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Parry reflects on city highlights

After originally being told by some people that he wouldn't be able to become a city manager, Bill Parry is on the verge of retiring after eight years of service as Gatesville's city manager.

His tenure in office includes helping the city navigate through a time of greater focus on improving infrastructure such as streets and water/sewer lines, and also a commitment to building and retaining outstanding city staff. Parry is officially retiring on Feb. 28, but will stay in Gatesville as a consultant until a new city manager can fill his post.

Parry said he initially found resistance to the idea that he could be a city man-

"When I was getting ready to retire from the Army, I was garrison commander at Fort Hood, which is as close to a city manager as you can get," Parry said. He said he asked around about how to make the transition to city manager from the Army.

"Back then, in 2004, cities usually hired city managers from within the organization," Parry said. "I was told at the age of 48 that I was too old to be a city manager because you had to work your way up through the ranks."

Parry instead took a job as executive director of the Heart of Texas Defense Alliance, a regional organization that works to promote the importance and sustainability of Fort Hood and the defense industry in Central Texas.

"One evening at a farewell dinner at Fort Hood, I was sitting across the table from David Byrom, who was Gatesville's mayor at the time. He mentioned they were looking for a city manager and he thought I'd be a good fit. I was offered the job in October 2014 with a start date of May 2015.

"It was already something I was interested in, I just wasn't sure exactly how to get into it. David Byrom broke down a lot of those roadblocks."

Although there was a learning curve, Parry's experiences as garrison commander helped him build a foundation toward a smooth transition.

"Some components of the job weren't hard at all to understand, and some required me to really dig in," he said. "I knew how to do a budget for a large organization but in the Army you're appropriated money by Congress, with some restrictions on how it is spent. With a city, you don't get an appropriation of money from the state in Texas. So you've got to see what the tax rate and water and sewer rates need to be to effectively serve the community.

"I needed to dive deep into Texas statutes for cities. Basically we're allowed to do anything that isn't prohibited by the Constitution. I had to go through the city ordinances to make sure they were up to date and conformed to local government

Parry said he has enjoyed "building a team and getting them focused on the objective of providing the best services we can to the community.'

When Parry interviewed for the job, he said it was "clearly obvious that the city wanted a comprehensive plan for the future." The city was able to complete that

"That's usually a very expensive effort, but we were able to complete the task at no cost," he said. "This is something that will influence the direction of the community for the next 20 years."

Repairing and replacing outdated and suboptimal infrastructure has been one of the city's biggest challenges, a task that Parry, the City Council and other city staff members have worked hard to address, he said.

"Many of the water and sewer lines in the city are old — everything has a useful life and you've got to know what it is and decide what to do about that.'

He said much of the work needed to resolve that concern has been put off, which has only delayed efforts and increased the cost of making needed repairs and replacing old infrastructure. Although it will take an extended amount of time, Parry said the city is focused on addressing those issues.

"The biggest challenge we're attempting to address is finding the right balance between funding what needs to be done and also keeping (water, sewer and

tax rates) as low as possible," he said.

Improving the condition of streets is another priority, and this is best done in conjunction with replacing old water and sewer lines beneath those streets, Parry said.

"We have a list of streets where the road needs to be replaced and also areas to focus on preventive maintenance," he said. "A lot of these roads weren't put in well, which may have been the standard at the time.'

Parry said the cost of redoing a 32-footwide street with two inches of asphalt is about \$8 per square yard, so replacing a mile of road would cost about \$150,000. In instances where roads can be repaired, rather than replaced, the cost for the same area would be about \$26,000.

Considering the poor quality of many Gatesville streets, Parry said there are about 60 miles of road that need to be replaced. The total cost would be about \$9 million.

"At our current rate, we bring in about \$2 million a year in taxes," Parry said.

City selects finalists for manager post

The Gatesville City Council selected four finalists for the city manager position during a special meeting on Feb. 21.

The names of the candidates could not be disclosed until each of them had an opportunity to communicate with their current employers.

"All are active city managers," said Gatesville Mayor Gary Chumley. He added that pending background checks, the city has to have each of the finalists attend a meet and greet session for the community sometime in the next two to three weeks.

