### Coryell County to declare local disaster ahead of eclipse on April 8

Coryell County will issue a Declaration of Local Disaster to prepare for the total solar eclipse that is expected to draw thousands of visitors to

County Judge Roger Miller said the influx of people could put a strain on the county's infrastructure, hospitals, and emergency response teams. The declaration is effective starting April 6, at 6 a.m. until April 13, at 6 a.m.

"The reason that we're issuing it is that I'm getting reports that we're going to have anywhere from 2.000 to 200.000 people come into Coryell County," Miller said. "Between the county and the cities, we don't have those assets on hand to be able to respond to all the potential emer-

gencies.' A disaster declaration allows the county to coordinate with the Texas Division of Emergency Management if state assistance is needed regarding severe traffic, fuel shortages, and other emergencies.

"The issue is trying to protect our resources, because potentially we're going to have more people in Coryell County than we can respond to," Miller

said.

Miller said the declaration includes precautions to mitigate potential risks, such as prohibiting outdoor burning on certain


Since several parts of Central Texas are in the path of totality, the county expects a significant population increase on the days leading up to and following the eclipse on April 8. The declaration will also list recommendations on how residents can plan ahead, such as keeping additional food on hand, preparing for internet and cellular service outages,

filling up gas tanks in vehicles, and avoiding unnecessary travel.

Miller announced the intent to issue the declaration at a commissioners' court meeting on March 12. Other counties have also declared local disasters for the eclipse, including Bell County, Kerr County, Travis County, and Burnet County.

Coryell County offices will be closed on April 8.

The "Block (Out the Sun) Party will take place on the downtown square during Saturday and Sunday leading up to the total eclipse on Monday, April 8. The festival will feature a variety of food trucks, vendors, and various activities for kids and adults.

"Some cities have planned large events in the hopes of drawing in a large number of visitors. We approached our plans a little differently," Eclipse Coordinator Cheri Shepherd said. "We knew that a certain number of people would be coming to Gatesville, regardless of what we planned.

We wanted to make sure that our residents and visitors had the best possible experience during and leading up to the eclipse."

Activities include a petting zoo, painting with a twist, goat roping, photo props, pickleball and cornhole tournaments, live music, and more. Visitors will also have a chance to view and support local artists through the "Art in the Shadow" exhibit that will feature various mediums of Texas and eclipse themed artwork.

With thousands of out-of-town visitors expected to arrive in Gatesville, the festival will also be an opportunity to support local businesses and organizations.

### Annual Cross Walk to be held on Good Friday, March 29

With Good Friday upon us, the annual community cross walk will take place

on Friday, March 29. For over 15 years, Carlos Webb, founder of the cross walk, has put together this event for locals to participate in to honor Good

Friday and Easter.

Webb expressed that he came up with the idea one day while watching the news when he had seen a man walking down I-35 carrying a cross.

"I thought it would be a good youth activity for church," Webb said.

Last year, the cross walk was attended by over 150 people.

"The cross walk is important for several reasons," Webb said. "It serves as a time of remembrance and celebration for the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.'

The cross walk will start at the First Methodist Church and will begin at 8:30 a.m. The walk will be three miles long and will end at Coryell Community Church (CCC).

The cross that is carried

is around 100 pounds and is made up of 1x6 lumber. It is 10 feet tall and five

feet wide. Anyone can carry the cross. It is usually volunteers comprised of men, women, and children.

"We take turns so that as many people as possible can have a chance," Webb

During the walk, the group will pray for all surrounding schools and staff, first responders (fire department, law enforcement, and EMS), the military, the local judicial system and its leaders, state and federal leaders, as well as for service organizations similar to Righteous Roots.

When asked what scripture Webb feels relates to the cross walk, he stated Luke 9:23, "Then He said to them, whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow

'Scripture (1 Corinthians 12:20) talks about one body with many parts, so this event serves as a symbol of unity by bringing our church bodies together to serve one God, regardless of denomination," Webb said.

"We invite any and every one to get involved in this year's cross walk," Webb said. "Encourage your churches to participate."

