Coryell County opposes proposed ban on countywide voting

Coryell County is one of many Texas counties pushing back against state lawmakers who want to eliminate countywide polling locations on Election

Coryell County Commissioners approved a resolution at a regular meeting on Tuesday to oppose the

removal of the Countywide Polling Place Program (CWPP). Tax Assessor Collector Justin Carothers said that ending countywide voting means voters would no longer have the opportunity to vote anywhere on Election Day.

Coryell County has a total of 16 individual voting precincts but operates eight voting sites on Election

Day. Without countywide voting, people would be required to vote in the precinct where they live instead of one of the county's eight voting centers.

"I think it'd be verv detrimental for our county to go back to that. No one would know where to vote," Carothers said. "Most

Man confirmed dead in structure fire on Feb. 10

As of press time, investigators have not released a cause of the fire or the identification of the deceased victim.

One person was found dead in a building that caught fire in the 3300 block of South State Highway 36 on Monday, according to the Gatesville Police Department and Gatesville

Volunteer Fire Department. Gatesville firefighters and police responded to the incident around 8:17 a.m. on Feb. 10. The building that caught fire belonged to a local business, Coryell County Customs.

A news release distributed by the Gatesville Fire Department states that the heavy smoke and fire seemed to stem from the east end of the multi-use, one-story building.

The fire department said firefighters had to force their way into the building due to a double locked door and locked garage. Their entrance to the building was also hampered due to a "large number of items inside the building." Once inside, they discovered "heavy fire conditions," and that the fire had spread to the west side of the build-

After extinguishing most of the fire, firefighters discovered a deceased male victim in one of the breeched areas of the building, per the release.

Police said in a separate press release that the body was found in an area of the building that was also being used as a residence.

Heritage Salon, which is next door to Coryell County Customs, received minor smoke damage, according to the fire department. Firefighters were able to stop the fire from spreading before it reached the salon's building.

"Firefighters continued with extinguishment and overhaul of the building until all flames and hot spots had been extinguished," the fire department's release

Gatesville Police Chief Jeffrey Clark said no other injuries have been reported.

A State Fire Marshal was called to investigate the cause of the fire. Coryell County Justice of Peace Jim Caldwell has also ordered an autopsy of the victim.

As of press time, investigators have not released a cause of the fire or the identification of the deceased victim.

City Council slightly increases solid waste fees

In a City Council meeting held on Tuesday, Feb. 11, Gatesville City Council members held a third and final reading of a new ordinance to adjust solid waste

The solid waste agreement between Waste Management and the City of Gatesville provides the city with an annual CPI

(consumer price index) and fuel adjustment. This year, Waste Management contacted the city to notify them of an increase in solid waste fees of 0.53 cents total.

The 2.3% increase became effective on Feb. 1 and includes an increase for the "Cart Service" and the "At Your Door" service. The residential cart service will increase from \$21.56

to \$22.05 per month, and the "At Your Door" service will increase from \$1.46 to \$1.50 per month.

An additional cart will increase by 0.12 cents per month as well.

"For a year, it's 7,000 more pounds of 'At Your Door,' and the total pounds of that recycled is 7,200. So, basically, they are able to recycle or reuse 97% of all

the hazardous household waste that was collected," Finance Director Mike Halsema said.

In a previous meeting held on Jan. 28, Council Member Meredith Rainer asked if the process is still working in place of a household hazardous waste day.

Hunt responded that they have plans to implement a waste day for next year. He

mentioned that it helps increase awareness for folks, and, typically, most people prefer to attend a household waste day.

"We are going to try to support some other ones around the area and direct people there," he said. "I think it would be beneficial to happen."

Council members passed and approved the new

ordinance, which states: "The City Council finds it in the best interest of the city and in the service of health, safety, and general welfare that the solid waste collection rates charged by the city to customers be increased."

Courthouse Master Plan presented to commissioners

On Tuesday, Feb. 11, the Corvell County Commissioners Court heard a presentation by Architexas representative Alexis McKinney to update the commissioners on the recent investigative findings concerning the Coryell County Courthouse and present them with their recommendations regarding a master plan for the

Architexas conducted an in-depth building investigation between Nov. 6. 2024 and Jan. 28, 2025, using Matterport laser imaging to create a detailed floor plan of the Coryell County

The master plan for the courthouse, when approved by the Texas State Historical Commission, would allow the county to apply for grants to refurbish and update the courthouse so that the structure could continue to be a "working courthouse."

