Former Gatesville resident killed in fatal wreck on Highway 84

A head-on vehicle crash that took place east of Gatesville on the evening of June 3 left one passenger dead, according to a Texas Department of Public Safety crash report.

The incident occurred around 9:25 p.m., at the 12,000 block of U.S. Highway 84. A 38-year-old man from Carlsbad, New Mexico was traveling westbound in a 2016 Subaru Crosstrek SUV. His vehicle then crossed into the eastbound lane, colliding head on with a 2022 Mitsubishi Outlander SUV that was driven by a 69-year-old woman from Gatesville.

The Mitsubishi also contained one passenger who Texas DPS identified as 50-year-old Crystal Anne Nagle from Clifton, formerly of Gatesville. Nagle was pronounced deceased at the scene, and their next of kin have been notified.

The driver of the Subaru admitted to having fallen asleep while driving, Texas DPS said in the report.

The crash investigation is still active and open. Results of a blood analysis are pending for the driver of the Subaru. The wreck led to an approximately two-hour

closure on Highway 84, according to a Facebook post by the Coryell County Sheriff's Office.

Texas DPS reminds drivers of the dangers of fatigued driving, which greatly increases the risk of being involved in a traffic crash.

"Additionally, the sheriff's office does not and will not call anyone to tell you that you have a warrant," the sheriff's office said on Facebook. "Please do not give anyone you do not trust any financial information and do not send anyone money or gift card information over the phone."



Second blow hits Pecan Grove Baptist

Pecan Grove Baptist Church, located in rural Coryell County and built in 1929, has experienced numerous floods over the years from the raging waters of nearby Coryell Creek, and this year has been no exception. The 95-year-old structure was once again flooded during the evening hours of Saturday, May 5.

Heavy rain caused a historic rise in Coryell Creek, which flows next to the church, which often uses the usually tranquil creek for baptisms.

Following the tragic flooding on May 5, Pastor Jeff Huckeby said that it was quite a shock to see how much damage was done to the interior of the church.

At that time, Huckeby said, "We're not sure how long the restoration of the church will take and when we can start using the building again, but we do have a large tabernacle we can use until then." His hopes of using the tabernacle for worship services were to be short-lived.

"We talked about having services under the tabernacle, but realized it was still very muddy down there," he said. Since restoration work on the building was progressing, it was decided that the congregation would hold services at the Oglesby Community Building until repair work was completed on the historic church.

Another blow came a few weeks later. Huckeby reported that since the May 5th flooding, Coryell Creek has come out of its banks at least twice, and that the ground surrounding the church was completely saturated.

Huckeby said that in the early morning hours of May 31, sometime between 3 and 3:30 a.m., a thunderstorm with high winds blew through the area and uprooted a large pecan tree on the grounds of the church. "It was the largest pecan tree on the church property, and it fell on and crushed one corner of our historic tabernacle," he said.

Huckeby continued, "One cedar corner post, approximately 10 inches in diameter that was set in concrete, was driven approximately three feet into the ground after taking the brunt of the tree trunk as it fell. The huge branches crushed the entire south side of the tabernacle. Branches on the opposite side of the tree sheared off large branches on another large pecan tree next to it."

Huckeby said that the century old tabernacle, which pre-dates the construction of the actual church, was built in the mid-to-late 1890's. Minute books of the church reference the tabernacle with other congregations as early as 1889, but the word "tabernacle" itself didn't appear in the church minutes until 1890. The tabernacle served several congregations in the area, both Baptist and Methodist.

Huckeby reported that the church is now mostly dried out, and that they hope repair work to the structure will be completed in the next four to eight weeks. "The entire electrical system is being replaced, and once that is finished, the two heating and air conditioning systems have to be replaced, and the walls and floors will be repaired and repainted," he said.

"Repairs to the historic tabernacle will have to wait until after we get the church repaired."

World's largest Cybertruck meetup held in Gatesville

If you were out driving around Gatesville or the Central Texas area on Sunday, you might have caught a glimpse of one or more Tesla Cybertrucks.

A Cybertruck Rodeo, which is considered the world's largest meetup of Cybertrucks, recently came to Gatesville. Hundreds of owners and enthusiasts gathered at the Dove Nest Motorsports Club of Central Texas on June 2 to participate in a variety of activities as well as view and drive the Tesla trucks.

