He traveled to Texas Tech during his sophomore year to compete in the Regional Tennis Tournament and brought home a bronze medal. At the tournament he became known as the bracket buster for being an unseeded player. He was recognized as a KWTX Classroom Champion for his leadership on the tennis court and for his outstanding academic achievements in the classroom.

Shivaree to shine on 49th anniversary

This year will mark the 49th anniversary of the Gatesville Shivaree. The first Shivaree took place on August 3, 1974, and next year Gatesville will celebrate the 50th anniversary of this special event.

The very first Shivaree was sponsored by the Greater Gatesville Chamber of Commerce, embellishing on the old fiddler's festival which had been taking place mid-summer each year. The idea of having a Shivaree became a multi-faceted event in hopes to incorporate and include the entire community on the downtown courthouse square which would become the focal point of the festivities. At the time of its inception, the event was described as an "old-fashioned" Shivaree. Why the term "Shivaree" was decided upon is unknown. Traditionally, a Shivaree was a folk custom designed for the wedding night of a bride and groom and consisted of loud noises and merrymaking that would keep the newlyweds awake. Generally, everyone in the community would take part in the event. In later years, the word took on a new meaning and was described as a custom of good cheer where the community would unite in a time of celebration. In 1974, chamber members decided to incorporate this term with the old fiddler's festival which became a yearly tradition that carries on to this day. In addition to the 1974 fiddling festival, plans were made for a concert by the Kitchen Band, a square dance with Ray Stewart as the caller, followed by a street dance. Other activities that took place at the original event included a sidewalk sale and white elephant sale; an exhibit of antique cars, spurs, barbed wire, dolls, and old-time



Phone scams target multiple local people

Local residents — along with people throughout the state and nation — should beware of scams in which people receive phone calls and are threatened with arrest or seizure of property by callers falsely claiming to represent law enforcement and saying that the targeted individuals have unpaid fines or fees. "One person was told they need to meet (a deputy) and bring \$1,200 in cash, and the caller identified himself as Sgt. Franklin Smith with the Coryell County Sheriff's Office," said Coryell County Sheriff Scott Williams. "There is no such animal. We do not have anyone by that name working for us." There are reports of scammers contacting people in the Waco area and actually using the names of law enforcement officers, but agencies in Waco have said they are not responsible for those calls, and that the caller was falsely identifying himself. "If the sheriff's office has a warrant for your arrest, we are not going to contact you by phone," Williams said. In one instance, a local resident was told by a man claiming to be law enforcement that to avoid arrest for an unpaid fine, he needed to get a money order from Western Union and meet the caller at the sheriff's office. Then the caller later said the person did not need to go to the sheriff's office but could meet them in a local parking lot. "If we're catching four or five scam attempts before it happens, there's no telling how many people are getting burned. I hate to see folks get beat up and taken advantage of by this. It's a pretty significant chunk of money." Williams said some of the calls are being routed through Jamaica, but the scammers are able to spoof and change numbers frequently in order to avoid law enforcement shutting them down.

District Clerk Becky Moore said she has also received multiple calls from people who have been targeted by the scams.

"It started (in late April)," Moore said. "Somebody called and indicated that they had been contacted (about money owed to the county). I told them to call the sheriff's office, but an older man wanted to talk to me to confirm he didn't owe anything. He was really scared. The guy on the phone asked him if he owned a gun and felt like the caller may have been stalking him. I assured him that he didn't have a fine."

Moore said none of the people she talked to about the scam attempt had paid money to the caller, who used several different numbers. In some instances, the caller identified himself as Brandon Steele or Franklin Smith.

"One call was to the wife's number, but the caller said he wanted to talk to the man," Moore said. "The caller told the man to bring him \$1,012 and not to bring his wife when he went to the bank. He said if the man didn't meet him,

he'd take his car. Others who were called were told they would be arrested.

"I talked to a detective in Killeen who was called (by a scammer), but (the scammer) didn't get very far."

Anyone who receives a call from someone claiming to be with law enforcement or a local official should contact the number of the law enforcement agency or county office to confirm. Both Sheriff Williams and Moore said their office did not make the types of calls that the scammer is making.

