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Jail overcrowding continues to loom large over county

Representatives of Coryell County, including Sheriff Scott Williams, are scheduled to meet with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards to discuss continuing problems with noncompliance due to having too many inmates at the facility.

That was the case as of Feb. 3, when the jail had 97 inmates in a facility that is supposed to house no more than

"We are still sitting at 97 after dropping off inmates" at state prison units, Williams told the Coryell County Commissioners Court. "We have a potential arrangement with Zapata County (located on the border with Mexico about six hours from Gatesville) that is pending. Milam County (located a little over an hour from Gatesville) hasn't taken any of our inmates in months, so we ought to revisit that contract."

Commissioner Scott Weddle asked what the process is for reducing the number of inmates at the jail in order to achieve compliance with state requirements.

"Every day we send emails out (to other jails asking if they have space available)." Williams said. "We send requests to each contractor asking if they have beds available. They look at the inmates' history, type of crime and medical condition. If we have a list of 15 inmates, they might take two. "A lot of places just won't take them. Contract places

don't want to deal with anyone that's a discipline problem. All that creates our overcrowding."

Weddle said the county has to work to try to send some of the inmates elsewhere to avoid overcrowding.

"We've got to send the ones that will stick (there) for a while the best we can," he said.

Inmates who are sentenced to prison often must wait the maximum number of days in the county jail -45 — before they are admitted to state prisons, which also aggravates the crowding situation for the county.

"The commissioner doesn't care if it takes 10 hours to get inmates (to another facility that will accept them — you've got to get them out no matter what."

Transporting the inmates great distances reduces the number of jailers available locally, creating additional con-

"Even with a four-hour commute one-way, it's an all-day affair (to relocate inmates)," Williams said.

"I sent emails to all other 253 counties in Texas (seeking

One of the shop's employees is Quenby Dixon, a Gatesville High School graduate.

"Our most popular items are the energy teas," Dixon said. "Energy bars are also popular. The banana nut bread shake is a top seller, and we also have a honey nut Cheerio shake."

Being able to offer healthy options that provide a boost of energy is something Jonasson said she enjoys.

"We are able to give people a shot of clean energy with caffeine and vitamins but without the sugar," she said. "People are able to get their vitamins — B1 through B12. It is all the yumminess without the guilt."

Spur Nutrition is open from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday.

"Our busiest time is probably 6 to 9 and then again closer to lunch," Jonasson said. "It's all pretty much about offering healthy options on the go."

She and Dixon, as well as the shop's three other employees, are also wellness coaches.

"We help people who are interested in weight loss, enjoying more nutritious things and those who are just interested in fitness in general," Jonasson said. "We specialize in working with those who want to lose weight



Positive lessons learned from her dog was the focus of Randi Wilde's recent presentation to the Gatesville Lions Club.

Wilde, who serves as First Vice District Governor for the Lions, said her dog Chili Bo, a dachshund, was a great teacher in

"I learned a lot from him," she said. "Not only was he a best friend, he was a powerful teacher, loving and generous."

One of the key lessons Chili Bo taught her was to live in the moment. While people are often preoccupied about what has happened in the past or what may happen in the future, she said her dog's attention was firmly rooted in what was happening at the time.

"It helped teach me to live for the moment

jail space for inmates). There are plenty of beds, just not enough staff."

Weddle asked if Coryell County might be able to address some of those staffing concerns.

"Crazy idea — what if we loaned them a jailer?" Weddle asked.

"We don't have the staff to do that," Williams said. "I think we're seven short right

Weddle said he thought

the jail commission would voice its displeasure with the continued overcrowding in the county.

"I imagine it's going to be a very uncomfortable meeting," he told the sheriff.

'You can't squeeze blood out of a turnip," Williams said, adding he is doing his best to address the chronic problem.

County Attorney Brandon Belt said the permit process is underway to expand the jail.

"That's going to make more hay than anything," Williams said.

Although jail expansion has been approved, construction will take at least most of the rest of 2023, if not longer, before the expansion is complete.

"Even though we fasttracked it, it's going to be November, December or January before the jail is expanded," Weddle said.

Belt said a May 1 groundbreaking for the expansion is possible.

"I hope they see these efforts as us busting our butts ... we're trying everything we can (to resolve overcrowding)."






