Albert enjoys an adventurous career

Gatesville City Manager Scott Albert recently celebrated his two-month anniversary on the job, and on July 12 he talked to the Gatesville Lions Club about the

life experiences that have led him to this point. "It's been a very busy two months," Albert said. "It feels like it's been a year already.

Albert has kept a full schedule from the start, and said the city is looking at about \$21 million in capital improvements that will not require the raising of taxes.

"During my entire career I have not raised taxes, and I don't plan to raise taxes here, either," he said.

Albert's interest in public service began when he was a student at the University of Texas at Dallas, when he took a class and was inspired by Plano City Manager Tom Muehlenbeck. "It was a light bulb moment," Albert said. "I thought,

'What an interesting career. Where else could you go and serve to make a difference in communities and lives at that level?"

Albert changed his major from economics and fi-

nance to public administration, saying Muehlenbeck inspired him.

"I learned that I really am a servant at heart," Albert said. "That's what led me to a career in public service."

After serving as an intern in the city of Plano's budget department, Albert had an opportunity to enroll in the city's management training program, where he was given a chance to work in several different departments and see how a city's day-to-day operations were carried out.

"It was probably one of the best experiences of my life as far as education," he said. The day he graduated with a master's degree in public affairs, the mayor of Springtown called and offered Albert an opportunity to serve as the city administrator.

"It was one of the best experiences of my life," Albert said. "I really loved Springtown. I was there a year and a half or two years, and then a friend called and encouraged me to apply for a job opening in Fairview,

\$25 million budget proposed for city

While final approval awaits, Gatesville City Manager Scott Albert has submitted a budget preview to the Gatesville City Council that requests a budget of \$21,934,977 for the 2024 fiscal year - a 25% increase from the city's \$16,412,014 budget for 2023.

"If I were sitting in your shoes I'd say, 'OK, how are we going to pay for this?" Albert told the council. He then presented a detailed list of areas in which the city is expecting additional revenues. This includes:

- * \$3,679,967 in grants and American Recovery Plan funds
- * \$309,568 in sale tax
- * \$261,373 in property tax * \$170,522 in interfund transfers
- * \$335,947 in water sales
- * \$319,414 in sewer charges
- * \$342,281 for sanitation
- * \$31,366 for municipal franchise fees, which reflects a 6% change in rates.

The total anticipated additional revenues are \$5,450,438. Grants are expected to help cover the cost of the Lovers Lane project currently underway, work on water plant lagoons, the drainage master plan and two water plant clarifiers. These grants total \$3,679,967.

In a presentation to the council, Albert said sales tax revenues budgeted for the 2024 fiscal year were increased by 12% compared to the previous year, which amounts to \$2.9 million (\$2.6 million was budgeted for the 2023 fiscal year).

"This adjustment was made since current year collections have exceeded the estimated budget numbers by 13.8%," Al-

From October 2022 through June 2023, sales tax revenues have risen from 5% to 19% each month compared to the previous fiscal year.

Demolition of the old county jail and the nearby building that previously housed the Texas Department of Public Safety is complete - and under budget.

"Sierra Demolition has finished with all the sites, and they've come \$24,000 under budget," said Commissioner Ryan Basham. "I'm very pleased with how they handled it. They did a very good job."

Commissioner Scott Weddle also voiced his endorsement of work done. "They've been an outstanding vendor," he said. "We have a

lot of movement going on." Weddle said S3 of San Antonio was scheduled to do a walk-

through of the jail to assess camera needs.

One of the biggest costs related to the camera system is viewing stations, and County Judge Roger Miller asked what makes them "so special" as to warrant those costs.

"I'm going to guess it's just like anything - it's a closed

Gatesville's Shea Harp's love for library began at an early age

At the age of 8, Shea Harp began volunteering at the library and, in her words, "I was just trying to get out of the pre-school story time.'

Even at that young age, Harp had already begun her love of reading.

"I loved books as a little girl. I would look at the picture books and come up with my own story just by looking at the pictures. I could read Junie B. Jones (a book series) all by myself by first grade," Harp said.

When librarian Faye Nichols retired after 28 years, Harp was named interim librarian. She became the official librarian on April 20.

Harp was home-schooled from sixth grade until her graduation. When she was 14 years old, Faye Nichols allowed her to start officially volunteering at the library. In 2015, she became one of two volunteers to be

hired, and she's been there ever since. After receiving her high school diploma in 2016, she began attending classes at Central Texas College. Eventually, she transferred to Texas A&M Central Texas where she received a bachelor's degree in social work.