"My concern is if the caller contacts 100 people this week and 10 fall for it, that's a lot of money lost," Moore said. "I don't want people to fall for it. I don't want people to think they have to pay money over the phone or because of a call on the phone. They are not going to get a call like that from us. These (scammers) especially like to take advantage of the elderly.

"It bothers me because they get people on the phone and scare them. This is a terrible way to try to take advantage of people."

farm equipment; a quilting bee; and an auction of antiques, furniture, and toprated merchandise with proceeds to benefit the Coryell Memorial Hospital with their \$500,000 fundraising campaign. At the time, Chamber of Commerce president. David Barnard, was quoted as saying "We're hoping to raise a lot of money (for the hospital)."

Other activities at the first Shivaree included such games as Mumblety-peg, washer pitching, horseshoe pitching tournaments, and a domino contest; a starving artist sale and unique craft sale; and a concessions alley featuring such treats as corn-on-the-cob, cold cider, popcorn balls, and watermelon.

In a 1974 edition of The Gatesville Messenger, the first Shivaree was advertised as being "a show sure to please, no matter what your fancy."

Since the first celebration, over the years the Shivaree has grown in an enormous way. Today, instead of a single day event, the Shivaree now encompasses three days.

This year, the Shivaree will

The final day of the Shivaree will include a Color Run starting at 8 a.m. at the Cotton Belt Depot. Live music will take place at Texas Station that evening from 6 p.m. until 7 p.m. followed by a performance by the band Ricochet with special guest Landon Heights. Also performing will be Not So Jazz Band – Jazz Band, and local musicians Mike and Bailey Shea Dickie.

From its humble beginnings 49 years ago, Gatesville's Shivaree has turned into a three-day event that provides fun and entertainment for both adults and children.

Gatesville Lions, Salvation Army partner to help local residents

The Salvation Army Red Kettle campaign made a big comeback in Gatesville in 2022. That was only the beginning, as the Gatesville Lions Club steps up to the plate to help provide volunteers and lead the effort to collect funds -100% of which will be used to benefit local residents during times of need.

During a recent Lions Club meeting, members of the Lions Club who are helping to lead the efforts spoke about efforts to raise funds through the Salvation Army Gatesville Service Unit to help local residents when they have financial struggles.

The Red Kettle campaign, which begins in late November and continues until just before Christmas each year, raises money that is used entirely for the benefit of local charthe Salvation Army Emergency Assistance Office, located in the Gatesville Senior Center, 208 N. Lutterloh Drive, from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday or Wednesday.

Creek said fundraising efforts are making an impact locally, and he expects things to get even better.

"I think we're going to be very effective in the future," he said. "We're going to raise more money than ever before."

Annette Cole, the assistance secretary for the Gatesville Salvation Army Unit, said additional volunteers are needed to help those seeking financial help.

"Right now we have a group of ladies on the first Wednesday of every month, but we need more help," she said. "What volunteers do is take basic information from applicants and financial information from people who come in. We need help making copies, and if someone comes in with a bill that's \$325, we try to help them get the extra \$25 to cover it.



ity. None of the money collected from the campaign is sent to national headquarters. In fact, actions taken by the national organization and local Salvation Army volunteers are entirely separate.

"Some people said they didn't want to donate (to the Red Kettle campaign) last year because the Salvation Army gave money to the prisons," Creek said. "That's the national group. Our local funds go to benefit people like single mothers who have a financial crisis or older people who may have a hard time paying a bill, and it stays in Gatesville and other areas or Coryell County except for Copperas Cove. Cove has its own (Salvation Army unit).

"These funds are also used for emergency assistance such as when people are displaced by a fire. We help people on an asneeded basis."

Creek manages the local funds and said rather than give cash to people in need, vouchers are given for people to take to H-E-B or checks are written to utility companies to pay bills.

"One of the stipulations is we can only help you one time per year, and the cap is \$300," he said. "We don't want to run out of funds, and we want to help as many people as possible."

Those who need financial help can visit

"We will gladly welcome volunteer help. and people can split a shift and work 8 to 11 or 11 to 1."

Jeremy Stills, chairman of the Red Kettle Campaign, said 2022 was a learning process. It was the first year the Gatesville Lions Club helped lead the collection efforts.

