Fire chief has ample experience

Billy Vaden raises the glass and aluminum overhead door on the south side of the Gatesville Fire Department, a rambling, thrice-expanded metal building located between Taco Bell and 7-Eleven.

Walking across the concrete floor, he pauses at a gleaming, red and white behemoth.

"This truck," he says matter-of-factly, "cost over a half a million dollars."

And that's just one of the 20-plus pieces of firefighting vehicles that he oversees as fire chief. Tank trucks, transport vehicles, a dozer, rescue watercraft, maintenance units, various trailers - they're all part of the department's equipment inventory. Then there are the 33 full-time women and men volunteers under his watch.

Vaden, 75, joined the Gatesville Volunteer Fire Department in 1970. He was elected Chief in 1975 and has served in that role continuously since then, a tribute to his competence and skills. Fire Department members vote annually for their preference as Chief and have re-elected him for 47 years.

His Gatesville roots run deep. Vaden was born here and graduated in the class of 1965 at Gatesville High School. He was employed at Powell Supply Company after graduation, working in the metal shop. After a stint in the National Guard, he worked at Con Site, now known as MATES (Maneuver Area Training Equipment Site) at North Fort Hood, repairing heavy equipment and Army tanks. After two years at Powell Chevrolet Company, he and a partner opened an auto repair shop.

One morning, Vaden saw a notice in the Waco Tribune-Herald seeking firefighters. "I was 30 years old and I applied," he says. There were 270 applicants and he was selected to fill one of five vacancies at the Waco Fire Department. "It was 24 hours on and 48 off so I could continue to work on the side. I still was a member of the Gatesville VFD." Over the years, Vaden kept busy with various enterprises. He built up an automotive hauling business, eventually owning five big trucks and coping with employee and other

Gatesville Methodist votes to 'Go Global'

After voting earlier to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church, members of First Methodist Church of Gatesville voted on Oct. 3 to apply for membership to the newly formed Global Methodist Church.

The church membership had voted in August to officially leave the United Methodist. Other area Methodist churches – including ones in Pidcoke, Jonesboro, and Evant, also voted to disaffiliate from the UMC.

Although the issue of same sex marriages was often prominently featured in the media as the reason for the split, there were actually several factors leading many churches – 81 from the Central Texas Conference – to disaffiliate from the UMC. Among those are an adherence to traditional orthodox Christian beliefs and values and the authority of Scripture as well as the Methodist Book of Discipline.

trucks and coping with employee and other logistical issues.

"I was with Waco Fire for 25 years when I retired," he explains. "It was time to sell all those trucks and make some changes."

He'd been spending many of his off-time hours at the Gatesville Fire Station. "They asked if I'd just stay there 8 to 5 during the week and they'd pay me," he says, emphasizing that his wife Peggy was an essential element in his career. "She's always been very understanding of the time it takes to do this job." The couple were married in 1970 and have two daughters and five grandchildren.

Vaden reflects on changes over the decades. "Back when I started, the only equipment we were given was a pair of coveralls from the Walls outlet store," he says. "No hats, boots, nothing. Today everybody has two sets; a structural set for entry into a building, as well as a dual-purpose set, which is good for everything else except entering a structure." He smiles as he remembers the trucks in use years ago. "Those old vehicles just don't compare. Most were old military trucks that were converted; lots of homemade jobs. Now they're all factory built."

The shift to a partly paid fire department is a change that Vaden predicts. Currently, he's the only paid employee, a situation that he's quick to point out "saves the City of Gatesville a terrific amount of money." The city allocated the department \$229,000 this year. Coryell County contributes an amount that varies each year based on several factors and this year's lump sum was \$144,000. Vaden mentions a Texas Forest Service grant received



five years ago and federal grants "since I don't know when."

Female and male volunteers are always needed and Vaden adds that it can be difficult to recruit them. "People sometimes don't realize that there's so much else to do around here besides fighting fires," he explains. Applications are available online and at the fire station.

The area protected by the Gatesville Fire Department encompasses 287 square miles and the department receives an average of 700 calls each year. Vaden is effusive in Billy Vaden joined the Gatesville Volunteer Fire Department in 1970, and was elected chief in 1975. He has been re-elected to the post for 47 consecutive years.

his praise of the women and men that serve as volunteers. "There are truly great people on our team," he stresses. "They are unflinching when given orders. They know that I've been there and done everything I'm asking them to do."