"I did all of this while working at the library in part-time and full-time capacities," she said.

When asked if she always wanted to be a librarian, Harp replied "I did not. I remember being told as a child that I needed to be a librarian one day and I decided that was not

FROM MY FRONT PORCH

You've got to be kidding me...a horse stuck in a tree?

here is something unique about the relationship between a human being and a horse. Like all emotionally satisfying connections, the relationship between man and horse is based on trust, communication, and acceptance. Over time the horse learns to speak "human" and the man learns to speak "horse."

Almost 30 years ago, I was in the horse business and owned a significant number of equines. There were several stallions as well as broodmares and performance show horses. I loved it when the mares would foal out and I could witness the innocence of their babies. Watching them stand for the first time or learning to walk and run was so interesting and amusing.

Once foals were placed out in the pasture to graze and exercise, I was reminded of watching human children going to kindergarten. The foals would run, play, annoy and aggravate the other foals and their mothers. They would learn from the other animals as they experienced their new surroundings. It was always interesting to watch a foal ease over and try to nurse off a mare other than their mother and see the mare turn and gently bite or "cow kick" the intruder to teach it to stay with its own mom. A lesson learned.

It was spring, the grass had just turned green, and I had let three, two-year-old fillies out into a small pasture of about 10 acres. The field had a board fence around the perimeter so there was no fear of the young horses

getting caught up in a wire fence or barbed wire. There was a pond for the horses to drink from, and the grass had to be tantalizing to the youngsters who had been eating nothing but hay or grain all winter. The pasture even had a little stand of tightly bunched trees which would provide some shade if the spring sun became too

I led the horses from the barn, through the pasture gate, removed their halters and turned them loose. Immediately they took off running as a group, kicking up their heels, bucking, nickering, and in general, celebrating life. It was spring and it was obvious they felt good about being out in the sunshine with plenty of grass to eat. It only took a short time before all three horses had their heads down, content with their surroundings and the fresh grass they were consuming.

I went about my chores, only occasionally glancing at the three. After completing a few additional tasks. I went to the house to grab a morning cup of coffee, only to be interrupted by one of the farmhands. All he could say was, "You are not going to believe this!"

As I quickly followed the

farmhand towards the pasture, my mind raced. Had one of the horses stepped in a hole and broken a leg? Did a dog or a coyote run them through the fence? My heart was pounding!

As I got closer, I could see two of the horses facing and staring at the third. She was also standing in the middle of the little clump of trees. From a distance the situation looked innocent enough. What was the farm hand talking about?

As I got to the trees, it was clear what had happened. Years ago, two of the trees had sprouted only a few feet apart. Over time they had grown to nearly 20 feet high, but their trunks at the base were only 30- or so inches apart. The young animal had been grazing and thus had its head down as it walked along and ate. It grazed between the two trees and kept grazing and moving forward. The problem was that once the horse moved forward, the trunck of the two trees touched the horse's sides. A horse's natural reaction when startled is to run. When this mare felt something touch its sides, it became startled and ran forward. Unfortunately, the space between the two trees was so small the horse could not pass. This made matters worse, because when the horse felt like it was stuck, instinct told it to run forward to get free, and it became even more stuck. Now the horse was wedged so tightly between the two trees that it could not move at all!

I will never be able to replicate the glance my young horse gave me when I arrived. Her look was a mixture of embarrassment,

fear, and being ashamed for having gotten themselves in such a position. While I was concerned for my mare's health and welfare, it was also hard not to laugh at the predicament. A horse stuck in a tree?

After assessing the situation, I tried to push the horse back through the opening to no avail. The mare was simply wedged too tightly. I tried dishwashing soap, but even its slippery nature was not enough to free the imprisoned equine. It finally came down to either cutting down one of the trees or getting the tractor and placing a rope around the horse to pull the horse backwards towards freedom.

Turns out the tractor did a pretty good job of freeing the animal. The horse had a few scrapes on its side but was otherwise uninjured. For me, I learned that horses can somehow find a way to get themselves in trouble seemingly no matter what precautions you take. They are just as curious as us humans and just as apt to get in trouble.

From that time on the young mare and I had a bond. It is like she understood I had rescued her and perhaps she was hoping I would not tell the other horses of her embarrassing situation. I never told this story to an outsider until the horse had passed. Friends don't tell on their friends... do they?