If you are not able to walk, the community is invited to attend the worship rally after the cross walk.

The rally will be held in the prayer garden at Coryell Community Church (CCC) at approximately 10:45 a.m. Children under the age of 13 must be accompanied by

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### Trinity Baptist Church presents Passion 2024: Thee Gift

With Good Friday and Easter to soon be in our presence, Trinity Baptist Church will host Passion 2024: Thee Gift on Thursday, March 28, Friday, March 29, and Saturday, March 30.

This will be a free event and will give the community of Gatesville the chance to experience a live action story of Jesus' life, with the trial, crucifixion, and the resurrection.

Preparations for the play first began in October of 2023, when Trinity Baptist Church member Jonathan Ford began writing the script.

"One hundred and sixtyeight friends have worked together since before Thanksgiving to offer a gift to our city that is already changing lives," Ford said.

The play consists of 12 different scenes and will be told from the point of view of Grandfather John as he explains his experience with the last days of Jesus to his grandsons Elijah and Abel.

"It reminds them of the real reason for Easter," Pastor Sam Crosby said. "Easter is not about easter eggs but about the resurrection of Jesus."

The event will feature live performances, live actors, live animals, and live music as well as a walk through on the streets of Jerusalem.

"Passion 2024: "Thee Gift" is becoming so much more to me than just a story of the past," Ford said. "Knowing first-hand the folks playing key roles such as Jesus, Peter, James & John, and Mary Magdalene, well, it's like time traveling from 35AD to 2024 in a millisecond."

Crosby expressed that a lot of time has been put into this event, with 168 volunteers, the costume designers, and the set team has worked lots of hours to prepare.

Jerusalem will open at 6 p.m. each evening for the community to view and will be located behind the sanctuary of the church in a large tent.

The tent will be able to hold up to 1,000 people. The office secretary of

Trinity Baptist Church has sent out 10,000 cards through the mail system within a 10-mile radius of Gatesville to invite the community to this event.


"As plans have evolved, I think the festival will be an opportunity for residents and visitors to make some wonderful memories surrounding the eclipse experience," Shepherd said.

ne of the true blessings in life is friendship. It is a relationship between two people and, often, the underlying bond between the individuals is vague in definition. Grade school friends are generally our first relationships outside the family circle. grade school friends who helped us to understand life in our own terms while facing whatever joys or tribulations might confront

When picking teams for a stickball game, friendship presented the challenge of selecting the best player for your team but to do so in a way as to artfully navigate the dilemma of failing to select a close friend, because they were a poor hitter. Such a decision compelled the art of social diplomacy at a level not unlike what is utilized by ranking state department officials.

As we grew just slightly older, our relationships evolved and the possibility of friendship with a member of the opposite sex became a possibility. Though previously looked on with disdain and contempt, it necessitated being able to recategorize girls as "human beings" instead of a species which must have come from another planet. It meant finding a common ground in which to talk and interact. I learned starting a friendship with a girl meant meeting her "halfway" and taking an interest in what she liked and learning to accept there were possibilities beyond sports and the usual things which were the heart of a young boy's life. It meant learning to accept my female friend was different from me in many ways. Her interests were not necessarily sports, climbing a tree, or challenging each other about who could spit the furthest. It was learning to accept there was more in life than what my world had previously thought possible.

Later in life there are "activity" friends — so named because of the activity the two friends share. I have had hunting buddies, fishing buddies, going to the ball game buddies, poker buddies, lake buddies, and who knows how many other kinds of buddies. While the two of us friends would engage about the other goings on in our lives, the friendship primarily revolved around an activity we participated in together. It was an activity which was the connecting force. These

types of relationships can create wonderful memories, but unfortunately, usually end when participation in the underlying activity stops.

There are also work friends, church friends, college friends, and a host of other types of human relationships, which are loosely categorized as friends. But no matter the shape or form of the connection, it is part of the thread which weaves our life into the tapestry it becomes. Sometimes, positively, and, sometimes, negatively, we are all a product of our friendships.

