Highway 36 Monument dedication held Dec. 10

Soldiers arrested on human smuggling conspiracy charges

Three Fort Cavazos soldiers were arrested on criminal charges related to their alleged involvement in a conspiracy to smuggle undocumented noncitizens.

According to court documents, a United States Border Patrol Agent initiated a vehicle stop in Presidio on Nov. 27. The vehicle fled as the agent approached the

passenger side and struck a second USBP vehicle, injuring an agent inside, according to the filed criminal complaint.

Presidio County deputies and Presidio police officers eventually stopped the vehicle and apprehended four individuals, three of whom were undocumented noncitizens—one Mexican national and two Guatema-

Be sure to heat your home safely this winter

When the cold weather first arrives, the first thing Texans want to do is turn on the heater and use their fireplace. However, there is often a correlation between house fires and freezing temperatures.

Following a blast of chilly weather this week and the upcoming winter season, Chief Billy Vaden with the Gatesville Volunteer Fire Department offers a few precautions that people

can take to safely heat their homes and protect themselves from a fire.

Most house fires in the winter are mainly caused by some sort of heating problem, Vaden explains. Before building a fire in a fireplace or wood stove, he said it's important to ensure they have been cleaned properly.

"A lot of times, the chimneys are not cleaned, and the stove pipes are not clean, and they have a lot of creosote in them," Vaden

said. "That's something you should always do - prepare way ahead of time and have all that cleaned."

When it comes to fireplaces, Vaden said to ensure it has a safety screen in front of it and that wood is fully dry before using it to build a fire.

"Your wood does need to be dry, because, if it's damp or wet, it's going to cause a lot of smoke and smoke will have carbon monoxide in it," Vaden said. Flammable items such as clothing, bedding, or paper should be kept at least three feet away from fireplaces, wood stoves, and space heaters, Vaden said. When using space heaters, he adds to make sure it has a setting that turns off if it falls over and to avoid using an extension cord to plug it into the wall.

"You have to plug it straight into the outlet on the wall because they can draw a lot of power, and most little extension cords that people have around the house are not capable of providing enough electricity or enough amps to make those heaters work," Vaden said. "Never walk off and leave an electric heater running. You should always cut it off"

Vaden reminds people to check the batteries of smoke detectors and ensure they are working properly, since they are beneficial at detecting early signs of a

One of the most common issues that arise when heating a home is the threat of carbon monoxide poisoning, an odorous and colorless gas that can be deadly, Vaden explains.

Always check to ensure carbon monoxide alarms

are up to date. He advises replacing them every five years.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include nausea, headaches, dizziness, and shortness of

If a fire or carbon monoxide is suspected in the house, Vaden said to always call 911.

"If you suspect something, don't hesitate to call 911 and get somebody to come out and look," Vaden said. "That's our job to come out look and make sure you're safe. We don't mind it – nobody likes to get out in the cold, but that's our job."

The monument is located on Highway 36 across from Walgreens.

lan nationals.

The fourth individual was Emilio Mendoza Lopez, who claimed to be the front seat passenger in the vehicle. The driver, alleged to be Angel Palma, fled on foot and was located the following day at a hotel in Odessa.

Mendoza Lopez and Palma allegedly traveled from Fort Cavazos to Presidio for the purpose of picking up and transporting undocumented noncitizens.


A third individual, Enrique Jauregui, is alleged to be the recruiter and facilitator of the human smuggling conspiracy. A search warrant revealed uncovered data, which was extracted from Palma's phone and showed messages between the three soldiers indicating collaboration in the smug-

gling operation.

On Monday, Dec. 2, Mendoza Lopez made his initial appearance in Alpine before U.S. Magistrate Judge David B. Fannin. He has been charged with one count of bringing in and harboring aliens.

Palma and Jauregui were both arrested on Tuesday, Dec. 3, on Fort Cavazos. They were scheduled to appear before U.S. Magistrate Judge Jeffrey Manske for their initial appearance hearings in Waco last Friday. The two codefendants are charged in a separate criminal complaint with one count of bringing in and harboring aliens and one count of assaulting a federal agent.

