# **County considers grant priorities**

The Coryell County Commissioners Court is setting priorities for what to do with a \$3.4 million Community Development Block Grant to help offset damage from flooding, and the first step will be to provide the cities of Gatesville and Copperas Cove with \$500,000 each.

Those cities will decide how best to spend their \$500,000 share, leaving county leaders with \$2.4 million to devote to county projects. Based on previous discussions, those priorities will include addressing low-water crossings, a drainage study and Geographic Information System (GIS) mapping.

"My number one recommendation is to approve the funding for Gatesville and Copperas Cove," said County Judge Roger Miller. "Other priorities are a drainage study and allocating funds for work on the bridge on 314."

Commissioner Kyle Matthews asked what the cost will be to replace the bridge.

"I would estimate between \$150,000 and \$200,000," said Justin Latham, the county road and bridge administrator. "There is a large tree that will have to be removed, too."

Matthews said he would like to see some funding set aside for communications infrastructure, and Commissioner Ryan Basham said some of the money could be divided up to improve county roads.

Miller said a drainage study will help to know areas of future flooding concerns and prioritize projects to mitigate those issues.

"We'll be able to look at the most rapidly

developing areas in the county – we have historically had challenges with getting drainage easements," he said. "This will also serve as a model for future growth."

Latham noted that some of the easement concerns go together with the county's continuing ETJ (extra-territorial jurisdiction) talks with Copperas Cove and Gatesville, and whether the cities or counties are responsible for specific areas.

Based on population, Gatesville's ETJ extends one mile outside the city limits, while Copperas Cove's extends for two miles.

Latham suggested if a drainage study is approved, the county look at the Fort Gates area.

"I believe the city of Gatesville is funding that," Miller said. "If not, then we need to fund that." Miller said the county is looking at what projects it needs to get estimates for to determine how the grant will be applied.

"I have no idea how much a drainage study would cost, whether \$400,000 or half a million," Miller said. "Being that we're about to come into budget season, we are looking at getting cost estimates."

Matthews said he was not in favor of funding a drainage study until the county resolves ETJ issues.

"I think we need to put (money) into road improvements," he said.

Miller asked Matthews about funding for improved communications systems.

"I think it can be done and it will expedite emergency calls," Matthews said. He referred PLEASE SEE **COUNTY** A2

After a successful trial run, Gatesville Independent School District leaders are looking forward to continuing a national (school bus) fleet tracking program that helps both parents and school administrators keep better tabs on students using GISD's transportation system.

Yancey Sanderson, executive director of testing and federal programs for the district, gave an overview of the fleet tracking program, known as BusView, during the May meeting of the GISD Board of Trustees.

A memorandum included in packets given to school board members states, "BusView enables schools

to calls sometimes "bouncing around" from one area to another.

"It comes back to protecting lives," Matthews said. "A communication center is important. I also think we should put more into road and bridge improvements.

to help us organize and focus, we'll have the same discussion in two weeks, four weeks, eight weeks ..."

Miller said having a GIS database and mapping system will also benefit the county.

"That sounds expensive," Matthews said. "It is expensive," Miller answered.

Belt said the expense is actually cheaper than what the county might spend on some equinment

County Attorney Brandon Belt said employing a grant specialist to help get all the information gathered and properly submitted would benefit the county.

"It seems to me it would behoove the county to have somebody help us with (the process)," he said. "If we don't have somebody

Miller said he hopes to work with the Coryell County Central Appraisal District and share some of the GIS data that they have.

In addition to the \$500,000 for Gatesville and Copperas Cove, the commissioners court also approved \$650,000 for the county road and bridge department for improvements.

schools to monitor bus metrics, including location, speed, stops, idle-time, mileage, engine hours - all in realtime and viewable via maps."

The biggest boon for the district with the program may be StudentView and ParentView.

"StudentView also provides monitoring, but for students," the memorandum stated. "Students scan on and off buses, and this is marked on a map in realtime, providing location, date and time.'

The ParentView component "works with this data, enabling parents to see this detail for their kids, providing peace of mind. Parents can also set perimeter alerts so that when the bus is approaching, they get alerts, reducing the need to keep their kids on the street longer than necessary. This also reduces idle-time for buses, reducing fuel costs for schools."

Sanderson said the district had just over 1,000 students riding GISD buses, with more riders in the afternoon than in the morning.

As of the May meeting, 55 parents had signed up with GISD to participate in ParentView, but Sanderson said he expects that number to increase as people become more familiar with the program.

"This is a great program to have and another step to providing greater safety for our students," he said.

GISD Superintendent Barrett Pollard echoed Sanderson's views.

"In a more and more dan-

gerous world, this adds more safety and security in," he said. "That's exciting for us and really helpful. Parents can know if their child got on the bus and got off, and when and where.

School board member Mary Anne Leib expressed her support for the tracking system.