"I learned quickly that there's a lot more involved than setting up a kettle and getting a lot of volunteers," he said. "The plan is to double what we brought in last year. Joyce Talbott (a Lions Club member) really helped us a lot and made things so much better and easier.

"This is a great effort to help our community, and I'm excited and happy to be a part of it. The Red Kettle is right now our only way of raising money (for the Gatesville Salvation Army Service Unit) to distribute in our community, so it's very important. One hundred percent of the money stays local none of these funds collected go outside our area."

This year's Red Kettle Campaign is scheduled to begin Nov. 24 and continue through Dec. 23. Volunteers are needed to ring bells next to the kettle in two-hour shifts from

noon to 2 p.m., 2-4 p.m. or 4-6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. No collections are taken on Sundays.

The campaign raised \$8,000 in 2022.

Because this is a communitywide outreach, people do not have to be Lions Club members to volunteer. Churches and civic groups can get involved in the Red Kettle Campaign as well.

Stills said a Facebook page is being set up for the Gatesville Salvation Army Service Unit, which will have a link for people interested in volunteering. People can also mail checks to benefit the Gatesville Salvation Army Service Unit to P.O. Box 213, Gatesville, Texas, 76528.

GISD leaders discuss impact of dress code flexibility

School board members discussed the impact of changes to the dress code made last year to allow more flexibility on nose studs and boys' facial hair during a meeting of the Gatesville Independent School District Board of Trustees on May 15.

The review of the policy items was made following what had been described as a "year-long trial run" allowing principals to evaluate the changes and offer their input to the board. High school and junior high administrators said the policy changes had been positive and that students were responsive to rules. While nose studs are allowed, nose rings are not, and students can remove them. For those who refuse, In School Suspension is an option. Administrators say there has not been any problem with facial hair violations.

"Making the adjustments has made kids more willing to comply (with the rules)," said Gatesville Junior High School Principal Suzy Penrod. "There used to be more of an argu- a standoff. Now, there really hasn't been a probment lem.

Board member Charles Alderson said he appreciated the efforts of staff in dealing with dress code issues.

"Thank you for everything y'all have done," he said. "To

me, the dress code isn't what I thought I was voting for originally," he said. "To me, the issue is neatly trimmed (facial hair). One thing that stands out to me is the goatee. To have it scraggly is not neat to me. As far as I'm concerned, I'd like them to be clean-shaven. But I'm one of seven (board members)."

Calvin Ford said he had heard from one teacher about a student who did not take a nose ring out, and was told that if a teacher referred the student to the office, then In School Suspension was an option.

"I'm with Charles (Alderson)," said board member Jimmie Ferguson. "If we want neat and trimmed, do we have a definition or take a picture?"

"We didn't get that specific," Alderson said.

Board President Charles Ament said he had heard that principals were spending excessive time dealing with dress code issues before the changes were made.

"I heard from administrators that they were spending an inordinate amount of time measuring and figuring things out," Ament said. "This was a way to give them discretion.' He said he heard mixed reports from parents about their views on the policy changes. "We've hired good administrators to take care of it."

"We have to consider what the community wants, too," Alderson said.

Ford said the students have larger issues to focus on.

"I think the kids have too much to worry about, and they are going to express themselves," he said. "Are the kids coming to school and doing their work? Some things we're going to like and some things we're not going to like."

Ferguson said his biggest concern about the policy was "consistency. I don't know how you reach that. One teacher may say it looks great and another wants to send a student to the office."

Board member Cheyenne Kizer agreed with Ford that there are more important issues to prioritize.

"There are bigger issues than a beard," she said. "Some are talking inappropriately and what they do. In the big picture for me, it's not a life or death situation. It comes down to is a nose stud or facial hair distracting from learning? No."

Superintendent Barrett Pollard said flexibility on these issues has benefitted administrators.

"We don't want it to be so taxing on the principals," he said. "That defeats the point."

"The only thing I ask is that they keep (facial hair) neat and trim," Alderson said.

Gatesville ISD increases substitute teacher pay for 2023-24

Gatesville substitute teachers will make more money in the 2023-24 school year after the Gatesville Independent School District Board of Trustees approved the request from Superintendent Barrett Pollard on May 15.

