Brad Hunt welcomed to Gatesville community

Although he has been on the job since Feb. 3, new Gatesville Police Chief Brad Hunt was sworn in during a ceremony on Feb. 14 with his family attending. Hunt's wife, Courtney, pinned her husband's badge to his uniform.

"I appreciate y'all," Hunt told city staff and Gatesville City Council members. "It's an honor to be here today. There are lots of good people working for the city of Gatesville and I am thankful to be working with them."

Hunt said he has a 90-day plan for his first three months in

"The first 30 days is mainly to listen, days 30 to 60 are to participate and starting at 90 it's time to get things done," he said. "I am fortunate to come into a situation where there are people who are capable and dedicated."

City Manager Bill Parry said he is pleased to have Hunt lead the department.

"Don't be afraid to take the department to the next level," he said. We're excited about the opportunity to build things here."

Hunt was previously police chief in Keene, Texas, where he served from April 2020 to January 2023. Keene is a community of about 6,500 in Johnson County.

Before that he worked for the Temple Police Department for 25 years, where he was division commander over special operations. His role involved helping to coordinate community police relations, traffic control, the school resource officer program, investigation of violent crimes, helping oversee Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) operations, hostage negotiations, honor guard and public information.

Hunt has worked closely with Texas police departments in helping them to identify the 168-170 standards that must be met during the Texas Police Chiefs Association's accreditation process. He has helped other departments obtain this designation, and said he hopes to be able to do that as chief in Gatesville.

He said one of his priorities will be working closely with other area law enforcement agencies, along with building on the strong foundation of law enforcement in place at Gatesville, where Nathan Gohlke served as chief for 17 years.

County funds construction with tax note

The Coryell County Commissioners Court approved a seven-year tax note on Feb. 14 that will pay for the construction of a new justice center and also for the expansion of the Coryell County Jail.

The county will receive \$6.7 million in funds on March 15 to go along with an additional \$7 million already set aside for the county in order to complete the projects.

Paul Jason with Specialized Public Finance said notices were sent to 50-60 banks nationwide, starting with local banks, asking about their terms for the seven-year loan.

"Webster Bank out of Connecticut had the best rate at 3.6% (interest), Jason said. "The call date is Feb. 15, 2026, so you wouldn't be able to pay it off before that. There was a Houston bank that offered a higher rate, but with that you would be able to pay it off at any time."

Jason said Specialized Public Finance recommends the county select the bank with the lowest bid, adding that it would save the county \$51,000 over the seven-year term of the loan.

The first payment of the loan is scheduled for Feb. 15, 2024, with the last scheduled payment to be made on Feb. 15, 2030.

"I'm happy with the rate we got," Jason said. "The rates were at about 4% and have come down, so I'm extremely happy with that.'

The commissioners' court unanimously voted to authorize Specialized Public Finance to proceed with Webster Bank on the tax note series.

County details demolition, building plan

With demolition of the old Coryell County jail — which currently houses justices of the peace, constables and their staff — scheduled for this spring, plans are being made to vacate the

County Commissioner Scott Weddle provided a timeline to the Coryell County Commissioners Court on Feb. 14, and said officials have been notified to remove sensitive materials (official documents) from the building.

Requests for bids for the demolition are scheduled to be posted, and an onsite review of the property is scheduled for March 2.

The demolition of the old jail will not only result in building a new facility (the justice center, or Leon Street annex) for the staff working there, but will also allow for the expansion of the current Coryell County Jail.

On April 4, construction firm Butler-Cohen is scheduled to submit a price to the county, and the guaranteed maximum price is scheduled to be finalized on April 11.

"There are topics we'll have to adeventually," Weddle said.

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Focusing on fitness, writing & adventure after 60

As an author, fitness trainer and senior athlete, John Clark has had some interesting experiences many of which did not occur until after he reached the age of 60.

Clark, who lives in Kempner and is a member of one of Copperas Cove's three Exchange Clubs, shared his story of going from being apprehensive about aging to finally embracing the opportunities and embarking on new adventures. He talked to the Gatesville Exchange Club about his experiences on Feb. 9.

For much of his life, Clark worked as a reporter, including 13 years spent at the Temple Daily Telegram, before writing books. He has since written "about 20 books" on a variety of topics, including "Finally Fit," about his experience of becoming a pole vaulter for the first time at the age of 60, and competing in the National Senior Games.

Asked about his favorite book, Clark said it is probably "Camino: Laughter and Tears along Spain's 500-mile Camino De Santiago."