A federal district court judge will determine any sentence after considering the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines and other statutory factors.





love the state of Texas. I am proud to live here, proud to be a part of a vibrant, friendly community, and proud to do my part to maintain Texas traditions and customs.

I have never been ashamed to introduce myself and declare, "I am Sam Houston from Texas." It is a great source of pride and my self image.

When traveling in Europe and asked where I was from, I would always say, "Texas." No matter where I was, people knew of the place I called home. The

name Texas required no further explanation. I did have someone ask me why I said I was from Texas instead of the United States, and I covly responded that we Texans did graciously agree to let the United States join us, but that my home was Texas. Texas first, Texas last, and Texas everything in between.

This is why it pains me so much to criticize most anything to do with Texas, but sometimes situations call for comment. The relationship between Texans, their cars, and the state has got to change. Mind you, there are more than 22 million registered vehicles in Texas and more than 19 million registered drivers. No question this is a lot to keep track of, monitor, and regulate. At the same time, the situation has become almost laughable.

This past week, a fellow I work with needed to renew his driver's license. He was advised he needed an appointment to renew, so he called the local bureau and was advised he would need an appointment. He told the bureaucrat that would be fine but was shocked to learn the next date available was some six or seven weeks hence. He was told he needed to bring a copy

of his birth certificate in order to renew. It can only be assumed the birth certificate is to establish that the person getting the license is, in fact, who they say they are. Between illegal immigrants and the threat of terrorists, proof of who you are seems like a reasonable request, so my friend started digging through his legal papers to find a copy of the document which proves who he is. Unfortunately, he could not find his copy, so he had to go to the state and request a duplicate copy of his certificate. When he called the state, they wanted to see his driver's license to establish that he is the same person as the person on the birth certificate. So, the birth certificate establishes the ability to get a driver's license, as long as you have a driver's license to get a birth certificate? Does that sound like one big bureau-

cratic circle or what?

My car and my wife's car both need to be registered in the month of December. I have the check made out and ready, but I am required by law to have my car inspected before it can be registered. New legislation mandates that effective in January, inspections are no longer required to register a vehicle.

To fulfill my legal obligation, I spent half a day Saturday driving from one place to another, trying to find someone to inspect my car. The first four places told me that they no longer had somebody approved to do inspections since the inspection requirement ends in 30 days. When I attempted again Monday, I was told the state computer system was down and nobody in the state had access to submit inspection results, so I would have to come back to have the inspection done.

Millions of cars, millions of people, and the state collects millions of dollars in taxes from our vehicles. At the minimum, shouldn't the state have a system that is convenient, fast, and efficient for the taxpayer? The role of government should be to serve the people, not for the people to have to spend time, effort, and money to pay the taxes due and satisfy the requirements set forth by law.

Sometimes, I think politicians work at creating new programs when they should be looking at the programs in place and fix how inefficient and ineffective they are. Now, there is a way to win some votes!

Christmas in Gatesville 85 years ago

In December of 1939, in the years following the Great Depression, The Gatesville Messenger reported that during the holiday season the Gatesville merchants were having the "Best Christmas business in years." A headline read, "Christmas buying this year topped any years since the stock market crash ten years ago."

Despite the cold weather in the 20s, with ice and extreme snowfalls and road closures, holiday purchases were extremely heavy prior to Christmas.

Stores reported that their inventories were practically depleted and "entirely sold out in many lines of merchandise." It was written that one store kept a record of customers that totaled over 3,000 buyers during one Saturday alone.

It was reported in *The* Gatesville Messenger that the holiday purchases were in the "brackets of highpriced articles - including apparel, electrical appliances, radios, and other expensive pieces."

Coryell County also enjoyed a more prosperous year than in several past.

"There was a very good turkey crop sold prior to the holidays, which accounted for some \$75,000 in cash." It was also written that crop conditions were good during the year of 1939, and that the egg and poultry markets held up as well - all of which contributed to a very prosperous year for most Coryell County residents.

