City manager resigns after only one year

Scott Albert has stepped down as the city manager of Gatesville after spending approximately one year in the position.

The Gatesville City Council accepted Albert's resignation during its regular meeting on Tuesday, May 14. The council's vote came after an executive session on the issue, where the details were not

released to the public. Albert's resignation

takes effect immediately. "In February, both my parents were admitted to the hospital with significant medical conditions, which has led to me not being able to devote the amount of time necessary to my responsibilities in Gatesville," Albert said. "For the next few months, my focus will be on my family as I evaluate my career and what would be best for my family.'

Mayor Gary Chumley said the resignation was a mutual decision between Albert and the city.

"It wasn't a good fit for the city, and for him as well, so it was kind of a mutual thing," Chumley

Following the acceptance of Albert's resignation, the city council appointed Gatesville Police Chief Brad Hunt to serve as interim city manager until a permanent city manager is found. Hunt has been the Gatesville police chief

"As interim city manager, I am looking forward

to working with our dedicated, experienced department heads to set a strong foundation for the city's future," Hunt said.

Hunt said he will work with Gatesville Finance Director, Mike Halsema, who was appointed by the council as interim deputy city manager, to ensure the city's current projects stay on track.

"We will begin work on the budget for next fiscal year and will begin discussions on our search process to identify Gatesville's next city manager,' Hunt said.

Albert accepted the contract as city manager in April 2023 following former city manager Bill Parry's retirement. He assumed the role in May 2023.

The Gatesville city manager oversees a total operating budget of more than \$16 million, 82 full-time employees, and various city projects and policies.

Faunt Le Roy Park closes after flooding, community shares concerns

Recent flooding in Coryell County impacted several areas across the Gatesville community, including extensive damage

in Faunt Le Roy Park. The park closed its gates due to rising waters on the morning of Sunday, May 5. Gatesville Parks and Recreation Director Seth Phillips said that the park will remain closed until it receives a professional as-

sessment of the damage. "We cannot clean anything up until we get a professional opinion/estimate on the significant damage that has occurred," Phillips said. "The city hopefully will be able to receive access to grants and other resources for repair/restoration of the park, but that will take time."

Settled along the banks of the Leon River, Faunt Le Roy Park is no stranger to flood damage. In 2018, severe flooding caused erosion to the river's

embankment. Since then, a road that leads to the damaged section of the park has been closed for safety

Phillips said the latest damage is to the banks of the Leon River, the road that wraps around the park, and the walking trail.

"I believe we may have experienced more damage this time around," Phillips said. "We won't know for sure until we receive a professional opinion/estimate of the damage."

For many, Faunt Le Roy Park is a focal point for activities such as exercise, sports, camping, and events. One organization that frequents the park every weekend is Amtgard, a global nonprofit that recreates medieval-style combat with foam-padded replicas of weapons. Members of

TxDOT: Crash that killed two people allegedly due to distracted driving

A fatal wreck that took place in Temple on April 27 and killed two passengers from Gatesville involved a driver that was either "distracted or inattentive," according to a Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Texas Peace Officer's crash

report. The two passengers who died in the crash were identified as 22-year-old Abigail Boatwright and 17-year-old Evan Boatwright by the Temple Police Department and the TxDOT crash report. They were traveling in a Ford F-150 on State Highway 36 when an oversized load fell off its trailer and onto the vehicle.

The incident occurred just after 11 a.m. near the intersection of State Highway 36 and Highway 317 in Temple.

The TxDOT report states that the driver of the F-150, James Jones, was traveling eastbound on State Highway 36 at an undetermined speed when it approached the rear of several vehicles that were stopped to facilitate a trailer carrying a 16-foot wide and nearly 350,000-pound load. The oversized load was driven by a Kenworth truck as well as carried by five connected flatbed trailers with "240 tires on 120 axles."

Dashcam footage from Kenworth shows them traveling westbound on Highway 36 at 43 milesper-hour. The report says the truck was wider than the lane width and had to straddle both the east and westbound lanes.



County issues new disaster declaration for flood recovery

The Coryell County Commissioners Court issued a Declaration of Local Disaster to assist in recovery efforts following a historic flood event that took place on May 4 and May 5.