"That was life-changing," Clark said of his walking journey on the famous trail in Spain which takes people on a 500-mile pilgrimage to the shrine of the apostle St. James in northwestern Spain.

Clark said as a newspaper reporter, he learned that if he had a question about something, "probably somebody else has the same question.'

One book he wrote was about seeking answers, finding out about people's spiritual beliefs and why they had those beliefs.

"I was on a spiritual journey, so

I drove around Texas would go up to people randomly and ask them questions (about their faith)," Clark said. "My first stop was in San Saba. I asked

a man what he believed and why, and traveled around the country asking the same questions, about what people believe in and how they came to believe it."

Clark said he was partly inspired to write about those questions of faith by the loss of a loved one.

"My mother died in 2000, and that affected me in a lot of ways that I didn't understand at the time," he said. "I became disenchanted with life, so I decided to be a teacher."

Clark said he enjoyed the first three or four years, and then changed school districts to a job situation that proved to be difficult and frustrating for him.

"I did it for 18 years, although I didn't like it for most of the time. I started teaching at 45 and thought it was too late to change to something different then. I felt like I couldn't jump ship at that point."

As he grew older, Clark said that began to weigh on his mind.

"The summer before I turned 60 — in August — that really freaked me out," he said. "It really got to me. I was miserable with my job. I let myself go physically and would come home and drink to try to forget about the day and then go to bed. I was 50 pounds heavier then,

and I was miserable."

While viewing Facebook one day, Clark said he saw posts by a childhood friend, Bubba Sparks, whom he had grown up with in Houston. Those posts focused on Sparks' experiences as a senior athlete.

"He talked about winning a gold medal in master's pole vaulting at age 64," Clark said. "USA Track and Field has a masters division that starts at age 35 and goes up from there. One guy is 84 and he is still pole vaulting and getting world records — it's great. I decided I wanted to try pole vaulting."

Although he had been involved in athletics in junior high, Clark said he had quit his involvement in sports when he was in high school and "that had always been one of my huge regrets in life.'

Clark reached out to Sparks and asked if he could also start pole vaulting. "With Sparks' encouragement, I ended up doing it," Clark said. "On Sunday mornings I would practice pole vaulting for a year. The first six months was kind of a mess. I hurt myself. I pulled every muscle from the waist down at least once."

The training regimen encouraged Clark to work on becoming

"I told my wife there probably weren't a lot of drunken, fat pole vaulters, so after six months, I started working at it and got myself into shape," he said. "I started entering competitions. The first was the Senior Games and it was a disaster. He said he performed poorly on his first attempt, but the second was better. From there, things continued to improve."

Clark has since won five medals

for pole vaulting.

"I've enjoyed working with good coaches," he said. "No matter how bad a practice is, they'll find at least one thing you did right. My record is (8 feet, 6 inches) and I'm not happy with that. But once you reach the 8-foot level you start winning something. Last year, I was 17th in the country and 46th in the world, or something."

People have told him that what he has done is inspiring, which led him into another line of work.

"I decided to become a personal trainer — especially for seniors," Clark said. "The shape I was in, I was depressed and out of shape. I didn't care because I was depressed, I just wanted to get it (life) over with. I want to spread the message that it doesn't have to be that way.

"I now specialize in senior fitness training and have done that for about three years," Clark said. He works with people at a gym in Copperas Cove or in people's homes.

One of his clients is in his 80s and in a wheelchair but works to improve his fitness level.

"He inspires me because he works hard," Clark said. "I saw my dad get into a wheelchair and refuse to exercise, and he never got

After he retired from teaching, Clark began writing for the Killeen, Copperas Cove and Fort Hood newspapers. He wrote profiles on military veterans and their spouses, which led to another book.

His walk on the Camino De Santiago is among his most memorable experiences, Clark said.

"For some people it's a religious

pilgrimage, but for me it was mostly for adventure," he said. "At first I was terrified because I'd never been out of the country. We would walk all day and stay at hostels (inexpensive accommodations that often feature dormitory-style ame-

"I was scared when my wife took me to the airport (to fly to Spain), and I thought, come on, you're not going to prison."

Clark said he was still apprehensive about the journey when he arrived, so he looked up the cost of an airplane ticket home before beginning the walk. "It was like \$2,500 bucks, so I said, 'I'm not doing that."

Those walking on the trail carry backpacks with them, and the advice is to travel light. Clark said he had to learn the hard way to do

"The backpack is supposed to be no more than 10% of your body weight, but starting out, mine was like 50 pounds, because I thought I needed all that stuff," Clark said. "The first day, I went eight miles and thought I was dying.