Our closest friendships, commonly referred to as "best friends," are often a combination of all the possibilities of friendship. They listen when a friend needs to talk. They speak out when a friend needs to be corrected. They support when there is doubt. The relationship may be a daily interaction, or it might be that the two friends do not speak for months, or even vears, but the connection between them never disap-

pears. It is a feeling which is kindled in the very soul of the other and shared. It connects the two in such a way that no power on earth could pull it apart. These are the most cherished and treasured of relationships.

This week, stop and reflect on all your friends and how your lives are entwined with one another. Smile at the joys you have shared and the emotion you feel. It is those feelings and experiences that make you the person you have become. Give thanks to those who have endured your shortcomings, listened to your complaints and sorrows, and who have smiled and leapt in joy upon learning of your successes.

### Faunt Le Roy Park to close for Total Eclipse

The City of Gatesville Parks and Recreation Department has announced that access to Faunt Le Roy Park, along with the walking trail, will be restricted between the dates of Friday, April 5 to Tuesday, April 9 due to the Total Eclipse.

"We are restricting access to Faunt Le Roy Park to provide safety and privacy to those who have paid for camping reservations specifically for viewing the eclipse," Parks and Recreation Director Seth Phillips said. "Restricting access will help ensure these folks have an enjoyable time while visiting our great city."

Part of the city's plan is to accommodate out of town visitors for the eclipse and to utilize the park for expanded RV camping and tent camping. In addition to the existing

RV spaces, the middle of the walking trail will be used for expanded RV camping as well.

Tent campers will reside in the picnic and playground area.

A bathroom and shower trailer will be placed in the park for all campers.

As of right now, there have been 116 people who have made reservations to camp in the park.

Parks and Recreation staff will be onsite throughout this time, and signs will be posted at the entrances giving notice of the closure.

Raby Park will remain open to the public as usual.

### \$8.9 million project on SH 36 expected to end in 2025

Construction crews have begun a road overlay project on State Highway 36 that will cause various lane closures throughout its duration, according to a press release by the Texas Department of Transportation's (TxDOT) Waco District.

The roadwork takes place on SH 36 from U.S. Highway 84 to FM 931 in Flat, which includes mill

and inlay operations for road surface restoration. TxDot states in the release that it will enhance road safety and improve driver experience.

The \$8.9 million project started in mid-February. It is scheduled to be completed by spring 2025.

Due to an influx of visitors for the Great American Eclipse on April 8, traffic congestion is expected to be a concern on major

highways in the Central Texas area. A spokesperson for TxDOT's Waco District said they are working with industry partners to ensure that traffic-related disruptions are minimized, including no temporary lane closures.

TxDOT encourages motorists to slow down, eliminate distractions, and buckle up when driving through work zones.

### Texas Historical Commission official given tour of courthouse

Emiliano "Nano" Calderon, the CHC Program Coordinator in the History Programs Division of the Texas State Historical Commission in Austin, recently went on a private tour of the courthouse with local historical commission chairman, Danny Corbett.

Tiffany Butler, who works in the building and is considered by many to be the official "courthouse historian," guided the two men on a tour of the building describing how it was constructed and important events that have taken place inside and outside the 125-year-old structure.

She even showed them the bullet hole in a doorway in the district courtroom where, in 1909, Verna Ware opened fired during court killing three men. It was written that tensions were riding high in the district courtroom at the Coryell County Courthouse. A town divided had come to witness a muchdiscussed court case... that would never culminate with a verdict.

Multiple gun shots rang out in the packed courtroom, and those assembled were scrambling to avoid the sudden spray of bullets fired by a woman who was "wronged" by the man who was on trial for seducing

The remaining bullet hole in the district courtroom door is the only reminder of what happened many years ago. Butler said that it is one of the main attractions during her courthouse tours.

Calderon was in Gatesville to attend the monthly Coryell County Historical Commission meeting. He gave a presentation to the members of the commission and spoke on new programs that the Texas State Historical Commission would be addressing in the next year.