Hosted by the Tesla Owners Club of Austin, the meetup started with a Cybertruck caravan that departed from the Tesla Supercharger in Temple. According to the event page, the event included test drives and tutorials, live music, giveaways, and a light show with Cybertrucks. It also featured demonstrations with the infamous "Not-a-Flamethrower" from Elon Musk's

The Boring Company. "We had somewhere between 200 to 250 guests and 50 Cybertrucks, a DJ, barbeque, a few panel discussions, and obviously a flame thrower, and people got to try their hand driving their trucks off road through mud and over rocks," said Matt Holm, president of the Tesla Owners Club of Austin. "It was a blast."

The purpose of the event was to make history by becoming the world's largest gathering of Cybertrucks at one venue.

The Cybertruck is an electric truck built by Tesla that contains shatter-resistant glass and a stainless-steel exoskeleton that helps reduce dents, damage, and longterm corrosion, according to the Tesla website. It also includes off-road capabilities, a towing capacity of 11,000 pounds, and advanced technology features.

Tesla released the first Cybertruck in November 2023 after unveiling the design in 2019. The trucks can cost up to \$100,000.

FROM MY FRONT PORCH Expectations of summer have changed

omething has changed in me. An essential, fundamental belief I held for years has morphed into something new.

The change was slow yet seemingly relentless. I would have never thought my feelings about such a fundamental and important part of my life could be modified. Yet here I am experiencing the first week of June, and there can be no question that my basic view of the world has changed. Surprisingly, my love of summer has diminished.

Don't get me wrong, I do not hate summer. It is not my intent to move to Alaska or Alberta, where I can experience mild days and cool nights during summer and then live through the dark cold of winter. I have never been a snow/ cold weather person. My confusion is about why my attitude toward summer has changed.

As an elementary school student, I could not wait until the last day of school. My buddies and I would take our shirts off and, with a few exceptions, not put them back on until school started again in the fall. We would swim, play baseball, invent kids' games like soccey — a combination of soccer and hockey where you could kick, throw, or strike the ball into the goal using your hands, feet, or a hockey stick. If the game sounds chaotic, it was, and that is what made playing soccey in the heat of summer so much fun.

During the summer, my friends and I might start the day off with a game of catch while dissecting the results of the MLB game the night before. Eventually, we would wander to the pool where we would swim, dive, dunk each other, and chance a quick glance at one of the young female lifeguards. After the pool, we might grab a Coke and sit on the stone fence outside the drug store, sipping our drinks and talking about the many things in life we did not understand, or had not yet experienced.

Usually, about an hour before dinner time, we would head home and check in with our moms. The matriarchs of our family had not missed us during the day. They knew where we were and basically what we were doing. Our only obligation was to be home for dinner.

After eating our evening meal, it was back outside for the continuation of the nightly kickball game. This sporting event had been going on for weeks. It started right after dinner and continued until it was too dark to see. The game never ended, it simply went on and on. The joy was to play, not to worry about a final score.

Through all these days' events, the sun would beat down on us without mercy. We never thought about staying inside because it was "too hot" to play. There were no video games for us to play or movie channels for us to watch, because the technology had not yet been invented. Even if electronic games had been invented, I am not sure they would have interfered with our love of being outside in the sun, basking in the heat.

With each day of summer our tans got darker. We were not troubled with regular applications of sunscreen. Science had yet to explain to mothers that skin exposed to large doses of sun could create skin cancer. In fact, the girls of the neighborhood would coat themselves in baby oil so their skin could get even darker and leathery. The sun was a way of life. Growing older never changed my love for summer. I would haul hay, work in the oilfield, or work livestock, and it seemed like the sun was always shining brightly. Well into my 50s I would work outside for 10 to 12 hours, and, while I would certainly feel warm, I was never deterred by the heat of summer.

If not at work, I might be at the lake skiing, on the golf course, or working outside in the yard. The sun was like an old friend. It comforted my soul and let me feel as warm on the inside as I did on the outside.

At this point in my life, something has changed. I no longer work outside doing manual labor in the heat. I cannot tell you the last time I had the time or made the effort to spend a day at the lake. I stopped playing golf years ago after an injury to my back, and playing soccey with the neighborhood kids is simply a memory which will not be relived.