The newspaper also ran several holiday recipes, which included:

Christmas Relish

6 cloves 1 pint of water

1 pkg. lemon-flavored

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gelatin

¼ tsp. salt ¼ c. vinegar

12 maraschino cherries,

6 sweet pickles, sliced

Boil cloves in water for three minutes. Remove cloves. Dissolve gelatin in 1 \(^4\) cups of this hot liquid. Add salt and vinegar. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in cherries and pickles. Turn into half-size individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with fowl or ham. Makes 10 half-size molds.



Spur gets a new fire station

The Grand Opening of the new four-bay fire station in Spur took place in October when the town was full of people who came for the annual homecoming. It's the biggest annual event in Spur.

"We're hopeful that it will be greatly used," says Linda Swenson. "The floor has drains in it that are flat, so they won't be any danger to people walking or dancing or whatever."

Linda and her husband Eric donated money for the fire station.

""The fire station was literally caving in," says Eric. "When it rained, water just poured in."

They got four firemen to

design the building. Two were from out of town.

"We told them, 'here's what we want to do," Eric said. "We want to build a fire station, but we don't know where to start. You guys design this thing so that it will be functional and will be ergonomically useful for the firemen. They spent an immense amount of their personal time designing this thing."

"It has a metal roof on

it," says Linda. "On the outside, we have metal and stone. We got the stone from a quarry at Lueders, Texas and had it hauled up here. They have multiple stone quarries there. A lot of the capitol building in Austin used that stone. There's a stone cutting facility there that belongs to a friend of ours. We had the stone cut there.

"I think people thought at first that the fire station would be just a simple metal building but that wasn't what Eric and I had in mind. We wanted it to be something that would enhance our main street in Spur."

Two couples donated lots to the project. Both had buildings on them. The buildings were removed and the area is being paved, so the fire trucks will have more room to maneuver. Linda says that will make it more convenient for the firemen.

"They will have passage completely through that building. It can be entered from either the front or the back of the building. It has a kitchen and meeting

The fire station is brand new, but there's something old inside it.

"That's Old Betsy," says Linda. It's an old fire truck that's over a hundred years old. It's not being used any more, but it would be a shame to get rid of it. So, we put it behind glass inside the fire station. Two sides of the room it's in are with floor to ceiling windows. It's lit up at night, so people driving by can see it. That's our showcase. '

The building was put into use quickly. It was the venue for the homecoming dance.

Eric said - when he met with his 15-member coffee group - members were discussing what the town needed. Two things led the list: a swimming pool or a fire station. They chose the fire station. It does enhance the town's main street.

Mission Gatesville to hand out food bags Saturday, Dec. 21

Mission Gatesville is changing the schedule of their food distribution program in December.

The local organization normally passes out bags of non-perishable food at no cost on the first and third Thursday of each month. This month, thev will distribute the bags on Saturday, Dec. 21, instead of Thursday.

The distribution will take

place at the same location - the organization's trailer at 301 N. Lutterloh, from 10 a.m. to noon. Arriving at 10 a.m. is recommended since bags are first come first served.

"Remember, we don't require an ID or any proof of residency," Mission Gatesville wrote in a Facebook post. "Any adult that shows up can get food from us until we run out."

The bags include non-

perishable food along with fresh items such as bread and eggs if available. Bags are limited to one per adult.

Mission Gatesville was founded in early 2023 to further help those in need within the community. They are 100% volunteer run and funded by donations.

While the organization has not made any official plans past Dec. 21, Mission Gatesville Board Member Scott Ayers said there is a

possibility they might shift their schedule to the first and third Saturday of the month if distribution in December is successful. The changes would not occur until January 2025.

"Brock and Ruby were so sweet," she said. "To be little kids and to be so humble is a great lesson in humanity, so I applaud Chad and Katy for that."

After the Hills dropped off their donation of toys this week, the center has now reached their goal of 34 toys total and plans to distribute two toys per child.

Rudolph expressed that the response she has gotten from the community over the years has been tremendous.