### New angles in taxidermy

yatt Oakley retired from the fire department in Odessa, then became fire chief in Stamford and retired from that position. Once, when he was fishing, he caught a beautiful bass and decided to mount it himself. It won a prize at a taxidermy competition. Now, he has Paint Creek Taxidermy in a building near downtown Stamford.

"I started in the garage at the house, and my wife finally, after smelling chemicals and dead animals, told me I needed to find some other place to do this," says

He works with all types of wildlife, everything from a water buffalo to a mouse. The water buffalo is the heaviest thing in his shop right now.

"I did a turkey and that was the first and last one of those I'll ever do. That's the nastiest thing God ever created."

He does some unusual mounts.

"I did a bobcat and a rattlesnake fighting. That's probably the most unusual

one I've done. But I've done fox, deer, aoudads, different kinds of goats, even some coyotes. I did a longhorn with about a six-and-a-half foot span of horns.'

Wyatt, on the board of the Texas Taxidermy Association, stays busy but guarantees a one-year turn around on his work. He has customers from New Jersey to Nevada. Once, some women contacted him after they had shot a deer and didn't know what to do with it.

"I said, 'ok, bring it up here.' I spent two hours teaching them how to field dress a deer. They just ate it up. One of them put gloves on and helped me

do it."

He gets animals in all sorts of conditions.

"I've had everything from a full body pig to one that's been cut right there at the rib cage with a chain saw." Wyatt started handling

rattlesnakes.

"We euthanize them and freeze them and were selling rattlesnakes for a dollar fifty an inch plus shipping. They sold like hotcakes. Taxidermists all over the country wanted them so they could mount them. Some have sent me pictures of what they did. One shows a rattlesnake biting a pig, another shows a snake striking a fox."

He learned many of his

skills by watching other taxidermists. The first animal he mounted was a

squirrel. "I've done a 350-pound black bear, a 250-pound full body pig. People come in with some weird stuff sometimes."

He is quite innovative. He'll mount some animals or birds on a piece of driftwood for the client to hang on a wall. When I was in his shop his two granddaughters, Kylynn and Preslee, twelve and ten years old, were diligently learning how to do taxidermy.

### Mother Neff State Park at capacity for eclipse

Mother Neff State Park, located in the southeastern portion of Coryell County, will be one of the 31 state parks in the direct path experiencing the total solar eclipse on April 8th.

According to Mother Neff State Park Superintendent, Melissa Chadwick, no special events will be held at the park on the day of the total eclipse, although she stated that all campsites at the park have been reserved for several months. "Not as much for overnight rentals," she said.

Chadwick reported that approximately 15 campsites had been previously rented with a few that were set aside for park staff and emergency vehicles. She also mentioned that additional park security would be needed on the day of the eclipse.

According to Texas Parks and Wildlife, it is recommended to head to your designated park early to allow for heavy traffic. It is also recommended to fuel up your vehicle before coming to the park in case of traffic delays.

Chadwick stated that the "day permits" to the park became available to the public on March 8th at 8 a.m., and that in less than an hour, the day permits were sold out, which numbered 70 in total.

Mother Neff Park has approximately 90 parking places available, then

quickly, so be sure to stock up on food and drinks in case your departure is delayed by traffic

"We are certainly looking forward to the eclipse and creating stellar memories with our visitors that will last a lifetime," Chadwick said.

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

### Coryell County to discuss SAP at public meeting

Coryell County is currently in the process of developing a Transportation Safety Act Plan to identify and address roadway and transportation safety concerns. The plan will feature projects that are to improve dangerous roads identified by the community.

A public meeting will be held to discuss the Coryell County Safety Action Plan on Thursday, April 4, at 2 p.m. and will be in the Commissioner's Courtroom.

This comprehensive plan will identify many areas of concern to provide a framework to address concerns and reduce injuries and fatalities.

Coryell County is com-

mitted to a goal of zero roadway fatalities and serious injuries. This can be achieved within 10 years, by Jan. 2034, with the funding and completion of projects outlined in the safety action plan.

Current potential projects include traffic signal and signal improvements, new and improved sidewalks and crosswalks, the installation of bike lanes, turn lanes, and guardrails, reduced speed limits, and safer school routes.