"It's a great idea," she said. "How are we going to push for more parents (to participate)?"

"We've really just gotten started - expect more and more will want to do this," Sanderson said.

Leib, who said she is a former bus driver, added, "this sounds great - something to increase safety."

Sanderson said he has already received a lot of positive feedback about the program.

## MY FRONT PORCH *I've got no phone, no cash, no gas,* but no problem

Do you recall the days before cell phone service and electronic money? Everyone now days has a cell phone which gives them the ability to communicate with others. We have all gotten so accustomed to being able to instantly connect, we forget the time before cell phones and how troubling it could be. The same goes for debit/ credit cards. In today's world, few young people carry cash in any form, they simply carry a "card" and transact their business. Such was not always the case.

It was my freshman year in college, and I had traveled home to see my folks during a vacation break. Before I left to go back to school, I wanted to make a quick trip to see my grandparents who lived in a rural part of the state some four hours away. My Mom liked my idea and happily agreed to allow me the use of her car. Being a college kid, I was broke, but Mom gave me a check to cash. My folks still banked at their old hometown bank and once I got to where the grandparents lived and cashed it, I would have

enough money to fill the car back up to drive home. As I got in the car, Mom assured me the vehicle had plenty of fuel and waved as I drove off.

I got down the road about three hours and began noticing the gas tank was creeping lower and lower. Mom had assured me I had plenty of fuel to arrive with gas to spare, but the fuel gauge in her car did not seem to affirm her declaration. I became more and more nervous. I did not have a single penny in my pocket; not even a dime to make a telephone call. What was I going to do?

After twenty minutes of driving slower, coasting down hills, and praying for divine intervention, the car's engine sputtered and coughed and let me know it was starving for fuel. I pulled off to the side of the highway and immediately began to ponder how I was going to get out of the pickle I was in. I had stopped smack dab in the middle of rural America. There was not a town for twelve miles, and I was 40 miles from my grandparents' house. The only thing I could think to do was to walk to the farmhouse I had passed about a ½ mile back and see if they would let me use their phone to make a collect call to my grandfather. Once I communicated my situation, I knew he would come and bring gas.

I made the stroll to the farmhouse, and an elderly gentleman slowly opened the door and asked what I needed. I explained my situation, how I had a check but no cash, and if I could use his phone to call for help I knew my grandfather would come and rescue me. The old man wore overalls like the other farmers of the area. He looked at me, nodded his head and said, "I don't

'spect we need to bother your grandfather. I bet we can get you fixed up".

I had no idea what the old man had in mind. but he motioned me to follow him as we walked to his barn. He retrieved a five-gallon fuel can, filled it with gasoline from the tank he used to fill his farm equipment, and then told me to get in his pickup. We drove back to my mom's car where he proceeded to pour the gasoline into the fuel tank. I cranked up the motor, and with the fresh fuel, it fired right up. I looked at the man, thanked him profusely, and told him I would be back on this same road the next day and I would be happy to stop and pay him for the 5 gallons of fuel and his trouble. I showed him the check I had in my billfold and told him I would have it cashed and would be able to reimburse him.

The old man smiled and then looked at me and said, "Son, it is just a little gas, and everybody needs help sometimes. I bet you would do the same for me if I was in a jam. Just remember the next time you see someone who needs some help".

I went on my way that day, but here I am nearly 50 years later, and I have never forgotten what the old man told me. I am sure he passed on many years ago, but he is still a bright shining light. The whole world needs to know about my old acquaintance and the lesson he taught me. It is a good lesson to learn. I have tried to practice the lesson as often as I can.

Oh, and by the way, never trust your mother on how long your fuel will last!

### TUMBLEWEED SMITH *Cats with six toes*

Joy Doss calls herself the crazy cat lady in the area. On her ranch near Sulphur Springs, she has a cat rescue operation and takes care of cats that are unadoptable because of medical or behavioral problems.

'They call me and ask me if I have room for this cat and I rarely say no, so we have ended up with 21 cats. One of them has a tendency to attack other cats so we have a jail for him. We take him out by himself, and he

plays outside for a while, then we put him back in his cell, which is a roomy cage. He's pretty content unless a cat wanders by, then he wants to kill it."

Joy is a former biology teacher who loves to observe animal behavior. She has different eating bowls and sleeping arrangements for each cat.

"Some of them sleep in my tack room where my saddles are. Some sleep in the hay barn. We arrange the bales so there's space between them and they're just snug as little bugs in there." Some of her cats stay by

a pond.

"I've got some really good frog catchers. They catch little frogs all the time. And we don't have a mole within three miles of this place because they're all good mole catchers. They'll sit and watch a molehill so they can coax that mole out of there. We don't have to have any mole traps set out at all."

Only one cat stays in the house. It's a big one that weighs 17 pounds. It has six toes and has learned how to shake hands.