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CHAMBER HOSTS RIBBON CUTTING CEREMONY



Texans add 28 football players

TEPHENVILLE — Last year, with an already young football team entering 2022, Tarleton State University went after veterans in the transfer portal and wanted just a few to complement the roster, announcing seven additions on National Signing Day. This year was a little different — multiplied by four.On Wednesday (Feb. 1), National Signing Day for the 2023 season, Tarleton announced the addition of 28 football players to its 2023 roster.

The Texans have added six defensive linemen, six offensive linemen, five linebackers, three defensive backs, three quarterbacks, two wide receivers, two tight ends and a running back. That's an even split of 14 defensive players and 14 on offense.

Several players have plenty of NCAA Division I experience from the likes of Mississippi State, Washington State, Florida State, and even fellow Western Athletic Conference foe Utah Tech. Of the 28 additions to the 2023 roster, 21 are transfers, with seven joining straight out of high school.

Mason Miller returning to TSU to be OC under head coach Whitten

STEPHENVILLE — Tarleton State University's football program has added a familiar face to the coaching staff — someone who has spent the last few years coaching in the Southeastern Conference. Mason Miller has been hired to be the Texans' offensive coordinator entering 2023, the team announced on Jan. 31.

Miller is returning to Stephenville and Tarleton, where he coached for three seasons from 2014-16. He was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach all three years, serving under head coach Todd Whitten in

Mississippi State University the last three seasons as the offensive line coach.

adding the title of run game coordinator for the Bulldogs last year.

"I think so much of Mason Miller, he's a first-class person who I've worked with in the past," Whitten said. "Our players really enjoyed his coaching style, and he has a knack for coaching, teaching and working with young

men. He's a really smart, creative football coach. He's recently at been with some of the best football minds out there, with Mike Leach and Hal Mumme and guys like that. He'll be good for our program and he'll be good for our players."

Miller has guided different offenses to among the best in the nation at every level. of NCAA football, including the best offense in the nation at Southeastern Louisiana (2004). He's also helped produce top-five offenses nationally at Tarleton, New Mexico State and McMurry.

Miller joined the late Mike Leach's staff upon his arrival to Mississippi State in 2020.

Over his final two years with the Bulldogs, Miller's offensive line ranked No. 2 in the SEC and No. 15 in the FBS in offensive line efficiency.

At Tarleton, Miller led his side to third nationally in total offense in 2014, averaging 522.8 yards per game, scoring 43.7 points per game. Exceptional offense continued in 2015, as the Texans averaged 38.1 points and 451.2 yards per contest.

"Our family is very excited about returning to Stephenville where we spent three wonderful years with friends and family," Miller said. "We are grateful for our time at Nevada, Washington State, as well as Mississippi

State. However, we are glad to be home."

Miller will inherit a successful offense from a season ago, a Texan group that led the WAC in yards per game (436.7) and rush yards per game (174.6), and was second in scoring average (31.0 PPG). Tarleton is also set to return 1,000-yard running back Derrel Kelley III, 1,000-yard wide receiver Darius Cooper, and 800yard wide receiver Jaden Smith.

Whitten, who engineered that offense, will hand over play-calling duties for the first time in his Tarleton tenure, in what will be his 14th season at the helm in

"I think it's time to turn this over to somebody else, and Mason Miller, to me, is the perfect guy to do that," Whitten said. "I'm going to step away from being the offensive coordinator and being the play caller. It will be the first time that I've ever done this, so it will be an adjustment for me but I think it's the best thing for our team and best thing for our offense."

Miller began his full-time collegiate coaching career in 2000, and has since been a part of eight collegiate programs across 21 seasons.

Texans hold off Utah Tech comeback, stay perfect on home court

Both teams had a slow start to the second half. After three minutes, the Trailblazers had the only two points of

Tarleton and Utah Tech traded buckets back and forth as the Trailblazers gradually cut away at the Texans' lead. With 12 minutes left in the game, the Trailblazers reduced their deficit to 10 points.

The Texans built their lead back up to 12 points with three minutes remaining. The second half comeback attempt by Utah Tech fell short, and the Texans continued their home winning streak with the two-point victory.

The Texans were led in scoring by Lue Williams, the Fireside District Player of the Game, with 25 points, six rebounds and four steals. Garry Clark earned 13 points coming off the bench and had five rebounds to boot. Javontae Hopkins scored eight points and Shakur Daniel had seven points with four assists.

