Trash collection changes coming soon

Starting Monday, Jan. 23, Gatesville residents will receive their new 96-gallon trash carts as well as 96-gallon recycling carts in anticipation of changes in trash collection service that will begin the week of Feb. 6.

Gatesville is the last community in Central Texas to move to an automated collection service. City residents will have once per week trash pick-up (either Monday, Tuesday, Thursday or Friday depending on their zone) and every other week collection of recyclable materials (primarily plastics, aluminum cans, cardboard boxes and paper), once per month bulk pickup (large items that will not fit in a standard trash container) and at-your-door household hazardous waste collection. The hazardous material collection must be scheduled by contacting Waste Management.

Although a significant amount of trash can fit in the 96-gallon carts - especially when recycled items are separated - customers who need additional carts can contact Centex Waste Management at 1-800-800-5804 to have them delivered. Additional carts will cost \$5 each per month.

"Each of you will have a slightly different trash schedule in the future," said City Manager Bill Parry. Some of the major dividing lines for the four different trash collection zones for Gatesville are Lutterloh Street and Lovers Lane.

Trash that is outside of the carts in other containers or in bags will not be collected.

'All of your trash has to fit in the cart and the lid has to close," Parry said. He added that people will be required to put their trash bags inside the carts, and loose materials should not be placed in the trash carts.

Mayor Pro Tem Meredith Rainer asked about recycling and was told that those items should be placed directly in the designated recycling cart rather than in bags.

County approves building financing

The Coryell County Commissioners Court approved a \$13.6 million plan to finance the expansion of the Coryell County Jail and the construction of a justice center, the Leon Street Annex, during

the Jan. 10 meeting.

Of the amount, county leaders agreed to fund \$7 million of the cost up front, but the vote was not unanimous. County Judge Roger Miller opposed the plan presented by Pct. 2 Commissioner Scott Weddle to transfer \$1 million from a fund dedicated to broadband internet planning to help pay for construction costs. However, Pct. 1 Commissioner Kyle Matthews and Pct. 3 Commissioner Ryan Basham both supported Weddle's proposal, which passed by a 3-1 vote. New Pct. 4 Commissioner Keith Taylor, who was attending training for new county leaders, was not present at the meeting.

"I have been examining every single alternative the county has available, and I consulted with the county auditor's office," Weddle said. "I'm of the opinion that when I spend my own money, I try to put as much down as I can because I hate paying interest."

Weddle said putting an extra \$1 million down would save the county an estimated \$125,000 in interest costs.

Miller was against transferring the \$1 million allotted for broadband studies "because it looks at areas that are underserved or unserved and that is an economic driv-

"The recycling specifically does not go in a bag," Parry said. "Those items remain loose in the recycling cart."

Getting community members used to once per month curbside bulk pickup will be an important part of the trash collection service changes, Parry said.

"The key thing becomes bulk pickup once per month in each zone," he said. "The city utility yard is also still open on the second and fourth Saturdays for people to bring stuff. It may be a challenge to keep people from putting bulk on the curb (when their collection is not scheduled) so it doesn't sit there for a month."

A detailed list of which items can be placed in recycling containers, which can be collected via bulk and household hazardous waste pickup (tires will not be collected) and other information will be provided in brochures that will be attached to the new trash carts.

Councilwoman Barbara Burrow said she plans to have a neighborhood town hall meeting, which in part is intended to encourage people to recycle.

"This needs to be a success for the city and for the people, too," she said.

Parry said the trash carts are intended to serve a specific address.

"What's really key and critical - when you live in Gatesville and move out of the house, you leave the trash cart," he said. "Each can has a serial number, so people can write it down and track it if something happens to it."

Asked by a resident attending the meeting if the cost for collection will go up, Parry said, "You'll pay more, but you'll get the recycling and household hazardous waste as added services."

During a December Council meeting, a representative from Waste Management noted that a cost increase would have been scheduled anyway. He added that the old system of collecting trash is being phased out, partly because less manpower is needed by using the automated system and partly because the new system is cleaner and more efficient.

