Frustration mounts over jail overcrowding

Facing what seems to be a no-win situation with no easy solution in sight, county officials once again are scrambling to find help dealing with the chronic problem of overcrowding at the Coryell County Jail.

The issue has been aggravated by the fact that a source of relief in previous years — sending inmates to other counties when overcrowding occurs — is sometimes no longer pos-

Sheriff Scott Williams told the Coryell County Commissioners Court on Tuesday (May 10) that he had received a letter from the Texas Attorney General's Office threatening action if overcrowding problems aren't fixed. The problem is there is no apparent quick fix to resolve overcrowding.

In April 2021, local voters overwhelmingly rejected a proposal to spend \$30 million to build a new jail, with about 73% voting against the measure. That left officials with little op-

tion other than finding another jail willing to house them or simply turning inmates loose.

Sheriff Williams and County Judge Roger Miller are both scheduled to visit Austin and go before the Texas Jail Standards Commission on May 19. They indicated that in order for the visit to be fruitful, they want help and suggestions to find solutions rather than finger-pointing and criticism.

"The statutes quoted (regarding jail standards in the recent letter) were pretty broad with nothing specific," Williams said. "There are a lot of jail beds in the state of Texas, but you can't send inmates there because there aren't enough people willing to work (at those facilities).

"Last year, Milam County took 60 of our inmates, and now they're only able to take 10 — eight males and two females. I don't see it getting better, and (the lack of ability to find places that will accept inmates from Coryell County) is causing our overcrowding. I don't see it getting better, and we can't stop enforcing the law.

"I just don't know what we're going to do."

He noted this is an issue that is a nationwide concern, not just one facing Coryell County. He said the Coryell County Jail is already short 11 jailers, and three more are expected to leave at the end of the month to take higher-paying jobs

The demand for jailers — coupled with a short supply — is causing something of a bidding war.

"McLennan County is hiring new jailers for their juvenile facility for \$40,000 and all that is required is a GED (general equivalency diploma) or a high school degree," County Attorney Brandon Belt said. "No certification is required (beforehand), and they'll train you on the job.

"There's also so much more regulation, it's really crippled us as far as being able to use beds."

Not having enough jailers compounds the problem, and there is a lack of quality applicants to fill positions.

"I'm embarrassed to say this, but one application we got

In a split vote, Council approves water for RV park

More than 30 people crowded into the Gatesville City Council chambers for a May 10 meeting, many of whom were there to either support or oppose a proposed RV Park to be located near the city ballpark and the Gatesville Civic Center.

Property owner Lynn Massingill, who owns about 500 acres in the area, initially approached city staff in February with plans to build what he described as an upscale RV park outside the city. While he was told sewer service would not be available for the property (making a septic system necessary), he asked the city to make water available to his property so he could build the RV park.

After both sides presented their views for or against the RV park, the Gatesville City Council was initially deadlocked with three Council members in support and three against the proposal. Mayor Gary Chumley cast the deciding vote in favor of allowing

the city to provide water to the facility, which will be located outside the city limits, via a 6-inch water line.

Other Council members voting for the property's request for city water were Claude Williams, Greg Casey and Billy Sinyard. Council members voting against it were Meredith Rainer, John Westbrook and Barbara Burrow.

City staff recommended that the Council request, citing four reasons: first, that the city is not compelled to provide city services outside the Gatesville city limits and there is no right to service outside the city; second, the property is located in an area served by a 100,000 gallon storage tank which only meets the minimum requirements for pressure at each connection, and concerns about the potential impact an RV park might have on the water service provided to existing customers in the area; third, the city is limited in the amount of water available to it, and providing water outside the city could reduce the amount of water available for future growth inside the city; and fourth, "city staff

has analyzed the request and identified ad-

ditional impacts." A recommendation from city staff was that if the Council did approve Massingill's request, that restrictions be part of an agreement which would limit water service to the proposed 10-acre RV park; however, no limitations were imposed based on the Council's vote, which was simply to extend a 6-inch water main and install a 6-inch water meter to Massingill's property.

Gatesville City Manager Bill Parry, voicing city staff's recommendations against approval, said the city engineer was asked if sufficient water pressure could be provided and that a response had not been received before the May 10 meeting.

He also noted that Gatesville is using 60% of its authorized water rights, and the concern that with "growth exploding" in Central Texas, "there is no more water to be had - no reservoirs are being built. He said providing water outside the city could hamper future growth opportunities by reducing the

amount of water available within the city

"The issue is not so much today as it is 10, 15 or 20 years from now," Parry said.