Methodist Church of Gatesville's Church Council, called the Oct. 3 congregational meeting to order, and the 63 church members who voted unanimously chose to seek membership in the Global Methodist family of churches. Another option that had been considered was alignment with the Free Methodist Church.

Before the vote, Pastor Stephen Schmidt prayed that the church would follow God's will and do "what's pleasing in your sight and best for our congregation, and that we are patient through the process."

Schmidt said the Gatesville church will have until Oct. 31 to get all the necessary documents submitted to the United Methodist Church, and that the official date of disaffiliation will be Nov. 1.

"I've had a lot of people ask me about what I'm going to do," Schmidt said. "I've served as a pastor in the United Methodist Church for 37 years and five months. I will retire from

the United Methodist Church, affiliate with the Global Methodist Church and end my career there."

Schmidt, who is from Moody, said he hopes to continue serving as the pastor of the Gatesville church. He said he has been asked to serve as one of the elders of the Western District of the Global Methodist Church.

"We will wait until all the checklist items for disaffiliation are complete and turned in to apply to be part of the Global Methodist Church and the Mid-Texas Conference," he said. "This has been a long, arduous journey but I believe the church is following God's

will."

The Mid-Texas Conference is based in Waco and is the first conference of the Global Methodist Church that is "up and running officially," Schmidt said. He added that the Mid-Texas Conference will accept churches all the way to Oklahoma in the north, to McAllen in the south, Winters and Abilene in the west and Lufkin to the east.

"Once we are officially affiliated with the Global Methodist Church, we will have a celebration. We believe that this is God's will for the church, and we believe it wholeheartedly."

While there has been division and disagreement within the United Methodist Church for decades, the timing of disaffiliation was led by a UMC decision to allow churches to disaffiliate within a certain time.

Nationwide, churches that want to leave the UMC must do so by Dec. 31, 2023.

Several Central Texas Methodist churches, including some of those in Waco, Killeen and Temple, are among the first to seek affiliation with the Global Methodist Church.





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Dutch Oven Gang helping Eagle Springs church



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Did you know that fire departments across the nation receive a call about a home fire every one-and-a-half minutes?

According to the Red Cross, approximately 68,000 disasters take place each year, and of those, the majority are home fires. Fortunately, there are steps you can take around your home to reduce the risk of fire. These include:

• Inspect all electrical outlets and extension cords, and make sure they are in good condition and are not overloaded.

• Handle gasoline with care and store it in an approved container out of the reach of children.

• Store matches, lighters and volatile chemicals in their original containers in a locked cabinet out of the reach of children.

 Place space heaters away from combustibles and turn them off when leaving the room. • Keep candles away from combustibles and out of the reach of children, and extinguish the flames when leaving the room.

- Stay in the kitchen or at the grill while cooking and keep combustibles away from the stove- or grill-top.
- Install smoke detectors on each floor and bedroom in your home, and test them regularly.
- Douse cigarette butts with water before throwing them into the trash.
- Arrange for a professional cleaning and inspection of wood stoves, fireplaces and furnaces prior to the start of each heating season.
- Place fire extinguishers throughout your home and learn how to use them.
- Keep combustibles away from wood stoves, fireplaces and furnaces.

• Burn wood only in wood stoves and fireplaces, and use a fireplace screen when possible.

In addition to following these safety tips, you should devise a fire escape plan with two exits out of every room and practice it often with your family. You should also arrange for everyone to take a fire safety course. That way, in the event that a fire happens, your family will know how to react.

This past week I was fortunate to be scrolling through social media when I saw a notice that a young man I knew was celebrating his birthday. Jeff is now 43 years old and lives in New York.

A little more than 20 or so vears ago, he arrived on a bus after traveling from the northeast to Texas over a period of two full days. He was interested in learning about horses and had reached out to me looking for a place to work and learn. Since Jeff had verv little background in terms of ranching or equines, I was more than a little reluctant, but I finally told him if he could get to Texas, I would give him a chance.