The declaration comes

after the first declaration County Judge Roger Miller issued on May 5 during the height of the floods.

"It's a standalone order. It identifies the previous order in there, but we're more in the recovery phase of things rather than the

actual event itself," Miller

The declaration went into effect on May 11 and will continue for 30 days. It encourages citizens to report business and personal damages and losses to the Texas Department of Emergency Management (TDEM) website at https://damage. tdem.texas.gov/ and to select "Spring Severe Weather and Flooding Event."

The declaration states that the flooding and high waters have caused extreme damage to the county's

roadways and infrastructure, as well as the homes, properties, businesses, and agriculture and ranching lands of its citizens.

It says that recovery operations are ongoing to repair county roads and other damaged infrastructure.

"This order covers the gap time from the previous order that I issued to allow us to collect the data for the efforts that the county government has submitted in there, and it extends from here to 30 days," Miller said.

A Houston Police Department motorcycle unit providing escort services was traveling ahead of the convoy and directing traffic for the oversized load.

According to the report, due to Jones being "either distracted or inattentive, he failed to see the escort pilot vehicles warning him of the approaching wide load as they passed his location."

The report says Jones continued to disregard the warning from the Houston

police motorcycle unit and failed to stop behind the other vehicles, causing him to swerve to the left and cross over into the path of the Kenworth carrying the oversized load.

The driver of the Kenworth slammed on his brakes to avoid colliding with Jones' vehicle. Jones then pulled onto the shoulder and came to a stop, partially blocking the westbound lane, and forcing the driver of the Kenworth to veer left.

The TxDOT report says the braking action by the Kenworth caused the massive load it was pulling to "shift forward." As the Kenworth came to an abrupt stop, "the rear chains holding the load onto the trailer snapped and the

load rotated to the right, falling off the trailer and its support."

The oversized load then landed on the Ford-150 that contained Jones and Abigail and Evan Boatwright, the report states.

Temple Fire & Rescue teams said that it took just over four hours to safely remove Jones from the car. He was flown to the emergency room with life-threatening injuries, but is in stable condition as of

April 30, per a press release by Temple police.

It is unknown what the piece of equipment was that fell onto the vehicle, Temple Fire & Rescue said.

Southern Transport LLC was the name of the company overseeing the transport of the oversized load, according to the Tx-DOT report.

After the crash, it took nearly two days to clear the debris from Highway 36.

the local chapter, which welcomes approximately 40 to 60 people weekly at Faunt Le Roy Park, addressed the Gatesville City Council on Tuesday with their concerns about losing the space.

"It's been a hit for us, because that's kind of a safe haven for a lot of people," said Aaron Adams, a member of Amtgard. "We take in a lot of trouble teens. We take in a lot of individuals that have social disorders. We give them a safe place for them to come and express themselves and to be who they are and let them kind of grow, but our park's been taken from us."

Adams and another member, Tiffanie Meagher, said they are looking for another spot to host Amtgard while but it is difficult to find a spot large enough to host

the group.

"It's a little concerning to not have a park. I know a lot of people use Amtgard for catharsis therapy, a way to get out, and a way to meet people," Meagher said. "It's kind of like a second church and kind of like a second home to a lot of us - it's like a family to a lot of us.'

Mayor Gary Chumley said that the park will not open until it is deemed safe for citizens.

"How long that will be I don't know," Chumley said. "This is not the first time it's flooded. We still have not repaired the damage that occurred in 2018 in that flooding."

Former City Manager

Scott Albert, who was interviewed by The Messenger before his resignation on May 14, said city officials will meet with a stormwater engineer next week to assess the flood damage and

determine the necessary

recovery steps. "Additionally, we will discuss options for requesting financial assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA) and the Texas Department of Emergency Management (TDEM) to help with repairs in the park,"

Albert said. In December 2023, the Gatesville City Council voted to move forward on an agreement with engineering and consulting firm, Frees and Nichols, to perform an initial assessment of the damaged riverbank from the 2018 floods.

Albert said the upcoming assessment will determine how the city will repair the park after both flood events.