Completed in 1898, the building does suffer from a few structural issues, which were brought to the attention of the commissioners by Architexas. "For the most part, I want to say that the courthouse is in excellent condition. There are some structural concerns - it needs to be fire sprinkled. There's definitely a fire safety concern," McK-

The Coryell County Courthouse is one of the 15 courthouses built in Texas by architect Wesley Clark Dodson - only six of which remain. McKinney reported that the courthouse in Gatesville is the last one to be updated and restored. She said that the Gatesville courthouse is a significant example of Dodson's "Golden Age" of Texas courthouse construction.

McKinney provided detailed information about all three floors of the building, including the basement, attic, and bell tower. She presented short-term as well as long-term solutions for the restoration of the building.

Some of the more critical concerns discovered by Architexas include fire safety, accessibility, damp conditions in the basement, deteriorating mortar between the foundation stones, roof leaks, cinder concrete flooring concerns, site handrail replacement for building codes, and the resecuring of the bell attachment in the dome.

McKinney told the commissioners that the master plan would allow the county to apply for grants to cover the estimated 12.8 million dollars - stating that 10 million of this cost could possibly come from the Texas Historical Commission. She explained, "This is a ball-park number, an estimate, cost-wise for a full restoration." She also said that the THC recently increased their funding for such projects, and that there is a strong chance that the county would receive 10 million to help with the project.

On a humorous note, McKinney related that on a recent fly-by inspection of the outside of the structure by a drone, honey bees were seen flying around the eagle, which is perched on top of the building - reminiscent of the continuing dilemma the courthouse has faced with the bee colony located in the attic of the building.

County Judge Roger Miller would later mention that the first draft of the Master Plan would be submitted to the Texas State Historical Commission by the end of February or in the first few weeks of March. He also stated that the application period for funding by the THC for the restoration is now closed and that the county would have to wait until 2026 to make an ap-

Miller also mentioned that it would probably be the first part of 2029 before the actual restoration process of the courthouse would begin.


"Our plan is to restore and preserve this historic structure," he said.

people don't vote in their precinct. They vote some-

where else or somewhere close to work. Since residents must vote in their individual precinct, the county would need to open 16 individual voting

locations as well as find

the staff and equipment to

operate in those locations. "We would have to double the amount of personnel to operate those sites as well as identify what those sites would have to be," County Judge Roger Miller said.

Carothers said it would also cost the county a lot of money up front since they would need to purchase more equipment and hire more poll workers for the eight additional voting locations. One of the benefits of the countywide polling program is that it cuts costs,

especially in rural areas with limited resources.

"It saves money – less equipment and poll workers are required. It also makes it easier to vote. You can show up anywhere in the county and cast your vote," Carothers said.

According to the Texas Tribune, two bills have been filed to get rid of the option to countywide vote. Per the article, state lawmakers fighting for the ban believe the program lacks transparency and produces inaccurate vote totals and results. However, many state and local officials have refuted the claim, citing that there is no evidence that it affects voting counts.

The bill also includes the elimination of electronic voting equipment, which counties are required to use for the countywide voting program.

Currently, the program allows 99 counties to vote countywide on Election Day, including Coryell County. The county has participated in the program since 2014.

Carothers said the resolution the county commissioners voted on will be sent to state representatives in Austin. He adds that dozens of other Texas counties are also fighting back on the ban.

"We hope these resolutions, and hope the Judge or you all, can get this out to not only our senator or representative but anyone that you know to get this word out that we're strongly opposed to this," Carothers said.

Prescription drugs are not a joke, but you better have a sense of humor

ike most folks my age, my doctor has prescribed several medicines for me. I have suffered from asthma most all my life, and something about pecan trees and mountain cedar seem to make the condition more unbearable.

I use a daily inhaler as well as a rescue inhaler when I have a flareup.

Taking medications is something that is becoming more and more prevalent in America. There were \$582 billion worth of pharmaceutical drugs sold in the U.S. in 2017, and by 2023 the number had risen to \$716 billion, an increase of 23% - an interesting number when one realizes the rest of the world increased its

drug purchases by a mere 2% during the same period. Are Americans that sickly or are we simply the victims of a self-serving industry?