In a memorandum to the board, Pollard wrote, "With staggering inflation, it is important that we evaluate our substitute rates of pay. Our substitute teachers do a phenomenal job and help keep the district functioning.

Pollard said he worked with other administrators and human resources office employees to evaluate GISD's substitute pay rates and also compare them to other school districts.

"With the increases tonight, our substitute pay rates should be competitive with other local public school districts," Pollard said.

The daily rate for non-certified substitutes

(those who have a high school diploma, general equivalency diploma or associate's degree) increased from \$70 to \$80.

The daily rate for certified and degreed substitutes (those who have any teaching certification, a bachelor's degree, master's degree or doctorate) increased from \$80 to \$100.

10-day same assignment rate for The non-certified substitutes rose from \$90 to \$100, and the 10-day rate for certified and degreed substitutes rose from \$95 to \$110. The 30-day same assignment rate rose from \$105 to \$120 for non-certified employees and from \$110 to \$125 for certified and degreed substitutes.

'We're trying to help out our substitutes and stay competitive with other districts,' Pollard said.

Board President Charles Ament asked, "Is it still hard to find subs?"

Multiple principals answered, "Yes."

SD school board approves several financial items

The Gatesville Independent School District Board of Trustees approved several financial items during its May 15 meeting, including approval of a bid for new kitchen equipment, selection of an audit firm, renewal of a bank depository agreement, approval of a bid for entry-resistant film on windows, and setting the dates for upcoming budget workshops and public meetings.

Darrell Frazier said four bids were received for kitchen equipment on GISD campuses, from companies in Texas, New York, West Virginia and Colorado. The bid from Texas

received bonus points, but the winning bid was from Douglas Equipment of West Virginia. That bid was for \$156,234.

The kitchen equipment purchase will now go to the Texas Education Agency for approval.

The board also approved Lott, Vernon & Company of Temple to audit the district for the current fiscal year.

"They've done a great job, and it takes a while for an auditing firm to learn their clients," Frazier said. "The audit is very detailed and extremely complex, and it is getting more complicated every year (because of added state requirements)."

Because of the increasing complexity, the cost of this

year's audit has gone up \$5,000, Frazier said.

The board set a tax rate and budget workshop for the month of August on Aug. 15, with a board meeting the following week and a public meeting to discuss and adopt the tax rate planned for Aug. 29.

The board also approved a bid from Sun Safe LLC for entry resistant film to help protect windows of GISD buildings from unauthorized entry. The bid was for \$165,792, and was the lowest of three bids by at least \$22,000.

Gatesville ISD receives preliminary property values

The preliminary property values within the Gatesville Independent School District received from Coryell and Bell counties indicate a 14.3% increase, which amounts to

\$167.683 million.

This amount will likely be adjusted over the coming months, and the certified property values will be presented to the district in July.

"How this will impact the tax levy depends on what the state legislature does in June," said Darrell Frazier, chief financial officer for GISD. "There is talk about increasing homestead exemptions, we'll just have to

see. There are a lot of important meetings going on (at the state level)."

Frazier said one of the things the legislature has discussed is limiting property value increases.

The Eagle Springs Baptist Church, an offspring of the Onion Creek Baptist Church, was built in 1878 in the community of Eagle Springs. The small, one-room church is considered to be a rare type of architecture due to the two front doors - one for the men to enter through and one for the women. Very few of these historic churches

are still in existence in Texas today. The inside of the church remains much the same as it did when Governor Pat Neff attended there as a child. The church pews, pulpit and pulpit chairs are all original to the building.

About 17 years ago, the Historic Eagle Springs Baptist Church Association was formed in order to raise funding to have the church repaired and restored. Repair work remains continuous on the soon to be 145-year-old structure. Although funds were recently raised to have the floor of the church professionally leveled, the building continues to slant to the east. The siding, windowsills, and parts of the eaves of the church need to be replaced, and the building needs to be painted.

Association member Martha Deeringer said, "The Leon River Dutch Oven Gang is a group of amazing folks who can cook up culinary magic in Dutch ovens."