"The proposed assessment will primarily document the damage to the park and determine the most effective strategy for the city to seek financial assistance in repairing the park following both the recent and the 2018 flooding

events," Albert said.
In 2020, the city received a \$1.3 million grant from FEMA to repair Faunt Le Roy Park. Due to concerns about how the park would stand against future floods after repairs, the city chose to designate a portion of the funds toward the development of a new park across from the Gatesville Fitness Center, according to previous coverage by The Messenger.

"We can go to Freedom Park or Raby, and we're looking into those. But that's our home park, so we would like to have that back," Meagher said.

Hunt recalls eclipse event to Lions Club

Gatesville Police Chief Brad Hunt, who has been in law enforcement for 29 years, recently spoke to the Gatesville Lions Club about the force's involvement during the recent eclipse.

"I was hired as the chief of police in February, and it was not part of the incoming process to talk about the eclipse, and about two weeks after I got here, Cheri Shepherd let me get settled in my office and then said, 'Hey you, have you heard about the eclipse?' We started planning from there." Hunt said that, without Cheri's help, some of the

planning would have fallen on his shoulders.

"First, we had a lot of positive press coverage, there was a lot of Gatesville news out by KWTX, KXXV, and The Gatesville Messenger – those were the main three - and when I was looking at coming to Gatesville back in January and you would do a Google search of Gatesville, there was a hospital explosion, a flood, and a convict that escaped from the sheriff's office, and that's what the news was about in Gatesville," he said.

In comparison, Hunt pointed out, "Now, if you do that same search for Gatesville, it would be

that there were 62 stories in a ten-minute search about the eclipse and what Gatesville has done or did do about the eclipse - a lot of positive stories out of that." Hunt continued, "So, to me, that was the word about our town out there. What I found out since is that this is a close-knit community and a very giving community."

During the eclipse, Hunt reported that Gatesville had visitors from 30 states and 19 countries, including Amsterdam, Brazil, Bulgaria, Canada, Columbia, Ireland, and Japan to name a few. "Personally, I met dozens and dozens of people over that weekend

from all over the world. My own relatives came in from South Carolina. Every single person that I encountered had nothing but positive things to say

about Gatesville.' Hunt said the visitors were not only pleased about the event and how the preparations were made in advance, but also who the people were in the community and their friendliness. "So, I'm now so proud to be a part of a community that's like that," he said.

After what could be considered a life-long commitment to his community, Ronald Medart recently stepped down as president of the Pearl Community Center and his involvement with the Pearl Bluegrass event, which has taken place each month since

Medart, age 87, was born and raised in the Pearl community of Coryell County. He attended

school at Pearl and graduated with the class of 1955 - walking across the very same stage to receive his diploma where he recently received a certificate of appreciation for his years of devotion to the Pearl

Community Center and the Bluegrass Festival.

After the school closed, the building sat vacant for a few years before it was decided that it would be used for class and family reunions.

"Well, we started re-doing the building in January of 1997, and then, in October of 1997, we started having music," Medart said. "We finally decided to have Blue Grass itself and we sent out notices to have everyone start coming to Pearl, and the first time they showed up, we had a fairly good crowd in 1997," Medart said.

As years went by, the Pearl Bluegrass Festival began to blossom as word spread across the state and into neighboring states. "This auditorium will seat about 275, and, sometimes, when a certain band would be here, there would be 50 or 60 lined up around the walls," he said.

As the popularity of the monthly event grew, Medart knew that "Pearl had something to offer."

Upon his retirement as president of the community center's board of directors. Medart said. "I've enjoyed it. I'll enjoy it as I continue to come up here every month. Like I've said, if you don't have anything to enjoy tomorrow, you've got to enjoy something you do the rest of your life, and I enjoy this. I plan on playing my guitar more and now I can go in the practice rooms and play more."







John Campbell's adventures around the world

ohn Campbell, of Austin, started his professional career on a high note. "My actual first job was at the White House," says John. He went there after graduating from Tulane with degrees in biology and sociol-

ogy.

A professor helped him get a job as part of a panel to research global hunger and health. "And then there

was the International Year of the Child in 1979," says John, "when I was asked to create a presidential commission on the issues of children."

Still in his twenties, he got a job with the United Nations. "So much of this is just out of the blue. My father told me just before he died to do something to make the world a better place. Those words set the course for my life, and I've tried to do that. He experienced some genuine horror. He was a prisoner of war for three years during World War Two and toured Nagasaki after the bomb was dropped on that city."