Now, I realize for the next 100 days we will be sentenced to the Purgatory of summer heat. Of course, the number of days could be longer, but it is hard to imagine any time before mid-September when the temperature will be down into the 70s and 80s. We will experience a relentless daily grind of excessive heat, no rain, no cool breeze, and no relief from the drudgery of summer. The conversations in offices, cafes, and on the sidewalk will be of a community ready for cooler weather.

I never thought it would happen. But my friend, the summer sun and I have grown apart. We have fond memories of each other and still have moments of casual connection where we smile at each other and pass a wink or a smile, but we will never have the same intimate relationship we once had. Time changes all things.

HOW TO DOCUMENT FLOOD LOSSES

If you've suffered excessive livestock death losses and grazing or feed losses due to recent floods, you may be eligible for disaster assistance programs through the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA).

The Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) offers payments to you for livestock death losses in excess of normal mortality due to adverse weather and the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) provides emergency relief for losses due to feed or water shortages, disease, adverse weather, or other conditions, which Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Department of Natural Resources, or other sources to substantiate eligible death losses due to an eligible loss condition;

• Documentation that livestock were removed from grazing pastures due to an eligible adverse weather or loss condition;

• Costs of transporting livestock feed to eligible livestock, such as receipts for equipment rental fees for hay lifts, and snow removal;

• Feed purchase receipts if feed supplies or grazing pastures are destroyed;

For more information on these programs and documentation requirements, contact your Coryell County USDA Service Center at 254-865-7012 ext. 2, or visit fsa.usda. gov/disaster. This personalized assistance provides producers with the science-based data and tools to make informed decisions about where to target efforts to get the greatest return on their investment and ensure the long-term sustainability of American agriculture.

are not adequately addressed by other disaster programs.

To participate in LIP, you will be required to provide verifiable documentation of death losses resulting from an eligible adverse weather event, and you must complete and submit the notice of loss to FSA no later than the annual program payment application date, which is 60 calendar days following the program year in which the loss occurred. To participate in ELAP. vou must submit a notice of loss to your local FSA office no later than the annual program application deadline of January 30 following the program year in which the loss occurred and should maintain documentation and receipts.

You should record all pertinent information regarding livestock losses due to the eligible adverse weather or loss condition, including:

• Documentation of the number, kind, type, and weight range of livestock that have died, supplemented if possible by photographs or video records of ownership and losses;

• Rendering truck receipts by kind, type, and weight - important to document prior to disposal;

TWDB state flood planning bill passed

In 2019, the Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 8 directing the creation of the first-ever state flood plan for Texas. Statute requires that all recommended flood mitigation projects be ranked in the state flood plan. The 15 Regional Flood Planning Groups (RFPG), designated by the TWDB in 2020, submitted regional flood plans in Jan. 2023, and submitted their amended regional flood plans to TWDB on July 14th, 2023. The TWDB approved the 15 amended regional flood plans on March 5th, 2024. The approved regional flood plans are incorporated into a single state flood plan.

The TWDB is currently in the process of generating Texas's first state flood plan to be delivered to the Legislature by Sept. 1, 2024. The state flood planning process will continue to recur in five-year cycles.

uth Ann Hattori, marketing director of the Nimitz Museum in Fredericksburg says the enclosed Japanese garden there is a lovely place to contemplate anything in your life you wish to think about.

The museum is named for Admiral Chester A. Nimitz who commanded the U.S. Navy during World War II.

The official name of the Museum is National Museum of the Pacific War. The museum houses a library, exhibits, and artifacts that attract visitors as well as students and scholars of World War II from all over the world.

The Japanese garden is located behind the museum. "This garden is a gift

from the people of Japan, and one of their gestures of friendship with the United States post war was to create this garden for us.'

The garden is genuinely authentic.

"It has Koi ponds, and we do have Koi fish here in the pond. All the different plants and trees are authentic. The types of rocks and arrangements of all the elements follow in the tradition of Japanese gardens. We have a gardener here who is trained in maintain-



ing Japanese gardens. She rakes the gravel or the sand every day in a particular pattern prescribed for that form of garden."

The garden has audio commentary, which explains some history of the garden. This is a sample: "The Peace Garden incorporates two classic Japanese designs. The first is a waterfall, pond, trees and a stream representing the river of life. The second is a stone garden with small rocks to represent the infinite ocean. The large rocks represent islands. In his last message to the Japanese people, Admiral Nimitz said the damage received by both sides was great, but with the passage of years, the wounds of war have healed, and, today, our countries have joined their hands in cooperation." The commentary is also in German and Spanish.