This past week my prescriptions ran out, and I had to reach out to my physician to get them renewed. Before I could get a new script, I was informed I would need to make an appointment with the doctor. I was then advised I needed to have blood work completed before the appoint-

I had been using the prescribed medications for years and, though this seemed like a lot of hoops to go through, I reasoned it was all for a good purpose: I had not been to the doctor in a year, I am getting older, and it makes sense to get checked. It even makes sense to have blood work done to detect an ongoing or upcoming problem. But all of this seemed like a lot of time and expense just to get a prescription renewed for a drug I had used for

After checking all the boxes at the doctor's office, I got my prescription and headed to the same pharmacy that had filled my prescription on previous occasions. My medicine had previously cost about \$160 for a month's supply, certainly pricy but at least the drug is effective. After handing over the prescription, the drug store employee told me the cost would be \$450, a significant increase from the \$160 I

had paid the month before. In hopes of finding some economic relief, I showed them the app on my phone, which indicated the pharmacy would sell the product for the \$160 figure which I had previously paid. Fortunately, I also noticed that the app indicated the pharmacy across the street would sell the product for \$95! The app also indicated some of the pharmacies in my area wanted far more than \$160. How lucky was I to notice that? I told the druggist to send my prescription across the street to the second pharmacy and I headed out the door to pick up my prescription and save \$65 dollars.

Upon arrival at the second place, the staffer confirmed my prescription could be filled for \$95 but then told me they were out of the medicine I needed. They checked and their warehouse was also out, and they did not have any idea when the medicine would be available.

As I stood at the pharmacy window, my breathing was labored, and I decided lower price or not, I needed my meds. I instructed the second pharmacy to send the prescription back to the first pharmacy and I would suffer paying the higher price. I did not feel like I could wait for who knows how long before the medicine was restocked.

Upon my return to the first pharmacy, I no more than got up to the window to pick up my prescription when I got a text from the second pharmacy indicating my prescription had been filled and was ready for pickup. How could that be? They had just told me they did not have any of the medication in inventory. Was the text a mistake?

Not wanting to leave a stone unturned in my efforts to save cash, I made the trek back to the second pharmacy where my prescription was in fact, filled. I got it for the price of \$95. Where did the medication come from? The pharmacy had just told me they were out and had no idea when they would be resupplied.

I walked out the door with my prescription, though confused, conflicted, and shaking my head about the entire process.

According to Open Seats cited by NBC News, last year the pharmaceutical/ health business spent \$4.2 billion lobbying state and national legislators. It has been reported there are at least three dedicated lobbyists for each member of the U.S. Congress! God knows they are not lobbying to make things better or more efficient for consumers. Customer service, efficiency, competition, and uniformity in pricing fall by the wayside, all while Americans are prescribed more and more medications. In the meantime, the drug companies continue to make billions, and the U.S. consumer pays.

All this is enough to make you sick.

Thought for the day: Price is what you pay, value is what you get.

The Mound, Texas Post Office

ostmaster Sherry Hopson knows the 40 people who have boxes in the post office at Mound.

"I know them by name. I know their children, their grandchildren, their grandparents, and maybe their great-grandparents. I even know the names of some of their pets."

She has been postmaster for ten years and watches the parade of life from her post office window.

"We have a lot of chickens in Mound," says Sherry. "I sit here and I can look out and anytime there might be six, eight, ten, 12 chickens in the road, trying to get out of

the road before a truck hits them. And with the chickens are the guineas. They entertain me. One day I looked out, and here was a huge hog walking down the middle of the road, and this high school kid was chasing it. It was an FFA project gone wild. He was trying to get that hog back in the pen. It was a real rodeo. And all this happened right here. I have to get out and see where the ambulance or fire truck goes, because people will come in and

ask where they went." Sherry is a retired

teacher and is at the post office only a few hours a day. "I'm here before 8 a.m. and close at 10 Monday through Friday. Saturday is my long day. I'm here before eight o'clock and close at 11:30." Sherry has a good time at her job and enjoys Mound, population 200, near Gatesville. Mound got its name from a hill that was full of cedar. When the cedar was removed the hill became known as the White Mound. There was a school and church near the Mound. "Back in the 1800s, they shared the same building.'

There is a mail route out of Gatesville, so some people have mailboxes on their property. Sherry gets mail from both services. She has had a post office box at Mound since 1962 when she and her husband married.