John spent thirty years with The National Academy of Sciences. "I organized international conferences on various topics in Istanbul, New Delhi, Tokyo, and places like that.'

He had tea with the emperor and empress of Japan. "They were exceedingly genuine and wonderful people, and I had a good visit with them over tea. Months later I ran into them at a meeting. They were in a line greeting guests, and when the empress saw me she walked over to me, grabbed my hand and said, 'Oh, Mr. Campbell, we're so excited to see you again. How was your trip to Kyoto?' Everybody around me just stared at me and wondered how I knew the empress."

Once he rode around Tiananmen Square in Beijing in a car that had a special license plate. "The police could not stop the driver for any infraction apparently. He floored the car and drove as fast as he could through all the back streets. When we got to Tiananmen Square he illegally just barreled through the barricades and drove around while Cher was blasting from the CD player. He put the windows down and just entertained whoever was around during this wild ride. I'll never forget that night."

John is a certified world traveler. Once he was detained at the airport in Frankfurt when they looked at his passport and discovered he had been to several countries in a short amount of time. "A young officer made me take off my shirt and shoes and he did a body search. About an hour later, they released me after being convinced I was not a terrorist."

John has had an incredible life and met some significant people. In 1990, he arranged a meeting of world leaders to discuss the future. He says it would be hard to do that today.

He came to Texas to work with a blue-ribbon committee to study the status of universities in the state. Retired now, he recently spent a few months going through his photos and journals and produced a book for his family and friends titled "Offbeat Tales." He finished the book on his seventy-fifth birthday.



The hand that was left behind

Strolling through the oldest section of the Gatesville City Cemetery, visitors sometimes notice very ornate tombstones as well as small inexpensive stones. People are often captivated by the information carved into the memorials... "gone but not forgotten" is an epitaph often seen. Other messages might include poetry or Bible verses.

Not too far from the cemetery entrance, in the old part of the cemetery, is a small tombstone which has a hand on it. Upon closer observation, one can make out the word "amputation."

In years past, when peo-

ple would lose body parts to amputation, whether for health reasons or accidents, it was custom to give the body part a proper burial and, often, a gravestone was erected at the site. In some parts of the United States, it was the law for amputated limbs to be disposed of by burial.

Perhaps the most famous limb that was buried is that of Confederate General Stonewall Jackson who lost his arm while in battle in 1863. Jackson's soldiers gave his arm a proper burial and then erected a granite marker at the grave site which read, "Arm of Stonewall Jackson, May 3,

Returning to the hand burial in Gatesville City Cemetery, the amputated hand belonged to that of 38-year-old Wiley Osburn Redford. How he lost his hand has faded with history, but the tombstone reflects amputation of his hand and the simple date of Feb. 1, 1898. It is not known if a "proper funeral" was held, but the grave was marked with a tombstone.

Redford married Martha Drew in 1884 in Coryell County and was the father of at least five children. Census records reflect that he was a "traveling welder."

After losing his hand, Redford and his family left Gatesville and eventually settled in Liberty Hill in Williamson County.

Redford died in 1946 at the age of 86.

There are some theories about why people buried their amputated limbs. In the past, it was reported that some Christians believed that at the time of resurrection, they would want their bodies to be whole again. In some cases, the person would be buried next to the grave that held their appendage. This was not the case with Wiley Redford - he was buried in Liberty Hill, while his hand remains in Gatesville.



GRMELA SALSA

1 gal. canned tomatoes 12 Torridor peppers * 1 c. chopped onions ¼ c. liquid from peppers 2 T. cilantro

2 T. Tony's Cajun Seasoning 2 tsp. garlic salt

Drain tomatoes, reserving tomato juice. Remove stems from peppers. In a blender, finely chop tomatoes, onions, peppers, and cilantro. Add spices and liquid from peppers. Check for taste and if you feel that it is too hot, add a little of the tomato juice. After flavors meld, it may be a little hotter than right after it is made. Refrigerate. This recipe can be adjusted to taste - remove seeds from the

peppers or add less Tony's to reduce the heat, add more or less onion, cilantro, or any of the spices to suit your *Torridor peppers are also called Santa Fe peppers.