Thought for the day: Do something good and no one sees it. Do something embarrassing and it feels like it is going to be on the national news.

system," Weddle said. "It's in order for S3 to program the system. They are \$5,000.

"That's why I asked the question," Miller said. "That seems high - not crazy."

Weddle said during a July 13 walk-through the jail's air handlers were assessed so the vendor could determine the best way to install them. The county is committed to purchasing two new handlers for certain, with the possibility of others to be considered.

During work on the jail expansion project, Weddle said "they hit water at 12 feet while drilling and

were able to pump it out."

So far, the Leon Street Annex is \$24,500 under budget, Weddle said, adding that the engineering firm working on the project has determined there is no need for a detention pond.

"Southwest Architects can put a preliminary plan out," he said.

"The biggest topic - there is a lot of talk about a server room," Weddle said. "The court had decided not to make that our server site. I had a meeting to talk about a server room. We can eliminate office space and turn it into a future server room."

He said Southwest Architects will give a preliminary cost estimate for locating a server room at the Leon Street Annex.

"The Halon (fire suppression system) will probably be the biggest cost," Weddle said.

"We have determined there is ample space and room for future expansion. We would have room if we decide to move the server from the rental spot in Waco into the county."

County Attorney Brandon Belt talked about the server in relation to the Coryell County Sheriff's Of-

"We have a plan - it may be a loose plan," he said. "The sheriff's office really needs to be hardwired in. They have a lot of systems going. Long-term, we've got to get that hard-wired in. Then it's not far from the courthouse. Then if we get the courthouse wired in, "It would be my hope how do we get more modernized?"

we're way down the road to getting where we want to be."

"I'm 99% sure that's already in the plans," Weddle said. "As we progress through this, we have opportunities."

Belt said having a local server "is our best solution. It's going to be there for a long time. I don't think we have a choice."

County Judge Roger Miller said resolving server concerns will benefit the county.

"It would be my hope - how do we get more modernized?" Miller said. "This would be the first time the county invests in a server room. We're already investing a considerable amount of money into this new building.

"I would think it would be a good idea to heed the advice of the technical experts and have a server room. The costs are truly minimal because the distances are so short. Do we want to bore to install fiber or pay pole fees?

"I hope to tie buildings in with fiber and it becomes a closed system which reduces the amount of data we're putting on the internet. We become much more efficient and much more secure.'

Albert then took a city leadership job in Celina and worked there for more than four years.

'Celina covers 99 square miles and will be the largest city in Collin County when it builds out." (Plano, with more than 285,000 people, currently holds that distinction).

While working in Celina, Albert discovered

he had kidney cancer.

"It really changed my life and changed my focus," he said. "This was in 2005, and I went back to work with a different mindset. I backed off my career and took a job with The Economist, which did utility rate and impact fee studies in Texas and also

Albert said he received another call from a friend who asked him "what I thought about going overseas and embedding with Marines in Fallujah (in Iraq).'

Although he had never served in the military, Albert said he was intrigued by the idea.

"After 9/11, I thought I needed to make my contribution to my country." Albert said. "I went to Fallujah in September or October 2005 and embedded with the Marines at Camp Baharia, which had replaced Camp Fallujah."

When Albert first arrived in Iraq, he flew into the airbase in Baghdad and spent two or three days there before he went to Camp

"I got sicker than a dog with all the fecal matter in the air, my body had to adjust,"

A Chinook helicopter picked him up to take him to his next destination.

"I was the lone civilian," Albert said. "There were pilots and gunners on board, and it was about 2 or 3 a.m. We landed at the Fallujah base, and a Marine carried my bag and told me to wait there for somebody to pick me up. They took off, and I was alone in the middle of the night in Fallujah. I didn't see anyone around."

Finally, a Marine arrived and took him to

"I was originally going to do this for about 6-9 months," Albert said. "The time I spent with the Marines and what we accomplished was incredible. There were a lot of good stories that you didn't hear about."

One of the major projects Albert was involved in was helping to oversee construction of the Fallujah wastewater treatment plant.

"It was an over \$100 million project and the largest wastewater treatment plant in Albert said.

iraq. U.S. Ambassador Ryan Crocker asked Albert to be his "eyes and ears" when it came to the Fallujah plant.

"It was 80% complete and seven civilians had lost their lives (during construction)" Albert said. He was asked whether the work on the project should continue, and Albert recommended that it be completed.