Councilwoman Burrow said she was excited by the atyour-door collection of hazardous materials.

"I'm excited about trash collection in a can," Parry said, adding that when people put trash in loose bags on their curb, the bags are often torn by animals and trash is scattered on the street and in yards.

"I believe truthfully what Waste Management tells us, you'll see an immediate improvement in service and in the city's appearance," Parry said. "I think this will be a good thing."

Other communities in Central Texas have already made the transition to the automated service, and after communities adjust to the changes, the response has been positive, Waste Management representative Paul Daugereau told the Council.

Belton, Robinson, Harker Heights and Bellmead are among the communities served by Waste Management that have made the change.

"I had this service (the automated collection) in Carlsbad, New Mexico in 1981, and it worked great," said Mayor Gary Chumley.

Veteran honored with Purple Heart, Bronze Star presentation

FORT HOOD — III Armored Corps and U.S. Army Garrison Fort Hood leadership formally recognized a retired Soldier for his gallantry during the Vietnam War. Lt. Gen. Sean Bernabe, commanding general, III Armored Corps and Fort Hood, presented Staff Sgt. (Ret.) John Footman the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star for valor in a ceremony Jan. 11. Footman, a Vietnam War veteran, was presented his awards 33 years after his retirement from the Army. in his career. Footman was never formally presented his awards for his service and gallantry during combat. Upon hearing the story, Fort Hood leadership stepped in to change that.

The Bronze Star Medal with Valor was presented to Footman, for distinguishing himself by outstanding meritorious service in connection with ground operations against a hostile force on July 15, 1970, in the Republic of Vietnam. waited for longer than I thought." The ceremony was hosted by the Fort Hood Garrison commander, Col. Chad Foster. The awards were presented by the III Armored Corps commanding general, Lt. Gen. Sean Bernabe.

Footman is a native of Tallahassee, Florida. He was drafted into the Army in June 1967 as an infantryman and served as a cavalry scout throughout the remainder of his military career. Footman's assignments included serving in Germany, Vietnam and various U.S. assignments. He retired in July 1987 at Fort Benning, Georgia.

City approves tax note sale for financing future city hall site purchase

Gatesville City Council authorized issuing tax notes for the purchase of property at 803 and 805 East Main St. for a future city hall location during their Jan. 10 meeting.

The current city hall building was built in 1936, and in a memorandum to the Council, City Manager Bill Parry noted "normal maximum life of a facility is between 50 and 75 years. We are beginning to experience sub-system failures - plumbing, electrical, et cetera - and any renovations to the existing city hall would require we bring the building into compliance with current city codes." The Council authorized Parry to negotiate with Cadence Bank to purchase the properties for \$650,000 - the combined appraisal value for the properties.

Because there was not enough in the city's capital fund to make the purchase, the city will use tax notes to pay for the purchase. Ryan Cunningham with SAMCO Capital Markets said the city has already obtained a purchaser for the tax notes - Presidio Tax Exempt mutual fund.

"The markets have been pretty volatile in the past year or so, and we negotiated a rate for 3.73%," Cunningham said.

City Councilwoman Barbara Burrow asked about the city's option

to pay off the note early.

"It's the city's option if you have the cash available," Cunningham said.

Mayor Gary Chumley voiced his support for the measure.

"I believe this is the right step forward," he said.

and that is an economic driver." Miller said rising property values should also help offset costs.

"I'm in agreement with Mr. Weddle on making that change," Matthews said. "I'd like to buy down ahead of time."

Weddle said it made sense financially for the county.

"My good business sense tells me that you take any opportunity to reduce the cost up front," he said. "That reduces the payments per month and it reduces the interest. I don't believe funding broadband is a primary function of county government. The people I've talked to, broadband is not at the top of their list. Security and maintenance of transportation are two key areas for county government. We could look for specific grants for broadband."

Basham said he also favored reducing the tax burden by increasing the county's upfront funding to \$7 million.

"The more we can put down up front, the more we can save in the long-term," he said. Miller took issue with shifting priorities

from the budgeting process.

"Why do we have a budget? The county agreed ..." Miller said.