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Coryell County to celebrate 125th anniversary of its Courthouse

The Coryell County Historical Commission, in conjunction with Coryell County Judge Roger Miller and the Coryell County Commissioners, are making plans for the 125th anniversary of the courthouse.

Festivities are planned to be held on the courthouse lawn on Saturday, July 22. Tours of the courthouse will be conducted as well as many outside activities which will include speakers, live music, games, and the presentation of the colors.

There will also be a rededication ceremony of the Texas State Historical Marker that once stood on the north side of the building but is currently being restored and will be placed on the south side of the building which was originally planned to be the front entrance of the building. Food trucks will also be on site to provide food and refreshments for those attending.

The courthouse, built in 1897-98, is the county's third courthouse; Architect Wesley Clark Dodson, a designer of many civil buildings in Texas, designed the Beaux Arts building. In his design, Dodson modified the traditional cross-axial plan to allow for the erection of a central tower. By moving the district courtroom to a position alongside the tower rather than centered underneath it, he was able to extend the masonry support walls to the ground and support the tower.

An important feature of the courthouse is the massive classical porticos, differing somewhat in scale and treatment, which define the north and south

entries. The south portico has paired corner columns, while the north has single columns. The porticos rise from a one-story base of rusticated stone with arched entries in the lower level. The openings flanking the central arch are smaller on the north facade. Red sandstone Corinthian columns support white sandstone pediments, with the fivepointed star of Texas inset in contrasting carved stone.

So, I guess we still had a privately-owned school in 1884, and Prof. Crow possibly owned and operated it until 1889. In that year, according to the Gatesville Star, the school over on the hill was called the Central Texas Institute, with a school board headed by president T.B. Saunders and secretary J.C. Chrisman. The fall term opened in September of 1889. Back in the '80s and '90s we thought that old twostory frame school building was just about the finest building in the whole country, and, of course, it was at that time. It stood out like a sore thumb on that old gravel hill. It was tall enough for a three-story building, with large rooms and high ceilings and a little narrow stairway leading up to the second floor. It would reel and rock in high wind, but never did blow over. Each room had plenty of windows in it – it was cool in summer but cold as the devil in wintertime. It stood in lonely grandeur, our college building, with plenty of room on that old gravel hill for a playground. In fact, we had more playground than anything else. There was only a few homes to the north of the building and none on the east until you get over to where Uncle Tobe Hearn lived. To the south of the building was an old rough road going down the hill by old man Reese Chaney's home behind where Barney Wollard now lives, and there was no other houses over there. There was nothing to the west until you went under the bluff and crossed the gulch to where Col. H.N. Atkinson lived. Out in front of the college building to the north lived W.L. Ayres in a large two-story home, and next to him lived W.M. Colgin

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ly business pioneers. Born in 1880 in Gatesville, Uncle Bob had many memories and stories from his childhood which, later in life, he put in writing during the 1940s and 1950s for The Gatesville Messenger in a weekly column titled "Down Memory Lane."

According to John Frank Post, editor of the Gatesville Messenger from 1946-1978, "Mr. Saunders composed his Down Memory Lane columns from his West Main Street home in the shadow of the county courthouse dome. Deadline time would find him hunched square-shouldered over his small desk pecking away at his typewriter." Post continued, "disdaining the rules of grammar and political correctness, he wrote like he talked – straight and plain-speaking. He was *spared any tedious research,* as his gifted memory supplied him with facts that he could weave into his own inimitable embroidery, using colorful anecdotes, local history, and happenings. Yes, Uncle Bob knew how to juice up a story."

Post recalled that the "Down Memory Lane" column was a hit with the readers of the newspaper from the beginning. Post said that Uncle Bob's close friends felt he viewed his writing as a "gift to his generation and a legacy to generations to come."

The following is an excerpt of Uncle Bob's Down Memory Lane column that appeared in the September 24, 1948, edition of The Gatesville Messenger:

Town's First School Stood All Alone on a Windy Hill

Even we natives who have been born and reared here in old Gatesville can hardly realize the wonderful changes that have taken place in the old town in the last 50 or 60 years. Especially does

placed with modern structures or rock and brick and our streets that used to be knee-deep in sand are now all hard surfaced.