The post office is in the old Mound Depot building built in 1926 when there were a lot of people coming and going to Mound

by train. The post office was slated for closure, but citizens rallied to keep it open.

"At that particular time. I was not the postmaster and did not work here. But I was a friend of the postmaster, and she told me what was happening. So, I got a petition and went around to every house in Mound and to nearly every farm and ranch and got people to sign to keep our post office. And wouldn't you know it, several years later here I am running the post office." When the previous postmaster left the position, she asked Sherry if she wanted to take it. Sherry said she would be glad to.

Apparently, people appreciate her. They bring gifts and leave them on the post office porch. One was a loaf of fresh baked bread and a jar of orange marmalade with a note that said "for Miss Sherry, our postmaster. Thank you.

Coryell Museum has temporarily closed

The Coryell Museum and Historical Center is temporarily closed to the public while a new elevator is being installed in the facility. The museum officially closed on Wednesday, Feb.

According to museum board member Ray Ashby, "The reasons for getting a new elevator are many, but mainly because the current lift is old and outdated. If it were to break down, it would be impossible to find parts to repair it. If that were to happen, the museum would be out of ADA compliance (Americans with Disabilities Act) and would have to shut down for a much longer period than we have planned for."

Ashby said that the museum board made the decision to be pre-emptive and purchase a new elevator rather than to wait for problems in the future.

The company installing the elevator will be Home Elevator of Texas, which

is based in San Antonio. Griffith Renovation and Construction in Evant will be doing the construction portion, which will include rails, shaft, and landing under the supervision of Chance Griffith.

Ashby stated that the cost of the new elevator would be in the neighborhood of \$125,000, and, considering the price of a new elevator in the future, could be much higher than it is currently.

Ashby continued, "There are also lots of benefits about the new elevator that the old one doesn't have. At the moment, the current lift will only hold about three people or one person and a person in a wheelchair. The new elevator will have a larger capacity - maybe five to eight passengers. The new elevator will also travel at a much faster speed than the old one. This will come in handy during our busy times, such as Spurfest."

The museum will be closed for approximately three to four weeks.

Featherston expressed that our society has become fixated on fast food, processed items, and the convenience of which can be very costly.

"If we teach them the skills and give them the knowledge to cook and to learn how to use these in everyday life, they will begin to see a change in their finances and will take pride in what they have accomplished," she said.

"Cooking on a Shoe-String Budget," will be held once a month and will last an hour and a half for each session, with a start time of 5:30 p.m. The class will typically be held on the last Thursday of each month but is subject to change. 

Texas teenagers have big dreams for the future, and a simple click can help keep them alive.

TxDOT's Teen Click It or Ticket campaign is urging all teens to buckle up—every seat, every ride. Texas has seen a rising trend in teens not wearing their seat belt in a crash, jumping up 6% from 2022 to 2023. Out of the 296 teens that died in traffic crashes in Texas in 2023, 49% were not wearing their seat belts at the time of the crash. Buckling up takes just seconds—but those seconds save lives.

"These fatalities serve as a sobering wake-up call," TxDOT Executive Director Marc D. Williams said. "Every time someone gets in a car and skips buckling up, they're taking a deadly gamble. In the event of a crash, seat belts can give you the best chance to survive, and yet far too many Texas teens are still skipping this critical safety

Buckling up isn't just the safest choice, it's the law. Unbuckled drivers and pas-

sengers—even those in the back seat—can face fines and fees of up to \$200.

The Teen Click It or Ticket campaign is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader social media and word-of-mouth effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices

'The Cold Case Foundation: How a Team of Experts Solves Murders and Missing Persons Cases'

And there you were, at a dead end.

Your GPS sent you there, didn't it? Or it looked like an interesting road, an adventure in the middle of an otherwise normal day, but it simply ... ended, and the progress you made stopped with it. Now, you're lost. As in the new book, "The Cold Case Foundation" by Gregory M. Cooper and Thomas McHoes, it's time to re-

There were two murder cases that weren't yet solved, and FBI profiler Gregory Cooper had told the man he thought the cases were linked. Then Cooper met with his unit chief, the very esteemed John Douglas, who told Cooper that, having spoken to the prosecutor, the case was now his. Cooper took the task seriously and helped solve both cases.

helped solve both cases. In the U.S., the authors say, "more than 200,000 unsolved homicide cases" are waiting for solutions. Thousands of families are hoping for closure, even if it's bad. Publicity helps shine light. Police departments "do the best they can," but it's often not enough and that bothered

In 2014, shortly after he'd retired from the FBI.