'We want to make sure we don't reduce volume at that storage tank," he said, adding that the tank was among the city's smallest. Parry said expanding the tank to 200,000 gallons would cost the city about \$200,000.

"It was built (in the 1980s) when a smaller storage tank in that area made sense," he

Councilman Williams asked when the city engineer had been notified, saying the lack of a response by meeting time seemed to him to be a delaying tactic. Parry said the city engineer is attempting to retire, and is only working 30% of the time.

Asked why water pressure was so low for those living in the area, Parry said it is more of a water volume issue, which impacts what

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

was from a stripper in Killeen, and we're getting folks applying who have a criminal history," Williams said. "We're facing another issue where not enough people want to work, and I don't know how we're going to get

Belt said in previous instances, state officials made calls to different counties to get Coryell County help resolving overcrowding

"We need help or they'll have to find a place for all the inmates if they close us down (for overcrowding)," he said. "We ought to be on the line every day asking who do you know who will take (inmates)."

"We already do that," Williams said. "We can't stop enforcing the law. There are surplus beds in other jails, it's just there's not enough staff working to allow us to fill

"We need help finding some place to take (inmates) — we need answers," Belt said.

County Auditor Ben Roberts said state officials have to be aware of the lack of available space.

"I can't believe these people don't know there's no jail in the state that can provide "It's a broken system."

Coryell County Sheriff Scott Williams, referring both to local and statewide jail overcrowding issues

"Travis County is in the same boat we are with shortages in the sheriff's office and their jail," Belt said.

Williams said part of the frustration is being hit with blame and criticism when no so-

lution is readily available. "This is all about them getting their i's dotted and their t's crossed, and unfortunately

that's the system," he said. County Judge Miller echoed Roberts' senti-

"Mr. Roberts hit the nail on the head," he said. "Having an adequate workforce for jail facilities whether city, county, state or federal is a problem nationwide. An increase in pay would help some, but I also think there is a lack of work ethic in our society in general."

Williams said additional money will only solve part of the problem.

"Unfortunately, the only thing more money will do is help you keep the racehorses you've got — that's not hiring others.

Belt said state facilities face the same overcrowding issues and expressed frustration

that people with mental health issues have to wait a year in jail until a spot opens in a state hospital for them. "That makes me mad," he said.

"It's a broken system," Williams added.

"We can't find the 15 beds we need in order to be in compliance. What will they do with an extra 100 (inmates) if they shut us down?" Miller said the issue is one that is all too

"This is not unique to Coryell County. there are violations across the state," he said. "In a perfect world, the state takes care of it and the county doesn't have to deal with it.'


Williams said he wanted to keep the com-

missioners court aware of the situation.

"I wanted to make sure the court was aware of what's going on," he said. "They talked about tent cities (to help provide more space). Those folks that are eligible for tent cities are the ones we let out. I've got rapists, murderers and just straight killers in my

Miller said the county will continue to seek state assistance on resolving the chronic concern.

"We'll work to see what kind of help we can get from the state from the state jail system other than just finger pointing," he said.

GHS Choir students earn state music award

The Texas Music Scholar Award designates students in high school music programs who exemplify attributes of meritorious performance in the areas of scholarship, musicianship and citizenship.

Two GHS students were nominated for this honor by Choir Directors Cherith Wells and Tim Klingler, but the award is given by the Texas Music Educators Association. Less than 1,800 students in grades 9-12 state wide were named as Texas Music Scholars last year, as the criteria are extremely vigorous.

Students must be a viable member of the school's parent musical organization for the entire school year, must maintain an overall "A" average, must participate in all scheduled events of the parent organization, and must attend two director-approved concert events of high school, collegiate or professional level during a school year.

The criteria also include that they must audition and participate in the TMEA All-State process, compete with a UIL Class 1 solo, and consis-

tently exhibit behavior which brings honor to the parent organization, school and community.

Gatesville High School has two students who have met these prestigious criteria.