They are usually found with the pickles, banana peppers, etc., rather than with the jalapenos. You may need to purchase two jars to get 12 peppers.

Look twice for motorcycles during Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month

As more motorcyclists hit the roads to enjoy the warmer weather, taking an extra moment to double check for them can save a life.

Motorcycles are not only smaller and harder to spot, but they also do not contain most of the safety features found in other vehicles. Nearly 600 people riding motorcycles were killed in crashes in Texas last year, and more than 2,400 riders were seriously injured, according to a press release by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

One of those motorcyclists was Al Peterson, a husband and father of three children, who nearly died last May when another driver turned left in front of him while riding his motorcycle in Austin.

"By the time they pulled out in front of me, I didn't have any time to react in any way - tap my break, accelerate, swerve, nothing," Peterson said. "So, I ran into the side of the vehicle when they pulled out in front of me.

Peterson was thrown over the vehicle and landed around 20 yards from his motorcycle.

"The vehicle then parked on top of my leg and was parked there until first responders were able to come and pick the vehicle up off my leg and get me loaded onto the ambulance," Peterson said.

The crash left him with damaged organs, broken bones, eating, drinking, and breathing through a tube, and other severe

internal injuries. He remained in the hospital for nine weeks and in a medically induced coma for two weeks.

"It's a miracle that I am still alive, and I am still one of thousands of Texas motorcyclists who are seriously injured or killed on the roads each year,' Peterson said. "Drivers need to slow down and use extra caution when making left turns and



Gatesville throttles Caldwell to advance to regional quarterfinals

Flooding rains came Thursday and washed a game away. Then a flood of runs came Saturday and washed the Caldwell Hornets away.

After dropping a delayed game one 3-2, Gatesville beat Caldwell 13-3 and then 11-0 on May 11 to capture their second straight area championship and roll into the regional quarterfinals where a familiar foe stands in the way of Gatesville baseball history

"At the beginning of the season, we talked about expectations for this season and we knew that what we had been building with the guys we have wasn't just a one year flash in a pan type thing. I think you could ask every one of those guys if they expected to win the first round even when we weren't picked to win, and they would say yes," said head coach Chase Smith.

The three-game series with Caldwell was originally scheduled to feature a double-header at Live Oak's Falcon Park on May 9 with a third game to be played in Caldwell if necessary on May 10. But severe storms in Waco delayed the series opener, and then a bizarre weather-related field issue ultimately suspended it.

After starter Gehrig Keeton retired Coy Becka to end the top half of the third inning, lightning in the area caused a 2 hour

and 41-minute rain delay. Fans and players were forced to leave the stadium as torrential rains fell for most of the delay.

When play resumed, Caldwell starter Shane Clements began to throw his warmup pitches but struggled to get solid footing on the wet turf. Clements, a tall right-hander with a big stride, found his front foot slipping on each pitch.

Gatesville head coach Chase Smith, Caldwell skipper Kyle Toney, the umpiring crew, and Live Oak game administrators spent approximately twenty minutes debating whether the field was playable. The lengthy mound conference saw Keeton come out and test the mound, Live Oak staff wiping the mound with a dry towel, then Clements throwing several more warmup pitches with little improvement. The game was then suspended due to the unsafe nature of the field.

On the surface, a suspense of the game would have seemed to benefit Caldwell as Clements had only thrown 23 pitches and would be fresh for a third game. Whether the mound issue was genuinely unsafe or allowed for a bit of gamesmanship was irrelevant to Smith.

"I think it was a little of both. I told our guys after the umpires made the decision it was unsafe to play that we weren't going to

make excuses or get frustrated with things we can't control. We would show up ready to play wherever whenever, and I think those guys have adopted that attitude and don't let all that affect them," he

The decision was made to finish game one in Caldwell on May 10, then play a double-header in Salado on May 11. Gatesville opened the continuation of game one with John Ibarra on the mound while Caldwell countered with their No. 2 starter Colby Maresh.

Caldwell scored a run in the top of the fourth to take a 3-0 lead before Gatesville scored twice in the bottom of the fifth to cut the deficit to 3-2.

Justin Johnson opened the inning with a single then scored on a Lawson Mooney single to make it 3-1. Miles Tull scored on a balk by Maresh to make the score 3-2. Gatesville got the tying run on in the seventh when Tull walked, but he was stranded, and the Hornets dropped the opener.

