Despite hotter than usual weather, 150 bicycle riders from throughout Texas – and even some from other states – visited Gates-



Hospice house a goal for local doc

Helping to make sure people have a comfortable, dignified place to spend their final days is a goal of Dr. Jeff Bates and some of his partners in The Lord's Work Christian Mission.

Although it can be a difficult topic to consider, end of life care is something that will eventually impact everyone. It's not something that Bates has shied away from.

"I always wanted to be involved in helping people, and when I was a kid, a lot of the people in my life were older and were dying, so it made an impact on me," he said. "I wanted to be a part of helping people facing that."

Bates, the chief medical officer at Coryell Health in Gatesville, is involved in a ministry called The Lord's Work that helps people with medical care and the basic needs of life in Haiti, Kenya and other locations throughout the world. But a new project he is focused on will benefit Central Texas. The goal is to have several hospice houses throughout the area. Hospice care helps those who are nearing the end of life, and Bates has been involved in helping to provide that care.

"We didn't have a hospice doctor when I came to the hospital in Gatesville, and people asked why I didn't do that," he said. "So I did. I think it's very important."

Some people who are nearing the

ville on June 11 to participate in an annual Fire Ant Tour, sponsored by the Gatesville Exchange Club.

Alan Mathis, Exchange Club president, told riders to be cautious of the heat and to look out for each other.

"It's hot today, and I rode in Saudi Arabia in 1993 and Iraq in 2003, so I know what heat is," Mathis said. "Pace yourself, be careful and watch out for your buddy. Everybody you see here today is your buddy."

To help keep the tour riders as comfortable as possible, the Exchange Club and other local volunteers staffed five water break spots, had five sag wagons (vehicles driving the route to see if anyone needs a ride and a bit of relief) and first responders along each of the routes.

This was billed as the 26th annual Fire Ant Tour. The event started in 1996, and the 2022 version of the ride was among the hottest, along with 2011 – another year for recordbreaking heat.

High temperatures were expected to climb well above 100 degrees, so most participants began the race at 8 a.m. A few of those riding the longer routes actually started about 6 a.m., said JoAnn Sugg, a longtime Exchange Club member and one of the organizers of COURTESY PHOTO

the event.

One of the newest local sponsors for the bicycle tour was Cycle Logical, owned by Josh Gooden of Gatesville. A bicycle mechanic,



Gooden travels to events throughout the state. During the Fire Ant Tour, he helped riders

fine-tune their bikes before the event began. "There were some shifting issues and flat

tires, and I helped with whatever they needed," Gooden said. "It was actually a pretty easy day."

Gooden said he has helped with bicycle rides in Muenster (North Texas) and the Houston area, as well as San Antonio and a 24-hour ride that takes place in Amarillo and Canyon.

In the Gatesville event, the oldest rider was 85, while the youngest who had pre-registered was 13.

Exchange Club member Faye Nichols said several of the riders are from the Gatesville area, and several others are members of the military.

Proceeds from the event go toward scholarships for students and different charity efforts for the Exchange Club.

"All the riders seem to appreciate that we do this," Nichols said.

"I love to meet people who come here from everywhere," Sugg said.

"Some have been here for several years," Nichols said. "They tell us they do rides all over Texas and that this is one of their favorite ones."

Riders had a choice of 11-, 31-, 48- and 62-mile routes.

The first rider back, Dan O'Brien of Fort

Methodists explore future affiliation

First United Methodist Church of Gatesville members continue to consider options for the future of the church, and will have a meeting at 6:30 p.m. today (June 15) to hear a presentation on reasons for remaining under the United Methodist umbrella.

The meeting will be held in the banquet hall of the church.

A difference of views on same sex relationships and other issues has led to a split within the church body both nationally and internationally, prompting Methodists to consider affiliating with a different organization, one of which is the more conservative Global Methodist Church.

During announcements on June 11, FUMC Gatesville Pastor Stephen Schmidt said that 92 of the 257 churches in the Central Texas Annual Conference were considering disaffiliating from the United Methodist Church.

In May, the Rev. Dr. Leah Hidde-Gregory, an elder in the UMC who is also has a connection to the Global Methodist Church, spoke to the Gatesville congregation about the process of disaffiliating from the UMC.

Schmidt has asked members of the church to pray about the decision.

Among those who have left the UMC to join the Global Methodist Church are the Rev. Michael Lowry, who had served as a church bishop in Fort Worth.

Lowry was quoted in The Christian Post, saying the UMC had "strayed in significant ways from faithfully upholding" orthodox beliefs of the Methodist tradition, adding "Jesus is my Lord. It is first and foremost in allegiance to my Lord and savior that I take this action."

Worth, arrived at the start/finish area at 8:58 a.m.

"I rode the 11-mile route," he said. "I was going to do the 31-mile one but the sun is already so hot. I love this event. All the volunteers are so friendly and helpful, and they have exactly what you need at the break stops. Ther routes were very well marked, which can be a problem at some of the other events I've attended.

"The organizers of this ride did a terrific job – I'm very impressed."

O'Brien said this is the second time he has participated in the Fire Ant Tour.

"I did this once before, years ago," he said. "I am just starting riding again after a hiatus of about 20 years."

Mattigan Moffat of Killeen and Morgan Moffat of Fort Worth also rode the 11-mile route.

"I just like the way this ride is organized and getting to ride with a lot of other people," Mattigan said. "I do a lot of riding alone, and it's great to be able to ride together."

