Texas Prepaid Tuition Plan Newborn Enrollment Deadline Approaches

Texas families have through July 31 to enroll their newborns at 2022-23 prices in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund®, the state's prepaid college tuition plan. Newborns are children younger than 1 year of age at the time of enrollment.

"I know what it's like to be the parent of newborns, and paying for college was not always at the top of my

mind," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "That's why we're reminding new parents to take advantage of the opportunity to lock in this year's rates and lay the foundation for their children's future educational opportunities."

With the Texas Tuition Promise Fund, participants can purchase tuition units and lock in the costs of undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at Texas public colleges and universities, excluding medical and dental institutions, based on today's prices.

For additional flexibility, the plan also can be used at Texas medical and dental institutions, Texas private colleges and universities, out-of-state colleges and universities, career schools and registered apprentice-

ship programs, where tuition the 2023-24 school year. is not locked in, and the benefits and payouts would be based on the Transfer Value.**

Enrollment at 2022-23 prices closed on Feb. 28 for children 1 year of age and older. The next annual enrollment period begins on Sept. 1, with new contract prices based on Texas public college tuition and schoolwide required fees costs for

she said. "I truly believe that education opens doors that otherwise would never be open for someone, so I guess it's just the fulfillment that comes from knowing that you have the ability to open those doors for kids and

adults alike." Chavez and her husband - both of whom are from Springtown - decided to move back to their hometown to be closer to family, and both found jobs at Springtown ISD. Chavez was hired originally as the dean of academics at the high school in 2016 before being assigned to the assistant principal role. Chavez handled tasks related to discipline, monitoring attendance, noticing red flags and building positive relationships with students.

"You want it to be a safe place for kids to come," she said. "You want them to know that they have a support system there.'

While reviewing candidates

for the middle school principal role, SISD Superintendent Shane Strickland said Chavez had a few qualities that stood out from other applicants.

"Mrs. Chavez has a strong track record of successful leadership in educational settings," he said. "Throughout the interview process Mrs. Chavez showcased a clear vision for enhancing educational practices, fostering student achievement, and addressing the unique challenges faced by the campus, and she also displayed a collaborative spirit. It was a combination of all of these qualities that made Mrs. Chavez the ideal candidate for the position."

As she has begun her new role at Springtown Middle School, a challenge Chavez will likely face is limited space on campus. Because of growth, space is tight on all SISD campuses, including the middle school.

Springtown Middle School will have an extra lunch time this school year to prevent the cafeteria from becoming overcrowded, Chavez said while pointing out that space needs affect bathrooms and the cafeteria as well as classrooms

The problem with having limited space is that it can affect learning opportunities for students and teachers' ability to feel effective in their jobs, Chavez said.

"When you're rotating kids around in temporary classrooms, you're not giving them necessarily those hands-on experiences, like great science labs and those types of things," she said. "(We're) trying to figure out those solutions to still give our kids every opportunity to have that experience that when they leave Springtown, not just Springtown Middle School, when they leave and go out into the world, they are as well versed as anybody else and are able to just

Chavez praised the middle school's administrative team and said they are brainstorming on how to be a solutiondriven building and giving kids the best.

"We believe that with Mrs. Chavez's innovative ideas

and collaborative approach, we can overcome this hurdle and continue to create a great learning environment for all students," Strickland said. "One goal we have discussed with Mrs. Chavez is the need to implement flexible scheduling options to accommodate the large student body. Another goal is maximizing space utilization. Mrs. Chavez has already been working hard at reconfiguring offices

and classrooms.' Chavez enjoys watching kids grow in the classroom, and catering to individual students' needs to close learning gaps will be focused on at the middle school. She also likes seeing teachers get excited about student growth.

"I love seeing a teacher get fired up because a kid made progress, so I get as much out of that and seeing teachers enjoy this journey that we're on together," she said. "It still is very satisfying to me. I like to help people around me be better, like kids, adults, whoever.'

Chavez realizes there

are reasons why working in schools may be difficult right now, particularly because of readjusting after the COVID-19 pandemic and political conversations about education. As a self-described positive person who likes to find solutions, she wants to encourage educators to love their jobs.

"I hope that moving into this role, it gives me even more ability to make people still love teaching and still being educators," Chavez said. "I hope that I'm capable of having that kind of impact, and so I think that's probably what drives me to want to do this. I have a great job. Teaching is a great job. It's sometimes really hard, but the people you work with is who really help you to remember that.'

Strickland said Chavez will also be focusing on "enhancing academic programs, fostering a positive and inclusive school culture, and continuing to strengthen community engagement." In addition, Chavez said she will listen to the needs of the middle

school families, staff and others impacted by the middle

"We believe that Mrs. Chavez's leadership and passion for education will have a significant and positive impact on our school community," Strickland said. "We are confident in her ability to inspire our students, support our dedicated staff, and continue to build a tradition of excellence at Springtown Middle School.'

Chavez praised SISD for having good kids, caring parents and a community that is invested in the schools. In her new role at the middle school, Chavez strives to be transparent and available to parents.

"I want them first to know that I'm going to love their kids," she said. "I want them to know that I have an opendoor policy, and I'm a phone call or an email away. I want them to know that I'm going to hold their kids to a really high standard, but I'm going to love them while I do it."

1 can cream of mushroom


1 can chicken broth 1 can Rotel tomatoes, diced