"It takes only a few minutes to wander around it," says Ruth Ann "but it's also a very reflective space."

Before World War II. Admiral Nimitz was a friend with the famous Admiral Togo of the Japanese Imperial Navy. After the war, because of the friendship, Admiral Nimitz was instrumental in preserving the Mikasa, the flagship of Togo's time in the Navy. It was going to be destroyed after the war, and Nimitz was able to help raise funds to make sure it would be restored. It is now a museum.

June is Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month

According to the Alzheimer's Association, June is Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month. The Alzheimer's Association offers 10 early signs and symptoms of Alzheimer's and Dementia. Memory loss that disrupts daily life may be a symptom of Alzheimer's or other dementia. Alzheimer's is a brain disease that causes a slow decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. There are 10 warning signs and symptoms. If you notice any of them, don't ignore them. Schedule an appointment with your doctor.

1 – Memory loss that disrupts daily life

One of the most common signs of Alzheimer's disease, especially in the early stage, is forgetting recently learned information. Others include forgetting important dates or events, asking the same questions over and over, and increasingly needing to rely on memory aids (e.g., reminder notes or electronic devices) or family members for things they used to handle on their own.

2 – Challenges in planning

or solving problems

Some people living with changes in their memory due to Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience changes in their ability to develop and follow a plan or work with numbers. They may have trouble following a familiar recipe or keeping track of monthly bills. They may have difficulty concentrating and take much longer to do things than they did before.

3 – Difficulty completing familiar tasks

People living with memory changes from Alzheimer's or other dementia often find it hard to complete daily tasks. Sometimes, they may have trouble driving to a familiar location, organizing a grocery list, or remembering the rules of a favorite game.

4 - Confusion with time or place

People living with Alzheimer's or other dementia can lose track of dates, seasons, and the passage of time. They may have trouble understanding something if it is not happening immediately. Sometimes, they may forget where they are or how they got there.

5 – Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships

Some people living with Alzheimer's or other dementia could experience vision changes. This may lead to difficulty with balance or trouble reading. They may also have problems judging distance and determining color or contrast, causing issues with driving.

6 – New Problems with words in speaking or writing

People living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may have trouble following or joining a conversation. They may stop in the middle of a conversation and have no idea how to continue or they may repeat themselves. They may struggle with vocabulary, have trouble naming a familiar object, or use the wrong name (e.g., calling a "watch" a "hand-clock").

7 – Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps

A person living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may put things in unusual places. They may lose things and be unable to go back over their steps to find them again. He or she may accuse others of

stealing, especially as the disease progresses.

8 – Decreased or poor judgement

Individuals living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience changes in judgment or decision-making. For example, they may use poor judgment when dealing with money or pay less attention to grooming or keeping themselves clean.

9 - Withdrawal from work or social activities

A person living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience changes in the ability to hold or follow a conversation. As a result, they may withdraw from hobbies, social activities, or other engagements. They may have trouble keeping up with a favorite team or activity.

10- Changes in mood and personality

Individuals living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience mood and personality changes. They can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful, or anxious. They may be easily upset at home, with friends, or when out of their comfort zone.

Shrimp gumbo

SHRIMP GUMBO **DOROTHY LOVELACE**

½ lb. shrimp
1 med. onion
1 red pepper
3 T. butter
1 T. bacon drippings
Polish sausage
1 c. shrimp broth
3 c. water

frozen okra tomatoes 1 sm. can of tomato sauce ¼ c. flour 1 tsp. gumbo filé hot pepper sauce salt & pepper to taste rice

Sauté onion and pepper in 3 tablespoons of butter and 1 tablespoon of bacon drippings. Preboil ½ lb. of shrimp for 6 minutes. Add polish sausage cut up and set aside. Boil 1 cup of shrimp broth and 3 cups of water with tomatoes and frozen okra. Simmer 6 minutes. Add shrimp, sausage, and cooked chicken or turkey if desired. Simmer for 30 minutes. May add 1 can of tomato sauce and flour to thicken. Add gumbo filé. Serve over hot rice. Additionally, you can boil smoked turkey bones until the meat falls off and use the broth as base for gumbo.