Adeline Carpenter is a senior soprano and Memphis Wells is a freshman bass, both in the Varsity Choir. Both Carpenter and Wells competed in the TMEA All-State process, advancing through three rounds of auditions to the area level. They both ranked ninth in state, however only four chairs from Region 8 go to the All-State Choir. Both students also competed at the regional UIL Solo & Ensemble Contest and were awarded a "Superior" rating by their judge, qualifying them for Texas State Solo & Ensemble contest which will be held in Pflugerville on May 30.

those with a practical bias as being useless, or at best, a harmless diversion. They would rather read non-fiction, presumably because it gives them knowledge which they can actually use. But fiction often teaches us valuable lessons about how to live life, how to handle adversity, and what it is to be human in difficult circumstances. Furthermore, we are sometimes struck by the realization that we might bend circumstances and events to our will, and in effect become the heroes of our own life. That is a valuable lesson, and one which can be learned from reading fiction, but also from reading biographies, autobiographies, and the narratives of the Bible. Becoming a hero usually starts, as it does in fiction, with conflict or adversity. From there, one must be inspired to resolve the conflict or deal with the adversity. And before the inspiration fades, one usually has to create a workable plan. In the same way that an author must plan her work, thinking over and trying out different plots and plans for character development, we should plan our own lives, perhaps imagining different paths toward achieving something great, something worth writing about. And just as an author has to develop her characters, so too do we have to develop our own moral character. - Christopher Simon

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





of a water volume issue, which impacts what is available at the meter.

Councilman Casey asked if the concern is a 6-inch line. whether a smaller line could be installed that would meet the facility's needs.

"They're going to want to build more apartments and duplexes (in the area)," Casey said. "If we can't expand or build, why even do this? Shut the town down."

Parry said those concerns could be addressed "in the future, but that's not what the agenda item is.'

Chase Massingill, son of the property owner, provided handouts to Council members with specific information about the proposed RV park.

He said the plan is to build a maximum of 120 RV slots, possibly less in order to keep more trees on site, but likely a minimum of 100. The facility would include such amenities as a swimming pool, locations for barbecue grilling, internet service and golf cart rentals for easier mobility throughout the park. Other potential amenities could include a dog park, picnic tables and a playground, along with a laundry facility.

He cited statistics which showed how important outdoor recreation is to the economy, bringing in billions of financial benefits, talked about the popularity of RVs and said the park that he and his family are proposing would have a positive impact on the area's tax

"The whole reason to put it next to the civic center is that it would be a great complimentary business," Chase said. "It would give people another place to stay, including when there are special events, and it will create jobs."

He said having such a facility next to the civic center and rodeo arena could help boost the Gatesville rodeo, baseball tournaments held in Gatesville and other special

"Sometimes people coming here have to stay out of town because the hotels are full, Chase said, adding that the RV park will provide extra space for visitors. He pointed to specific examples throughout the country in places such as Brady, Texas; Jackson, Mississippi; and Hoover, Alabama where RV parks had a positive impact.

He said in some places, cities are giving RV parks grants because of the positive economic impact.

"We're not asking for money, we're just asking for a 6-inch water line," Chase

Lynn Massingill said he is also considering building corrals north of the RV park on land he owns to give a place for people to keep their horses during riding club or rodeo events.

"I also own the land east and north of it," Massingill said. "I know there are concerns, but this will not drive down property values. It will be a nice facility. If we can get water, then we know where we're going with this thing and we can get started.'

Mayor Pro Tem Meredith Rainer asked who would pay for the installation of the 6-inch water line.

"I imagine we'll pay for the line to our property," Massingill said.

Councilwoman Barbara Burrow asked about the status of the project, noting that land had already been cleared and staked before Council approval of the water line.

"We've been clearing land for three years and have done preliminary staking ourselves," Massingill said. "We still have to lay out each one. I'm trying to leave trees so it's not just a bare field."

He said the initial plan was for 130 RV sites, "but we're down to 120 and it will probably be less than that.

"There's a lot of undeveloped property there - potential development for the future," Burrow said.

"Sure, but we'll need 60% (occupancy) to break even,"

Massingill said. "We have the right to use

the property and intend to use it. It won't be a nuisance. We won't be doing anything to drive values down - we hope. All we need is water, then we can proceed."

Burrow said she understood Massingill's eagerness to develop the property, but said it can take time to ensure all concerns are addressed.

"I hear the urgency but there are processes and they take time," she said. "That might incur some delays on this really well-worked complex."

Massingill said he needed water to move forward, and has been ready to do so since February.

Councilman Casey asked if the city was able to provide sewer service to that area in the future, if Massingill would be open to the possibility of annexation.

