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# Council approves new policy for cats & dogs

The Gatesville City Council approved an ordinance which updates the definition and owner responsibility regarding dangerous dogs and also addresses the issue of numerous cats roaming city streets.

"We took a 30-day pause for the animal advisory committee to meet," said City Manager Bill Parry. One change is that references to feral cats were changed to community cats. The reason is some of the stray cats do not fit the definition of feral. They are domesticated animals, but do not have an

Dangerous dogs are defined as animals that make "an unprovoked attack on a person that causes bodily injury and occurs in a place other than an enclosure in which the dog was being kept.

Gatesville Police Chief Nathan Gohlke said the city is in line

to receive funding to help pay for the community cat issue.

"We could get a possible grant for \$26,000 to help us manage our (stray) cat population," he said. The animal advisory committee includes representatives from both Gatesville veterinary clinics.

"This grant would allow us to take the cats we impound and have them spayed or neutered and returned to the community," Gohlke said. "Part of the grant will allow us to purchase deterrents we can loan out to those who don't want

cats on their property."

Mayor Pro Tem Meredith Rainer asked what type of deterrents would be available.

Gohlke said while he did not know specifics, he believes there are devices that can be hooked up to sprinklers or noise makers that could chase cats from properties.

"It does give us an opportunity to have cats spayed or

# Doctor focuses on reducing foot, ankle discomfort

(Two of Coryell Health's newest doctors recently spoke to the Gatesville Lions Club. This is the second of a two-part series).

As a podiatrist with Coryell Health, Dr. James Townson Jr. is committed to helping people receive the best foot care possible.

"I'm excited to be back in Central Texas," said Townson, who has more than 10 years experience as a podiatrist. "I was in New Braunfels for a while but jumped at the chance to come back to this area.

"I specialize in the foot and the ankle and treat whatever may be bothering you."

Townson said the most common question he gets is what shoes he recommends. He said many of the top-selling athletic shoes do not offer the best support, and provided a list of recommended shoes.

These include:

\* Brooks Adrenaline, Glycerin, Beast (most supportive) and

Ghost New Balance: 990, 1012, 1260

and 1540 \* Saucony: Grid, Stabil and Hur-

ricane \* Hoka: Bondi (good for arthri-

tis in the big toe) and Clifton \* Topo Athletic: (has a wide toe box for deformities) Phantom 2 and Spector

Good walking shoes with room: \* Aetrex, New Balance, Hoka and Topo Athletic

During a recent visit to the Gatesville Lions Club, Townson brought samples of shoes and showed things to avoid when selecting a shoe. He suggested going to a shoe store and using a Brannock Device (standard foot measuring tool) in the evening when your feet are most swollen from a day's activities.

"One thing you should look for is that the shoes bend at the toes," Townson said. "If you can bend a shoe in half (front to back), that's not good.

"Second, if you can twist the shoe a full 360 degrees, that will not offer your feet the best stable support. Third, squeeze the back of the shoe in the heel area. If it collapses when you push it, that's not good. You need firm heel support."

Townson said wearing the right shoes can prevent a host of foot problems. Inserts are also available to offer additional support for those who need it.

While anyone can suffer foot and ankle pain, those who have diabetes are especially prone to those concerns.

"Diabetes is number one hands down the thing we see when

Transforming the In School Suspension classroom at a junior high campus can be a formidable challenge, and that's what Gatesville Junior High staff member Alex Fulton was recognized for by the Gatesville Independent School District Board of Trustees.

Fulton was honored during the staff spotlight presentation at the school board's November meet-

GISD Superintendent Barrett Pollard said that "Fulton has been a fantastic addition to the junior high campus," adding not only does the ISS classroom address disciplinary issues, it is making a positive impact on those students in an instructional setting.

"Alex's primary focus is for students to change their behavior so they don't return to ISS," Pollard

said. "One way he achieves this is by cultivating relationships with students and checking on them once they are out of ISS.'

Fulton also coordinates fishing tournaments to serve veterans through the Wounded Warriors project and promotes those events with students.

