Wildfire danger leads to limits

Despite some recent rainfall, extreme fire danger caused by hot and dry weather has prompted the Coryell County Commissioners Court to prohibit burning trash as well as the use of certain types of incendiary ammunition for recreational purposes and also the use of metal or hardened targets that may produce sparks when hit by bullets.

Those were just some of the restrictions and requirements enacted to help prevent wildfire tragedies. The county has been under a declaration of local disaster since wildfires this spring scorched parts of the county and resulted in the evacuation of Flat.

On Aug. 9, the commissioners court got an update from County Emergency Management Director Bob Harrell and Gatesville Fire Chief Billy Vaden about the fire dangers plaguing Coryell County and much of the state.

"We've had quite a few fires, and only two that I know of were acts of God – caused by lightning," Harrell said. "The others were caused by human negligence, grinding and gunshots from a firing range."

The required time and resources necessary to fight the fires has put a drain on local fire departments, and the Texas A&M Forest Service has

GISD modifies policy to allow beards, nose studs

The Gatesville Independent School District Board of Trustees approved a couple of modifications to the student handbook on Aug. 8 that will allow students to have neatly trimmed beards as well as nose studs.

One change that had been considered previously was to allow different hair colors, but a decision was made that only natural hair colors would be allowed.

Because of legal issues, school districts no lon-

ger regulate hair length.

GISD Superintendent Barrett Pollard said he noticed over the summer several girls who had nose studs which are barely visible. The board approved those but are prohibiting the more noticeable hoops.

Regarding beards, Pollard said there are not many students who would be impacted by that.

"I don't know if we have many students who would be able to grow them," he said. Board member Jimmie Ferguson said he rarely

is contacted about anything related to school

policy, but he has gotten several calls and comments from people and that "100% are saying no nose rings. That's all ages telling me that, from students to older adults. I haven't heard from anyone in support of them. When I ask them why, they say it's not appropriate in school. I am getting more feedback on that than everything else combined. Based on that, I can't support nose rings. On beards, I don't care one way or the other."

City sets tax rate

Although no members of the public were present to speak on issues related to the proposed 2023 fiscal year budget or tax rate, the Gatesville City Council approved a preliminary tax rate of 56 cents per \$100 valuation and the upcoming annual budget.

Property taxes and sales tax allocations account for just over 71% of the city's general fund revenue.

Budgeted expenses are \$7,230,866, and 69.3% of funds are allotted to the police department, street department, administration and parks and recreation department. The police department is set to receive \$2,572,967, or 35.6% of the city budget, followed by the street department/fleet services at \$1,414,316, or 19.6% of the budget, and \$1,026,393 of administration, or 14.1% of the budget.

Other expenses include the fitness center, library, fire department, building inspectors, municipal court, planning, convention and visitors bureau and the swimming pool.

Projected revenue from water/ wastewater services is \$8,788,634.

also provided help. "We are in this for the long haul," Harrell said. "The forecast for the next three months is for higher than normal temperatures and below average rainfall."

Chief Vaden said in the month of July, there were 59 grassfires in Coryell County, and "only one or perhaps two of them were caused by lightning. It's been very expensive for all of us."

He said it cost the Gatesville fire department \$18,000 to respond to a fire caused by bullets from a local firing range, and there were additional costs for the forest service and other local fire departments.

Through the first week of August, Vaden said there had been five area grassfires.

"The biggest cause of all these fires is not welding but grinding," he said. "There are a lot of weekend guys building their own fence. You can't put out a (wildfire) with a five gallon jug of water."

Vaden said firefighters are responding to an average of two calls per day regarding wildfires "and it takes a toll on equipment and manpower. The fuel impact is astronomical."

Vaden said from January through July 2021, the Gatesville fire department spent \$7,000 on fuel. Through the same period in 2022, the expense had risen to \$20,000.

"We are also spending more time on fires," he said. "It takes three to five hours for a five-acre fire. You cannot leave anything smoldering. You have to put it out nearly 100%.

"This year is reminding me of 2011 but I think it's worse

"There are three critical areas," he said. "First is how to address weapons and ammo being discharged in the county." He suggested prohibiting the use of the hardened targets and prohibiting the use of any rounds that were incendiary tracers or explosive. There is no prohibition on being able to purchase that type of ammunition or discharging a firearm that does not use an incendiary round.

"The second piece of this is that (burn bans) usually do not prohibit burning trash," Miller said. "With these ex-

"Number three is establishing for welders to have at least 20 gallons of water on hand and the ability to spray it and also have a backup source (of water) to extinguish a fire."

Commissioner Scott Weddle asked what the repercussions would be if someone violated these rules.

"At this point, it's a Class C misdemeanor," Miller said. Those violations are punishable by fines of up to \$500.

Board member Calvin Ford said he heard opposite reactions from people regarding nose rings or studs.

"Students, teachers and people in the community said, 'It's about time,' Ford said, adding that some said that "too much time was spent worrying if you have a nose ring or a beard."

