in 2022.

they entered military service during WWII. Erwin and Ervin requested to stay together and the two became a bazooka team in the 89th Infantry Division in the European Theater of Operations from May 27, 1944, until April 25, 1946. In combat, the bazooka team was comprised of Erwin loading and Ervin firing.

The Davis twins helped to set up Camp Lucky Strike in France which was a tent city with streets. They were then sent to Luxembourg for a short while. They faced combat at the Mosell River bordering Germany and Luxembourg where they crossed the river at 2 a.m. in a rowboat.

Erwin and Ervin were both honorably discharged on April 25, 1946, at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas. Upon returning home, they managed to catch a ride to Gatesville, but had

to walk from Gatesville back to their home in Pearl - approximately 22 miles.

Concerning the recent novel by Schmitz, Erwin Davis was quoted as saying, "I have just finished reading your manuscript of 'The Road Remembered.' It is truly a masterpiece. Even though it had to include some sadness, I'm glad you were able to end it on a pleasant note. I am glad your dad and I served together in the 89th Infantry Division."

On her decision to write the historical novel, Schmitz said, "After my dad died, I found the map of his journey across Europe at the end of WW II. Then I found a transcript he had done of his experiences in the war. I read that with the map open in front of me and I knew I had to tell his story."

Her father's story began to expand, and she decided to include the stories of other WW II veterans who had experiences of their own to relate.

He had worked with horses all his life and for the 10 or so years before he came to work for me, had supervised all the other hands at a ranch in the middle of horse country. The owner of the old ranch had passed on, and Esteban did not like the change in ownership that resulted. He was needing a change of environment and I was fortunate to have him come work with me.

Esteban's vast work experience made him very good at anticipating problems before they happened. He made sure plenty of supplies were on hand and was first rate in taking care of the animals.

I declare, Esteban could tell a horse was getting sick before the horse knew he was starting to feel ill. He needed very little direction because he knew what needed to be done and simply saw it was taken care of. He was a valuable addition and a trusted and much-appreciated compadre.

If Esteban had a fault, it was when a piece of machinery would

break down. From his vast experience he could gerrymander solutions to many problems that saved the ranch a bunch of money, but at the same time, computerized machinery or electronics were very frustrating to him. Esteban has spent a lifetime working only with a manure fork or a shovel, and he found troubleshooting mechanical issues a real challenge.

One day, Esteban had driven the tractor to a far part of the ranch. Once he got there and was ready to return to the barn, he could not get the tractor to start.

I was out checking stock and I could see the tractor sitting in the same spot and noticed Esteban had the hood to the engine compartment open.

I drove over and parked my truck and got out. When I did, I could see Esteban had a hammer in his hand and was utilizing it to bang on the engine block of the John Deere and then on the battery. He would strike several blows at one, and then switch to the other, all the while muttering words in Spanish with which I was unfamiliar.

I walked up to the tractor and stood for a brief second before asking, "what is wrong with it?" Esteban never looked up and kept hammering away, muttered the re-

sponse, "it no start."

I watched for another second or two, as the ranch hand kept pounding away with the vigor of Mickey Mantle swinging a baseball bat.

Admittedly I am no mechanic, but I was at a loss of how beating the machinery into submission was going to solve the problem. Finally, after a few more resounding hammer thuds, I inquired sheepishly, "Does that help?"

Esteban never looked up. He kept hitting the mechanical devil he was trying to exorcise, and uttered, "Maybe. Or Maybe no."

I finally suggested we take the battery off and go and get it checked. He did and sure enough, the battery was bad, and the problem was solved.

I learned a little about life that day. Sometimes we all act in ways that really have no goal or purpose, other than to make us feel better at the time.

In coping with our frustration, fears or anger, we act in a way that makes us feel better for the second but does nothing toward solving the underlying problem. For Esteban, fixing the tractor had become personal and if he could not figure out the issue and repair it, he was going to make sure the tractor paid a price for its disobedience.

He kept hammering away and did not know if it was solving the problem or not — but in the instant, it made him feel better.

After that day when I found myself acting out of anger, frustration, or passion, I would stop and ask myself if what I was doing would help with the problem at hand. Many times, the answer I had to give myself was "Maybe. Maybe no."

On those occasions I realized it was probably better to simply get the "battery checked" and solve the problem than seeking retribution or to keep pounding away.

Thanks, Esteban, for teaching me an important life lesson.

Thought for the day: Explain your anger instead of expressing it and you'll find solutions instead of arguments.