Fulton has a keen eye for detail. Pollard noted that on one occasion, Fulton stopped a school board member whom he did not recognize to make sure that person was authorized to be on

someone is dealing with foot pain," Townson said. "It does so many things to the body. It affects hydration, neuropathy (weakness, numbness and pain due to nerve damage) and causes lots of problems in the feet."

He said when toes lose stability, people can get hammer toes (where the joint is abnormally bent) and bunions.

"We look at arteries, nerves, bones and skin whatever you might have a problem with, we look at," Townson said.

Asked about widths in shoes, Townson said some shoemakers are better at making proper widths than others.

"Make sure you have a good supportive show when you are active or exercising," he said. "I approach treatment for anyone the same way I would with my own family. We do perform surgeries when that is important, but there are often options instead of surgery. There are pluses and minuses in different treatment options."

While other doctors can also treat foot issues, Townson noted that "podiatrists do a residency for three years focusing on the foot. There is a lot more training specific to just the foot and ankle."

neutered at a local veterinary clinic and then returned to the community," Gohlke said. "Part of the process is to have the cats vaccinated.

"We have a lot of (stray) cats roaming around the community and \$26,000 will only allow us to do about 200 cats each year. Hopefully it will take off and people will do this (spay or neuter cats)

on their own. The grant is renewable for a year, but we have to show we are working on the problem and not just euthanizing (the stray cats)." Gohlke said there is track-

ing software that will help the city keep up with the location of community cats better, and said the cats will be tattooed or earmarked when they are picked up.

Councilwoman Barbara Burrow asked if traps were the way cats were collected and if the city had sufficient traps available.

"Yes, and the grant will help us buy more," Gohlke said. "We won't be able to do everything with this grant but it will help us." He added that the traps would only be put on Sunday night or Monday through Thursday to avoid a cat being trapped without access to food or wa-

ter for a prolonged period. "This sounds well thought out," Burrow said.

The Council approved the amended ordinance.



The person who performed was a Black man in his mid-50s. He was a good looking, personable sort of man, who quickly drew the audience in and made them laugh. The wife and I were having a great time and roaring at the comedian's skit, when a most unfortunate act occurred.

The comedian, like most comedians do, started interacting with people at the front of the stage. The comedian was not out of line, nor abusive to the audience. but he did make a few wise cracks. The interactions were not offensive or anything that should upset a reasonable person. Heck, when you go to a comedy show and sit in the front row, you can pretty much expect to have the comedian interact with

In this case, the comedian addressed a man wearing a cowboy hat. I forget exactly the nature of his question, but I do know it was harmless and intended to draw a laugh. From where I was sitting, I could not hear the reaction of the man with the hat, but suddenly the comedian's face went flush. For an instant I thought it was all part of the act, but then the comedian said, "What did you just say?" Evidently the man repeated what he had shouted. The comedian responded by saying, "That is not all right, that is not cool, we are going to have a teaching moment here." It became very apparent the cowboy had called the comedian the worst insult you could say to a Black person. Yes, in a room full of 250 people, the cowboy called the comedian the "N" word!

The comedian proceeded to explain how hurtful that word was to so many people.

How he never used hateful words like that, and even when members of his own race used the word, he asked them to stop. He spoke for about five minutes about why it is SO wrong to use the "N" word, and told the cowboy he was not mad, and he did not hate him for using the word but was trying to educate him that the use of the word is simply the wrong thing to do.

The comedian got a standing round of applause. I felt pain for the comedian and every Black person in the audience. Everyone in attendance was there to have a good time, and then one person did something to ruin the entire aura of the show. I felt shame for the ignorant speaker, and how he had managed to add fuel to the fire that cowboys were racist and intolerant. The comedian handled the situation as good as it could be handled. I am so very pleased to report that most people in the room apparently felt like I did.

It is still hard for me to forget what happened. How could such a thing happen in today's world? Racism is not something that occurred a hundred years ago. It still exists in the hearts of some. I am very happy to report the number appears to get smaller with each passing day and generation. There should be no place in our world where someone is judged other than by their character and heart.