"Last year, each child ended up with eight toys each, and there was stuff left over that we were able to donate to the classroom," she said. "Even if we didn't have enough toys to cover all 34 children, then we would still have a party for the kids and we would donate everything that was

collected to Head Start."
Each year, a party is held to distribute the toys to the students. This year the party will be held on Dec. 19, at the Senior Center for students and their families.

students and their families.
She said that on the day
of the party, parents can
pick their child up and head
over to the Senior Center

for punch, cookies, dessert, music, and gifts.

"What I enjoy the most about this toy drive is the day of the party," she said. "I don't know if I enjoy watching the kids open their gifts more or the relief I see on the parents faces."

"If nothing else, I want the children to know that there are people in the community who are going to look after them," she said. "Sometimes, with Head Start, since it is considered low income-based, a lot of people think that they don't deserve things. So, I would rather the parents be able to focus their money on paying bills or making sure there is food on the table, and we will take care of the presents."

She said that she believes the toy drive shows her

more and more everyday what this community is capable of and what they are willing to do.

"When people donate, it just kind of keeps that spirit alive here in Gates-ville, because it is such a giving community," she said. "Some people think that it is just a dollar tree toy, but to the kids it means everything, and, for parents, it's a huge weight lifted off of them."

The toy drive officially began on Dec. 1 and will end on Dec. 16.


or some other Christmas remembrance would probably be a day (or night) brightener for all of them!

Until here lately, the "way" to Branson, Missouri has not been quite so clear. Though highway routes to this Christian entertainment mecca are many some of them picturesque — they can easily eat up the better part of a day for Texans driving there.

Eureka! Southern Airways Express now offers twicedaily flights from Dallas/ Fort Worth International Airport to Harrison, Arkansas, just a half-hour from

"The Way of the Cross Branson. Round-trip airfare is around \$150, parking is free, and the two-hour flight a few thousand feet aloft provides welcome "looksees" at the colorful foliage below. (The aircraft has eight seats, with some safety requirements that may be unfamiliar, such as use of scales to determine weight of both passengers and luggage. Rent a car, use an Uber app, or lean on a friend for pickup in Harrison and the short final "leg" to Branson. Remember to pack light and arrive early for check-in.)

En route to this one-of-akind entertainment center that emphasizes God and country, one sees an exit for College of the Ozarks in Point Lookout, Missouri. It's a stop worth taking, a scant half-dozen miles from Branson, this college of some 1,500 students. The Lord is honored, and patriotism is the hallmark of the appropriately nicknamed "Hard Work University."

Students earn their way to four-year degrees by working at numerous campus sites. They graduate free of debt, unlike many college graduates who face heavy payback commitments for several years.

Named C of O president in 2022, Dr. Brad Johnson envisioned an additional symbol to enhance the institution's spiritual and patriotic values. It already had The Missouri Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Now. the giant cross erected last year reminds students and visitors of Christ upon entering or leaving the campus. Artist/designer Max Greiner Jr. was commissioned for the project — The Empty Cross-TM - made of steel - is 40feet tall and weighs 28,000 pounds...

I have written about Branson many times, but somehow was never previously present for the muchheralded "Christmas in Branson." Though "late to

the party," I recently was "wowed' by a community emblazoned by lights and Christmas décor, and a bevy of shows "glitzed up" with festive costumes, Christmas music, and creative dancers. (The season starts in November and runs through the first week of January.)

During a whirlwind 46hour visit, I attended seven shows, including the Sight and Sound Theater's "Miracle of Christmas." This is Branson's "crown jewel," where all 2,200 seats often are taken for productions that dazzle with Broadway quality and are always Christ-centered. "David" opens March 8, 2025.

Other shows included The Duttons, The Hughes Brothers, Pierce Arrow (featuring a world-class baritone and a Guinness Book of Records holder for the lowest bass voice), Doug Gabriel, A Tribute to ABBA, and "Hot Rods and High Heels." They, too, sparkled...

Branson is a "family place" on both sides of the flood lights. Central to its "warp and woof" are shows dominated by multiple family members, including three generations of Duttons and their across-the-street neighbors, the Hughes Brothers. They even "bor-

row" each other's grandbabies for manger scenes. This year, the Hughes Brothers' family has two of their four infants "on loan" to the Duttons! The Clay Coopers have to be proud of son Colton, star of the "Hot Rods" show, a high energy production featuring 1950s music.