Freddy Hicks picked up seven points (3-4 FG) and four assists. KiAndre Gaddy scored six points and grabbed a team-high seven rebounds on the game. Tiger Booker came off the bench in the second half to record six points

KNCT celebrates Black History

KNCT-FM, public radio for Central Texas housed on the campus of Central Texas College (CTC) will celebrate Black History Month with a series of shows.

On Wednesday, Feb. 8 at 7 p.m. is baritone Robert Sims, the gold medal winner of the American Traditions Competition in 1999. He is also noted for giving the first all spiritual and folk song recital at Carnegie Hall in 2005. On Sunday, Feb.12 at 8 p.m., "Music and the Spoken Word" features Alex Boyé. Known for his dynamic African-infused songs, Boyé was named YouTube's Cover Artist of the Year in 2014 and the 2017 Rising Artist of the Year in a music contest sponsored by Pepsi and Hard Rock Café.

"The Big Band Sunday" program offers an amazing lineup of artists on Feb. 12. At 12 p.m. is Ella Fitzgerald. Count Basie is at 1 p.m. followed by Billie Holiday at 2 p.m., Louis Armstrong at 3 p.m., Sarah Vaughn at 4 p.m. and concludes at 5 p.m. with the Mills Brothers.

On Monday, Feb. 13 at 7 p.m., "Like it Is" offers a two-part discussion opening with "Crossing Bridges" which discusses the effects of poverty, racism and violence in Birmingham, Alabama with civil rights leader Dr. Abraham Lincoln Woods. He helped coordinate the 1963 March on Washington and stood behind Martin Luther King Jr. during his historic "I Have a Dream" speech. The second discussion fea-

tures a conversation with Larry Gossett, the last surviving member of the "Gang of Four." He along with local activists Roberto Maestas, Bob Santos and Bernie Whitebear joined together to give voice to Seattle's minority communities as marches, boycotts and civil unrest began across the state of Washington.

Black History Month programming continues Feb. 15 at 7 p.m. on "Music and the Spoken Word" with "Heart and Soul" featuring a Martin Luther King, Jr. special with the Tabernacle Choir, Orchestra and Bells at Temple Square and special guest Alyson Cambridge – one of the world's leading opera and stage concert performers. On Sunday, Feb. 19 at 7 p.m., "Music and the Spoken Word" presents "Messenger of Peace - Tribute to Nelson Mandela."

"Right Man for the Time - A Tribute to Jackie Robinson" is the subject of "Music and the Spoken Word" on Wednesday, Feb. 22 at 7 p.m. On Sunday, Feb. 26, "Music and the Spoken Word" concludes its Black History Month tribute with "Building Our Roots" at 7 p.m.

On Tuesday, Feb. 28 at 7 p.m. is the award-winning "Still Going On" – a four-part, hour-long documentary saluting William Grant Still and other African-American composers. Still, often referred to as the "Dean" of African-American composers, composed more than 150 works including five

symphonies and eight operas.

In addition to these shows, regularly scheduled weekly shows on KNCT-FM – "The Softer Side with Carl Rossi" (Fridays at 5 p.m.) and "Voice of Texas Veterans with Julia Conner" (Sundays at 3:30 p.m.) will also feature special episodes during Black History Month.

Earlier in the month, KNCT started the Black History Month series with the award-winning documentary "A Portrait of William Warfield." The hour-long profile includes the 80-year old Warfield candidly discussing the impact his life and career in music and theater have had on contemporary American society.

Acclaimed as one of the great vocal artists of our time, Warfield is known worldwide for his work as a soloist, recitalist, actor, narrator and activist and is a Grammy Awardwinner in the "spoken word" category for his narration of Aaron Copland's "A Lincoln Portrait" accompanied by the Eastman Philharmonic Orchestra. Two of his most famous and memorable roles were the lead character in George Gershwin's opera "Porgy and Bess" and his performance in 1957 and 59 on NBC-TV's Hallmark Hall of Fame production of Marc Connelly's "The Green Pastures" in the starring role of De Lawd. The documentary aired Feb. 1 at 7 p.m.



Hornets clinch playoff spot with win over Eagles

of another playoff berth.

A bounce-back road win capped an eventful week of basketball for the Gatesville Hornets that culminated with the clinching

The freezing weather that blew through Central Texas forced the Hornets to endure three days of school cancellations and two game postponements before finally getting back on the court and suffering a near-miss double overtime 68-65 road loss to Connally Feb. 2. The following night, they traveled to Salado and took down the Eagles 59-45 to wrap up a postseason spot for the second

straight season. "It's huge first off to clinch - especially in this district. It's like the Big 12 of high school in that you better show up and play every night. So clinching is huge," head coach Brit Campbell said. "And it's a big deal for the program. We've gone back-to-

back now in two different districts." Last season the Hornets clinched their playoff spot in District 6-4A with a win on the last day of the season. This season, they have three games remaining to improve their potential playoff seed.