Funding has been provided by the U.S. Department of Transportation's Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant to develop the plan, which they applied for and were awarded last year.

Coryell County was one of 25 SS4A Safety Action

Plan (SAP) awards in the State of Texas in 2022.

Since public involvement is essential to the development of an SAP, a survey was conducted from Jan. 5 through Feb. 29 for citizens of Coryell County to complete. With 318 responses to the survey, locals provided 131 points on a map of Coryell County to identify road with safety

Post cards alerting citizens of Coryell County to the survey were mailed out to 17,000 residential addresses.

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
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

### Pain of loss highlights rising trend of bicycle and pedestrian crashes

TxDOT urges drivers, pedestrians and bicyclists to follow state laws and save lives

AUSTIN - Katie Parker still gets nervous just crossing the street. Eight years ago, a careless driver plowed into her and her dog, Riley, while they were out for a jog. Parker was hit with such force that she was thrown more than 60 feet. Riley, a Great Dane, was killed on what was supposed to be a pleasant morning jog.

The mental and physical toll from the 2016 crash continues for Parker. The physical scars have mostly healed, but she doesn't feel safe while walking or driving. Her story is an example of the impact crashes can have on survivors.

"The crash changed my life," Parker said. "I lost my dog, and my sense of safety when crossing the street.'

Parker is joining TxDOT this spring during its "Be Safe. Drive Smart." campaign to remind Texans why it's important to follow traffic laws to keep pedestrians and cyclists safe.

"Too many people are killed or seriously injured every year in Texas walking, jogging or biking in their communities,' TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams said. "We want all Texans whether you're behind the wheel, on foot, or on a bike — to watch out for each other and follow the rules of the road so everyone gets where they're going safely."

In 2022, 922 people died in traffic crashes involving pedestrians and bicyclists in Texas, accounting for one of every five fatalities on the state's roadways. It's a part of a rising trend in recent years as pedestrian fatalities increased 30% and bicyclist fatalities increased 28% in the five years from 2018 to 2022.

"Be Safe. Drive Smart" urges all Texans to learn and follow the laws for safe driving, walking and biking. As part of this effort, TxDOT is sending teams of walking billboards to cities around the state to put key safety reminders in front of drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists in crash-prone areas.

If you're driving in Texas, state law requires you to:

Stop and yield for pedestrians, bicyclists and other vulnerable road users in crosswalks.

When turning, yield the right-of-way to pedestrians and bicyclists.

Pass bikes at a safe distance and give bicyclists room to ride.

Always follow the speed limit and drive at a safe speed.

If you're walking: Cross the street only at intersections and cross-

walks. Obey all traffic signs and signals, including at crosswalks.

Use sidewalks. If there's no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road, facing oncoming traffic, unless the left side is obstructed or unsafe.

If you're riding a bike:

Always stop at red lights and stop signs.

Ride in the same direction as traffic and use bike lanes or ride as near as possible to the right-hand

Use hand signals when turning or stopping.

At night, ensure your bike has a white light on the front and a red light or reflector on the back.

TxDOT's Be Safe. Drive Smart. campaign and pedestrian and bicyclist safety initiative are key components of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader social media and word-of-mouth effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices while behind the wheel to help end the streak of daily deaths. Nov. 7, 2000, was the last deathless day on Texas roadways.



### County expected to use jail addition by April

Staff Writer After nearly one year of construction, the expansion of the Coryell County Jail is scheduled to be complete and in use by early April.

Commissioner Scott Weddle said in an email that the Texas Commission on Jail Standards is scheduled to inspect the expansion on March 28. Inmates who are currently housed outside of the county can move into the new jail following approval from the state commission.

Weddle said the county is aiming to make the move by April 1.

"Once we pass the inspection, we should

be able to start moving inmates into the expansion and start saving the out of county inmate fees paid to other counties," Weddle

The county is currently finalizing minor details on the expansion ahead of the inspection, Commissioner Ryan Basham said. Construction crews are also set to complete the new parking area in front of the Coryell County Sheriff's Office, which was built to meet Texas Accessibility Standards.