The Gatesville City Council had narrowed the list of candidates from 31 to seven semifinalists earlier this month.

A recruiting brochure developed by the city in partnership with Strategic Government Resources included detailed information about the community. The brochure also listed details about expectations for the new city manager. These include:

· Providing, creating and executing strategic city planning and collaborative teamwork for internal and external customers for various regular and special projects.

Analyzing and approving financial transactions ensuring adherence to state, federal and personnel laws, policies and

· Acting as city ambassador for private and public media events and providing conflict resolution by resolving issues and answering questions when the arise.

·Receiving inquiries, complaints and service requests for information from elected officials and resolving them within the framework of established policies and pro-

· Preparing federal and state grant applications in compliance with organizational and municipal rules and regulations.

Opportunities and challenges were listed

- · Fiscal sustainability, striving for continuity and constancy in department-level budgeting.
 - Capital improvements planning
 - · Economic development
- · Fee and rate assessments for city ser-

· Employee recruitment and retention

Organizational growth, including the possibility of new hires in the areas of information technology, a staff engineer/ pubic works director and a public information officer. It was noted the city manager currently oversees 13 departments.

Candidates are required to have a bachelor's degree in public administration or a related field, with a master's degree preferred. At least five years of successful experience in government administration was listed, along with a preference for 10 years or more of progressively responsible experience in city management.

Starting salary for the position was listed at \$130,000 to \$150,000, depending on experience and qualifications, along with insurance benefits, paid time off, a car allowance and cell phone, and free membership at the city's fitness center. Gatesville also participates in the Texas Municipal Retirement System with a 7% employee contribution and a 2-1 employer match.

County leaders present plan on jail overcrowding issue

While Coryell County continues to scramble to meet state mandates related to jail overcrowding, no additional actions were taken against the county by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards.

Coryell County Judge Roger Miller and Sheriff Scott Wil-

liams both appeared before the commission earlier this month to update officials on the steps being taken to resolve local jail overcrowding issues.

"Overall, I think it was a good meeting," Miller said. "A win was that the jail commission did not escalate actions they had previously taken. The focus was on continued enforcement of remedial orders.

One negative was that the executive director of the commission, Brandon Wood, appears to be losing patience with the amount of time it is taking for the county to resolve

That amount funds all of the city's expenses, apart from grants.

There are honestly streets that can't be salvaged," he said. "So we look at the capital plan to see what water lines will be replaced in the next five years, and which streets can be done. There is a balance and a tradeoff."

Parry said he is retiring now because he had a long-term plan to retire at age 68, and he believes he is leaving Gatesville at a time when progress is being made to improve the

"I look at what accomplishments have been made to improve the quality of life in Gatesville, and we're on the right track," he said. "I am proud of the employees. They are a great team and dedicated public servants. They are experts in the areas of specialization, and I listen to them. It's been up to me to provide them with the resources they need. We are as close as we've ever been to

getting them the resources they need. "I am proud of the City Council. There have been some tough arguments over the years but they generally give us the resources we need and are dedicated to doing their best for the community.

Parry said the Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates city managers stay on the job in

one location for an average of two years. "I like to say I beat the odds - beat the av-

erage," he said. What's next on his agenda?

"I am the guardian and conservator for my mother, who is in her 90s in Missouri, and

it's hard to do that from 1,000 miles away," Parry said. "We wanted to get closer to family (in North Texas) so we can get help when we need it and it's not a burden to them. We are close enough to grandkids so I can watch them play sports more than once a season.

"We are also close to a major airport so we an travel if the mood strikes us

A lifetime of service will continue for Parry and his wife, Stacye, in some form or fashion.

"It's important for us to volunteer for benevolent efforts," he said. "My wife has been involved in prison ministry since we've been here, and we'd like to do some volunteer work together.

"We'll be five minutes from the University of North Texas and they have a masters in public administration program. I've always envisioned one day maybe being a history teacher at a community college. I'm not going to sit around and watch soap operas.

"I'd like to continue to give back to the community and grow old gracefully."

the concerns, Miller and Williams said.

"Mr. Wood seemed much less receptive (to county input) than he did at the November meeting," Miller said.