Texan Football slotted 19th in 2024 FCS Preseason Top 25 Rankings

Tarleton State University

STEPHENVILLE – Tarleton State will become a fullyfledged NCAA Division I program next season after successfully completing its four-year reclassification period, and Texan Football is projected to be a championship contender right away in its first opportunity at the playoffs.

The Texans were ranked in the top-20 in a prominent FCS preseason poll, slotted No. 19 in Craig Haley's 2024 FCS Football Preseason Top 25 Rankings on Opta Analyst.

Haley coordinates the Stats Perform national media poll that is used as one of two official rankings during the season. Projected to coordinate with 55 national voters next year, Haley will push this preseason poll for a basis in Stats Perform's official preseason rankings poll before the 2024 season.

In February, Haley pegged Tarleton State as having "the best chance (to make the playoffs) among the schools that are seeking their first FCS playoff bid in 2024."

Tarleton State has shined at the NCAA Division I level, posting four straight winning seasons and finishing with the third highest win-

ning percentage in a reclassification period since 2004 at .610 (25-16). Among all Texas D1 and D2 programs since 2018, the Texans own the best winning percentage in the state at .727 (48-18).

Last season, the Texans went 8-3 overall, 4-2 in conference play, finishing tied-second in the United Athletic Conference. They likely would have received an FCS playoff at-large bid, if eligible. Head coach Todd Whitten was named the UAC Coach of the Year after Tarleton had it going across all three phases in 2023. Offensively, the Texans were ranked first in the conference in yards per play (6.4, 11th most nationally), first in rush yards per game (201.7, 12th nationally), first in rush touchdowns (25, 16th nationally), second in points per game (33.3, 13th nationally), second in yards per game (430.5, 14th nationally) and second in yards per rush (5.2, 17th nationally). Defensively, the Texans had the most defensive touchdowns in the conference (four, tied-fourth nationally), were first in fumbles recovered (11, tied-ninth nationally), first in yards per play (4.8, 17th nationally), first in sacks (26, tied-28th nationally), tied-third in takeaways (18, tied-36th nationally), tied-third in tackles for loss (65, tied-39th nationally), and fourth in scoring defense (24.5 points per game, tied-46th nationally). On special teams, Tarleton was first in kickoff return (24.3 yards per return, eighth nationally) and second in punt return (18.2 yards per return, fourth nationally).

STEPHENVILLE — Tarleton State University graduate student Vladyslav Logos will present his clinical research at the eighth annual International Conference on Education and Psychology (ICEAP) July 18-20 in

Fukuoka, Japan. This year's conference theme is "Innovations in **Education and Psychological** Well-being: Bridging Theory and Practice," and Logos and his collaborator, Dr. Nikki Hurless, will speak about the unique insights they gained from their research and clinical practice while in Japan. Logos, originally from Kyiv, Ukraine, is in his second year of master's studies in clinical mental health counseling at Tarleton State's Fort Worth campus.

"It's a great honor and pleasure to represent Tarleton State at the international level," said Logos. very supportive of me, and I'm proud to spread the word about our exceptional university."

A former musician, Logos said he changed his career course to medicine and science "to be as useful as possible to humanity," graduating from Taras Shevchenko National University of Kyiv and working as a clinical psychologist/therapist in Ukraine before moving to the U.S.

"I steadily gained more appreciation of medical research and its power to positively impact many people rather than just one patient," Logos said.

His research focuses on identifying and addressing the most prevalent mental health concerns among refugees and looks at how to approach and effectively work with these vulnerable populations. short-term asynchronous psychoeducational intervention that will enable individuals to maintain their mental health and well-being during challenging times of forced migration from a war-torn country," Logos said.

This year alone he has spoken at eight scientific conferences and produced five peer-reviewed articles and two textbook chapters. STEPHENVILLE — Aiming to increase access to higher education, Tarleton State University has announced the expansion of its Tarleton Promise Program to the institution's Fort Worth campus, giving eligible first-year students the opportunity to attend free of tuition and fees.

The financial aid office will notify recipients of their award, which is renewable for up to four years if the student remains enrolled full time and meets satisfactory progress requirements toward their degree completion.

"Our goal is to remove barriers for high-performing students who have the most financial need," said Dr. Rachael Capua, dean of Tarleton State Fort Worth and vice president for external operations. "This is an important step to increasing access and opportunity as we prepare to welcome our inaugural first-year class later this year."