At another area, Lt. Col. Matthew Lopez told Albert he wanted him to help oversee projects to decrease the violence in the area. "I met with the mayor and the elders, and

28 water projects were identified which were desperately needed," Albert said. "The purpose was to improve the quality of life in Iraq and also to put money back into the district."

When U.S. forces took over reconstruction efforts in Iraq, all members of the Baathist Party were dismissed and sent home, Albert

"The problem was all the professionals were Baathist, because Saddam (Hussein, the former leader) was a Baathist, and if you wanted a job, you were also a Baathist."

Some of the unemployed men became involved in setting up explosive traps and shooting at Americans and Allied troops.

By once again allowing the men to work in constructive ways, "it calmed the community and you could see a decrease in violence," Albert said.

He found the work challenging and rewarding and stayed overseas working on various construction projects much longer than he anticipated - both in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"I basically stayed involved for about five years between Iraq and Afghanistan," Albert said. "I joined USAID (the U.S. Agency for International Development) and went between Iraq and Afghanistan working on different

"At the end of that time I was ready to come home, and my family was ready for me to come home - I was tired. The entire time I was overseas I worked seven days a week. I said all I wanted to do was go home, sit at Starbucks and have a tea and just watch

Although spending so much time overseas was a sacrifice for Albert and his family, he said, "they realized this was something really important to me. I enjoy making a difference in people's lives. That's why I'm a public servant."

When Albert returned to Texas, he worked for the Riverbend Water Resources District in East Texas, which he said was about to be shut down by the state's Sunset Advisory

"East Texas is an area where we have abundant surface water, so it's very important to the Dallas-Fort Worth area," Albert said. He was able to help put the district on the right path and the state opted to keep the district operational.

Albert then worked for three years as city manager in Hondo, Texas before coming to Gatesville.

"Here I am in Gatesville, Texas and I couldn't be happier," Albert said. He has relatives in both the San Antonio area and in North Texas, so Gatesville is a central location for his family.

"It's a beautiful area and the potential is outstanding," ne said. "We have a great downtown area, auditorium and access to the (Leon) river, and there's so much opportunity.'

Albert pointed to the growth of the Granbury area as an example of what Gatesville has the potential to become, and also recalled when McKinney was much smaller.

"I think the same potential is here in Gatesville, as well," he said.

"I'm here to hopefully make a difference in Gatesville and to serve the community and every one of you as well."

Local man organizing jail ministry

Don Strieber considers himself a newcomer to Coryell County, having lived in the area since about 2006, but he's a man on a mission

when it comes to reaching

people with the gospel. Strieber, who has a background with previous prison and jail ministries, is looking to start a ministry to reach Coryell County Jail inmates and offer them partial advice for improving their lives, as well as the life-changing hope he says comes through the love of

Christ. "I had an epiphany from Christ on many levels to do things in my old age,' Strieber said. "David Green, the CEO of Hobby Lobby (and an outspoken Christian) and the Bible have set me on fire. I want to work with men, and I want to work in unity and community. I'm not a one-man show."

He said the county jail previously had an active jail ministry that stopped when COVID-19 concerns arose in early 2020, and he is hoping to revive it.

"I met with Sheriff (Scott) Williams and learned the jail has some space issues, but there is an expansion planned and they'll be getting 48 new beds," Strieber said. "Right now he doesn't have a common area, so we'd have to go in and meet with guys one-on-one in a small area. That can change once there's a common area, but it's what we're going to have to do to see inmates."

Strieber said he previously volunteered at the Texas Department of Corrections Hughes Unit for about 15 years, "so I have a background of working with inmates. Many have had a really tough life. One was put on the streets at the age of 5 or 6, when a step-dad pushed him out and said he didn't want him around anymore.

So, at that age, he was on his

Strieber said he plans to have men ministering to male inmates and women volunteers working with female inmates.

"The message is 'We Care About You," he said. "One thing for them to know is this is valuable to them right now. They will have an opportunity to choose to participate.

"There are three things. We deal in truth, and we will advise them how to get the best from the time they spend on this unit. We will give advice about their time in the world. When you send people from jail or prison to the streets, sometimes they go back to their old ways. We need to love them like Jesus loves them and point them to programs that can help them.