What I really started out to write about was the changes over the on College Hill from the time I first remember it down to 1948. I am given to understand that the first little schoolhouse over there was just a one-story affair with a hall down through the center and maybe two rooms on either side. The kids hung their hats and wraps out in the hallway. This was back in the late 1870s after the town of Gatesville was incorporated. It was possibly a private school and you had to pay tuition.

The town was incorporated in 1870, just five years after the close of the Civil War. During the war everything was at a standstill, but after the '70s, lots of new people come into the town of Gatesville, and by the middle '80s things were sorter looking up and folks were beginning to think about and want better schools for their kids. To Professor Frank Crow goes the honor of opening the first college in Gatesville on March 17, 1884. It wouldn't be considered a college in this day and time; I believe we just call it the high school now. But the Gatesville Sun, our newspaper of that time called it a college and I am just quoting Dr. Mudd, the Sun's editor when he stated that the college building will soon be ready and Professor Crow had secured the services of Miss Fannie Robinson of Melrose, Nacogdoches County, an experienced and successful teacher. He speaks of the building then nearing completion as an excellent building and says that Gatesville would have a well-conducted institution of learning, which she had long been in need of.

Gatesville captures 3rd area title in baseball program history

In the midst of a playoff run, most coaches are prone to large amounts of "coach speak".

They tend to avoid color and candor, will offer generic compliments about their opponent, bland plati-tudes about the game, and keep the emotion to a minimum. Chase Smith is not most coach-

es.

After his Hornets had swept Giddings two games to none, after the Area Championship trophy had been presented, and after all

the family photos had been taken, Smith stood alone in the home dug-out and packed up his bag with tears in his eyes.

"I'm just super proud. I was thinking about my time as a player, all the ups and downs the past three seasons, and just how proud I was of these guys. It kind of came to head and was an emotional moment for me," Smith said.

In three seasons as head coach, Smith has turned the Hornet program from afterthought to area champs.

In the two seasons before Smith became head coach the Hornets were a combined 11-27. In 2019, they went 5-20 then 6-7 in the CO-VID shortened season of 2020.

Smith took over the head job in 2021 and led the Hornets to the playoffs with a 16-14 record. In 2022, he guided a team decimated by loss to within one game of the postseason.

His 2023 team has seen its share of injuries, inconsistency, slumps, and near-misses. Now they will see the Regional Quarterfinals for just the third time in school history.

"I have been telling the guys how special it was and how much I wanted them to get to experience what I was able to experience as a player," said Smith, a player on Gatesville's first regional quarterfinalist in 2006. "It's a special feeling they will remember forever getting to see all the kids look up to them and all the people of Gatesville get behind them."

After technically pulling off an upset over 24-4A champion Marble Falls in the bi-district round, there was no doubt that the Hornets were the superior team in

the area round. The Hornet hitters - particularly the left-handed bats - battered the Buffaloes 11-0 in game one. They took game two by a 4-2 score thanks to a dazzling performance from pitcher Grant Erwin.

Erwin threw a complete game four-hitter to get the win, striking out nine and walking just one batter. Two of the hits and the lone walk all came in the bottom of the first inning when Giddings jumped out to 2-0 lead. After that, Erwin was nearly untouchable.

Following an RBI double from Giddings' Peyton Tomas in the first inning, Erwin retired 15 straight batters until allowing a single in the bottom of the sixth.

"He was really good on the mound and has been solid when

he has been healthy all year," Smith said. "He was able to keep them off balance and going back and watching the game his breaking ball was really moving which made it tough on them."

Thanks to a Gatesville scoring a run and numerous conferences between the Giddings coaches and the umpiring crew the top of seventh inning was a prolonged affair and might have afforded Smith the opportunity to give the ball to one of his many relievers.

"I usually talk to our pitchers briefly about simple adjustments and how they are feeling in between innings, and he said he was good to go for the seventh, so it was all his from there," he said. Erwin gave up one more single in the seventh but got his ninth strikeout of the night to end the game and the series.

The Hornets led 3-2 heading into the top of the seventh inning but tacked on an additional run thanks to an RBI single from pinch-hitter Jacob Ybarra. After Bralen Veazey laced a double to right field and Ben Mabry singled, Ybarra flared the first pitch he saw into right field to score pinch runner Sean Agui-ar and make it 4-2.