"It was cool so see all the different set-ups and people here this morning," Morgan said "This was a nice ride."

Mattigan said this was his second time to do the Fire Ant Tour. He rode in the event four years ago. Morgan said this was her first time to do this ride.

"We weren't prepared for all the hills – there's no hills in Houston," Bill said. "This was Sean's first tour.

Bill said he sees messages for rides all over the state on the internet, and an ad for the Gatesville event brought him and his grandson to Central Texas.

"He's out of school, so it's nice to be able to do something together as grandpa and grandson."

final days in a hospital or nursing home and may not want or be able to go home. So, a hospice house gives them a place where they can go and be cared for.

"Waco doesn't have a hospice house and neither does Temple," Bates said. He added that when he and his wife Jennifer, who is a nurse, were dating, they had a mutual interest in building a hospice house.

"People in Central Texas aren't familiar with the concept because they don't exist here," he said. "I told my wife to take the life insurance when I die and build a hospice house."

The Bates family wouldn't have to wait that long to see their hopes for a hospice house move much closer to reality.

About \$3 million worth of property in Robinson was donated to Bates' charity, and plans for a hospice house moved forward "There's a cabin on it with about 14 acres, and I started thinking it was the perfect place for a hospice house," he said. "All these steps fell into place."

Confirmation of Bates' plan came when he talked to Rod Ready, a longtime friend of Pastor R.L. Whitworth, who had a connection with the Robinson property through the Calvary Assembly of God in that area.

"Rod told me that Pastor Whitworth wanted to build a hospice house out there, and I couldn't believe he said that. It's exactly what I'd been thinking about."

Helping Bates through The Lord's Work are Waco builder Tom Wright and Gatesville radiologist Kevin Dwyer.

Bates said having a hospice house can be a blessing for local residents.

"Most people want to die at home, and that's a wonderful luxury if you have it," he said. "It's not for everyone though, and it can be a huge burden on family. Our goal is to take care of people in their

last week of life."

A hospice house in Florida proved to be a blessing for the Bates family when his father was dying.

"My dad had five days left, and he was able to go to a hospice house in Florida," Bates said. "It was impractical for his wife to take care of him at home. It was the perfect place for him to be able to go. That was the first time I actually got to visualize a hospice house."

The hospice house in Robinson will serve as the first for The Lord's Work, but land has already been donated for another hospice house in Liberty Hill. There are also plans to build hospice houses in Temple, Gatesville and Georgetown.

"I want this to be something the community will embrace and support," Bates said. "There are thrift stores that support the Florida hospice house (where Bates' dad went), and I plan to open a thrift store in Robinson to help generate money for the hospice house." Bates has raised more than \$57,000 already, and he said he needed about \$100,000 to renovate the cabin on the Robinson property for a hospice house.

"We'll need a couple hundred grand more for staff," Bates said. "It costs about \$250 or \$300 a day for someone to stay in a hospice house. We won't charge that because we are a charity, but we certainly will welcome donations to help cover the costs."

Bates looks forward to the day when hospice houses serve multiple local communities. "It's something God put on my heart and He moved all the pieces into place," he said. "I really do think this is something that can be a benefit to people in our community."

When Tommy Womack was a boy, his family moved from El Paso to Amarillo. His daddy had just been discharged from the Horse Cavalry at Fort Bliss and had taken a job with the Santa Fe Railroad in Amarillo. Tommy started working in journalism.

"I rode a bicycle and delivered the Amarillo Globe newspaper to some neighborhoods. I would ride my bicycle down the middle of the street and throw papers to houses right and left. That's just the way paper boys did it back then.'

He says after having that job a while, he acquired a throwing skill and had a strong rhythm of getting the paper from the bag, folding it and throwing it, almost always landing it on the front porches of houses.

"Every once in a while, I'd throw a wild pitch and the paper would land on the roof or in a flowerbed and I'd have to retrieve it and put it by the front door. That really upsets the rhythm."

Small steps to save drops

Recent conversations here at the district have swirled around drought forecasts and below normal rainfall totals even with the past rains. As the days heat up and the water demand rises, have you thought about the water requirements of your landscape?

We all know that a healthy, beautiful landscape around our homes takes a lot of hard work and sometimes a lot of water. There are simple ways to practice water conservation even in droughty times.

One small step to incorporating water conservation into landscape features is to plant for success. There

are so many beautiful native species options that can significantly reduce a landscape's water consumption by approximately 80%. Deeper root systems keep the plants thriving in the crazy Texas weather patterns, including high temperatures and little rainfall. Texas Smart Scape and www.wildflower.org are both great resources to learn more about native plant species.

Trading out thirsty turf grasses like St. Augustine and Bermuda for native grass species like Curly Mesquite and Buffalo grass can also lower lawn irrigation needs. Mulch is another helpful addition to beds. Just a minimum of 3 to 6 inches of organic mulch will help maintain moisture levels and reduce watering frequency.

Don't set it and forget it. Sprinkler systems have their

benefits. Smart controllers, rain sensors and even soil moisture meters can all aid in a conservative approach to landscape irrigation, but even with technology, human involvement is still needed. It is important to closely monitor landscape. Checking the soil moisture level, sensors, controllers and sprinkler heads on a regular basis will cut down on unnecessary watering.

Rainwater harvesting can also be incorporated into lawn irrigation systems. There are many system options that can be used to fit your needs and budget. In Texas, rainwater harvesting equipment is tax exempt.

Making small changes within our homes and landscape to save water will not only add up by the drop but could also add up by the dollar.