"I'll take him to a school or summer camp and hold him up to look at the person in front of him then he'll stick out that right paw to shake hands.'

Six-toed cats are called polydactyl, meaning multiple toes or fingers.

'They're very unusual and they can handle all six toes. They have muscles to them so they can actually grab things and hold on to them. They pull their food bowls over and sometimes pick up their food with their fingers. They can grab and hold your finger like a baby does. They're very gentle cats and they're comical, always wanting to play. We've heard that cats don't like water but polydactyl cats for some reason like water. When I take them to the pool, they get in. They love to play in water."

The cats with six toes are hard to find and when they come up for adoption, they go fast.

"It is a recognized breed by the cat association and if you get one that is a purebred polydactyl, those kittens sell for at least \$1,500 a kitten."

Joy Doss also has a cat with no tail called a Pixiebob. It looks like a bobcat, acts like a dog but purrs instead of barks.



# Air Evac Lifeteam issues water safety tips ahead of Memorial Day

As area residents begin making plans for Memorial Day weekend, Air Evac Lifteam wants to remind them of the importance of boating and swimming safety.

In 2017, the U.S. Coast Guard reported more than 4.000 recreational boating accidents resulting in 658 deaths and 2,629 injuries. Additionally, 1.2 million people drown worldwide every year, with half of those being children and more than onequarter of them being people

who knew how to swim. While drowning accidents can happen any time of the year, incidents increase during warm weather months when more people enjoy water recreation. Most drowning incidents occur in open

water, lakes, rivers, ponds, and the open sea where lifeguards are limited.

Justin Bright, program director for Air Evac Lifeteam in Killeen, has several suggestions to help prevent water accidents.

A few simple but vital steps to keep you safe while boating:

· Always wear a lifejacket or personal flotation device Take a boating safety

course  $\cdot$  Avoid alcohol and drug

use · Check the weather forecast before heading out

 Learn to swim • Never stand up in your small powerboat, canoe, or similar watercraft

· Don't overload your boat  $\cdot$  Use common sense and operate responsibly

Things to keep in mind when swimming:

· Never swim alone  $\cdot$  Only use approved flotation devices; do not rely on toys or inner tubes

• Don't take chances by overestimating your swimming skills

· Swim only in designated swimming areas

 Watch small children near water

 Never dive into rivers or lakes; each year nearly 3,000 people are paralyzed as a result of diving into shallow water or hitting an unseen underwater obstruction.

## **BOOK REVIEW** *Real people caregiving in chaos*

Just a little pinch. That's what they tell you when you get a shot in the arm. Just a "pinch," a halfsecond of pain and you can handle that, right? Still, nobody likes getting a shot. Nobody enjoys the sore arm afterward or anything else about it. Those things aren't fun but neither — as in the new book "The Helpers" by Kathy Gilsinan — is a pandemic.

Some people saw it coming: the sister of The Patient was a doctor herself, for instance, and she was aware. The Vaccine Developer, who spent most of her time studying a headline-making disease from years ago, was alarmed, too. They recognized that the virus running rampant in China was trouble in the making.

The CEO knew it, too: the headquarters of his company, "one of only a handful in the world" that made ventilators, was near where the first U.S. death from the virus occurred. If they could get the parts, his factories could manufacture more machines but not the "tens of thousands" of ventilators that the country needed. This dilemma led him to a car company.

Because he'd dealt with emergencies for most of his working life, The Paramedic recognized the urgency of

it all, and he headed with a team from Colorado to New York to help. He still had 9/11 on his mind and regretted that he hadn't offered a hand then.

As the patient load went "from two to nearly 700 in two weeks in the middle of March" that year, The Nurse watched it and she was exhausted. She lived with her parents and grandmother in a Bronx apartment, and she had to avoid carrying the virus home.

As The Chef tried to figure out how to feed her poor community in the shadow of Breonna Taylor's murder, The CEO brought his former VP of manufacturing out of retirement, and The Vaccine Developer lost sleep over a preventative. Meanwhile. The Paramedic wasn't feeling well, The Nurse tested positive, and The Patient's

mother lay in a coma...

For going on three years now, COVID-19 has saturated our lives and killed more than a million American parents, children and grandparents.

Now's the time to read "The Helpers."

Here, author Kathy Gilsinan specifically names her subjects - depicted are real people and real lives, and nearly all of them are everyday folks who pounced on the problems endemic to a pandemic. The few who weren't "helpers" nevertheless help by displaying the inner workings of caregiving in chaos, and it all reads like a thriller, with heartstopping moments of terror mixed with a backstory, heroes who rush to save lives, a surprising bit of adventure, and a little light toward the end of the book. Yes, there's death here, and frustration, and Gilsinan doesn't skip the naysayers in an account that's familiar but fresh.

More than a million Americans. Are you keeping a wary eye on this fall? Then this is a book you'll want to read. For you, "The Helpers" is worth pinching into.