"I can't say enough good things about Jacob Ybarra. He is the ultimate teammate, captain and has set the example and tone for this team. He is just selfless and the kind of kid you wish you had more of on your team as a coach," Smith said. "He will leave a legacy on this

program that will last for years."

After falling behind 2-0, Gatesville came back and scored three times in the top of the second inning to take a 3-2 lead. Veazey and Mabry singled to start the inning then a walk from Justin Johnson loaded the bases for leadoff hitter Lawson Mooney.

Veazey, the designated hitter on days he isn't pitching, is a remarkable 7 for 10 in the Hornets last three playoff games while Mabry is 6 for 9 and James has three hits over the same stretch.

Area Fishing Report

Lake Belton

GOOD. Water lightly stained; 76 degrees; 13.49 feet below pool. A strong threadfin shad spawn continues most mornings with gamefish of all kinds blitzing the threadfin shad for a roughly 30-minute window concluding around 6:50 A.M. As the skies brighten and the bait moves downward in the water column and out to deeper water, white bass and hybrid striper are intercepting them in about 20-24 feet of water. Looking for boils and/or bird activity over top of these fish are significant aids in locating them. Once located, counting down MAL Heavy Lures with chartreuse tails to match spawning shad is producing catches consistently. White bass in open water have just begun to feed on the newest young of the year shad. This is occurring with increasing frequency each day, although location is quite sporadic as these fish orient on the bait, and not on the bottom features. Under tough conditions, downrigging with #13 Pet Spoons is a consistent producer. Report by Bob Maindelle, Holding the Line Guide Service. Blue catfish are good, slowly trolling shallow flats for catches up to ten pounds. Larger

blues and flatheads are good in 2-5 feet of water using fresh gizzard shad or perch. Channel catfish are good on prepared baits in shallow muddy water. Report by Brian Worley, B&S Catfishing.

Lake Waco

GREAT. Water stained; 74 degrees; 9.76 feet below pool. Crappie are good on brush piles in 10-18 feet of water. The lakes are slowly coming up while it has not affected the bite, you will need to use dark water colors in the muddy water. If that does not put them in the boat, throw minnow. A favorite Snacky Lures color is snacky flash for everyday use, or black/chartreuse with the muddy water in the size FS200 on a Eye-Hole jig head in 1/16th ounce. Report by Robert Stover, Workingman Crappie Guide.

Stillhouse Hollow

GOOD. Water lightly stained; 77 degrees; 12.55 feet below pool. The upper third of the reservoir is muddy upstream of the long bridge and off-color from the long bridge to Union Grove. Fishing for largemouth bass in the lower two-thirds of the reservoir continues to be excellent.

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Six champions crowned, one school record set

ACOGDOCHES — Six Tarleton State University Texans can now call themselves a WAC champion after the third and final day of the WAC Outdoor Track and Field Championships last weekend.

The first individual to earn a crown was Alan Palmer in the men's high jump. Palmer came into the meet with the 11th best jump of the season. However, Palmer decided to give his final meet his best performance. Palmer jumped a personal best of 2.10 meters to become the champion.

Tarleton State University's softball team is headed to the national postseason for the second straight season after being chosen to compete in the 2023 National Invitational Softball Championship (NISC) Sunday night.

Tarleton was one of eight teams selected to compete for an NISC championship in Fort Collins, Colorado. The tournament is scheduled Thursday-Sunday, May 18-21 and will be played across two fields at Triple Crown Sports - Red **Rocks Field and Horsetooth** Field. Since making its debut in 2017, the NISC has grown into the largest college postseason tournament outside of the NCAA Championships,

The tournament format features two four-team pods that will play a double-elimination slate, with winners of the two winner's brackets and loser's brackets advancing to a single-elimination championship bracket. There will be live stats and live video for every game of the tournament.

The semifinals are set for 9 a.m. MT / 10 a.m. CT and 12 p.m. MT / 1 p.m. CT on May 20, with the championship game scheduled for 3 p.m. MT / 4 p.m. CT - all those games are on Red Rocks Field.