"There are just a few minor details that need to be

addressed," Basham said. The county approved the jail expansion in

November 2022 to bring the building up to compliance with state standards, which included issues with overcrowding. The new addition adds 47 beds to the facility.

The expansion replaces a historic building that served as the county jail since the 1930s.

The jail expansion project was originally scheduled to be completed in December, according to a previous article by The Messenger. Construction first began in May 2023.

### Courthouse repairs underway

Work commenced last week on the repair of the northwest dome of the Coryell County Courthouse. In February, County Commissioner of Pct. 3, Ryan Basham, reported that the four courthouse domes, located on each corner of the building, were leaking and causing damage in the attic and to the offices below.

After the county agreed to a quote of \$48,500 from A\*R\*C\*Hitexture Roof Coatings owned by Gregory Cole of Rowlett, restoration and repair plans were soon put into action. Cole, who has been in the business for 48 years, said, "We specialize in working with metal roofs." He also stated that his work is guaranteed for 25 years.

When asked about the time frame for completing the work, Commissioner Basham said, "Best thing they can give me is two weeks to a month to repair the dome."

"Water from the northwest dome is leaking into the attic and into an office below, which is occupied by District Clerk Becky Moore where records have received water damage," Basham said.

Although leaks have been discovered in all four domes, the one on the northwest corner of the 125-year-old courthouse needed to be addressed first.

"On some of the spots,

they're having trouble getting some of the old covering off. There's been more damage than good," he said. Basham reported that, over the years, hail has been responsible for damage t the domes and to the roof. "There is some hail damage and the contractor said that the dome we're working on now has been beaten down and they're going to have to straighten that up. Now, after the coating has been painted onto the dome, it will be more protected from hail damage, wind, and heavy rains," he said.


Basham recently gave an update on the repair work to the Coryell County Historical Commission and brought samples of the sealant that will be used on the dome. "There's going to be three different coats on it," he said. Four coats of a neoprene base, which is black and known as PermaLastic Plus, a rubberbased sealant, was applied by hand to the dome following repair work of loose seams and repair work on the lightning rod on top. Concerning the black PermaLastic, Basham said, "We're going to get some phone calls, and people are going to ask why the dome is being painted black, but it's not going to remain black."

According to Basham, the last two coats put on the dome will be Omni-Clad, which is a polyurethane coating that will provide seamless waterproofing. To carefully match the color of the other domes, the Omni-Clad coating will be "terra cotta" in color.

The white base that supports the dome was also treated with neoprene and then painted with a sealant called "Coryell County White."

Basham stated, "My goal is that we need to take care of this courthouse that we're so very proud of. I was born and raised in Coryell County, and I think she's probably the prettiest courthouse in the State of Texas. We need to take care of it. If there's an option where we don't have to use taxpayer's dollars, that's the route I'd like to go."



# Texans take down recently ranked Roadrunners squad

STEPHENVILLE – The Texans kept things rolling March 9 with no end in sight, facing one of their toughest opponents yet and still emerging victorious.

Tarleton State (9-1) remained perfect at home (5-0) with a 4-3 victory over UTSA (9-5), who was ranked as high as No. 62 just two weeks ago in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITF) NCAA Division I Women's Rankings. Last week the Roadrunners were No. 70.

The Texans will now have gone at least a full calendar year without losing in Stephenville, as they next play March 19, and they last lost at home March 19, 2023. This is the second straight season Tarleton has upended UTSA, as it also won 4-3 last year in San Antonio.

The Texans remain atop the Western Athletic Conference in winning percentage (.900) and they have the fewest number of losses (one). This marked their third straight victory.

"What a match!" said head coach Elianne Douglas-Miron. "We knew this match would be tough and talked about how it would take everyone showing up for us to win. We took care of doubles and that momentum helped us start strong in singles. Noelia came out on fire and kept her energy up her whole match to get us a singles point quickly. Martha and Elsa played at an elite level today. They competed hard and I'm proud of them leading our team to victory."