Cooper greatly.

Cooper took a handful of unsolved cases he knew about, and he started the Cold Case Foundation, a nonprofit organization now staffed by knowledgeable people who are pas-

sionate about the issue.

Here, among others, is a case of a murdered star football player; and that of two vulnerable young women in separate cities. The authors share a story of a newlywed, stalked; and that of a young mother whose bones went unidentified for years.

"In the United States alone," the authors say, "there are more than 40,000 unidentified bodies ... still lying in medical examiners' offices across the country. That also means there are thousands of families ... wondering what happened to" missing loved ones.

As a procedural, "The Cold Case Foundation" is solid, riveting, and real. It's filled with hope and closure for families that sometimes wait decades for results.

Unfortunately, that authenticity is greatly marred

by pages and pages of re-created and made-up dialogue, which inherently makes this somewhat of a fictional tale. Yes, authors Cooper and McHoes explain that one of their methods of cold-case solving is to imagine exactly how a crime happened, including conversations — but what's in this book often extends way beyond methodology and into plain old-fashioned novel-

like storytelling. You may also notice a number of case solutions that seem ridiculous in their simplicity, and at least one exciting account that ends so flatly you'll wonder why it was included in the first place. Add in story omissions, repetition, sentences you'll have to read twice, and head-scratchers that True Crime fans will spot quick, and, well, tackle this book if you will, but go in with eyes open. Initially, "The Cold Case Foundation" seems to hold such promise and it has its very good parts, but ultimately, it's more of a dead end.

MUSEUM SPOTLIGHT

Lincolnville exhibit helps capture local Black History

When thinking about Black History Month in Coryell County, the Lincolnville exhibit, located on the second floor of the museum, comes to mind. The exhibit is full of photos of the former residents of the community and a few historic items, including the hand-held bell used at the Lincolnville School.

The story of Lincolnville has become intertwined with the history of Coryell County. Shortly after the end of the Civil War, local freedmen formed a community four miles west of Gatesville and named it Lincolnville in honor of

President Abraham Lincoln.

It was located near the Moccasin Bend area along the Leon River. James Maberry, former overseer for Chief Justice John Walker Maberry, provided leadership for the founding families of the colony, including Cook, Easley, Mayberry, Snow, and Weatherly families, among many others.

Acquiring land and establishing new homes on the edge of the Texas frontier was not an easy task, but all of the freedmen were experienced farmers, ranchers, and caretakers. The Leon River Valley provided an abundant supply of catfish and small game, and the

settlers quickly learned to live off the land to supplement their meager wages as freed slaves.

A church and school were immediate priorities of the community, which had not previously been allowed to openly practice religion or attend school. Bethlehem Baptist Church was established on April 10, 1872 by the Reverend G.C. Alexander. The church later moved to Gatesville in 1882.

The first African-American school in Coryell County opened in Gatesville in 1868, but the building burned shortly afterward. In its place, Lincolnville School No. 62 became a

public school by 1883 and existed until 1943 when most small rural schools were consolidated.

A Texas State Historical Marker, near the site of the former community, reads, "The survival of Lincolnville, despite racial strife and the harsh conditions on the frontier,

is a testament to the efforts of the citizens of the community.'

When the museum reopens, visitors are welcome

to drop by the museum located at 718 E. Main to view the massive spur collection. Yearly Coryell Museum memberships are \$20 for singles, \$30 for families, and \$40 for businesses, which includes free admission to the museum, plus four newsletters. Of course,

large and small donations are welcome at all times. Coryell Museum offers area schools and tour groups a delightful, guided tour through the museum with docents at many exhibits. Call the museum at 254-

865-5007 to plan a visit.

Gatesville basketball clinches fourth straight playoff berth

Gatesville basketball took care of their business, got the help they needed, and are playoff-bound for the

fourth straight season. By virtue of their 59-47 win over Lorena and La Vega's 59-51 victory over upstart China Spring, the Hornets locked up the No. 4 playoff spot out of 23-4A and will face old rival Lampasas in the Division I bi-district round Feb. 18 in Bruceville-Eddy.