"We will offer them advice about their eternity. This is where we can step up and be courageous and talk to them about their eternity. Let's face it guys, there's one of two places we go when we

Strieber said there is not a local homeless shelter, and he hopes that will change. But beyond being just a homeless shelter, he hopes the community will offer a one stop shop to help meet "people's needs in life and in Christianity."

Volunteer times are flexible but will likely be during the day Monday through Friday. He said the meetings with inmates will likely be 20-30 minutes and will allow volunteers to get to know inmates before reading them chapters of the Bible.

"I want to let the inmates know that we are people who believe in Jesus and if they choose to meet with us, they will receive grand benefits both now and in their eternity," Strieber said.

The latest certified property appraisal roll for the city shows property values of \$532,448,691, which is a 13% increase for the previous year. A memo to the council states that "the new taxable value from property and improvements added to the city's tax roll is \$7,945,140. The city anticipates receiving \$261,373 more in property tax proceeds.

Interfund transfers will involve moving money from the water and sewer funds to the city's general fund.

"These transfers are made with the purpose of covering 50% of operating expenses related to administration, fleet services, as

City waives fees to attract more sports tournaments

In an effort to attract more amateur sporting events to Gatesville, the Gatesville City Council has approved a recommendation for city Parks & Recreation Director Seth Phillips to waive the collection of gate fees for baseball and softball tournaments.

The city will instead charge a smaller field use fee of \$125 per field.

City Manager Scott Albert explained this is a two-year pilot project to determine response to the gate fee waiver.

A memo to the Council noted that several other cities, including Taylor, Harker Heights, Stephenville, Killeen, and Waco, already use this incentive.

"We've got some exciting interest in our city - people are looking to host tournaments here," Phillips said. "We want to host them because it stimulates tourism and is good for the economy."

Phillips explained the waiver of gate fees will decrease city revenues by about \$5,345.

The memo to the Council stated, "If we waive the option for the city to collect

the gate fees, the USSSA (United States Specialty Sports Association) Baseball has verbally agreed to host seven tournaments during the fall and spring seasons, and we believe Small Town Select Tournaments will continue to host seven or eight tournaments."

The memo stated that city staff are also planning to pursue the idea of hosting Texas Teen-Age district and state tournaments."

Phillips pointed to a study done for Greensburg, Indiana, which has a population of 11,000 and the impact of hosting youth baseball tournaments.

If 50 teams participate with an average of 13 players, and family travels with the team, there is a significant boost to the local economy in terms of potential lodging, dining, shopping and fuel purchases.

Phillips said on a recent Saturday, 3,007 people entered the Gatesville Sports Complex during a tournament. He said USSSA hosts both statewide

and national tournaments. "I believe people will come from further away to visit our city," Phillips said.

"Right now, we host about eight Small Town Select tournaments, and we want to host 6-8 USSSA tournaments. This will benefit hotels, restaurants and stores and we should see an increase in sales taxes and hotel/motel taxes that will offset the loss of gate fees.'

Councilman Greg Casey asked if hosting additional tournaments would interfere with local youth leagues.

"We have limited fields, so it will impact practice times and it will be an extra burden on my department," Phillips said. "It takes a lot of time to host events, plus clean-up. We may need some money for overtime. With increased revenue, it will more than offset those costs."

Mayor Pro Tem Meredith Rainer asked if the tournaments bring in more money for the city, whether those funds can be put back into supporting the parks and recreation system.

"Absolutely," City Manager Albert said. "We can use HOT (hotel occupancy tax) funds to finance lights (at fields) as well.'

The Council approved the recommendation for a two-year trial run.




Betty Shults, age 93, of Abilene, formerly of Gatesville, went to be with her Lord and Savior on Saturday, July 15, 2023.





A welcome will be offered by Coryell County Historical Commission president, Danny Corbett followed by Coryell County Judge Roger Miller who will share the history of the construction of the courthouse.

In addition, there will be a rededication ceremony of the Texas State Historical Marker that was originally installed on the north side of the structure but will be relocated to the south side of the building which was the original main entrance of the building.

Larry Weiss, of Harris Creek, recently restored the original marker and brought it back to its original condition just in time for the 125th anniversary celebration.

The Coryell County Courthouse was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1977.

During the 125th anniversary celebration, nonguided tours will be given of the historic structure which was restored in the late 1980's.

Those planning to attend the celebration are encouraged to bring lawn chairs for seating on the courthouse lawn. Several food trucks will be on hand to provide refreshments and a courthouse birthday cake will be provided by the Coryell County Historical Commission.