Board member Chevenne Kizer said she received similar comments.

"People said, 'Man this is great - so much time is wasted' worrying about those things," Kizer said. "In light of whether it's a distraction in the classroom, it's more of a distraction trying to monitor those things and send kids out of the classroom (to the office)."

Board member Linda Maxwell said she had talked to

people and they told her they were not opposed to the nose studs, "but they're very opposed to the rings."

Ford said he received positive feedback from staff who want to focus more on education.

"Teachers I talked to are all for it," he said. "They're ready to teach (instead of focus on dress code issues)." Kizer said she talked to a teacher "who was thrilled" to

focus more on instruction. Maxwell said it is more

difficult for teachers who enforce dress code issues. Pollard said that is a big

reason for the changes.

"The impetus behind this is all the time and effort spent enforcing this," he said. "It's been a draining, taxing process. It's so divisive and polarizing.'

Some board members said that staff should have to follow the same dress code set for students, but board Vice

Reskilling grant funds can help at CTC

Central Texas College (CTC) recently announced the Texas Reskilling Support Grant has reopened with limited funds and may help some students pay for fall semester classes. Initiated by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, the Reskilling grant can help pay for tuition if a student is returning to college to complete a certificate or degree. Students previously enrolled at CTC as well as students who were previously enrolled in another college are eligible.

Students with financial needs who are eligible for federal Title IV aid can qualify up to \$2,500. Those who do not have financial needs can qualify for up to \$500.

The Reskilling grant is designed to help cover tuition and fees for adults who started college but had to stop before earning a degree or certificate. This can benefit individuals who want to come back to college to finish a certificate in a high-demand field and help them get into the workforce or advance their career. The grant may also be used for graduates who can benefit from earning ad-

ditional training such as applying their Certificate of Completion towards an associate degree.

• have attended college at some point in the past but have not been enrolled in an accredited post-secondary institution in the previous fall or spring or semester or previous six months.

GISD announces student IDs will be required in 2022-2023

Starting with the 2022-2023 school year, all fourth through 12th grade GISD students will be required to wear their student ID at school. Students in fourth through 12th grade will be issued a traditional lanyard and their ID during the first week of school. These students need to wear their ID in a visible location every day after they receive it. This is an important measure for school safety.

All students in kindergarten to third grade will be issued a vovo lanyard and ID that will be attached to their backpack. All these students need to have their ID on their backpack every day after that.

Bus riders used their IDs to scan on and off the bus dur-

ing April and May last year. GISD will continue that process this year. All bus riders must have their ID and scan on and off every day. Some things to be aware of

with IDs:

· These IDs were made last vear.

Dr. Cummings' educa-tional events clearly explain dementia and how it progresses in the brain. A master at translating medical jargon into easyto-understand terms, she walks the audience through how the disease starts, how it presents itself in each stage of dementia and how to provide care for a loved one or resident, even when their behaviors may be challenging. From diagnosis to death, her expert advice and explanations change families' lives. Her book, "Untangling Alzheimer's," is designed to allow the first-time caregiver and the longtime professional to gain the understanding and skills they will need to work effectively with persons with dementia. Her dementia staging tool, the DBAT, is adapted from the Global Deterioration Scale. Updated with the behaviors easily recognized in each stage of dementia, the DBAT allows families to track the disease process, prepare for the future and recognize how the behaviors of their loved ones are directly related to damage in the brain's lobes.


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CHARLES HADLEY DALTON, JR.





Area Fishing Report

Belton

GOOD. Water lightly stained; 85 degrees; 8.04 feet low. The white bass fishing on Lake Belton continues to be very tough and difficult to pattern. These nomadic fish are chasing the abundant young of the year shad in small schools above the thermocline here, there, and everywhere, only occasionally showing themselves for just seconds at a time as they burst to the surface to feed on shad, and then disappear again. Best chances are to look for brief topwater action at first light and last light, and anticipate this activity to be short-lived. MAL Original

Best Of Coryell Co

Lures work well when white bass are feeding on mature shad, but the #13 Pet Spoons cast on light braid or mono with a fully-spooled spinning reel work well when fish are feeding on young of the year shad. Downrigging will produce bonus fish in the first three hours of the morning and the last 90 minutes of the day. Report by Bob Maindelle, Holding the Line Guide Service.

Stillhouse Hollow GOOD. Water lightly stained; 85 degrees; 8.05 feet low. The white bass fishing on Stillhouse is strong, but technical. Quality sonar and the ability to read it are a must as fish are found in small tight schools at, or near, the bottom in up to 52 feet of water. Once fish are found, primarily using sideimaging, hover on top of the fish with Spot-Lock and work MAL Dense Lures with chartreuse tails vertically. Largemouth bass are good working soft plastics in dark, natural hues along the deep edge of hydrilla in 22-26 feet of water. Quantities of smaller fish can be caught by sight-casting in the first three hours of the morning using small, clear soft plastics like grubs and small fluke-style baits. Report by Bob Maindelle, Holding the Line Guide Service.