Tarleton State had to

make a solid comeback in the doubles point to take it, which proved to be the difference on Saturday afternoon. All three pairs trailed midway through, but two duos emerged victorious in back-to-back fashion to clinch. UTSA's Ekua Youri and Magda Tuells first defeated Elsa Boisson and Clara Sobius 6-2 on Court 2. Then Tarleton's Noelia Lorca and Emma Persson came back to win 6-4 over Aleksandra Zlatarova and Vittoria Baccino on Court 3. The Texan duo of Martha Makantasi and Maretha Burger followed with a 6-4 win over Fatima Gutierrez and Cassie McLay to clinch the doubles point.

Tarleton and UTSA split the six singles matches, which is all the Texans needed to take the team victory.

First, Makantasi made it 2-0 Texans with a 6-3 6-1 win on Court 3 over Baccino. Makantasi improved to 9-1 in singles with the victory, all between Nos. 2-3.

UTSA got on the board next on the top court, as Gutierrez defeated Persson 6-1 6-3. Lorca boosted Tarleton to a 3-1 team lead as she remained perfect in singles play, now 10-0, with her 6-1 6-3 win over McLay on No. 4.

UTSA's Youri beat Sobius 6-3 6-4 on Court 5 to make it a 3-2 Texan lead.

Boisson clinched the team victory for Tarleton on

Court 2, as she took down Zlatarova 6-3 6-7(5) 6-2. Boisson has won six of her last seven singles matches, improving to 7-3 on the year.

The Roadrunners took the final singles match to make it 4-3 overall, as Eva Beyebach beat Adeliya Mukhutdinova on Court 6.

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

### Books about Women's History

eorge Washington was the father of our country. Bill Gates co-established Microsoft. Thomas Edison improved the light bulb. Stephen King created Cujo. Walt Whitman wrote poetry, Lyndon Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act, and Bass Reeves brought bandits to justice. Notice one thing there? Those are all men, so, why not flip the coin? Read these great books about women in American history...

A generation of us grew up with television doctors who were all men, but in "The Doctor Was a Woman" by Chris Enss (Two Dot, \$26.95), you'll see how Hollywood missed the mark, and that women wore white coats, too. Read about a woman physician who worked for the railroad, one who left her home in South Dakota to tend to farmers and their families on the prairie, a ground-breaking plastic surgeon, a female dentist in the late 1800s, and several woman doctors who worked during times of pandemic. You'll love these hidden stories that aren't hidden anymore

Study any womens magazine from the 1950s, and you'll see plenty of ads targeted expressly to homemakers. In "Housewife: Why Women Still Do It All and What to Do Instead" (Legacy Lit, \$30), author Lisa Selin Davis looks at why "homemaking" is still mostly women's work today, even if the woman of the house is the breadwinner in a two-adult household. This is a wide and widely interesting look that, most importantly, doesn't denigrate homemakers. Instead, this book leaves women – and men – with ways to find their own comfortable (and equal) choices.

No women's history book would be complete without considering our First Ladies: in "American Woman: The Transformation of the Modern First Lady, from Hillary Clinton to Jill Biden (Crown, \$30), author Katie Rogers writes about how our most modern first ladies have molded the role from one of quiet helpmate to one of activism and personal platforms. Though its focus is more contemporary, the book is overall a sweeping look at presidential wives: Rogers reaches back into history for comparison and




reality-check, making this a book that will delight historians and political animals


And, finally, if you like a little salt with your history, look for "Unbecoming a Lady" by Therese Oneill (Simon Element, \$24.99). In this book, you'll meet some of history's loudest, most audacious women, the bravest, and the ones who saw something they didn't like and fixed it: inventor, Lilian Gilbreth; Civil War doctor, Mary Edwards Walker; wrongly hospitalized Elizabeth Packard; visionary Ellen G. White; Alaska millionaire, Reindeer Mary Antisarlook; sideshow "fat lady," Celesta Geyer; miser Hetty Green; and others who did what they needed, or simply wanted to do.

If these books aren't enough – because you know you'll want more – check with your favorite librarian or bookseller. They've got all kinds of books to help you see that history is just as often HERstory.