The Hornets currently sit in second place in the district standings with three games to play. Should they win out they would finish 8-2 and as the district runners up. In the event that they were to lose their remaining games and end up in a tie with Salado for the fourth and final spot, the Hornets would hold the tie-breaker by virtue of their two head-to-head wins over the Eagles.

Against Connally, the "Heart Stopper Hornets" were on full display. They led 12-11 after one quarter but eventually found themselves down 44-32 late in the third quarter before flipping the switch and almost pulled off their fourth come-from-behind win of district play.

Their run began with a three-point play from West Allman just before the end of the period that made it 44-35 in favor of the Cadets. Gatesville scored the first four points of the fourth to cut the deficit to 44-39 before a quick 5-2 run pushed the Cadet lead to 49-41 with four minutes to play. From there, the Hornets finished regulation on a 12-4 run to send the game to overtime.


After Connally's Jylon Nobles made a pair of free throws to give Connally a 53-50 lead, the Hornets ran a play to get West Allman a look at a game-tying three pointer. Allman's contested attempt bounced off the rim and appeared to be headed out-of-bounds but Rayshon Smith gathered the long rebound, set his feet, and buried a three-pointer from

the right corner just before the buzzer to tie the game at 53-53 and send the game to overtime.

In the first overtime period, Gatesville scored the first five points and took a 58-53 lead but Connally charged back and sent the game to second overtime tied at 60-60 thanks to a runner from Nobles in the closing seconds.

Gatesville took their last lead at 65-64 on a corner three from West Allman but that was quickly countered by another bucket for Nobles and a 66-65 Connally lead. The Hornets would not score again and the Cadets would hit a pair of free throws late for the final 68-65 win.

"We continue to show that we can show up and play with anybody. It gave our guys one more affirmation that that is true," Campbell said.

Banner Allman led all scorers against Connally with 21 points and also pulled down seven rebounds. Tyler Shea had 18 points, 6 rebounds, and five assists. Smith finished with 9 points and grabbed seven rebounds.

Following such a tough loss, Campbell knew that the possibility of an emotional letdown against Salado - especially considering the Eagles fell victim to an historic comeback in the two teams' first meeting. But that was quickly to rest in the locker room at Connally.

"I had a good feeling after talking to them (after the game). It seemed like they were alert and ready and re-focused," he said.

Campbell said his confidence grew during the school day and in the lead up to tip-off

"It was very relaxed - which I have come to find out with this group is a good thing. You could tell that they were ready and confident," he said.

Salado led 15-13 after the first quarter thanks to ten quick points from Noah Self. Gatesville stayed close thanks to seven firstquarter points from Carter Williams.

In the second quarter, the Hornets were sparked by West Allman on the offensive end and Trae Miller on the defensive side of the ball.

Allman scored all ten of his points in the quarter while Miller guided a Hornet defense that allowed just four Salado points in the period. The Eagles shot 0 for 8 from the three-point line in the first half and made just 3 of 18 in the game. In their prior meeting, the Eagles made 11 of 25 from beyond

Campbell said that his team didn't change anything schematically, they just changed

"I thought they would shoot more but part of it was that we did a better job defensively

not letting them have those open looks," he said. "We just kind of elevated the stuff we were doing and were more aggressive and once we got going we just played with mo-

The momentum carried over into the third quarter as the Hornets extended their lead to as large as 52-28 late in the period. After a relatively quiet first half, the third quarter belonged to Shea and Banner Allman as the duo combined to score 21 points on 10 of 12 shooting in the frame.

Banner Allman led all scorers with 18 points and had five rebounds. Through seven games of district play, the senior guard leads District 23-4A in scoring at 19.7 points per game. Shea had 18 points while Carter Williams finished with ten points, six rebounds, and four assists.

The Hornets hosted La Vega on Feb. 7 then welcome Robinson on Friday for senior night. Wins against the Pirates and Rockets would secure second place in the district standings - something that's less of a concern to Campbell than continuing to improve.

"We kind of got into a little slump but we got ourselves out of it. There are still little things to improve on but I think we are in a really good place right now."