Despite the loss, Smith had no concerns about his team's ability to climb out of the 0-1 series hole.

"I told them after we made the last out how good I felt about the next two games and I think they all expected to win Saturday, and those guys showed up more focused than ever," he said.

For starters, he knew

his team had not played their brand of baseball as they walked eight batters and committed an error in game one. They committed three errors in the game two win.

"It is very rare for us to walk eight guys and make three errors in a game. That was just a rare occurrence, and, luckily, we were able to still come out on top. Those guys know that's not what has made us successful, and that those mistakes had to be cleaned up.," Smith said. "We know to be successful we can't give out free passes and make errors like that. It's nice to have our offense be able to make up for the miscues in game two."

With Clements set to start game three, the Hornets pounced on Caldwell in what amounted to a bullpen game scoring eight times in the first inning despite just three hits in the frame. They drew two walks and picked up a pair of runs on a Caldwell error.

"We had the opportunity to see three of their best arms in the first game and we still had three of our best four arms ready for games two and three. I thought we were deeper when it comes to pitching and would have the advantage on the mound for both games two and three.

Bralen Veazey started game two for Gatesville and allowed just one earned run in five innings of work. He struck out seven and gave up just two hits. The win moves Veazey to 8-1 on the year and gave him the 20th win of his career. He is one win shy of tying the program record of 21 set by Darwin Lucero from 2003-06.

Clayton Gregory paced the Gatesville offense in the game two win going 2-for-2 with a walk, a run scored, and an RBI. In the series, Gregory was 3-6 with four walks and was hit by a pitch. He reached base in eight of his 11 plate appearances.

"Gregory has been consistent and has come up with some big hits for us. I think he likes the big moments, which has made him so good in that closer role and five-hole for us, especially late in games in pressure situations." said Smith.

Gatesville also got tremendous production from their leadoff man Tull and the nine-hole hitter John-

Tull hit .429 in the series and scored six runs. He's hitting a torrid .455 in the playoffs. He turned in a 2-for-3 performance with two walks and two runs scored in the series finale. "He has made a couple


slight adjustments at the plate that have really helped him out. He has such a good eye at the plate, too, and doesn't swing at balls. I think that



"He was so great on the mound. He was able to locate his fastball and get his curveball over and keep them really off balance at the plate. He has been getting in his bullpens all year and, even though he hasn't had to pitch a ton for us this vear, he was ready to go and did an awesome job," said Smith. "I think one thing we learned from last year's playoff run is that it takes more than two pitchers to win - especially in a series and our backend guys have worked hard and have been ready to go on the mound.

It was James' second dominant start of the year against Caldwell. He threw a two-hit complete game in a 7-1 win over the Hornets on March 18. He has allowed four hits and one run in 14 innings pitched against Caldwell this year.

Gatesville will face district foe Salado in the regional quarterfinals. The Hornets beat the Eagles 2-1 on March 16, then fell at home in the rematch 3-1. Salado features outstanding ace Logan Flores who struck out 12 Hornets in the win on March

The series will be played at Lake Belton and will be a bit of a homecoming for Flores who played for Lake Belton for two years before transferring to Salado prior to his junior season. It will also be a farewell as realignment has moved Salado to District 24-4A for the next two years.

A win would put Gatesville in the regional semifinals for the first time in program history. Despite the familiarity and existing rivalry and the potential for program history, Smith has seen nothing different from his team in the run up to the

Texan Baseball ends 2024 season at home with Senior Day win over Utah Valley in series finale

STEPHENVILLE - Tarleton State Baseball split the second day of the series with the Wolverines, closing out the Texans' home campaign in the win column the weekend of May10-12.

Tarleton State (26-26, 16-11 WAC) finished the final home series against Utah Valley (27-26, 17-10 WAC) 1-1 on the Saturday evening. Game 2 saw a 11-7 final in favor of the visitors, but the Texans took the final game of the series and last home game of the season with a 9-4 final.

A weekend of bad weather welcomed 17-plus hours of baseball for the three-game series as weather delays came pouring in. The double header lasted 10-and-a-half hours from start to finish.