"We've agreed to budget amendments, too," Matthews said.

"We make budget amendments throughout the year," Weddle said. "Both of these allocations (construction funding and broadband) are in the same fund (category). I think the citizens of the county want us to get these projects done, and with the cost savings it is a better conversation with my constituents."

"I agree," Matthews said, "and according to our county attorney, it can be done."

Weddle said the strong need for jail expansion and a new justice center arguably rises to the level of an emergency.

"I think action by the court is imminent," he said. "It is almost an emergency. A, we are out of compliance at our county jail (because of overcrowding) and B, we have employees working in substandard conditions (which the Leon Street Annex would resolve). In my opinion, it's crunch time."

Multiple funding options were presented to the commissioners court by Vince Viaille with Specialized Public Finance, each of which has an estimated 4% interest rate.

He said the cost of funding the jail expansion only would be nearly \$4.9 million,

which would have a 2.2 cent tax impact over a seven-year period. The cost of funding construction of the Leon Street Annex would be just over \$8.7 million. The cost of both projects combined - with the \$7 million initial payment, is expected to have a tax impact of 2.9 cents over seven years. If only \$6 million had been paid up front, as Miller favored, the tax impact would have been 3.4 cents over seven years.

Following approval by the commissioners court, the plan will now go to the state Comptroller's Office and the Texas Attorney General's Office for approval.

Viaille said the item should come back to the commissioners court with a list of bidders on Feb. 14, and the closing date for the county to receive construction funds is anticipated on March 15.

GHS improves record to 21-3 before district competition

Gatesville used a 29-6 second quarter burst to offset a sluggish first quarter en route to a 58-39 win over Stephenville on Ian. 10.

Gatesville actually trailed 14-8 after one quarter and then did what they've done all season long to get back in games - they cranked up the defensive pressure allowing just 12 points over the second and third quarters.

Down 16-12 with 5:12 remaining in the second quarter the Hornets erupted for a 21-4 run to essentially put the game away by halftime.

West Allman hit a three to make it 16-15 then scored on a layup and was fouled. He connected on the free throw to give the Hornets an 180-16 lead – their first since a 2-0 lead to start the game.

Carter Williams scored in transition to provide the first double-digit lead of the night at 29-18 and another West Allman bucket and foul shot later made it 34-18. Banner All-

break.

West Allman scored all 11 of his points in the second quarter while Tyler Shea had nine points in the frame. Shea led all scorers with 17 points and added four rebounds and five steals.

The Hornets forced 13 turnovers over the second and third quarters alone and converted 59% of their field goal attempts over that stretch.

They pushed the lead up over twenty points in the third at 47-26 when Trae Miller connected with Shea on an alley-oop dunk. Miller threw the lob from almost 30 feet from the basket and Shea's sky-high finish elicited a significant amount of fanfare from the Stephenville students seated under the basket.

"I felt like I jumped out of the gym," Shea said.

Banner Allman finished with 13 points and 9 rebounds and Williams had 10 as four Hornets scored in double figures. Williams had five rebounds and Miller had five assists on the

The win gave the Hornets a 21-3 mark in non-district. Their 21 victories featured two tournament championships, a 17game win streak, and a perfect 4-0 record against opponents from former 6-4A opponents. They defeated Lampasas twice and Brownwood once before taking down the Yellow Jackets.

The Hornets began district play at home against Connally on Jan. 13 and begin the district slate just seven wins away from tying a school-record for wins in a season at 28. Gatesville entered the game with the highest scoring offense in the district at 71 points per game while the Cadets were allowing just 45 points per game.

Following the Connally game they will host Salado on Jan. 17 before hitting the road for their first district road contest against La Vega on Jan. 20.

Connally (17-4), China Spring (15-9), and La Vega (13-8) all finished non-district with winning records while Salado (7-17) and Robinson (6-15) enter with losing records. The Cadets are widely considered the district favorite.

The smallest Bladed Hazy Eye Slab, 3/8 ounce, in white with a stinger hook is a good default bait. A slow-smoking retrieve or a long, slow pull upward off