At first, I thought my night was ruined, but it turns out I felt a sense of pride and growth that so many people felt as I did, and were appalled about what had happened. There is hope.

# General James Davis: Farmer, soldier, politician

EDITORS NOTE: The story of General James Davis is told by his third great-grandson, Robyn Davis. Robyn is a member and president of the Erastus "Deaf" Smith Chapter of The Sons of the Republic of Texas in Pasadena. Robyn serves the SRT as the San Jacinto, District Representative and as a committeeman on the Texian Navy Day and Logo committees.

My name is James Davis, and I was born in Richmond, Virginia in 1790. The exact date of my birth is not for sure but sometime in the month of July. My parents, the Reverend John Davis and Mary Eastin, had a total of 12 children. Maybe that's why birth dates could not easily be remembered.

I was commissioned as an officer in the Army during the War of 1812 and Battle of New Orleans, fighting alongside of my good friend, Sam Houston. My next stop after my time serving during the war was in the Alabama territory where I was appointed sheriff of Marian County in

In 1823, I was appointed the County Judge of Franklin County, Alabama, followed by a stint as the Solicitor of the Fourth Judicial Court in 1827. After leaving an appointment to the Alabama militia, I finally made my way to Texas in 1834. I reconnected with my friend Sam and served on his staff in 1836. I was appointed by General Houston to help prevent attacks on the Alabama and Coushatta Indians in April 1842.

In May 1842, I was appointed Adjutant General of the Texian Army by General Houston. This was a position I served in until July 1842. During this time, I was assigned to Fort Lipantitlan. I was in command of a garrison of misfit soldiers that General Houston had ordered me to enact discipline and to whip into shape. During this command, the 192 men I commanded defeated a Mexican force three times our size under the command of General Antonio Canales on July 7, 1842.

After my command was over, I began a political career representing Liberty County in the Eighth Congress of the Republic of Texas in 1843-1844. Additionally, I was a member of

the Constitutional Convention of 1845 casting a vote for Liberty County for the Republic of Texas to join the Union as well as a delegate to the 1848 National Democratic Convention in Baltimore to select a president and vice president.

Lastly, I served as a state senator during the Fourth Legislature of Texas representing Liberty, Jefferson, Tyler and Polk counties 1851-1853. During my time in Congress, I supported homestead exemptions as a right for all landowners.

In 1848, I donated a portion of my land in Polk (now San Jacinto) County to establish a Baptist church, which would later be known as the Laurel Hill Baptist church. This land donation included a parcel for a cemetery to be established. The name was selected because of the laurel trees that lined the baptismal pool of the Laurel Hill Baptist Church.

I was married to my sweet-



heart, Anne Eliza Hill Davis. Our family included eight children and we knew all their birth dates. We were happily married and considered wealthy by most folks. One of our daughters, Catherine, married Vernal Lea in 1846. Vernal was the brother of Margaret Lea who was the third wife of my lifelong friend, General Sam Houston. Catherine and Vernal resided in San Jacinto County and had four children.

I died peacefully at home, in Coldspring, June 10, 1869 at the age of 68. I am buried in the Laurel Hill Cemetery, Coldspring, Texas.

"Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."

Te are spiritual and material beings, bodily creatures with feelings which can be hurt or soothed in equal measure. Those who work in the healing arts know the importance of tenderness, especially when people are in pain. We have all felt the pain of someone treating us roughly, and this treatment is all the worse when we know they could have been gentler. Sometimes we need God's grace in order to show tenderness, because the person in question is morally or physically repulsive to us. There is a good example of this from the life of Saint Francis. As a young man he had always found lepers repulsive, a natural reaction to their appearance. But one day after praying ardently he was told by God that what he had previously desired carnally would be repulsive to him and what he found repulsive would give him enormous delight. A few days later he came upon a leper and was moved to give the leper a coin, kissing him on the hand as he did so. Thereafter he found that the sight of lepers no longer repulsed him and that he was able to embrace them and kiss them tenderly. Who are the lepers in your life that you need to befriend and embrace? Pray for God's loving kindness to work through you, and especially for it to be made manifest to those who you may find repulsive. - Christopher Simon