GAME 2

Matt Haley (L, 2-8) got the start for the Purple and White with 3.0 innings pitched, giving up eight runs on five hits, four walks and two strikeouts.

Jackson Thomas started on the mound for Utah Valley with 2.1 innings pitched, giving up five runs on four hits, three walks and one strikeout. Robby Butenschoen (W, 5-0) saw 4.1 innings on the bump, giving up two runs on three hits, one walk and one strikeout. Eli Sundquist (S,1) earned his first save after a 2.1 inning outing, giving up no runs on one hit, no walks and five strikeouts.

Tarleton State closed out the first game of the day with a total of seven runs on eight hits with a home run from Cole Miears for his seventh of the season. Sergio Guerra added a triple for the Texans while Hunter Smith, Kooper Shook and Slade McCloud each tallied doubles for the home team.

The Wolverines compiled 11 runs on 13 hits with



UVU got back to work at the plate in the fourth with two runs scored. A pair of walks opened the inning for the guys in green. An RBI double tallied the seventh run and another walk followed. The inning's five-hole reached on a fielder's choice and an error from the Texans saw another run pinned for the Wolverines, unearned.

In the bottom of the sixth Shook walked and stole second to kick off the inning. With one out tallied and Shook on third, a flyout from Ike Shirey brought in the sixth run for Tarleton State.

The visitors' half of the seventh welcomed in another

run. With one out recorded, a double was followed by an RBI single to continue the Wolverines' reign. Tarleton State got to work in the bottom of the seventh with a lone run tallied to stay on pace with the visitors. Hammonds was hit by a pitch to lead off the inning. Tosti wins gold in triple jump, 21 Texans medal at 2024 WAC Outdoor Track and Field Championships

FINAL RESULTS

OREM, Utah - After three days in which high winds, rain, lightning and sun almost all appeared on each day, Tarleton State Track and Field closed out the event with Gabriele Tosti becoming the WAC Champion in the triple jump and 21 total medals claimed by the Texans at the 2024 WAC Outdoor Track and Field Championships at the Hal Wing Track and Field May 9-11.

Both the men's and the women's squads posted higher team finishes than a year ago in Nacogdoches. The men improved to sixth with 76 points after a seventhplace performance in 2023. The women's team recorded 61 points earning sixth place as well, improving from 11th last season.

MEN

Tosti won the gold medal in the triple jump, the lone gold performance of the three days. Tosti's best jump of 51 feet, 7 inches, was nearly two feet farther than the second place competitor. Jaden Hall also qualified for the finals in the event, placing seventh with a best jump of 47 feet, 10 inches.

Hugo Menin broke his program record in the $400\,$ hurdles, becoming the first to post a sub-50 time. His 49.99-second run earned the silver medal, separated from the champion, GCU's Daviciea McCartney by thousandths of a second.

Justin Raines earned a pair of silver medals in the 100 and 200. Raines opened the day in the 100, posting a 10.43 after running a 10.20 in the preliminaries, his personal best and the third fastest in program history. The reigning 200-meter champ was edged in the final meters to earn the silver in 20.85 seconds. Reid Vincent earned fourth in the 100 in 10.54 to post a pair of Texans in the top four of the

Caterrin Cox and Konnor Hoerman teamed up to give the Texans another secondfourth finish. Cox earned his first WAC medal finish in the 110-meter hurdles crossing in 13.82 seconds. Hoeman was not far behind claiming fourth in 14.13.

Kevin Baez earned a sixth place finish in the 1500. The distance runner ran a 3:49.04 in the morning then attempted to run the 5k just an hour after. Baez will graduate after spending the past six seasons donning a Texan uniform.

In the field, Davi Torres completed his record-breaking weekend with a medalist finish in the high jump. Torres' best jump of 6-7.5

earned him the bronze medal in the open high jump. He finished in ninth after the first two days in the decathlon. Among the decathletes, he posted the best high jump and recorded nearly the same jump in the open finals. Ethan Bratton earned a fifth place finish in the discus. The senior placed fifth for the second straight year, this year with a best throw of 161-10.5. Jaxson Bray recorded an eighth place finish in the pole vault with a best height of 15-8.25.