Doug Gabriel has been "at it" for decades, playing a stringed instrument his dad made from a car muffler. He calls it a "muff-tar."

This account barely touches the garment's hem of Branson. Experiencing it coupled with a visit to C of O — never grows old, at Christmas and throughout the year...

After moving away from home to go to college, Payne learned about people who weren't like him, and he assimilated and embraced other ideas and cultures. He became "a secular liberal college professor" who's distressed today at the divide he sees.

"We need more humanizing," he says, "because people in our country have been dehumanizing one another To end that, and to pull


> think we can't believe. These are the answers to the divide. Says Payne, "It is time to look plainly at why people believe what they believe, choose what they choose, and want what they want."

125-year-old courthouse commemorative cup

Built between 1897 and 1898, last year the Coryell County Courthouse celebrated its 125th anniversary. Recognized as one of the most beautiful courthouses in the State of Texas, it has been toured by countless visitors from across the state and nation for over 100

The current structure was the third courthouse that the county commissioners authorized to be built by W.D. Dodson, a well-known Texas architect. Since its construction, the building has undergone several improvements, while the building itself has remained much the

same since its construction. The modern conveniences include indoor restrooms, air conditioning, and an elevator.

In the early stages of the building process in 1897, a ceremony was conducted by the Gatesville Masonic Lodge when they installed the cornerstone. Later, during the completion ceremony and celebration, items were sold to commemorate the day.

The Coryell Museum and Historical Center has a display of early-day courthouse relics. Among those items on display is a hand-painted water glass depicting the new courthouse. The glass was first purchased by

Alexander Campbell Cantrell of the Levita/ Ater community. Cantrell purchased the glass as a gift for Effie Cantrell who, at her passing in the 1950's, left it to Irene Cantrell.


The glass was later donated to the Coryell Museum by Brents Davis who was the great-grandson of the original owner and the son of Irene Cantrell. Visitors are invited to

explore the museum and see the courthouse exhibit that includes several items from the past three courthouses.

Visitors are welcome to drop by the museum located at 718 E. Main to view the massive

spur collection. Coryell Museum and Historical Center is open Wednesday through Saturday, as is the gift shop. Yearly, Coryell Museum memberships are \$20 for singles, \$30 for families, and \$40 for businesses, which includes free admission to the museum, plus four newsletters. Of course, large and small donations are welcome at all times.

Coryell Museum offers area schools and tour groups a delightful, guided tour through the museum with docents at many exhibits. Call the museum at 254-865-5007 to plan a visit.

Each Christmas, local shoppers see the colorful poinsettias (both real and artificial) on sale at Walmart, HEB, and other local retail stores, but most do not know exactly why the flower has become so associated with the Christmas holidays. Possibly not.

To begin with, Poinsettia plants are native to Central America - especially an area of southern Mexico called "Taxo del Alarcon" where the flower blooms during the winter months.

The ancient Aztecs found many uses for the bright colored flowers, including making dyes for clothing, cosmetics, and medicinal purchases.

It has the been reported

that the Poinsettia became more widely known due to a man named Joel Roberts Poinsett, who was the first United States ambassador to Mexico in 1825.

Poinsett became very interested in the plants and sent some of them back to his native South Carolina where he began growing them. The plants were an instant success and became popular for landscaping and pot plants in the United States.

How Poinsettias and Christmas came together comes from an old Mexican legend, which has become a favorite holiday

It was written that a poor Mexican girl called Pepita had no present to offer to the baby Jesus at the

Christmas Eve service at her church. While she was walking to the chapel, she became very distraught since she had nothing to offer. Her cousin Pedro tried to cheer her up and told her that even the smallest gift would make

Pepita then picked a small handful of weeds from along the roadside and made them into a small bouquet. She was extremely embarrassed that this was such a small present to offer to the remembrance of the baby Iesus.

Jesus happy.