When the bus came to a stop, the doors opened and out walked a long, tall string bean of young man, wearing a hat that was right off a cowboy caricature photo. To say Jeff did not look like a

cowboy would be a vast understatement. I had him toss his stuff into my truck and got him back to the ranch and settled in. I am pretty sure I was shaking my head in dismay, as I navigated the road back home. What had I gotten myself into?

I dropped Jeff at the bunk house and gave him the rest of the day off to catch up on some sleep he had lost while traveling. I made it clear the day started at 7, and he needed to be at the barn ready to go.

Early the next morning, my new ranch hand met me with a smile and began attending the "school of hard knocks." He learned how to saddle horses all day, wash them, turn them out, take care of tack, and a thousand other tasks. Though he was ignorant of how to do things the "cowboy" way, his knowledge quickly grew, and he was never short of enthusiasm as he went about his work.

Jeff worked from 7 to 6, six days a week. Many times, on Sunday I would have him join my son and I as we went to church. Afterward, we would return home and I would cook. Though he was very slender, he had a tremendous appetite, which led to me teasing him, "Jeff this is all you can eat, not eat it all."

There were many times we talked about life, manhood, the future, and the proper way to handle yourself. Jeff always listened closely, though a man trying to spread wisdom never really knows if those kinds

of lessons stick. The test is through observation over the years.

At the end of the internship Jeff went back to New York. He served a tour of duty in the military, and now works as a farrier and from all outside observations, has a nice life. When I sent him a "Happy birthday" greeting on Facebook he sent me a nice note back, telling me had never forgotten some of the things I had told him. His favorite was "When the pressure is off, the pressure is on," which in cowboy language means if you stay on top of your life and take care of business daily, there will never be any pressure because you worked, planned and thought ahead and anticipated all the things that could go wrong. Jeff told me he tried to practice that phrase every day.

A man never knows what effect he might have on someone. I am proud that Jeff demonstrates the character I always wanted to see be a part of him. He was a hard-working young man, and I was proud to know him. I am even prouder of him now.

Learning about life the way Jeff did is not the easiest way, but it is the "cowboy" way.

Thought for the day: The people around us impact us. Be intentional about how you associate with others and who you let be around you.

Willis Dale Warner, age 82, passed away on September 29, 2022, in Lampasas, after a courageous battle with cancer. He was born on February 29, 1940, in Izoro, to Charles Everett Warner and Ada Elizabeth Hammett Warner.

Funeral services will be held at Sneed-Carnley Funeral Chapel on Saturday, Oct. 8, at 10 a.m. with interment to follow at Hines Chapel Cemetery in Adamsville.

Willis began the first grade with Miss Holly Parsons, he then attended grade school in Levita and graduated from Jonesboro High School in 1959. After high school, he moved back to Izoro and began his own business as an independent contractor, installing plumbing, heating, and air conditioning in new construction homes in Copperas Cove. Two years later in 1961, he joined the Air Force, where he served for four years. While there, he completed Heating Specialist Training at U.S. Naval Schools Construction in Port Hueneme, California. He then served at Osan Air Base in South Korea at the Hospital as the Boiler Plant Operator. In 1963, he was assigned to 65th Strategic Aerospace at Walker Air Force Base in Roswell. New Mexico. He was a

member of the AeroClub and completed his first solo flight in 1964.

After serving in the Air Force, he attended several aeronautical training schools, receiving diplomas and certificates from Spartan School of Aeronautics in Tulsa, Oklahoma, Piper Aircraft Corp. in Lockhaven, Pennsylvania, General Electrical Aircraft Engine Sectional Maintenance, **Evendale** Technical Training School in Cincinnati, Ohio, Lycoming Service School in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, General Motors in Indianapolis, Indiana. He worked in Beaumont, Texas, Olathe, Kansas and Dallas in aeronautics as a mechanic, inspector and trainer. He wrote a training manual on the CF-6 jet engine and taught training school at Southwest Airmotive, Dallas Love Field, where he was promoted to foreman of the CF-6 product line. Students from all over the country came to take his classes there.