Whether to remove the AC units or replace them (is one issue). One is original to the jail so it's about 30 years old.'

The location where those displaced by the demolition and construction will be moved temporarily remains to be finalized.

"I should have something to present to the court by the next meeting that I believe will be a suitable option," said County Judge Roger Miller.

Weddle and Commissioner Ryan Basham visited the old jail on Feb. 7 and looked at electronic devices, Weddle said. "We need to come up with an action plan to dispose of that property. My recommendation is that we do it as a lot and get a certificate of destruction. It's a massive amount of stuff that's been set aside, mainly obsolete elec-

Miller said the county is still awaiting plat

approval from the city of Gatesville before work can begin.

"Regarding items in the old jail (that will be retained), is there any notice they'll need assistance with the storage of that?" Miller

"We have a container the county owns that will work for it," said Commissioner Kyle Matthews. "It's currently being used for courthouse records so there's adequate space."

He said officials will tag materials with a label to determine whether the items need to be kept or disposed of.

"There's a lot of boxes - a lot of trash, actually," Weddle said.

Basham said that is because there are "30-something years" of materials being stored at the old jail. That won't be the case for long, however.

"Anything in the building as of March 15 is deemed disposable so we can get it cleared out and ready for demo," Weddle said.

Area Fishing Report

Lake Belton

GOOD. Water lightly stained; 52 degrees; 13.79 feet below pool. The water temperature roller coaster continues. Fish are both tight to the bottom on breaklines in distinct schools, as well as, parallel to and just off of the main river channel in very large, slowly moving, suspended schools. The fish on bottom were temperamental, typically responding well as soon as our presentations arrived at bottom, then losing interest quickly. Catfishing is excellent. Drifting old river channels that are 20-35 feet deep using fresh cut bait has produced great numbers of eating size as well as trophy blue catfish. Flatheads have been caught near shorelines with timber on live bait. Crappie are fair most fish are in 18-35 feet of water using hand ties and plastics. Fish still haven't made the push to the shallows.

Gatesville to face Georgetown Gateway Academy in bi-district playoff game

The Gatesville Hornets basketball team wrapped their regular season on Tuesday with a 55-39 loss at China Spring and now turn their attention to winning their first playoff game in a decade.

The Hornets - the No. 3 seed out of District 23-4A - will face the Georgetown Gateway Gators in the bi-district playoffs on Feb. 21 at Temple High School. The Gators finished as tri-champs in District 24-4A with Marble Falls and Lampasas but enter the postseason as the No. 2 seed by virtue of tie-breaker.

Gatesville will try to take advantage of a full week between games as they looked tired and sluggish in the loss to China Spring. After leading 14-12 after one quarter, the Hornets managed just 25 points the rest of the game.

The Cougars outscored Gatesville 30-14 over the second and third quarters - a stretch the Hornets usually dominate. Coming into the game they outscored opponents



by an average of ten points over the second

and third quarters this season. Tyler Shea scored a game-high 25 points and pulled down a team-leading eight rebounds in the loss. Banner Allman, Rayshon Smith, and Trae Miller each had four points while West Allman scored two.

The loss also prevents the Hornets from tying the school-record for wins in a season at 28. It was previously believed that the record for regular season wins in a season was 27 and that the Hornets had tied that record with their win over Robinson.

But it was later discovered that the 2007-08 boys basketball team won 28 regular season games but lost their only playoff game in the area round. A win over Gateway would officially tie the record for wins in a

The Hornets' last playoff victory came in February of 2013. They beat Glen Rose 35-33 in the bi-district round of the 3A state playoffs before falling 62-48 to Kennedale in the area round. The Hornets did not appear in the postseason again until 2022 where they lost 67-41 to eventual state-finalist Wichita Falls Hirshi in the bi-district round.

Gateway will be looking to snap a drought

of their own as they have not won a playoff game since the school opened in 2009 though they have made the postseason five times in their school's history. They made their first postseason appearance in the in the 1A playoffs in 2012 then had three straight appearances in the 3A playoffs from 2018-2020. In 2021 the lost in the first round of the 4A playoffs.

Gateway is in their third season of 4A competition and finished the regular season with a record of 16-18 and 6-4 in district play. The Gators average just under 52.8 points per game and allow an average of 52.7 points per contest. The Hornets have scored 69.6 points per game this season while allowing 53.9.

This season they have shared four opponents with Gatesville: La Vega, Salado, Jarrell, and Lampasas. The Gators went 4-2 in games against those opponents while the Hornets went 5-1 with their one loss being a 64-62 loss to La Vega.