When she entered the church, she silently knelt down and placed her bouquet at the symbolic nativity scene. It was written that the bouquet of weeds

suddenly burst into bright red flowers, and those in attendance felt sure they had seen a miracle.

From that day forward, the bright red flowers became known as the "Flores de Noche Buena" or "Flowers of the Holy Night.'

Some have always believed that the shape of the Poinsettia flower resembles the Star of Bethlehem, which led the Wise Men to Jesus. Others also believe the red-colored leaves symbolize the blood of Christ, while the white leaves represent His purity.

So, this holiday season, while purchasing Poinsettias in Gatesville, one might remember the history behind the flower.

Dove Nest opens three-mile racetrack, shares offerings for visitors

For the owners and founders of the DOMO Dove Nest Motorsports Club of Central Texas, Toan Leung and Nhi Lieu, their purpose is to offer a memorable experience

for the community and its

visitors.

Located just north of The Grove, the property serves as an event venue, motorsports club, and resort community. The 400-acre venue provides a space for weddings, celebrations, recreational activities, and, of course, a three-mile dirt track for offroading.

"We want to create an experience for everybody," Leung said. "We still have a lot of work to do, but it's been well received."

In October, the property finalized the dirt racetrack that includes 22 turns and 126 feet of elevation change. The track was designed by German engineering company Tilke and excavated by Ranger Excavating in Austin.

Leung said the new track allows motorists to practice their speed and technical skills in a safe environment.

"It's very technical for people to hone their skills, and it also adds speed to their experience," he said.

In addition to an off-road racetrack, Leung said there are more than 15 miles of trails for biking and hiking, as well as a quarry for fishing.

"Basically, think of it as a destination that an entire family can enjoy as far as

hiking, walking, off-roading, fishing at our four-acre quarry, and for car enthusiasts – Jeep, trucks, or any off road vehicle," Leung said. He and his wife purchased

the property in 2020 at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Leung said they recognized the potential in the old structure, which used to serve as a sandblasting warehouse for military vehicles. The venue space took one year to renovate and has been open for a little over one year.

Now, the remodeled space serves as a venue for Leung and Lieu's other business on the property, Dove Nest Estate. With a rustic and industrial vibe, the venue can host weddings and other events for up to 250 people.

The property also contains an industrial barbeque smoker and an old saloon that they modernized and refurbished for visitors and guests. There are also five on-site cabins for those who wish to stay the night on the property.

Dove Nest hosts various events throughout the year for car and off-road enthusiasts. On Dec. 5, they hosted a 12-hour endurance race for off-roading vehicles. They also work with local car clubs, such as Austin's Tesla Club and various Jeep clubs, to host meet-up events.

Along with car clubs, major automotive manufacturers such as Polaris and Yamaha often travel to Dove Nest Motorsport's Club for staff training and to utilize

the property to test their offroad products.

"It adds businesses to the city. They come out with new products, and they bring in dealership staff from Austin and Dallas," Leung said. "They come here, and they do the training on the machines."

Leung emphasizes the importance of the venue's economic impact.

"It will take up hotels in Gatesville, restaurants, convenience stores. People come and buy food, drinks, gas, everything to sustain the event," he said. "So, in some ways, maybe in a smaller scale, it has positively affected the city."

Leung said there are plans to expand the facilities and offerings on the property, such as providing future car storage, outdoor pavilions, and a wellness center with a pool, pickle ball and tennis courts, and more.

"Going back to what we wanted to create, it is not just the track, but also to be able to provide good barbecue, have drinks, enjoy the atmosphere, the vibe, and our environment," he said. "That's what we want to create"

After working as an Emergency Room physician for 25 years, Leung said running the club and event space has been a rewarding experience.

"Looking back, the growth has been very positive, not just financially, but also in the networking, and getting



TSU Women's Basketball bounces back with win over LeTourneau

STEPHENVILLE — Tarleton Women's Basketball had five different players score in double figures and 56 points from its bench to clinch a 99-34 victory over LeTourneau Saturday, Dec. 7 at Wisdom

Tarleton shot a season-high 53.6% from the floor, its highest shooting percentage since Dec. 4, 2021.