He married Betty Ann Wilkie in Westville, Oklahoma on April 2, 1966. In 1975, he left the aeronautics industry to move home to Izoro to his ranch where he raised cattle and worked at Evant ISD as the school bus maintenance mechanic and as a bus driver where his daughter Annette began kindergarten. He later worked as the plant maintenance supervisor at Deck Boat in Gatesville and was then owner/operator of Warner's Garage in Evant. From there he worked for Santa Fe Oil and Pipeline on the Tonkawa barge maintaining the diesel engines. He worked as an auto mechanic and service manager for Benny Boyd Dodge Chrysler Jeep, Hoffpauir Chevrolet, Hoffpauir Ford, Gene Jones Ford, and Hal Harton Ford all of Lampasas. Also, Highland Autoplex, Maxwell Auto, and Sue Har-

ton Chevrolet, where he retired at age 62. He had earned training certifications from Dodge, Ford and Chevrolet. Later he worked part-time for Tommy Foster, Norris Monroe, Jeff Cockburn and Tom York in Lampasas. He had rebuilt engines on cars, trucks, boats, heavy equipment, airplanes and helicopters. He was fascinated with all things mechanical and electrical and meticulously broke them down and put them back together.

He loved bluegrass, country and rock and roll, and he played the acoustic guitar, electric guitar, bass, mandolin, harmonica, and balalaika. For many years he played music at the annual Sausage Fest at the Lutheran Church in Copperas Cove, and he enjoyed playing music at the Oatmeal Music Fest, Adamsville Music Hall and the Pearl Bluegrass Jam.

He was a proud native Texan, whose third great-grandfather (Captain Andrew Bell Caddell) fought at the Battle of San Jacinto.

He loved his children and grandchildren, his cousins and his dear neighbors in Lampasas. He was preceded in death by his wife, his parents and his aunts and uncles.

He is survived by his daughter, Annette Moore, and husband, James Moore; a son, Dale Everett Warner; a grandson, James Edwin (Jem) Moore and a granddaughter, Torri Alexis Gutierrez Warner.

The Radical **Nature of Faith**

"Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me." -Luke 9:23 NIV



he story of Abraham is often told as an example of the radical nature of faith. Abraham accepted on faith that his wife Sarah would give birth to a child in her nineties, and then after this actually happened, he accepted on faith that God required him to sacrifice this very son, Isaac. God relented of this demand after seeing Abraham's willingness to do so, but the philosopher Kierkegaard wondered what effect this whole experience must have had on Abraham. Can we go through such experiences and not be radically altered? Look at any of the Old Testament prophets and you see how radical faith can be. Isaiah went barefoot and naked for three years as a prophetic gesture. Hosea married a harlot in order to show how God was similarly yoked to the unfaithful people of Israel. Jesus's message must have been extremely radical in his day, enough for it to get him executed. The early Christians practiced their faith in secret because they too were in danger of being executed for it. Faith can be comforting, but if all it does is let you sleep well at night, then perhaps you aren't taking it far enough. As David Platt says in the book Radical, "I could not help but think that somewhere along the way we had missed what was radical about our faith and replaced it with what is comfortable." Consider whether you have made an idol of comfort and have in the process watered down your faith. - Christopher Simon





Area Fishing Report

White bass continue to concentrate on both breaklines and slow-tapering bottoms in the 38-48 feet range, but are now much more willing to chase and bite. Using side-imaging over large tracts of bottom to find fish, then using MAL Dense Lures vertically at first, then horizontally after the vertical bite cools off continues to produce morning limits of fish. Small largemouth bass begin schooling on the surface around 8:30 a.m. and go strong until around 11 a.m. Small, unweighted flukes cast quickly and accurately get bit.

Waco

FAIR. Water stained; 81 degrees; 10.63 feet low. The bite can be tough this time of year while the fish are transitioning to the fall pattern. The fish are on the move to either deep water along creek channels, or shallow timber. To locate the fish follow the bait fish, where there is bait fish there will be predatory fish that follow. Bass are fair chasing roaming fish suspended in the creek channel. The afternoon bite will start to outshine the morning bite, as fish can be lethargic in the cool mornings. The fish are

not acclimated to the switch in the weather temperatures, so once the sun begins to warm the water the fish will begin to feed. Report by Robert Stover, Workingman Crappie Guide. The fall brawl is on with crappie stacking up in brush between 10-17 feet of water on the main lake. Throw jigs tipped minnows.