The final two nights of the regular season featured dramatic swings in momentum for Gatesville and China Spring.

With two games remaining in the regular season, Gatesville controlled their own fate and just needed a pair of losses from China Spring to clinch a playoff spot. Gatesville lost 72-44 to La Vega on Feb. 7, but the Cougars pulled off a surprising upset of Connally the same night to take a one-game lead in the district standings.

That result meant that Gatesville needed to beat Lorena - who had dealt the Hornets a double-digit defeat three weeks ago - then hope that the red-hot Cougars did not pull off another stunner against the Pirates.

After dispatching the Leopards, a large contingent of Gatesville players, coaches, family members, and fans huddled around phones and packed themselves into Brit Campbell's office to watch the final six minutes of the matchup between the Pirates and Cougars.

Once the Pirates had secured their win, a wave of handshakes, high-fives, and relief swept through those remaining at Sydney Pruitt Gymnasium.

"That felt good," said Campbell.

The Hornets' head coach has much to feel good about considering how his team played in the biggest game of their season and how they will fare now that they have escaped the gauntlet that is 23-4A. The district schedule leaves every team beat up, worn out, and simply trying to survive and advance to the playoffs.

"It's been so frustrating at times. I honestly felt like we just couldn't catch a break,' said Campbell. "Now, I feel like we got our guys back and we are excited.'

In what was essentially a playoff game against the Leopards, Campbell and his staff pushed all the right buttons and got valuable

minutes from every player on the roster in avenging their previous district loss - perhaps none bigger than senior Kase Cox.

The three-year letterman played all 32 minutes and poured in a career-high 29 points in the win. Cox knocked down a three-pointer to start the Gatesville scoring in the opening period and never looked back.

He scored seven points in the first quarter, eight in the second, eight more in the third, then another six in the final period.

He scored 22 of his 29 points in the paint via an array of runners, floaters, and putbacks. He pulled down six rebounds, had three assists, and forced three turnovers.

West Allman was Gatesville's other double-digit scorer with 15, including three three-pointers and also dished out a career-high seven assists.

The Senior Night finale was the 100th game that Cox and Allman have played together in a Gatesville uniform, and their chemistry was evident throughout the night. The duo combined for ten assists with eight coming to each other. Six of Allman's assists were to Cox, and two of

and picked up a steal. The Hornets committed just nine turnovers on the night against steady, full-court defense from the Leopards.

After a deadlocked first quarter, the Hornets dominated the second to take a 33-18 lead.

Senior Evan McCracken buried a three pointer to give the Hornets a 19-16 lead early in the period. Then Allman followed with a transition layup to make it 21-16. Lorena cut the lead to 21-18 with 3:07 to play in the quarter before the Hornets closed with a 12-0 run into halftime.

Allman hit a mid-range jumper to make it 23-18; then Amos Phillips knocked down a free throw to push the lead to six at 24-18. Winkler then hit Allman for a corner three-pointer to make it 27-18 before Cox finished the half on his own personal 6-0 run.

He knocked a ball loose on the defensive end and finished with a layup to push the lead to 29-18, then scored on a nifty layup to make it 31-18. The final

bucket of the quarter came when McCracken found Cox cutting to the hoop, and the senior laid it in to make it 33-18 at the half.

Lorena would get as close as nine points in the second half before the Hornets pushed the lead to the 59-47 final.

The win over Lorena was the final home game for Allman, Logan Biggs, Cox, McCracken, and Rex Owen. Biggs had two steals in his usual disruptive defensive performance, and Owen had one steal while taking his turn defending Lorena's bruising center Seth Taverner. Junior Amos Phillips had eight points and six rebounds in the win, while freshman Grady Keeton had

three points and two rebounds.

The Hornets primary ballhandlers - Winkler, Keeton, Biggs, and McCracken - combined for nine assists against just two turnovers against Lorena.

In the loss to La Vega, Winkler led Gatesville in scoring with 15 points, while Cox and Allman each had ten. Phillips had six points and six rebounds to share the rebounding lead with Allman.

The Hornets' matchup against Lampasas will be their first since the Badgers defeated Gatesville 58-56 in November 2023. The Hornets and Badgers played twice in 2022 with Gatesville winning both by doubledigits.