Freshman guard Grace Booth led the Texans with her first collegiate double-double of 15 points and 13 rebounds off the bench. Booth's 13 rebounds set a new Division I Era program record for most boards in a single game by a Tarleton freshman. The Glen Rose native also tallied a season-high five steals, three assists and three blocks.

Sophomore center Faith Acker added 12 points and seven rebounds while senior guard Niki Van Wyk scored 11 points in her first game since Nov. 26. Guards Arieona Rosborough and Kyriana Jones also added 10 points

each for the Texans.

Tarleton got off to a quick start in the first quarter, opening the period on a 14-2 scoring run. A LeTourneau layup cut the deficit down to single digits, but the Texans scored the final six points of the first quarter to go back in front by double figures. The Texans knocked down 12 of its 18 shots in the first quarter for 66.7% shooting to finish the opening period with a 26-11 advantage.

Following a basket from sophomore forward Anya McKenzie, Van Wyk finished a layup through contact and converted the and-one opportunity. Booth helped start a 7-0 scoring run with a 3-pointer and fast break layup, with the Texans moving ahead by 26 with just under three minutes to play. LeTourneau scored the final two baskets of the half, but the Texans remained ahead by 21 points going into the locker room.

Tarleton continued its high-powered offense in the second half, scoring eight of the first 10 points to start the third quarter. The Texans continued to expand the lead by going on a 12-0 scoring run capped off by Van Wyk making a basket while drawing a foul. Tarleton scored on each of its final three possessions of the third quarter to hold its lead entering the final 10 minutes.

The Texans continued to scorch the nets at Wisdom Gym in the fourth quarter, shooting 51.7% from the floor. Tarleton ended Saturday's game with 22 unanswered points to record its fifth win of the season.



A pair of Texans cracked the top 10 in the 60-meter dash. Sir Jonathan Sims posted the seventh best time in school history crossing in 6.93 seconds. Evan Wells tied the ninth best mark all-time finishing in 6.95 seconds.

Jace Poole posted the second-best time in program history in the 3000 in the final event of the night. Poole finished fourth in 8:29.91. The sophomore was just two seconds shy of Kevin Baez's program record.

Mason Hill's performance in the weight throw earned him the fourth best throw in program history. Hill's best throw of 14.31 meters came on his second of three tosses. Hill also improved his PR in the shot put by .15 meters to

Magical Texan football season ends in FCS Playoffs 2nd round

VERMILLION, S.D. — The 2024 season for Tarleton State Football was truly historic, and for three quarters on Saturday, Dec. 6 in the second round of the FCS Playoffs at South Dakota, it looked like the Texans' magical ride would continue on another week. But the Coyotes proved too tough at the end, ending Tarleton's season in Vermillion, South Dakota.

The No. 13 Texans (10-4) had their offense clicking for three quarters and led at The DakotaDome 28-21 entering the fourth quarter. The No. 4 Coyotes (10-2) outscored Tarleton 21-3 in the final frame to win 42-31 in a playoff classic between two top-15 teams in the country.

"Hats off to South Dakota, they've got a great team, they had just maybe three or four penalties and no turnovers, so they played really clean,' head coach Todd Whitten said. "But I just couldn't be more proud of the way that our guys played. I thought we played really hard, battled until the end. We had a great season, an incredible senior class, so it kind of hurts right now, but I'm really proud of

our team." Texan wide receiver Darius Cooper proved once again he belongs in the NFL, wowing the crowd with his acrobatic catches and touchdowns, finishing with three touchdowns on the day, a Texan Football playoff receiving record. He recorded nine receptions for 161 yards and three touchdowns overall.

Texan quarterback Victor Gabalis also set program playoff records with four passing touchdowns and 379 passing yards, completing 23of-31 (.742). After going turnover-free over the previous four games, Gabalis had three interceptions Saturday, two off deflections that bounced the Covotes' way.

Cody Jackson eclipsed 100 receiving yards, along with Cooper, finishing with four catches for 104 yards and a touchdown. Kayvon Britten rushed for 86 yards on 24 carries, and Benjamin Omayebu added five catches for 76 yards.