"We'll already have (incurred) the cost of the septic system," Massingill said.

Burrow asked about the potential impact of RVs on the roads to the RV park.

"I know that road (to the future RV site) has a lot of base, I watched the county put it in," Massingill said. Richard Shook and his

wife Tammy, who reside on Churchill Drive, which is near the proposed RV park, spoke in opposition to Massingill's request.

"I'm here to oppose selling water to Mr. Massingill," he said. "Typically I am a pro growth, pro development and pro business kind of guy, but there are two pillars to why I don't think this is a good idea.

"An RV park would certainly be within eyesight of several of us in the neighborhood. We don't want an RV park in our backyard for various reasons. They deteriorate over time, and he could sell the property down the line.

"A legitimate fear is water pressure (and the impact to nearby properties of adding the 6-inch line). We should at least wait until we hear the (city) engineer's recommendation on how it will affect our water system. I think we're trying to circumvent the normal or conventional process of getting city ser-

Shook said he was also concerned about the development using city water "which is a very valuable and limited commodity.

Another issue for Shook is that the property will not generate any property tax revenue for the city, only for the county, despite accessing

"You'll have no control over what goes into the park once you give him water. ... I also didn't hear of any set agreement on the use of water, how much and what will the water be used for. He added that giving Massingill the water would set a precedent for other developers wanting access to city water for properties outside the city limits.

Shook said the proposed RV park violates the city's comprehensive plan for future development.

"I talked to the city planner," he said. "That property is earmarked for residential growth. If you put in an RV park, that's not residential.

"There are also water issues within the city, and selling it to someone outside the city is not right. It just doesn't make sense to me. I don't want to see us sell our commodity outside the city."

Tammy Shook said she considers the issue "very personal, adding that she is familiar with RV and boating and is concerned that a city

She added that she believes city water services should be available for developments inside the city

"As the state grows and the area grows, water is a very limited resource," Rainer said.

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She also said that while the city would not receive property tax revenue from the RV park, any financial benefit to the city would be limited because "most RVers travel with food and supplies instead of spending money at local restaurants and stores.

"Other possible issues are loud noises, damage to the roads, access on a very narrow road, the potential for traffic issues. Also, in the future we have no control over whatever happens on the property once he gets water. It also goes against our future land use.

"A huge concern - I can't believe he'd have enough (customers) to make 60% without having some permanent residents."

Rainer said her focus was to do what was best for the city of Gatesville, "not my dad, friends or people I've known my whole life. Once he gets water, he can do whatever he wants with the property and that possibly extends to 500 acres.

"We have to do what's in the best interest of the city. It might be fantastic and it might be a dump. We also need to think about the next developer's request."

Mayor Chumley said he had a note from Ronnie Dixon who was unable to attend the meeting but wrote that he and neighbors in the Stone Ridge addition were opposed to Massingill's request, saying water availability is already low. He added that the addition of apartments and duplexes nearby hasn't improved the water concerns.

Councilman Westbrook asked if the city required some limits, how that would be enforced once the water line was operational.

"In theory the city could cut the water off (if the agreement was violated)," City Manager Parry said. "It's a thorny issue."

However, no restrictions were approved by the Council, only the 6-inch water line extension to Massingill's property.

Answering someone's concern about Gatesville not being able to support an upscale RV park, "I stayed at a high end RV park about 10 days ago in a town smaller than Gatesville," Chumley

"I think it would definitely be an asset to the city," he said.

Burrow said she was opposed based on the loss of property tax revenue since the development was outside the city.

Williams said he did not want to delay Massingill's development plans.

"The city engineer had ample time, we need to get this taken care of," he said. "It seems to me that's just a stall or delay.'

Rainer voiced her disagreement.

"I think this takes time," she said. "It's better to make the right decision for the city than to just rush into something.'

Based on the 4-3 vote, Massingill will have the water line he requested in order to proceed with the development.

Chumley said later that it was the first time in eight years that he had to cast the deciding vote at a Council meeting.

Eagles land gold in state golf

Combining a formidable blend of experience and skill, the Jonesboro High School golf team earned the Class 1A state golf championship on Tuesday at Plum Creek Golf Course in Kyle.

The Eagle golfing quintet was led by Jeffrey Morse who shot a 153 in the two-day, 36-hole event. That score was an im-


pressive 11 strokes better than par. Morse's efforts were the best in the state at the Class 1A level, two strokes ahead of the second place golfer.