Coryell County is planning to expand the current jail, with groundbreaking scheduled for later this spring. The jail's capacity could potentially be increased by early 2024.

"They have received plans for the jail expansion, and still have concerns regarding medium security (inmates), which is the biggest concern for overcrowding,' Miller said.

Sheriff Williams said other concerns voiced by the commission have already been resolved.

"The other issues they brought up were rectified 18 months or two years ago," he said. "Mr. Wood seems to be at the end of his rope, but the other committee members seemed to be receptive to what we're doing. We've tried everything in the world to pacify him.'

The next meeting in which Williams and Miller are scheduled to appear before the commission will be in

"It's an eye-opening experience with some of the concerns people bring up statewide," Miller said.

One source of relief that the county is working to finalize is an agreement to house some of the county's jail inmates in Johnson County to reduce overcrowding.

"They sent us a template and their sheriff seems to think they can handle up to 30 of our inmates," Williams said. "We're at the mercy of their court and trying to cater to their needs. Their going rate is \$120 a day (per inmate). There is a premium on feeding them and caring for them.'

Commissioner Kyle Matthews said it was important to reach an arrangement with Johnson County. "I don't want to lose the opportunity," he said.

"Oh absolutely," Williams said. "We're working on a deal right now for at least 30 beds for males with the possibility of additional space for females. There's possibly an additional deal to house our inmates awaiting transfer to a (Texas Department of Criminal Justice state prison) facility.

"Johnson County would be a spectacular drive compared to the distances we're having to go right now."

Gatesville is about an hour and a half from Cleburne, where the Johnson County Jail is located.







YA-YA's SHRIMP AND **GRITS**

Shrimp 2 T. Louisiana style Cajun seasoning 1 ½ lbs. large shrimp, peeled and deveined

1 T. paprika

2 T. salted butter 1 T. dried Italian seasoning 1 T. minced garlic

Freshly ground black pep-

Prepare shrimp: in a small bowl, combine Cajun seasoning, paprika, Italian seasoning, and a pinch of pepper. Add shrimp and toss until combined. Set aside. Cook shrimp: Melt butter in a large skillet. Add garlic and cook approximately 30 seconds. Add shrimp and cook until opaque, 1 ½ minutes per side. Transfer shrimp to a medium bowl and set aside.

Grits 2.04 oz. chicken bullion cubes

T. tomato paste 2 T. salted butter

34 c. heavy whipping cream

1 c. quick cooking

white grits

3 ½ oz. extra-sharp cheddar cheese, shredded Prepare grits: Fill a me-

dium saucepan with 2 cups of water. Add bullion cubes and butter and bring to a boil. While whisking, gradually add grits. Cook, whisking often, about 5 minutes. Stir in tomato paste, cream, and cheese. Continue cooking, whisking until creamy, 2 to 3 more minutes. Set aside.

Sauce 3 T. all-purpose flour 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

1 c. low sodium chicken stock ½ tsp. hot sauce

½ c. heavy cream Prepare sauce: Stir flour

into remaining butter in skillet that shrimp were cooked in. Cook, stirring occasionally until thickened and mediumtan color, 5 to 10 minutes. Whish in chicken stock and cream. Let cook, whisking constantly 2 minutes. Whisk in Worcestershire sauce and hot sauce. Set aside. Heat a medium skillet over medium heat. Add ham and cook, turning once, until browned. Transfer ham to a cutting board and cut into ½ to ¼ inch pieces.

To serve, divide grits evenly among six plates. Top with shrimp and drizzle with sauce. Serve garnished with ham.

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Hornets top Gators in playoffs, 62-47

For the first time in 10 years, Gatesville will add a gold basketball to the trophy case. Behind 26 points from Tyler Shea, 14 points from Banner Allman, and an inspired all-around performance from Rayshon Smith, the Hornets took down Georgetown Gateway Prep 62-47 in Temple on Tuesday for their first playoff win since February of 2013. They will now move on to the area round to face Houston Washington, the

state's No. 3 ranked 4A team. "I am just so extremely proud of these guys and the fact that we are bi-district champs," head coach Brit Campbell said.

The Hornets led for almost the entirety of the game but were not able to pull away until the second half.