Defensively, Donta Stuart led the way with 15 tackles and a tackle for loss, his third game of the season posting double-digit tackles. Blake Smith added a tackle for loss and seven total tackles.

South Dakota narrowly held the edge in total yardage at 509-477, outgaining the Texans on the ground 296-98, while Tarleton had the passing attack going 379-213. Tarleton didn't punt the entire game, but South Dakota won the turnover battle 3-0 and the time of possession 33:12 to 26:48.

USD RB Travis Theis scored three touchdowns on the ground, totaling 130 yards on 25 carries (5.2 YPC). Charles Pierre Ir. added 80 vards on nine carries (8.9 YPC) and Quaron Adams busted one for a 70-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter. Quarterback Aidan Bouman completed 18-of-22 (.818) for 213 yards and two touchdowns, one to Carter Bell (five receptions, 98 yards, one TD) and the other to Keyondray Jones-Logan (four receptions, five yards, one TD). Tim White, Mike Reid and Shahid Barros each had an interception for USD, while Mountain Valley Conference Defensive Player of the Year Mi'Quise Grace had a team-high seven tackles and the team's lone

plays for a 33-yard Cooper touchdown. The first quarter nearly ended with just two drives spanning the 15-minute period, with South Dakota bleeding 9:41 off the clock across 15 plays. Theis capped it off with a 1-yard touchdown rush to make it 7-7 with 36 seconds left in the first quarter.

The Texans scored again on their next drive, this time a 43-yard Gabalis to Jackson connection to seal an 80-yard scoring drive. USD answered once again with another long drive, taking 12 plays and 7:37 off the clock, covering 75 yards. Theis once again cashed in on a 1-yard touchdown rush, knotting the game 14-14.

With 38 seconds left in the second quarter, Tarleton made it 3-for-3 on its three drives in the first half, with Cooper scoring his second touchdown, this time from 20 yards out. The Coyotes drove down quickly to give themselves a chance at a field goal, but Zeke Mata's 48-yard attempt was no good, putting the Texans in the locker room ahead at the break 21-14.

To start the third quarter, the Texans forced a threeand-out, the first punt of the

game. Tarleton couldn't take advantage, failing to score a touchdown for the first time, as Barros came down with the interception. USD took it down 60 yards on 11 plays, scoring on a Jones-Logan receiving touchdown from five yards out as he caught it off of a teammate's drop.

Tarleton responded quickly, covering 75 yards in five plays, scoring a 23-yard Cooper touchdown in just over two minutes of game action. Following that, Tarleton forced another punt, but another interception gave USD the ball in good field position to end the third quarter.

Theis ran it in from two yards out less than a minute into the fourth to tie the game 28-28. Tarleton scored for the final time on its next drive, a 23-yard Corbin Poston field goal, putting the Texans ahead 31-28 with 11:16 remaining.

Bouman found Jones-Logan for a 12-yard reception, who lateraled it to Bell for a touchdown to give the Coyotes their first lead of the game 35-31 with 9:36 remaining. Tarleton strung together a nice drive to put the Texans in prime position to take the lead, getting to the USD 35yard line, but they turned it over for a third time to put the game in jeopardy. Adams burst for a 70-yard touchdown to put the Coyotes up two scores with 5:13 left. Tarleton marched down to give themselves a chance, getting to the USD 21-yard line, but turned it over on downs to essentially end the game with just over two minutes to play. Three more first downs by Theis allowed USD to run out the clock and advance the Coyotes to the quarterfinals.

USD remained undefeated at home on the year, improving to 7-0. The Coyotes will host No. 5 UC Davis in Vermillion next week.

For the Texans, this was the longest season in Tarleton Football history, playing 14 games for the first time and playing until Dec. 7 for the first time.

Cooper ends his Texan career with 29 career touchdowns, the second most in program history, only behind Zimari Manning (34). Cooper also concludes with 3,185 career receiving yards, the most in program history. Britten ends his Texan career with 3,132 rushing yards across just two seasons, the fourth most in program history.

A bracket will be released by 10 a.m. on Friday, Dec. 20.