WOMEN

The women's squad was able to collect multiple medalist finishes as well. The women's team earned a pair of both silver and bronze medals on the final day as

Kassidy Kirkpatrick placed fifth, Jourdaine Cerenil notched sixth and Jordan Rae was slotted eighth with a best jump of 5 feet, 5 inches.

On Friday, Morgan Lamberson earned the Texans' first medal of the 2024 championships, with a bronze in the 3000-meter steeplechase. Lamberson

crossed in 10:56.07, exhausting all her energy.

Taylor McFarland earned a pair of podium finishes in the 200 and 400. In the 400, McFarland finished fourth in 54.42 seconds. She was followed closely by Aaliyah Rifort-Delem who finished in fifth in 54.98. She concluded her day with a fifth place finish in the 200, crossing in

Rese Schoonover earned her first podium finish, slotting in eighth in the 400-meter hurdles. She crossed in

Tarleton earned a pair of medals in the relays. The Texans opened the day with a silver medal in the 4x100

relay in 44.70. The squad consisting of Davis, Anayah Copeland, Amandine Estival and Cameron earned the women's first silver of the WAC Championships. The ladies closed the day with a bronze finish in the 4x400 as well. Both relays set new program records with the 4x400 crossing in 3:41.35 consisting of Rifort-Delem, Estival, Alessa King and McFarland.

The pair of sixth-place finishes closed the Texans' 2024 campaign. The Texans' are expected to complete their Division I reclassification July 1, 2024, making future Texans eligible for the NCAA Championships next season.





Retired School Personnel (CRSP) held its last meeting of the 2022-2024 term Thursday, April 25, at Ranchers' Steakhouse at 10 a.m.

Delegates to the state convention in Corpus Christi April 15-17 were Gail Johnson, JoAnn Sugg, and Gayla and Gerald Linton. They gave a brief report on information shared by our state organization regarding membership, number of COLAs and stipends given out (first cost-of-living increase for retired school personnel in about 20 years), the stability of TRS, and plans to redesign the TRS website in mid-2024. In 2017, TRS Care was in trouble, and some difficult decisions had to be made to save it. Currently, TRS

Care is in good shape. In May 2024, TRS will recommend the board open up enrollment for the Medicare Advantage TRS program for 2025-2026. Members can re-enroll. Then, at the July 2024 meeting, TRS will recommend lower premiums in the future. Statewide total of community volunteer hours in 2023 was 5,133,446 hours (our chapter donated 83,968 hours). Statewide, TRTA members distributed 141,582 books through the Children's Book Project (our chapter's total was 32,315 books). New state officers were installed for the next two years.

The program was presented by Emily Wuenschel PA-C. She was a 2010 graduate of Gatesville High School and an honor graduate of Temple College, where she played softball. She

continued her education at Texas State University in San Marcos and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology and a minor in biochemistry. She holds a Master of Physician Assistant from the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston and was an interprofessional scholar. Wuenschel enjoys helping patients, coaching softball and hiking. She loves spending time with her husband, Matthew, and daughter. She is the daughter of Tom and Mary Anne Leib and the granddaughter of Bill and the late Ollie Loggins.

Wuenschel's program on "Health and Wellness" covered several topics. First, she discussed preventative measures older people can use, such as vaccines for COVID, shingles, pneumonia, and flu. There are other tests your doctor can recommend to help detect problems you or he may suspect, such as regular mammograms and colonoscopies (cancer detection), bone density tests (for osteoporosis), etc. Secondly, there are measures you can take to make your house safer and prevent falls. This could include installation of handrails for porches or steps and in showers; providing adequate lighting on stairways, in darker areas of the house, and outside; removing or relocating throw rugs. Physical therapy is also available to help strengthen muscles and improve difficulties involving walking and balance. Thirdly, make use of your free wellness checks with your primary doctor. This is a time when you

can ask questions about problems and concerns you may have. Use this time to discuss new (or old) issues that are bothering you. If your doctor doesn't know what problems you may be having, he cannot help you. And lastly, be careful with medications you may be using. Some medications have bad side effects just by themselves; others can cause problems by the way they interact with other medications you are using. The pharmacist and your doctor can help you with these reactions, some of which may be very bad, or even fatal. Wuenschel also mentioned that patients should have an advanced directive drawn up, with a copy provided to the hospital, your doctor and your family.