A slow start found the Hornets down 6-2 and 8-5 in the first quarter before they found their footing. Campbell noted that the environment may have contributed to the uneven start.

"We were excited and the atmosphere was definitely elevated and we let that get us a little bit to speed up early on," Campbell

A putback from Shea cut the Gator lead to 8-7. Smith then ripped off seven straight points to give the Hornets a lead they would not surrender. The junior guard scored on a layup, drew a charge on Gateway's Asher Eddins, converted a three-point play, then capped the run with another layup to make it 14-8.

Banner Allman opened the game with a layup but Smith and Shea scored the Hornets remaining 12 points of the quarter.

"I thought those two stepped up and had a great game for sure. Tyler had a good inside presence on both ends, and I thought Rayshon was aggressive on offense," Campbell said. "He also had some huge stops with the charges he took. Both guys had some plays that got us going and gave us some positive momentum.'

In the second quarter, the Gators cut the lead to 14-12 but 12-2 run - capped by layups from Carter Williams and from Shea -



gave Gatesville their biggest lead of the first half at 26-14.

Six straight points from Gator guard Gavin Ndubisi made it 26-20 but a West Allman three-pointer stopped the bleeding and pushed the lead back to 29-20. The Hornets led 31-24 at halftime.

The second half began and essentially ended with punctuation marks from Shea. In between the Hornets fended off repeated Gateway comeback attempts with runs of their own thanks to timely defensive stops and buckets from five different players.

The Hornets opened the second half with an alley-oop dunk from Trae Miller to Shea to stretch the lead to 33-24 but four points from Ndubisi and a three-pointer from Eddins made it 33-31.


Gatesville countered with six straight points from Banner Allman - the Hornets' leading scorer this season. The senior guard scored on a three-point play then buried a Tyler Shea

lead back to eight at 39-31. Then, back-toback layups from Shea and Kase Cox pushed the lead to 43-31.

Gateway cut the lead to single-digits when a three-pointer from Westin Hartness made it 48-39 but a steal by Shea and layup from West Allman made it 50-39 after three quar-

In the fourth, the Gators were able to get as close as nine points again when a threepointer from Eddins made it 56-47 but on their next possession, Miller drew a charge on Eddins. Gatesville countered with a layup from Banner Allman on the next possession to make it 58-47 and the Gators would not threaten again.

The win was punctuated by a three-point play from Shea with 1:37 to play that embodied the Hornets defensive efforts in the second half. The senior forward batted away an errant pass and dove for the loose ball. As Ndubisi attempted to make a save for the Gators, Shea snagged the ball, dunked, drew

a foul, and sealed the Hornets' victory.

"In the second half we picked up the pressure and that gave us some momentum and we also got out in transition well," Campbell

Shea led all scorers with 26 points while Banner Allman had 14 points. Shea passed the 1,000 point mark for his career in the first quarter and Allman needs 13 points in the area round game to set a new singleseason scoring record for the Hornets. The record of 656 was set in 2009 and Allman currently has 644 points on the season.

After losing his sophomore pitching season due to injury, Veazey looked healthy against the Cougars. He walked two batters in the first inning and gave up back-to-back singles in the third inning, but was virtually untouched throughout the rest of his four innings of work.

Veazey struck out the side in the second and third innings and had two strikeouts in the first inning and the fourth inning. All 10 of his strikeouts were swings and misses.

"He looked good for his first outing. There were a ton of swing and misses so that is a good sign that he had pretty good stuff (on Monday)," GHS head coach Chase Smith said. "As good as he was last night he is only going to get better. It's exciting having him back.'

The Gatesville offense put four runs on the scoreboard in the first inning but did it on just one hit. Kason Herbelin and Lawson Mooney opened the game with walks and both advanced a base on a passed ball. A balk scored Herbelin to make it 1-0 and moved Mooney to third. He scored on a sacrifice fly from freshman Brady James to make it 2-0.

Veazey and Mason Mooney then drew consecutive walks and Veazey later scored on a passed ball to make it 3-0. A line-drive

Gatesville batted around in the second inning and added another six runs in the frame. The Hornets opened the inning with five consecutive hits.
